INSIDE SCOOP

Here are a few items that were on the table recently:

E-SCOOTER & ELECTRIC MOBILITY DEVICE ORDINANCE

In February, City Council voted to approve an electric mobility device ordinance. This ordinance will have the following effects:

- Creates a permitting process for companies that wish to supply e-scooters in the city.
- Establishes violations for abandoned devices.
- Allows for device geofencing and geolocation to ensure safety.
- Requires companies to share their data with the City.
- Establishes standards for device construction, safety lighting, and maintenance.
- Establishes parking, conduct, and operational standards in accordance with the Michigan Vehicle Code and traffic laws.

It was a pleasure to work with the Office of Mobility Innovation and Councilmember Calloway's Office on this ordinance. E-scooters and other personal mobility devices, when properly regulated, bring an accessible, green addition to the growing mobility options in Detroit.

BUDGET SEASON

Budget Season is officially underway! Mayor Duggan will present his proposed budget for Fiscal Year 2023-2024, followed by budget hearings with every city department.

I held a townhall meeting in February to get resident input on their top budget priorities.

Throughout the month, I also held budget planning meetings with my team and I will be pushing for what our residents need most.

RECENT MEMOS

Often, my office submits memorandums to get official answers to pressing questions of our residents. My recent memos and resolutions include:

INCOME PROTECTION ORDINANCE INQUIRY

I recently inquired with the City's Law Department on the legality of an ordinance prohibiting rental discrimination on the basis of an individual's source of income.

The city of Detroit currently has an ordinance that prohibits rental discrimination based on whether an applicant receives public benefits from government programs. The Law Department advised that we do not need a new ordinance, but that we may amend the existing ordinance to extend past public benefit status and covers any source of income.

2% EVENT SURCHARGE

I recently submitted a memo inquiring into the process and potential effects of establishing a two percent entertainment surcharge for events in the Arena District.

Detroit's Arena District brings thousands of locals and visitors to the downtown area. While the City does see some economic benefits of these events, the ticket revenue for these events goes solely to Development/venue owners.

The ability to raise capital from tickets sales could be a vital tool for increasing revenue to the City and to cover the cost and expenses that come with serving as the premier event and entertainment hub in the State of Michigan. I will share an update when I receive a response to this memorandum.

GUN LAWS RESOLUTION

In February, the epidemic of gun violence hit even closer to home in the senseless mass shooting at Michigan State University. The three students killed were all Wayne County residents, including one Detroit resident from District 5. My heart and prayers are with the families of all that are suffering as a result of this devastating tragedy.

I submitted a memo to have a resolution drafted that will urge the Michigan State Legislature to enact the 11 common-sense gun laws recently introduced in the state house and senate. I will fight for right of all people to learn, worship, and exist safe from the threat of gun violence.

DISTRICT DETROIT EXEMPTION

The District Detroit project is anticipated to receive approximately \$800 million in tax capture revenue over the life of the proposed Transformational Brownfield. While several taxing jurisdictions stand to be impacted by the Brownfield, the Detroit Public Library and Detroit Public Schools are particularly vulnerable to the loss in revenue.

I submitted a memorandum to see what the effects would be of exempting Detroit Public Schools and Detroit Public Library from tax capture. Detroit's Legislative Policy Division prepared a report in response to the memorandum. Their report states that the Library's tax contribution will be 1% of the project's total tax capture and that DPS' tax contribution will represent 22% of the total tax capture.

ESTABLISHMENT OF REPARATIONS TASKFORCE

The Reparations Taskforce that was voted on by more than 80% of voters during the November 2021 election has been appointed and will begin the work to repair the harm and damages done to Black people in our City.

As many other cities have begun constructing similar committees, I am honored to have Detroit join those leading municipalities that are paving the way for those affected by the historic discrimination and oppression against the Black community.

Our goal was to have these members seated before the end of Black History Month and I am elated that this body made it happen! Thank you to my colleagues and the members of this honorable Taskforce for your diligent service and efforts for the residents of Detroit.

STATE OF THE YOUTH 2023

I held my 8th Annual State of the Youth Panel last month at Osborn High School. Students requested the panelist that they would like to see at heed advice from.

Panelists included Justice Kyra Harris Bolden, Icewear Vezzo, Randi Rossario, and many more.

Students asked questions on the value of education, pressures of success, and maintaining friendships.

In addition to an amazing panel, we had giveaways on giveaways! Thank you to Massive Lifestyles, Detroit vs Everybody, the Wealthy Store, and Paper Dolls Boutique for spoiling our students!

MAYA ANGELOU VILLAGE GROUNDBREAKING

I had the honor of joining Alternatives For Girls, Mayor Mike Duggan, and Councilman James Tate at the groundbreaking for the Maya Angelou Village. This time next year, it will be a supportive housing facility, featuring 45 units of *affordable and permanent* housing with resources to aid those experiencing or at risk of homelessness.

Alternatives for Girls is a Detroit-based nonprofit dedicated to helping vulnerable, at-risk girls and young women avoid violence and exploitation and teen pregnancy. They are building this \$17.3 million project in collaboration with a nonprofit developer, Full Circle Communities.

The poll results showed that alley cleanup, home repair, and beautification are our residents' highest priorities. Once again, the community showed up! I can't thank you all enough for your contributions to this city.

Also attending the meeting were DWSD, We The People of Detroit, and the Wayne Metro Community Action Agency. I would like to thank Bruce Simpson and all the special guests for making this Town Hall so great.

TENANTS' RIGHTS WORKSHOP

As you all know, one of my favorite parts of my job is getting to visit my seniors every Friday! Usually I bring a hot meal, some small gifts, and games for us to play.

Last month, in addition to food, I held a renters' rights workshop at Van Dyke Center. Detroit People's Platform came out and informed all the residents of their tenant rights. They provided renters' resource guides and contact information for each resident in case they need assistance.

HOW TO APPLY FOR NEIGHBORHOOD BEAUTIFICATION PROGRAM



Funded by the Neighborhood Improvement Fund | Founded by Council President Mary Sheffield

WHAT IS THE NEIGHBORHOOD BEAUTIFICATION GRANT PROGRAM?

The Neighborhood Beautification Program (NBP) grant provides funding to Detroit-based neighborhood associations, block clubs, faith-based organizations, and non-profit organizations that currently own property or purchase Land Bank vacant lots (up to 4) to carry out a project in their community. Grant awards range from \$500 to \$15,000.

NBP has three eligible project areas: Clean-up Activities, Community Gardens, and Public Space Activities



HOW TO APPLY FOR NBP GRANT

STEP 1 APPLICANT ELIGIBILITY

- Must be a registered block club with the Department of Neighborhoods.
- Block clubs and/or neighborhood associations can register with the Department of Neighborhoods at How to Get Started. Visit bit.ly/3yjnBDR.

To receive funds, all applicants (even if approved by the Department of Neighborhoods) must be a NonProfit 501(c)(3) organization to receive grant funds.

- If the applicant is a 501 (c)(3) organization, move to Step 2.
- If you do not have a 501 (c)(3) designation, you may partner with one in your community.

STEP 2 SELECT YOUR SITE

If applicant already owns the vacant lot(s), move to Step 3. Please note: the property owned must be in the name of the LLC.

If applicant does not own vacant lot(s), go to Detroit Land Bank Authority:

The Detroit Water and Sewerage Department (DWSD) Lifeline Plan is Detroit's new water affordability program. Once enrolled, your benefits are:

- Get water **shutoff protection**
- Have your **past due balance erased** for good
- Receive an **affordable fixed bill** based on household income and size, and get up to **1,125 gallons of indoor water usage per household member per month**
- Eligible for **minor plumbing repairs** for high water usage
