CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Good evening, ladies and gentleman. Welcome to the Board of Detroit Police Commissioners meeting. My name is Jerome Warfield, Chairman of the Board of Police Commissioners. Serving with me tonight is the Vice Chairperson from the Board of Police Commissioners, Adela Rivera. Additionally serving with me is Commissioner Donnell White. And I'm glad to have with us from the Chief's office, Assistant Chief Chester Logan. Sir, good to have you here. And I'm going to ask our Secretary to the Board, Secretary George Anthony will introduce the rest of our staff for you.

SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Mr. Chair. For the record, Secretary George Anthony. From our staff, we have -- I would ask if you would just stand or raise your hand in your place. We have Ms. Celia Banks Washington who is our Attorney Supervising Investigator. We have Ms. Dalph Watson, who is our Director of Police Personnel, Lieutenant Timothy Leach who is from our Office of the Chief Investigator. We have Ms. Yolonda Caudle, who is our Community Affairs Coordinator. We

1 have Mr. -- or officer or Mr. Robert Brown seated to my
2 right who is our Office Manager. We have Officer
3 Terrence Bell who is one of our Recorders, Sergeant
4 Allen Quinn who is videotaping our recordings today and
5 Ms. Wendy Boer from Hanson Court Reporting Service.
6 Welcome. And that completes an introduction of our
7 staff.

8 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you,
9 Secretary Anthony. Again, it is such a pleasure to be
10 here in this historic location, Sacred Heart.
11 Certainly, it has served as a vital role in the history
12 of this great city. I don't know if there is a
13 representative here from Sacred Heart. But if so, we
14 would love to hear from you if there's a representative
15 from Sacred Heart Seminary or Church, I'm sorry. Okay.
16 Maybe they will be here a little bit later.

17 At this time, I'm going to ask if Chaplain
18 Darren Penson, Senior Pastor of Allen Temple AME Church
19 will come to the mic as we pause for the invocation.
20 Sir, good to have you here tonight.

21 CHAPLAIN PENSON: Amen. May we all bow our
22 heads in a word of prayer? Dear Heavenly Father, in the
23 name of Jesus, we come before You to ask Your blessings
24 upon this meeting. As we begin to hear the echoes of the
25 community, God, we ask that You hear their echoes, God to

1 brighten our City of Detroit. We also ask, God, that
2 the badges that each officer wear, God, the shields,
3 God, that You enlarge it by the blood of the lamb to
4 cover them, God, from their day-to-day operations. We
5 bless Your holy name. In Jesus' name, Amen.

6 AUDIENCE: Amen.

7 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Pastor Penson.
8 Bless you. At this time, I'm going to ask if
9 Commissioner White will read the duties and
10 responsibilities of the Board of Police Commissioners.
11 I'm sorry, Commissioner Rivera. We switched. That's
12 all right. Thank you.

13 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: The Board of Police
14 Commissioners was created by City Charter in July
15 of 1974. There are five members appointed by the Mayor
16 and confirmed by City Council. As Commissioners, we
17 serve five-year terms. And we may not serve more than
18 five years consecutively. We meet once a week, 52 weeks
19 out of the year. And all of our meetings are open to
20 the public.

21 Our duties are to establish policy, rules and
22 regulations in consultation with the Chief and approval
23 of the Mayor. We review and approve the department
24 budget. We review and approve department promotions.
25 We receive and resolve complaints concerning the

1 operation of the Police Department. We are the final
2 authority to impose and/or review discipline of all
3 Police Department employees. We appoint the Civilian
4 Personnel Director. We prepare an annual budget of
5 department activities for the public, Mayor and City
6 Council.

7 Our staff includes an Executive Secretary who
8 serves as a Secretary to the Board and attends all of
9 our Board meetings, a Chief Investigator and additional
10 Investigators. We also have other staff as necessary to
11 support the Board. The Detroit Police Commission
12 considers itself a liaison between the citizens of the
13 City of Detroit and the Detroit Police Department.

14 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Commissioner
15 Rivera. At this time, I would entertain a motion to
16 approve the agenda for tonight's meeting.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So moved.

18 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Second.

19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved
20 and supported. All those in favor?

21 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed? Motion
23 carries. Also entertain a motion to approve the minutes
24 from the Thursday, March 31st meeting.

25 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: So moved.

1 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

2 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved
3 and supported. All those in favor?

4 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

5 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Motion carries. I wanted
6 to just update you. As Some of you know, the Mayor of
7 the City of Detroit this week presented the budget for
8 the entire city. And as some of you know, we are
9 without question challenged in a number of areas
10 throughout this city. And this department, the Detroit
11 Police Department, certainly is no exception. But we
12 are pleased to report that in the budget that the Mayor
13 presented to the Detroit City Council, that he still has
14 a very strong commitment to make sure that law
15 enforcement officers are on the streets and in position
16 to continue to do the job that they have been hired and
17 commanded to do.

18 In addition to that, he has supported the
19 structure of this Board in an effort that we may
20 continue to do the job that we have been called to do as
21 well. And so, we want to thank the Mayor, and we want
22 to impress upon the representatives of the City Council
23 persons who are here tonight to work with us as we
24 continue to forge ahead and as we continue to make new
25 ground and new leeway into those things operationally

1 that we believe we need to do to make sure that this
2 department remains one of the top police departments in
3 the country.

4 In a few weeks, we are going to report to you
5 what we believe is just some outstanding news coming
6 from our Office of Chief Investigator as relates to
7 their ability to be able to really investigate cases in
8 a timely manner and through the new standard operating
9 procedures that were introduced late last year, to
10 really get a system of accountability around their
11 efforts and how -- and the amazing progress that has
12 been made. So in a few weeks, we will update you with
13 those numbers.

14 I also want to report that I had an excellent
15 time just last -- a couple nights ago, appearing at the
16 Southwest District meeting and the Northeastern District
17 meeting. The support that this police department
18 receives from the community is outstanding. And as we
19 told the citizens that night, that it is so vitally
20 important that the citizens of this city stay engaged as
21 willing partners hand in hand with the Detroit Police
22 Department. And so we applaud your efforts, and we
23 thank you for staying engaged.

24 At this time, I will yield the floor over to
25 the Assistant Chief that he may bring his presentations

1 forth. Thank you, sir.

2 ASSISTANT CHIEF LOGAN: Thank you so much.
3 Through the Chair, I'd ask that Lieutenant Danny Allen
4 come forward and do a presentation.

5 LIEUTENANT ALLEN: Good evening and welcome.
6 After having spent so many years standing in the back of
7 the room, now I have to be on this side of the
8 microphone. It truly is an honor. Lieutenant Danny
9 Allen from the Northeastern District. And I would offer
10 all of you a welcome from the Northeastern District,
11 Chairman Warfield, Commissioner Rivera, Commissioner
12 White, Assistant Chief Logan, Secretary Anthony and
13 Attorney Washington.

14 A few introductions. My partner at the 7th
15 Precinct, the officer in charge of the 7th Precinct is
16 Inspector Gary Sroka. Commander Frankie Lewis is
17 unfortunately unavailable to attend, but he is the
18 leader of the Northeastern District. And he is on
19 furlough currently.

20 We have from our Community Relations staff,
21 Officer Melanie Malone, Officer Labrie McClendon,
22 Officer Andre Camp and Officer Erik Hill.

23 A little bit about our demographics, but I
24 won't spend too much time on that. We are located at
25 5100 East Nevada. And we encompass approximately

1 28.16 square miles with a population of 125,000
2 residents. Our borders are east 8 Mile to Woodward
3 Avenue to east 8 Mile Road and Hoover at the north. To
4 the east, Hoover at east 8 Mile Road to McClellan Avenue
5 and the Detroit River. To the south, the Detroit River
6 at McClellan to the Detroit River at I-75. And to the
7 west, I-75 to east McNichols to Woodward Avenue and east
8 8 Mile Road.

9 As I stated before, the Northeastern District
10 is comprised of the 11th and the 7th Precincts. Some of
11 our major attractions in the Northeastern district are
12 the Eastern Market, beautiful Chene Park, which is a
13 wonderful concert venue and also home to some of our
14 Detroit favorites, notably Faygo Beverages and the
15 Better Made Potato Chip Company.

16 Amongst our goals and objectives, our number
17 one and always number one, to reduce crime. Secondly is
18 to improve our response times to calls for service.
19 Thirdly and also very important is to increase our
20 community partnerships. Four is to accelerate
21 compliance with our two federal Consent Decrees, also to
22 develop and implement a plan to increase police
23 visibility and implement crucial department technology.

24 It's difficult to put a numbering on this.
25 They are all very important goals, and we fully plan to

1 meet them. Our crime enforcement initiatives are an
2 armed robbery task force. And this is put together to
3 conduct surveillances using intelligence information to
4 focus on patterns of individuals who have been targeting
5 notably Family Dollar stores.

6 One of our successes occurred recently on
7 April 1st when a subject was arrested in connection with
8 two Family Dollar robberies. A subsequent search
9 warrant of his home uncovered evidence that tied him to
10 an armed robbery and a shooting in the 10th Precinct as
11 well. With the warm weather approaching, we plan on
12 instituting a curfew car which will focus on young
13 people out after the designated curfew.

14 This is twofold. The goals of this are two
15 fold; first of all, to increase the safety of our
16 youths. We find that when they are out after curfew,
17 very few good things happen. Secondly is to prevent and
18 be proactive at some of the crime that youths out after
19 curfew tend to be involved in; home invasions, stolen
20 vehicles and larcenies amongst them.

21 We additionally plan on increasing enforcement
22 of parental responsibility ordinances. Some of our
23 community initiatives are the update -- recent updating
24 of all of our business files with contact information
25 for new entrepreneurs who have a vested business in the

1 City of Detroit. We plan to meet with these owners on a
2 quarterly basis to hear their concerns and identify a
3 workable plan of action to help reduce any criminal
4 activity.

5 With the summer months approaching, also we
6 have our east Jefferson Avenue traffic initiative.
7 Traditionally, during the summer months, traffic along
8 the east Jefferson Avenue corridor has created many
9 congestion problems. We plan on increasing a patrol
10 presence down there. And our beats that are already in
11 place have been well received by the businesses and
12 residents in the area. We have begun an initiative with
13 Crime Stoppers beginning on April 1st. This is a very
14 important initiative in where Crime Stoppers offers a
15 \$100 cash incentive to those who provide tips on
16 individuals who are either carrying or storing illegal
17 guns. And I will note that this is not a gun buy back
18 program.

19 Our Woodward Avenue prostitution initiative
20 has yielded to date over 500 tickets which have been
21 issued to violators. That continues to be a problem
22 along the Woodward Avenue corridor. Our police
23 substations -- we have two of them -- are located in the
24 7th Precinct at the Butzel Family Center,
25 7737 Kercheval. This substation is staffed from

1 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., with officers and citizen
2 volunteers.

3 Our 11th Precinct substation is located at
4 20100 Conant in the Bellmont Shopping Center. This also
5 is operational from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and is
6 staffed with officers and citizen volunteers. And it
7 provides a full range of police services.

8 Upcoming, we have Police Week, which is a
9 celebration that occurs annually during the month of
10 May. It allows the citizens in our community to
11 voluntarily show their appreciation to law enforcement
12 personnel who work so diligently to serve them. It is
13 also a time when we all as a community and as a police
14 department remember our members who have made the
15 ultimate sacrifice and given their lives in the line of
16 duty.

17 National Night Out is an event that occurs
18 annually every August. It involves the community and
19 the police department uniting and working collectively
20 to bring awareness to the citizens in regard to crime
21 prevention solutions. This event is a family event, and
22 it features games, food and entertainment. There is
23 always a large turnout.

24 Our Turkey Bingo occurs on the Sunday before
25 Thanksgiving. It's an annual event. And at the end of

1 the day, each participant goes home with a free turkey.
2 Upcoming on May 6, I would like to remind everybody and
3 extend a warm invitation and welcome to our annual
4 Interfaith Memorial service. It is held in Greektown at
5 the Old St. Mary's Church. For those that have never
6 attended, it is truly a moving service.

7 In conclusion, it is my hope that this report
8 will give the Board of Police Commissioners and the
9 citizens of the Northeastern District a brief synopsis
10 of the mission and directives as mandated by our Chief,
11 Ralph L. Godbee, Jr. The members assigned to the
12 Northeastern District are dedicated and fully committed
13 to providing public safety and stability to our
14 community. Thank you.

15 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you. Are there any
16 questions from the Commissioners? Do you have a date
17 for Police Week?

18 LIEUTENANT ALLEN: That's usually in the first
19 week of May. I don't have a hard date for it. But we
20 will get it. Third week, 16th to the 20th.

21 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: May 16th to the 20th.

22 LIEUTENANT ALLEN: I stand duly corrected
23 before the Board.

24 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Any other questions?
25 Assistant Chief?

1 ASSISTANT CHIEF LOGAN: Through the Chair, you
2 know, many times -- this is something I really believe
3 in -- the hard work of officers sometimes go unnoticed.
4 I'd like for Lieutenant Allen to tell you about a
5 horrific crime that occurred last week and the fact that
6 his officers were able to bring it to a successful
7 conclusion. I'd like you to talk about those shootings.

8 LIEUTENANT ALLEN: Savannah and Charleston,
9 yes. And that was a very horrific crime. We had
10 unfortunately six people shot, one fatally. And through
11 the efforts of our special operations group, headed by
12 Lieutenant Harold Rochon, we were able to bring the
13 individuals that committed that assault to justice.
14 Well, we arrested them; and we will put them through the
15 justice system. It was a very horrific scene. I was
16 out there personally. And it was a dispute over some
17 stolen narcotics. But there was a very quick and sure
18 response by members of the Northeastern District.

19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Excellent job. Thank you.
20 Thank you. Always good to see you, sir.

21 LIEUTENANT ALLEN: Good to see you, Chairman.
22 Thank you.

23 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I want to apprise the
24 audience that Chief Ralph Godbee desperately wanted to
25 be here tonight. However, unfortunately his family has

1 suffered the third transition of a member of their
2 family in a very short period of time. His aunt made
3 her transition. And he is involved in making the
4 arrangements for that. So we ask that you would keep
5 the Godbee family in your prayers. Normally he would
6 not miss a community meeting. But certainly, he
7 extends his apology. And we want to make sure that we
8 keep them in our prayers, he and his family.

9 Moving on, Assistant Chief, is there anything
10 else, sir?

11 ASSISTANT CHIEF LOGAN: No.

12 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you. Moving on
13 through to the agenda, we have a grant, a couple of
14 grant requests that have come our way. And I'm going to
15 ask if -- thank you -- may I ask Commissioner White, if
16 you can read those for us. Thank you.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: As relates to a request
18 to apply for the OJJDP Fiscal Year 2011 Community-Based
19 Violence Prevention Demonstration Program from the
20 United States Department of Justice. United States
21 Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs,
22 Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention is
23 seeking applications for funding under the Fiscal Year
24 2011 Community Based Violence Prevention Demonstration
25 Program. Local governments are eligible to apply for

1 awards up to \$2,200,000 with no cash match.

2 The program will extend over a three-year
3 period. The Mission of the program is to change
4 community norms regarding violence, to provide
5 alternatives to violence when gangs and individuals in
6 the community are making risky behavior decisions and to
7 increase awareness of the perceived risks and costs of
8 involvement in violence among high risk young people.

9 The Detroit Police Department's Criminal
10 Investigations Bureau has been provided with the
11 application instructions and is currently developing a
12 program to fit the guidelines of the grant. CIB with
13 assistance from Grants and Contracts will submit an
14 application seeking the amount of \$2,200,000. In the
15 event that approval is granted to apply and the award is
16 received, Commander Robert Ennis would serve as the
17 Project Director. The deadline for this application is
18 May 23rd, 2011. Upon your approval, the Detroit City
19 Council will be requested to adopt a resolution
20 supporting this application.

21 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Is there a motion?

22 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Motion to approve the
23 grant.

24 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

25 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved

1 and supported to support the grant. Any questions? All
2 those in favor please say aye.

3 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed? Motion
5 carries. Second grant, please?

6 COMMISSIONER WHITE: As relates to the request
7 to apply for the COPS Fiscal Year 2000 -- I'm sorry.
8 It's an acronym. As relates to the request to apply for
9 the COPS Fiscal Year 2011 Community Policing Development
10 CPD program from the United States Department of
11 Justice's Office of Community Oriented Policing
12 Services. The United States Department of Justice's
13 Office of Community Oriented Policing Services has
14 announced that they are accepting applications for their
15 COPS Fiscal Year 2011 Community Policing Development CPD
16 program. Community policing funding should be used to
17 provide organizational strategies which support the
18 systemic use of partnerships and problem solving
19 techniques to proactively address the immediate
20 conditions that give rise to public safety issues such
21 as crime, social disorder and fear of crime.

22 Applicants are encouraged to present original
23 and innovative proposals under one of the following
24 topic areas. Number one, policing in a new economy.
25 Number two, ethics and integrity. Number three,

1 children and youth safety. Number four, role of
2 Community Policing and Homeland Security. Number five,
3 Urban Violence. Number six, open. Number seven, Tribal
4 Resources Grant Program. Number eight, basic community
5 policing technical assistance. Number nine, Critical
6 Response Technical Assistance Program. And number ten,
7 Core Community Policing Curriculum Program.

8 The Detroit Police Department is determining
9 which topic area to apply under. Funding can be awarded
10 up to \$500,000 with a no cash match for the three-year
11 grant. The 12th Precinct has been provided with the
12 application instructions and is currently developing a
13 proposal to fit the guidelines of the grant. In the
14 event that approval is granted to apply and award is
15 received, Inspector Nick Kyriacou of the 12th Precinct
16 would serve as Project Director. The deadline for this
17 application is April 21, 2011. Upon your approval, the
18 Detroit City Council will be requested to adopt a
19 resolution supporting this application.

20 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Motion to approve the
21 grant.

22 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

23 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved
24 and supported. Any questions?

25 COMMISSIONER WHITE: I do have a question,

1 through the Chair, to AC Logan. With the deadline
2 fastly approaching next week, have we already identified
3 which target area we'll be focusing on?

4 ASSISTANT CHIEF LOGAN: Sir, through the
5 Chair, I've got Inspector Kyriacou from the 12th
6 Precinct.

7 LIEUTENANT FITZGERALD: Good afternoon.
8 Lieutenant Fitzgerald from the Central District, Charles
9 Fitzgerald. It's going to be the Central District. We
10 have a few target areas within the 1st and 13th Precinct
11 we've identified.

12 COMMISSIONER WHITE: I'm sorry. I think I got
13 lost. So it's not going to be the 12th Precinct? It's
14 going to be the Central District?

15 LIEUTENANT FITZGERALD: Right, it's going to
16 be the Central District, the 1st and 13th Precinct.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: As it relates to the
18 target areas that were listed, the 1 through 10?

19 LIEUTENANT FITZGERALD: It would be number
20 five, urban violence.

21 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Can you explain exactly
22 what that is going to entail?

23 LIEUTENANT FITZGERALD: It's a three-part
24 objective to our grant proposal. It's going to be --
25 the first part will be a com staff, bi-weekly com staff

1 meetings. The second objective is going to be through
2 bed checks, night owl checks through the Michigan
3 Department of Corrections, along with Narcotic
4 Enforcement through DPD and Wayne County Sheriff as
5 another partner. And then the third objective is going
6 to be the crime prevention strategies with both business
7 and community.

8 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you.

9 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you. Any other
10 questions? With the stated changes to the grant as
11 relates to the area of focus, we will -- I ask if you
12 can just amend your motion to reflect the changes.

13 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Motion to grant the
14 approval of the grant with the changes as stipulated.

15 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

16 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved
17 and supported. Any other questions or discussion?
18 Hearing or seeing none, all those in favor?

19 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

20 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed? Motion
21 carries. Also for the record, we want to put on the
22 record that this Board has been apprised of three new
23 directives that have been submitted to the Board,
24 Directive 101.9 regarding special purpose committees;
25 Directive 102.5 regarding awards; and Directive 304.6

1 regarding training.

2 At this time, this is one of our favorite
3 times that as we come out to community groups, because
4 we have the opportunity to say thank you. Many times,
5 the individual's hard work unfortunately is only
6 recognized after they have gone on to the other side of
7 living. But I'm glad that we have the opportunity to
8 thank people while blood is still flowing through their
9 veins and while breath is still healthy in their body.
10 And tonight we are very happy and very pleased to honor
11 Evangelist Hatcher from the Northeastern District. And
12 I'm going to ask if she will come up at this time.

13 (Applause)

14 Commissioner White is going to read the
15 resolution from the Board. And certainly we have some
16 other things for you as well. Commissioner White?
17 Thank you, sir.

18 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you. It's an honor
19 to read this resolution to Evangelist Hatcher.
20 Resolution Honoring Dora Hatcher. Whereas Ms. Hatcher
21 has been a life time resident of the City of Detroit for
22 47 years, she is a stand-up citizen and active member in
23 her community. She has helped to assure safe passage to
24 school for children and residents of the Northeastern
25 District.

1 And whereas Ms. Hatcher plays a major role in
2 the growth and stability of her community. She started
3 her long involvement with community activism with the
4 late city council president, the Honorable Erma
5 Henderson working on neighborhood clean-up projects,
6 attending neighborhood meetings and City Council
7 meetings.

8 And whereas, Ms. Hatcher is active in her
9 neighborhood, and the qualities displayed by her not
10 only reveal her sincerity and devotion but also
11 emphasizes her loyalty and assistance to the Detroit
12 Police Department. An example of this is shown by her
13 participation in the Citizens' Police Academy and her
14 dedication as Corresponding Secretary to the
15 Northeastern District's Community Relations Council.

16 And whereas, Ms. Hatcher serves in many
17 capacities. She has participated in community service
18 activities such as the Motor City Makeover and Angel's
19 Night Out. She has volunteered for numerous events at
20 the Northeastern District, including the Northeastern
21 District's Annual Easter Egg Hunt, Police Week, Back to
22 School Rally, National Night Out, Haunted House and the
23 Annual Senior Turkey Bingo.

24 Now therefore, be it resolved that the Detroit
25 Board of Police Commissioners, speaking on behalf of the

1 Detroit Police Department and the citizens of Detroit
2 recognize and honor the community spirit of
3 Ms. Dora Hatcher. Her commitment to volunteerism and
4 improving the quality of life for the citizens of the
5 Northeastern District and the entire City of Detroit
6 merit our highest regard. We thank and congratulate
7 you, Ms. Dora Hatcher. Adopted by the Board of Police
8 Commissioners, April 14, 2011, signed by all
9 Commissioners. Congratulations.

10 (Applause)

11 ASSISTANT CHIEF LOGAN: Ms. Hatcher, on
12 behalf of the Chief of Police Ralph L. Godbee, he'd like
13 to present you with the Certificate of Recognition. And
14 this says to Ms. Dora Hatcher, a resident of the City
15 of Detroit, in appreciation for the following
16 outstanding service and cooperation, for your
17 involvement with the community and services to the City
18 of Detroit, supporting our efforts in the community,
19 demonstrate spirit and commitment that is truly worthy
20 of recognition. Signed Ralph L. Godbee, Jr., Chief of
21 Police, Detroit, Michigan.

22 (Applause)

23 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Assistant Chief, give me
24 the -- I'm sorry. One more. I'm sorry.

25 COMMANDER SROKA: Hey. How you doing? I have

1 only been here a short time. But I have gotten to know
2 you and respect you. And it's my honor that I get to
3 present the Spirit of Detroit Award, presented by the
4 Detroit City Council. And it his presented here with an
5 expression of the gratitude and esteem of the citizens
6 of Detroit to Mrs. Dora Hatcher in recognition of
7 exceptional achievement and outstanding leadership and
8 dedication to improving the quality of life, which is
9 signed by all the City Council members.
10 Congratulations. Keep up the good work for us, all
11 right?

12 MS. HATCHER: Good evening. I'm a lady that
13 talks a lot, but I'm at a loss for words tonight. But I
14 thank God first for me being here. And I thank Him for
15 all of you. And I thank Him for this honor. And I want
16 to say that I thank God for my husband who is here with
17 me tonight. And I want to thank God for all of my
18 family and friends that are back here tonight. Would
19 you all please stand, my family and grandchildren, some
20 of them. I thank God He is allowed me to live to be the
21 age I am. I'm 65. I have like 11 grand and 11 great
22 grand. And I just thank God today for how good he has
23 been to me. And I plan to keep on working in the City
24 of Detroit. I ain't leaving because you know what? If
25 we don't work together and love one another, our city

1 won't make it. Our city will not make it. And I'm just
2 like most older seniors, I have problems too. But you
3 know what? We have to push past those problems. We
4 have to keep our mind a little more stable. My mind say
5 I'm 25 y'all, but my body say I'm a lot.

6 I just want to thank you all tonight. And I
7 want to let you know, Officers, and to our Chairman and
8 everyone here, when you see me hug and kiss our young
9 police officers, I was asked by my Commander who is not
10 here tonight does my husband have a problem with that?
11 Let me tell you why I do that. Tomorrow ain't promised
12 to us. I may walk out of here tonight, God forbid I
13 don't and pass out and fall out and die. And if I have
14 not said goodbye to you, I love you and God bless you, I
15 don't feel right.

16 So, when I hug you and tell you bless you and
17 I love you, it's from my heart because we have to learn
18 to love one another. You may not like what someone
19 does, but we have to love each other in order to make
20 it. And again, I thank you so much.

21 (Applause)

22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you. The great
23 thing about Evangelist Hatcher is that certainly she
24 supports our effort and she supports the efforts of this
25 Department. But I appreciate her and her honesty

1 because when she sees something wrong, she is not shy
2 about letting us know what needs to be corrected. And
3 we need citizens like that who understands both sides of
4 that coin. So, we -- again, we thank you and honor you
5 again tonight for your work.

6 The next Board of Detroit Police Commissioners
7 meeting will be held Thursday, April 21st, 2011, 3:00,
8 1300 Beaubien, Room328 A. It certainly is open to the
9 public. And we would love to see you there.

10 The time of our agenda now calls for oral
11 communications. If you wish to address the Board of
12 Police Commissioners, we ask that you come to the podium
13 in the center, give us your name and if you can spell
14 that for the record for us we need that so that we can
15 enter it into the record. And we also ask that you
16 abide by our four-minute time commitment in order that
17 we may hear from as many persons as possible. And if
18 you see me trying to stop you, I'm not trying to be
19 rude. I'm just trying to move it on. All right. Thank
20 you. Good evening.

21 MS. JACKSON: Good evening. My name is Kim
22 Jackson, and I'm the president of Northeastern District
23 Community Relations. Most people come up here to
24 complain. I'm not going to complain tonight. I just
25 want to say thank you for the Northeastern District, for

1 Lieutenant -- okay I'm going to get it right this time
2 -- Lieutenant Rochon, which I saw him back
3 there, and Inspector Sroka and Lieutenant Allen,
4 Commander Lewis. Those guys are phenomenal. We
5 couldn't ask for anything better. And I thank them so
6 much. They give their heart. They give their time,
7 they take our complaints, our issues. I know they sick
8 of me. But it's okay because I'm there to help.

9 But I just want to say thank you not just to
10 those guys but the whole Northeastern District from our
11 Community Relations on down. But I do want to say thank
12 you to all of the officers because everybody puts their
13 life on the line every day, even the citizens if you
14 want to know the truth. But the officers, they're out
15 there. They have to deal with this. And I just want to
16 say thank you guys very much. Thank you.

17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I want to thank the
18 Northeastern District for your faith and your patience
19 in the leadership of the Chief because when there was
20 some adjustments in the staff there, certainly there was
21 some anxious hearts. But we can understand that, that
22 through faith and through patience, you all see that
23 there are plenty of good men and women in uniform. And
24 there are more good things that can come about. So we
25 need to thank you for your patience.

1 MS. JACKSON: Thank you.

2 MS. MORRIS: I would be the grim reaper.

3 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: There is no such thing.

4 MS. MORRIS: Tawana Morris, Fight For Your
5 Rights Investigator. I do the investigations for the
6 Detroit Coalition Against Police Brutality. I'm also a
7 retired 25-year officer from the Detroit Police
8 Department. Of course, when there are complaints, the
9 complaints come to the Coalition. And it's -- you know,
10 I hate to be the bearer of bad news. But the truth have
11 to be told, and the City needs to be aware. So, if we
12 do have bad officers, they need to be dealt with. Okay.

13 Two comments. He told me only take two
14 minutes. But anyway, one, welcome to my home. This is
15 my church. Yeah, I go to church. In the presentation,
16 I would also like to offer, the use of vehicles when
17 they are doing this new program the officer was talking
18 about for this summer, that they use marked vehicles
19 because marked vehicles is another form of deterrent.
20 And using professional ethics because, you know, Detroit
21 is in a pinch right now.

22 And I just came from Lansing yesterday. And
23 it's tension, serious tension. So, this summer is going
24 to be tension. So we need some communication along with
25 the young people as well. And they need to be taught

1 how to respect. And secondly, a concern. Will the
2 Financial Manager have control over the Police
3 Department?

4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Well, we don't have a
5 Financial Manager. And it is my prayer that we will
6 never have a Financial Manager. But that's my opinion.
7 So it's interesting to me that the State has been in a
8 mounting deficit for years, and no one has ever
9 suggested a Financial Manager for the State of Michigan.
10 But yet when there is money -- and let me say this.
11 When there is money to be directed or redirected, when
12 there is money to be redirected, whether it's the school
13 board, whether it's the City of wherever, then others
14 come from the outside on the inside to direct monies.

15 And we have seen in our past -- this is
16 nothing new -- that when the monies are redirected, they
17 are not redirected to our benefit. They are redirected
18 for our detriment. And that's on the record. And so,
19 we do not have a Financial Manager. And it is our
20 prayer that the budget that will be passed will reflect
21 the fact that we have no need of a Financial Manager.

22 Unfortunately though, the law that was passed
23 regarding financial managers give them broad powers,
24 sweeping broad powers that I think will still be
25 challenged. So that remains to be seen. But we are

1 going to do everything in our efforts to make sure that
2 we tighten our buckle, our belt, to add to, relieving
3 the pressure of the deficit with the City.

4 MS. MORRIS: Okay. One more comment, which is
5 a good comment believe it or not because, you know, we
6 are the watch dogs. The incident that happened on
7 Ashton and Joy Road when there was a -- I don't want to
8 call it agencies, but a certain agency came into
9 Detroit. And the situation began to be tensed. Detroit
10 came in and divided the situation and was able to be
11 effective as well as the FBI came in and they were able
12 to be effective. And you gain, through the community,
13 it's my understanding because I work through the
14 community, that they appreciated that. They appreciated
15 that Detroit did come in and settle the situation
16 professionally. Thank you.

17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Let me say this to you,
18 Sister Morris, before you take your seat. And you and
19 others have apologized before you come to the mic.
20 There is no need to apologize for what you need to say.
21 You have a role. And your role is valid, your role is
22 valuable. And so no need to apologize. We want to hear
23 the good, bad and indifferent in order that we may
24 collectively get better quickly. So we thank you for
25 being that watch tower, Ms. Morris. Thank you.

1 MS. REED: Hello, Commission. I am Sherry
2 Trumbell-Reed. You guys have seen my face before. And
3 I'm so glad that you said that you're open to hear good,
4 bad and indifferent. I want to give all my thanks to
5 all of you guys and the Detroit Police Department. And
6 it seems like I have been anointed or whatever to be the
7 squeaky wheel for the citizens of Detroit.

8 Again, I had an unpleasant experience with
9 some police officers today. And, you know, I just want
10 to say that what do you guys do as far as teaching
11 compassion to your officers? I know that they're under
12 a lot of stress. Their jobs are hard. But people that
13 live in the city are having a rough time too. So, we
14 need our officers to be compassionate and caring in some
15 sense of the words.

16 I got a call from ADT that my burglar alarm
17 was going off. So, I was stopped there at a light at
18 Davison and Livernois. And when the call came in, and I
19 did take off because I, you know, I wanted to get home.
20 They asked me did I want the Police Department to meet
21 me there at my house. And I said no because I didn't
22 want to get a charge for the officers coming out. But
23 the officer, when he -- you know, as soon as I crossed
24 the light I saw him. I pulled over. And when he came
25 up, I said, officer, I just got a call that my alarm

1 system has went off. And he immediately was like, well,
2 what was you 'gonna do when you get there you know?
3 It's just -- it's not what you say, it's how you talk to
4 your citizens.

5 We pay the salaries, and we understand that
6 you guys are under a lot of stress. But the people in
7 the city is under stress too. I am not a second class
8 citizen. And I'm very sure if, you know, when you look
9 at it from the standpoint if it was you, how would you
10 feel? So, I asked him -- he was very very rude. He did
11 say he was going to call the alarm company to see if the
12 call came in. Because I told them not to send the
13 police, it didn't show the report that the alarm had
14 gone off. But he wrote me a ticket you know. He was
15 very cruel. I mean, I lost about 15 minutes to get home
16 to see about my property. But once I got there,
17 everything was okay.

18 But again, you know, I'm in a forgiving spirit
19 about a lot of things that's going on here in the city.
20 I just have to ask every day that the Lord forgive me.
21 I want to be a benefit in my community. I work in the
22 community. And I stand up for my community. I put my
23 life on the line for my community several times. I take
24 care of five or six properties around my house to make
25 sure to keep my neighborhood clean. And I have worked

1 and communicated with the Police Department.

2 But I don't want to be treated like a second
3 class citizen. I want the same respect that they would
4 -- that an officer would like to have if somebody
5 stopped his mother or his sister. Thank you.

6 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Ms. Trumbell, before you
7 go back to your seat, two things. Certainly we will
8 agree that, you know, the approach of the officers are
9 very important. So two things. I am going to ask if
10 you will see our Chief Investigator, Lieutenant Leach,
11 that he may get that report from you because we do want
12 to follow up on that. And then Commissioner Rivera had
13 something to say as well.

14 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Last week, I don't
15 recall seeing you at our meeting. But we had a
16 presentation by Commander Dwayne Love. And one of the
17 concerns that I had was about the demeanor of police
18 officers. And I understand from him -- he did send us
19 the training schedule for the Police Department. And he
20 has assured us that they will add a course or
21 reemphasize the course on what they call Verbal Judo,
22 which I think is their attempt at being polite.

23 So, he has assured us that that is going to be
24 in the training program in the 40 hours that they get
25 every year.

1 MS. REED: That's wonderful. Thank you. Just
2 real quick, I don't have any points. I don't know when
3 I have gotten a written violation. So it just seems
4 like some things you have to think and you look at the
5 whole situation. This is an older lady. She doesn't --
6 if you look at my record, you can see I don't have any
7 problems with traffic. So it just seems like some
8 things should just automatically click in when a police
9 officer stops a person, you know. You just don't jump
10 right into attack mode right away. Okay. Thank you
11 very much.

12 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you. Again, before
13 you leave, please make sure you see Lieutenant Leach
14 before you leave. Yes, sir? Good evening.

15 MR. MILLER: Good evening. My name is Steven
16 Miller, and I appreciate this opportunity to talk to
17 this Honorable Body. I am here also on a sensitivity
18 issue as it relates to the Mental Health Transport. On
19 last Thursday, April the 7th, I attempted to follow a
20 court order, having a relative transported. I had the
21 legal document. And I want to first of all say that I
22 am very supportive of the Police Department of course.
23 I have previously worked in the Administrative Section
24 of the city and as well as the Legislative Branch of
25 government. So I'm very familiar with the policies.

1 And I'd like to say that the officers -- of
2 course we support them one hundred percent. I have had
3 great experiences. I have had family members that have
4 served the Police Department, currently serving the
5 Police Department as well as many friends from years of
6 working with the City of Detroit. However, this
7 particular day, and even with the mental health
8 transport, 98 percent of the officers that have had to
9 come out, I would like to say, they have handled the
10 situation with dignity and with grace.

11 However, that was not the case on
12 April the 7th from Officer Choice and Officer Allen.
13 When they came to the residence, I had of course the
14 legal document from Judge Mahar. I had sat in his
15 chambers, and the judge had signed the document. And
16 one of the officers went so far as to ask me for a birth
17 certificate. And if you look at the Petition for
18 Hospitalization, it doesn't require that you be a
19 relative. It simply specifies whether a relative,
20 neighbor, peace officer, etc.

21 So, in Michigan, for a 72-hour hold, anyone
22 can do it. Most of the times, the officers, they come
23 out with a great deal of finesse. And they usually will
24 talk to the patient and will have the patient say, you
25 know, they will say something to the extent of, you

1 know, I know you don't want to go. But legally, this
2 gentleman has gone to court, and the document allows us
3 to take you there. You'll have your day in court. And
4 normally that works very well.

5 Well, on this particular day, the officer went
6 back and forth and he told me in fact that the document
7 was not legal because he said it didn't have a seal on
8 it. Well, not all documents from the court, especially
9 for probate, have seals on them until the official has
10 been done, the official act has been done. And of
11 course I know a little something about legal having
12 worked for the former General Counsel, the Honorable
13 Sharon McPhail. And having worked with her for some
14 years since 1992, you can imagine I know a lot of
15 lawyers. And I'm not going to just bring a document and
16 not be aware of it. So I was very kind to the officer.

17 However, at one point, I asked him, are you
18 saying that you're not going to transport the patient?
19 And then of course he changed his whole demeanor at that
20 point. But then of course instead of taking 96 or
21 either 75, which they traditionally do, they decided to
22 take Grand River from Wyoming and Grand River all the
23 way and then of course all the way over to Warren. And
24 it was just like I didn't understand where this level of
25 resentment was coming from because of course all you're

1 doing as a relative or even a neighbor or a friend is
2 attempting to get the person the help. And you're
3 following the guidelines of the probate court. And so,
4 you know, we expect that that should go smoothly. It's
5 not like we made these documents up. They are official
6 documents. And maybe they need to understand. I'm
7 going to assume they don't know.

8 At one point when the officer said he couldn't
9 read the documentation, he asked me if the actions had
10 happened that day. The law doesn't require that they
11 happen that day. You in fact have ten days to execute
12 it, which I was executing the very next day. And so,
13 you know, it was just unnecessary I think. And they had
14 been there before. And so, you know, my grandmother
15 used to always say if something happens once it's a
16 fluke. If it happens twice, it's sure to happen a third
17 time.

18 I am not attempting to see a third time. I'm
19 also on the Littlefield Community Association Board as
20 well as others. So I'm still doing community work, love
21 the City of Detroit, will continue to do that work. The
22 police, I can say they service our community very well.
23 When we have had situations, of course, I've even gone
24 as far as to testify when we have apprehended
25 perpetrators because I understand that it's very

1 frustrating to the officers when they go so far and they
2 work so hard and then they won't get someone to go to
3 court, of course the charges won't stick. So, I am, you
4 know, a full-fledged citizen. And I believe in going
5 the extra mile. And of course when I have the legal
6 documents, I expect it to be handled properly.

7 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Mr. Miller, just a few
8 things. First of all, thank you for coming tonight.
9 And we appreciate the detail that you have given us to
10 follow up on. And again, I want to ask that you would
11 see Lieutenant Leach, who is now in the back of the
12 hallway now when he gets through with Ms. Trumbell.
13 But Assistant Chief, do you have anything?

14 ASSISTANT CHIEF LOGAN: Yes, sir. You
15 mentioned Littlefield and they took Grand River. That
16 leads me to believe that was in the Southwest District?

17 MR. MILLER: Southwest District, you're
18 correct.

19 ASSISTANT CHIEF LOGAN: Who is here from
20 Southwest? Inspector Montgomery will also look into
21 this.

22 MR. MILLER: Yes, sir. I also wanted to say
23 that our Community Relations Officer, Officer Williams,
24 she's doing a great job.

25 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.

1 MS. ROMANO: Good evening, everyone. My name
2 is Anna Romano.

3 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Could you spell that for
4 us for the record into the mic?

5 MS. ROMANO: R-o-m-a-n-o. I have attended
6 quite a few of these meetings. But it seems that we
7 seem to fail to recognize the tireless and endless
8 efforts that these officers are doing within our
9 community. I would like to acknowledge the Northeast
10 District and Lieutenant Rochon and his crew on the
11 tremendous effort that they have been doing and the
12 great tremendous job they have been doing at the
13 district. And it seems that I've come to meetings, we
14 talk about everything from tow to different problems.
15 But we never acknowledge these officers.

16 And I did listen to Lieutenant Allen, and he
17 really summed it up. And I think it's wonderful, and
18 they should be acknowledged.

19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Absolutely. And we have
20 said it before, and maybe we don't say it as often as we
21 should. But without question, the overwhelming
22 majority, as Mr. Miller said, 98 percent of the time
23 when they come to his house, it's been great. The
24 overwhelming majority of officers who work for the
25 Detroit Police Department do an outstanding job day in

1 and day out. So certainly, we can do more to
2 acknowledge those efforts. So we echo your voice.

3 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair, if I could,
4 Ms. Romano, correct me AC if I'm wrong, I think you
5 announced a few weeks ago, on the department's website,
6 not only can you file a complaint against an officer,
7 but you can also recommend an officer for -- it's coming
8 soon, not up yet. Maybe AC can speak to it.

9 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: We are going to have our
10 own ribbon the Board will be allowed to award. So --

11 MS. ROMANO: I hope it's coming real soon
12 because it seems like we have got a forum for complaints
13 but nothing to commend a person.

14 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: As soon as it's
15 available --

16 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's done. And we want to
17 wait until we do the formal announcement. But it's
18 done. But we probably about six or eight months ago
19 recognized the fact that there are just some guys and
20 ladies who are doing an outstanding job on the force.
21 And like you, we felt like that our job has been
22 fielding complaints and handing out reprimands. But we
23 as the Board, we wanted to recognize those officers who
24 are going over and beyond the call of duty. And really
25 soon, next week or so, we will announce our award that

1 we will be giving out to the officers as well.

2 MS. ROMANO: Wonderful. Thank you so much.

3 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you. Are there
4 others wishing to address the Board?

5 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: I would just like to say
6 while we have a moment here that -- and I will be
7 speaking with you later, Lieutenant Rochon. But that we
8 have heard a lot of very good things about what's going
9 on at Northwest. Are you in charge of Community
10 Relations? I'm sorry, Northeast. I'm from Southwest.
11 What do you want? You get me past Woodward -- I would
12 like to speak to you about the towing issue. And I'd
13 like to put that on the record next week.

14 MS. ELSASSER: Good evening. How are you? My
15 name is Kayla Elsasser. That's E-l-s-a-s-s-e-r. I'm
16 going to very brief. I would like to applaud every man
17 and woman, two-legged and four-legged, that wear blue
18 and protect and serve us here in the City of Detroit. I
19 have only lived here eight years. And in that eight
20 years, I have volunteered that entire time through
21 community relations. And I have met and worked with
22 incredible men and women, dedicated. Do we all make
23 mistakes? Absolutely. That officer that pulled that
24 lady over, he was having probably a bad day like I am
25 because I couldn't go home and change before I came

1 here. So, it's a bad day.

2 But I applaud them all. And it is a way if
3 someone is doing something we might want to change, to
4 present it. And I would ask that the citizens of the
5 City of Detroit, when you present your issue -- not a
6 complaint, let's make it an issue -- that you take that
7 into consideration. And trust me, I have presented
8 issues in a friendly way I Hope. Sergeant Carrie can
9 attest to that. Northeastern District, I have lived in
10 for three years. It's different from Central. That's
11 where I came from. And Lieutenant Harold Rochon, I'm
12 going to applaud him again. I have never known this man
13 -- and I have only known him now about six or eight
14 months. He is incredible. He puts in the time. He
15 does the work. And everyone supports him and helps him
16 over there.

17 The Community Relations Officers are great.
18 Command is great. And you have a good Police
19 Department. So, I applaud you, and I thank every one of
20 you that have taken care of us for years, and we
21 appreciate it. Thank you.

22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you.

23 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Through the Chair, I
24 just want to -- all those nice things I have told you
25 about Lieutenant Rochon, he can't make pancakes.

1 MS. PANNELL: My name is Sharon Pannell,
2 P-a-n-n-e-l-l. I'm from the Barton-McFarland
3 Neighborhood Association. And I got involved with them
4 because I had a break-in in my home. And I just want to
5 personally tell Commander Serda, Commander Fair, thank
6 you because without them -- I was terrorized because I
7 had never been broke into in my life. I have been
8 living on Hartwood for 30 years. I worked for 35 years
9 with the phone company. I worked all my life, raised
10 two boys in this city, which 21 years in the army one
11 son, and my other son is an FBI agent. I raised them by
12 myself.

13 So when I got broke into, I was like crazy,
14 you know. So I called the police station every three
15 days. I know they get sick of me. But I just
16 personally want to say thank you. Thank you.

17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Mrs. Pannell.
18 I appreciate you. Thank you.

19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Yes, ma'am.

20 MS. JOHNSON: Hi. It's my first time in this
21 situation; So bear with me. My name is Darlene Johnson.
22 I have lived in the City of Detroit for five years. And
23 unfortunately my experience has not been so well. I
24 have had to call the police about eight times for my car
25 being stolen. And the thief was actually in the car,

1 outrageous neighbors, squatters, all types of things.
2 And out of the seven or eight times I called, I only had
3 two responses from the police. They never showed, never
4 called back. And it's very disheartening.

5 And also there's no quality of life calls,
6 what I call quality of life calls. If you have
7 outrageous neighbors that are, you know, blasting their
8 music at 2:00 in the morning, it seems like there's no
9 police force or availability for people to come out and
10 address quality of life issues is what I call them.

11 But the other two problems I have with the
12 Detroit Police -- and I'm sure officers are going to
13 hate me for this. I would like to see a patrol car
14 going down the street without both officers on a
15 personal cell phone. How can you patrol the streets
16 when both of you are on a cell phone? Now, it's --
17 there's laws against driving with cell phones. There's
18 laws against texting. But I cannot recall the last time
19 I have seen one of your officers, if not one or both of
20 them on the phone, on their cell phones. To me they
21 should not be allowed to carry them. Obviously, if
22 there's a crisis or an emergency in their family, they
23 can be reached. And they should follow the same
24 standards that most employees have.

25 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: One second. I'm going to

1 ask if we can close that door so we can hear a little
2 bit better because the voices aren't carrying very well
3 in this room. And if we can take our side conversations
4 outside, that would be very helpful so that everyone can
5 hear our speakers. Thank you.

6 MS. JOHNSON: So that's really a big thing for
7 me. You cannot be doing your job if you are on a cell
8 phone. You cannot be gazing and looking. And another
9 thing is, you know, in the area that I'm in, people run
10 red lights right in front of officers, and they are not
11 pursuing. And then there could be -- I know that you
12 guys go to calls that we don't see, and you have to rush
13 to situations. But for an officer to come zooming by me
14 on Outer Drive with no lights on and blowing lights with
15 to me no apparent reason because I don't obviously know
16 what his call was. But there should be lights. If a
17 police officer is in the pursuit of something or on his
18 way somewhere, he shouldn't just be zooming through
19 traffic and blowing lights. He should have his signals
20 on. He should be made seen and known.

21 And that happens a lot. I'm not exaggerating.
22 Almost every other day we see a police officer just go
23 pull up to the light, see the traffic is clear and just
24 blow through it and not even in a hurry or turning with
25 no signals. How can you expect an average citizen to

1 follow and obey your traffic rules when you have police
2 officers out there that aren't? So thank you for your
3 time.

4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you. I'm going to
5 ask if the Chief might want to respond. Ms. Johnson,
6 if you can stay there for one second, the Chief might
7 want to respond to some of those issues.

8 ASSISTANT CHIEF LOGAN: Through the Chair,
9 I'll see if I can find the district Ms. Johnson lives
10 in. And I'd like to put her in touch with --

11 MS. JOHNSON: I live on Outer Drive and 94.
12 And I have had no response from the police. And, you
13 know, I seriously mean, there was -- the thief was in my
14 car. I walked out and caught them. I was scared. I
15 didn't even know how to turn my car off. I called
16 again. Nobody came. I called again. Nobody came. I
17 finally had to call somebody from way across town to
18 come over and help me shut off my car because the thief
19 was -- I didn't know if the thief was still in the area.

20 ASSISTANT CHIEF LOGAN: I'm going to direct
21 her to Commander Dolant.

22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: See Commander Dolant.
23 He'll speak to you right now. Thank you.

24 MS. JOHNSON: Thank you for your time.

25 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: In defense, a lot of

1 times when I was a police officer, we were calling in
2 reports and things like that. So, not every time you
3 see an officer on a cell phone, they are not always, you
4 know, talking to their friends. Sometimes it's just
5 easier for us to rather than sit in the precinct and
6 waste our time in there, it's better to be on the street
7 and call your reports in. So, a little defense there.

8 MS. SMITH: Good evening to the Commissioners,
9 to you Chief Logan. Good seeing you again. Bernice
10 Smith, political activist. I am so delighted to see
11 these guests here in our neighborhood, I mean, my
12 neighborhood. I am a mid-city representative and also
13 my officers, always glad to see them.

14 But my concern tonight is the budget that the
15 Mayor went before the Council and stated. One in
16 particular subject was, is it true that he is thinking
17 about it, getting -- cutting on the Police Department
18 and the Fire Department? I mean, the statement was
19 made. And I was quite concerned about it. And of
20 course I'm going into it anyway as far as I'm concerned,
21 not coming to you, I'm going to him when I see him. But
22 the fact is I think that's atrocious. Look what's
23 happening to Flint. They got six police officers on
24 their force. Now, is the Mayor thinking -- you know,
25 how is he thinking? Who is telling him?

1 I have looked at his booklet. Most of you
2 have seen the directory of all the employees. He has
3 nine, assistant to the Mayor, assistant to the Mayor.
4 Come on. This is ridiculous. I don't know even why we
5 got an assistant to the Mayor's wife. What is she doing
6 down there? What is going on?

7 But anyway, I am concerned about the Police
8 Department because being number one on the Police
9 Department -- which I haven't got my certificate yet
10 since 1973, which I am still working on it. I just want
11 to let you know, the Police Department has done wonders
12 in my estimation. I have no problems with them. I get
13 along with them. I go to the meetings every Thursday.
14 And most of you citizens should come down there also,
15 and then you will see what the police are doing. They
16 take care of the bad, and they take care of the good.

17 So I don't want you to feel as though that
18 it's all one way. The Police Department is doing a good
19 job. They are handicapped because they do not have the
20 employment and more police to help them out because they
21 can't do it all on their own. And I know this for a
22 fact.

23 And as far as the cell phone is concerned, I
24 -- that's kind of hard to believe that two policemen are
25 on the cell phone while they driving. But anyway, I

1 don't doubt what she's saying. But it's kind of
2 unbelievable. But the fact is it may be. I wasn't
3 there, neither was you.

4 But the fact is the Police Department is doing
5 the best that they can. And I want the people and the
6 citizens of this city to know, give them a break because
7 they are at a handicap now. The budget is being cut in
8 every way. I was at the rally yesterday in Lansing. I
9 saw what the people are doing. And I imagine most of
10 you do not know what's going on in this city, the water
11 plus the pensions. We got to worry about their pensions
12 and everybody else's pensions. So, be kind to the
13 Police Department. That's my advice to all of you.

14 (Applause)

15 MS. HATCHER: You all already know who I am.
16 I have a few things I want to say. First of all --

17 OFFICER BELL: Say your -- repeat your name,
18 please.

19 MS. HATCHER: I am Evangelist Dora Hatcher.
20 The young lady that was up here is some of my
21 grandchildren's mother, Ms. Johnson. And I want to say
22 not only to her but y'all of you know I'm pulling from
23 the hip -- if you get out and you go to some of the
24 meetings like this meeting and your Community Relations
25 meetings and you get to know who your Commanders are in

1 your area and who your Lieutenants are or whatever,
2 maybe we can help this problem. But if you sit at home
3 and you don't go to meetings, you don't know what's
4 going on.

5 And so I'm glad tonight I was honored so that
6 she could come and see now that she can go to meetings
7 and express what's going on and needs to get involved
8 because once you involved, then as the lady said, you
9 know what's going on. We have good officers. Let's be
10 real, and we got some just there for the paycheck. I'm
11 sorry. I already know that. I'm human. They are
12 human. I don't knock it.

13 But our police officers I know in the
14 Northeastern District, they go their limit. I want to
15 thank my police officers out of the Northeastern
16 District. They go their limit. And I do believe No. 9
17 does the same thing. But you ain't going to get
18 cooperation from everybody. You don't get cooperation
19 from everybody in the church. So we just start there
20 and move on down.

21 (Applause)

22 MR. MOORE: Good evening to the Commissioners,
23 to our Chief and to Detroit's finest and to the family
24 that's here. My name is Edward Moore. I am the liaison
25 of the Honorable Kwame Kenyatta, our Detroit City

1 Councilman, bringing warm greetings from his office. My
2 purpose of standing before you is to recognize Ms. Dora
3 Hatcher. This is not the first time I have seen her.
4 In the last five years, she's been coming to 1300
5 Beaubien. So I want to thank you from me personally and
6 also from Councilman Kenyatta's office for all the good
7 work that we have seen you doing for our city. The
8 Councilman might not know your face but he does know
9 your name because I have put you on my report. So,
10 continue on doing the good work for our city.

11 I'd like to say to the Board, we are pleased
12 as always to see you all of you all in the community.
13 Keep doing the good work for us as citizens and also for
14 Detroit's finest. And one other thing. I'd like to
15 recognize Detroit Police Reserves is in the house.
16 Thank you.

17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you.

18 (Applause)

19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Seeing no other comments,
20 at this time, I will entertain a motion to adjourn the
21 meeting.

22 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: So moved.

23 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

24 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved
25 and supported. All those in favor?

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COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Ladies and gentlemen,
thank you so much. Have a good night.
