5	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Good afternoon, ladies and
6	gentlemen. Welcome to the Board of Police Commissioners
7	meeting. My name is Jerome Warfield, chairman of the
8	Board of Police Commissioners. Serving with me today is
9	the vice chairman, Commissioner Adela Rivera, as well as
10	Commissioner Donnell White. And sitting in for the
11	chief of police for us today we have Assistant Chief
12	Chester Logan. Sir, good to have you here.
13	ASSISTANT CHIEF LOGAN: Good to be here.
14	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: At this time, I'm going to
15	ask the board secretary please, Mr. George Anthony, to
16	introduce the rest of our staff.
17	COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
18	For the record, Secretary George Anthony. Our staff
19	includes Miss Tina Orr who is our chief investigator
20	seated in the front; Miss Celia Banks Washington, our
21	attorney and supervising investigator also seated in the
22	front, Lieutenant Lolitha Porter who is representing the
23	personnel department, Miss Yolanda Caudle who is on
24	staff, Police Officer Kent Cooper also on staff,
25	Mr. Robert Brown our office manager, Police Officer

1 Terrence Bell who is recording our proceeding and 2 Miss Wendy Boer who is our court reporter today from 3 Hanson Court Reporting Service. That completes the 4 reading, sir.

5 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir. 6 Appreciate that. At this time, we want to ask if 7 Chaplain Ray Hill is here. Sir, could you come to the 8 podium? Thank you. From Mt. Zion Church. We're going 9 to ask if you could deliver for us today's invocation. 10 Thank you.

11 CHAPLAIN HILL: Thank you. Let's bow our head 12 for a brief word of praise. Almighty God, creator of 13 all mankind, we first pause to say thank you. Thank you 14 for the many blessings that you have already bestowed 15 upon us. And we thank you that this is a day that you have made. We ask and we pray for prosperity for this 16 17 city. We pray for our leaders. We pray for these commissioners. And oh, God, we thank you for the ideals 18 19 and concepts that you would give us to move this city forward according to your name and your word. And the 20 21 people of God agreed and simply said amen.

22 AUDIENCE: Amen.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Chaplain Hill.
We appreciate your service. At this time we will accept
a motion to approve the agenda for today's meeting.



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1 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Motion to approve the 2 agenda. 3 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support. CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Properly moved and 4 5 supported. All those in favor? 6 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. 7 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed? Motion 8 carries. We will have the approvals of last weeks 9 meeting on the next agenda because they were not ready 10 today. So, if that's okay with everyone, we will do 11 that. There is no chair report. We have a lot of 12 information we want to get to, certainly want to remind 13 you that we will have an open forum today during the 14 meeting to discuss secondary employment. But there are 15 some information that's going to come to us from also the chief from the police as relates to forfeiture 16 17 funds. And, Commissioners, I want you to notice in 18 19 your packet, there is a request for an executive 20 appointment of Lieutenant Charles Wilson. I'm going to 21 ask if we can bring that item back for next week after 22 we have reviewed the request and place it on the agenda 23 for next week to be acted upon if that's okay. 24 At this time, we want to ask if Assistant

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Chief Chester Logan will bring on the presentation and

1 anything else he has at this time. ASSISTANT CHIEF LOGAN: Thank you, sir. I'd 2 3 like to bring forward Deputy Chief Ben Lee who has a presentation that I think you will find very 4 5 interesting. Deputy Chief Lee? 6 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Yes. Deputy Chief Benjamin 7 F. Lee from the management services bureau. Good 8 evening, I should say afternoon. The forfeiture 9 accounts fall into two categories. We have what we call 10 the federal fund and the state -- what we call the local 11 fund. The federal fund is a little bit more liberal 12 than the state fund. And the quide for the federal fund 13 is a book called, The Guide to Equitable Sharing for 14 State and Local Law Enforcement Agencies. That is the 15 Bible of how to spend and how not to spend the federal forfeiture funds. 16 17 The state fund which we call the local fund is a little bit more liberal, I mean a bit more stringent 18 19 in what we have to do. It has to have a narcotics nexus in order to spend that money from that particular 20 21 account. This is actually the cover for the book that 22 the feds printed out. It was updated in April of 2009. 23 Next. And within the book, they give you all of the

24 uses for the equitable share.

25

That could be property that we seize or money

1 if the property is sold. Depending on the amount of time that we spend on that particular case, we get a 2 3 share of that particular money. So, if our input is 50 percent, then 50 percent of those proceeds will be 4 5 forfeited to the City of Detroit. And you can use those 6 funds on any activities that you see in the future that 7 will result in some investigation, law enforcement 8 training, equipment, detention facilities. That's 9 either construction or the operation of that facility, 10 law enforcement facilities and equipment, drug education 11 and awareness, pro rata funding, asset accounting and 12 tracking, law enforcement travel and transportation. 13 Impermissible uses, you can't pay salaries for

14 existing positions. You cannot use it for non law 15 enforcement personnel, payment of non law enforcement expenses and any expenses not specified on what they 16 17 call a DAG 71. That's just a form that's filled out. The feds will notify you that the assets are available. 18 19 And then you fill in the information as to the amount of 20 time you spend on that particular case. And you forward 21 it back to the federal government. And then they in 22 turn forward the money and deposit it into our account. 23 You cannot use it for political or personal reasons or 24 anything that would be deemed extravagant.

25

Federal uses, we have used it for travel and



1 training. We funded the Explorers programs, Explorers program 1 and 2, purchase surveillance cameras at 2 narcotics, copy machines, computers, printers. We also 3 4 used it in the gun buy-back program. We were allowed to 5 use \$20,000 of that fund. We also bought money 6 counters, new flashlights for every member of the 7 department, tactical lights, a cashiering system for the 8 Central District where we have centralized all of our 9 cashiering responsibilities that we have there; and it's 10 now on computer. That was one of our audit findings 11 that we had. So we corrected that by buying a computer 12 system that kept track of all of the monies that were 13 deposited by account. Cell block painting and the PR 14 24's. We use the PR 24's. And we bought those.

15 The way the federal government operates in their audits, they actually conducted an audit. And 16 17 when they came in, they wanted to know that we had bought the PR 24's. And they gave -- we gave them a 18 19 list of all of the PR 24's that we had. They conducted a random sample of all of the PR 24's that we had. And 20 21 the officers were required to bring in that PR 24 and 22 show the auditors when they came in. That's how strict 23 they are in terms of how we spend this money.

24 State use, the only uses that you can use it 25 for are personnel, equipment, federal grant match,



1 informant fees which is our secret service account, buy 2 money. And I have to look up. State uses, we have used 3 it to pay the lease payments for narcotics and for the 4 forfeiture section where we store the cars, the secret 5 service funds, buy money, leased vehicles and the maintenance of those vehicles. The state law was 6 7 changed some time ago to allow Crime Stoppers to use a 8 portion of the narcotics state forfeiture fund. So, we 9 did give Crime Stoppers I believe it was \$25,000. We use it for salaries, Wayne County prosecuting attorney 10 11 and computer software.

12 All of these expenditures are subject to audit 13 and internal and external review. All of the requests 14 from expenditures from the forfeiture fund is funneled 15 through my office at management services. And the chief has the final say on the expenditures or his designee. 16 17 And at management services, I am the designee. So the small items that come through, I will go ahead and 18 19 approve those. And Tina in budget will not approve an item unless I have signed off on the use of forfeiture 20 21 funds and I have inquired as to whether or not it's a 22 permissible expense.

23 We are subject to audit from the federal 24 government as well as the auditor general and also 25 internal affairs. As I mentioned earlier, with the

1 federal audit, that's how strict they are in terms of actually wanting to see the property that you have. And 2 3 they were strict about it. And those officers that did 4 not come in and were on furlough, they required that 5 they sign an affidavit that they have that particular 6 PR 24. And we had to present that to the federal 7 auditors and the Department of Justice. I am in 8 constant contact with the Department of Justice 9 regarding any expense that I may not see or don't 10 understand within the federal quidelines for permissible 11 use. So, I have a contact person that I will call and 12 say this is what we want to do. Is this a permissible 13 expense? They will say okay, and we will exchange an 14 And I'll make that part of the file. e-mail.

15 The source of the funds that we have are usually with the state funds, it's going to be either 16 17 through individuals that are stopped and arrested and articles are seized, either cash or property, or through 18 19 a raid. With the federal government, it's generally going to be a partnership that we have with the federal 20 21 government, matter of fact it has to be a partnership 22 with the federal government. And then we complete the 23 DAG 71, and the money is forfeited.

And the process is usually there's an address, and there's a seizure. The DAG 71, which is available

1 on line. There's an administrative court proceeding. 2 They have 20 days to contest the seizure. And if they 3 don't contest it, it's an automatic seizure/forfeiture 4 after 21 days or the administrative court proceeding and 5 then it's forfeited and the item or property or money is 6 our's.

7 Right now, as of February, the balance that's 8 available in the federal account is \$508,000, and the local account, it's approximately 2.9 million. These 9 10 have not been adjusted by any seizures that we have that 11 have not been officially forfeited. So, this at some 12 point in time will probably be more. I'm sure it will 13 because I know there's some seizures that we have and 14 that have been -- we have but have not been adjudicated 15 yet. Next slide. Any questions?

16 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Commissioner Rivera has 17 questions.

18 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: I remember when I first 19 came or became a commissioner, we had an audit, am I 20 correct in that? And it specified the spending. Can we 21 get that kind of audit again? I don't -- I'm sure Celia 22 will be able to tell you the report I'm talking about. 23 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Was it the auditor 24 general's report?

COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Was it the auditor

2	MS. BANKS WASHINGTON: It was.
3	DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: That's available on line.
4	MS. BANKS WASHINGTON: It went up for 2008 I
5	believe.
6	DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: I know they just finished
7	an audit of our impressed cash that's going to be coming
8	through real soon.
9	COMMISSIONER RIVERA: As I recall, there was
10	five or six million in the federal and around seven or
11	eight million in the local. Now, am I correct in saying
12	that you have to spend that money within two years?
13	DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Yes, ma'am. That was one
14	of the audit findings that we had. So, we went on an
15	aggressive spending program because the federal
16	government's policy and procedure is if you don't spend
17	that money, then they have the right to come and take
18	it. So, we went on an aggressive spending to adjudicate
19	that money and spend it within that two-year time frame.
20	COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Is the federal balance
21	always higher than our local one or is it the other way
22	around?
23	DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: They have been comparable.
24	We have just done a lot of things with the federal fund
25	because it's a little bit more liberal. And that

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1	balance is down.
2	COMMISSIONER RIVERA: So, we spent almost
3	let's just throw a number out there four million
4	dollars on all this stuff that you told us, radios and
5	is that am I correct in that?
6	DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: It's exactly how
7	much
8	COMMISSIONER RIVERA: The batons and all that
9	is where those millions went?
10	DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Yes. And I got these
11	figures from Tina Toliver in budget I believe it was on
12	Monday. So, there is going to be more in that account
13	because we are constantly taking. And it's just whether
14	or not it's adjudicated or not. But the balance that's
15	available there may be more money in that particular
16	account. But when we have to make lease payments or
17	there are payments that are constantly made, like the
18	undercover cars. Those are very large payments that we
19	make. And so, that constantly draws on that fund. And
20	that money is not available. Even though it's there in
21	the account, it's not available to spend on anything
22	else other than that.
23	COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Okay.
24	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Any other questions?
25	COMMISSIONER REEVES: I just wanted to know



1	and again I apologize. I just wanted to know how long
2	until this report be ready. And agaain through the
3	Chair, I do apologize for my tardiness.
4	MS. BANKS WASHINGTON: The next audit?
5	COMMISSIONER REEVES: When will the next audit
6	report be available so we can just
7	DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: I know that we are
8	answering the questions now through the Chair. And that
9	will be available probably next week, they will put it
10	on line. They will wait for our answers, and then they
11	will publish our answers to the audit I'm thinking next
12	week. That's controlled by the auditor general.
13	COMMISSIONER REEVES: Definitely within the
14	next two weeks?
15	DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: I can't say. They release
16	that particular report. I don't have any control on
17	when they actually release it.
18	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Yes, sir?
19	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you. DC Lee, is
20	there a cap on funds that can be spent before it
21	requires the chief's signature?
22	DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Through the Chair, there's
23	no cap. But if it's going to be a large expenditure, if
24	an expenditure comes through and it's \$40,000 and it's
25	for cameras and it's for narcotics, then I will sign off

1 on that. The expenditure where we purchased flashlights, it was \$200,000 something odd thousand 2 3 dollars. I did get approval from the chief prior to 4 doing that because we were switching to a different 5 flashlight. And the other expenses that come out of 6 those accounts, Party Stopper, Operation Party Stopper, 7 it's a narcotics initiative. Those get prior approval 8 before they actually do that operation. And they get 9 the prior approval from the chief and the assistant 10 chief. 11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: But there is no dollar 12 amount that warrants the chief's signature per se? 13 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: No, not that I'm aware of. 14 COMMISSIONER WHITE: The second question, is 15 there a revenue split as relates to forfeiture dollars? Whatever we forfeit, we don't need to spend all of that? 16 17 Is there a percentage that -- I thought it was a certain 18 percentage that we were able to spend. 19 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Through the Chair, every 20 dollar that we have that's forfeited, we can spend it.

20 dollar that we have that's forfeited, we can spend it. 21 There is a cap on what you can use for community based 22 programs. And that's 15 percent of the last two years. 23 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Last question, on the 24 numbers that you showed on the previous slide, are those 25 balances year to date or does that include what might be



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1 left over from the previous year? And if it is year to date, do we -- what is the balance from 2010 and 2 3 potentially 2009 that was not spent? 4 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: I had that through the Chair, but I did not bring that with me. And off the 5 6 top of my head, I don't know what that balance was as of 7 that date. But this balance is as of the beginning of 8 February. 9 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So year to date? 10 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Yes, that's what's 11 available to spend on anything that we want to spend it 12 on within the guidelines of how we can spend it. 13 There's more in that account. But this is the only 14 amount that's available to spend on something else other than what we have already accounted for, money that's 15 16 already spent like lease payments, car payments. Those 17 are all taken out so that we don't spend it and not have 18 money to pay the rent or the lease vehicle payments. 19 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So to Commissioner 20 Rivera's point, the concern that you saw a report that 21 it was much larger, you're saying that there is more 2.2 funds available but they are ear marked for something 23 else and therefore not included in this number?

24 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Yes.

25 COMMISSIONER WHITE: You don't have that

1	larger number, what that is today?
2	DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: That's correct. What it
3	will show, let's say if we have a lease payment that's a
4	half a million dollars, that will be backed out of that.
5	There's another lease payment for our UC cars. It's a
6	half million dollars. Theoretically, there's a million
7	five in the account, but only \$500,000 is available to
8	spend.
9	COMMISSIONER RIVERA: (Indicating). It's the
10	new flashlight. I just wanted to maybe the public
11	would like to see how it works. It's very bright. If
12	you click it twice, it strobes I think, right?
13	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All right then.
14	COMMISSIONER RIVERA: It's supposed to like
15	distract the bad guys' vision or something. I don't
16	know.
17	ASSISTANT CHIEF LOGAN: It comes with a cone
18	for directing traffic at night also.
19	COMMISSIONER RIVERA: So, nice new
20	flashlights.
21	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All right then. Let's
22	COMMISSIONER RIVERA: That's \$200,000. The
23	public has a right to know what the flashlight looks
24	like and how it works.
25	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Absolutely, Commissioner,

1 you're right. One last thing, Deputy Chief. The balance that's to date, do you know how much of that is 2 3 toward the end of it's life cycle as relates to what 4 could potentially go back if the federal government 5 wanted to come and get it? And secondly, have we ever 6 given over money back because we didn't spend it, I 7 mean, from your knowledge? 8 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: No, we have not. That was just one of the findings in one of the last audits that 9 10 they had. And at that point, we went on an aggressive 11 spending because we didn't want to have to give it back. 12 And we didn't want that be to an audit finding 13 the second time around. And they have not been back for 14 an audit since then. 15 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: And the life cycle of the balance, do you know if any of that money is close to 16 17 that two-year life cycle? DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: I don't believe so. 18 19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Great. Any other 20 questions? 21 ASSISTANT CHIEF LOGAN: Through the Chair, 22 Assistant Chief Logan. You know, many times you will 23 read and hear about large seizures that the Detroit 24 Police Department is involved in. So it's not unheard 25 of that you're, you know, bringing in ten million

1 dollars. But that money is divided among a number of different ways. So, the bottom line is we don't get the 2 3 whole ten million dollars. I think a part of it goes to 4 the jurisdiction where it was confiscated, and it also 5 goes to the partners who are involved in the seizure. 6 So, in a way, it's misleading. I just wanted to make 7 that point. 8 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Absolutely. Thank you, sir. Any other questions from the commissioners? 9 Thank 10 you, Deputy Chief. Appreciate that, sir. 11 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: You're welcome. 12 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Assistant Chief, did you 13 have anything else? 14 ASSISTANT CHIEF LOGAN: No, sir. 15 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All right. At this time, we have a grant request. And I'm going to ask if 16 17 Commissioner White would read the grant request for us, 18 please. 19 COMMISSIONER WHITE: As it relates to the 20 request for permission to accept a donation of \$191,094 21 from the DTE Energy Company for the copper theft task 22 The DTE Energy Company has offered to donate force. 23 \$191,094 to the Detroit Police Department's copper theft 24 task force. The funds will be utilized to pay for the 25 costs and expenses for two police officers. There is no

1 cost to the department for this donation. And the funds will be utilized exclusively for law enforcement 2 3 personnel. I am asking the board's permission to accept 4 5 this donation and seek approval of the honorable city 6 council. So moved. 7 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Is there a second? 8 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Motion to approve the grant. 9 10 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It has been properly moved 11 and supported to approve the request for this grant. 12 Any discussion? 13 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Ouestion. 14 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Yes, ma'am. 15 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Who is in charge of I have a couple questions. 16 this? 17 COMMANDER BETTISON: Commander Bettison. 18 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: I have a question, 19 Commander. Who is in charge of the copper theft task 20 force? 21 COMMANDER BETTISON: Currently right now, that 2.2 is going to be Commander Steven Dolant. It falls under 23 the major crimes bureau. 24 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: That was my question. 25 And how many -- do we have a task force right now?

2	COMMISSIONER RIVERA: How many officers are
3	currently on it?
4	COMMANDER BETTISON: Four.
5	COMMISSIONER RIVERA: This will provide two
6	more or just supplement them?
7	COMMANDER BETTISON: It's just going to help
8	pay for the cost we're paying now.
9	COMMISSIONER RIVERA: The four we have. Thank
10	you. Those are my questions.
11	COMMANDER BETTISON: Thank you, ma'am.
12	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Any other questions?
13	Commissioner Reeves?
14	COMMISSIONER REEVES: Through the Chair, our
15	four people, are they able to pretty much handle this
16	task? The four officers that's designated to this
17	particular task force, are those enough officers to take
18	care of this?
19	COMMANDER BETTISON: Through the Chair, yes,
20	sir. We have been successful. Started the task force
21	back in 2006 to address the epidemic that was occurring
22	at the time. And in 2006, DTE and AT&T and the City of
23	Detroit Public Lighting Department was experiencing a
24	severe problem where thieves were actually climbing up
25	on to utility poles, cutting overhead lines and also

stealing transformers. And they were knocking out
 citizens' telephone services and their power to
 businesses. So it was really adversely effecting the
 City.

5 So we put this task force together over at 6 Northeast, myself, now Assistant Chief Logan. And we 7 started small and was able to actually go city wide with 8 it. And we were able to really reduce those thefts big 9 time. We reduced AT&T's theft rate by over 90 percent, 10 over 95 percent actually. Also, DTE's theft rate in the 11 high 90 percent, saving them over 3.1 million dollars in 12 one year alone and also the City of Detroit theft rate 13 to our public lighting department because a lot of the 14 light poles out there, they are actually City of 15 Detroit's. So, we reduced that theft rate tremendously, saving the citizens of Detroit a lot of money. And our 16 17 POD yard over on Grinnell was getting hit. And they had lost over \$400,000 in like a year and a half at that 18 19 facility. And we cut their theft rate almost basically 20 to zero.

21 So, it's been very very effective. And what 22 we found was that it wasn't a lot of folks committing 23 this crime. It was a few folks who were masterminding 24 the whole operation. So after we were able to identify 25 them and work with the prosecutor's office, get them

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1	some real prison time, get them off the street, then
2	that's how we actually got those reductions.
3	COMMISSIONER REEVES: Great job.
4	COMMANDER BETTISON: Thank you, sir.
5	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Any other questions from
6	the commissioners? All right. Thank you, sir. Thank
7	you, Commander Bettison. Hearing or seeing none, all
8	those in favor of the grant request, please say aye.
9	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
10	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed, you
11	have the same privilege. Motion carries. Thank you.
12	At this time, we want to move toward the issue
13	concerning secondary employment. And we want to make
14	the floor open and available for those citizens who wish
15	to comment on the secondary employment work opportunity
16	for the police officers. Let me explain it for those of
17	you who may not be fairly familiar. Last year the
18	mid last year, the Detroit City Council enacted an
19	ordinance that allowed the police officers to work in
20	uniform for private businesses, serving as officers,
21	serving as officers that will work for them. Primarily,
22	it's a huge cost savings or one of the things it does
23	for the City is a huge cost savings, especially as it
24	relates to special events.

25

1 to a lot of the special events. And we can move the continuum where those events actually now can pay for 2 3 those officers at those events as well as in other areas 4 as well. Certainly there were some concerns expressed 5 when we first brought this up I believe in July, in our July or August meeting. I think it was the August 6 7 meeting of last year. And I received a lot of 8 information and talked to the chief and others about the policy itself, went through it. 9 10 But here we want to give the citizens an 11 opportunity to sound off as relates to secondary 12 employment. Any concerns, any comments, questions, any

complements, anything you want to say, the floor is open. We ask that you come to the podium and that you state your name for the record and that you abide by a four-minute time limit so we can get as many comments in as possible. Do you have some questions? Sure.

18 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Who is our expert?
 19 DEPUTY CHIEF LOGAN: There's a number of them

20 available for you. We have DC Lee.

21 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: I feel like I pick on 22 you every week.

ASSISTANT CHIEF LOGAN: He does too.
COMMISSIONER RIVERA: I have a couple of
questions that I just kind of -- I have read the entire

thing. I'm a little -- just a couple of questions.
When you -- okay. The officer applies for secondary
employment, for permission to do secondary employment.
Now, do they go on a roster that you have or does the
business request and you pick them or do they pick them?

6 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Through the Chair. Ma'am, 7 the process, it's going to be a web based program. And everybody that applies will be on a roster, and their 8 9 names will be in the system. At the point where the 10 business says I need five officers for this particular 11 job, secondary employment will put those five jobs in 12 the system and then hit enter. At that point, everybody 13 who is eligible on the department will get an e-mail, 14 either phone or whatever e-mail they designate to 15 receive that message. When they receive that message, the first person to press the button to say I accept 16 17 that job will be the first person that gets the job.

18 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Okay. What if a company 19 has particular requests, like for instance in Southwest 20 Detroit, they might want officers that speak Spanish to 21 come. Can they make those kind of requests?

DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: I believe -- we have the capabilities to do that. We want to make it fair and equitable for everybody. But if there is a specialty -and that's a specialty, we can build that into the



1 system. And only those persons who have that specialty will see that particular job. And then they can bid on 2 3 that particular job or press the button on their phone or their computer. And then they'll be eligible to work 4 5 that job. 6 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Okay. And as I read 7 this, the usual restrictions apply, no alcoholic 8 beverage place, no dancing place, any place that's 9 against the rules and regs as a normal business are not 10 allowed to apply for this, right? 11 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Yes. 12 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: And then the business 13 pays the employee directly? It doesn't come to us? 14 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Through the Chair, that's 15 correct. It will be paid directly. COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Here is the next 16 17 question. What happens when one of our scout cars gets in an accident when they're at their secondary 18 19 employment? Does the business pay to have the vehicle fixed or because they are paying us to use the vehicle, 20 21 are we still responsible for getting it fixed? 2.2 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Through the Chair, yes, we are still responsible. 23 24 (Exit Commissioner White) 25 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Okay. And of course



1 people with bad attendance aren't allowed, right? And court appearances are paid by the business as well? 2 3 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Yes. COMMISSIONER RIVERA: If they have to go to 4 5 court for some reason? 6 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Yes, through the Chair. 7 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: For every three 8 employees they have, they have to hire one supervisor? 9 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Through the Chair, yes, 10 ma'am. 11 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Now, is this secondary 12 employment thing going to apply to like Joe Louis Arena 13 or are we still going to provide them some amount of 14 unpaid police service? 15 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Yes. Through the Chair, anything related to traffic we will do. But what we are 16 17 moving toward is inside personnel will be secondary employment. 18 19 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Okay. I think that's 20 all unless the public has some questions that they want 21 to ask. It sounds like a plan to me. 2.2 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I have a question and/or a 23 suggestion. As relates to the interfacing of the 24 officers with the citizens, and specifically if there 25 are instances where citizens feel for whatever reason,

1 they need to file a complaint against an officer who is on secondary employment. That will still go through the 2 3 normal process as it does now? Who will collect that 4 complaint, and how will it get to us? Will the business 5 be told to forward it to us? Will the business know to 6 tell that particular citizen they can call us? Will 7 they know the avenues to file the complaint? How would 8 that work?

9 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Yes, Mr. Chair. When we 10 sit down with the business and provide them the 11 information, that will be some of the information that 12 we will provide. But the same procedures that apply on 13 duty will apply off duty. So if there's something that 14 happens, they will have to call the supervisor. There 15 will be a person from secondary employment that will be on call at all times that they can get a hold of. And 16 17 if not, then there will be a supervisor from that particular district. And at the districts will be aware 18 19 that that person is there as well as communications.

20 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. Could there also be 21 something in the system -- and maybe you already have 22 it, but I didn't see it -- where the officers who accept 23 the assignment, could there be some type of an 24 agreement, you know how you accept the software and you 25 have to check that I agree to the terms and the

1 conditions? I think it needs to be some type of reminder that although they are working for a private 2 3 entity, that they are still bound by the rules and the 4 procedures of the Detroit Police Department, especially as relates to their interfacing with citizens. Of 5 6 course, I'm talking very selfishly from our perspective. 7 But just to make sure that they understand that although 8 they are being paid by private industry, that they are 9 still bound by the policies and procedures of the 10 Detroit Police Department? 11 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Yes. Through the Chair, 12 that's already in the system. You have to click on that prompt to say I have read the policy, I agree, and I 13 14 accept it. Otherwise you can't even move any further in 15 the program to do that. And what we can actually do is before accepting the job, we can make that there again, 16 17 and you click on that and then click on the job. CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thanks. Commissioner? 18 19 COMMISSIONER REEVES: I have two questions. One, there's -- piggy-backing off of Commissioner 20 21 Rivera's question as far as if there's any kind of 22 incidents or accidents concerning the vehicles, is there 23 a separate insurance policy that will cover any kind of 24 incidents or accidents? 25 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Yes. Through the Chair,

1 the companies are required to have X amount of dollars of insurance. And whether or not the City will go after 2 3 them for that particular incident if there's a car wreck 4 while they are working secondary employment, I don't 5 know. That would be something we'd have to check with 6 the law department whether or not they want to pursue it 7 too or if we want to go after the insurance company for 8 that amount of money. But right now, we are basically 9 renting them the car for that day.

10 COMMISSIONER REEVES: When you say we'll go 11 after the insurance company, whose insurance company? 12 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: The owner of the business. 13 And I don't know if that's going to be the City's policy 14 or not through the law department. That's something we 15 can check into.

COMMISSIONER REEVES: Okay. Here is my second 16 17 question. What kind of awareness will go out to make 18 the public more knowledgeable of the secondary 19 employment plan as well as how to -- I know you said you'll communicate everything with the businesses. But 20 21 as far as the people that patronize the businesses, how 22 will they know if there's an issue to come and talk to 23 either the board or to just -- or how to be more aware 24 of making a report?

We said, if we fix it up, you know, we will 9 purchase it you know. You will get -- I thought he 10 owned it. 7	I still have more tires. I'm still trying to get the
8	City to come. They say they don't have no records of
9	it. I said, you seen the condemned building. You see
10	this man did not pay no rent. They told me that the
11	expenses when they move all those tires and rims, they
12	was going to give it to Heavy T to bill to them. But
13	they have not.
14	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: How can we help you?
15	MR. DAVIS: Get the City to move them.
16	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Oh. There's some city
