4 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Let me say good
5 evening, good evening, good evening. Let me
6 welcome you to the Board of Police Commissioners
7 meeting dated for Thursday, May 10, 2012.

8 My name is Commissioner Donnell White.
9 I have the pleasure of serving as Chairman for
10 the Board of Police Commissioners. Today I am
11 joined with my colleague, Commissioner Jessica
12 Taylor, and representing the staff for the Board
13 of Police Commissioners Executive Secretary to
14 the Board Mr. George Anthony.

15 Mr. Anthony, for the record can you
16 please introduce our staff?

17 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you,
18 Mr. Chair. For the record, George Anthony,
19 Secretary to the Board. We have present attorney
20 Celia Banks Washington seated in the front. She
21 is our attorney to the Board. Ms. Dalph Watson,
22 our director of Police Personnel, also seated in
23 front.

24 Lt. Tim Leach who is the acting office
25 -- chief investigator from the Office of the

1 Chief Investigator's Office. We also have
2 Mr. Robert Brown seated to my right, Sgt. Alan
3 Quinn who will be recording our proceedings and
4 Mr. Dale Rose from Hanson Court Reporting
5 Service.

6 That completes the introduction.

7 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
8 Mr. Secretary. Certainly we would like to note
9 the presence of Deputy Chief Benjamin Lee
10 representing the Office of the Chief. Thank you
11 for being here, DC.

12 At this time, we would ask that we have
13 our invocation from Ms. Dora Hatcher.

14 (INVOCATION WAS GIVEN.)

15 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
16 Ms. Hatcher. At this time I'm going to ask if
17 the founder of the Old Redford Academy Middle
18 School could join us for remarks and that's
19 Mr. Melvin E. Smith, the founder. Did he leave
20 out? We certainly will give Mr. Smith an
21 opportunity to greet us if he should come back
22 in.

23 As is customary when we meet within the
24 district we like to read through the roles and
25 responsibilities of the Board of Police

1 Commissioners.

2 The Board of Police Commissioners was
3 created by City Charter July 1, 1974. It's
4 composition currently is a five-member board
5 appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by City
6 Council.

7 Commissioners serve five-year terms and
8 may not serve more than five years consecutively.
9 Commissioners meet once a week 52 weeks out of
10 the year and all meetings are open to the public.

11 The duties of the Board are to
12 establish rules and regulations in consultation
13 with the Chief and the approval of the Mayor, to
14 review and approve department budget, to review
15 and approve department promotions, to receive and
16 resolve complaints concerning the operation of
17 the police department, to serve as final
18 authority on imposition and/or review of
19 discipline of police department employees, to
20 appoint civilian personnel director and also to
21 prepare an annual report of department activities
22 for the public, the Mayor and City Council.

23 Its staff represents the Executive
24 Secretary who serves as Secretary to the Board
25 and attends all board meetings, a chief

1 investigator and additional investigators and
2 other staff as necessary to provide support to
3 the Board.

4 The Police Commission considers itself
5 a liaison between the citizens of the city of
6 Detroit and the Detroit Police Department.

7 I'm going to table the reading -- the
8 motions on the approval of the agenda as well as
9 the minutes until such time a quorum is reached.
10 Mr. Secretary, is there a Secretary's report
11 today?

12 SECRETARY ANTHONY: No, sir.

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Okay, and I'll
14 come back to our Chairperson's report, but Deputy
15 Chief, at this time we'll have our report from
16 the Northwestern District, please.

17 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Yes, we'll bring a
18 report, Commander Duane McKissic, if you could
19 make the introductions?

20 COMMANDER MCKISSIC: Good evening. How
21 is everyone doing? Citizens of the great
22 Northwestern District. But -- and for today's
23 meeting the 8th Precinct and, Board, how you
24 doing this evening? Deputy Chief Lee,
25 executives, officers, citizens, everyone.

1 We're here today to bring you a
2 presentation, to give you an overview of some of
3 the efforts of the Northwestern District, how we
4 do business here, how we interact with our
5 citizens. It will be done by Inspector Vicki
6 Yost who is the leader of the 8th Precinct on a
7 daily basis. She runs the daily operations.

8 Inspector Yost?

9 (APPLAUSE.)

10 INSP. YOST: Good evening, how are you?
11 Thank you for having us and thank you for coming
12 to the 8th Precinct. We enjoy it when you guys
13 get out and get to be involved with our
14 community. I'm very proud to represent the 8th
15 Precinct and, Sean, if you hit the slide, we'll
16 go ahead with our presentation.

17 The 8th Precinct is approximately 15.25
18 square miles. It is bounded by Five Points on
19 the west, Eight Mile on the north, the Lodge and
20 Schaefer on the east and Fenkell to the south.
21 Per the 2010 census data the precinct's
22 population is 92,836 which makes it the most
23 populous precinct in the city of Detroit.

24 The 8th Precinct is home to the
25 following public schools: six elementary schools,

1 three middle schools and three high schools,
2 being Renaissance, Henry Ford and Jerry L. White.

3 Other community assets are
4 approximately 200 churches, 400 businesses and
5 seven nursing or senior citizen homes. We offer
6 a lot of community outreach at the precinct. Our
7 Community Relations officers do a good job every
8 day. One of the things we do is we go to the
9 schools and we do the Ed Eagle Program that was
10 started in 1988. It's a gun safety program aimed
11 at kindergarten to third-graders and it basically
12 focuses on telling kids if they see a gun to
13 stop, don't touch, leave the area and tell an
14 adult. Simple instructions that is age
15 appropriate for what they're doing.

16 The other thing is is we do a free lot
17 giveaways in conjunction with Police Community
18 Services on average three times a year.

19 The youth programs include Cops Reading
20 to Kids. This is a pre-K and elementary school
21 program where officers actually go in and read to
22 kids ages from three to eight years old. We also
23 have Program Reality Check which I want to
24 actually take a little more time to discuss
25 today.

1 It's aimed at kids six to 14. It's a
2 12-week program, military-based instruction aimed
3 at kids who are having difficulty with everyday
4 life situations. It focuses on educational,
5 social and behavioral obstacles that affects
6 those kids and it is an outlet to stop kids from
7 going into the juvenile justice system and being
8 incorrigible.

9 Post 808 Law Enforcement Explorers,
10 that's them when they went to their prom. It's a
11 career-based program for kids who are doing well
12 in school who have an interest in law enforcement
13 so they can see what opportunities they can work
14 with us. They do some marching, they do some
15 stuff volunteering, they do a lot of events with
16 the Reserves and with us as well. They do wear
17 uniforms so they got kind of a taste of what it
18 would be like to be an officer.

19 We also have Operation Safe Passage.
20 That's something that is done I think pretty
21 city-wide and that's just an early morning
22 special attention is given to bus stops, school
23 routes that kids walk and the schools themselves
24 to ensure children's safety on their way to and
25 from school.

1 (COMMISSIONER WARFIELD ARRIVES.)

2 We have a CB Patrol. Actually we have
3 seven active volunteer CB Patrol organizations
4 within the 8th Precinct. They're currently being
5 sponsored by a \$350,000 federal grant promoting
6 citizen involvement in their community to reduce
7 -- to improve safety and reduce crime. The grant
8 provides for supplies such as placards, ads,
9 shirts, a training center, radios and other items
10 as approved by the grant.

11 The first quarter statistical
12 information I'm going to give you is just some
13 arrest totals. The 8th Precinct had 286 felony
14 arrests, 212 misdemeanor and 28 juveniles
15 detained for felony-related crimes from January 1
16 to March 31 of this year.

17 Statistical information going on, guns
18 seized 81 handguns, 27 long guns for a total of
19 108 guns in the first quarter of this year. This
20 is a 35 percent increase over last year. And
21 something noteworthy also, in the last two weeks
22 -- if 108 seems like a lot to you, in the last
23 two weeks the 8th Precinct has removed 36 guns
24 from the street.

25 Calls for service, there was 7,428 in

1 the first quarter of 2012, being broken down to
2 3,221 Priority 1 runs and 4,207 Priority Other.

3 April 26 to 28 the 8th and 6th
4 Precincts or the Northwestern District did a
5 joint initiative trying to aim at some sweeps
6 while the weather is turning. We tend to see an
7 increase in crime, so we put out a blitz which
8 was called Operation Spring Break. That resulted
9 in 14 felony arrests, 46 misdemeanor arrests,
10 eight guns recovered, 467 tickets, but I think
11 some of the quality of life issues here are going
12 to be more important, there's the 27 basketball
13 hoops that we impounded, the 56 abandoned
14 vehicles that we towed and the 260 illegal signs
15 we removed from the poles.

16 A lot of citizen complaints we get are
17 the illegal signs posted on the telephone poles,
18 so the officers went out with members of our
19 community and took about 260 of those down. And
20 we also recovered 10 stolen cars.

21 That's it; any questions?

22 (APPLAUSE.)

23 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
24 Inspector. Commissioner Warfield?

25 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I want to

1 comment just a little bit on Reality Check before
2 you do. I know Officer Jeffrey Townsend and
3 Ms. Roland does an excellent job with that. I
4 know we had the program at our church for a while
5 and we've had several youth and parents through
6 the program and they give excellent results, so
7 just want to applaud Officer Townsend and the
8 outstanding work that he's done down through the
9 years on inspiring our youth and the parents,
10 because this is a youth and parent program, so
11 just outstanding work.

12 INSP. YOST: I will relay that to them,
13 thank you very much.

14 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
15 Commissioner Warfield. Commissioner Taylor?

16 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: No questions.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you.
18 Inspector, I did have a question. For the
19 Operation Safe Passage, is that going to continue
20 through the summer school?

21 INSP. YOST: That will continue as long
22 as the schools are open, yes. If we have summer
23 programs in the schools, we will be doing the
24 same thing.

25 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And Operation

1 Spring Break, can you recap that again, what
2 exactly is that program?

3 INSP. YOST: Basically as the weather
4 starts to break we tend to see an increase in
5 crime, so Inspector Thomas, Commander McKissic,
6 myself got together, put together a plan or
7 initiative to try to do kind of a spread or a
8 blitz where we increased police presence, we did
9 more proactive patrol, put a few more officers on
10 the street, moved some things around, and that
11 was to go -- actually more of those juvenile
12 misdemeanor arrests you'll see up there is from
13 what was on the news that weekend where the stuff
14 that happened in Southfield where they were
15 leaving the fair had started to bleed over into
16 Detroit.

17 Actually it was the officers who was
18 doing the Operation Spring Break along with our
19 regular officers on patrol that were able to
20 ensure that those kids were detained if it was
21 appropriate and ensure that nobody got hurt.

22 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And if you could
23 also, 27 basketball hoops impounded, how, why,
24 what --

25 INSP. YOST: Yeah, one of the big

1 complaints from the community is that they'll put
2 the basketball hoops out on the public street and
3 when you try to pass with a car that you can't go
4 by and if you try to say something to them, that,
5 you know, they'll almost either look at you in
6 the threatening manner or actually take a
7 threatening stance.

8 Normally, we aim to go out -- our
9 Community Relations aims to go out and talk to
10 people, advise them of the law, that they cannot
11 be on a public street and if the problem persists
12 and they don't heed our warning, then we will
13 impound them consistent with the law.

14 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
15 inspector.

16 INSP. YOST: Thank you for your time.
17 (APPLAUSE).

18 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Deputy Chief Lee,
19 anything further?

20 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: No.

21 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, sir.
22 At this time the Chair will entertain a motion
23 for the approval of the agenda dated for
24 Thursday, May the 10th, 2012.

25 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second.

1 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Support.

2 COMMISSIONER WHITE: I think that was a
3 motion and a support. Is there any discussion?
4 Seeing none, all those in favor?

5 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

6 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Opposed? Thank
7 you very much. At this time the Chair will
8 entertain a motion for the approval of the
9 minutes of the Thursday, April 26, 2012 meeting.

10 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: So moved.

11 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second.

12 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Properly moved and
13 supported. Any discussion? Seeing none, all
14 those in favor?

15 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Opposed? Thank
17 you. I would ask that we table -- I'm sorry,
18 there's also a second for the special hearing for
19 the April 26, 2012 as well. The Chair will
20 entertain a motion for the approval of those
21 minutes.

22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: So moved, sir.

23 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second.

24 COMMISSIONER WHITE: It's been properly
25 moved and supported. Any discussion? Seeing

1 none, all those in favor?

2 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

3 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Opposed? Thank
4 you. We will ask that we table the minutes as
5 they have not been provided to us, the minutes
6 for Thursday, May 3, 2012, but the Chair will
7 also entertain a motion for the minutes of
8 Thursday, May 9, 2012.

9 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So moved.

10 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Support.

11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: It's been properly
12 moved and supported. Any discussion? Seeing
13 none, all those in favor?

14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

15 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Opposed? Thank
16 you very much. Are there any standing committee
17 reports? Seeing none, the Chair would ask if
18 Commissioner Taylor will lead us in the reading
19 of grant for request for permission to accept the
20 monetary donation from the Home Depot Foundation
21 for the Northwestern District Beautification
22 Program of the 8th and 6th Precincts Project.

23 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: On May 2, 2012
24 the Home Depot Foundation informed the Detroit
25 Police Department Northwestern District of its

1 intent to donate \$24,000 with no cash match for
2 the Northwest District Beautification Program,
3 8th and 6th Precincts Project.

4 This donation will come in the form of
5 gift cards to purchase various items to improve
6 the district inside and out. Officer Tanda Roz
7 Owens of the 8th Precinct will serve as the
8 project director for the donation and organize
9 activities such as painting and installing
10 building tiles, light fixtures, cabinets and
11 carpets. There is no cost to the department for
12 this donation.

13 I'm requesting the Board's permission
14 to accept this donation and seek approval of the
15 Honorable City Council.

16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
17 Commissioner Taylor. Commissioners, as relates
18 to the request for permission to accept a
19 monetary donation from the Home Depot Foundation
20 for the Northwest District Beautification Program
21 of the 8th and 6th Precinct Project, what is your
22 pleasure?

23 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sir, I move
24 that we honor the request of the department to
25 receive the funding.

1 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Support.

2 COMMISSIONER WHITE: It's been properly
3 moved and supported. Any discussion? Seeing
4 none, all those in favor?

5 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

6 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Opposed? Thank
7 you very much.

8 (APPLAUSE.)

9 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you.
10 Commissioner Taylor, I would ask if you will lead
11 us in the reading of the grant for permission to
12 accept a Project Safe Neighborhoods Grant from
13 the Detroit Community Justice Partnership (DCJP).

14 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: The Detroit
15 Police Department has been selected to receive
16 \$35,076 in grant funding with no required match
17 from the Eastern District of Michigan Project
18 Safe neighborhoods Initiative to conduct border
19 operations within the cities of Detroit and
20 Dearborn targeting handgun-related crimes and
21 street gang activity by sharing vital
22 intelligence and employing directed patrols.

23 The initiative has three goals: 1,
24 aggressively promote the message that all
25 firearm-related violent crime will be met with

1 strict enforcement and swift and certain
2 punishment, encourage citizens to work with
3 local, state and federal law enforcement to
4 address firearm-related violent crime in their
5 community and, 3, promote gun safety in the
6 community.

7 The time period for the grant is May 1,
8 2012 through June 30, 2013. Sgt. Jason Sloan of
9 the Criminal Investigations Bureau will serve as
10 the project director for the grant.

11 The Detroit Community Justice
12 Partnership will serve as the fiscal agent for
13 the grant. The appropriation number for the
14 grant is 13550. I'm requesting the Board's
15 permission to accept this funding and seek
16 approval of the Honorable Detroit City Council.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Commissioners,
18 before us is a request for permission to accept a
19 Project Safe Neighborhoods Grant for the Detroit
20 Community Justice Partnership (DCJP).

21 What is your pleasure?

22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sir, I move
23 that we grant the department permission to accept
24 the funding and to seek the approval of the
25 Honorable Detroit City Council.

1 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Support.

2 COMMISSIONER WHITE: It's been properly
3 moved and supported. Any discussion?

4 Deputy Chief, I did have a question.
5 Is someone able to articulate when we mention to
6 conduct border operations, what exactly are we
7 speaking of?

8 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Through the Chair, I
9 believe that's the borders between Dearborn and
10 Detroit, so any activity that happens between
11 those two cities and I don't know if there's
12 somebody here -- Sgt. Sloan here?

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Good evening.

14 SGT. PAHOLSKI: Good evening. I'm Sgt.
15 Jeff Paholski.

16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Sergeant, if you
17 could articulate the -- when we mention the
18 border operations, what exactly are we speaking
19 of?

20 SGT. PAHOLSKI: It is -- Deputy Chief
21 Lee is correct by stating that it's the border we
22 share with Dearborn and the 6th Precinct.

23 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Is that different
24 than what we would normally do in patrol
25 operations on the bordering street?

1 SGT. PAHOLSKI: This would actually
2 have Dearborn officers participate with us in the
3 grant and working, you know, both sides of the
4 border.

5 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
6 sergeant.

7 SGT. PAHOLSKI: You're welcome.

8 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Any other
9 discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor?

10 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Opposed? Thank
12 you very much. At this time I'm going to ask if
13 Commissioners Warfield will lead us in the
14 reading of a resolution honoring Mr. Austin Grout
15 -- am I saying that correctly -- Grout. Thank
16 you, Mr. Grout.

17 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Mr. Grout,
18 would you join me at the mic, please.

19 Resolution honoring Mr. Austin Grout.

20 Mr. Austin Grout has worked in the
21 Northwestern District for over a year as a
22 devoted citizen and active member in this
23 community and

24 WHEREAS, Mr. Grout attended Central
25 Michigan University and received a bachelor's

1 degree of science, he later furthered his
2 education in Wayne State University where he
3 received a master's degree in social work with an
4 emphasis in community practice and social action,
5 and

6 WHEREAS, Mr. Grout serves in many
7 capacities, he is a proud member of the National
8 Association of Social Workers, National Crime
9 Prevention Council and the Wayne State University
10 Alumni Association, and

11 WHEREAS, Mr. Grout's extensive
12 community involvement includes volunteering for
13 the Grandmont-Rosedale Development Corporation
14 and several other non-profit organizations
15 through the American Americorps Program and

16 WHEREAS, Mr. Grout is committed to
17 partnering with the Detroit Police Department and
18 serves as the crime prevention coordinator for
19 GRDC Mr. Grout moderates the GRDC Crime Alert
20 which serves to improve safety in the community.

21 In addition, Mr. Grout is actively
22 involved in a pilot project with the Northwestern
23 District, the Manhattan Institute, and Dr. George
24 Keeling which is aimed at applying the broken
25 windows theory to home invasions in the 6th and

1 8th Precincts, and

2 WHEREAS, Mr. Grout in his action has
3 displayed true commitment to our community and to
4 the city of Detroit he is engaged in community
5 partnership that serves to improve the
6 Northwestern District one block at a time.

7 Mr. Grout is an example of how
8 partnerships are critical to community awareness
9 and growth.

10 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the
11 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking on
12 behalf of the police department and the citizens
13 of Detroit recognize and honor the community
14 spirit of Mr. Austin Grout. His commitment to
15 community service merits our highest regards.

16 We thank and congratulate you,
17 Mr. Austin Grout, on behalf of the Board of
18 Police Commissioners.

19 (APPLAUSE.)

20 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Mr. Austin Grout, on
21 behalf of the Chief of Police I present to you
22 Detroit Police Department Certificate of
23 Recognition. Reads:

24 In appreciation for the following
25 outstanding service and cooperation for your

1 involvement in the community and services to the
2 City of Detroit supporting our efforts in the
3 community demonstrates spirit and commitment that
4 is truly worthy of recognition.

5 And it is signed by the Chief of
6 Police.

7 (APPLAUSE.)

8 INSP. YOST: The awards keep coming.
9 The Spirit of Detroit Award is from the City
10 Council is presented herewith as an expression of
11 the gratitude and esteem of the citizens of
12 Detroit to Mr. Austin Grout in recognition of
13 exceptional achievement, outstanding leadership
14 and dedication to improving the quality of life,
15 signed by all the members of the Detroit City
16 Council.

17 (APPLAUSE.)

18 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Grout, if you
19 would, please, feel free to --

20 MR. GROUT: I don't got much to say. I
21 just want to say thank you for nominating me.
22 Officer Childre, thank you for coming. Citizens
23 of Grandmont-Rosedale, I appreciate it and the
24 officers at the 6th and 8th, Inspector Yost,
25 Inspector Thomas, Commander McKissic, Officer

1 Childre, Officer Gordon. I'm pretty sure that's
2 everybody. They make it a lot easier to do the
3 work that I do, so thank you.

4 (APPLAUSE.)

5 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you. Again,
6 we certainly congratulate Mr. Grout on his
7 community spirit and his commitment to community
8 service within the Northwestern District.

9 Commissioners -- well, we'll table. We
10 have another resolution before us. I'll ask if
11 Commissioner Warfield will lead us in the
12 resolution honoring Mr. Michael Farrow.

13 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Resolution
14 honoring Mr. Michael Farrow.

15 Mr. Michael Farrow has been a dedicated
16 and committed supporter of the Detroit
17 Northwestern District. His commitment to
18 business, service and leadership is exemplified
19 throughout the entire district and

20 WHEREAS, Mr. Farrow is a unsung hero
21 and stalwart in the Northwestern District and
22 surrounding communities and is the proud owner of
23 the Farrow Group, Inc Mr. Farrow's pledge to
24 service goes far beyond volunteering his service.

25 Mr. Farrow employs many citizens who

1 live within the communities that he does business
2 with enabling them to support their families.

3 Mr. Farrow has gone beyond the call of employer
4 and has been a mentor, friend and counselor and

5 WHEREAS, Mr. Farrow believes community
6 involvement and engagement are the most powerful
7 tools that a participant can utilize to educate
8 residents about change. He attends city council
9 and school board meetings. He is an active
10 supporter of community focus groups such as
11 Detroit Green Task Force, Gleaners Community Food
12 Bank and Capuchin Soup Kitchen and

13 WHEREAS, Mr. Farrow is known for his
14 outreach efforts by donating his time and
15 providing financial support, he provides
16 scholarships, financial support, to high school
17 students and non-profit organizations such as
18 Girl Scouts of America. He is also known for his
19 efforts in assisting the Detroit Police
20 Department in a near tragedy that occurred on
21 December 14th, 2011 when a building collapsed on
22 two men trapping them underneath the rubble.

23 He volunteered his time and equipment
24 to clear the debris which made it safer for EMS
25 to retrieve their bodies. His giving spirit and

1 vision for Detroit and its citizens is unmatched
2 and highly respected.

3 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that
4 the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners
5 speaking on behalf of the citizens of the city of
6 Detroit and the Detroit Police Department
7 acknowledge the unmistakable spirit of community
8 service of Mr. Michael Farrow. His willingness
9 to volunteer his time and promote economic
10 stability has been an invaluable asset to the
11 Northwestern District and to the entire city.

12 We thank and congratulate you,
13 Mr. Michael Farrow, on behalf of the Detroit
14 Board of Police Commissioners.

15 (APPLAUSE.)

16 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Again, on behalf of
17 the Detroit Police Department on behalf of the
18 Chief we want to give to you the Certificate of
19 Recognition to Mr. Michael Farrow in appreciation
20 for the following outstanding service and
21 cooperation, for your involvement in the
22 community and services to the City of Detroit.

23 Supporting our efforts in the community
24 demonstrates spirit and commitment that is truly
25 worthy of recognition. Signed Ralph L. Godbee,

1 Jr, Chief of Police.

2 (APPLAUSE.)

3 INSP. YOST: And again the Spirit
4 of Detroit Award presented by City Council is
5 presented herewith as an expression of the
6 gratitude and esteem of the citizens of Detroit
7 to Mr. Michael Farrow in recognition of
8 exceptional achievement, outstanding leadership
9 and dedication to improving the quality of life
10 and it's signed by all the council members,
11 Detroit City Council.

12 (APPLAUSE.)

13 MR. FARROW: I don't to thank you for
14 the recognition. It means a lot to me. Citizens
15 of Detroit, I'm Michael Farrow, a committed
16 citizen to this city. I'm trying to keep it
17 together here because -- excuse me -- I want to
18 thank you for your prayer. This city needs that
19 bad.

20 The reason I'm emotional is because I'm
21 so tired of Detroit getting a black eye. But the
22 reason I started the Farrow Group is to educate
23 and teach people a different skill. If you can't
24 make it in college, there is another way and
25 that's running heavy equipment or construction.

1 I love this city. I was born and
2 raised in this city and I deeply love it, but I'm
3 so tired of black eyeing Detroit. It's -- and
4 we're so better than that. Yes, we have some bad
5 apples and we also have some bad politicians, but
6 at the end of the day we have to stand together
7 despite all of that and be a stronger people
8 together, black, white, green, it doesn't matter.

9 I can't stop saying enough I love the
10 city. The reason I started this company is to
11 able to give back and it's not for money, it's
12 not for profit all the time. You know, some
13 people say you're going to go out of business.
14 At the end of the day I don't worry about that.
15 If I can help someone, I'm helping them. But,
16 guess what, it's 14 years and I'm still here.

17 Despite all the wrong doings that
18 people do towards my company, I'm still here and
19 I love the city. So I want to thank the citizens
20 that's here and the police department. I'm an
21 owner that's in the street, in the trenches with
22 my team and my guys. I know what you guys go
23 through and I don't know if anyone else is really
24 paying attention, but I understand your job as
25 well as the fire department.

1 You guys have a tough job and you're
2 underpaid to me.

3 (APPLAUSE.)

4 MR. FARROW: So with saying that, I
5 don't care what time of night it is, what day it
6 is, what holiday it is, I'm always here for the
7 City of Detroit Police Department as well as the
8 fire department and other agencies I work with as
9 well as the ATF. I want to say thank you again.

10 (APPLAUSE.)

11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And certainly
12 again to Mr. Michael Farrow for -- again to
13 Mr. Michael Farrow for his spirit of volunteerism
14 and his promotion of economic stability within
15 the Northwestern District. We certainly
16 congratulate you and admire his work within the
17 Northwestern District.

18 Commissioners, before us are two
19 resolutions, a resolution honoring Mr. Austin
20 Grout. Is there a motion for adoption?

21 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sir, I move
22 that we adopt the resolution honoring Mr. Austin
23 Grout and that that resolution be a part of our
24 permanent archives.

25 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Support.

1 COMMISSIONER WHITE: It's been properly
2 moved and supported. Any discussion? Seeing
3 none, all those in favor?

4 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

5 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Opposed? Thank
6 you very much. Commissioners, before us is a
7 resolution honoring Mr. Michael Farrow.

8 Is there a motion for adoption?

9 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sir, I move
10 that we adopt the resolution honoring Mr. Michael
11 Farrow and that resolution be a part of our
12 permanent archives.

13 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second.

14 COMMISSIONER WHITE: It's been properly
15 moved and supported. Any discussion? Seeing
16 none, all those in favor?

17 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

18 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Opposed? Thank
19 you very much. Is Lt. Christopher Vintevoghel
20 here? He's not here. We will read this into the
21 record.

22 There's a resolution honoring the
23 retiring of Lt. Christopher Vintevoghel.

24 Mr. Christopher Vintevoghel was
25 appointed to the Detroit Police Department on

1 October 14, 1985, upon successfully graduating
2 from the Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy. He
3 began his lifelong public service career at
4 Special Events and.

5 WHEREAS, Officer Ventevoghel's
6 assignments with the Detroit Police Department
7 included 1st Precinct, Vice Section, 7th Precinct
8 Public Housing Unit and the Tactical Services
9 Section Officer Ventevoghel excelled in these
10 departments and was well known for his unique
11 crime fighting approach and

12 WHEREAS, Officer Ventevoghel
13 displayed tremendous knowledge and leadership
14 skills as a police officer and was promoted to
15 the rank of investigator on October 3, 1995 as
16 investigator where he served in the Homicide
17 Section.

18 I'm going to submit this for the
19 record, but I'm going to fast forward to the
20 therefore be it resolved clause for the purpose
21 of time this evening, but we will enter this
22 entire resolution into the record.

23 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the
24 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking on
25 behalf of the citizens of the great city of

1 Detroit recognize and honor the lifelong
2 contributions and commitment to excellence in
3 public service of Lt. Christopher Ventevoghel for
4 his display of courage and unwavering community
5 spirit has improved the quality of life for the
6 citizens of Detroit.

7 We wish you all the best in your future
8 endeavors. We thank and congratulate you,
9 Lt. Christopher Ventevoghel, signed the Board of
10 Police Commissioners adopted this day -- I'm
11 sorry, this was a previous resolution adopted May
12 3, 2012.

13 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sir, I move
14 adoption of the resolution.

15 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second.

16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: It's been properly
17 moved and supported. Any discussion? Seeing
18 none, all those in favor?

19 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

20 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Opposed? Thank
21 you very much. Earlier I mentioned I would
22 reserve my remarks to later in the meeting, and
23 I'm actually going to table the Chairperson's
24 report until our next meeting next Thursday.

25 At this time we ask that we have our

1 announcements which is our next meeting which
2 will be held Thursday, May 17, 2012 at 3 PM at
3 the police headquarters, 1300 Beaubien, Room
4 328-A. Again, that's next Thursday at 3 PM.

5 I don't believe we have any further
6 announcements, so at this time we will have our
7 oral communications from the audience.

8 If you wish to address the Board of
9 Police Commissioners, we would ask that you come
10 forward, please clearly state your first and last
11 name and spell it for the purposes of the record.

12 COMMANDER McKISSIC: Duane McKissic,
13 commander of the Northwestern District. I'm
14 coming before you again because I wanted to -- I
15 failed to mention some of the hard-working
16 members. We have Inspector Thomas over there
17 from the 6th Precinct who does a good job working
18 in connection with 8. We have Officer
19 Childre-Sims over there. We have Officer Ross
20 Owens over there. We have Linda Groves that
21 helps us over there. We have Lt. Ackerson over
22 in plainclothes over there. I think that's about
23 everybody, but also I'd like to introduce you to
24 some key members who are helping us place forward
25 the program for the beautification project of our

1 command.

2 We have Marty Zonk, the store manager
3 of Home Depot; Mark Green, assistant manager of
4 Home Depot. That's the Home Depot on Livernois
5 and Seven Mile and we have Chris Gilbert,
6 regional prosite and I would be really remiss if
7 I did not have Officer Roz Owens also approach
8 the microphone just to give a quick overview of
9 the operation, if it's all right with you. It
10 will be within two minutes, sir.

11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Please do.

12 MR. ZONK: It's our honor and privilege
13 on behalf of --

14 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And I apologize.
15 For the record, if I could get you to state your
16 name, please.

17 MR. ZONK: Marty Zonk, represent the
18 Home Depot Foundation, and I was just saying it's
19 our honor, our privilege to be able to help the
20 community and police at the 6th Precinct doing
21 what we're doing. I think it's a very worthy
22 cause, most deserving. Thank you very much.

23 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
24 absolutely.

25 (APPLAUSE.)

1 OFFICER OWENS: Officer Roz Owens, good
2 evening everyone. I'm just going to present
3 these hats to the key players in the
4 beautification program. This is my partner,
5 Coleman.

6 COMMISSIONER WHITE: What does your hat
7 say there?

8 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Good afternoon, "The
9 Great Northwestern District".

10 (APPLAUSE.)

11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: We certainly thank
12 the Home Depot family and all of their efforts in
13 working with the Northwestern District and
14 certainly we're appreciative to the men and women
15 of the Northwestern District and if we could just
16 get all of you to please stand so we can
17 acknowledge al of us, all of our officers from
18 the Northwestern District, please stand.

19 (APPLAUSE.)

20 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you very
21 much, thank you commander. Are there any other
22 oral communication?

23 MS. HATCHER: -- to God, to the Board,
24 to all of you here. I've missed you all. That's
25 all I want to say. You know I'm working part

1 time now, but I missed you.

2 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And Ms. Dora
3 Hatcher, just again for the record, if you could
4 state your name.

5 MS. HATCHER: I'm sorry, that's my
6 name, Dora Hatcher, Rev. Hatcher. I have really
7 missed the meetings and I have missed you all and
8 I want you to know that I always tell all of my
9 officers that I love them because we never know
10 what's going to happen. And be blessed, and one
11 of my prayer, to all of us to be blessed. Thank
12 you.

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you.

14 (APPLAUSE.)

15 MS. WESLEY: Good evening. My name is
16 Wendell Wesley and I'm here on behalf of a
17 citizen that resides at 482 -- in the 49205 --

18 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: No address.

19 MR. HATCHER: That's the zip code. The
20 48205 zip code. On May 8 about 4 o'clock in the
21 morning this resident called 9-1-1 because her
22 dog kept barking. So she looked out the window
23 and she saw about two or three men stealing a
24 fence. She called, they told her that there had
25 been at least three people that had called prior

1 to her, they were sending someone out.

2 About 15 or 20 minutes later the
3 resident called back. The people in this truck
4 moved over to this abandoned building that used
5 to be, she said, a nursery or daycare and prior
6 to that it used to be some type of clinic, and
7 they began taking -- removing things from this
8 building.

9 She called back and they told her,
10 well, we're going to send somebody out. She said
11 I called 15 or 20 minutes ago and I was told that
12 you all were going to send somebody out and these
13 guys are still here. She says the problem that I
14 have is that the fencing was very close to her
15 home.

16 She said, what am I supposed to do at 4
17 o'clock, 4:20 in the morning. My husband is at
18 work. And what if they want to come in my house
19 and I'm calling for help. The 9-1-1 operator she
20 said -- she was very polite, she listened, but
21 really did not respond.

22 She couldn't come to this meeting. She
23 asked that if I could bring this information
24 before you all on her behalf and I told her that
25 I would. She does not understand why and she

1 said for at least until maybe about 6 or 7'ish
2 she said nobody came through there, and she has a
3 concern about that and she wanted to get a
4 response to that. So who would I see?

5 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you for
6 that. I'm going to ask if you could see Lt.
7 Leach, if she believes that she may have not
8 received a -- I'm not sure, if I heard you
9 correctly someone did show up from the
10 department?

11 MS. WESLEY: Did not.

12 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Did not show up.

13 MS. WESLEY: No. The gentlemen that
14 were -- that stole the fence and that entered
15 that vacant building took items from the
16 building, they got away.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Okay, so if she
18 believes that she had a call for service and no
19 one showed up, that's one issue that I would like
20 you to speak with the lieutenant for. There's a
21 number of factors, I'm sure, that will play out
22 in that, but we'll be happy to take that
23 information and see if we can look further into
24 that.

25 Deputy Chief, would you like to add

1 anything to that?

2 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Yes. I thank you
3 for coming on behalf of your neighbor,
4 Ms. Wesley. I believe -- is that going to be
5 Eastern District or Northeast District, 48205?

6 Eastern? Who's here from Eastern? See
7 -- take the information for me, Commander
8 McKissic, and then we'll look into it for you.

9 MS. WESLEY: All right, thank you.

10 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: You're welcome.

11 MS. McCANTS: Good afternoon. My name
12 is Yolanda McCants and I would just like to say
13 to this board thank you, Commissioner Warfield,
14 for your endeavor today in what you did as far as
15 us as citizens whether or not we would like for
16 our taxes to be raised or be responsible for more
17 funds coming into the police department.

18 Obviously people who sit behind a desk
19 who are not out in the trenches does not
20 understand exactly what goes on out here in the
21 streets, what these officers need and what we are
22 asking them to do.

23 We are asking them to have more visual
24 officers so that when we do call for service, we
25 can have them and having more working and legible

1 cars and I have been a firm fighter for putting
2 things that officers need back into the
3 department.

4 So thank you very much.

5 (APPLAUSE.)

6 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Good evening.

7 MS. SMITH: Good evening. I'm used to
8 the podium, I see we don't have it here, but
9 that's all right. Bernice Smith, political
10 activist. To the Board, Deputy Chief, good
11 seeing you. I heard you the other day.

12 What I want to ask, the Chief was
13 questioned about it on the radio show. You have
14 cars that are being leased from the year '03,
15 2003, and they're still -- they were supposed to
16 be brought in in 2005. They are still out on the
17 street over 100 some miles on them. What kind of
18 condition do you think that they're in at this
19 late date?

20 Also I would like to know -- the Chief
21 said he wasn't involved in it at that particular
22 time because it wasn't in his are, but then we
23 later found out that he was manager -- he was
24 involved with the Management Department, so he
25 was in there in that respect, but I want to know

1 -- Brown, why you do this to me?

2 I want to know what is going to happen
3 with these cars? Are they dangerous for the
4 police department to be driving and riding in
5 them? When you lease a car, you have a certain
6 length of time to turn the cars in, so why are
7 the cars still out on the car. There's over 100
8 of them that are still out on the street and I
9 would like to know why we still have the cars out
10 on the street and there's nothing being done
11 about them.

12 I understand we have no money to trade
13 them in because Trader Ray will not accept them
14 because of the fact that we don't have any money
15 to pay for 100 more cars. So what is going to
16 happen as far as one of these officers get hurt
17 with a car broken down or whatever the case may
18 be. And then you're paying still the fee for the
19 cars and you got late fee on them also that's
20 been tacked on there. See, I lease my car so I
21 know once I get the time over, I have to turn it
22 back in and then they do get you when you go over
23 the mileage.

24 Now, can you imagine how many mileage
25 that these cars have gone over? Come on guys, we

1 got to do better than this. Money is being spent
2 unnecessary and this is in the millions, so we
3 have to do better than this and the Commission, I
4 wish you would investigate this also and see
5 what's going on, why we can't get rid of these
6 cars that have been over -- overdue in taking
7 them back in.

8 I thank you for your time.

9 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
10 Ms. Smith.

11 MS. PANSELL: Good evening, Sharon
12 Pannell.

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: To date, the Board
14 has not been provided or have we requested any
15 information in that regard, but we will in the
16 immediate future. At such time we will reserve
17 comment for that.

18 MS. SMITH: Excuse me.

19 COMMISSIONER WHITE: We'll reserve
20 comment until such time we receive --

21 MS. SMITH: Did you find an answer?

22 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Deputy Chief, is
23 there anything you wish to add to that?

24 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Just that the actual
25 process started in 2010 to actually secure the

1 new cars. We have to have cars to drive in now
2 to perform our operations and therefore we have
3 to keep those cars right now.

4 The dealership was not able to provide
5 the new cars when we got approval in 2011 to
6 actually purchase the cars. When it was time to
7 deliver the cars, he was unable to deliver all of
8 the cars and then that's how the dilemma started.

9 And we're actually paying -- it's an
10 average of \$545 per car. Under the new lease it
11 would have been \$625. We don't have the late
12 fees. All of that was not tacked on our lease.
13 We don't have a normal lease than you would have
14 as a citizen.

15 MS. SMITH: Are you saying the mileage?

16 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: No, we don't have to
17 pay for mileage. The mileage -- we had extra
18 mileage on those cars, so we haven't gone over
19 them. We've put a lot of miles on the car, but
20 we don't have to pay for the mileage.

21 MS. SMITH: Oh, that's good. All
22 right, thank you.

23 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Good evening.

24 MS. PANSELL: Good evening. My name is
25 Sharon Pannell. I just wanted to say how well of

1 a time I had this morning at the crime prevention
2 that Mr. McKissic and his team put on over at
3 Henry Ford. It was excellent and all of them did
4 a great job.

5 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
6 Ms. Pannell. Any other communications?

7 MR. STIDHAM: Good morning, Board,
8 Deputy Chief. Thomas Stidham. I'm here today --
9 well, I have two comments. First I'm here on
10 behalf of Muscat Towing, LLC and over the last
11 six weeks or so I'm been working with the Board
12 to acquire some documents that have come to my
13 attention that someone had raised a question
14 about some issues related to Muscat Towing.

15 And so I'm confident I'll work with the
16 Board to get those documents, but the issue that
17 I have is I would like to know the identity of
18 the individual or persons that submit this
19 information which we believe is false to the
20 Detroit Board or how the Board acquired this
21 information. I think that's only fair in the
22 interest of fairness and complete transparency in
23 the process.

24 My second comment -- my second comment
25 is there was a meeting I know this Board is aware

1 of with all the towers on May 9th and -- I'm
2 sorry, with all the towers and the police
3 Management Services staff.

4 One of the issues that arose out of
5 that was a discussion about the release -- the
6 proper release of an automobile and it was clear
7 from that discussion that both the police and the
8 towers need some clearly defined written
9 standards because people are operating under
10 different rules, different scenarios, and it's
11 causing quite a lot of confusion and chaos quite
12 frankly amongst both the towers and the citizens.

13 So I would certainly ask the Board to
14 intervene on that endeavor and seek to clarify
15 the rules or some directives with respect to
16 that.

17 Lastly, I'd just ask -- like to know or
18 ask the Board is there any idea when the proposed
19 vote on the new rules will take place or occur.

20 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Are you talking
21 about -- I believe your first question centered
22 around a meeting on May 9th.

23 MR. STIDHAM: My first question was
24 related to Muscat Towing. My second question was
25 there was a meeting on May 9th, yesterday.

1 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: For the Muscat
2 information, we got that information from
3 Management Services. I actually looked through
4 my files this morning and my desk at home is just
5 like literally stacks of paper and so if you give
6 me another week, I'm sure I can locate my copies,
7 but they were through Management Services is
8 where I got them, and so I cannot remember whose
9 name is on the document, but as soon as I locate
10 them --

11 MR. STIDHAM: Well, the reason I raised
12 that, Commissioners, is there -- and I can ask
13 Management Services because they told me a long
14 time ago they couldn't -- they weren't certain
15 the source, but I will say this. I want the
16 Commissioners to be aware there has been a
17 pattern of people or individuals submitting
18 documents to either Management Services or this
19 Board and attributing facts that aren't entirely
20 accurate and true about certain companies, and I
21 believe Muscat I'm here to tell you is one of
22 them.

23 And so I want to clarify the record,
24 that's the only purpose I'm asking.

25 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sure, but as

1 soon as I find that out, I'll give it to you.

2 MR. STIDHAM: Thank you.

3 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: But I did look
4 this morning.

5 MR. STIDHAM: As far as the meeting is
6 concerned, Commissioner, Mr. Chair, all what I
7 would ask is this Board intervene if the Board
8 isn't aware of the meeting or what occurred,
9 certainly Management Services staff can -- I can
10 probably give you some additional information.

11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: I'm not aware of a
12 meeting, and I'm not sure if I need to be made
13 aware of a meeting. Deputy Chief, are there
14 meetings going on between towers and Management
15 Services that you're aware of or is that normal
16 course of business or that that meeting will be
17 convened that day?

18 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: I don't know exactly
19 how the meeting -- through the Chair -- how it
20 was convened. I do know that they met yesterday
21 and I believe it was regarding the new signage
22 that they wanted to introduce everybody to the
23 new signage that was required by the new rules,
24 and I believe that's what that meeting was about.

25 I don't know if Commander Serta is

1 aware.

2 MR. STIDHAM: There was a whole host of
3 items and topics that were addressed.

4 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Deputy Chief,
5 would that meeting have been open to all towers?

6 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: Through the Chair,
7 yeah, that would have been open through the --
8 for all of the towers, especially if it was to
9 explain and introduce the new signage that's
10 required.

11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And that was
12 across the entire city?

13 DEPUTY CHIEF LEE: All the authorized
14 towers.

15 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So Thomas, to
16 answer your question, this Board certainly is not
17 engaged into every detail of the handling of
18 towers with Management Services Bureau, but it's
19 certainly their prerogative to meet with towers
20 as needed.

21 MR. STIDHAM: But it's a big issue that
22 dovetails with part of the rules that have been
23 written, so --

24 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Certainly, and if
25 there's some ambiguity as relates to certain

1 aspects of the rules, the Board would be happy
2 to, where necessary, again to go through really
3 what we're going through at this point to add
4 clarity where there is ambiguity --

5 MR. STIDHAM: And that's all we're
6 asking.

7 COMMISSIONER WHITE: -- of the rules.

8 MR. STIDHAM: That's all we're asking
9 for.

10 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Sir, sure.

11 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Didn't know
12 about the meeting about towing, especially as
13 relates to the rules. And if there are
14 interpretations of the rules I mean at least this
15 Board should be advised prior to those meetings
16 taking place so that if we want to attend and
17 have a staff person there we could have a staff
18 person there for further clarification.

19 So could you give me some information.
20 Who called the meeting or who invited you to the
21 meeting?

22 MR. STIDHAM: It was Management
23 Services invited all police-authorized towers,
24 all current police-authorized towers, to the
25 meeting to address, as the Chief said, the

1 signage as well as they had a whole agenda and it
2 was Wednesday in the Southwest District from 11
3 to 2.

4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sir, through
5 the Chair, is it possible that we can get a copy
6 of the agenda?

7 MR. STIDHAM: We'll certainly --

8 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Were there
9 minutes kept of that meeting?

10 MR. STIDHAM: I don't know,
11 Commissioner, if there were minutes kept by the
12 police, but certainly we can furnish you with the
13 letter and the agenda.

14 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And if I could,
15 Commissioner, I believe it was said that
16 Commander Serta might be able to add some clarity
17 to what transpired, so we invite Commander Serta
18 to the microphone, please.

19 COMMANDER SERTA: Commander Serta
20 from Management Services Bureau. The meeting was
21 held at the Southwest District. We invited all
22 authorized police towers. It was really kind of
23 an inform meeting and it's one we hope to do on a
24 regular basis to open channels of communication
25 with all the towers.

1 We weren't talking about new rules or
2 anything like that. It was just standard
3 procedural issues, so, you know, we weren't
4 trying to have a meeting where we're discussing
5 the rules you all are getting ready to adopt. It
6 had nothing to do with that. It was just
7 standard procedural stuff and it's something we
8 hope to do probably quarterly or something like
9 that.

10 So that's all the meeting was. It was
11 informal, it wasn't -- it wasn't anything that
12 needed the Board to be there or, you know -- I
13 mean, in the future we'll make sure you get
14 notified and you're certainly welcome to attend,
15 but it didn't have anything to do with the new
16 rules or anything that's in your purview.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And for the
18 record, commander, all police-authorized towers
19 were invited to participate?

20 COMMANDER SERTA: That's correct and
21 there was a pretty good turn-out. I wasn't able
22 to stay for the entire meeting because it was
23 scheduled from like 11 to 1 or 2 and I had
24 another obligation, but Lt. Adams and Roland
25 Clark were there the entire time and exchanged

1 information with the towers.

2 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Commissioner
3 Warfield?

4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
5 Mr. Chair. Commander Serta, obviously the towing
6 community is a very small community and obviously
7 they have excellent communication channels as you
8 well know.

9 COMMANDER SERTA: Right.

10 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Certainly I was
11 made aware about that meeting today and some of
12 the topics or some of the things that were
13 discussed at that meeting were outside the bounds
14 of our rules and regulations, and so that's why I
15 would really like to know the detail what was
16 said by Lt. Adams, Roland Clark or whoever else
17 was there representing the department because
18 from the report that I received, there were
19 several statements that were made that were not
20 coinciding with the rules and regulations that
21 are currently in place.

22 And if that was the place -- I'm just
23 saying that was one of the reports I received --
24 if that was the case it raises a great deal of
25 concern to me that there is an effort to make

1 supplemental rules to the rules that are already
2 in place right now. I'm just telling you I've
3 heard from several sources that that was the
4 case.

5 So, again, if somebody there can
6 provide me an answer, maybe we can get several
7 reports from towers, that would be very helpful
8 for me to understand to get more than just two
9 sides of that opinion. Thank you, Mr. Chair.

10 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
11 commander.

12 COMMANDER SERTA: Sure, no problem.

13 MR. STIDHAM: If you're asking if I
14 have the agenda, I don't have it with me. I can
15 get a copy.

16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
17 commander.

18 MR. STIDHAM: And lastly, Mr. Chair, I
19 was just wondering about a potential or possible
20 date, future date, for the voting on the rules,
21 if there was any -- if anything had been set.

22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: No date has
23 been set yet, Tom, but there is still
24 deliberation over all comments and communications
25 that have been shared with the Board, but we

1 certainly will give ample notification prior to
2 any discussion so that everybody has an
3 opportunity to participate.

4 MR. STIDHAM: And as a follow-up to
5 that, Mr. Chair, will the Board still receive
6 additional comments if we have them in writing?

7 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Absolutely.

8 MR. STIDHAM: Thank you.

9 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you. Any
10 other communications?

11 MR. FOSTER: Good afternoon, Barry
12 Foster, one of the owners of Allied JBS Towing.
13 I'm going to need a little bit more time,
14 Mr. Brown, than two minutes. I have a couple of
15 serious issues that I want to address the Board
16 and I just want to ask the Board for the
17 permission to do so before I get started.

18 I probably need about four minutes of
19 the time.

20 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Just try to get it
21 to two and then we'll go and let you --

22 MR. FOSTER: Okay. I got some serious
23 issues with being a business owner in the city of
24 Detroit and currently a resident of the city of
25 Detroit with the Detroit police-authorized towing

1 information. I just want to first commend the
2 department for literally getting a sign to post
3 in the tow yards. I think that is very much well
4 needed. But there is some concerns that I do
5 have with this actual posting of this sign.

6 For one, the first issue that I have a
7 problem with that was actually mentioned at this
8 meeting yesterday is the redemption of vehicles,
9 actually the proper way to release a vehicle to
10 an owner. Currently on this poster it tells us
11 that we're supposed to release the vehicle to an
12 owner if they possess a title or current
13 registration and a valid picture ID.

14 That's not enough clarification for us
15 in how we do business. We were told that, first
16 of all, the state law requires anyone operating a
17 motor vehicle in the state of Michigan to have a
18 driver's license and also he's supposed to have
19 valid insurance on the vehicle to operate a motor
20 vehicle on the current highways in the state of
21 Michigan.

22 My reason that I have right now with
23 this poster, the department or the Board,
24 whoever, is telling us, the tow operators, to
25 release vehicles to individuals who don't

1 currently have a valid driver's license, they can
2 come in our tow yards with a picture ID, a school
3 ID, was even mentioned they could have a Sam's
4 Club card and a title or a registration and drive
5 their vehicle out of the lots.

6 To me, that is putting the citizens in
7 danger, the police officers and the community at
8 large and the City of Detroit, the name Detroit.
9 We're telling our youngsters, you're telling our
10 citizens or the community that it's okay to drive
11 a vehicle in Detroit without a license.

12 I don't agree with that. I agree --
13 but my problem with that is, if you have
14 someone's vehicle being impounded, I get calls
15 from officers all the time literally asking us
16 did you just release that car. Well, under the
17 new rules that's in place that I'm asking the
18 Board to look at this and amend this for the
19 towers, we got officers that impound vehicles and
20 literally the vehicle -- the reason that the
21 vehicle is impounded is because the person does
22 not have a driver's license. When we get to the
23 tow yard, my drivers come to the yard, I have the
24 individuals following the tow truck and they're
25 coming with their title which is not in their

1 name, with their school ID and they're saying
2 give me my vehicle back, because they know that
3 this policy is in place.

4 We have no choice but to release this
5 vehicle back to these individual owners and give
6 it to them with a high school ID, don't have a
7 driver's license, don't have a state ID or
8 anything and we're told to give it back to them
9 and not only give it back to them, let them drive
10 it out of our impound yard.

11 A solution to that -- that I have to
12 this is if you're coming to pick up your vehicle
13 from the impound yard, you should have a valid
14 driver's license and a valid registration and a
15 valid proof of insurance. Then you can drive
16 your vehicle out of the lot, we don't have any
17 problems with that, once we verify insurance.

18 Now, with them literally telling us
19 that we have to release this vehicle, I literally
20 think this is unfair and it's unsafe. I wish
21 that the Board would literally hear us and help
22 us change this policy where if you don't have a
23 valid driver's license, registration and proof of
24 insurance, you cannot drive your vehicle out.

25 We are the only city in the state of

1 Michigan that literally allows this, the impound
2 yards. I've called 20 different impound yards
3 that I know that own different impound yards out
4 of the city and it's zero tolerance for that. So
5 to me we're just telling everything that it's
6 okay to come to the city of Detroit, drive a
7 vehicle without a license, it's okay, you're
8 going to get it back with just a title and ID.

9 To me, that's not fair to us as a
10 community as a whole and it blackens the eye of
11 Detroit again. I'm a business owner in the city,
12 I love the city, I grew up and raised in the
13 city, went to Detroit Public Schools, moved out
14 of the city. I just recently bought a home in
15 the city and moved my family back to the city.

16 So you're telling me that this is the
17 way that we literally have to --

18 (APPLAUSE.)

19 -- show my son and my daughter that's
20 growing up that this is okay in the city of
21 Detroit to be able to drive without a license.
22 That's one of the reasons that we have high
23 insurance rates, because everyone in the city is
24 driving without a license.

25 Well, if the police department -- and

1 I've been told that we're not the police. I
2 understand that. But we are, quote unquote, a
3 police impound yard. So when you come to the
4 police impound yard, you should have your
5 credentials and proper documents to drive your
6 vehicle out of the yard.

7 My next issue that I have is on this
8 actually posting sign that we have to have posted
9 in our lobbies. The department is telling us
10 that we need to have our insurance broker name
11 and number on there. I have a problem with that.

12 If we have a customer that comes in the
13 yard to pick up their vehicle and if we've
14 damaged -- I have a major problem with us listing
15 insurance company and numbers. For the one
16 reason that is, if I have a customer that comes
17 in to pick up their car and they're mad with the
18 police for towing their car. We take pictures of
19 the vehicle and I have my insurance
20 broker/agent's number listed up there and they're
21 angry with the police department, they're going
22 to call and open a new claim.

23 The claim might not be successful, but
24 it's still on our record with the insurance
25 company that we have an open claim and it's

1 documented. So at that point it's already hard
2 enough for business owners to get insurance in
3 the Detroit area because as soon as say Detroit,
4 the red flag goes up, okay.

5 So now if we can just don't put the
6 insurance up there. If there's a better way to
7 handle a claim with the customer. For one, if
8 there's a problem with the tower and the customer
9 first of all we'll see if the tower can handle it
10 and get the process straightened out. If not, I
11 think the next suggestion would be, which we do
12 have on the sign posted, contact Resource
13 Management.

14 I have an actual incident where I have
15 a lady that literally had her vehicle towed, it
16 was an aban vehicle. It was in the lot for
17 probably three years. Customers had complained
18 and literally we towed the vehicle in, get it in,
19 took pictures of it, had all the damage listed on
20 the impound card and literally she had came down,
21 she pissed a fit, and literally wanted her
22 vehicle. We gave it back to her. She had to
23 have it towed to Dearborn and this is an ongoing
24 lawsuit right now that's pending against us.

25 Now, we got the vehicle. My driver

1 loaded up, towed it to Dearborn. She waited
2 until we got it to Dearborn, called the police on
3 my driver and said we did all of this unnecessary
4 damage to her vehicle, which we did not. It was
5 listed on the impound card. If she would have
6 had our insurance company number, she would have
7 called and made a claim. That would have opened
8 up a claim against us where we literally would
9 have to fight it and at that point we can't erase
10 it because it's an open claim.

11 Currently right now it's pending. One
12 of my attorneys is handling it and literally she
13 told us -- told my driver I'm in Dearborn now,
14 I'm going to get you guys for all this damage.

15 So I just wanted to bring that up to
16 the Board. There is -- I commend the poster, I
17 commend all of that. I think that there should
18 definitely be a way for the citizens to contact
19 the police department if there is a problem with
20 the police department -- with the tow yard. I
21 definitely commend you guys for that, but I just
22 ask that you guys would just help us with this,
23 especially on the releasing of vehicles and also
24 with the actual having our insurance name and
25 number.

1 And one last thing I wanted to add.
2 There is no company in the state that I know of
3 that you walk in and they have their insurance
4 company posted. If the police department hurts
5 and kills someone, you don't walk in the police
6 department and say I'm going to sue the City of
7 Detroit and here's their insurance company.

8 You don't have access to that kind of
9 stuff, so again, I would just ask that the Board
10 would help us and literally think about these
11 posters that are going up and if there's
12 something that the towers need to do, I'm
13 available 24/7, if I could give any input to this
14 Board or to the department on a couple of issues
15 that we have, I will be glad to do that.

16 Again, Board, thank you for your time.

17 (APPLAUSE.)

18 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Again, and if you
19 could submit those recommendations in writing, it
20 would be helpful.

21 MR. FOSTER: Okay.

22 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And also Deputy
23 Chief, I'm going to ask if the Board can -- if
24 not an actual sign, if we can receive the
25 language that is on the sign that we might

1 benchmark that against our actual rules and see
2 where there may be gaps that need to be clarified
3 and/or filled. Thank you.

4 Commissioner Warfield?

5 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: When you were
6 talking about the driver's license and insurance
7 information, was that something that was
8 mentioned at the meeting yesterday?

9 MR. FOSTER: Yes, it was mentioned
10 at the meeting yesterday.

11 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Here's where
12 I'm at.

13 MR. FOSTER: And it was told to me
14 at the meeting yesterday if they come in with a
15 valid picture ID, it doesn't have to be a state
16 ID, a military ID or a passport, if it's a Sam's
17 Club card and a title, give them their car back.

18 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: And that was
19 stated at the meeting?

20 MR. FOSTER: Yes.

21 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: By DPD
22 official?

23 MR. FOSTER: Yes, and I have a major
24 problem with that literally because if it's you
25 guys out there or the police officers or my

1 family going down the road and we just -- there's
2 one more last issue I wanted to add to that.

3 If the department does approve this
4 signage to go out, then I would need a letter for
5 my company saying that the City is holding us not
6 responsible and not liable for giving a title and
7 letting someone drive a vehicle out with an ID of
8 Sam's Club or a title and they don't have a valid
9 insurance, because pretty much it's just asking
10 us to ignore state laws.

11 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
12 thank you, Brother Foster. Here's what I'm going
13 to ask all the towers are in the room. Certainly
14 if you have other comments, we want to hear them
15 tonight, but I will ask this.

16 If you want to prepare your own
17 individual reports of what happened yesterday at
18 that meeting and send them to me, I want to see
19 them, or send them to the Board because the Board
20 wants to read exactly what happened from your
21 perspective at that meeting because it's
22 important that we know exactly from your ears
23 what was said, and if there were things that were
24 said that are against our policy, we will
25 investigate that and we will deal with that as we

1 move forward, but certainly we will certainly
2 look into the issues that you brought up.

3 But if you all who are in the room are
4 towers will do that for us, I will be very
5 grateful to receive that report -- those reports
6 from you.

7 MR. FOSTER: Okay, thanks.

8 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, sir.
9 Good evening.

10 MR. HAMBRICK: Hi, my name is Cheryl
11 Hambrick and I did want to give kudos to Officer
12 Thompson for that boot camp program that he has
13 running because I had a bad grandson that I had
14 to actually put in there and it turned him around
15 360 degrees, so it is a wonderful program out
16 there.

17 (APPLAUSE.)

18 And it really does work. Something
19 else that I'm very concerned about is -- I mean I
20 can't thank you guys for being out there and I
21 can't even imagine doing what you guys do every
22 day and I know they work hard. I see their
23 presence. I know they're out there, but the
24 scary about is I'm getting a little older.

25 In my younger days I could deal with a

1 lot more, you know. I was kind of hard growing
2 up and I could deal with a lot more. I'm getting
3 a little older now and the older I get the more
4 fearful I'm getting and the thing is, you know,
5 me and my husband both work and we're getting
6 ready to retire soon, but we have to -- our house
7 was broken into a couple of times and the things
8 about it is, you know, I still haven't gotten
9 over that and every time I come home and put that
10 key in the door, I still have palpitations and
11 stuff because you just don't get over something
12 like that.

13 And my fear about -- you know, with
14 them talking about -- I mean because hears that
15 it's just like -- it's just so on the new, so on
16 the radio, it's everywhere about all the crime
17 going up, and what's so scary about is that, you
18 know, they're talking about cutting the police
19 officers and stuff like that, and that really
20 scares me because, I mean, we need our officers
21 and I was just wondering is there anything that's
22 going to go on that's going to -- I don't know --
23 give us more officers?

24 Is there anything as community
25 organizations that we can do? Is there anything

1 that you can tell me to kind of, you know -- I
2 don't know, you know what I'm saying?

3 I'm just -- you know, I just -- you
4 know, I hate having to live like this, and I know
5 -- and I don't blame it on the officers because
6 yous can only do with what the resources that you
7 guys have, but I just hope that yous guys got a
8 -- can pull a rabbit out of a hat or something
9 because this crime is just going crazy, you know,
10 and that's all I wanted to say.

11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you.

12 (APPLAUSE.)

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Are there any
14 other communications? I'm sorry, Commissioners
15 Warfield would like to make a comment?

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I'm sorry, your
17 last name, I'm sorry?

18 MS. HAMBRICK: Hambrick.

19 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Hambrick.
20 Thank you, Ms. Hambrick. Just so that you know,
21 yesterday this Board adopted a resolution that we
22 would not approve any more cuts to the Detroit
23 Police Department's budget, especially as relates
24 to personnel, and --

25 (APPLAUSE.)

1 -- and we also -- it's been on the
2 radio all day today and we also yesterday held a
3 press conference that we were going to City
4 Council today to ask them to put a millage, a
5 public safety millage, before the people in order
6 that we may add up to 500 more officers in the
7 neighborhoods, and so we asked for them to
8 consider that to be placed on the ballot in
9 November of this year.

10 And if that millage passes, we're
11 asking that all of those officers that are able
12 to be funded and come on board will be placed in
13 the neighborhood and that it does not supplement
14 -- that those officers cannot be supplemented out
15 or the ones who are already in the neighborhoods
16 cannot be moved out, but it's an additive effect
17 to the officers that are already there.

18 According to the preliminary
19 calculations that we have invoked, it's somewhere
20 between 40 and 80 officers per district and
21 precinct that we're looking to add through this
22 millage process. We will be providing the
23 language to City Council within the next 10 days
24 that we believe will be ballot ready and it will
25 be up to the Council to place that millage before

1 the voters so that, as you said, you all can make
2 that decision whether you can determine how much
3 policing you have in your own neighborhoods.

4 Now, I will tell you this. If Council
5 refuses to put it on the ballot, there are
6 citizens who are ready to take up petitions and
7 get petitions signed to make sure that's on the
8 ballot even if Council refuses that.

9 (APPLAUSE.)

10 MS. SMITH: One more last thing.

11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: I'm sorry,
12 Ms. Smith. We'll be happy to speak with you
13 following the meeting.

14 MS. SMITH: Excuse me?

15 COMMISSIONER WHITE: We'll be happy to
16 speak with you following the meeting.

17 MS. SMITH: I wanted everybody to know
18 that Chief Knox is doing well and he extends his
19 thanks to the police officers. Now, that's
20 important.

21 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Okay, thank you.

22 MS. SMITH: My goodness, you --

23 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you. Are
24 there any other oral communications? Any other
25 communications?

1 MS. JACKSON: Kimberly Jackson,
2 president Northeastern District and I tried to
3 keep my mouth shut. I can imagine how the
4 seniors feel because I'm tired of being tired.
5 When we lose our seniors out of this city, we're
6 done, because these seniors are the ones that are
7 keeping the houses up, keeping they grass cut,
8 trying to fix roofs, they're doing that, and if
9 we're not there to help them and they leave, what
10 happens to us? Our youngsters don't care and
11 that's obvious every day we hear on the news.

12 What are we going to do? I'm tired of
13 being tired. So we really need to find a
14 solution and we got to make it happen fast. We
15 keep saying we going to do this next week, we
16 going to do this next year, we going to -- we
17 need to do it now. We don't have time for it
18 next year because our citizens are becoming the
19 police.

20 Because it's either going to be me or
21 you and I'm not going down and I'm not going to
22 let my family go down. So we really need to get
23 something and we really need to make it happen
24 now. It's getting scary out here. I mean I
25 don't even want to be out here after dark. God

1 forbid if a senior has to be out here after dark.

2 We got to do something and I'm at the
3 point what can happen next. We have had
4 everything happen to us under the sun. It's got
5 to stop and it needs to stop now.

6 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
7 Ms. Jackson. Any other communications? Any
8 other communications? Any other communications?

9 Seeing none, again as a reminder the
10 Board will meet next Thursday, May 17 at 3 PM at
11 1300 Beaubien, police headquarters, Room 328-A.

12 At this time there's no further
13 business before this body. A motion for
14 adjournment is in order.

15 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: So moved.

16 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Properly moved and
18 supported. Any discussion? Seeing none, all
19 those in favor?

20 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

21 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Opposed? Thank
22 you.

23 (Proceedings concluded at
24 8:23 p.m.)
