- 4 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Good afternoon to everyone.
- 5 AUDIENCE: Good afternoon.
- 6 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Good afternoon. I know the
- 7 sun is not shinning today, but it's still a good day,
- 8 so good afternoon to everyone.
- 9 AUDIENCE: Good afternoon.
- 10 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Okay, okay. Let me welcome
- 11 you to the Board of Police Commissioners Meeting dated
- 12 Thursday, May 31st, 2012. My name is Commissioner
- 13 Donnell White. I have the pleasure of serving as
- 14 Chairman for the Board of Police Commissioners.
- Today I'm not joined with my colleagues, but
- 16 I am joined with Mr. George Anthony, Secretary to the
- 17 Board of Police Commissioners. I'll ask Mr. Secretary
- 18 if he could introduce our staff for the record.
- 19 MR. SECRETARY: Thank you, Mr. Chair. George
- 20 Anthony for the record. Present we have Ms. Celia
- 21 Banks Washington our Attorney to the Board, Lieutenant
- 22 Sizemore who is representing Dalph Watson from Police
- 23 Personnel, Lieutenant Timothy Leach who is the Acting
- 24 Chief Investigator at the Office of the Chief
- 25 Investigator, Mr. Robert Brown our Officer Manager



- 1 standing in the back, Sergeant Alan Quinn who is
- 2 recording our proceeding, and Ms. Elizabeth Koller from
- 3 Hanson Court Reporting Service. That completes the
- 4 introduction, sir.
- 5 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Thank you, Mr. Secretary. I
- 6 would like to note the presence of Deputy Chief
- 7 Benjamin Lee from the Office of the Chief. Thank you
- 8 for being with us today.
- 9 D.C. LEE: Good to be here.
- 10 CHAIRMAN WHITE: At this time we would ask if
- 11 Chaplain Reginald Best would come forward with our
- 12 invocation, please.
- 13 CHAPLAIN BEST: Let us pray. Father God in
- 14 Heaven, we approach your thrown with goodness, grace,
- 15 and mercy. Dear Lord, we're asking a special prayer on
- 16 behalf of our City. Lord, we ask for a spirit of peace
- 17 and calmness within our City. Lord, we're asking for
- 18 prayers on behalf of our Chief of Police and our Board
- 19 of Commissioners.
- 20 Father, give them the wisdom that they need
- 21 in order to battle the enemy of violence in our City
- 22 right now. Father, we're asking a special blessing
- 23 upon this meetings that everything that will be done
- 24 will be done in way that will bring peace and harmony
- 25 into our great City.



- 1 Father, this is our prayer. In you son's
- 2 name, Jesus, we pray. Amen.
- 3 AUDIENCE: Amen.
- 4 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Thank you, Chaplin. At this
- 5 time due to the fact that we do not have a quorum we
- 6 will table the approval of our agenda today. We will
- 7 also table the approval of our minutes dated for
- 8 Thursday, May 24th, and we move onto our Officers
- 9 Report. There is no formal Chairperson's Report today.
- 10 And I'll ask for our Secretary's Report at
- 11 this time, Mr. Secretary.
- MR. SECRETARY: Thank you, Mr. Chair. The
- 13 Secretary's Report regarding citizens complaints
- 14 received during the month of March 2012. The monthly
- 15 count of complaints for 2012, April there were 90 for
- 16 2012 and for 2011 that compares to 138, so there was a
- 17 35 percent decrease in complaints for April of 2012.
- 18 Year-to-date through the end of April, 422
- 19 complaints have been received compared to last year 479
- 20 complaints, a 12 percent decrease. At the end of
- 21 April 2012 the Office of the Chief Investigator had
- open investigations 389, cases filed 422, cases closed
- 23 729.
- Of the 90 cases filed 37 percent involved
- 25 unknown officers. The alleged known units involved



- 1 leading in complaints filed in April 2012 were the
- 2 Eastern District at nine percent, Northeastern District
- 3 at nine percent, 10th Precinct at seven precinct, and
- 4 the Southwestern District at seven percent.
- 5 Of the 90 cases filed in April 2012, they
- 6 involve 136 allegations where the leading area of
- 7 concern were demeanor 30 percent, procedure 30 percent,
- 8 force 10 percent, and service 10 percent. That
- 9 concludes the Secretary's Report, sir.
- 10 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Thank you, Mr. Secretary.
- 11 At this time I believe we were prepared to have a
- 12 report from the Office of the Chief Investigator.
- 13 We'll have that report at this time.
- 14 LIEUTENANT LEACH: Good afternoon.
- 15 Lieutenant Leach, Office of the Chief Investigator. On
- 16 February 24th, 2012, there were 591 active cases, 348
- 17 over 90. We got into a consent judgement, a court
- 18 order to be able to work on our back log cases, so I'm
- 19 just giving an updated report. As of May 31st we went
- 20 from 591 active cases to 306, and from 348 cases over
- 21 90 to 115.
- 22 So this is letting you guys know that we're
- 23 really working diligently on our cases, working real
- 24 hard. And I'm just going to feed off of what the
- 25 Secretary of the Board just said as far as incoming



- 1 cases.
- 2 We received 132 cases in March, we received
- 3 90 cases in April, and an additional 108 cases in May,
- 4 which was 330 cases within three months. So for us to
- 5 have 591 cases in February, receive an additional 330
- 6 cases as of date and we have active cases 306, it shows
- 7 you that your investigators are on their jobs and doing
- 8 their jobs.
- 9 So I just wanted to commend the Office of the
- 10 Chief Investigator Investigators on the job well done
- 11 with the leadership of Ms. Washington and George
- 12 Anthony. Thank you.
- 13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Lieutenant, if you
- 14 could, one question before you take your seat. So if
- 15 I'm reading this reported correctly as of May 31
- there's still 115 cases in backlog?
- 17 LIEUTENANT LEACH: Exactly.
- 18 CHAIRMAN WHITE: What is our projected
- 19 timeline if we continue to move at this aggressive
- 20 pace? And again I applaud the Office of the Chief
- 21 Investigator for getting us to this point, but when
- 22 will we see a substantial reduction beyond this 115?
- 23 LIEUTENANT LEACH: June, we have it set up
- for June 30th to be at 39 case in backlog and by
- July 18 zero cases in backlog. One approach that we've



- 1 been doing is we've been having weekly meetings every
- 2 week with every investigator. So now the supervisors
- 3 know exactly where the investigators are within their
- 4 reports. Myself and Ms. Washington sit down every week
- 5 and go over the reports in detail. So by doing that we
- 6 can come to a conclusion of who needs to be
- 7 investigated and who should not be investigated.
- 8 So it's kind of a team effort and that's why
- 9 it's speeding up, along with assistance of the Chief of
- 10 Police who had us be able to receive six officers from,
- 11 you know, the personnel to be able to go and canvas and
- 12 run around and get paperwork and stuff for us. So as a
- 13 team effort it's been working real good.
- So hopefully, I won't say hopefully, by
- July 18th we'll have zero cases under 90.
- 16 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Okay. Thank you.
- 17 LIEUTENANT LEACH: Any other questions?
- 18 CHAIRMAN WHITE: No.
- 19 LIEUTENANT LEACH: Thank you.
- 20 CHAIRMAN WHITE: And, again, this Body
- 21 certainly thanks Lieutenant Leach for your leadership
- 22 serving in the capacity as Acting Chief Investigator is
- 23 helping us get to this point. And certainly the
- leadership of Attorney to the Board, Ms. Celia Banks
- 25 Washington, and Secretary to the Board, Mr. George



- 1 Anthony.
- I know it's been all hands on deck effort to
- 3 get us to this point. We're certainly appreciative of
- 4 the progress and I'm sure Judge Cook will be as well
- 5 when we arrive at the July date of zero cases in
- 6 backlog.
- 7 So please convey our accolades and our
- 8 commendations to our troops in the Office of the Chief
- 9 Investigator and urge them to continue to keep the nose
- 10 to the grind. So thank you again.
- 11 LIEUTENANT LEACH: Thank you.
- 12 CHAIRMAN WHITE: At this time we will have a
- 13 report from the Office of the Chief. Deputy Chief?
- D.C. LEE: We have no report other than all
- 15 the staff, you can see I'm the only one here today, the
- 16 staff is coming back from Lansing for a meeting they
- 17 had there. I have Sergeant Brian Harris from my office
- 18 with me today. We have no report.
- 19 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Thank you, Deputy Chief.
- 20 There are no Standing Committee Reports before us or
- 21 New Business or Old Business. So under Announcements,
- 22 please be mindful the next Board of Police
- 23 Commissioners Meeting will be held Thursday, June 7th,
- 24 at 3:00 p.m. at the Central District, 7310 -- is that a
- 25 Tigers Game?



- 1 MR. SECRETARY: Yes.
- 2 CHAIRMAN WHITE: 3:00 p.m. at the Central
- 3 District to help accommodate with the parking since the
- 4 Tigers will have a home game that day during that time
- 5 period. So be mindful the next meeting will be
- 6 3:00 p.m., June 7th at Central District which is
- 7 located at 7310 Woodward Avenue.
- 8 At this time in our meeting we would like to
- 9 hear from our audience for our oral communications. If
- 10 you wish to address the Board of Police Commissioners
- 11 we would ask that you would come forward, please
- 12 clearly state your first and last name, for the benefit
- of the record, please spell your name so we can have an
- 14 accurate account and also please be mindful of the
- 15 two-minute allotted time period which will be shown by
- 16 Mr. Brown our Officer Manager to my right and your
- 17 left.
- 18 MR. MELVILLE: Good afternoon, sir. Joseph
- 19 Melville, from Westside Impound, Inc., and from
- 20 Melville's Towing. I approached the Board last week
- 21 and asked permission to move two current authorized
- 22 towers into my two vacant yards on the Westside of
- 23 Detroit and this week the Board said they would have an
- answer for me if they're going to allow tow companies
- 25 to move from yard to yard.



- I have my applications with me. I just
- 2 wasn't sure if the Board of Police Commissioners is
- 3 going to authorize this or not. I can go into details,
- 4 but that was my main question.
- 5 CHAIRMAN WHITE: And I want to ask for an
- 6 update because I do believe Commander Serda who may be
- 7 at training this week was to give us a report back on
- 8 that. Deputy Chief, do you have any information on
- 9 that regard?
- 10 D.C. LEE: No, I do have I think a memo,
- 11 through the Chair, to the Board of Police Commissioners
- 12 with questions and that's the only information that I
- 13 do have with me today.
- 14 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Do you have copies of that,
- 15 Deputy Chief? And I apologize, Mr. Melville, give me
- one second. This is my first time seeing this
- 17 communication here. I don't want to belabor this
- 18 point. There's a lot of information here and since we
- 19 just received this today my colleagues have not had an
- 20 opportunity to look at this either.
- 21 So with no formal report back from our
- 22 office, particularly the Office of Management Services
- 23 Bureau, if you would allow us an opportunity to digest
- 24 this information so that we can communicate with you
- 25 more appropriately as to what the next steps are, what



- 1 the Department has deemed possible for you, and if
- 2 there's a need for this body to intervene.
- 3 So I don't believe it would be within our
- 4 prerogative to answer that question for you. I do
- 5 believe that's a function of the Department. But if
- 6 there's an issue that's where we will come in at that
- 7 point.
- 8 MR. MELVILLE: I appreciate that. My concern
- 9 is I'm on a timeline. Either I'm going to submit two
- 10 applications to the City of Detroit for towing
- 11 contracts or I'm going to move two companies current
- 12 onto my properties.
- 13 My concern is it seems like there might be
- 14 favoritism since some of these companies that were
- 15 moved were owned by ex-police officers. And just the
- 16 appearance, I mean, don't look good. I mean, if you're
- 17 going to allow one company to do it, you must allow all
- 18 companies to do it.
- 19 Like I said, I'm not asking for favors,
- 20 special favors, favoritism. I'm just saying if you're
- 21 allowing certain companies to move then I'm asking for
- 22 permission to do the same. I'm not asking for nothing
- 23 extra. No extra districts, no extra tows, so on and so
- 24 forth.
- 25 I'm just saying if you allow the ex-police



- 1 officers to do this, then you must allow me to do this.
- 2 And this is my concern.
- 3 CHAIRMAN WHITE: It would be our position
- 4 that there absolutely should be no favoritism shown.
- 5 MR. MELVILLE: But there has been since 2001.
- 6 I mean, I've been in front of Public Corruption Task
- 7 Force.
- 8 CHAIRMAN WHITE: I understand.
- 9 Unfortunately, I can't speak for 2001. But since my
- 10 presence on this Board in 2010 that has not been the
- 11 case and you can fully expect that with just a few
- 12 short years left, the remainder of my tenure on the
- 13 Body you won't see that favoritism showing.
- MR. MELVILLE: I appreciate that, sir.
- 15 CHAIRMAN WHITE: If we can get to the bottom
- of this issue, and again, we will move as aggressively
- 17 as possible to make sure we have the best answers as
- 18 possible and you should not expect to see any
- 19 favoritism anywhere in this process.
- MR. MELVILLE: I appreciate that. So is it
- 21 possible to have an answer by next week so I know if
- 22 I'm going to submit the applications or?
- 23 COMMISSIONER WHITE: I'm going to ask if --
- 24 we'll get this to my colleagues and if you haven't had
- 25 a communication from Management Services Bureau, I



- 1 believe that's where you started your conversation?
- 2 MR. MELVILLE: Yes, last year.
- 3 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Right. I'm going to ask if
- 4 Deputy Chief could step in. Chief, I'm not sure what
- 5 communication would be next to an individual who was
- 6 looking at moving a location because in the past that
- 7 is not something this body would okay or deny. So I'm
- 8 assuming there's a communication needed from that
- 9 department.
- D.C. LEE: Yes, through the Chair, he would
- 11 have to submit his application, the initial application
- or request to move a tow company to Management Services
- 13 Bureau.
- MR. MELVILLE: Thank you, sir. I'll do that
- 15 this week. Thank you so much.
- 16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Good afternoon.
- MR. ALLEN: Good afternoon. Leon Allen,
- 18 L-E-O-N A-L-L-E-N. Good afternoon, gentleman. I come
- 19 before you today to express a little outrage and
- 20 concern about the manner in which I was treated by
- 21 several Detroit Police Officers on Tuesday, May 29th,
- 22 2012 after a traffic stop on Gratiot and Seven Mile in
- 23 Detroit.
- 24 After I was stopped by two Detroit Police
- 25 Officers for failure to stop at a red light I sided my



- 1 vehicle into Officer Richardson of the Eastern
- 2 District, approached my vehicle and asked for my
- 3 vehicle information. I explained to the Officer that I
- 4 had to take off my seatbelt and get my wallet and go
- 5 into my glove compartment. I did want to be shot for
- 6 trying to do either.
- 7 Officer Richardson became very irritated with
- 8 my statement. After Officer Richardson gave me the
- 9 ticket I threw it in my passenger seat and pulled off.
- 10 At this point the harassment started. Both officers
- 11 returned to their vehicles and raced down Gratiot at a
- 12 high rate of speed without their emergency lights or
- 13 siren on.
- Once they got behind or got close to my
- 15 vehicle they turned on their lights as if to pull me
- 16 over again. Which I did not understand because I had
- 17 not violated any other traffic laws. As I went to pull
- 18 over with the police vehicle behind me, the lights on
- 19 the vehicle went off. So I pulled off again.
- This went on for about eight blocks. Then
- 21 the Officers pulled along side me as I was parking in
- 22 front of the Eastern District, and the Officer in the
- 23 passenger seat gave me the middle finger. At this
- 24 point I went into the Eastern District and picked up
- 25 one of the telephones in the outer area where operate



- 1 number five took my call.
- I explained to her the situation and that I
- 3 wanted to file a formal complaint. She told me that I
- 4 needed to go into the actual police station to do so.
- 5 I told her I could not get in because they were in
- 6 virtual mode. She told me to hang up and stand by,
- 7 that she would call the precinct.
- 8 A Sergeant Green opened the door and asked me
- 9 what was the problem? When I told him I wanted to file
- 10 a formal complaint against two police officers,
- 11 Sergeant Green disposition was as if I was wasting his
- 12 time. He asked me what was the problem? And I stated
- 13 to him, how are you going to take a formal complaint
- 14 without anything to document what my complaint is?
- 15 At this point there was a verbal exchange
- 16 between myself and Sergeant Green when I finally said I
- 17 will go to police headquarters to file this complaint
- 18 if necessary and turned and walked away.
- 19 Sergeant Green then stated he would take my
- 20 complaint. He led me back to an office where he began
- 21 to take my complaint. Three minutes into taking my
- 22 complaint two other Sergeants, Sergeant Faulkner and a
- 23 Caucasian female Sergeant, with blonde curly hair came
- 24 into the office. Sergeant Faulkner turned on the
- 25 television set and turned the volume up very loud



- 1 making it difficult for Sergeant Green to take my
- 2 complaint.
- 3 Also both of these Sergeants started trying
- 4 to intimidate me by making comments about my complaint
- 5 and staring at me as if I was beneath them. Once the
- 6 complaint was finished I asked Sergeant Green could
- 7 either he or the other two Sergeants tell me when was
- 8 the next Police Commission Board Meeting.
- 9 The female Sergeant stated that that's not
- 10 part of my job to tell you when these meetings are so
- 11 you can waste somebody else's time with this, and if
- 12 you want to know when the next meeting is then Google
- 13 it. At that point I got up and left the station.
- Even though this is a small and minor example
- of police intimidation and harassment and abuse of
- 16 authority I do not blame the patrol officers completely
- for their actions because clearly they're only
- 18 following the examples of their direct supervisors and
- 19 leadership.
- 20 And as a citizen who pays his taxes, an Army
- 21 Veteran, a man that works, been working at the same job
- for twenty years, this is one of the reasons why me and
- 23 my wife have sold our house and left the City of
- 24 Detroit.
- Every black man and excuse me I'm not trying



- 1 to make it a racial issue is not a criminal. I work
- 2 for a living. I have put three kids through college.
- 3 One of them is an air traffic controller for the United
- 4 States Navy. The other one just came back from Arizona
- 5 to get a job in Detroit Public School System. Now I'm
- 6 trying to persuade her to go back to Arizona.
- 7 This is why people are leaving the City. And
- 8 I can understand that we have a lot of other issues,
- 9 but it starts with our police force. No citizen should
- 10 be treated in the manner in which I was treated
- 11 seriously, and to me that's totally unacceptable. So I
- 12 thank you gentlemen for your time.
- 13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Mr. Allen.
- 14 Let me say before you leave we certainly do not condone
- 15 that type of behavior within the Detroit Police
- 16 Department. We thank you, for one, having the courage
- 17 to come forward, two, your thoroughness in your report
- 18 that you were able to share the details of what has
- 19 transpired.
- You have our commitment that we will
- 21 certainly look into this issue. There are a number of
- 22 issues that you have raised which is the function of
- 23 this Body is to serve into looking at those types of
- 24 matters from the Office of the Chief Investigator.
- One, I would like you to see Lieutenant



- 1 Timothy Leach before you leave so he can inform you of
- 2 that process if you wish to pursue that as a method of
- 3 filing a formal complaint so that our investigators can
- 4 look into this more thoroughly for you.
- 5 And if there are improprieties into how these
- 6 Officers have acted proper action will be taken. Two,
- 7 certainly Deputy Chief may want to address you, as
- 8 well.
- 9 D.C. LEE: Yes, sir. Thank you for coming
- 10 forward. Likewise, I don't condone what has happened.
- 11 You took the proper steps to do what you needed to do
- 12 and in order to make your complaint known.
- We will let that take its course and whatever
- 14 actions we need to take be it warranted then we will
- 15 take that action. Our stations have cameras.
- 16 Hopefully the car that was used on that particular day,
- 17 I didn't get the day this happened.
- MR. ALLEN: May 29, this past Tuesday, sir.
- 19 D.C. LEE: That information is available from
- 20 the car as well. We just equipped I want to say almost
- 21 90 percent of our precincts, well, all of our precincts
- 22 with working cameras and working cars. We just had a
- 23 meeting last weeks about cars on the streets and cars
- 24 that have cameras.
- So in an incident such as this, more



- 1 incidents that come up we need to look at it it's
- 2 available. So we will take a look at that. And I do
- 3 thank you for coming forward. And as far as our
- 4 virtual precincts, never believe that the precincts are
- 5 closed. Those precincts are open. The doors are
- 6 simply locked. The officers are still available.
- 7 They still have to come to that door and talk
- 8 to you. If that phone wasn't connected to the desk the
- 9 operator did what she was supposed to in terms of
- 10 connecting you with the desk and having somebody come
- 11 out and take that formal complaint.
- MR. MELVILLE: Can I say one more thing? I
- didn't get the young lady's name, but whoever operator
- 14 number five was out of all this she was the only
- 15 professional person I dealt with that day representing
- 16 the Detroit Police Department.
- Because the young lady could have hung up and
- 18 could have say, well, sir, you can come back. She told
- 19 me, no, stand there. As a matter of fact, hold on, let
- 20 me talk to my supervisor and see what can be done right
- 21 now, sir.
- D.C. LEE: I'd also like you to give your
- 23 information to Officer Harris at the back, he's
- 24 standing in the back. I want to say on the record I
- 25 had a very pleasant experience with Delta yesterday



- 1 when I flew back.
- 2 MR. MELVILLE: I just got off work.
- 3 D.C. LEE: A very pleasant experience. I
- 4 don't know if you work at Metro?
- 5 MR. MELVILLE: Yes, sir, I do.
- D.C. LEE: There was a lady by the name
- 7 Brenda that helped me yesterday. Very wonderful
- 8 experience.
- 9 MR. MELVILLE: Customers service is what
- 10 we're trying to improve on, sir, so I'm glad.
- 11 CHAIRMAN WHITE: So are we. Thank you,
- 12 again. Good afternoon.
- MS. WILLIAMS: Hi, my name is Debby Williams,
- 14 and I'm a social worker. I'm hear to talk about, I
- 15 want to say first of all congratulations. Thank you
- 16 for all the Police Officers who conduct themselves in
- an ethical manner when they're out here dealing with
- 18 the public. Okay.
- I would like you guys to know, you don't have
- 20 anything to do with child protective service, but I
- 21 know when calls come out Police Officers have to escort
- 22 the social workers to protect them while they do their
- 23 job about getting children, okay.
- Now, CPS has been operating under unethical
- 25 practices, falsifying documents, literally falsifying



- 1 documents before they get to preliminary. Somebody can
- 2 call in and make a false allegation on anybody in here,
- 3 okay. And the CPS workers supposed to go in and do a
- 4 proper investigation and see if that child is being
- 5 abused and neglected. A lot of times people's kids
- 6 have been pulled out the home and it's no abuse
- 7 nowhere.
- 8 But what I'm here for I have talked to many
- 9 people telling me that when the Police Officers come
- 10 they don't, they'll come with the workers, they'll come
- 11 right on in the house just open the door and just come
- in, don't ask the workers or anything if they have a
- 13 warrant, do they have a proper warrant to, you know,
- 14 come in their homes and stuff.
- So I'm asking you guys, please, if when CPS,
- 16 you have to escort CPS, ask these ladies or men do they
- 17 have the proper warrant from juvenile hall to enter
- 18 these people's homes and not have the Police Officer
- 19 encouraging them to just come on in the house and
- 20 intimidate people and their children. Because people
- 21 make false allegations on a lot of these parents and
- 22 grandparents. Thank you.
- 23 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Thank you, Ms. Williams.
- 24 Good afternoon.
- 25 EVANGELIST JOHNSON: Good afternoon. My name



- 1 is Evangelist Johnson with Unity in the Community. We
- 2 had a wonderful prayer walk around the City of Detroit.
- 3 We walked around the City County Building seven times
- 4 today praying for the City. And I'm convinced that the
- 5 walls of Jericho are going to come down from the
- 6 Mayor's Office, City Council, Police Department, and
- 7 every other area where it's affecting the people.
- 8 My concern is I was driving Downtown and
- 9 something I see frequent, I see youth from the suburbs
- 10 and I know they're from the suburbs because I've
- inquired, and their skateboarding on all the
- 12 development and everything.
- 13 What I observed yesterday was the Detroit
- 14 Police Officers they didn't say anything to these youth
- 15 from the suburbs. But they were so busy looking at
- 16 some young African American youth that look like they
- 17 were just coming from school. And the kids were just
- 18 skateboard knocking on the buildings, just knocking and
- 19 banging and pounding.
- 20 So my question is, is that okay that suburban
- 21 kids can come to the City of Detroit and skateboard all
- 22 through the City property and African American kids
- 23 that live in the City of Detroit can't walk home from
- 24 school without being observed, yet the suburbanite kids
- 25 are skateboarding and knocking property down, and



- 1 everything else?
- I seen the Police Officers look like they
- 3 might as well just started clapping and applauding the
- 4 young kids destroying the property. I would like to
- 5 see the Police Department stop that nonsense because we
- 6 put too much money, and people in the City of Detroit
- 7 are suffering economically. We're putting too much
- 8 money in development for anyone whether it's people
- 9 from the city or suburbs to come and just destroy it,
- 10 you know.
- I'm beginning to wonder was that legal
- 12 because I was just watching the Officers just like
- 13 fifteen, fifteen young people just tearing up the
- 14 property in the City. And I see this almost everyday.
- 15 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Evangelist Johnson, I
- 16 know what you described could be a profile situation
- 17 and that is something that certainly is not condoned by
- 18 this Department. As it relates to the ability for you
- 19 to be skateboarding on City property I defer that for
- 20 comment from Deputy Chief Lee.
- D.C. LEE: Through the Chair, as best I know
- they have to put the signage up on those different
- 23 places. I don't know if it's actually illegal to do
- 24 it. If it's damaging the property I'm sure that it is.
- 25 But generally most places I've seen they put signage up



- 1 that says you can't do it or put barriers up to
- 2 discourage it.
- 3 So without some specific places, if you can
- 4 give me some specific places or something?
- 5 EVANGELIST JOHNSON: What I'll do I'll get
- 6 your number and when I see it from this point on I will
- 7 get the specific places. If I can ask this guick
- 8 question to you, so then it would be okay if fifteen
- 9 African American youth can go in that same location
- 10 because they do have some nice little loops where they
- 11 can scoop around, can they go in that same location and
- 12 not be bothered because I see these suburbanites every
- 13 single day.
- D.C. LEE: Through the Chair, without having
- 15 some specific knowledge of exactly what they're doing.
- 16 EVANGELIST JOHNSON: Well, they're
- 17 skateboarding on the property, Washington Boulevard,
- 18 for example, City County Building.
- D.C. LEE: From my perspective walking,
- 20 skateboarding within the law we don't have a problem
- 21 with that.
- 22 EVANGELIST JOHNSON: Okay. Thank you.
- 23 D.C. LEE: You can give the information to
- 24 Sergeant Harris.
- 25 EVANGELIST JOHNSON: Okay. Thank you, I



- 1 certainly will.
- 2 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you. Good
- 3 afternoon.
- 4 MR. SECAL: Good afternoon. My name is Ron
- 5 Secal. There's several things I wanted to talk about.
- 6 Number one is a number of years ago, long, long time
- 7 ago actually, it's 1980, I was working in the program
- 8 in Highland Park called Community Against Crime, and
- 9 actually training people.
- 10 We would set up neighbor watch which is
- 11 happening and I was training people with the help of
- 12 the Highland Park Police in what to watch out for. We
- 13 have a suspect identification form, you know, how to
- 14 make police reports and stuff.
- We did emphasize that you don't go around and
- 16 try to arrest the person themselves. We did not want
- 17 that way back then. That was the rules of the
- 18 neighborhood watch. And so we didn't want what
- 19 happened in Florida. And crime went down by
- 20 20 percent.
- I'd like to volunteer to help out in Detroit.
- 22 The one thing that helped us in Highland Park was that
- 23 police had respect for the community and I hope you
- 24 deal with different complaints about when people are
- 25 not being shown respect like that last person.



- 1 Another thing, one of the worse crimes is
- 2 crimes of respect, not just simply robbery or crime for
- 3 gain, but crimes for people. Kids feel that they're
- 4 not respected or even an adult shot a kid for looking
- 5 at them the wrong way.
- 6 We need to teach kids respect. We need to
- 7 kind of help kids learn respect and learn to respect
- 8 themselves. And I'm with the group called Respect
- 9 Month Committee and we're working with the Rosa Park
- 10 Institute. And, well, my phone number is area code
- 11 (313) --
- 12 CHAIRMAN WHITE: We wouldn't want to put your
- 13 personal information because this is public record, we
- don't want to put that on record, but we'll be happy to
- 15 get your phone number following the meeting.
- MR. SECAL: Okay. Thank you. And maybe we
- 17 could work with the Police and also with the schools
- and certainly we'd be very interested in helping train
- 19 people in neighborhoods. I was paid for this in 1980.
- 20 I would be willing to work as a volunteer and so I'm
- 21 offering my services right now.
- 22 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Sure. Mr. Secal, before you
- 23 leave, Deputy Chief, I'm sure there's a mechanism that
- 24 we can engage Mr. Secal's energy and expertise into the
- 25 fold.



- 1 MR. SECAL: Thank you. Should I walk up to
- 2 you and give you my phone number? The man in the back,
- 3 okay. Thank you.
- D.C. LEE: Sergeant Harris in the back.
- 5 MR. SECAL: Yes, the man the back. Okay.
- 6 Thank you very much.
- 7 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Good afternoon.
- 8 MR. DIPONIO: Good afternoon. My name is
- 9 Steven DiPonio, that is D-I capital P-O-N-I-O.
- I was here last week. I met with you, Deputy
- 11 Chief, about the drug dealing up and down Trumbell
- 12 Avenue in the Cork Town Neighborhood and at Greyhound
- 13 Bus Station. I tried calling you last Friday. You
- 14 were not in. And I believe an Officer Jones answered
- 15 the cell phone that day.
- I called your office at 2:30 yesterday and
- 17 you were not in. Which she asked what the message was
- 18 about. I told her about the drug dealing in Cork Town.
- 19 Now, she did call me back at 2:45, 2:57, and I believe
- 20 3:13 yesterday. Now, those are the only phone calls I
- 21 have. I have not heard from Narcotics for anything.
- 22 As I told you I have a year and a half's
- 23 worth of surveillance photos that are date and time
- 24 stamped that I've taken and made with my digital
- 25 computer. And I've made three copies of them. I got a



- 1 copy each with people that are safe and another copy
- 2 with my attorney. Nobody in law enforcement has seen
- 3 any of this stuff yet.
- When do you want to look at it?
- 5 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Anything further?
- 6 MR. DIPONIO: Thank you.
- 7 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Deputy Chief, have you
- 8 received a report back as to the status on the
- 9 information that Mr. DiPonio may have?
- 10 D.C. LEE: Yes, and I do apologize. I was
- 11 out of town when he did call my office. But I was
- 12 informed of all his information and it was forwarded to
- 13 the proper authority and we're just going to be
- 14 awaiting what their response is going to be to the
- 15 information. And I actually spent about 45 minutes
- 16 last week with him in my office.
- 17 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Thank you.
- 18 MR. HANKINS: Good afternoon. My name if
- 19 Freddy Hankins, H-A-N-K-I-N-S, F-R-E-D-D-Y, first name.
- 20 Good afternoon to you all. I was here. I'm listening
- 21 to different ones saying in regards to what they have
- 22 to say. You know what? It disturbs me very much so
- 23 because I was born in the City of Detroit and even
- 24 having to do with the Coleman Young Administration and
- 25 how Detroit have suffered so much.



- 1 And, you know, we were sitting here and I'm
- 2 looking at the faces on different ones smiling and what
- 3 have you, it's almost like sitting at a funeral
- 4 smiling. I'm really sorry for the fact that the City
- of Detroit, the people in the City of Detroit have to
- 6 go through what they have to go through with is because
- 7 we're concerned about our titles and our positions to
- 8 the extent that we can't reach out to the people and
- 9 meet the people's needs.
- And it's a sad thing. And I have suffered
- 11 many things myself. But the thing is here we're not
- 12 getting the job done. Everywhere else you go perhaps
- and they talk about the suburbs and I too agree you
- 14 have a liquor store on every corner, you don't have a
- 15 drug house in every neighborhood.
- You don't have people running here and there,
- doing all they want to do and breaking the laws and
- 18 getting away with a lot of things. You know, you don't
- 19 have that. But here in the City of Detroit there's a
- 20 lot of things goings on. And I think what we need
- 21 here, we need people that are more concerned about the
- 22 people in Detroit more so than a paycheck, more so than
- 23 the titles and the positions.
- 24 That stuff don't mean nothing when people are
- 25 suffering and people are dying and going through what



- 1 they're going through with when you can go home and sit
- 2 down and kick your legs up and look at your TV and get
- 3 your paycheck and everybody else is suffering.
- I don't agree with that stuff. I just wish
- 5 that they have some people that stand up for the City
- of Detroit and be concerned about the people that's
- 7 going through and suffering rather than sitting up with
- 8 their suit and necktie on. This stuff don't work and
- 9 it's not going to work.
- And when we get through talking here and all
- 11 this is over and said and done and it's still going to
- 12 remain the same because you don't have people that's
- 13 concerned about what's going on in Detroit. I'm not
- 14 happy now whatsoever.
- I had two Police Officers come out to my home
- and told him about an incident that had taken place and
- 17 a bag that was left in front of my vehicle. And I
- 18 didn't know what it was. And I called them and they
- 19 came out. They talked to me. They got my name. What
- 20 happened they went over to the neighbor's house next
- 21 door and they talked to the neighbor smiling and
- 22 laughing, got in their car and pulled off. And they
- 23 told me what they was going to do. They did not do
- 24 that.
- Well, I can understand when you have people



- 1 in leadership, people in positions that can do
- 2 something about it and they don't do anything about it,
- 3 then I can understand these people are doing what
- 4 they're doing because you people need to scream. They
- 5 need to scream at these folks in position with titles.
- 6 They need to scream and find out how do you feel about
- 7 the people.
- 8 You can't just mess with people and take
- 9 advantage of people because of your position and your
- 10 titles. This is a sad thing. Something needs to done
- 11 about it.
- 12 You know, you talk about Kilpatrick and Nixon
- 13 robbed this country. Didn't do a thing. Talk about
- 14 Kilpatrick and they want to hang him because of what
- 15 they said so happened. But they knew what Nixon did
- 16 and they didn't do nothing about it.
- 17 Let's not fool ourselves. Let's get down to
- 18 business. We're not doing as we ought to do. Pray all
- 19 you want to, but if you don't do what you all do ain't
- 20 nothing going to happen. We've get to get down to
- 21 business. I don't need no response. I can walk out of
- 22 this door.
- I'm not leaving Detroit. I'm going to stand
- 24 up for what I believe in. I believe it's right to do
- 25 right. I believe it's right to see about the people.



- 1 Don't wait till preacher get robbed and everybody going
- 2 to get involved in it.
- 3 What somebody -- get robbed. I don't care if
- 4 it's a child. See about it. Do your business. Do
- 5 your job. You're placed in office. You're place in
- 6 position to do your job. Do your job as you're paid to
- 7 do. Then you can go home and rest and sleep good
- 8 because you've done your job. I'm through this with.
- 9 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Thank you. Good afternoon.
- MR. LACY: Good afternoon. My name is Mary
- 11 Lacy, L-A-C-Y. I'm very active in my community. So I
- 12 attended the City Council Meeting last week I believe
- in the evening out in the community. And I was
- 14 concerned about senior safety.
- 15 And of course Councilman James Tate and
- 16 Councilman Brown came from the Police Department and
- 17 they were sort of like referring me to the Police
- 18 Department to find out about senior safety because I
- 19 was telling them. I remember City Council, I mean City
- 20 of Detroit use to have a City Department, Senior
- 21 Department. But they was referring me here. So I
- 22 would like to talk to an Officer or someone about
- 23 senior safety.
- 24 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Sure.
- MS. LACY: Because there's a particular thing



- 1 that's happened in those apartments I would like to
- 2 talk to a Officer about. And my other thing is like I
- 3 said I'm very active in the community, and I would like
- 4 to give appreciation to the Police Officers out there
- 5 in the field who have to deal with like these parades
- 6 and things.
- Just like last week the electronics, 30,000,
- 8 the race coming up out on Belle Isle, and then you're
- 9 going to have the Country Hoedown. All of these I'll
- 10 be taking friends from out of town to that. A 100,000.
- 11 I think the Police Department is only about three or
- 12 4,000. So if you think about that 100,000 people from
- 13 all over the states.
- So I think, like I said, it's a two-way
- 15 street. I think like in the old days they use to have
- 16 people going on tour when they go to the police station
- 17 just give them an idea what is involved. I don't know
- 18 if they have that anymore.
- But do we have any young cadets anymore that
- 20 be out on these parades, out at these places? You
- 21 know, like, when we have so many thousands and
- thousands of people like I say at the Country Hoedown,
- 23 100,000, all like that. Do we have any young cadets in
- 24 training anymore?
- Well, that's good. Because I think having



- 1 them out in the real world helps. But like I said, I
- 2 would like to talk to a Officer about senior safety.
- 3 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Ms. Lacy, before you
- 4 leave I would think, I was thinking is it Brian Simons
- 5 who served -- so there is an Explorer Program where
- 6 young people are active within the Department. For the
- 7 large events, and I have to give accolades to our
- 8 Tactical Operations Department who do an excellent job
- 9 in covering our large scale events.
- 10 And I know that Deputy Chief, correct me if
- 11 I'm wrong, that is a scientific approach along with the
- 12 Reserve Officers as well. So we have excellent
- 13 coverage at many events that you notice that thousands
- of people who have come for a number of things and have
- 15 gone without incident.
- MS. LACY: Right, right.
- 17 CHAIRMAN WHITE: And part of that is due to
- 18 the due diligence of our Department. And the third
- 19 piece was senior safety and I'm going to defer to
- 20 Deputy Chief Lee because I do believe there's an
- 21 excellent person who can work with you on that.
- MS. LACY: Okay. And one more thing, traffic
- 23 controllers, they was excellent. I heard they don't
- 24 have them anymore. The traffic controllers, they still
- 25 have them?



- D.C. LEE: That's going to be Brian Fountain,
- 2 the Investigator. He does an excellent presentation.
- 3 He did one for the last quarterly meeting that we had
- 4 and it was an excellent presentation. Just give that
- 5 information to Sergeant Harris who also will put you in
- 6 touch with your district and they can provide you some
- 7 information, as well.
- 8 MS. LACY: All right. Thank you.
- 9 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Thank you. Good afternoon.
- 10 MS. PANNELL: Good afternoon. Sharon
- 11 Pannell. I just wanted to let Ms. Lacy know they have
- 12 a Detroit Police Officer Citizen Academy. It's six
- 13 weeks' course. And if they want to know about what the
- 14 police does they have all entities of the different
- 15 polices to come in and everything and take them to the
- 16 gun range and take them to 911, take you on a police
- 17 ride, if you want to learn about the police.
- 18 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Thank you, Ms. Pannell. Any
- 19 other communications?
- MS. SMITH: Good afternoon to the one
- 21 Commissioner.
- 22 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Good afternoon.
- MS. SMITH: No, seriously, good afternoon to
- 24 you to, Deputy Chief. Bernice Smith, proudly belong to
- 25 the Detroit 300 and was out there doing a parade last



- 1 night. Of course I wasn't. I was feeding the young
- 2 men.
- But the fact is we're back on the battlefield
- 4 looks like, and I think we're going to have good
- 5 results within the next couple weeks because we did get
- 6 some information I understand that's very good in
- 7 regards to supplying the police on who the culprit is.
- Now, I wasn't going to talk about anything.
- 9 But what we're doing in the neighborhoods because a lot
- of people are really thrilled to see the 300 back in
- 11 the neighborhood. And in that particular area is very,
- 12 very criminally infested because people feel as though
- 13 they can get away with a lot of things because the
- 14 Police don't response right away.
- But that young man that came in here just
- 16 now, I couldn't sit by and let him talk about you. I
- 17 mean, I talk about you because I know what I'm talking
- 18 about. All right. Brown, please, today is my
- 19 birthday. Give me a break. Come on now. I did let
- 20 him know that the Police -- and what was he doing?
- See, when you come here and complain to the
- 22 Commission about what you're not doing and what are you
- 23 doing. He's a minister, I understand. And he wanted
- 24 to know was I in with you? I said, no, I will be one
- of their supporters and I will be one of their critics.



- But let me ask you, what you have you done?
- 2 He stood up there and looked at me like a statue. If
- 3 he's a minister then why wasn't he out there with those
- 4 ministers last week, right? So we would like all the
- 5 ministers and their churches to get together and help
- 6 clean up this City.
- 7 My church did this past week Tabernacle
- 8 Baptist Church. They went from Dexter over to Linwood.
- 9 They cleaned up three or four blocks it was, and they
- 10 boarded up houses. And I thought this was a beautiful
- 11 project. If all the churches would do this in various
- 12 neighborhoods close to their churches we would have a
- 13 hell of a city that would be cleaned up.
- We don't have to depend on Bing and the rest
- of the politicians, who are not doing nothing the way
- 16 they should be doing. But the fact is we got to do for
- 17 ourselves. We can't continue to blame the Police
- Department, blame the Fire Department, which I'm very
- 19 upset with Mr. Hester, and what his actions was.
- What kind of officer is that you going to
- 21 curse at people? Come on. You don't do this. You
- 22 show respect. But I haven't got to him yet and you
- 23 know I will call Hester and his brother up and find out
- 24 what's going on with them.
- But I just want to let you know we are going



- 1 to be helping. I mean, as far as the 300 is concerned
- 2 we will be out there helping and we're going to do all
- 3 we can to try to rid this City of all these criminals
- 4 and try and help with the Police Department.
- Now, when you're wrong I will come before you
- 6 and tell you. But I do want you to know we do have
- 7 some bad Police Officers out here and we have to
- 8 chastise them and let them know don't bring their
- 9 reputation on the rest of the Officers out there. And
- 10 I just want to let you know I am 80 years old today.
- 11 The Lord has been good to me.
- 12 (Applause.)
- MS. SMITH: I have been in good health so
- 14 far. As you can see nothing wrong with me yet. Maybe
- 15 I talk too much. But the fact is I've been blessed.
- 16 Truly I am blessed and I thanked the Lord this morning
- 17 when I got up. And I said, I have moved over. In
- 18 other words, I've gone from seventies to the eighties.
- 19 And I don't know where the year's gone to.
- But anyway they gave me a good birthday gift
- 21 this morning and then plus the fact I was on the radio
- 22 all morning with people giving me congratulation. So I
- 23 got to brag today. So that's why I told you, Brown,
- 24 give me a break today. I'll be good next week. Thank
- 25 you so much. I appreciate it.



- 1 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Thank you, Ms. Smith. And
- 2 we certainly wish you a very, very, happy, happy
- 3 birthday and many, many more.
- 4 MS. SMITH: I hope so.
- 5 MR. MOORE: Good afternoon to the Chair, to
- 6 our Deputy Chief, Detroit's Finest, and to the
- 7 families. My name is Edward Moore. I am the liaison
- 8 of the Honorable Kwame Kenyatta our Detroit City
- 9 Councilman, bringing warm greetings from his office.
- 10 I'd like to say to the Chair, and to the
- 11 Chief, and to the families, we also from the Office of
- 12 Councilman Kenyatta we want to wish Mother Bernice a
- 13 happy birthday with many, many, many, more.
- 14 And also I'm one of the troopers that she
- 15 spoke about. As the Councilman said, as long as
- 16 Detroit 300 stays within the laws he supports Detroit
- 17 300. So I'm one of the originals. I'm one of the
- 18 troopers.
- And I want to say to the Commissioners and to
- the Chief and to our families, as long as Detroit 300
- 21 stays within the law, Councilman Kenyatta will stand
- 22 with them. Thank you.
- 23 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you. Good
- 24 afternoon.
- MR. STIDHAM: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair,



- 1 Deputy Chief, Mr. Secretary. Tom Stidham. Just as a
- 2 point of clarity I was looking at the agenda it says
- 3 under Old Business, Towing Hearing. I was just
- 4 wondering what is the nature of the hearing and the
- 5 purpose of the hearing?
- 6 CHAIRMAN WHITE: You normally have a few
- 7 questions.
- 8 MR. STIDHAM: Yeah, those are my only two
- 9 questions.
- 10 CHAIRMAN WHITE: The Old Business of Towing
- 11 Hearing was if there was to be deliberations on
- 12 anything that was discussed as we move in this process.
- 13 There's no Old Business as relates to the towing
- 14 hearing process at this time. So that's why it may
- 15 have been viewed as kind of glossed over. It's just
- 16 because there's no discussion at this time.
- 17 MR. STIDHAM: Is there anticipated to be
- 18 discussion next week?
- 19 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Soon. Again, we're in the
- 20 final phases of putting together all the comments that
- 21 were shared with the Commissioners. Unfortunately what
- you see here, we're unable to deliberate behind closed
- 23 doors.
- MR. STIDHAM: Sure.
- 25 CHAIRMAN WHITE: So it's not as if we don't



- 1 have it. The only time we have an opportunity to
- 2 discuss it is before you here. So once it has been
- 3 shared with each Commissioner individually and they
- 4 have an opportunity to look over it then we can come
- 5 here and have that discussion.
- So as soon as we're able and the
- 7 Commissioners feel comfortable and they're in a
- 8 position to discuss we'll do that in this body so we
- 9 can move that process forward. But I do anticipate
- 10 without being date specific that we should try to wrap
- 11 that up this coming month here.
- 12 MR. STIDHAM: In June?
- 13 CHAIRMAN WHITE: Yes.
- MR. STIDHAM: Thank you.
- 15 CHAIRMAN WHITE: You're welcome. Any other
- 16 communications? Any other communications? Any other
- 17 communication? Seeing none. Again, please be reminded
- 18 that the next Board of Police Commissioners Meeting
- 19 will be held Thursday, June 7th, 2012, at 3:00 p.m.,
- 20 and there's a location change to accommodate the Tigers
- 21 Game. We will meet at the Central District, at 7310
- 22 Woodward, Detroit, Michigan 48202.
- There's no further business before us at this
- 24 time. I bid you to have a wonderful afternoon.
- 25 (The hearing concluded at 4:04 p.m.)

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
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
