- 2 June 14, 2012
- 3 About 6:39 p.m.
- 4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Good afternoon,
- 5 ladies and gentlemen. Welcome to the Board of Police
- 6 Commissioners Meeting. We will get started with our
- 7 meeting for tonight. Good evening and welcome to the
- 8 Southwest District.
- 9 My name is Jerome Warfield. Serving with me
- 10 tonight is Commissioner Jessica Taylor, also sitting in
- 11 for the Chief of Police through the Chief's Office is
- 12 Deputy Chief Benjamin Lee. Sir, good to have you, and
- our Board Secretary Mr. George Anthony. We're going to
- 14 ask him at this time if he can introduce our staff for
- 15 you.
- 16 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
- 17 Present we have Ms. Celia Banks Washington seated in
- 18 the front row who is our Attorney to the Board,
- 19 Ms. Dalph Watson also seated in the front row who is
- 20 our Director of Police Personnel.
- 21 We have Mr. Robert Brown who is our Office
- 22 Manager, and Sergeant Alan Quinn who is recording our
- 23 proceedings, and Ms. Elizabeth Koller from Hanson Court
- 24 Reporting Service. That completes the introductions,
- 25 sir.



- 1 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
- 2 SECRETARY ANTHONY: If I may, I see two other
- 3 staff members coming in. Lieutenant Tim Leach who is
- 4 the Acting Chief Investigator from the Office of the
- 5 Chief Investigator, and Police Officer Kent Cooper who
- 6 will assist in recording the proceedings.
- 7 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
- 8 Mr. Anthony. We appreciate that. At this time I'm
- 9 going to, because we do not have a Chaplain, I'm going
- 10 to ask if we can just bow for a word of invocation
- 11 tonight. Can we bow our heads in prayer?
- Most Heavenly Father, we come tonight to say
- 13 thank you for all your glorious blessings. We say
- 14 thank you for you power and your strength that guides
- 15 us throughout our days. In this chaotic time in our
- 16 City we pray that you are still in control and we know
- 17 you're in control. And we ask, Lord, that you guide
- 18 not only the meeting tonight but you guide the affairs
- 19 of the City's.
- 20 Bless and protect our Mayor, our Governor,
- 21 and our City Council and elected officials. Bless and
- 22 protect our Chief of Police and all of the Officers who
- 23 make up this wonderful Department. We thank you for
- 24 the citizens that are here tonight who stay engage in
- 25 this process.



- 1 We ask, Lord, that you continue to bind us
- 2 together as one that we may stand as a community, a
- 3 community of people that love on each other and will do
- 4 the work that we need to to make sure all of us are
- 5 lifted.
- In Christ's name we pray. Amen.
- 7 AUDIENCE: Amen.
- 8 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: We do not at this
- 9 time have a quorum so we will not being making any
- 10 official voting unless a member shows up and we are
- 11 able to achieve a quorum. So at this time we'll just
- 12 be meeting as the committee of the whole.
- And as we do that, certainly I want to just
- 14 for those of you who this may be your first time here
- 15 want just to give you a little background on the Board
- of Police Commissioners, and let you know that the
- 17 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners was created by
- 18 Charter on July the 1st, 1974.
- We are a five member board that's appointed
- 20 by the Mayor and confirmed by the Detroit City Council.
- 21 Commissioners serve a five-year term and may not serve
- 22 more than five years consecutively. We meet once a
- 23 week 52 weeks out of the year. All meeting are open to
- 24 the public. Our duties are to establish the policies,
- 25 the rules, and the regulations in accordance and in



- 1 consultation with the Chief of Police and the approval
- 2 of the Mayor.
- 3 It is also our responsibility to review and
- 4 to approve the department budget, to review and approve
- 5 the departmental promotions, and to receive and resolve
- 6 all complaints concerning the operations of the Detroit
- 7 Police Department.
- 8 We are the final authority to impose and/or
- 9 review discipline of the Police Department employees.
- 10 Our job is also to appoint Civilian Personnel Director
- 11 and prepare an annual report for the Department
- 12 regarding it's activities for the public, for the
- 13 Mayor, and for the City Council.
- Our staff is made up of an Executive
- 15 Secretary who you already heard from this afternoon who
- 16 serves as Secretary to the Board and attends all of the
- 17 Board meetings, Chief Investigator, and additional
- 18 Investigators as needed, other staff as necessary are
- 19 also provided for the support of the Board.
- The Police Commission itself our main
- 21 function is a liaison between the citizens of the City
- of Detroit and the Detroit Police Department.
- 23 Ultimately what all that means is we're here to serve
- 24 you and to make sure that your experience as relates to
- 25 law enforcement in this community is optimal.



- 1 Having said that, I will go over to Deputy
- 2 Chief Lee to see if there's a report from him at this
- 3 time.
- D.C. LEE: Yes, there is report from the
- 5 Southwestern District, and Inspector Leslie Montgomery
- 6 will becoming forward and his staff, as well.
- 7 INSPECTOR MONTGOMERY: Good evening.
- 8 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Good evening, sir.
- 9 INSPECTOR MONTGOMERY: I'm Inspector Leslie
- 10 Montgomery, and on behalf of our Commander who had a
- 11 death in his family and Inspector Brown who had to take
- 12 a class today, I'm representing the Southwestern
- 13 District and I give my greetings on behalf also of the
- 14 proud men and women of the Southwestern District.
- The Southwestern District encompasses 24.9
- 16 square miles, and its primary office is located here at
- 17 4700 West Fort. It's bounded by Fenkell Avenue from
- 18 Livernois to Greenfield to Tireman on the northern
- 19 section. And it's bounded by the south by Wyoming and
- 20 Western, boarding the City of Dearborn, to Fisher
- 21 Freeway and Campbell boarding the city of River Rouge,
- 22 and the Lodge to the Detroit River.
- The population of Southwestern District is
- 24 190,000, with sixteen Detroit Public Schools which
- 25 include three public high schools Southwestern,



- 1 Western, and Brightmore Vocational. There are
- 2 approximately 400 churches and over 500 businesses.
- 3 Here are some of the initiatives that we have
- 4 undertaken at the Southwest District to improve the
- 5 quality of lives of the citizens in our district. We
- 6 had a prostitution sting that started in January 2012
- 7 and it's continuing.
- 8 The Southwestern District Operations Officers
- 9 partnered with Homeland Security Officials in
- 10 Washington in an investigation that has identified key
- 11 suspects involved in a muti-jurisdictional prostitution
- 12 ring with ties in Southwestern District.
- This investigation is ongoing and the
- 14 Detectives have gathered significant intelligence that
- 15 is expected to lead to dozens of arrests. Firearms
- 16 investigation started in March 2012 and are continuing.
- 17 The Southwestern District Special Operations Officers
- 18 had partnered with Homeland Security Officials
- 19 gathering intelligence relative to illegal firearms
- 20 being sold in the Southwestern District area. Several
- 21 key arrests were made and a list of indictments are
- 22 underway. The investigations are also ongoing.
- Robbery investigations from April and May.
- 24 The Southwestern District Officers have identified and
- 25 arrested a crew of robbery suspects who are responsible



- 1 for several carjacking crimes from West Warren and
- 2 Michigan area. Since the arrest of suspects involved
- 3 in these crimes the District has realized a reduction
- 4 in total robberies armed and unarmed.
- 5 Southwestern District Officers are continuing
- 6 to gather intelligence as it relates to robbery
- 7 patterns and are currently assisted by Crime Stoppers
- 8 in an attempt to locate the targeted subjects.
- 9 Let me just pause for a moment. I can
- 10 continue with all the details or hit the highlights?
- 11 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Either way, whatever
- 12 you want to do. We can ask questions afterward.
- 13 INSPECTOR MONTGOMERY: Okay. Patrol results
- 14 in Southwestern District from January 2012 until the
- 15 second week of 2012 May. Southwestern District Patrol
- 16 Officers answer thousands of calls of services in
- 17 Southwestern District while providing police presence,
- 18 enforcement, actions, and preserving order.
- 19 The following is a breakdown of activities
- 20 from January 1st until the second week of July. We've
- 21 issued 7,676 ordinance violations. We have
- investigated 22,574 people, 7,874 autos were
- investigated, 719 cars were impounded, 1,104 people
- 24 were arrested, and 148 juveniles.
- 25 Southwestern District Community Policing



- 1 Units continue to focus on initiatives to foster
- 2 relationships between the Police and the community. A
- 3 synopsis of some of our efforts are the Safe
- 4 Neighborhoods in Southwestern District.
- 5 During April and May and continuing through
- 6 the upcoming months Community Relations Officers are
- 7 working closely with the City of Detroit Building and
- 8 Safety Property Management Division to help identify
- 9 vacant and dilapidated homes and buildings within our
- 10 community for securing and demolition.
- The project began in Sector 7 bounded by
- 12 Outer Drive, Fort Street, Vassar, and West Fisher
- 13 Freeway. So far 263 abandoned and dilapidated
- 14 locations were identified by the Southwestern Officers
- 15 for securing and subsequent demolition by the Building
- 16 and Safety Department.
- We've had Career Day, anti-bullying seminars.
- 18 Southwestern District partnered with the Local School
- 19 Community Organization, the LSCO, and hosted multiple
- 20 anti-bullying seminars with hundreds of students
- 21 throughout the southwest area with very positive
- 22 results.
- The project began at Earhart Elementary,
- 24 Detroit and middle schools and Caesar Chaves Schools
- 25 and more than 500 students received our Officers on



- 1 Career Day and expressed great interest in a future
- 2 career in law enforcement.
- 3 And then there's National Police Week.
- 4 Through the month of May the Southwestern District
- 5 celebrated a National Police Week. Among the
- 6 festivities were toy giveaways to local children.
- 7 Southwestern District gave away over a thousand toys to
- 8 local area children and served refreshments as families
- 9 were welcomed into our facility.
- The week continued with the district honoring
- 11 our local seniors. We invited our seniors to select
- 12 activities that they would enjoy. They selected a day
- 13 at the movies. Officers accompanied the seniors on a
- 14 movie outing.
- The week concluded with Officer Appreciation
- 16 Day and meals were prepared for Police Officers
- 17 assigned to the Southwestern District to show their
- 18 appreciation. They were truly appreciated. That
- 19 concludes my report.
- 20 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, Inspector
- 21 Montgomery. Commissioner Taylor, do you have any
- 22 questions?
- 23 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I just have one. You
- 24 said you identified 263 homes that needed securing?
- 25 INSPECTOR MONTGOMERY: That were dilapidated



- 1 and should be demolished.
- 2 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: How many have you
- 3 demolished or secured so far?
- 4 INSPECTOR MONTGOMERY I don't think I have
- 5 that information right now. We let Building and Safety
- 6 know and they'll take care of the demolitions.
- 7 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: All right. That's it.
- 8 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I want to go back and
- 9 look at, Inspector Montgomery, the prostitution sting.
- 10 I have a couple questions with that. Are you working
- 11 with the drug court at all as relates to specifically
- 12 to Judge Moore? Is she involved in that effort?
- 13 INSPECTOR MONTGOMERY: I don't have that
- 14 information now.
- 15 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Okay. Secondly, you
- 16 had mentioned that there were a number of intelligence
- 17 that has been gathered. Do you know approximately how
- 18 many actual arrests has taken place?
- 19 INSPECTOR MONTGOMERY: I didn't capture that
- 20 information for this report.
- 21 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: How long has the
- 22 sting been going on?
- 23 INSPECTOR MONTGOMERY: Prostitution?
- 24 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yes.
- 25 INSPECTOR MONTGOMERY: That started in



- 1 January.
- 2 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All right. If you
- 3 could get back to us how many have been arrested?
- 4 INSPECTOR MONTGOMERY: Okay.
- 5 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Also, I don't know if
- 6 this is applicable or not and maybe depending on who's
- 7 involved in this jurisdictional task force, you might
- 8 want to reach out to Judge Moore only because she has
- 9 an outstanding program where she take those individuals
- 10 who unfortunately believe they can't earn their living
- 11 off the street and place them into or give them the
- 12 option of placing them into training or doing a long
- jail sentence where they can be rehabilitated and even
- 14 some education, complete their education as well.
- 15 I think it's a great incentive. I know that
- it has worked extremely well in other areas of the City
- 17 where prostitution stings are going on. I think it's
- 18 called Great Start Program, and she works with Wayne
- 19 County as well, but it's the Great Start Program.
- INSPECTOR MONTGOMERY: Okay. Wonderful. We
- 21 will do that, sir.
- 22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, Inspector
- 23 Montgomery. Chief?
- D.C. LEE: I have nothing.
- 25 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.



1	INSPECTOR MONTGOMERY: Thank you.
2	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: At this time we want
3	to recognize the outstanding accomplishments of those
4	heros in our community who go over and beyond the call
5	of duty and certainly without them being engaged in and
6	being involved it will be hard for even us to sit where
7	we are, but it would be hard for our community to
8	maintain just the cohesiveness that we do have.
9	So it gives us a great deal of honor and
10	pleasure tonight to recognize Mr. Arthur Simons, and
11	we're going to ask if he can come to the podium at this
12	time and Commission Taylor will make the presentation.
13	Give him a hand.
14	(Applause.)
15	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Resolution honoring
16	Mr. Arthur Simons. Whereas Mr. Arthur Simons is a
17	proud, lifelong resident of the City of Detroit who
18	resides within the Southwestern District. Mr. Simons
19	is member of Detroit Unity Temple where his life is
20	enriched with Christian teaching, and Mr. Simons is an
21	active member of the Southwestern District Police
22	Community Relations Council where he has served as a
23	consultant and currently as vice president adjunct.
24	He has been an active member of the
25	Barton-McFarland Neighborhood Association since 1966.



- 1 In 1968 Mr. Simons was the first African American to
- 2 serve as president for the Barton-McFarland
- 3 Association. Mr. Simons dedication was exemplified as
- 4 he assisted in organizing the first civilian patrol in
- 5 the Barton-McFarland area, which still exists today.
- In 1973, Mr. Simons was elected to the office
- 7 of vice president under the leadership of Joseph Walker
- 8 Williams. Mr. Simons has held several offices during
- 9 his membership and presently continues his service as a
- 10 advisor to the Board of Directors. And whereas
- 11 Mr. Simons has always been involved in community
- 12 relations and dedicated to improve neighborhood safety
- 13 and quality of life.
- During former Mayor Dennis Archer's
- 15 Administration, Mr. Simons served on the Cluster Board
- 16 Committee. The purpose of this committee was to
- 17 research and determine the needs of specific areas. In
- 18 1982 he was appointed by the City Council to serve on
- 19 the Planning Commission where he served as chairperson
- 20 for twelve years and remains a member today.
- In 2007, Mr. Simons was also appointed by
- 22 City Council to the Board of Zoning Appeals where he
- 23 served as vice president in 2011. And whereas a loyal
- 24 public servant, Mr. Simons' community devotion has been
- 25 consistent throughout his lifetime.



- 1 As an employee with Stroh's Brewery,
- 2 Mr. Simons was honored for arranging annual Christmas
- 3 parties for mentally impaired children in the Detroit
- 4 Public Schools.
- 5 In 1983, Mr. Simons receive the Minority
- 6 Achiever in Industry Award from the YMCA of Detroit.
- 7 In 1991, Mr. Simons received the Presidential Award for
- 8 his devoted service to Barton-McFarland Neighborhood
- 9 Association. And in 2002 received an award for
- 10 32 years of devoted community service.
- His life's combined philosophy is in order to
- 12 make any one organization successful you must have
- 13 respect, teamwork, and time management, and never worry
- 14 because worry is the interest paid on a debt that never
- 15 comes due.
- Now, therefore, be it resolved that the
- 17 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking on
- 18 behalf of the citizens of the City of Detroit and the
- 19 Detroit Police Department acknowledge the dedication
- 20 and persistence of Mr. Arthur Simons.
- 21 His highly displayed commitment to community
- 22 service and his ability to build sustainable community
- 23 partnerships merit our highest regards. We thank you
- 24 and congratulate you, Mr. Arthur Simons.
- 25 (Applause.)



- 1 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Can you come down,
- 2 Mr. Simons? Mr. Simons, if you can stay right there.
- D.C. LEE: On behalf of the Chief of Police,
- 4 I have another Certificate of Recognition for you. And
- 5 it reads, the Detroit Police Department Certificate of
- 6 Recognition to Mr. Arthur Simons, resident of the City
- 7 of Detroit, in appreciation for the following
- 8 outstanding service and cooperation for your
- 9 involvement in community and services to the City of
- 10 Detroit for supporting our efforts in the community
- 11 demonstrate spirit and commitment that is truly worthy
- of recognition. Dated June 14th, 2012, on behalf of
- 13 the Chief of Police, signed Ralph L. Godbee, Junior.
- 14 Thank you.
- 15 (Applause and photos were taken.)
- 16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: We're not done yet.
- 17 INSPECTOR MONTGOMERY: Also on behalf of the
- 18 City Council, I'd like to offer and give you the Spirit
- 19 of Detroit Award presented herewith as an expression of
- 20 the gratitude and esteem by the City of Detroit to
- 21 Mr. Arthur Simons in recognition of exceptional
- 22 achievement, outstanding leadership, and dedication to
- 23 improve quality of life. Signed by the entire City
- 24 Council.
- 25 (Applause.)



- 1 INSPECTOR MONTGOMERY: At this time here are
- 2 some words from Mr. Simons.
- 3 MR. SIMONS: Let me first thank the Board of
- 4 Commissions for recognizing me, as all the services.
- 5 But it's not about me. It's about the community. I
- 6 have worked in the community, my own community for over
- 7 40 years. And I've tried to do my best to make the
- 8 community more livable, more nice. But I didn't do all
- 9 this by myself. I had a partner. My wife over
- 10 50 years.
- 11 (Applause.)
- 12 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Would you come down,
- 13 please? Thank you.
- MR. SIMONS: Really, we have worked in the
- 15 community for all these years. And I think that the
- 16 City without organized groups is a lost city. I always
- 17 told the people that I met that policemen are your
- 18 friend, not your enemy. And I have been trying to
- 19 demonstrate that all those years, and I appreciate this
- 20 honor. But it's not about me. It's about the
- 21 community. And I thank you so very much.
- 22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
- 23 (Applause.)
- 24 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Fifty-seven years
- 25 they've been married. That's wonderful. Amen. We



- 1 typically vote to make sure that the resolution becomes
- 2 one in our permanent archives and next week or the very
- 3 next meeting we have a quorum we will definitely vote
- 4 the resolution into our permanent archives.
- 5 At this time there is a Police Directive that
- 6 we needed to be updated on.
- 7 INSPECTOR BLISS: Good evening,
- 8 Commissioners.
- 9 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Good evening.
- 10 LIEUTENANT BLISS: And Deputy Chief Lee.
- 11 There's actually two today.
- 12 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Please state your
- 13 name for the record.
- 14 LIEUTENANT BLISS: Lieutenant Bliss, Planning
- 15 and Accreditation. At Planning and Accreditation we
- 16 develop policy and procedures for the Detroit Police
- 17 Department.
- I have two, sir, for your review and
- 19 approval. The first one, Directive 103.5 Secondary
- 20 Employment. This is a brand-new directive that's going
- 21 to be included in our manual. It's based upon a
- 22 special order that came out in 2010.
- 23 Secondary Employment is relatively new. It's
- 24 a new type of employment that's different from outside
- 25 employment that we currently had prior to this. In



- 1 Secondary Employment you're in full uniform, fully
- 2 marked scout car, and you work for an employer.
- 3 The difference between this also from outside
- 4 employment is that for outside employment there is no
- 5 police stipulation or police powers whatsoever.
- 6 Included in this Directive is basically the
- 7 procedure on how to apply for Secondary Employment,
- 8 what employers can apply to have Police Officers work
- 9 for them, and certain guidelines for the Officers in
- 10 order to keep them safe during their Secondary
- 11 Employment activity.
- 12 The next Directive is Detainee Registration,
- 13 Directive Number 305.2. Basically it's an internal
- 14 Directive that has to deal with our detention
- 15 management. This past winter we got rid of a form
- 16 called the arrest ticket. Anyone that is brought into
- our lockups an arrest ticket has to be generated.
- 18 Well, we have a new form. It's called the
- 19 Detainee Intake Sheet. It replaced that. This
- 20 Directive basically is an outline and a guideline for
- 21 filling out that form. It's only for Department
- 22 members, basically our Prisoner Detention Officers.
- So we had to scrap and completely redo the
- 24 Directive to make up this new form. I have copies of
- 25 both Directives in the back. I've also notified the



- 1 City website to have them posted for any comments and
- 2 each of the Districts have also been notified as to
- 3 both policies and to have them available for any
- 4 comments. Any questions, sir?
- 5 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Commissioner Taylor.
- 6 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I don't have any.
- 7 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Just a couple,
- 8 Lieutenant. On the Secondary Employment Directive that
- 9 particular Directive is that policy pretty much the
- 10 same as it was when we reviewed it several months ago?
- 11 LIEUTENANT BLISS: Yes.
- 12 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: And then secondly, I
- did not notice in the initial Directive, nor as I just
- 14 thumbed through this one, I did not see where the
- 15 entity was responsible whether it was the Police
- 16 Officer going to that site or the Department generally
- in making sure there's pamphlets and information at the
- 18 establishment in case a uniformed Police Officer has an
- 19 encounter with a citizen where a report needs to be
- 20 made on behalf of that citizen.
- 21 Who provides that information on behalf of
- the Police to the business?
- 23 LIEUTENANT BLISS: Now, are you referring to
- 24 if there's a citizen complaint?
- 25 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yes, sir.



- 1 LIEUTENANT BLISS: All Officers are required
- 2 to carry with them the pamphlets for the proper
- 3 procedure of citizens complaints and also contact forms
- 4 that can be given to individuals once they give them
- 5 the pamphlet. It's something that was mandated through
- 6 our consent decree and each Officer has those.
- 7 Regardless if they're on Secondary Employment or if
- 8 they're on duty they have to have them on them.
- 9 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: And I guess my
- 10 followup question, thank you, Lieutenant, is does the
- 11 establishment owners are they aware of that? Because
- 12 if I am, you know, a citizen and I'm in an
- 13 establishment and if there's an interaction with an
- 14 Officer that I believe may be improper would the
- 15 establishment owner know to ask the Officer for the
- 16 complaint?
- 17 LIEUTENANT BLISS: That's something out of
- 18 the Office of Secondary Employment. It's something I
- 19 can check into to make sure when the employer applies
- 20 that they can forward that information to them.
- 21 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: That would be great.
- 22 And then on Detainee Registration, I remember vaguely
- 23 why you switched forms but for the public's sake can
- 24 you talk about why we needed to change the forms?
- 25 LIEUTENANT BLISS: Well, basically the arrest



- 1 ticket it's just not applicable to what we do now. The
- 2 Detainee Intake Sheet actually expedites the process
- 3 and allows us to put multiple charges on the form.
- 4 Years ago we had issues where you could lose
- 5 an arrest ticket and then a person would be discharged
- 6 and find out, oh, you have another charge. This
- 7 actually eliminates all that. It's actually easier and
- 8 a faster way to process individuals.
- 9 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, Lieutenant
- 10 Bliss.
- 11 LIEUTENANT BLISS: Thank you.
- 12 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: At this time we will
- 13 move to Old Business. And I'm going to ask if the
- 14 Board's Attorney, Attorney Celia Banks Washington will
- 15 come to the podium at this time and read some
- 16 communication that we just received in our office this
- 17 afternoon.
- 18 ATTORNEY WASHINGTON: Thank you,
- 19 Commissioner. Celia Washington, Attorney for the Board
- 20 of Police Commissioners. How much background or just
- 21 simply read?
- 22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Whatever you feel is
- 23 appropriate.
- 24 ATTORNEY WASHINGTON: Last week there was an
- 25 issue that was raised, there was no motion made, there



- 1 was no motion carried, with regard to five particular
- 2 towers and some action that was proposed to be taken
- 3 and this Board asked for my recommendations which I'm
- 4 offering this week in terms of what the steps should
- 5 be.
- 6 However, all those discussions have been put
- 7 on hold because we received this afternoon an ex-parte
- 8 temporary restraining order filed in Wayne County
- 9 Circuit Court, Plaintiffs, Detroit Auto Recovery, AVA
- 10 Towing, J&C Towing, City Auto Storage, and Independent
- 11 Brokers, LLC, against the City of Detroit and the
- 12 Detroit Police Department and the Board of Police
- 13 Commissioners.
- In short, the judge ordered that the City of
- 15 Detroit, the Police Department and the Board of Police
- 16 Commissioners and anyone acting on their behalf are
- immediately enjoined and restrained directly and
- indirectly from terminating plaintiff's towing permits
- 19 as described in the verified complaint, and from
- 20 directly or indirectly prohibiting plaintiff's from
- 21 participating in their applicable tower rotations or
- 22 otherwise enacting upon or enforcing the BPC, Board of
- 23 Police Commissioner motion approved on June 7th, 2012,
- 24 until further order of this court.
- 25 It is further ordered that the defendants



- 1 shall show cause before this court on June 27th at 2:00
- 2 p.m., or soon thereafter as counsel may be heard.
- 3 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you. Attorney,
- 4 just for the record, I just want to make sure it's part
- 5 of our record in the meeting that's mentioned in that
- 6 particular order that there was no motion approved,
- 7 that motion was actually defeated, so there is no
- 8 motion approved.
- 9 However, what we will do on the 28th of this
- 10 month we will have a hearing on that subject and I will
- 11 ask that all parties be notified of the hearing and
- 12 particulars regarding that hearing.
- 13 ATTORNEY WASHINGTON: Yes, sir. You said
- 14 June 28th?
- 15 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yes. Thank you. At
- 16 this time it's time for announcements. We want to
- 17 announce that our next meeting will be on June 21st,
- 18 2012, 3:00 p.m. at 1300 Beaubien, Room 328A. We look
- 19 forward to seeing you there if you can make it.
- 20 Also we want to apprise you of the fact that
- 21 there will be a police seized auction of automobiles
- 22 and jewelry and furniture, tools, and electronics, and
- 23 a whole bunch of other goodies. It will take place on
- July the 7th, 2012. All bids start at \$5.00. The
- location of the auction is 12660 Greenfield Road,



- 1 Detroit, Michigan, registration starts at 10:00 a.m.,
- 2 and the auction starts at 11:00 a.m. If you want more
- 3 information you can go to www.theauctionblock.com,
- 4 again www.theauctionblock.com, or you can call (313)
- 5 659-3376, again (313) 659-3376.
- At this time we want to open our floor for
- 7 communications. If your are interested in addressing
- 8 the Board of Police Commissioners you may come to the
- 9 podium right here in the center aisle, and for the
- 10 record if you give us your name and spell it out for us
- 11 so we can make sure that we have it on file directly
- 12 and if you will limit yourself to just two minutes in
- 13 your comments so we can get as many people's comments
- 14 as we can.
- Our timekeeper is Mr. Robert Brown. Robert,
- 16 will you hold up your hand and sign. Good evening,
- 17 ma'am, welcome to the Board of Police Commissioners
- 18 Meeting.
- MS. COCHRAN: My name is China, C-H-I-N-A,
- 20 Cochran, C-O-C-H-R-A-N. I'm here because on Saturday,
- June 9th, my home on Detroit's westside was raided for
- 22 drugs. I and my family along with friends were in the
- 23 home. My parents, my grandfather, they all have heart
- 24 disease. We did not know who was in our home. We were
- 25 not told. We were handcuffed. We were told to shut



- 1 up.
- I asked could I give them my name? I don't
- 3 know who you are. I said, please tell me why you're
- 4 here? They said, you know why we're here. You are
- 5 selling drugs in your house. I am not selling drugs in
- 6 my house.
- 7 Finally after the whole family was -- my
- 8 father has to take nitroglycerin. He was not given his
- 9 nitroglycerin when I said please give my dad
- 10 nitroglycerin. He ended up having a heart attack. He
- 11 was in the hospital for the weekend. He also had
- 12 several panic attacks since Saturday and he has been
- 13 put on Xanax.
- The kids in our home, my brother's kids, they
- 15 are having anxiety attacks. They're having nightmares.
- 16 They found no drugs in my home. I am very upset. I
- don't know who they were. They said I have a warrant.
- 18 They said they were from the Police Department and they
- 19 are from Narcotics.
- I have nobody to contact. I went to the 12th
- 21 Precinct around the corner from my home. They said
- 22 that job is routine. I really need answers. I'm a
- 23 public servant. I work for City Council. I work for
- 24 the Wayne County Commission. I run a program for kids.
- This has affected my life. I haven't been to



- 1 work all week. I don't know what's going on and I need
- 2 answers. They found nothing in my home. They said the
- 3 community knows it's a drug house. It is not. They
- 4 didn't find anything. And I need someone to tell me to
- 5 give me answers. This is not my life. I am college
- 6 educated. I am getting a Ph.D. I do not deserve to be
- 7 treated like this.
- 8 How could they come in my house and tell me
- 9 that we are running a drug house? They found nothing.
- 10 And I don't have anyone to contact.
- 11 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Well, Ms. Cochran,
- 12 certainly my heart goes out to you. I'm so sorry that
- 13 you and your family went through this ordeal. You say
- 14 you want answers and I believe we can help you with
- 15 that tonight. We certainly can help you with that
- 16 tonight.
- 17 There are two individuals that I want you to
- 18 speak with. First, is our Chief Investigator, our
- 19 Acting Chief Investigator, Lieutenant Leach who's
- 20 sitting right here. Would you raise your hand? He
- 21 will get with you immediately. And then Deputy Chief,
- do you have someone, as well?
- D.C. LEE: Yes, I do. D.C. Paul Welles. Did
- 24 he step out? He'll talk to you in the back.
- 25 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Can you raise your



- 1 hand, sir, so she can see you? So if you can see both
- of them. Again, our apologizes for the traumatic
- 3 experience to your family.
- 4 MS. MORRIS: My name is Tijuana Morris. I
- 5 have an investigator service, Fight For Your Rights
- 6 Investigation. And as everyone knows I do the
- 7 investigations for Detroit Coalition Against Police
- 8 Brutality.
- 9 I am as the majority knows a retired police
- 10 officer. I have talked to Attorney Washington about
- 11 this ongoing situation that we have talked about in the
- 12 past and hopefully we will come to some kind of
- 13 understanding soon.
- 14 But also this is kind of emotional for me
- 15 because I have been in the hospital, and I have to,
- 16 they're going to do an operation. I'm going to have
- 17 the operation done on my spine.
- Police Officers are rated at a high level and
- 19 that's the way it should be. That's the way I expect
- 20 it. That's the way I was when I was working. When you
- 21 hit your target you hit your target, and you know your
- 22 target. Mistakes when they happened it's hard for
- 23 people to know unless they have been through it to
- 24 understand situations.
- This family came to us and I looked at the



- 1 warrant and there are some questions that need to be
- 2 answered. She didn't explain that they were wearing
- 3 masks. They're not use to what had happened. They
- 4 been living in the home for three years. They don't
- 5 know who, what, when, where? They just asking for
- 6 answers. It is really unnerving for the whole family.
- 7 And on a better note, I'd like to say Happy
- 8 Father's Day. That goes out to the woman because some
- 9 women have to be the breadwinner.
- I appreciate this Body, and I expect and
- 11 believe that this Body will continue to do the work
- 12 they do and in a better fashion. Thank you.
- 13 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
- 14 Ms. Morris. It's always good to see you and certainly
- our prayers go out to you for a complete and total
- 16 healing for you for the procedure that you are about to
- 17 undergo. Thank you, ma'am.
- 18 MR. WELBORNE: Good afternoon, Commissioners,
- 19 Deputy Chief. My name is Bill Welborne,
- 20 W-E-L-B-O-R-N-E. I'm president of the Citywide Police
- 21 Community Relations. Recently I have been on a lot of
- 22 truancy runs and curfew runs. And what I would like to
- 23 know who follows up on these kids that are picked up on
- 24 truancy runs?
- I had one kid that I interviewed on one of



- 1 the runs from 9th Precinct. He had asked me, he said
- 2 he was interested in boxing. So I told him I would get
- 3 Tommy Hearns to talk to him. I called his house. I
- 4 found out he had got back in trouble again and he was
- 5 locked up.
- Is there any followup on this or do Detroit
- 7 Police Department have followup on this to find out
- 8 what's going on with these kids? Because some of these
- 9 kids they go through hell, I've got to admit. Talking
- 10 to some of these kids and checking back with them they
- 11 go through a lot. I just wanted to find out who checks
- 12 up on them?
- 13 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yes, sir. Thank you,
- 14 Mr. Welborne, it's always good to see you, as well.
- 15 Deputy Chief, is that a DPD function or?
- D.C. LEE: It's probably a DPS as well as
- 17 youth officers. I know they have some involvement with
- 18 the truancies that they arrest. But once they're
- 19 referred to whatever department we feel they need to
- 20 come from then we pretty much we don't do any followup.
- 21 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
- MS. PANNELL: Hi, Sharon Pannell. I just
- 23 have a question about firecrackers. Are they legal now
- 24 and what time can they pop them or is it a time for
- 25 them to stop popping them? You know, in my



- 1 neighborhood they start at 10:00 at night, start
- 2 popping the darn firecrackers. Nobody wants to hear
- 3 that at 10:00 at night.
- 4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Deputy Chief?
- 5 D.C. LEE: Through the Chair. The fireworks
- 6 are legal now and we would probably treat the end of
- 7 it, if there's a noise function of it as a noise
- 8 complaint as a opposed to illegal fireworks after a
- 9 certain time. But it should be quiet and you're
- 10 neighborhood should be quiet, and if it's not --
- MS. PANNELL: So I can make a complaint after
- 12 12:00 if they're still popping them?
- D.C. LEE: I would get ahold of that
- 14 Commander, who I'm sure you know and give his office a
- 15 call.
- 16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's almost similar
- 17 to if they were blasting loud music during that same
- 18 time. It would be like a noise violation.
- MS. PANNELL: Thank you.
- MR. SCOTT: Ron Scott, R-O-N S-C-O-T-T. I
- 21 wasn't going to say anything but I wanted to raise the
- 22 question about the report that the Lieutenant gave in
- 23 relationship to Secondary Employment. I'd like to find
- 24 out do individuals find out about the provisions with
- 25 Secondary Employment and are Officers allowed to



- 1 solicit to gain Secondary Employment?
- 2 The reason I ask that is because perhaps the
- 3 citizens might have in error, but there was a question
- 4 about a community group on the southeast side of the
- 5 City of Detroit where this question was raised. The
- 6 suggestion was made since the citizens were complaining
- 7 about the absence of police presence that they might
- 8 want to seek Secondary Employment.
- 9 The questions remains, I did not get clarity
- 10 as to whether or not the Officers in attendance had
- 11 suggested that to them or whether or not they came up
- 12 with that idea themselves. So I'd like to find out
- 13 what the soliciting process is?
- 14 The reason being is that we were always
- 15 concerned about the challenges between public service
- and private enterprise and the Secondary Employment in
- 17 terms of classes of groups of people who might get
- 18 service where others might not.
- 19 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Scott.
- 20 Do you want to handle that, and then I can chime in?
- D.C. LEE: Though the Chair. We don't
- 22 actively solicit clients for the Secondary Employment
- 23 Program. What we do is advise community groups that
- 24 it's available. There's several community groups.
- 25 East Jefferson, they are using the Secondary Employment



- 1 and they're trying to expand it. But we don't just go
- 2 out and actively solicit.
- 3 MR. SCOTT: Yeah, that was one of the groups
- 4 that I happened to find out about and I was just
- 5 concerned that the solicitation not be aggressive, that
- 6 it's an option of many options that people might want
- 7 to use.
- D.C. LEE: I actually attended one of their
- 9 meetings when they were announcing, the day they were
- 10 announcing it and I was invited to attend. They knew
- 11 more about Secondary Employment than I did.
- 12 MR. SCOTT: Right. Okay. Thank you.
- 13 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
- 14 MR. ADAMS: For the record, my name is Dean
- 15 Adams. I was at the meeting just last Thursday. I did
- 16 get a chance to talk to Lieutenant Leach. I did speak
- 17 to Inspector Houser today.
- The next day I was called to the prosecutor's
- 19 office and I was being questioned thinking I'm going to
- 20 sign a warrant when the individual is able to do a dual
- 21 warrant because the Investigator from the Police
- 22 Department and the first person on site didn't do what
- 23 I feel that their job was where if there's an
- 24 investigation you immediately ask everybody a question.
- 25 Everybody.



- 1 Well, the individual whom I'm speaking of
- 2 what he did was he manipulated the system. The
- 3 Sergeant did not ask my manager or the bartenders who
- 4 were on the floor when the incident happened, one being
- 5 a teacher, and the other being a student, which are
- 6 very credible. So now I'm being accused of a felony
- 7 with a firearm when I didn't do it.
- 8 And as I said last week a PPO is on me now
- 9 when I can't after carrying a weapon for almost twenty
- 10 years, being in public safety DPS for almost twenty
- 11 years, never breaking the law. I'm 54 years old. I
- 12 can't do the Police Department's job for them when I
- 13 know how to do the job for them because I understand
- 14 the investigation. I did that.
- I need the Police Department whoever deals
- 16 with the Investigators or whoever deals with people who
- 17 showed up on the scene to do something about this
- 18 again. I can't take the fall because DPD didn't do
- 19 their job. I can't do that. I won't do that.
- 20 Somebody here's got to do something.
- 21 Again, I did speak to Inspector Houser just
- 22 now. She said she's going to check. But my thing, I'm
- 23 not going to go away. I'm not going to be accused of
- 24 something that I didn't do. I'm too old to do it at
- 25 this point. Okay. And I understand weapons what you



- 1 do with weapons, if I pull my weapon I'm shooting you.
- 2 It's simple with me. Okay.
- I think of the system of where, why, and how,
- 4 which we're taught day one in the Police Academy, which
- 5 I went to in 1980. They've lost sight of, I guess the
- 6 younger Officers have lost sight of what that is.
- Again, I can't be the fall guy on this whole
- 8 piece. And it's a dual piece because this guy is
- 9 saying, no, he did it to me. And then they go to key
- 10 witnesses to ask them a question, what happened, when,
- 11 where, do you know anything about this? That's all I'm
- 12 saying. Somebody got to do something. Okay.
- 13 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Adams.
- MR. ADAMS: Thank you.
- 15 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: We will still
- 16 continue to look into your concerns. As you've said
- 17 you've already spoken to Inspector Houser who is just
- 18 an excellent example within our Department of people
- 19 who do the things right, and you also, of course, spoke
- 20 with Investigator Leach.
- So if there are other things that need to be
- done, certainly continue to say in contact with them
- 23 and I quarantee they will. But if you ever feel like
- 24 you're not getting movement please always let us know.
- 25 We're always available. We want to make sure that your
