- 4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Good evening. Welcome to
- 5 the Board of Police Commissioners meeting. My name is
- 6 Jerome Warfield, Chairman of the Board of Police
- 7 Commissioners. Serving with me today is the Vice
- 8 Chairperson of the Board of Commissioners, Jessica
- 9 Taylor, as well as Commissioner Donnell White.
- We're proud and pleased to have with us
- 11 tonight our Interim Chief of Police, Chief Chester
- 12 Logan. Sir, good to have you.
- 13 CHIEF LOGAN: Glad to be here.
- 14 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Also sitting at the table
- is our Board Secretary Mr. George Anthony. I'm going
- 16 to ask Mr. Anthony if he'll introduce our staff that's
- 17 present tonight.
- 18 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
- 19 For the record, George Anthony, Secretary to the Board.
- 20 We have Ms. Pamela Davis Drake seated in front, she's
- 21 our Chief Investigator, Ms. Loletha Porter Coleman, who
- 22 is our Personnel Director, Ms. Celia Banks Washington,
- 23 who is our Attorney to the Board, Mr. Robert Brown who
- 24 is our Officer Manager, we also have Officer Dan
- 25 Donakowski helping Sergeant Alan Quinn record our



- 1 proceedings, and Ms. Elizabeth Koller who is from
- 2 Hanson Court Reporting Service. That concludes the
- 3 introduction.
- 4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Anthony.
- 5 At this point I'm going to ask if Pastor Chaplain
- 6 Powell will come and lead us in our invocation?
- 7 PASTOR CHAPLAIN POWELL: Good evening, Board.
- 8 Let us look to the Lord. Lord God of Grace, in the
- 9 name of Jesus, we thank and praise you, Lord, for your
- 10 keeping power and your blessing power, Lord, for
- 11 blessing us, Lord God, to wake up today and to start us
- 12 on our way.
- Lord, as we come together and draw our minds
- 14 asking you, Lord, just to bless this Board, bless our
- 15 Chief. Look down upon our Mayor also, Lord, strengthen
- 16 him, give him, Lord God, all that he needs. Help us,
- 17 Lord God, to do your blessed will and help us, Lord
- 18 God, to love you and to love your people.
- 19 Lord, asking you just to bless our Officers,
- 20 Lord, as they do their jobs, Lord, on the streets
- 21 today. Look down upon us, Lord God, strength us.
- 22 Lord, let your blessing be upon us. Lord God, allow us
- 23 to do your will. Help us, Lord God, to serve you. We
- 24 thank you, Lord God. We praise you. We magnify your
- 25 name. In Jesus name, amen.



- 1 AUDIENCE: Amen.
- 2 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Chaplain, good
- 3 to see you. We're so happy to be here at the Boys and
- 4 Girls Club. And certainly we want to give thanks to
- 5 the director here at the Boys and Girls Club,
- 6 Miss Jackie Banks for her hospitality.
- 7 I don't know if she's here tonight. Is she
- 8 here, by chance? She stepped out. When she comes back
- 9 in let us know so we can acknowledge her and if she has
- 10 any words we certainly want to hear from her.
- 11 At this time I'm going to ask if Vice
- 12 Chairperson Commissioner Taylor will read the duties
- 13 and responsibilities of the Police Commission.
- 14 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Yes, sir. The duties
- 15 and responsibilities of the Board of Police
- 16 Commissioners was created by City Charter July 1st,
- 17 1974, composed of five members appointed by the Mayor,
- 18 confirmed by City Council. Commissioners serve five
- 19 year terms and may not serve more than five years
- 20 consecutively, meets once a week 52 weeks out of the
- 21 year. All meetings are open to the public.
- The duties include establishing policy,
- 23 rules, and regulations in consultation with the Chief
- 24 and approval of the Mayor, review and approve
- 25 Department budget, review and approve Department



- 1 promotions, receive and resolve complaints concerning
- 2 the operation of the Police Department. Final
- 3 authority to impose and/or review discipline of Police
- 4 Department employees, appoint Civilian Personnel
- 5 Director, prepares an annual report of Department
- 6 activities for the public, Mayor and City Council.
- 7 Staff includes Executive Secretary who serves
- 8 as the Secretary to the Board and attends all Board
- 9 meetings, Chief Investigator, and additional
- 10 Investigators, other staff as necessary to provide
- 11 support to the Board. The Police Commission considers
- 12 itself a liaison between the citizens of the City of
- 13 Detroit and the Detroit Police Department.
- 14 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Commissioner
- 15 Taylor. At this time I'll entertain a motion to
- approve the agenda for tonight's meeting?
- 17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So move.
- 18 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second.
- 19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved
- 20 and supported without discussion. All those in favor?
- 21 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed?
- 23 Motion carries. I'll entertain a motion to approve the
- 24 minutes from Thursday, November the 1st?
- 25 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So move.



- 1 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second.
- 2 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those in favor?
- 3 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed?
- 5 Motion carries. Chairperson's Report. First of all, I
- 6 want to say, good evening. Always good to be here in
- 7 the great Northwestern District, which is always near
- 8 and dear to me in my heart, so certainly good to see
- 9 the citizens here tonight.
- 10 Like some of you, I watched the Mayor's press
- 11 conference earlier today concerning a restructuring of
- 12 top management and other procedural and administrative
- 13 changes within the Department pending this Board's
- 14 approval.
- We agree with the Mayor that we need to do
- 16 all we can to make our Police Department more effective
- 17 and efficient in reducing crime. This Board wishes to
- 18 thank and applaud the outstanding work of our men and
- 19 woman in blue and all the work they have accomplished
- 20 considering the tremendous challenges they face daily
- 21 to do more with less.
- They have made significant strides in
- 23 challenging and changing the culture in this Department
- 24 as relates to the dictates of our Consent Decree. They
- 25 have been solid in performing their duties of



- 1 protecting and serving our citizens in spite of reduced
- 2 and insufficient resources.
- 3 Like the Mayor, this Board is also focused on
- 4 maintaining and improving the gains we've made under
- 5 the Consent Decree without slipping backwards while
- 6 we're in this transition period. We want to remind the
- 7 public that we are in a transition period.
- 8 Three weeks ago we held an open form to
- 9 engage the public and receive their input toward the
- 10 hiring of a new Chief of Police. Two weeks ago we
- 11 approved two companies to perform the search and
- 12 assessment of potential candidates for the Chief's job.
- To date these contracts have not been signed.
- 14 This Board has done its due diligence and has upheld
- 15 the mandates of the Charter, and we're now waiting for
- 16 the City to do its part.
- Today I heard on the radio the Deputy Mayor
- 18 of the City, Kirk Lewis, state that it would be
- 19 sometime in October of 2013 before a new Chief of
- 20 Police can be selected. That is certainly in conflict
- 21 with our time table. In speaking with the search and
- 22 assessment firms it was our goal to have a list to the
- 23 Mayor before Christmas of this year.
- The second week in January would be the
- 25 latest that we could get a list to the Mayor as relates



- 1 to potential candidates for the Chief of Police. That
- 2 is why I became concerned while watching the press
- 3 conference. We have a number of issues and significant
- 4 issues on our desk that I believe and I hope we believe
- 5 as a Board that needs to be metered out before we can
- 6 consider a major ground sweeping reorganization of this
- 7 Department.
- First of all, we have two contracts on the
- 9 table that need to be signed and we need to get on with
- 10 the process of searching for a new Chief of Police.
- 11 The Charter of the great City of Detroit mandates that
- 12 when there is a vacancy it is the job of this Board to
- 13 hire a firm to conduct that search. We have done our
- 14 due diligence and now we need those contracts to be
- 15 signed before we can move forward with anything else.
- Secondly, earlier this year, late -- early
- 17 last year this Board deliberated on and approved a
- 18 budget, and in that particular budget there were not
- 19 any budgetary items for three Assistant Chiefs of
- 20 Police. We say, well, why three? Why you say three?
- 21 Well, because the City Charter does not speak toward an
- 22 Interim Chief of Police.
- 23 And so in promoting two individuals to Chief
- 24 of Police we would in effect have three Chiefs of
- 25 Police, and the Charter does not speak to Interim



- 1 Chief.
- We as this Board do our very best to
- 3 represent the citizens and the Officers in holding up
- 4 and respecting that sacred document. In addition, we
- 5 need to know where the money is coming from for these
- 6 changes.
- We need to know where's the money coming from
- 8 to hire two additional Chiefs, where's the money coming
- 9 from to promote additional Sergeants and Lieutenants,
- where's the money coming from to bring on a new academy
- 11 class, where's the money coming from to do another test
- in order to promote more Sergeants.
- The budget that we passed last year was a
- 14 barebones budget that was additionally cut another
- 15 \$75 million dollars. Our men and women in blue took
- 16 significant cuts of salary as well as benefits and they
- 17 have held a stiff upper lip. Councilman Brown,
- 18 Councilman Tate, and others have commented to this
- 19 Board as we sat at their table that this Department is
- 20 very top heavy.
- We need to look at before we can approve any
- 22 sweeping changes of how we can put more Officers on the
- ground and as we're thinking about putting more
- Officers on the ground, thirdly, we hear that the
- 25 Administration is considering opening impound lots to



- 1 take aban cars to, which is very disturbing considering
- 2 we have a infrastructure in place that saves the City a
- 3 considerable amount of money where we would not have to
- 4 have Police Officers watching cars on lots. We need
- 5 Police Officers on streets watching citizens instead.
- 6 (Applause.)
- 7 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: In addition, we need to
- 8 make sure that the items on our desk including the new
- 9 towing process and the new towing fees are in place
- 10 before we can consider this. Like the Mayor, we're
- 11 concerned and we want to make sure that in this
- 12 transition period that we maintain our focus on the
- 13 Consent Decree.
- And our men and woman in this Department we
- 15 believe are still doing that to this day and we don't
- 16 want to lose any ground in doing that, but at the same
- 17 time we want to be fiscally responsible to the needs of
- 18 this City and the citizens of this City, but more
- 19 importantly we want to make sure that we uphold the
- 20 Charter of this great City in which we have dictated
- 21 to.
- Let me say this in my comments, the Detroit
- 23 City Charter was not a part of the Consent Decree.
- 24 Therefore, we would not seek to violated it, we will
- 25 not seek to circumvent it, nor, will we seek to



- 1 overlook what the dictates of the Detroit City Charter
- 2 mandates that this Board does.
- I am very proud of the men and woman in this
- 4 Department from the Interim Chief down to the
- 5 Street-Beat Officer. I have nothing against any
- 6 Officer who was mentioned as relates to being promoted.
- 7 Our interest, though, is to make sure that we do our
- 8 due diligence and do the jobs that we have been
- 9 appointed to do.
- We are an appointed body to oversee the
- 11 process. Now let me give one point of advice and I'm
- 12 done. I believe it would have been helpful if the
- 13 Mayor would have brought the information to us, allowed
- 14 us to deliberate in front of an open forum such as
- 15 this, come to a conclusion, give him our results, and
- 16 then stand together as a unified public safety entity
- 17 saying that these are the changes that need to be made
- 18 instead of putting the cart before the horse.
- I believe that, again, we need to support our
- 20 men and woman in blue and we need to look at every
- 21 opportunity to put more boots on the ground, to put
- 22 more cars on the streets, and to put more cops in our
- 23 neighborhoods, and that is my opinion.
- Now having said that, I would say this, that
- 25 I urge the citizens of the City to help us and support



- 1 us in making sure that the contracts for those
- 2 companies and firms that we have voted on are signed
- 3 and we can move this process forward. We would
- 4 appreciate your help in that effort.
- I would open it up to my colleagues if they
- 6 have any questions or comments regarding my report.
- 7 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I don't have any
- 8 comments.
- 9 COMMISSIONER WHITE: None.
- 10 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you. At this time
- 11 we'll go to the Interim Chief, Chief Chester Logan, for
- 12 his report and his report coming from the Northwestern
- 13 District.
- 14 CHIEF LOGAN: Through the chair, Interim
- 15 Chief Logan. I'd like to call upon I believe Inspector
- 16 Thomas is going to be giving the presentation for the
- 17 Great Northwestern District. Thank you.
- 18 COMMANDER MCKISSIC: Good evening, everyone.
- 19 AUDIENCE: Good evening.
- 20 COMMANDER MCKISSIC: My name is Duane
- 21 McKissic. I'm Commander of the Northwestern District
- 22 which under my control is the 6th and 8th Precinct.
- 23 The 6th Precinct which is commanded by Inspector Johnny
- 24 Thomas, and the 8th Precinct which is commanded by
- 25 Inspector Vicki Yost.



- 1 Tonight Inspector Thomas is going to give an
- 2 overview of some of the wonderful things that we do on
- 3 a daily basis to support the citizens of the City of
- 4 Detroit, and he's also going to make some introductions
- 5 of some staff personnel and he's going to present an
- 6 award. At this time without further adieu I'd like to
- 7 bring -- did I tell you all this is the great
- 8 Northwestern District over here?
- 9 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: We believe it.
- 10 COMMANDER MCKISSIC: The City is great but
- 11 right now I'm talking about the Great Northwestern
- 12 District and without further adieu I'd like to bring
- 13 Inspector Thomas to present.
- 14 INSPECTOR THOMAS: Good evening, everyone.
- 15 AUDIENCE: Good evening.
- 16 INSPECTOR THOMAS: Before I get started, I
- 17 would like to introduce members of my staff. Will you
- 18 please stand? We have Officer Childrey Sims, Community
- 19 Relations, D.S. Gray who is my daytime Special Ops
- 20 Sergeant, Michael Gordon in the back there. The reason
- 21 I want to introduce them is without them a lot of
- 22 things I'm going to talk about would not be possible,
- 23 so.
- The 6th Precinct encompasses approximately
- 25 16.08 square miles. It's bounded by the north by



- 1 Fenkell, the south by Ford Road, east by Greenfield,
- 2 and the west by Telegraph. We have approximately
- 3 82,000 citizens in the 6th Precinct. The precinct
- 4 contains eight elementary schools, seven middle
- 5 schools, and three high schools. Our community assets
- 6 include 200 churches, 400 businesses, which include
- 7 35 gas stations and 32 party stores as well as seven
- 8 nursing and senior citizen homes.
- 9 Our Community Relations Department we deal
- 10 with a lot of issues including we have our Community
- 11 Officers go out and do Cops Read to Kids which is
- 12 exactly what it is you go out to elementary and
- 13 kindergarten and actually read books to children.
- We also have Gruff the Crime Dog. Childrey
- 15 Sims usually takes on that mantel. She did a very good
- 16 job in October before Halloween. We went out to a
- 17 couple elementary schools and tell kids about community
- involvement and safety and crime prevention.
- We also have a law enforcement Explorers
- 20 Program which deals with children between the ages 14
- 21 and 21, and that's where children or young adults are
- 22 interested in a career in law enforcement. We also do
- 23 Operation Safe Passage, that's where we give special
- 24 attention to the routes that kids take to and from
- 25 schools to ensure they have safe routes to schools.



- 1 We also have a senior awareness program. We
- 2 go out and we talk to the seniors about different --
- 3 just tell them how to be safe. We also discuss
- 4 different scams that go out there so they will not be
- 5 duped by some unsavory individuals trying to get their
- 6 money.
- 7 We also have a program that we're doing for
- 8 the holiday season on the 1st and 15th of the next two
- 9 months. We're actually going to retirement homes.
- 10 We're conveying citizens to the banks and to the
- 11 grocery stores because usually around the holiday
- 12 seasons where they start to pick up and prey really
- 13 heavily on our seniors, so we're trying to prevent that
- 14 from taking place.
- Also if there's some seniors that want to be
- involved or, we have Mike Gordon in the back there so
- 17 he can give you the information and we can see if we
- 18 can get you into that program. We also have
- 19 approximately 45 active organized community groups and
- 20 block clubs. In addition we have a city patrol, our
- 21 senior patrol. At this point we have 12 patrols. We
- 22 are trying to increase that number to 25.
- 23 We have retired Sergeant Joiner here who will
- 24 be taking any applications that anybody of the
- 25 community groups that wants to be involved, even if an



- 1 individual wants to be involved. We are actively
- 2 pursuing increasing that number.
- We have also have Buoy 6 which was founded in
- 4 1994 that's where the business owners come together
- 5 with the children and add different programs where we
- 6 take the kids so that they can see, you know, do some
- 7 things that they may not normally do.
- 8 We also have people who are victims of
- 9 breaking and entering. We send out our Officers to do
- 10 security surveys to help target and harden their homes
- 11 to improve and lessen the chance of a repeat B&E.
- 12 Right here I'm just going to talk about some
- of the work the men and women of the 6th Precinct do.
- 14 These are the stats for the year-to-date. As of today
- we have made a 1,147 felony arrests, 1,392 misdemeanor
- 16 arrests, we've detained 186 juveniles. We've
- 17 confiscated 189 handguns, 64 long guns, giving us a
- 18 total of 253 guns as well as they investigated 1,277
- 19 male and 948 females.
- That's a brief synopsis of what we have
- 21 accomplished this year at the 6th Precinct. If anyone
- has any questions I'd be more than happy to answer?
- 23 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Are there any questions
- 24 from the Board?
- 25 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Inspector, as it relates



- 1 to year-to-date for 2012, how does that compare to 2011
- 2 numbers?
- 3 INSPECTOR THOMAS: We're up actually in all
- 4 categories at this point. I don't have the exact
- 5 numbers. We're up in arrests approximately 100,
- 6 investigations probably a couple hundred.
- 7 COMMISSIONER WHITE: As it relates to I
- 8 believe you mentioned 35 gas stations and 32 party
- 9 stores, from the data I've seen there's been a spike in
- 10 terms of crime perpetrated particularly at gas station?
- 11 INSPECTOR THOMAS: Right.
- 12 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Have you seen that
- 13 within the Northwest District and, if so, what are some
- of the things being done to curtail that?
- 15 INSPECTOR THOMAS: Well, actually there is a
- 16 spike just about city-wide. And what we do is we do a
- 17 lot of patrols in those areas. We have Officers get
- 18 out and go talk to the gas station owners. We
- 19 encourage them to get video. We encourage them to --
- 20 this partnership is a little better because a lot of
- 21 things that are occurring if we had a more open
- 22 communication line we'd probably prevent some of things
- 23 that are going on.
- 24 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Okay. Thank you,
- 25 Mr. Chair.



- 1 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you.
- 2 CHIEF LOGAN: Through the chair, Interim
- 3 Chief Logan. Inspector, would you just touch on the
- 4 Beautification Program that you had going on in the
- 5 precinct?
- 6 INSPECTOR THOMAS: Right. We partnered with
- 7 actually quite a few agencies. Home Depot was the main
- 8 contributor in which we actually redid the entire
- 9 precinct just about. We painted the inside. We
- 10 replaced the ceiling tiles. They refurbished the
- 11 kitchen. Actually the kitchen almost is better than
- 12 the kitchen at my house. I might just move in.
- 13 It was very tremendous. The citizens came
- 14 out and showed a lot of appreciation. At the end we
- 15 had a dinner in which everybody who was involved,
- 16 including the Officers. The Officers are very happy.
- 17 I think that the environment that you come to work in
- 18 has a lot to do with how you operate throughout the day
- 19 and I think it has played a considerable improvement in
- 20 the mindset of some of the Officers.
- 21 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Inspector Thomas, can you
- 22 give us a phone number the citizens can contact if
- they're interested in CB patrols and some of the other
- 24 services?
- 25 INSPECTOR THOMAS: Well, I'll give them my



- 1 number. They can just called 596-5610, that's my
- 2 administrative office and we will refer you to
- 3 whichever organization you would like to join.
- 4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: And that number is
- 5 596-5610. Thank you, sir.
- 6 INSPECTOR THOMAS: Thank you.
- 7 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Anymore questions? And
- 8 certainly we want to acknowledge Inspector Yost as well
- 9 who does a great job over there, as well. Thank you.
- 10 Commander McKissic, anything else?
- 11 COMMANDER MCKISSIC: Nothing, sir.
- 12 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir. A couple
- 13 questions, Chief, that we have. We, of course, have
- 14 heard of a demotion of two Officers or two Officers
- 15 within the Department. Without going into a great deal
- of detail, of course, were these demotions due to
- 17 discipline or some other actions?
- 18 CHIEF LOGAN: They were due to, I can't say
- 19 discipline. It was due to their conduct. The
- 20 discipline hasn't been adjudicated yet. The actions
- 21 were so egregious that we had to act on it.
- 22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Great. Thank you, sir.
- 23 Any other questions for the Chief? All right. At this
- 24 time we will move on down to New Business and there's a
- 25 Resolution that we want to honor one of our citizens



- 1 here in the great Northwest District. I'm going to ask
- 2 if Commissioner White will introduce our Honoree and
- 3 call her forward, please.
- 4 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Is Ms. Hambrick with us
- 5 this evening? Please come forward with us.
- 6 (Applause.)
- 7 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Commissioners and
- 8 members of the Detroit Police Department and community,
- 9 before us is a Resolution honoring Ms. Cheryl Hambrick.
- 10 The resolution reads: Whereas Cheryl Hambrick is a
- 11 proud lifelong resident of the City of Detroit who
- 12 resides within the Northwestern District.
- 13 Ms. Hambrick is member of Gesu Church,
- 14 Detroit where her life is enriched with Christian
- 15 teaching, and whereas, Ms. Hambrick is an active member
- and president of the Warren Avenue Community
- 17 Organization. Ms. Hambrick's dedication was
- 18 exemplified as she assisted in organizing Motor City
- 19 Cleanups which included cutting grass and cleaning
- 20 abandon businesses on Warren Avenue.
- Despite being robbed and shaken up during the
- 22 cleanup effort she refused to let this ordeal to take
- 23 away her passion for caring for her neighborhood. And
- 24 whereas, Ms. Hambrick has always been involved in
- 25 community relations and dedicated to improving



- 1 neighborhood safety and quality of life. She was
- 2 involved in getting 98 houses boarded up in her
- 3 community.
- 4 (Applause.)
- 5 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Through this effort the
- 6 neighborhood was stabilized and these homes are now
- 7 available for sale to new homeowners. This has also
- 8 made it safer for kids going to and from school. And
- 9 whereas, a loyal public servant, Ms. Hambrick's
- 10 community devotion has been consistent throughout her
- 11 lifetime.
- In 2012 she received first place for Most
- Organized Neighborhood Association as well as numerous
- 14 awards from Wayne County Commissioners, Wayne County
- 15 Clerk, Detroit 300, and Citywide Block Club for her
- 16 community service.
- 17 Her life's combined philosophy is pay it
- 18 forward because I believe you get what you give in
- 19 life, and I do believe what goes around comes around.
- 20 Now therefore be it resolved, that the Detroit Board of
- 21 Police Commissioners speaking on behalf of the citizens
- 22 of the City of Detroit and the Detroit Police
- 23 Department acknowledge the dedication of Ms. Cheryl
- 24 Hambrick.
- 25 Her highly displayed commitment to community



- 1 service and her ability to build sustainable community
- 2 partnerships merit our highest regard.
- 3 We thank and congratulate you, Ms. Cheryl
- 4 Hambrick. Signed the Detroit Board of Police
- 5 Commissioners, adopted and dated this day of
- 6 November 8th, 2012. Congratulations.
- 7 (Applause and photos were taken.)
- 8 INSPECTOR THOMAS: Could I have Councilwoman
- 9 Brenda Jones come up to help present this award?
- 10 MS. HAMBRICK: Thank you.
- 11 COUNCILWOMAN JONES: We have the Spirit of
- 12 Detroit Award to present to a citizen who has
- definitely done her share in her community. And it
- 14 reads, the Spirit of Detroit is presented herewith as
- an expression of the gratitude an esteem of the
- 16 citizens of the City of Detroit to Mrs. Cheryl Hambrick
- in recognition of exceptional achievement, outstanding
- 18 leadership and dedication to improving the quality of
- 19 life and is signed by all nine councilmen and we truly
- 20 appreciate your work in the community.
- 21 (Applause and photos were taken.)
- 22 CHIEF LOGAN: Last one, last one for the
- 23 night. The Detroit Police Department, this is a
- 24 certificate of recognition to Ms. Cheryl Hambrick,
- 25 resident of the City of Detroit in appreciation for the



- 1 following outstanding service and cooperation for your
- 2 involvement in the community and services to the City
- 3 of Detroit that demonstrate a spirit and commitment
- 4 that is worthy of recognition.
- 5 And for the first time, I can say I signed
- 6 this, Chester Logan.
- 7 (Applause.)
- 8 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Outstanding.
- 9 MS. HAMBRICK: I don't have a speech, but I
- just want to thank you guys from the bottom of my
- 11 heart. You know, they say that it takes a village to
- 12 make a neighborhood and I've always believed in that,
- and nothing, absolutely nothing couldn't have been done
- 14 without so many people in our neighborhood and there's
- so many people that I just, I can't thank you enough.
- And it's because of these people that just
- 17 keeps me going and I just want to thank you very much
- 18 for this. You know, I just never in my wildest dreams
- 19 expected this because, you know, you just do things
- 20 because you do them. And there are some just givers
- 21 and takers and it's just who I am and that I just --
- 22 I'm out of words. I just thank you so very much.
- 23 (Applause.)
- 24 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: At this time I will ask
- 25 if Commissioner Taylor will move a motion to receive



- 1 this Resolution?
- 2 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I would like to approve
- 3 the motion to receive the Resolution for Ms. Cheryl
- 4 Hambrick.
- 5 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.
- 6 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved
- 7 and supported that we will receive this Resolution and
- 8 it will be a part of our permanent archives of the
- 9 Police Commissioners, therefore, being a part of the
- 10 history of the great City of Detroit.
- 11 All those in favor of said motion?
- 12 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 13 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed?
- 14 Motion carries. Again, Ms. Hambrick, congratulations
- and thank you so much and your neighbors and friends
- 16 and supporters for just an outstanding excellent job in
- 17 what you do. Amen.
- 18 There is no Old Business on our agenda today.
- 19 I do want to announce that our next meeting will be on
- 20 Thursday, November 15th, 2012, 3:00 p.m., at the
- 21 Detroit Police Headquarters, 1300 Beaubien, downtown,
- 22 beautiful Downtown Detroit.
- 23 At this time we're going to open up our floor
- 24 for oral communications from the audience. If you
- 25 could indulge me for a moment. I see an honored guest,



- 1 the Honorable Brenda Jones, Councilwoman Brenda Jones,
- 2 and I'm going to ask if she has anything she would like
- 3 to say to come first at this time?
- 4 COUNCILWOMAN JONES: It is an honor to be
- 5 here with you all today just to hear the Police
- 6 Commissioner's report, hear the President's report, and
- 7 just awaiting to see what's happening.
- 8 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Bless you. Always good
- 9 to have you and see you, ma'am. At this time the floor
- 10 is open. If you wish to address the Board of Police
- 11 Commissioners and the Detroit Police Department, if you
- 12 have questions or comments you may come to the mic,
- 13 give us your full name first and last. We ask that you
- 14 abide by our two-minute rule so we can hear from as
- 15 many people as possible. You may come at this time.
- MR. MCGUIRE: My name is Pat McGuire,
- 17 Sergeant of Arms to Warren Avenue Community Center.
- 18 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I'm sorry, sir, would you
- 19 say your name for us one more time. Our reporter
- 20 didn't hear it.
- MR. MCGUIRE: Pat McGuire.
- 22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you.
- 23 MR. MCGUIRE: I'm Sergeant of Arms for Warren
- 24 Avenue Community Center. There was a report given
- 25 tonight about 1,147 juveniles. I'm just wondering is



- 1 that a curfew violation? Because to me there's a lot
- of kids that are out after ten o'clock every night on
- 3 Warren Avenue and I'm just wondering if we're
- 4 emphasizing the curfew or are we just doing it around
- 5 Halloween or certain times of the year we do it or how
- 6 it's working because there should be a lot more than
- 7 1,147.
- 8 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Mr. McGuire.
- 9 Assistant Chief, would you like to respond to his
- 10 question?
- 11 CHIEF LOGAN: Sir, if I could, I'd like to
- 12 direct that question to Commander McKissic.
- 13 COMMANDER MCKISSIC: Yes, sir, we run a
- 14 curfew operation in the 6th Precinct as well as the 8th
- 15 Precinct. We have particular specific cars designated
- 16 to that operation. Off the top of my head I believe
- 17 we've detained 180 something juveniles to date -- 189
- 18 juveniles to date, that is a daily operation that we
- 19 are undertaking.
- 20 Any time that any of our citizens have a
- 21 particular emerging issue that they see that we are not
- 22 aware of they can always forward that information to us
- 23 either at our front desk or to our front office at
- 24 596-5610 and we will take action on their concerns.
- 25 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Mr. McGuire, does that



- 1 answer your question?
- 2 MR. MCGUIRE: Yes.
- 3 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir. Are
- 4 there others? Yes, ma'am, sure, come on down.
- 5 MS. WEBB: Yes, sir, I have a comment. My
- 6 name is Marie Webb. I've been broken into three times
- 7 this past summer, and as it was I called the 911. They
- 8 referred to me crime reporting, an Officer took my
- 9 information down as to what was stolen and what I felt
- 10 was stolen, and nothing after that come of it.
- I asked the Officer on the phone, I said, is
- 12 someone coming out to see the damages? No. And he
- 13 said, I've given you a number, he said, and that's to
- 14 report to your insurance company. Well, that was the
- 15 first break-in, that was at the end of May.
- Second break-in came along August 1st, same
- 17 thing happened. They give you the crime reporting and
- 18 nothing took place. So the next break-in just several
- 19 weeks back October the 20th, I thought, well, I'm going
- 20 to the 6th Precinct, maybe I can speak to someone
- 21 across the desk. So I entered the station and there's
- 22 an Officer there, he said, how might I help you? And I
- 23 said, well, I'm here to report a break-in.
- He pointed like this. And he said, well,
- 25 there's a telephone there on the wall, he said, they'll



- 1 give you a number. At that point I turned to him and I
- 2 said, you know, I been through this twice already, that
- 3 telephone there on the wall is not going to do me a
- 4 thing.
- 5 He said, well, I'm sorry, that's our
- 6 procedure, you go ahead and report to crime reporting.
- 7 I said, well, I don't care for your procedure. I said,
- 8 the hoodlums are still out on the street and we suspect
- 9 that is the neighborhood suspects the house in
- 10 particular where there at are squatters. And I've been
- 11 broken into the three times. There's a lady here been
- 12 broke into once. Several neighbors around me have been
- 13 broken into.
- 14 They know who we are. I happen to live
- 15 alone. When my car's out of the yard, I'm gone. Oh,
- 16 hey, little old lady's gone. We've got opportunity
- 17 here to break in. They kicked in the back door twice,
- 18 and the front door. My latest break-in was the front
- 19 door. The kicked in the front door.
- Folks, I don't know where to go from here
- 21 other than to move and the move possibly will be just
- 22 to walk away. I do not own the home. The home has
- 23 been in the family for a good number of years, and I'm
- 24 going to walk away because I have no protection at all.
- 25 And with walking away I might say this, they'll be



- 1 another burned out boarded up aluminum siding tore off
- 2 for my neighbors to look at.
- 3 So I have no further comment. I don't know
- 4 what to do that this point.
- 5 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Well, Ms. Webb, first of
- 6 all, thank you for coming and sharing that with us, and
- 7 certainly we are sorry that your house has been broken
- 8 into those many times. We're even more concerned about
- 9 the lack of response that you have received.
- MS. WEBB: Exactly.
- 11 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: So here's what we're
- 12 going to do. Certainly I'm sure the Chief wants to
- 13 talk to you, but after that I want you to talk to our
- 14 Chief Investigator because we want to get some more
- information about your interaction directly at the
- 16 station, and so we want to get some information with
- 17 that, as well.
- And I just have a question for the Chief,
- 19 what is policy and procedures as relates to sending
- 20 techs out to the scene to dust for prints where there
- 21 may be evidence there?
- 22 CHIEF LOGAN: Through the chair, Interim
- 23 Chief Logan. That should have been followed up on.
- But, ma'am, before you go what I need you to do,
- 25 Commander McKissic, I need you to get with this young



- 1 lady and see what her problem is and report back to me
- 2 by next Wednesday so I can report back to the Board
- 3 your findings.
- 4 She indicates that the suspects live the
- 5 neighborhood.
- 6 MS. WEBB: Yes, they do.
- 7 CHIEF LOGAN: So there's something we can do.
- 8 MS. WEBB: Yes, you can.
- 9 CHIEF LOGAN: I need you to follow up on that
- 10 and I'll report back to the Board next Thursday.
- 11 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir. Let me
- 12 say this, too, because I had an opportunity to meet
- 13 with the Wayne County Prosecutor and in talking with
- 14 her and certainly I know we are resource challenged
- 15 right now, but certainly the more we can get techs out
- 16 to the scene to possibly capture some fingerprints or
- 17 some trace evidence and put that into the database it
- 18 helps significantly in capturing these individuals and
- 19 tracking them down.
- So I just hope on the Department's end, I
- 21 know we're resource challenged, but if we can send out
- 22 techs as much as possible it'll stop the multiple
- 23 break-ins I believe at one structure like this.
- MS. WEBB: Well, might I say this, though.
- 25 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Yes, ma'am.



- 1 MS. WEBB: As it is I don't know as the techs
- 2 would possibly gather fingerprints because, you know,
- 3 I've touched things and put things back.
- 4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Well, if they would have
- 5 came when you called.
- MS. WEBB: Well, absolutely, had they had
- 7 come, oh, yes.
- 8 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: That's what I'm talking
- 9 about. Yes, sir.
- 10 CHIEF LOGAN: Through the chair, Interim
- 11 Chief Logan. The fact that your prints would naturally
- 12 be at your house, so we can still send evidence techs
- 13 out. Your fingerprints will be there all the time.
- 14 Yours can be eliminated. We might come up with some
- 15 evidence there.
- MS. WEBB: Because another thing I might add
- is they took literally my jewelry boxes. I have no
- 18 jewelry but my Timex watch and I had some very nice
- 19 things having traveled abroad and bought things. I
- 20 tell you they made a mint on me, believe me they did.
- 21 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Well, we thank you for
- 22 coming and we will follow up with you. Thank you,
- 23 Ms. Webb.
- MS. WEBB: Thank you.
- 25 COMMANDER MCKISSIC: Do you mind if I would



- 1 make a comment, sir, piggyback on what the young lady
- 2 was discussing? Again, Commander McKissic,
- 3 Northwestern District. All of our employees they're
- 4 not perfect employees. Sometimes they have -- don't
- 5 put our procedure out and give our citizens the proper
- 6 service that they deserve.
- 7 And any time that any of our citizens feel
- 8 that is an issue an even if they just want to come in
- 9 and just talk to the Commander they can feel free to do
- 10 it. Our Inspectors as well as Commander McKissic has
- 11 an open-door policy. They're often times citizens as
- 12 well as citizen groups come in and my Officers will
- 13 have an impromptu meeting and we sit down and discuss
- 14 concerns in the community and come up with solutions to
- 15 the best of our ability.
- 16 So when have situations like this we
- 17 shouldn't have to go months, weeks, whatever that
- 18 timeframe is. As soon as you have that issue come in
- 19 and see if we can hash that out right away. Maybe this
- 20 is an arrest that we could have made on B&E 1 and 2.
- 21 I'll just put that out there.
- 22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Let me say this, I think
- 23 that's wonderful. I'm glad you said that because
- 24 you're absolutely right. Sometimes, you know,
- 25 citizens, maybe I'm not satisfied with the level of



- 1 help they received at the desk. But it might be
- 2 helpful if maybe you posted a sign to say that if
- 3 you're not satisfied please call me, put your name and
- 4 number on that sign by the desk, and so the citizens
- 5 will know there is another step in the process to get
- 6 their concerns answered.
- 7 Because the issue is when citizens are
- 8 already violated in their home, when the citizens feel
- 9 they're not getting the proper response either by way
- of call and then they come in and then our -- someone
- 11 will feel like they've been turned away and justifiably
- 12 so, you know, they don't feel empowered at that point.
- I don't think to ask for, who's your supervisor? Why?
- 14 Because somebody sitting across that desk
- 15 with a gun and badge may with a good, bad, or
- 16 indifferent attitude don't know at the time. But I
- 17 think it would be helpful to say, to see a sign with
- 18 your statement on it if you're not satisfied call me.
- 19 Just a suggestion. Thank you, sir.
- 20 COMMANDER MCKISSIC: It sounds like a great
- 21 suggestion, sir. I'm going to take my seat now. Feel
- 22 free to call me, come in, talk to me.
- 23 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: You can come up to the
- 24 mic.
- MS. PANNELL: Good evening, my name is Sharon



- 1 Pannell.
- 2 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Good evening.
- 3 MS. PANNELL: I think that the citizens don't
- 4 know about the relations, the community relations
- 5 person at the Police Department. If they get familiar
- 6 with that then they'll get some kind of response. I
- 7 know my community relations person. They know me.
- 8 Just about all of you all know me. So that's all I'm
- 9 saying is you got to know the person in charge at the
- 10 police precincts.
- 11 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Stay right there for a
- 12 minute, Ms. Pannell, because, and just give me one
- 13 minute to say this, Ms. Pannell started to come to our
- 14 meetings about a year and a half ago.
- MS. PANNELL: Two years ago.
- 16 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Two years ago, on a
- 17 regular basis because she was not getting the response
- 18 from the Police that she had desired. But since then
- 19 she's built significant rapport and relations with
- 20 Deputy Chief Turner and her Community Relations
- 21 Officers there at the station on the northeast side of
- 22 the City of Detroit.
- 23 And I just stand her up as an example of
- 24 citizens that get engaged and get involved because it
- 25 take citizens and the police to form a policing



- 1 community. And so I thank you. Because, I mean, we
- 2 saw you from day one to now and I'm telling you just
- 3 your response --
- 4 MS. PANNELL: I'm 2nd Precinct.
- 5 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I'm sorry, 2nd.
- 6 MS. PANNELL: But, no. The reason I got
- 7 involved is I worked for 35 years for a company. I
- 8 raised two boys by myself. They're professionals. My
- 9 house got broke into. My boys ain't --
- 10 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Right.
- MS. PANNELL: And I refuse to let somebody
- 12 come back up in my house and take my stuff again. I
- don't have much, but I want to keep it. And I don't
- 14 want to run. I don't want to be one of the 47 percent
- of people leaving. I'm not really. Was that the man
- 16 that was running for president talking about that?
- But anyway. I'm trying to stay in Detroit.
- 18 I want to keep my stuff, too.
- 19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Amen.
- MS. PANNELL: And when I call 2nd Precinct
- 21 somebody comes.
- 22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Ms. Pannell.
- 23 We call that righteous indignation.
- MS. PANNELL: Thank you. I appreciate the
- 25 comment.



- 1 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Yes, ma'am.
- MS. MOSLEY: Hi, my name is Demetris Mosley.
- 3 This is my first time to a meeting and I'm going to
- 4 keep coming after this. I fell a victim. I've been in
- 5 Detroit, born and raised in Detroit, 17 years in my
- 6 house. First time they broke in was 2010, three times
- 7 in five months.
- 8 The second time I fell victim was I was
- 9 harassed by Detroit Police Department. I respect
- 10 everything they do. I love them. They do a lot for
- 11 me. But this particular night me and my son was
- 12 harassed. We were so harassed I had to call somebody
- 13 to come sit with me because I was so angry.
- My son is a student. As a result of this I
- 15 have to fly him here next week for a court date,
- 16 another court date a week later, and then bring him
- 17 back the week before Christmas. Three times for
- 18 nothing. When I tell you they wrote him for everything
- 19 they could think of they did it.
- I'm still angry and frustrated. But I pay my
- 21 taxes. I do what I do. If he gets pulled over he
- 22 knows what he's supposed to do and so do I. And I just
- 23 think that it's just unexcusable behavior because
- 24 nobody should have to tolerate that. They wouldn't
- 25 want their son or their daughter, their mother, treated



- 1 like I was treated.
- 2 And I just want to be heard because now we
- 3 got to fight to get him here from Alabama then get him
- 4 back. He's missing school. I'm missing money. And
- 5 it's ridiculous.
- 6 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: First of all, thank you,
- 7 Ms. Mosley for coming. We do hope to see you at future
- 8 meetings. We certainly want you to see our Chief
- 9 Investigators. But before you leave my -- before this
- 10 meeting is over see myself or Commissioner White.
- MS. MOSLEY: Okay.
- 12 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Maybe we can do something
- 13 to talk to a judge to see if we can alter the schedule
- 14 that your son comes --
- MS. MOSLEY: He comes in Tuesday evening for
- 16 the first court date.
- 17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Maybe we can set
- 18 something up where his court dates are scheduled on his
- 19 breaks. I know, you know, that some judges actually
- 20 are able to do that, are able to delay their dates from
- 21 when they're already going to be here so you won't have
- 22 to go through the extra expense of that, okay. So talk
- 23 to us afterwards we might be able to help with you
- 24 that.
- MS. MOSLEY: Okay. Thank you.



- 1 CHIEF LOGAN: Through the chair, ma'am. I'm
- 2 trying to get an idea where this occurred at?
- 3 MS. MOSLEY: It was on Myers between Fenkell
- 4 and Linden.
- 5 CHIEF LOGAN: What kind of -- sounds like you
- 6 got tickets, your son got tickets?
- 7 MS. MOSLEY: And I got a ticket, too, for
- 8 interfering.
- 9 CHIEF LOGAN: What kind of ticket?
- MS. MOSLEY: He got a ticket for blocking
- 11 traffic, no proof of insurance and registration, which
- 12 I keep in the car. It was something -- you know, I
- 13 have a little cover on my plate. He got written for
- 14 that. And it was a matter of five minutes because when
- 15 he dropped me off -- see, the Police Officer didn't see
- 16 him drop me off.
- I was standing on the sidewalk and he was
- 18 waiting on a pedestrian to walk across the street and
- 19 he pulled off. He flicked his lights. By the time I
- 20 got to my child they had him in handcuffs, searched my
- 21 whole car, had everything just out, you know.
- 22 My ticket -- because when I got there I said,
- 23 excuse me, what happened? What'd he do wrong? And he
- 24 told me get back in the car with my friend which I did.
- 25 Then asked me to get out the car and wrote me a ticket



- 1 for interference.
- 2 CHIEF LOGAN: Deputy Chief Wells, I believe
- 3 this occurred on your side of the City. Would you get
- 4 with her and see exactly what transpired that evening
- 5 and here again report back to me preliminary findings?
- 6 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Ms. Mosley.
- 7 MS. MOSLEY: Thank you.
- 8 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Yes, ma'am.
- 9 MS. HAMBRICK: Cheryl Hambrick. I just want
- 10 to piggyback on what this woman here said regarding our
- 11 Officers. We know that they work so hard. And the
- 12 thing is I go to lot of the meetings where McKissic is
- and he never ever leaves that meeting without
- 14 giving his telephone number to each and every person on
- 15 the speaker for everybody to hear.
- I've emailed on several occasions Inspector
- 17 Yost, and she, I mean, not everybody can email, but she
- 18 likes to get emails because she never loses them, you
- 19 know, and she will get back to you, I mean, like right
- 20 on the money.
- 21 Officer Gordon, I had to be in contact with
- 22 him on quite a few occasions and he has always replied.
- 23 The thing is, you know, that we have -- I live, you
- 24 know, behind that woman that was up here earlier and
- 25 there were three house on her street, there were eight



- on my block on St. Mary's that were, that had gotten
- 2 broken into.
- And my question is is if you have to actually
- 4 make the report on the phone or, you know, and I had to
- 5 take people down there because some of them were Arabic
- 6 descent and didn't want to get involved and I had to
- 7 literally take them down there. They didn't speak good
- 8 English. They didn't want to do the call in and stuff,
- 9 you know.
- But when you get broken in does somebody
- 11 actually have to come out and do an investigation or is
- 12 just a report that they do because if you're just
- 13 giving in reports and calling this information how are
- 14 these people supposed to be, you know, caught if there
- 15 no fingerprinting or anybody comes out to followup on
- 16 that? So what is the criteria for that.
- 17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Chief?
- 18 CHIEF LOGAN: Through the chair, Interim
- 19 Chief Logan. I would ask that Commander McKissic would
- 20 step to the mic and address her concerns.
- 21 COMMANDER MCKISSIC: Like I say, there is
- 22 some times that call going into telephone crime
- 23 reporting that information comes into the Investigators
- 24 and the information coming down to our Patrol Officers.
- 25 However, a lot of the information that as we reviewed



- 1 reports we deploy our personnel according to activity
- 2 and then that activity we call the various threshold
- 3 areas. So if we have those threshold areas that are
- 4 having a spike in crime that's where we deploy our
- 5 personnel first and foremost.
- 6 We still deploy everywhere, but that's our
- 7 focus of attention where we have the most concern. Now
- 8 when we have those concerns which that's why I like to
- 9 have as much face to face with my citizens as I can
- 10 because information comes out through those
- 11 conversations that I can do specific enforcement. I
- 12 can have people looking for particular descriptions. I
- 13 can have people doing various things.
- 14 Because most of the times when you have
- 15 break-ins in your neighborhood, not all the time, but
- 16 most of the times it's someone who lives around there.
- 17 And most often times the people that live around there
- 18 know who it is. I mean, it's not usually new people
- 19 coming and doing that.
- So if we're able to have that dialog we can
- 21 have a more surgical approach to neutralize whatever
- 22 those issues are. Just a report is a portion of our
- 23 system, but it's not the whole system. The other
- 24 portion of the system is the followup the Investigators
- 25 do as well as our personnel.



- 1 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: So to answer her
- 2 questions, Commander, that someone should come out even
- 3 after the report's taken?
- 4 COMMANDER MCKISSIC: Someone should come out,
- 5 but they're not going to come out in every instance
- 6 unless there is some followup information that we can
- 7 work on. If no one sees anything, hears anything,
- 8 there are no fingerprints, nothing's been disturbed
- 9 that minimizes, but the more information that we are
- 10 able to garner in those reports then we know how to
- 11 deploy our personnel.
- 12 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Since this is a secret
- 13 community meeting right now, nobody here but us, what
- can the citizens do especially when they're
- 15 experiencing a plethora of break-ins, what can they do
- 16 to make sure that somebody comes out?
- 17 COMMANDER MCKISSIC: Yeah, if it's not on our
- 18 radar then do like I said before and call us, call us
- in the precinct. Call me in my command. Call 596,
- 20 again, 5610 and give us that information. Citizens
- 21 like I say, if it's a group of folks that's having
- 22 issues such as that, they bring it to our attention
- 23 because sometimes we have other things that we're
- 24 focusing our attention on and may not bring it us to
- 25 that at the time. If they bring it to our attention



- 1 we'll follow up on it.
- 2 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir,
- 3 appreciate it.
- 4 CHIEF LOGAN: Commissioner, through the
- 5 chair, Interm Chief Logan. I also very briefly would
- 6 like to bring Commander Bob Ennis to the mic to confirm
- 7 and amplify. He's in charge of our Investigators.
- 8 COMMANDER ENNIS: Through the chair,
- 9 Commander Robert Ennis from Criminal Investigations
- 10 Bureau. The protocol for ordering or utilizing
- 11 evidence techs for home invasions is that when the home
- 12 invasion occurs the report is generated, the evidence
- 13 techs should be notified and they would then respond by
- 14 calling the complainant, setting up a date and time
- 15 which would be immediately if possible, if not, then
- 16 the next day.
- In the instance where you have repeated home
- 18 invasions that first home invasion has a detective, if
- 19 that individual is victimized a second time, a week as
- in what the young lady was describing, that home
- 21 invasion for that second crime should also be assigned
- 22 to the same detective and that's normally, that's what
- 23 we always do.
- If you've got someone who's been victimized a
- 25 third time then obviously that rises to an incredible



- 1 amount of scrutiny within Investigative Ops, within
- 2 Special Ops and within the command. We don't always
- 3 pick that up because of the number of home invasions we
- 4 may have. But normally what will happen is and what
- 5 we're training our Investigators to do is when they
- 6 have a home invasion for Mrs. Jones on whatever the
- 7 street, Joy Road, they will go in and query our system
- 8 to see or ask Miss Jones when they do their interview,
- 9 have you had any other home invasions, how did they get
- in, what was the information, and use that. It's all
- 11 part of an investigative process.
- So anytime you have multiples they always go
- or should always go to the same Investigator, so I
- 14 don't have three different Detectives working on a home
- 15 invasion. Because normally as the young lady was
- 16 saying criminals who do home invasion do them within a
- 17 particular geographical area, and it's normally an area
- 18 where they either live in or they frequent all the
- 19 time.
- We have civilian techs and we got funding
- 21 years ago for civilian techs to do nothing more than do
- 22 evidence gathering for fingerprinting and for B&Es and
- 23 for home invasion and for auto theft, and they are
- 24 available and they will dust.
- We get an incredible amount of what we call



- 1 AFIS hits which are fingerprint hits, and we do an
- 2 incredible amount of prosecutions that doesn't get out
- 3 to the community at all that often. But it does happen
- 4 we get a lot of hits on fingerprints. And just like
- 5 the Chief said we do elimination prints. So if I go in
- 6 and I get four sets of prints off a glass and off a
- 7 table and off something's that knocked on the floor, we
- 8 eliminate everybody. We eliminate the kids. We
- 9 eliminate the victim. And then we isolate that until
- 10 we get that hit and we frequently get serial B&E
- 11 persons from those particular home invasions.
- 12 And if I have home invasions in a particular
- 13 block, all right, then we absolutely need to coordinate
- 14 that investigation within that particular squad so that
- 15 we absolutely locate and coordinate with our Special
- 16 Ops Unit.
- 17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Chief, if I can press the
- 18 envelope just a little bit? Commander Ennis, so if,
- 19 again, in the situation of Ms. Webb, she's calling and
- 20 no one responded is it possible to give just for the
- 21 few citizens we'll give them a number to call in order
- 22 that they might get some Investigators out to the
- 23 scene, a Detective out to scene? Is there such a
- 24 number we can give out they can call to follow up on
- 25 that?



- 1 COMMANDER ENNIS: Yes, sir. They can call my
- office, Criminal Investigation Bureau 596-2035.
- 3 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: 596-2035. Thank,
- 4 Commander, appreciate that.
- 5 COMMANDER ENNIS: You're welcome.
- 6 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Amen. I'm sorry,
- 7 Commissioner White?
- 8 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Through the chair,
- 9 Chief, if we could at least I think this might be a
- 10 good litmus test in terms of checking balances when
- 11 certain things are happening, this is probably a very
- 12 unique case, but when one individual has multiple
- 13 break-ins. I also heard mention that there's a series
- 14 of things that are going on in that block and I think
- 15 she said it was three or four down her block, eight on
- 16 the block behind, so I would just be curious to see if
- 17 there was the same Investigator or different
- 18 Investigators, if an evidence tech ever made it out to
- 19 her location?
- I'd just like to get a totality of her
- 21 picture just so we can use this in terms of how this
- 22 approach is working. I know you moved to this
- 23 telephone crime reporting opportunity to streamline.
- 24 This is a perfect example to see if, in fact, service
- 25 is being rendered to our citizens to the degree it



- 1 should be.
- 2 CHIEF LOGAN: Yes, sir.
- 3 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, thank you.
- 4 Are there any other comments tonight?
- 5 MS. SMITH: Good evening. Bernice Smith,
- 6 Political Activist. Your report to the Commissioners,
- 7 your report in regards to the news conference that the
- 8 Mayor did this afternoon, I'd taken some notes down and
- 9 what I'm really surprised about is it really feasible
- 10 for him to take, what, over six months to make a
- 11 decision in regards to the Chief? Was there anybody
- 12 questioning him afterwards in regard to it or is this
- 13 his way of saying he's going to take his time until
- 14 after the election?
- 15 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Well, you know, the
- 16 interview that I heard earlier on the local radio
- 17 station is was the Deputy Mayor --
- 18 MS. SMITH: Kirk?
- 19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Yes, it was the Deputy
- 20 Mayor, Mr. Lewis, who indicated that he believed it
- 21 would be into October before a new Chief would be on
- 22 staff. Again, that's not our timeline.
- 23 MS. SMITH: I wished I'd known this morning
- 24 he was on the air.
- 25 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Our timeline is very



- 1 specific. We know that we could have gotten if it was
- 2 posted last Friday like we had scheduled we could have
- 3 got a list to the Chief by the 21st of December.
- 4 MS. SMITH: I know we spoke about it at our
- 5 meeting. Remember you said it's going to be within two
- 6 weeks or better?
- 7 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: We still can get a list
- 8 of qualified candidates that have been vetted in the
- 9 process by at the latest the second week of January if
- 10 we move forward and get the contract signed, so that
- 11 gives that individual an ample amount of time to be on
- 12 the job.
- The question is and the comment is, well,
- it's costly and expensive. Well, it is not as costly
- 15 and expensive as hiring two assistant chiefs.
- MS. SMITH: Yeah, I don't understand that. I
- 17 wrote that down, yeah.
- 18 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I just think we need to
- 19 keep things in perspective.
- MS. SMITH: And by the way, my suggestion was
- 21 to keep Chief Logan in this position forever unless he
- 22 decides to retire again which I hope he doesn't. And
- 23 by the way, Chief Logan, you kept something from us. I
- 24 understand you got a beautiful wife sitting over here.
- Ms. Logan, would you introduce yourself so we



- 1 can see who you are? I'm sorry, anyway, I'm sorry, I
- 2 don't want to take over your spot. But, Chief,
- 3 congratulations. I'm glad that you brought her among
- 4 us so we can get a chance to see who your mate is, and
- 5 I approve. You know me, I tell the truth.
- 6 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Bless you. Good to see
- 7 you, Ms. Logan. God bless you.
- 8 MR. STIDHAM: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair,
- 9 Commissioners, Chief, Assistant Chief. Tom Stidham.
- 10 And a couple weeks ago, Mr. Chair, we learned that the
- 11 Department had initiated a new initiative to tow
- 12 vehicles to the impound yards. I know the Chief or
- 13 Assistant Chief when the Board questioned them last
- 14 week or two weeks ago had ask for some additional
- 15 information.
- I was just wondering if we could get an
- 17 update on the status of that initiative or if it's been
- 18 quashed or placed on hold or what the alternatives are?
- 19 Thank you.
- 20 CHIEF LOGAN: Through the chair, Assistant
- 21 Chief Logan. I will ask Inspector Wilson to come from
- 22 our staff to report out on this.
- 23 INSPECTOR WILSON: Inspector Charles Wilson,
- 24 Chief of Staff, Chief Logan. As it relates to that
- 25 there was actually an initiative coming out of the



- 1 Mayor's office. And I don't know if you guys are aware
- 2 or not but municipal parking handles their own towing.
- 3 So we were looking to try to replicate that same
- 4 process for police towing.
- 5 But Commissioner Warfield has been at the
- 6 table offering alternatives to avoid having to go to a
- 7 process which would require DPD to have Police Officers
- 8 still involved in towing. So as of this point we're
- 9 exploring other alternatives that would pretty much
- 10 allow us to keep the towers in place and move away from
- 11 having to use Officers again in towing. So right now
- 12 it's still kind of at a standstill. Nothing has moved
- 13 forward.
- 14 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Inspector
- 15 Wilson. And I know you have been meeting with the
- 16 Administration as well on this issue. And I'm glad
- 17 she's here tonight because it was Councilwoman Brenda
- Jones who had encourage us, the Board and the towers
- 19 and purchasing to go into locked door session, if you
- 20 will, and try to work something out. We believe we
- 21 did.
- The only problem is what we have worked out
- 23 has not been acted upon, and not been move forward.
- 24 And certainly I have a great deal of concern with that
- 25 especially when I still hear rumors that the Department



- 1 is going to use or the Administration, someone is
- 2 thinking about using a pilot program to take cars,
- 3 abandon vehicles and tow them to an impound lot.
- 4 As I told the Mayor in a private conversation
- 5 that when you use an impound lot that means Officers
- 6 whether they are active duty or nonactive duty will
- 7 have to sit there and watch cars sitting in the lot.
- And we think that is a poor resource, poor
- 9 use of public resources. As you said I think so well
- 10 that it's our job to try to get Police Officers moving
- 11 away from the towing business. And so, you know, in
- 12 your meetings, and I'll continue to go to in my
- 13 meetings, to encourage the Administration not to open
- 14 up any impound lots because we already have a physical
- 15 structure in place where aban vehicles can be towed to
- 16 and it has more than been adequate to handle the job.
- 17 INSPECTOR WILSON: Right. And the only thing
- 18 I would pretty much say is at all the meetings we call
- 19 Detroit Police Department we don't really have a dog in
- 20 the fight. A lot of these decisions as you are aware
- of are being made much above my pay grade and above the
- 22 Chief's pay grade.
- So if there's anything to be done as far as a
- 24 pilot program it will be something that will be coming
- 25 from the Mayor's Administration, not from the Chief's



- 1 Office. And as of this point the last discussions that
- 2 we had was everything was at a standstill right now.
- 3 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Unfortunately if that
- 4 happens we will issue injunctions to stop it.
- 5 INSPECTOR WILSON: Understood.
- 6 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Chief. Do you
- 7 have followup, Tom, to this?
- 8 MR. STIDHAM: I do. I just wanted to know if
- 9 the pilot program are there any plans to put it in
- 10 place anytime soon, a month or so, two months or?
- 11 INSPECTOR WILSON: Again, Inspector Charles
- 12 Wilson. As I stated, no, at this point everything is
- 13 pretty much at a standstill. I believe they have your
- 14 proposal which the Board in conjunction with the towers
- 15 presented and I believe they're reviewing that.
- 16 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. Great. Thank you,
- 17 sir.
- 18 MS. ROMANO: Good evening. Ann Romano. This
- 19 is just a friendly reminder for everyone that the
- 20 Detroit Police Department and Interim Chief Chester
- 21 Logan are holding a food drive for the Homeless
- 22 Veterans Shelters and they'll be collecting
- 23 nonperishable canned goods through November 12th and we
- 24 need everyone's participation.
- 25 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Absolutely.



- 1 MS. ROMANO: Thank you.
- 2 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Are there others who wish
- 3 to make comment? Okay. Yes, ma'am. I'm sorry, Anna,
- 4 the date for that food drive, the date for the food
- 5 drive?
- 6 MS. ROMANO: It's going on now until
- 7 November 12th.
- 8 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Until November 12th?
- 9 MS. ROMANO: Right, because we'll be
- 10 celebrating Veterans Day. Oh, I forgot to mention also
- 11 the Northeast District with Interim Chief Chester Logan
- 12 are having a Veterans Day Luncheon from 11:00 a.m. to
- 13 2:00 p.m., and I think the teletype was sent out to the
- 14 entire Department.
- 15 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. Thank you.
- 16 SPEAKER: Who's invited to the luncheon?
- MS. ROMANO: Everyone is. It's open to all
- 18 Veterans and the citizens.
- 19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Where's the location?
- 20 MS. ROMANO: James Post on Mound Road. It is
- 21 between East Nevada and Seven Mile. I do have the
- 22 address in the envelope if someone needs it.
- 23 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am.
- MS. SEMMA: Good evening, Board, Chief,
- 25 Assistant Chief, and everyone here today. In regards



- 1 to towing -- I'm sorry, Julie Semma, Seventies Towing,
- 2 in regards to the towing matters it is been brought to
- 3 all our attention that the City needs money. And
- 4 myself as well as other tow companies have come up with
- 5 ideas, strategies, where we can come up with an admin
- 6 fee and the City loved that, this is a way of the City
- 7 generating making money.
- 8 Myself and others have gone to City Council
- 9 and this has been well over a month and a half now and
- 10 I don't understand why the Administration keeps
- 11 stalling taking care of business. There's certain
- 12 structure that needs to happen within the City.
- And we came to certain solutions with your
- 14 help as well as other from City Council to come up with
- 15 a strategy and we've done that. Now, I don't
- 16 understand why the City is taking so long and just
- 17 stalling on making money. Because we could have made
- 18 money years ago if you guys, if the City and
- 19 Administration would have allowed this to happen three
- 20 or four years ago. We brought this to the City's
- 21 attention.
- However, here it is three or four years later
- and we're still back to the drawing board and it's over
- 24 a month and a half and nothing's still gotten done. So
- one minute the City needs money. We came up with



- 1 solutions for the City making money but the
- 2 Administration, the Mayor's office is stalling and not
- 3 allowing certain things to go in place.
- 4 Thanksgiving's right around the corner. City
- 5 Council is going on vacation here or taking a break and
- 6 who knows what's going to happen. But this is just
- 7 money, revenue that the City could potentially be
- 8 making if they'd work properly and get things in order.
- 9 So all I'm saying is if you guys could talk
- 10 to the Administration saying we're ready to do what we
- 11 have to do. The Administration just needs to do their
- 12 end and they can start generating some money so we can
- 13 get men in blue back on the streets and help generate
- 14 money for the City of Detroit. Thank you.
- 15 (Applause.)
- 16 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am. Are
- 17 there others who wish to make comments tonight? Are
- 18 there others? Hearing and seeing none, I'll entertain
- 19 a motion to adjourn the meeting?
- 20 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So move.
- 21 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second.
- 22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved
- 23 and supported. All those in favor?
- 24 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 25 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, ladies and
