- 20 Anthony, I'm going to ask if you could introduce
- 21 the rest of the staff for us, please, sir.
- 22 CHIEF OF STAFF ANTHONY: Thank you,
- Mr. Chair. For the record, George Anthony,
- 24 Secretary to the Board.
- We have present Ms. Pamela Davis-Drake,

9	That completes the introduction.
10	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
11	sir. I see the chaplain is in the house. Sir,
12	how you doing? Could you come and give us our
13	invocation for today? Thank you, sir.
14	(INVOCATION WAS GIVEN).
15	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir
16	appreciate seeing you again. At this time there
17	is no Chairperson's report. Just want to say
18	happy holidays to you all and those of you who
19	are celebrating either Passover and/or Easter
20	this weekend, God's blessings and God's speed to
21	you.
22	Is there an OCI report? Yes ma'am?
23	CHIEF INV. DAVIS-DRAKE: Good

afternoon. There's a short report. Mr. Chair,

our current statistics for OCI, we have 217 open

1	cases, we have 24 cases that are currently
2	submitted and pending closing and zero cases over
3	90 days.
4	The Department of Justice has signed
5	off on the modifications for standard operating
6	guidelines and we have submitted that document
7	for you for your review and for your adoption.
8	You also have a copy of the OCI 2013
9	Strategic Plan, that's in your packets as well
10	and that's for informational purposes. Most of
11	the items on that plan have already been
12	implemented, and that concludes my report.
13	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Any questions,
L 4	Commissioner? Madam Director I'm sorry, Chief
15	Investigator, I looked at the report online for
16	the SOP. What I did not see was what was
17	actually being revised.
18	CHIEF INV. DAVIS-DRAKE: I can send you
19	that. We have it or I can send you that.
20	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Can you send us
21	that version of it? I certainly read through the
22	report, but I just couldn't see what was being
23	changed.
24	CHIEF INV. DAVIS-DRAKE: No problem.



COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: So that would

1	be helpful. I also want to put on for the record
2	that OCI is in desperate need of some computers.
3	The computers that our people are typing on are
4	extremely slow and technology is a major
5	challenge in the office. As a matter of fact, we
6	need some more drop cords dropped from the
7	ceiling in the area. We have a section that we
8	need to activate quickly and we cannot hook up
9	anything to it because the apparatus to hook
10	everything up is not over there, so we'll reach
11	out to the IT person, Scott
12	CHIEF INV. DAVIS-DRAKE: Director Scott

COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,

1	Chief Investigator, appreciate it.
2	CHIEF INV. DAVIS-DRAKE: Thank you,
3	sir.
4	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Chief?
5	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Yes, sir. Just a
6	couple of things. One of the things I asked is
7	DC Tolbert, I've asked him to reach out to the
8	Board of Education Police and DC, could you give
9	the Board an overview on what you've been able to
10	accomplish thus far?
11	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Good afternoon,
12	Board. Deputy Chief James W. Tolbert, Patrol
13	Operations-West.
14	At the direction of the Chief I had
15	several meetings with the Detroit Public Schools
16	Police Department. What we were able to do was
17	come up with a workable SOP where we were
18	incorporating a lot of the redundancies on both
19	the DPD side of the house and the DPS side of the
20	house.
21	We have instituted a policy of when
22	calls come in to 9-1-1 if they are in fact DPS
23	related DPS should be the first responders to
24	that scene. There was actually some concern from
25	DPSPD the fact that they weren't even getting



1	notified and people were going over them straight
2	to the Detroit Police Department in some cases
3	when they obviously that's their whole purpose
4	in their being is to investigate instances that
5	happen on Detroit Public School property.
6	So we've instituted a process in
7	Communications where once a call is deemed to be
8	a DPS call, that call will in fact go to DPS.
9	And I just got off the phone with Commander
10	Bettison. We're trying to right now since the
11	inception of the reorganization find out how many
12	calls did we turn over to DPSPD. He's getting
13	those numbers now.
14	And going forward we're actually going
15	to put a flag in 9-1-1 so we'll know exactly when
16	we turn a call over to DPSPD. What this doesn't
17	negate, if there's an emergency situation we will
18	obviously respond, but if there's a case where
19	it's a non-emergency situation where DPS Police
20	should handle, they will in fact get that to
21	their Control Center and they will dispatch a car
22	to that, so we filled that gap.
23	We've also filled the gap on the
24	intelligence, DPS Intelligence and DPD



Intelligence working together in a concerted

1	effort to make sure that we're understanding
2	what's going on in the schools, we know the
3	situation, we know the gang situations in the
4	school.

And we also have developed a process where in the investigative process now we actually -- when a CRISNET report is made it is what we call duly assigned, assigned to the DPS folder and it's assigned to the DPD folder so if we have any instances where there are issues, they know what we know and we know what they know. So we simply have to do a search in the CRISNET system and go into the folder and find that out. It seems to be working.

There were two absolute examples of how the system works yesterday around two different schools. There was an individual shot, a school-age person shot, and DPS responded, arrested three people. There was another — shots fired around a school, Hope Academy, where Detroit responded away from the school, saw a person matching the description and arrested that individual.

So we have coverage of the schools, so we are continuing our partnership where we keep



1	everybody informed, we should have no issues at
2	the schools.
3	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Any questions,
4	ma'am?
5	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I just want to
6	know because I keep asking, DPS is that they
7	take the place of the Gang Squad? I'm just
8	trying to see how that correlates with the Gang
9	Squad.
10	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: No, ma'am. What
11	we have is when you say nobody takes the place
12	of the Gang Squad. What we did was we looked at
13	our resources and made sure that we have ample
14	coverage throughout the city because of the
15	people going back.
16	What you actually have is the people
17	from Gang Squad went back to the precincts. They
18	actually have kind of a force multiplier there
19	where that expertise in the various precincts is
20	then spread amongst the precincts as opposed to
21	being in a segmented deployment style so you have
22	a much larger coverage.
23	And we left with Gang Squad prior to
24	March 4 I believe Gang Squad was down to
25	approximately 40 some people. What you have now



1	is most of the Gang Squad people went to Special
2	Ops. What you have now is a force multiplier
3	where you've actually expanded that knowledge and
4	that base of knowledge that Gang Squad had to the
5	Special Operations or even the patrol force in
6	which they are now assigned.
7	COMMISSIONERS TAYLOR: Okay.
8	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: I might add that
9	the safety and security around the schools is a
10	responsibility of DPS, so we just brushed off our
11	SOP and just reminded them that we've got to do
12	this together now, that's all.
13	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Okay, that's all.
14	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Can we get a
15	copy of the SOP?
16	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Yes, sir, you'll
17	have it today, but there's one little thing that
18	needs to be changed and that's the paragraph that
19	talks about the investigations. When you read
20	the investigation, the one paragraph says that
21	we'll do homicides, rapes and robberies, but what
22	it should say is we'll do those investigations,
23	so
24	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Got you.
25	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: so I can get



1	it to you, but we'll still have to make that
2	correction.
3	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sure, thank
4	you, sir. So if I'm understanding you correctly
5	then, DPS security or officers are the first on
6	the scene, so now when, let's say, a student or a
7	teacher calls 9-1-1 and it's on campus at a DPS
8	school, who goes out or does it depend on the
9	situation?
10	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Absolutely it
11	will depend on the situation. Historically if
12	it's a non-emergency if it's a report run,
13	larceny or something of that nature, there will
14	be a vetting of that call, it will be taken by
15	the $9-1-1$ operator, transferred over to a
16	dispatcher and a dispatcher will dispatch it to
17	it will be given a HBO category and sent over
18	to the DPS Control Center and they will dispatch
19	a vehicle.
20	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: HBO, handle by
21	others.
22	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I was going to
23	ask.
24	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: And then on the
25	other side if there is an emergency situation,



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1	we'll take the call, we'll dispatch a car, we'll
2	still notify DPS that we're en route, but it's an
3	emergency situation and we will respond.
4	So to say that they will get there
5	first is not necessarily always going to be the
6	case.
7	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Correct. Now,
8	you had mentioned that Gang Squad members some
9	Gang Squad members went to Special Ops?
10	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Yes or they
11	went into the precincts. The precinct commanding
12	officers designated where they needed them and
13	where they wanted them.
14	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: So we still do
15	have Special Ops?
16	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: In the
17	precincts? Yes, sir.
18	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Sir, we never got
19	rid of Special Ops.
20	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Okay. Cool,
21	very good, thank you , sir.
22	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Not a problem,
23	sir.
24	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Sir, I might add
25	when we talk about DPS we had an extremely



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1	exciting basketball game with Cody, Denby and
2	Osborn at the Cass Tech on Saturday. Ms. Pannell
3	was there. I know she was rooting for the kids,
4	but we came back
5	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: You all could
6	not let the kids win, huh?
7	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Those kids were
8	good. That's the only thing I can say about
9	them. We beat them by four points, something
10	like 56 to 52.
11	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Anything else,
12	sir?
13	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Just a last thing
14	I have. For the last probably 10 weeks we've
15	been working in conjunction with the U.S.
16	Attorney General. They offered to give us a hand
17	on combatting violence in the city of Detroit.
18	That collaborative culminated last week with a
19	press conference at Northwest Activity Center
20	when the Mayor and the Attorney General announced
21	the creation of Detroit One.
22	But prior to them kicking off Detroit
23	One we had started doing some vanguard work in
24	terms of narcotics and some of our patrol
25	operations. And I just want to give you some



1	totals on what we came up with so far. This is
2	through three weeks, and these are cumulative
3	totals.
4	Over the last three weeks we've made
5	372 arrests, 154 felony arrests, 218 misdemeanor
6	arrests. We brought in four juveniles. We've
7	investigated 4,259 persons, 3,330 vehicles.
8	We've confiscated 44 handguns, 18 long
9	guns and 10 assault rifles. We've conducted 207
10	narcotics raids, 40 street enforcement raids.
11	We've issued 7,035 tickets of various kinds.
12	We've issued 200 miscellaneous
13	warrants. We've towed this should be
14	interesting to you we've towed 766 vehicles,
15	and the biggest part of that is people who don't
16	have the necessary licenses or they're driving
17	with their license suspended and the like.
18	We've confiscated 3,032.5 grams of
19	cocaine with a street value of \$1,213,000. We've
20	gotten 332 grams of heroin with a street value
21	of \$597,000.
22	We've gotten 94,502 grams of marijuana
23	with a street value of \$945,000, various pills
24	valued at \$8,000. So when you add up all the
25	drugs that we've been able to take off the street



Page 16 1 in the last three weeks, it comes up to -- the street value would be \$2,764,000 and we brought 2 in a total of \$92,000. 3 4 Now, this operation only runs on 5 Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays and so this is a 6 total of nine days this operation has been used. We anticipate great things. 7 Our homicide total is down almost 10 8 9 percent, our non-fatal shootings are down 10 approaching 20 percent, so we're starting to see traction in what we're doing. 11 12 So that's my report to the Board. 13 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Any questions 14 for the Chief? 15 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: No. 16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sir, when these 17 cars that were towed, those 700 cars that were towed, were they towed to the Number 1 Impound or 18 were they towed to the authorized towers? 19 20 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: I'm certain, sir, 2.1 they were towed to the authorized towers. 22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All right. Can 23 we get a report just to make sure? 24 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Yes, sir.



COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: And then the

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1	cash that is received from these raids, are they
2	is that money split between the agencies or
3	does that come back to Detroit?
4	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: This money will
5	come back to Detroit because this is strictly
6	Narcotics, our Narcotics doing this. If it were
7	a major drug operation it would be split among
8	the agencies, but this is strictly us.
9	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: So all of
10	this
11	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Everything I've
12	read to you is Detroit.
13	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: And was that a
14	special task force made up of like different
15	special units or was that just Narcotics?
16	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: For the most part
17	it was Narcotics and we worked some officers on
18	overtime. We paid the officers on overtime from
19	other forfeiture funds, so that's how it was
20	being done.
21	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It was noted at
22	our meeting last just so you know, it was
23	noted at our meeting last week, Chief, we had no
2.4	idea that this initiative was going on We had



no idea that the announcement was being made that

1	day and the Board would really like to be a
2	partner with the department and with the City
3	when those types of things are going on.
4	I just think, you know, it not only
5	looks bad and not only does it feel bad, but it
6	is bad when the policy making Board of the
7	department has no idea that this type of
8	initiative is moving forward.
9	And I know a lot of this comes from
10	across the street from the administration, from
11	the Mayor, so you are unfortunately getting the
12	speech that I would give him if he was sitting
13	right there in that chair, but it doesn't show
14	cohesiveness nor does it show a collaborative or
15	corroborative spirit between the Board and the
16	department and the administration, especially the
17	administration when things like that is done.
18	Certainly we're happy that, you know,
19	the streets are getting cleaned up, but you know
20	certainly we want to be included on what's going
21	on and why.
22	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Yes, sir. I
23	would just add that I was an invitee also.
24	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I understand.
25	I get you clearly. We will forward our minutes



1	over to the appropriate folks, it's not a
2	problem.
3	But anything else, sir?
4	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: No, sir, that's
5	about all I have right now.
6	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
7	appreciate it, and certainly want to congratulate
8	the department for beating up on the kids.
9	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Sir, those were
10	junior all-stars.
11	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I do want to
12	say this to that vein though. This week well,
13	this past weekend there was a high school
14	playoffs up in East Lansing and there was a
15	couple of schools who were involved, but one
16	school in particular, Detroit Community High
17	School which is right down the street from my
18	church in Brightmoor made it to the semi-finals
19	and did a really great job and I think lost by
20	just a few points in the semi-finals one point
21	actually in the semi-finals to make it to the
22	finals no, actually they made it to the
23	finals, I'm sorry.
24	They made it to the finals and I was at
25	both games and they represented the city of



1	Detroit extremely well and I want to present them
2	with a resolution from the department and from
3	the Board, just waiting to get their information
4	and as soon as we get their information I will
5	send it over to you and we want to recognize them
6	for just the outstanding job they did in getting
7	that far.
8	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Sir, I might add
9	one other thing. There was an announcement about
10	the group of business people coming together
11	donating some cars.
12	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yes, sir.
13	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: So it looks like
14	within the next 60 to 90 days we're going to have
15	almost a new fleet, somewhere around 100
16	vehicles. Also EMS is supposed to get 23 rigs.
17	So I did a segment on American Black Journal and
18	on the way there I did a segment on Frank
19	Beckman's radio show and as we talked I asked
20	him, "Doesn't this make you proud to be a
21	Detroiter?" He was you know, he fumbled, but
22	he said, "Yeah, I'm proud to be a Detroiter", and
23	I said the same thing on the American Black
24	Journal show this morning.



I kind of stunned the moderator with

1	that statement, but I think this is the time to
2	really take a look at how good we've got it.
3	We've got some hard times to face, but I think
4	Detroit is a wonderful city. Detroit is on the
5	way back and there's nothing for us to hang our
6	heads about.
7	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yes, sir and
8	certainly we appreciate that. Now, with the
9	donation of the new cars what does that do for
10	the ones that we had on order? Are we still
11	because there were some that were on order. Are
12	we still ordering those or no?
13	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: We should have
14	those I think when we first ordered them it
15	was 2011.
16	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Right, right.
17	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: We should have
18	those vehicles in fact I talked to the
19	gentleman from Chrysler who you know, the
20	fleet sales, and we should have those vehicles in
21	short order. We've kind of changed them, we're
22	going to put markings on them. We're going to
23	bring them down here so the Board can review
24	them.



These cars, most of them will be black.

1	We're going to have some white ones for traffic.
2	They will be all Dodge Chargers. The new cars
3	that we get with the the 100 should be a
4	combination of Chrysler, Ford and General Motors.
5	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: And to that end
6	I saw the graphics that was at the press
7	conference on the cars. Those are not going to
8	be the graphics that's going to be on the new
9	police cars, are they?
10	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: With the
11	silhouette of downtown Detroit?
12	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yes.
13	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: I don't think so.
14	I don't think they're going to get into the
15	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I just didn't
16	think that was cute, but yeah, right, great news,
17	very very good news. And someone had asked me to
18	ask you, we do have the budget to maintain all
19	those new vehicles, right?
20	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: They're going to
21	be maintaining them.
22	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Oh, they are?
23	That's outstanding, very good, very very good.
24	Well, thank you, sir, appreciate it, appreciate
25	all that.



1	And, you know, obviously what we want
2	this to translate to is, you know, more police in
3	the neighborhoods when citizens call they spend
4	minimal time getting their calls answered.
5	Obviously that's the end game for us and we've
6	been preaching and talking about getting more
7	citizens involved because we think that's the
8	real thing that's going to help clean up the
9	streets is getting citizens actively involved in
10	the process of partnering with the police.
11	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Sir, I just want
12	to add one other thing. Yesterday it was our
13	pleasure to have a sit-down meeting with the new
14	EFM, that was the hierarchy of the police
15	department, Director Porter, DC Tolbert and the
16	other ACs and DCs and we were collectively I
17	think we were very encouraged.
18	He listened, he listened very
19	attentively and
20	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Don't say that
21	too loud to encourage people to beat you up.
22	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: He made he
23	listened to what we had to say, but correct me if
24	I'm wrong, the director, were you impressed with
25	him?



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Page 24 1 DIRECTOR PORTER-COLEMAN: Yes, I was. 2 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Is that it? 3 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: That's it, sir. 4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir, 5 appreciate it. Oh --6 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Yes, sir. If I could, as you well know -- well, as the Board 7 8 knows, the Mayor has approved us hiring -- we're 9 losing officers at a tremendous rate. I think 10 we've got 23 we're losing just this month alone, 11 so we've got to back-fill. 12 Now, that's not going to really -- you 13 know, hiring, it's not going to put a lot more 14 officers on the street. In fact, we'll probably 15 still have less, but at least it helps get us out 16 of the hole. 17 The bad part about it is that those 18 officers probably won't be in a position to help the city until 2015. Well, it takes a while --19 20 it takes a while to recruit, it takes six to 2.1 seven months to get through the academy. That 22 puts it at January 1 of 2014, and it takes about 23 a year before you want to put a police officer 24 out there by his or herself.



So it's going to -- it's a long

1	process. It's a big investment, but we got to
2	get started someplace. Director Porter promises,
3	she promises that we're going to have two classes
4	by June. This is not only something that I share
5	and I'm certain the Board shares. This is a
6	concern that everybody we talk to shares that
7	we've got to get our department re-invigorated.
8	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Absolutely.
9	Thank you, sir. Oh, oh, last thing is my request
10	to you. With the advent of the new cars coming,
11	can we have our five cars back? I'm talking
12	about the five cars for OCI, the reason being we
13	were they were sharing cars. All of our
14	investigators gave up their individual cars and
15	began to share cars and when they took five cars
16	away, it made the situation even more complicated
17	trying to do the investigations.
18	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Yes, sir. Would
19	you just let me take a hard look at that. One of
20	the problems we're having is our IOU units, there
21	are four people that share the car.
22	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Who is IOU?
23	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: The investigators
24	that do the investigative work in the precincts,
25	so we're really down cars all the way around. If



1	we can come up with some extra money our hope is
2	to get some new general cars, but we will
3	definitely take a look at it and since you said
4	that's what you want, we'll work it out; somehow
5	we'll work it out.
6	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Appreciate it
7	greatly. Anything else for the Chief?
8	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: No.
9	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you. We
10	obviously do not have a quorum so we cannot vote
11	on the written directives, we will do that at the
12	very next meeting that we have quorum.
13	Our next meeting will be held on
14	Thursday, April 4, 2013 right here at police
15	headquarters.
16	At this time the agenda calls for oral
17	communications from the audience. If you wish to
18	address the Board of Police Commissioners, you
19	may come at this time. Please give us your name
20	and spell it for our recorder and we ask that you
21	abide by our two-minute limit that Mr. Brown is
22	will be holding up the signs so we can hear
23	from as many people as possible and direct your
24	comments to the Chair and we'll take it from



there.

2	MS. PANNELL: Good afternoon, Sharon
3	Pannell.
4	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Good afternoon.
5	MS. PANNELL: I was rooting for the
6	police, stop that. I want to know what about the
7	B&Es, first of all. Then I want to know about,
8	you know, the baseball games is going to start
9	up. I was wondering if you if the games are
10	on Thursday would you think about changing the
11	venue because the parking is so high down here
12	and I won't be able to come if you don't change
13	it.
14	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Well, thank you
15	first of all, thank you, Ms. Pannell and I
16	actually used you as an example in the community
17	forum last week of citizens getting involved and
18	changing what happened in neighborhoods, just so
19	you know, gave you a shout-out.
20	But we will change the meetings that
21	when we have games on Thursdays, and the staff

23	they will probably be at Central District more
24	than likely unless, you know, there's a

9	was wondering have they came down any and have
L O	they came down any in my area in Northwest?
11	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: I can't speak
12	specifically to your area, but that's probably
13	the area that we've experienced our biggest drop
14	in is break-ins. One of the things and I'm
15	certain you'll be there so I'm going to go ahead
16	and invite you first.
17	We're going to start opening up our
18	weekly crime briefings to the community so you
19	can come in and see exactly what we're doing.
20	couple of weeks ago a reporter by the name of
21	Nolan Finley wrote, to me, just a terrible
22	article about the Detroit Police Department, so
23	what we were able to do was invite him to the
24	meeting, our CAM meeting Tuesday. And he wrote



an article that's in today's paper which is not

1	really that flattering, but it goes to show the
2	kind of work we do.
3	And I think it's important for the
4	community to start to understand what we're
5	trying to do out there so you can hold your
6	commander accountable. You've got Vicki Yost,
7	right?
8	MS. PANNELL: Yes. She has not been to
9	one of our meetings yet, but they told me don't
10	worry about it, the other police told me they got
11	me.
12	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Okay.
13	MS. PANNELL: When is that meeting
14	going to be because I'm going on vacation?
15	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: It's going to be
16	we're going to start that process sometime in
17	April.
18	MS. PANNELL: Okay, I'm going to go on
19	vacation in April, so don't have it from the 10th
20	to the 15th.
21	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Yes, ma'am.
22	MS. PANNELL: Thank you.
23	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
24	ma'am, thank you. Good afternoon.
25	MS. CAMPBELL: Good afternoon. I have

2	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I'm sorry, your
3	name?
4	MS. CAMPBELL: My name is Shay
5	Campbell. Mr. Warfield, I have left you multiple
6	messages with your secretary. I've also left

17	gentleman on tape where on March 9th he punctured
18	my car tires with a knife and it is on videotape
19	from Motor City Casino and has not done so.
20	And when I asked him, he says, "Oh, I
21	talked to them and I'll go out there" and the
22	ultimate bottom line, I've been being treated,
23	Chief Logan, so disrespectfully by your staff
24	members from your operators of telephone crime
25	report to Sgt. Stubbs that answers on telephone

I want to put a restraining order and the officer is not willing to cooperate with me in order to get this man's full name so that I might be able to not only have charges brought against him, have a restraining order and sue him and I've not gotten any return phone calls other than ducking and dodging.

I've even had hostile, rude, abrupt treatment even when I tried leaving a message with Mr. Anthony and don't understand for me to just be a woman, a citizen, who drives cabs part time, also homeless, why must I be disrespected by your staff.

20	this company aware that they have this gentleman
21	on tape threatening me.
22	How long do I have to keep being
23	threatened night after night with a physical gun
24	in my face?
25	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Ms. Campbell,



1	we can talk after the meeting, we'll be hanging
2	around here after the meeting, we can talk after
3	the meeting, but we have other citizens who wish
4	to talk as well, but we would certainly love to
5	talk with you right after the meeting.
6	MS. CAMPBELL: So you're not just going
7	to brush me off as soon as it ends and then tell
8	me you don't have the time, is that correct?
9	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Again,
10	Ms. Campbell, we'll talk to you right after the
11	meeting.
