5	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All right. Good evening,
6	ladies and gentlemen again and welcome to the Board of
7	Detroit Police Commissioners meeting. My name is Jerome
8	Warfield, chairman of the Board of Police Commissioners.
9	Serving with me tonight is our vice chairperson,
10	Commissioner Jessica Taylor, as well as Commissioner
11	Donnell White. Representing the Chief's office is
12	Interim Chief Chester Logan. Sir, good to see you
13	tonight.
14	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Glad to be here.
15	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Also sitting at the table
16	before you today is our chief of staff, Mr. George
17	Anthony. And I'm going to ask that the Board
18	secretary/chief of staff he's everything if he
19	would introduce our staff that's here tonight.
20	SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Mr. Chair. For
21	the record, George Anthony, secretary to the Board. Our
22	staff includes Miss Pamela Davis-Drake, who is our chief
23	investigator seated in the front. Next to her is
24	Ms. Lolitha Porter-Coleman who is our director of police
25	personnel. And then there's Miss Celia Banks Washington

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who the attorney to the Board. Our recorders - Mr. Robert Brown, our office manager, Sergeant Allen
 Quinn who is recording our proceedings and Ms. Wendy
 Boer from Hanson Court Reporting Service. That
 completes the introductions.

6 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Anthony. 7 At this time, I'm going to ask if Chaplain Powell could 8 come to the mic. And, sir, happy New Year to you again 9 and good to see you. If you can lead us in our 10 invocation tonight, we greatly would appreciate that.

CHAPLAIN POWELL: Let us look to the Lord. 11 Lord God of Grace, in the name of Jesus, we thank and 12 13 praise you for your keeping power and your blessing power for blessing us throughout, Lord God, last year 14 and starting us, Lord, on another year. Ask you, Lord 15 16 God, just to bless this, Lord God, Board of Commissioners, look down upon our Chief, look down upon 17 18 or Mayor and look down upon everyone that's in this building today. 19

Lord, we ask you just to bless our police officers, strengthen them, let your blessings be upon them, Lord God, and protect them. Help us, Lord God, to do your will. Help us to love one another. And help us, Lord God, to spread your love across the city. Lord, we ask that you just touch and protect us from all



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1 danger both seen and unseen. Help us to draw our minds together to make this a great city. And let your 2 blessings be upon us, Lord. We ask you, Lord, again to 3 just to bless each and every one of us that is in this 4 5 building. We thank you and we praise you. We magnify your wonderful name. Let us all say Amen. 6 AUDIENCE: Amen. 7 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Pastor Powell. 8 We appreciate that greatly. We are delighted and 9 10 pleased to be here at what I could consider historic Messiah Missionary Baptist Church with Pastor Littlejohn 11 who is the under shepherd here. And certainly if there 12 13 is someone from the church who would like to extend a greeting, you may -- you're welcome to come at this time 14 15 and to extend a greeting on behalf of Messiah Baptist 16 Church if there is anyone here. Amen. Well, thank you. 17 It was funny. We were coming in the door, and 18 as some of you may have noticed, the choir is rehearsing across the hall. And, you know, if it wouldn't have 19 20 been against the Charter, I would have loved to just had 21 the meeting in the auditorium and had a good praise fest going on tonight. 22 23 But we are happy to be here. This church means a lot to this community. I know Pastor Littlejohn 24

personally. He is a wonderful, wonderful man of God.



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1 And we thank him for his leadership. For those of you 2 who are here for the first time, certainly we welcome 3 you. And for those who are our faithful followers, we 4 certainly welcome you. Want to just give just some 5 brief information about the Board of Police 6 Commissioners.

The Board of Police Commissioners was created 7 by City Charter in 1974. Currently, it is composed of 8 9 five members, next year to move to 11 members. The 10 commissioners serve -- that are appointed for a five-year term and may not serve more than five years 11 consecutively. Those when they will be elected will 12 13 serve four-year terms. The commission meets once a week 14 with the exception of the New Years holiday, the 15 Christmas holiday and the Thanksgiving holiday. All 16 meetings are certainly open to the public. Our duties 17 and responsibilities are primarily to establish policy, 18 rules and regulations in consultation with the chief of police and with the mayor of the City of Detroit. Our 19 job is also to review and approve the department's 20 21 budget, to review and to approve department promotions, 22 to receive and to resolve complaints concerning the 23 operations of the Detroit Police Department.

24 We have final authority to impose and/or to 25 review discipline of police department employees. We



Page 7 also appoint a civilian personnel director who handles the personnel issues for the Detroit Police Department. We prepare an annual report of the department activities for the public, for the mayor and also for the Detroit City Council. Our staff consists of a secretary -- you have met him tonight -- Mr. George Anthony who serves as secretary to the Board and attends all Board meetings.

8 We also have a chief investigator -- you met her tonight 9 -- and additional investigators. Other staff we are 10 able to bring on board as necessary to provide the 11 support needed by this Board. At this time, I will 12 entertain a motion to approve tonight's agenda as 13 listed.

14 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So moved.

15 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

16 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved 17 and supported. Any discussion? Hearing or seeing none, 18 all those in favor of approving tonight's agenda please 19 say aye.

20 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

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21 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed, you 22 have the same right. We also entertain a motion to 23 approve the minutes from Thursday, December 20th 24 meeting, 2012.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: So moved.



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1	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Support.
2	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved
3	and supported that we will approve those minutes from
4	Thursday, December 20th. All those in favor?
5	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
6	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed? Motion
7	carries. At this time, I'm going to defer my report and
8	go straight to the chief of police and ask for the Chief
9	for his report and presentation.
10	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Thank you, sir. We have
11	just a quick couple of presentations. First of all, I
12	am not certain from the 12th Precinct who is going to be
13	doing the presentation. I would imagine the commander,
14	Commander Dwayne Love, is going to give us an overview
15	of the 12th Precinct.
16	COMMANDER LOVE: Good evening, Board. Chief,
17	greetings. Before I get started, I would like to
18	introduce some of my staff members at the 12th Precinct.
19	Start off with Inspector Kyriacou who is over the 10th
20	Precinct, but he works under me as well. Inspector
21	Kyriacou, Sergeant Bledsoe in the back, Officer Crowder
22	and Officer Frinkley . And that's
23	my community relations team. And they do a really good
24	job at what they do.
25	I've got a brief presentation. They said ten



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slides. So we kept it to ten slides. The 12th 1 2 Precinct, the boundaries are -- they come up to be 15.65 square miles. The precinct is bounded on the 3 north by west 8 Mile Road, on the south by Lyndon. And 4 it's not an actual square. So it's like a rectangular 5 in shape. So, the southern borders, you got Lyndon and 6 at one point it's Fenkell. At the other point, it's the 7 railroad tracks down by the 10th, down by -- in that 8 9 area. The eastern most points are Woodward, and the 10 western most points are James Couzens, closer to 8 Mile and Schaefer when it gets down toward 6 Mile. 11

The population of the 12th Precinct is 12 13 approximately 92,091 people. In the precinct, we got five elementary schools; five elementary/middle schools, 14 15 K thorough 8 and then Pre-K; four high schools, two 16 private schools and one prep and one public school which 17 is Mumford, Mumford High; two colleges, that is U of D and Marygrove. And we have two private pre-K through 18 8th grade schools. And we have over 300 combined 19 20 churches in our precinct.

12th Precinct organization, the manpower,
we've got one commander there right now which of course
is me. The inspector spot is vacant at this time. We
have four lieutenants in the precinct, 15 sergeants, 123
police officers and three civilian detention officers.



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1 The mission and goal of the precinct is to reduce crime, increase response time. And I'm doing that by 2 challenging my supervisors to actually monitor the 3 officers' activities more, be out there monitoring what 4 5 they do, also looking at the patrol time to make sure that they clear up a run fast when they're on patrol so 6 when another run comes out, they can respond quickly to 7 8 the police run. Increase community partnerships among 9 citizens, businesses, and community and to serve the 10 community effectively. Our arrest totals for last year, 2012, total 11 arrests was 1,548. We had 800 felony arrests, 468 12 13 misdemeanor arrests, 280 juvenile arrests, 13,423

tickets issued and 605 vehicles recovered.

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15 Some of our goals for the next year, 2013, is 16 at least a five percent reduction in non-fatal and fatal 17 shootings and a ten percent reduction in part one 18 crimes. Some things I'm doing to help out with that is I started a little -- a small -- it's not -- I quess 19 20 it's something like an investigative in-house unit at 21 the precinct. And what they are doing, they're analyzing all our shootings, non-fatal and fatal. And 22 23 they are analyzing the robberies and the burglaries in the precinct. And they're doing follow-up in the 24 25 precinct and giving me real time information so we can

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deploy our resources accordingly. And that's been very helpful. They also -- I'm putting the dots on the map where the crimes are occurring at so I will have a good idea of how to deploy my people to the areas that need to be covered right away in real time.

6 We also coordinate our efforts with the 10th 7 Precinct because I have both the 10th and 12th Precinct. 8 So, I've been talking to Inspector Kyriacou, and we are 9 coordinating efforts a lot to combine to deal with both 10 precincts and also deployment of our special ops, which 11 is our plain clothes officers.

As a department, we do a lot of analyzing 12 13 crime. We have conference calls daily. We have com 14 stat meetings. And we constantly look at where the 15 crimes are occurring at. So, I have a system now where 16 I can -- I'm taking information from these meetings and 17 just looking at the crimes on the map and deploying my 18 special ops people to the high crime areas. They are doing a great job and working very hard and making some 19 20 really good arrests. So that's working pretty good.

Partnerships, doing the partnerships with the community. We have community relations. They help with the block club associations. And I have meetings with the associations myself a lot too. I do a lot of meetings in the 12th Precinct. We have a lot of



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1 community groups. And I meet all the time with CB 2 patrols, block clubs and any council group as a whole. We have citizen radio patrols that we help out with a 3 lot, 12th Precinct community relations volunteers that 4 5 help us out with our efforts to bond with the community, blight enforcement. We have senior movie day which is 6 the first Wednesday of every month, we take seniors to 7 the Bell Air show, theatre. And they pay \$5, and they 8 9 get a movie and concessions for that \$5. And it's a 10 very good program. The 10th Precinct does it as well.

Youth Explorers program, Parks and Walks. And 11 we encourage our officers to walk in the community as 12 13 much as possible so when they are not on police runs and when it's feasible to do it, I will tell them get out of 14 the car and walk the community, be seen in the 15 community. No Broken Windows, which is an initiative by 16 17 a community group that we are dealing with. And what they are doing, they are repainting buildings, 18 repainting gang tagging and graffiti. And what we do at 19 20 the 12th Precinct, we actually provide security for 21 them, police protection for them while they go out and paint over the graffiti. So that's a good thing as well 22 23 because, you know, the look of the area is very important to the people that live in the area. 24

Safe passage to school. And every morning, I



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have my community relations out and our traffic 1 enforcement officers going to different bus stops around 2 schools, in the areas of the schools so we can make sure 3 that the kids have a safe route to and from school as 4 well as dismissal time as well. 5

Child safety seat inspections. And my 6 community relations, they provide that service. 7 Charitable contributions, food basket distributions, 8 9 smoke alarm batteries we give out. We had a seniors 10 appreciation ball at Focus Hope this year which was outstanding. Retired Inspector Terry, that was her 11 initiative; that was her baby. And I came, and the 12 13 Chief was there. And it was a great, great event. So, 14 I was very proud of that.

Turkey giveaways. During the holidays, Coats 15 16 for Tots events, Christmas events. That was another 17 thing former Inspector Terry did as well. And she provided a lot of kids with toys. That was a great 18 event. And Goodfellows boxes. 19

20 Keeping our citizens informed, monthly 21 community meetings, relations meetings. And I make all of those for both precincts. We do a monthly newsletter 22 23 that we send out to all our community. And we actually 24 have one-on-one's with our community groups as well. 25

So, I always tell the community, whenever you



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1	want to meet with me, I'm available. And Number 12,
2	they take me up on it because I do a lot of meetings.
3	I'm trying to get Number 10 to come up to that standard
4	as well as far as meetings. But one-on-one meetings are
5	very important. I get a chance to find out exactly what
6	the concerns are in that particular area. And we work
7	out a lot of things where I can take care of that there,
8	the quality of life issues as well as the crime
9	problems. And just knowing is half the battle. That's
10	the important part about meeting with them. It's a
11	really good system. And I said I was going to be brief.
12	And that's all I have. So, any questions at all?
13	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Commander.
14	Appreciate it. Ma'am?
15	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Yes. I just have one
16	question. You said you utilize the block clubs for your
17	partnerships. And I think I heard you say you have 300
18	churches in this area. I just want to ask, do you
19	utilize the churches in that partnership? And if so,
20	what services do they offer to assist the police
21	officers in crime reduction?
22	COMMANDER LOVE: I cannot say that I have
23	actually partnered with the churches in that effort.
24	So, I won't sit here and say that. Of course, if a
25	church reaches out to me, I'll be available to whatever



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they need. And that's a good idea. Maybe we will start 1 2 reaching out to the churches as well. But I have not done that since I have been here so far. 3 4 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you. 5 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Chair. Commander Love, you reference the fact that U of D and 6 Marygrove are within your district there. Do you see 7 any collaboration and possibly even with Highland Park 8 9 PD like you might see in midtown with Wayne State 10 University, is there any strategic partnerships between the agencies? 11 COMMANDER LOVE: I know for a fact that my 12 13 special ops works with U of D a lot with their crime 14 fighting efforts. I'm not for sure about Marygrove. 15 But I know U of D, we have a good partnership. 16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And does Marygrove have 17 their own? 18 COMMANDER LOVE: They do have their own 19 police, yes. I don't know if they are actually police. 20 They might be just security. But they do have a 21 security force for the college. 22 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Is it strictly on campus 23 or do they patrol off campus? It's on campus and around the 24 COMMANDER LOVE: 25 immediate area of campus.

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1 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Highland Park? 2 COMMANDER LOVE: I have not spoken to Highland 3 Park. We do border Highland Park. If a crime happens 4 on the border, of course we work together with it. We 5 don't really -- it's not a regular thing for me to reach 6 out to Highland Park. But we do deal with border issues 7 together.

8 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Okay. How has the 9 12-hour shifts and the virtual precinct model been 10 working and been received by officers within your 11 district?

COMMANDER LOVE: It's funny you asked me that 12 13 because I just chaired a committee for the Chief. And I don't know what the Chief wants to handle that. I don't 14 15 want to divulge that right now. But it's -- some 16 officers like it and some don't. It depends on where --17 the people you ask and the precincts you ask. Some 18 precincts were in favor of eight and some were in favor I know as a department, it has helped us with 19 of 12. 20 our crime fighting efforts with the 12-hour shifts 21 because it has allowed us to put more vehicles on the 22 street during the night time hours. But then it's --23 you know, some of the officers, they have issues with 24 that as well. I don't want to say too much because I don't want to get in trouble. 25



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COMMISSIONER WHITE: I understand. 1 And the virtual precinct model, how is that working? 2 COMMANDER LOVE: It's working well. We go 3 into the virtual mode at 7:00 p.m. I haven't heard of 4 any issues. I have not -- some of the citizens don't 5 6 like it. But as far as issues, I have not been aware of any issues with it at all. We service the community. 7 And I haven't heard of any issues with the virtual 8 9 precincts. COMMISSIONER WHITE: Has that model enabled 10 you to increase your officer presence? 11 COMMANDER LOVE: Absolutely. I believe they 12 13 cut our inside desk staff probably more than in half and 14 put officers on the street on patrol. So, it has helped 15 with our manpower and our crime fighting efforts as far as allocations on the street. 16 17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, sir. Last 18 question. When it -- special ops has been one of the teams I've been out with probably over the past year 19 20 and I think I started off with over at 10 and 12. I think you might have had one of the oldest fleets I have 21 22 seen that special ops was using. Have you received any 23 new vehicles or has there been any improvement to the 24 fleet for your special ops team? 25 COMMANDER LOVE: I'm trying to think of the



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1	last time we received new vehicles. I don't have that
2	on hand. We have enough vehicles to adequately patrol
3	right now. My officers have not came to me recently and
4	told me that they needed new vehicles, that their
5	vehicles were inadequate. As far as I know right now,
6	we have enough and adequate vehicles for them to patrol.
7	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Chair.
8	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Commander.
9	Sir, this is time for you to also if there are resources
10	or things that you need the Board to look into from a
11	policy or resource standpoint, we certainly want to hear
12	that as well. So, if there are issues out there that we
13	need to, you know, focus on and concentrate on, please
14	let us know.
15	COMMANDER LOVE: None right now, sir.
16	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I do want to ask a
17	question about your officers, your community service
18	officers. If citizens who are here want to get in
19	contact with them and call, what number should they
20	call?
21	COMMANDER LOVE: Sergeant Bledsoe?
22	SERGEANT BLEDSOE: 596-1221.
23	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: 596-1221. So, you can
24	give them a call.
25	COMMANDER LOVE: They are there. They work



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1 very well with the community. When I meet with the groups -- I meet with a lot of groups. And they have 2 nothing but praise for Sergeant Bledsoe and her team. 3 They work very, very hard. And I have a really 4 demanding community. So, they do a great job. 5 6 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Absolutely. Any other questions for Commander Love? Thank you, sir. 7 Appreciate your presentation. 8 9 SERGEANT BLEDSOE: I just have one thing. 10 Someone is driving a white Range Rover. It is parked on Greenlawn in the alley. Would you please remove your 11 vehicle? You're blocking the pastor's vehicle, and he 12 13 needs to leave. CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Can you just move it and 14 15 bring me my keys back? I was just joking. Sometimes it 16 will work. Chief, is there anything else? 17 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Yes, sir. Just to clear 18 up a couple of things. You inquired about the vehicles for -- I'm sorry, Commissioner White inquired about the 19 20 vehicles for special ops. We are waiting on an order of 52 new vehicles. They were supposed to be 2012 Dodge 21 Chargers. But for whatever reason, to get through the 22

bureaucracy, now they're going to be 2013's. We are
expecting those vehicles in probably within the next 30
to 60 days. Those vehicles will be going to all the

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1 special operations units around the city. So that's what they will be driving. Instead of the black Crown 2 Vic's, they will be driving the Dodge Chargers. 3 4 Also, with regard to the issue of 12-hour 5 shifts, we are kind of reluctant to speak on that right 6 now because as you are aware, the department is now in Act 312. And those are some of the issues that are 7 being bandied around, the 12-hour shift versus other 8 9 things that the union is asking for. And also, I noticed when Commander Love talked about response time, 10 he used the word increase, but I think you meant to use 11 12 the word decrease response time. 13 COMMANDER LOVE: Yes, sir. INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: So, that's all I have 14 15 with regards to the commander's excellent presentation. 16 Thank you so much. And I just had one other thing. CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Sure. 17 18 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: The last thing I would ask that the Board consider the promotions that I 19 20 requested, you know, several weeks ago. As you are 21 aware, the department sorely needs the resources. And 2.2 I'm making that request again. 23 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Let me say this to that 24 directly on behalf of the Board. Certainly, we have 25 been vetting the list of those who are on the promotion



Page 21 1 list. We only have one thing to check, and I think that 2 we'll be ready to move. And so hopefully -- and certainly Board members can speak up -- but we should be 3 able to move hopefully within the next week on that. 4 5 We're just waiting to hear back from legal on one 6 particular item. And so once we get the clarity on that item, we will be able to move forward. 7 8 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Thank you, sir. 9 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. Board, do you have 10 any questions for the Chief? COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I don't. 11 12 COMMISSIONER WHITE: No, sir. 13 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All right. There are no 14 standing or committee reports. I want to move to one of 15 the favorite parts of the agenda for us. And that's 16 when we get an opportunity to highlight the outstanding 17 community support that our local precincts get from the 18 residents in the area. And for that, I'm going to ask if Commissioner -- the vice chair of our Board, 19 20 Commissioner Taylor, will come and offer Resolutions to 21 Mr. Darrin Cato and doing a separate resolution, retired 22 Sergeant Daniel Williams. Mr. Cato, are you here? Can 23 you come to the front right now, sir? Give him a hand 24 as he comes, please.

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COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Resolution Honoring



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1 Mr. Darrin Cato. Whereas Mr. Darrin Cato, born and raised in the 12th Precinct community, remains a pillar 2 in his neighborhood. His commitment to service and 3 leadership is exemplified throughout the community; and 4 5 whereas Mr. Cato has been instrumental in building bridges between the community and the Detroit Police 6 Department, always contributing with efforts to improve 7 neighborhood safety and quality of life, and whereas 8 9 Mr. Cato's passionate participation at the Twelfth 10 Precinct has been a positive force with the beautification efforts, cutting the lawn, trimming 11 edging, and planting flowers. Mr. Cato and his three 12 13 sons are a great source of strength to their neighborhood. 14

7 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: We are happy to have with
8 us tonight the Honorable Councilwoman, Brenda Jones.
9 Give her a hand as she comes to the mic.

10 COUNCILWOMAN JONES: I also have a Spirit of Detroit Award to present to you. And it reads, "A 11 12 Spirit of Detroit Award is presented herewith as an 13 expression of the gratitude and the esteem of the citizens of Detroit to Mr. Darrin Cato in recognition of 14 15 exceptional achievement, outstanding leadership and 16 dedication to improving the quality of life," signed by 17 all nine council members. Thank you for you what you do 18 in the community.

19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Then, sir, one more. Stay20 right there if you can.

21 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: From the Detroit Police 22 Department, this is the Certificate of Recognition to 23 Darrin Cato, resident of the City of Detroit, in 24 appreciation for the following outstanding service and 25 cooperation, for your involvement in the community and

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Page 24 1 services to the City of Detroit. You have demonstrated 2 a spirit and commitment that is very worthy of recognition. Signed by me. 3 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Do you wish to say 4 something, Mr. Cato? 5 MR. CATO: Thank you. 6 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir. And we 7 8 congratulate you again on just outstanding work, just 9 great, great work. 10 MR. CATO: Thanks a lot. CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Give him another hand, 11 12 please. 13 (Applause) CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Members, I would entertain 14 15 a motion that we will place Mr. Darrin Cato's award that 16 it would become a part of the permanent archives of the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners. 17 18 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Move for adoption. 19 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Support. 20 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved 21 and supported that the Resolution that was just presented will be a part of our permanent archives. Any 22 23 discussion? All those in favor? 24 COMMISSIONERS: Ave. 25 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All these opposed? Amen.



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Motion carries. We also want to read into the record
 the whereas clause for retired Sergeant Daniel Williams.
 Sergeant Williams, are you here today? We certainly
 would like to recognize you if you are. Okay. We'll
 just read it into the record.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: The Resolution Honoring 6 Retired Sergeant Daniel Williams. Whereas Daniel 7 8 Williams was appointed to the Detroit Police Department 9 on February 22, 1993. Upon graduating from the 10 Metropolitan Police Academy, Officer Williams began his career at the Tactical Services Section; and whereas 11 12 Office Williams was promoted to the rank of Investigator 13 on January 22, 1999, and reassigned to the Tactical Services Section and later with the Twelfth Precinct; 14 15 and whereas Investigator Williams was promoted to the 16 rank of Sergeant on August 11, 2000, and reassigned to 17 the Twelfth Precinct, and later to the First Precinct, Northeastern District, Tactical Operations, Executive 18 Protection, and reassigned to Tactical Operations; and 19 20 whereas Sergeant Williams was the deserving recipient of 21 numerous awards from businesses and community 22 organizations. Sergeant Williams attended Wayne County 23 Community College District where he earned his Associate 24 Degree and later attended Wayne State University for his 25 Bachelor's Degree. Sergeant Williams also completed the



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1 Officer Candidate Schools for both Investigator and Sergeant; and whereas during Sergeant Williams' law 2 enforcement career, he was the deserving recipient of 3 one (1) Department Citation, one (1) Chief's Merit 4 Awards, one (1) Chief's Unit Award, one (1) All Star 5 6 Game Ribbon, one (1) Rosa Park Ribbon, one (1) Super Bowl, several commendations, and numerous letters of 7 praise from citizens; and whereas Sergeant Williams has 8 9 tirelessly served the Detroit Police Department, the 10 citizens of Detroit and its neighboring communities for over 20 years. His professionalism, commitment to 11 public service, integrity and dedication has been a 12 13 credit to the Detroit Police Department. He is highly 14 respected by the law enforcement community as a 15 consummate professional.

16 Now, Therefore be it Finally Resolved that the 17 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners, speaking for the citizens of Detroit and the Detroit Police Department, 18 award this resolution in recognition of Sergeant Daniel 19 20 Williams' 20 years of dedicated and diligent public service. His professionalism, integrity, and level of 21 commitment to the City of Detroit and its citizens merit 22 23 our highest regards and best wishes for continued 24 success.

3	Mr. Chair, I move for adoption.
4	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Support.
5	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved
6	and supported that we adopt the Resolution honoring
7	retired Sergeant Daniel Williams. Any discussion? All
8	those in favor?
9	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
10	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed? Motion
11	carries. I want to say congratulations to Sergeant
12	Williams. And we want this to be a part of the public
13	record. Certainly, we are there unfortunately at times
14	when officers are taken down in their duty. But again,
15	it gives us a great deal of joy and and a great deal of
16	privilege when officers can retire and live a very
17	productive life after the Detroit Police Department. So
18	certainly, we thank him for all of his service to this
19	department. And we wish him and his family nothing but
20	the best in retirement.
21	There are no department updates that I know
22	of. I do want to just go I deferred my report to
23	this section. I just want to again say thank you to all
24	of those who wished us happy holidays during the holiday
25	season. It's been two weeks since we have met last.

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1And it's been a good break I think for most of us. We2had time to get away and just enjoy life.

But certainly, as you know, the City of 3 Detroit is faced with some serious issues, especially as 4 relates to crime and safety. And I want the citizens of 5 this city to understand and to know that the Chief of 6 Police and this Board are working hand in hand to try 7 8 and come up with a very viable solution to make sure 9 that we get as many resources to the streets and to the 10 citizens of our city as possible.

We want to make sure that we put more boots to 11 the ground. And we'll make sure we do that over the 12 13 next couple of weeks. And you will see that I think very clearly here shortly. But just know that no one is 14 15 resting on their laurels. No one is, you know, not 16 planning. There's a great deal of work that's going on 17 behind the scene to make sure that our citizens remain safe. We see the stories that are in the news as 18 relates to, you know, houses that are being broken in, 19 20 as relates to individuals unfortunately being murdered 21 in our streets. And it saddens us as much as it saddens 22 anyone else.

And so, we brain storm often to see how can we solve and how can we get a handle on this. And I will say this. And I mean it from the bottom of my heart,



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and I have said it before. We have some of the best 1 2 policing in this country with our men and women in blue. I'm telling you this from what I know and from what I 3 have seen first hand. We will do more to reallocate 4 5 resources, to get them where they are supposed to be. But our men and women are doing a phenomenal job under 6 the strain and under the stress that they are working. 7 They have not given up. They show up every day and 8 9 every night and every shift. They are making those 10 calls. They are not hiding. They are facing the challenges before them day in and day out. As a matter 11 of fact, if you really want to check how committed our 12 13 people are, they are showing up more now than they did a few years ago. And that's a testament to the commitment 14 15 of our men and women in blue and the leadership of the 16 department.

17 So, we encourage them. And when you see 18 officers, encourage them, pat them on the back because that matters. It matters a great deal. You know, we 19 20 want to stick a camera in their face when the slightest 21 little thing go wrong. But let us appreciate the ones 22 who are out there day in and day out, have not given up, 23 keep on fighting. And it will get better. As bad as it 24 is now, it will get better. So, we want to thank you 25 for that. That's all I have to go on right now from my



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1 report.

2	What I do want to do, I want to first of all
3	announce our next meeting. The next meeting of the
4	Board of Police Commissioners will be January the 17th,
5	2013, at police headquarters, which is 1300 Beaubien,
6	Room 328-A, right in beautiful downtown Detroit.
7	Before we open up the floor to oral
8	communications, I want to give a point of privilege to
9	one of my favorite council persons I'll say it on the
10	record and that is Councilwoman Brenda Jones. Do you
11	wish to say anything, address us? You may come at this
12	time, ma'am.
13	COUNCILWOMAN JONES: Thank you. And let me
14	first of all say happy New Year's to everyone. Thank
15	you for being here. You're in my district. You're
16	actually three blocks from where I live. I live on
17	Rosemont, three blocks down the street. I want to say
18	to everyone that's here, thank you for caring enough
19	about the City of Detroit for coming out. I want to say
20	thank you to Commander Love, Sergeant Bledsoe and all of
21	the 12th Precinct because that's my precinct. I know
22	what work they do. I appreciate them. Thank you,
23	Chief.
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We are facing some trying times right now.And one of the things that I hear as I'm in the



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1 community all the time is about crime. We have to do 2 something about the crime. And I can say about this particular district, we are relatively active when it 3 comes to community, block club associations, the CB 4 5 patrol, radio. And I say to the people that are here -and I push CB patrol in the area because most of the 6 time, the criminals that are out there are the ones that 7 8 live right in your neighborhood. And if you have a CB 9 patrol in your neighborhood and they know that you can 10 identify them, they are less likely to commit that crime because they know you're watching them and you can 11 identify them. 12

13 You know, I have been a victim of home invasion as well. So I know what it's like. I know 14 exactly what it's like. So, if you don't have a CB 15 16 patrol in your neighborhood, I ask you to look into starting a CB patrol. Again, thank you all for coming 17 out. Thank you for being here. And if I can be of any 18 assistance to anyone, feel free to contact me. 19

20 I thank our men and women in blue, not just in 21 this district but throughout the City of Detroit because they are some hard workers. And I know they don't get 22 23 thank you often. So I thank them all. Thank you. 24 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am. 25

Appreciate it. At this time, we want to open up the

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1 floor for oral communication. If you wish to address the Board of Police Commissioners, you may come to the 2 mic in the center. Please state and spell your name for 3 4 our recorder so that we make sure we record correctly your name. And we ask that you will abide by our 5 6 two-minute time limit. And we ask that you address the questions to the Chair, and we will defer the questions 7 out to the persons necessary to answer those. 8 9 And when you hear either Mr. Brown say that's

10 enough or hear his little beeper go off, we ask that you 11 will please, please, ma'am, please, sir, end your 12 comments at that time so that we may hear from as many 13 people as we possibly can. You may come to the mic at 14 this time.

MS. THORNTON: I actually live in the Central
District, but I am here --

17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Your name, ma'am? 18 MS. THORNTON: My name is Marie Thornton. Ι live in the Central District. I need to know who is the 19 20 deputy chief? Has he been announced? I just need them 21 to tell me. And who is the commander or if there's a 22 new commander, for the Central District? I need to know 23 those questions before if we can -- if we can before January the 15th. 24

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Yes, ma'am. Hold on one



25

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1	second, Ms. Thornton.
2	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Through the Chair,
3	Interim Chief Logan. The deputy chief in charge of the
4	Central District, the entire east side, is Deputy Chief
5	Benjamin Lee. We don't have a commander there right
6	now. Commander James White was recently elevated to
7	deputy chief. And that's going to be another it's
8	going to cause another round of promotions or a request
9	to this Board to approve some promotions.
10	MS. THORNTON: That is what you were asking
11	earlier about a list?
12	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: No, ma'am. This is a
13	separate one.
14	MS. THORNTON: Okay. So the man name is the
15	officer or person is Benjamin Wade?
16	INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Lee.
17	MS. THORNTON: Lee. Okay. Thanks.
18	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Ms. Thornton.
19	MR. BERNARD: Good evening. Wadsworth
20	Community Block Club, Wayne Bernard, W-a-y-n-e,
21	B-e-r-n-a-r-d. I just left a meeting. I don't know if
22	this is your area but I think as he mapped it out,
23	central High School. It is one of those EAA schools.
24	And they were having a so-called town hall meeting.
25	People were parked everywhere. I called the police and

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said you need to come give some tickets out because
 these people are parked everywhere.

Now, mind you, when we go and park where we 3 4 want to park, we get tickets. I think you guys better get your tickets up when these people come in Detroit 5 and do what they want to do. Get your money because 6 they parked everywhere because you giving people tickets 7 8 for impeding traffic. Then you impound people's cars 9 and searching people's cars. I got me a license where 10 your can't search me any time you want. And I think the same thing should go for these people because in 11 Dearborn they are going to give you that ticket. And I 12 13 think you should have -- I took the call. I called the 14 -- I called 267, I think it was 4200. I think I called 15 that number to say can you come and see this because 16 they were parked everywhere, all across the way, all 17 across the grass. But couldn't get a cop out there. 18 Thank you.

19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Mr. Bernard, before you
20 leave, was that tonight? Was that meeting tonight?
21 MR. BERNARD: That was earlier at 3:30.
22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: You might want to talk to
23 Sergeant Bledsoe, and she can give you some information
24 probably how to get that done a little bit more
25 efficiently.

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INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Actually, that's the 1 2 10th Precinct. CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Kyriacou. He's right back 3 4 there. MR. BERNARD: I want to give a shout out to 5 Officer Sharp. 6 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: If you see him there 7 there, Inspector Kyriacou will help you. Thank you, 8 9 Mr. Bernard. 10 MS. HINES: Hello. My name is Sandra Hines. I'm a member of the Detroit Coalition Against Police 11 Brutality. I haven't been here for a while, and I'm 12 13 happy to be back. I just want to make a quick comment. 14 We are right now in the midst of the takeover by the 15 state. The State of Michigan is taking over the City of 16 Detroit. What Mr. Bernard was talking about in terms of 17 the EAA, they have literally dismantled DPS. We talked about earlier the policemen having to work for the 18 12 hours because they busting the unions of all working 19 20 class people that's in the union. 21 And so, it's real important they coming back to City Council. They forced -- they coming back to 22 23 City Council to sign a second Consent Agreement along with the one they already signed where they gave their 24 25 power away. They are in the midst of telling people --



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I lost my thought. I'm sorry. But what I'm trying to say is that we got a lot to do this year in terms of saving our city. The police department, I'm finally -you know, I'm not glad what happened to you. But I'm kind of glad in a way because it forced you to now understand where the people is coming from, that they don't care any more about you than they care about us.

8 And I'm saying in order for us to save this 9 city -- and that's who we is. And this is not in any 10 way disrespectful towards anybody in the room. But we 11 have a black population. That's the majority. And so, 12 we should be running our own business and taking care of 13 our own city because we live here.

And so, I'm just saying this year that I feel 14 15 can be a much happier New Year if we really come 16 together as Detroiters and go back to the old ways of 17 loving one another the way black people used to love 18 black people in the past. We've gotten away from that 19 to the point where we are -- you will see a mother stab 20 a child. And so I'm saying that this year can we work 21 together really as a real community for real and not let 22 it just be all tongue and cheek, and it will really be 23 action with us working together as neighbors for real to 24 try to save our city from the state.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Ms. Hines. And



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before you leave, I need to see you after the meeting.
 Thank you, ma'am.

MR. LOWE: Hello. My name is Earnest Lowe. 3 4 I'm the president of Central District Police Community Relations. Marie Thorton is the recording secretary of 5 6 Central District Police Community Relations. What recently happened was I had people come from midtown 7 8 where they have heavy policing. We have at least four 9 different agencies down in midtown. We have Wayne 10 State, we have the county, we have the Detroit Police and we have the hospital. And believe it or not we are 11 actually -- we're going to save that part of the city. 12 13 But then we have -- we'll save downtown. But I live in 14 the north end. That's where me and Marie Thornton live, 15 on the north end.

16 So what we got to do is we got to start having 17 our police officers not only engage with our community 18 but we also have to have them engage with the community who comes to the meetings. What literally happened last 19 20 time was we had a meeting there. And people from Boston-Edison, midtown, the north end, through the whole 21 22 corridor were at the meeting. But we only had one 23 community officer there, Officer Dorsey. And it was a 24 shame because when you get people who come, lawyers and 25 doctors, who run the situation and live in these

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neighborhoods, that they can't get a mortgage because they're under \$122,000, because they live 720 feet from a broken window that's in a house.

Now we got -- what we got to do, we got to 4 5 start meeting our command staff. And Interim Chief Logan has to have somebody who is actually at the level 6 of lieutenant or better at our next meeting which is 7 going to be Tuesday, at 6:30 at the Central District. 8 9 And this Tuesday at Central District at the Boulevard. 10 You come 7310. So we want someone at the command level be there at least. But when it comes down to the 11 police, I think they have done an excellent job in the 12 13 Central District because that's one of the most 14 strongest policed areas in the City of Detroit. And 15 keep the good work up. And contrary to popular belief, 16 this Detroit is about to become a melting pot. 17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.

18 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: I just want to let him19 know, I will be there.

20 MS. McCANTS: Yolanda McCants from the 21 Northeastern District. Good afternoon to this Board. 22 Happy New Year. I just want to know from this Board and 23 from our Chief, what exactly is our plan as far as 24 moving us ahead? And when I say us, us as the 25 community, us as a whole, us as the police department.

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1 Do we have something that the community can -- the community leaders can take back as a whole and say, hey, 2 look, we got to put our best food forward to go for this 3 4 or to go for that, you know? I won't say in all the 5 changes, but just something for us to grasp hope so -because right now, we just pulling straws you know. We 6 hear this, we hear that. 7 So, if we could just have something we can 8 9 kind of grasp on to. 10 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I'm going to ask the Chief to answer that for you, Ms. McCants. 11 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Ms. McCants, I'm really 12 13 not certain exactly what you're talking about. But you 14 should know that the Detroit Police Department is big 15 into community policing. And we are undergoing some 16 changes right now. We are taking a look at our 17 staffing. We are taking a look at it from top to 18 bottom. Today, even on my staff, I had to remove two sergeants and four police officers, put them back out on 19 20 the street because it starts with me. I can't ask 21 anybody else to make sacrifices if I'm not willing to make them. 22 23 One of the things that we looked at is that --

and this is common knowledge -- in the last ten years,
the Detroit Police Department has lost 40 percent of its



1 personnel. I mean, that's the reality of it. And we 2 are not using that as an excuse. But I think you and probably everybody in this room demands that we maximize 3 the resources that we have. And so that's what's 4 5 causing some of the flux that you're talking about. 6 Rest assured that we are going to make sure that we do all that we can with what we have. We can't ask for 7 8 anything more until we properly utilize what we have. 9 And that's what we are trying to do.

10 So, I ask you to be patient. It's probably 11 going to be about three or four weeks. But you're going 12 to start to see some change in our city in our 13 department. Just be patient.

MS. McCANTS: I'm a news watcher. And when I 14 15 heard that they are going to take away a unit that to me 16 our crime is leading from, I just ask you to -- ask you 17 and this Board to really reconsider. And that is the narcotics unit. I mean, I understand that there is some 18 things that has to go. But if we could reconsider --19 20 I'm not saying -- I mean, even if we combine two units 21 together and call them the bust or the truck or whatever, just we can't lose those. 22

23 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: Yes, ma'am. And plus
24 you can't believe everything you see on the news.
25 MS. McCANTS: You're right. And I understand.



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1 I did say I'm a news watcher. Okay. Thank you. CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am. Are 2 there others who wish to address the Board tonight? 3 4 Yes, sir. MR. WILKINSON: My name is Ronald Wilkinson. 5 6 I have a question regarding the chief, new chief applicant. At the present time, we have a chief of 7 8 police. I would like for this question to be posed to 9 the new police chief. What is he going to do or what is 10 she going to do that's going to be different from the past chiefs that we have had that would curb the crime 11 in this city? 12 13 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Mr. Wilkinson, I think you 14 bring up a good point. Unfortunately, we can't answer 15 that question tonight, only from the standpoint that 16 throughout in the interviewing process, we will gauge 17 that information. I want you to know this though, that 18 on October the 19th, we had a community meeting, something like this, in which we called citizens 19 20 together to ask the citizens what do you want from your 21 next chief of police. What type of measures do you want them to undertake? What type of characteristics do you 22 23 want them to have? We had a great deal of feedback. So we are incorporating all of that information into the 24 25 interviewing process.

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1	So, if you have some things, very specific
2	that you have in mind, you can get with one of our staff
3	persons afterwards. We're going to take your
4	information down because we're still waiting for the
5	search to be done. And we will see if we can
6	incorporate that as well.
7	MR. WILKINSON: My question was really asking
8	the applicants what are they going to do that's
9	different.
10	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: That's definitely part of
11	the process, yes, sir. Thank you, Mr. Wilkinson. Good
12	to see you, sir. Are there others?
13	MR. COLEMAN: I thank you very much. Thank
14	you very much to the honorable body, certainly the
15	commissioners and Chief Logan. It's a pleasure to be
16	here. I am Ken Coleman, K-e-n, Coleman, C-o-l-e-m-a-n.
17	As some of you know, I am a former member of the Charter
18	Revision Commission. And I'm certainly from that
19	standpoint as a life-long Detroiter, I'm certainly happy
20	and proud of the work that each of you are doing as
21	commissioners in our city and living up to the Charter
22	mandated responsibility that certainly a clear majority
23	of voters supported a little bit more than a year ago.
24	So, I wanted to publicly say thank you for
25	that. I particularly want to say to thank you,

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1 Chairman Warfield, for your strong leadership. I 2 certainly have been impressed with you over the years. 3 And while we don't know each other very well, I have had 4 an opportunity to work with you over time on a couple of 5 occasions. And so, I wanted to say I'm very very proud 6 to have you as the chair of the Board of Police 7 Commissioners. I just wanted to say that publicly.

8 Secondly, I would just say -- and as some of 9 you may know, I am a strong supporter of Detroit based 10 towers, particularly the Detroit authorized towers, men and women who have businesses in the city, support this 11 city through taxes, support this city through hiring 12 13 employees, very much in support of a plan that they have to bring new revenue to the city, very similar to the 14 plan, Chairman Warfield, that you presented before the 15 16 Honorable City Council. I would hope that the fathers 17 and mothers of our city adopt that plan and keep 18 businesses in the city thriving and keep employing people paying property taxes and income taxes in the 19 20 city so we continue to strive. Again, Ken Coleman. 21 Thank you so much for your work, and happy New Year in 22 2013.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
MR. COLEMAN: I live -- if I can just say,
Chairman, I live in Lafayette Park on the lower east



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side. I grew in up in this district. I'm a Henry Ford
 High School graduate, proud to be a northwest sider.
 Thank you.

Thank you, Mr. Coleman. 4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: 5 And I will say -- I will just say this, Mr. Coleman. I'm hoping that, you know, very soon and since we have 6 councilwoman here, we can put this bug in her ear. 7 8 Hopefully very soon we will be able to make it through a 9 subcommittee and be able to present -- because it was 10 actually councilwoman who asked that we go into a room, sit down and bring our ideas together so we can come up 11 with a viable plan. And we believe we have. But we are 12 13 waiting for an opportunity to present that in front of the committee. And we think it would be a tremendous 14 15 blessing to the city. So I thank you, sir. Appreciate 16 your comments.

17 MS. SMITH: Good evening, Bernice Smith, 18 political activist. I just want to tell Ken, everybody don't go by the Charter, Ken, as we all know. 19 But 20 anyway, to you, Chief, I cut out an article. You know, 21 I'm always reading like the young lady back there said. It was Saturday on the 5th where you were being 22 23 interviewed. You were with the mayor. You were doing a 24 reconstruction plan. But what I want to say is I was 25 kind of disheartened because of the fact that you did --

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well, you -- didn't quote it. But it said the officers
will not be relating to the burglaries any more. I was
kind of upset because as most of us know, the other day
on the TV, we did see a citizen's home that was
burglarized not only one or two times but four times.
And he did report it to the police, and they didn't show
up.

8 Now, most of you know I am supporting this 9 police department. But when you're wrong, I will tell 10 you that you're wrong. And in this case, they did not show up. We had to see it on TV. And I was very upset 11 about that. That's one thing. Also, we all know, we 12 13 are in a -- crime is saturating our city. We know this. 14 And we have to show more diligence, not only the police 15 department but the neighborhoods. A lot of the people 16 in the neighborhoods, you know who the crime people are. 17 And another thing that upset me was we got a rapist 18 running around here.

Now, when you have a man that do not respect a senior -- and I am a senior also. When you have his husband, the wife's husband in the car, and then you're going to take it upon yourself to rob them and put her in the back seat and rape her, I was really mad. I spoke about it on the radio this past week. Then you have another one that is raping a woman because she is

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outside shoveling snow. Now, come one, we got to do
 something. The neighborhoods have to watch each other.
 We cannot stay in our houses and not be involved with
 nothing that's going on, the things that are going on in
 the street.

I am upset. I am upset because of the fact 6 that the police -- I understand they are on 12 hours and 7 8 they are frustrated too. But the fact is we got to be 9 more observant in what's going on with our neighbors. 10 And this I am really upset about. I do hope that the 300 -- we not going to be the 300 no more. We call 11 ourselves something else. We are going to start again. 12 13 And I hope that we will not give the police any kind of competition because we are coming back out. These 14 15 rapists cannot continue to do what they are doing to the 16 seniors, and we cannot tolerate it any longer. And 17 that's what I am upset about tonight. Thank you.

18 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Miss Smith.
19 Appreciate your comments.

20 MS. SEMMA: Good evening. Happy New Year 21 everybody. Julie Semma, part of DATA, which is Detroit 22 Authorized Towers Association that currently has several 23 different tow companies or Detroit authorized towers for 24 the City of Detroit. And we enjoy and love what we do. 25 And we are family-owned businesses that work hard in the



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City of Detroit. We love the men in blue, and we
 support everything that you guys do.

We currently came to you guys two weeks ago before you guys went on recess in regards to situations in regards to the ABAN problem that we are getting ready to face because we had certain departments saying go ahead and sign this and then we had certain departments as you guys set the rules and the guidelines to tell us not to do it.

Well, several of us tow companies did not tow. 10 And from my understanding, there's 11 tow companies that 11 did that currently tow for the city. Apparently as of 12 13 December 26, 2012, a memo went into effect and put in 14 effect that all ABAN's now are to go to 6311 Caniff, 15 which takes away from our business, that holds us from 16 having any more money being made. And all this is doing 17 is effecting all of us. We have to abide by certain 18 rules and regulations that we have done in the past 19 years and still do. However, here comes the police 20 department, whoever is in charge. And again, I don't know if it's you, Chief, or somebody else higher up, but 21 22 implements it. And we need to know why because myself 23 as well as other tow companies that were abandoned tow 24 company towers when we were issued our permits, is 25 violating our right to doing our business and taking

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1 away our economic impact on our business right now. So, I would like some answers today, please, 2 because this is effecting not only myself but several 3 4 Detroit authorized towers that are currently doing business in the City of Detroit. 5 6 INTERIM CHIEF LOGAN: DC Tolbert, could I get you to step forward? Would you be able to provide both 7 8 the Board and Miss Semma an overview of what's going on

9 with it?

10 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Deputy Chief Tolbert, patrol operations west. What we do know is there was a 11 meeting with the city officials. We were given a 12 13 direction that all vehicles towed will go to the new 14 Number One Pound. There were meetings set up with 15 Detroit, the Police Department. The Police Department 16 will tow the vehicles where we were told to tow the 17 vehicles. This is basic simple. All we really need is 18 if we have a vehicle, we call a tow truck. And the tow truck goes to a certain location. The location for 19 20 abandoned vehicles and abandoned vehicles only is in 21 fact the Number One Pound as we were instructed to do by the administration. And that's where we stand at this 22 23 point.

24 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Well, I just want to 25 reiterate and certainly and for Julie and for Deputy



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1 Chief, here is what we understand. And you said it succinctly and correctly. This is not the department. 2 This is not the Board of Police Commissioners. As we 3 said before, we believe that the actions that are being 4 5 taken not only break City Charter, it breaks City Ordinance, and it breaks the rules that bears the 6 signature of the Mayor of the City of Detroit and the 7 Chief of Police. 8

9 We issued a cease and desist order. After we 10 issued that order, letters kept going out. We at the last meeting that we came -- that we had before the 11 12 break, we asked the towers again for a third time, do 13 not sign any letters because if you sign the letters, 14 then you will be in violation of the current rules that 15 have been promulgated and signed off by the mayor and 16 the City of Detroit. So, we asked, as we said at the 17 last meeting, for a facilitation meeting as is 18 stipulated in the Detroit City Charter that we can sit down and iron this out before it goes any further. 19

20 Unfortunately, Julie, we have not heard from 21 the administration on that point. So, certainly we will 22 ask our staff to re-send the letter. We will also send 23 a letter to City Council requesting that meeting because 24 there are deficiencies and conflicts within City 25 Ordinance as well as City Charter but not with our rules

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because our rules are very clear. And the rule says that our permitted towers are to tow abandoned vehicles, which is a separate list from the regular rotation, to the district or the precinct where they are located. It is very clear in those rules. And again, those rules were signed off. They were validated. They were -they went through legal. They were checked off.

8 So, unfortunately we are waiting to hear from 9 the administration. And again, it is not the 10 department, it is not this Board. We are literally 11 following dictates as has already been communicated from 12 the administration, which we believe are in violation of 13 our current rules, of City Charter and City Ordinance.

14 And I will say one more thing. And again, this is not a swipe, I promise, sir. But in that email 15 that was sent out I believe on the 26th of December as 16 17 relates to how ABAN's are to be processed, that's policy That's setting policy. And whether it came 18 directive. from the administration or whoever it came from, the 19 20 Charter is very clear that this Board sets the policy 21 for this department. And when policy then comes from 22 other areas of government and not this particular Board, 23 then we have significant issues and significant conflict. 24

25

And so, we have to sit down with the



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1 administration. I'm telling you, our department does an 2 outstanding job. As you know, they are a para-military organization, meaning that they respond to the commands 3 that are above them. And so, we have to sit down and 4 5 clear this. It's unfortunate. It is really unfortunate that this situation is taking place because it does not 6 have to be the way it is. And so, hopefully that 7 8 answers your question. I think there are remedies that 9 the towers can do themselves to address this issue 10 themselves legally. And I suggest that you all look legally into what you can do to help assist in this 11 situation. We are doing legally what we need to do in 12 13 the Charter by following the mandates of the Charter 14 when it talks about interdepartmental disputes. And I believe it's section 8 something, right? So, we are 15 16 doing everything we can to make sure that we get this 17 vetted out hopefully in a somewhat expeditious way. 18 It's unfortunate. We regret it. And we believe there is a better way to handle this. 19 20 MS. SEMMA: Julie Semma for the --21 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Before that --CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Commissioner White has a 22 23 question. 24 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Just as a point of 25 information, you referenced that the department will tow



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1 ABAN vehicles as instructed by the -- as per instructions by the administration. Just for clarity, 2 which communication are you referencing or which facet 3 4 of the administration were you referencing? DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Actually, as I said 5 6 before, there were meetings that we had which caused the process to be explained to us as to what we were 7 8 supposed to do. And what's that we are following. 9 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Is that a communication 10 that could be shared with this body that the department is now acting on? 11 12 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: The process which we 13 are currently using? 14 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Right. 15 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: I'm sure. I mean, it's 16 common knowledge what we are doing now. That shouldn't be an issue. 17 18 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Okay. DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: We will make sure you 19 20 get it. 21 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Okay. The second thing, 22 Chair, not for you, Deputy Chief. But Chair, I do 23 believe I heard you say that there are individuals who 24 are currently violating rules as promulgated by this 25 body. My next question would be -- and I'm not sure if



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1 this is a question for counsel or not. But what are the 2 parameters of this body? What is within our purview? 3 What should be our next phase, Chair, to notify 4 individuals who we believe are in violation of rules as 5 promulgated by this body?

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: According to the rules 6 that were signed off on, adopted, when there's a 7 violation of the rules, notification needs to be sent. 8 9 And we need to conduct a hearing. So, a hearing needs 10 to be conducted for those individuals who are in violation. And we probably need to start that process. 11 12 However, instead of starting that process, sir, I really 13 would rather -- I really would rather try and sit down with the administration to see if we can come to a 14 15 viable solution because this is one of those things that 16 I believe there's just so much -- a much better way to 17 handle this where it would not cause this confusion, 18 which would not put our towers in jeopardy of losing their businesses and the city then can gain a heck of a 19 20 lot more revenue than it does under this current plan. 21 So, hopefully we can sit down and do that. If we cannot, we will follow certainly the legal discourse 22 23 that the Charter lays out for us.

In addition to that, we may have to havehearings with the towers as well. But I would hope to



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give the administration another opportunity to sit down and meet and try and do this peacefully before we do that.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Chair, you referenced 4 prior to the hearing, that notification is required to 5 Have we in fact communicated it to towers? 6 be sent. CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: We have not communicated 7 that to towers. And I think we need to begin to think 8 9 about how do we send that communication, who will direct 10 staff to head up that process. I do have a question too, Deputy Chief. How many officers are assigned to 11 the Number One Impound? 12

13DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: We have got two.14CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Is there any reason why15there would be eight officers over there at one time?16DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: It's possible eight17officers could be there. But they might have various18duties that take them over there.

19CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Such as? Help us out.20DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: The officer's detail21might be going through there, the officers that are22assigned there or officers who are just -- there is23no -- there are only two officers assigned that I'm24aware of at the Number One Pound.

25 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Just preliminary



1 reports -- I will be honest because I've seen it too. At one point this week, there were eight officers over 2 there at the Number One Impound. Our issue was -- and 3 we said this before -- is that if we are trying to get 4 5 more resources on the ground -- and maybe that was an aberration. Maybe that was, you know, out of the box 6 type situation that particular time. But if we are 7 8 trying to get more resources -- this is not to you as 9 much as it is to the administration. If we are trying 10 to get more boots on the ground, and if we are trying to get more people to respond to calls to burglaries where 11 folk are not able to, again, I said it on the record 12 13 before, we need officers watching neighborhoods and not 14 lots. It's just that plain and simple.

And so again, we hope we can sit down with the administration, iron out this inter-departmental conflict and be able to move forward. So, again, you're in a tough position. I understand that. And we are not beating you up at all. You're following records, and we do get that. We definitely get that.

21 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: I'd like to say 22 truthfully speaking there is no reason unless duties 23 take them over there, there are more than -- there are 24 unless something has changed in the past five days. And 25 I recently went over to patrol operations. Unless



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1 something has changed in the last five days, there is no
2 reason for -- there are not eight officers assigned to
3 Number One Pound, only two.

4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. All right. Thank 5 you, sir. Ma'am, anything else?

6 MS. SEMMA: Yes. Julie Semma again, co-chair I just wanted to say that we follow the 7 of DATA. 8 quidelines. We do everything that the department and 9 everybody asks us to do including the Board of Police 10 Commissioners. The one thing we don't understand is why do business owners in the City of Detroit abide by all 11 12 the rules, pay the taxes, pay our Detroit headquarters 13 based business licenses, pay all of our dues, pay all of our licenses and fees, yet now the administration comes 14 15 in there and does whatever they want to do and take 16 money out of our businesses? And this is something that 17 is impacting not one tow company, not two, but several. 18 And this is a domino effect. And I just want to state for the record, this is effecting hundreds of people, 19 20 not only employees but our vendors because as we don't 21 make money, we have an impact that pays 7.1 million dollars to the City of Detroit and that employs city 22 23 council people, that employs a lot of other men, people, and men in blue. We love and do what we wanted. 24 25 We stated that the City of Detroit wants to



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1 make money. We sat down with you guys as well as the administration. We generated an area of making anywhere 2 from three to four million dollars. And we don't 3 understand why the city is now going to take their own 4 5 way of doing things, not following and breaking the City Charter, let alone the rules and not only effecting 6 what's going on in the city. We talked about turning 7 the city around. And instead all the administration is 8 9 doing is hurting us. And that's the last thing we need. 10 So I suggest to all the people in here right now, if you guys can help the businesses supporting us, 11 talk to different people because this is unethical. 12 13 This is wrong. And this is taking food off all our 14 tables. Thank you, guys. 15 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am. Are 16 there others who wish to address the Board. Again, I'm 17 asking if you can just hold with the sidebar conversations. Are there others who wish to address the 18 Board? Yes, sir. 19 BOBBY: Yes, sir, Chairman Warfield. 20

21 Bobby's Towing, part of DATA. I just hope that you do 22 something for the ones that violated the City Charter 23 and signed up with the police department because, as you 24 know, this Board was formed to keep the playing field 25 level. And I feel as though those 11 towers that



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1 crossed over and agreed to do the towing, the playing
2 field is not level because we all agreed not to do it,
3 the ones that's following the Charter. And they are -4 so, they are getting capital gain and we are not. So,
5 the playing field definitely is not level. And if they
6 broke the rules -- they heard the rules -- then they
7 should suffer the consequences. Thank you.

8 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir. Are there 9 others? Are there other comments for the Board? Last 10 time. Are there others? Hearing or seeing none, I want to thank you. We will close that part of our meeting. 11 Again, thank you so very much for coming out tonight. 12 13 It's always good to be out in the community at a 14 meeting. And all the issues that are discussed tonight, 15 listen, you have committed, dedicated people, 16 leadership, in this Detroit that do care and that will 17 see to it that we get to the bottom of some of these 18 things.

And I want you to go back home to your communities and say look, as someone said earlier, what can we do to make sure this thing gets better? We are always going to work together collaboratively. We're always going to deal with tough issues. But we are never going to give up. We are never going to lose hope. We are never going to stop our righteous



1	indignation of moving forward to getting things done
2	that needs to be done. Thank you very much for coming
3	tonight. Have a safe trip home. God bless. I think we
4	have some treats and some food and some delicious stuff.
5	So before we eat, if I can get did Pastor Powell
6	leave? Let me say grace over the food real quick, and
7	then I think we can dig in.
8	Let us pray. Father God, we thank you for
9	this meeting tonight. We thank you for these concerned
10	citizens that are here. Bless us, Lord, as we continue
11	in fellowship. We ask that you will bless the food,
12	that it will be nourishment for our bodies. Bless the
13	hands that prepared it and set it up. Now, Lord, let us
14	fellowship as one. In Christ's name we pray. Amen.
