1 Detroit, Michigan 2 Thursday, April 11, 2013 About 6:36 p.m. 3 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All right. Good evening, 4 5 ladies and gentlemen, and welcome to the Board of 6 Police Commissioners Meeting. My name is Jerome Warfield, Chairman of the Board of Police 7 8 Commissioners. We have serving with us tonight Vice 9 Chairperson, Board of Commissioners, Jessica Taylor, as well as Commissioner Donnell White, and representing 10 the Chief's Office is Deputy Chief James Tolbert 11 sitting at the end of the table. 12 13 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Good evening. 14 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: And representing our 15 office is our Board Secretary, Mr. George Anthony. 16 I am going to ask if Mr. Anthony could 17 introduce our staff who is here. 18 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Mr. Chair. For the record, George Anthony, Secretary to the Board. 19 20 We have present Mr. Robert Brown, who is our office 2.1 manager. Recording our proceedings is Sergeant Alan 2.2 Quinn. And Ms. Rhonda Foster from Hanson Court 23 Reporting Service. Thank you. 24 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you. And we know



that we should have someone coming right now from the

1	Office of Chief Investigator, Celia Washington will be
2	sitting in for Ms. Pamela Drake-Davis, chief
3	investigator. So if there are citizens complaints, we
4	certainly will be able to take care of those tonight.
5	Certainly, we are very, very happy to be here
6	at the Sacred Heart Activity Center. This center and
7	the church is just a stalwart of community activity,
8	and just history for this side of town in our city.
9	And so it is always great when we come here to be with
10	those in this area of the city. And so we want to give
11	thanks to the director of this center and the pastor of
12	the church for allowing us to come here tonight.
13	Before we read the Commissioners' duties and
14	responsibilities, I am going to ask that Commissioner
15	White would lead us in our invocation for tonight's
16	meeting.
17	COMMISSIONER WHITE: If we could pause
18	ourselves.
19	We come before you to give you words of
20	thanks for allowing us to be here at this place at this
21	time, for we know that it is you who have ordered our
22	steps to this point. We thank you for this beautiful
23	rainy day. For we know that it is rain that brings
24	back a new season, a season of new. And as we allow
25	your grace to reign upon this department, for new

1	change, for new growth, for new development, for
2	renewed commitment to the citizens of this department,
3	we ask that you bless us with like-mindedness during
4	this meeting. Bless those who have been called to

11	AUDIENCE: Amen.
12	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Commissioner
13	White. Appreciate that, sir.
14	I am going to ask if you could read for us
15	our duties and responsibilities.
16	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Certainly. The Board of
17	Police Commissioners was created by City Charter
18	July 1, 1974. Its composition currently is a
19	five-member appointed by the Mayor, confirmed by City
20	Council. The commissioners serve five-year terms, and
21	may not serve more than five years consecutively.
22	Commissioners meet once a week, 52 weeks out of the
23	year. All meetings are open to the public.
24	The duties of this body are to establish
25	policy, rules and regulations in consultation with the

1	Chief and the approval of the Mayor; to review and
2	approve the department budget; to review and approve
3	department promotions; to receive and resolve
4	complaints concerning the operation of the police
5	department; to serve as the final authority to impose
6	and/or review discipline of police department
7	employees; to appoint a civilian personnel director; to
8	prepare an annual report of department activities for
9	the public, the Mayor and the City Council.
10	Its staff includes an Executive Director who
11	serves as Secretary to the Board and attends all Board
12	meetings, a chief investigator, and additional
13	investigators as needed, and other staff as necessary
L 4	to provide support to the Board.
15	The Police Commission considers itself a
16	liaison between citizens of the City of Detroit and the
L 7	Detroit Police Department.
18	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
19	Certainly appreciate that.
20	At this time, I will entertain a motion to
21	approve today's agenda.
22	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So moved.
23	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

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1	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
2	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I will also entertain a
3	motion to approve the minutes of Thursday, April
4	the 4th, 2013.
5	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So moved.
6	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.
7	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Without objection, all
8	those in favor?
9	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
10	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Motion carries.
11	As the Chairperson, I want to give an update
12	on where we are in our search for a new Chief of
13	Police. Also want to talk a little bit about the
14	towing issue that is still within the City and with the
15	City Council. And then want to talk later when we get
16	to the Chief's report about a proposed restructuring or
17	second phase of the first reorganization. And so I
18	want to take that in that order, if we can.
19	First of all, in regards to the search, I
20	want to update everyone about the contract to begin the
21	search was signed a few weeks ago. Immediately, when
22	that contract was signed, it was posted, the position
23	for Chief of Police locally as well as nationally. Our
24	recruiting firm has been in constant contact with their
25	network of affiliates throughout the country as relates

to the field of candidates not only locally but also
nationally. We do know that interviews are taking
place currently. The position was not posted it has
only been posted for a week. And so we are basically
waiting to hear back from that first firm. As they
drill down their candidates, they cast a wide net
first. And what they have done as part of their
process, to interview candidates, and they will
interview the appropriate number of times. An actual
candidate may only get one or two interviews depending
on how much they need to drill down. After they drill
down, they will provide a list for the Board to send on
to the second phase of the interviewing process.

Let me also say that prior to negotiating the process is somewhat of an examination that each candidate will go through testing their skills, testing their leadership attributes, as well. And that data, that information will be made available certainly to the Mayor and to the Emergency Manager when they get ready to make their decision.

The second phase of the interviewing process will really be to assess and a drill down assessment. We will have a number of Chiefs of Police, currently-serving Chiefs of Police, that will come in and actually test the candidates in very specific

	duties and responsibilities and requisites as it
2	relates to asserting out the duties of a Chief of
3	Police.

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I want to back up for a minute and say to the citizens here, we included in the process the information you gave us back in October to ask the Chief of Police as it relates to how do they do culture change in the department, whether there is a policy as relates to developing aggressive drug strategy, aggressive gang strategy, and how they motivate the department. So those questions will all -- are also part of the interviewing process in phase one and phase two. Just so that you know.

Going back to the assessment portion of the interview. The assessment, once it is completed, then we will have a final list of candidates. We will just turn that list over to the Mayor, to the Emergency Manager. Of course, they will make a decision on who the next Police Chief will be.

We do not have a timeline as far as when that will be completed. Certainly, we are letting the agency that we have hired do the work. And we are not dictating to them the timeline. But when they are done with their work and when that's completed, we are certain to report back out to the community. We will

1	report statistical analysis, how many candidates
2	actually inquired, how many Chief interviews, you know,
3	what part of the country are they from, how many
4	internal candidates versus external candidates. We
5	will break it down, male versus female, and also
6	ethnicity demographics, as well. So we will have all
7	that information provided to the community when that
8	time arises.
9	And so certainly, during the oral
10	communication part of the meeting, if you have any
11	further questions about that, I will be more than happy
12	to answer your questions regarding that.
13	I will skip to restructuring and then come
14	back to towing.
15	I was informed today, received a call from
16	the Assistant Chief, that the Department is considering

the Assistant Chief, that the Department is considering another reorganization which will take place on the 29th of this month. And certainly, we understand the need to put more boots on the ground, but we are hoping and we are really expecting the department to go through the proper process this time.

We do know that the reorganization we are under right now violates the city charter because this Board is supposed to approve any reorganizations before they take effect. The city charter has not changed.



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And we are asking the Department for a presentation on any reorganization plans formally to this Board so that this Board may be able to weigh in.

It is hard for us to buy in on the second reorganization when we didn't buy in on the first reorganization. And so we had to deal with that issue. We are more than willing to sit down and talk about that issue so that we can make sure that our citizens are covered, because at the end of the day I think that's what the Department wants, what the Board wants, to make sure that we have enough boots on the ground that our citizens are covered and protected in a very safe environment, and we want to make sure that our citizens' needs are covered in the community. And we have to be very careful, the balance that is in the various areas within the Department.

Certainly, as you all know by coming to these meetings, we wear two hats. Not only do we wear the hat that represents the Department, but we also wear the hat that represents the citizenry of this city, and so we take all of that into consideration when we look at restructuring the Department and what an impact it has on the citizens of the city of Detroit.

Finally, I just want to report out on some updated information regarding towing. There has been a

1	number of hearings that have been held in front of City
2	Council regarding establishing a new tow rate and
3	establishing what we just are dealing primarily
4	with, the tow rate. And the Tow Rate Commission is the
5	commission that is made up of members appointed by the
6	Mayor and City Council. It came up with a
7	recommendation of a tow fee structure. And there has
8	been a lot of negotiating going back and forth. I have
9	been part of those meetings. There have been two tow
10	representatives as part of those meetings. The
11	Director of Purchasing for the City of Detroit has been
12	there, as well as persons from the Tow Rate Commission.
13	And we had a meeting this week, and we have come to the
14	agreement that the tow rate should be raised for two
15	reasons. First of all, to make up for the lost time
16	that there has not been a tow rate increase. I think
17	it has been the last help me I think 15 years.
18	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: 17.
19	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: 17 years since the
20	last. Thank you. So the last 17 years there has not
21	been a tow rate increase. As a matter of fact, when we
22	look at the entire metropolitan area, and we look at
23	cities around the country, Detroit is at the very
24	bottom as it relates to tow rates for the country.
25	And so we did our research and looked at

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other cities that surrounded Detroit and looked at other major metropolitan areas. And we believe that we came up with a plan that was fair, that would also raise significant amount of revenue that pays for the costs of the police officers who are on the scene that have to deal with making sure that those cars are towed properly.

And so I am going to ask this Board, and I will ask quidance of you all who deal with it, we might, you know, just go -- either to adopt those rates or talk about it. And we can talk about it later, maybe have one of the gentlemen come up to talk about it. But the tow rate should -- their recommendation is that the tow rate will rise to \$125 for a tow. And that storage will go to \$15 a day. And then the City will receive an administration fee of \$75 per tow that will take care of the cost, what it takes to put an officer there on the scene. Actually, it does not cover the full cost. I am going to say that up front. I think the City has been very generous because it takes at least typically two officers there at minimum on the scene when a tow is called in. And when you look at their hourly rate, what they get paid, the 75 administration fee does not cover the full cost. would include the cost to dispatch that car, as well.

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1	So I think the City has done a great job in keeping the
2	fee within reason as relates to the cost, what it costs
3	the City to tow that car.
4	These rates are consistent pretty much with
5	the communities around us, and we are still just below
6	the national average, what major cities charge to tow a
7	car. And so again, those rates write them down,
8	\$125 to tow the car, \$15 storage, and \$75 for City
9	administration fee. And part of that fee will also
10	include a new software system that helps to better
11	manage the towing operations so that we actually can
12	get more boots on the ground with that, as well.
13	Mr. Wild, Billy Wild, do you have anything
14	else, Tom Stidham, to add to that or is that
15	MR. STIDHAM: Tom Stidham. I want to
16	summarize, just ask that all parties all the towers
17	have endorsed this proposal. We ask the Board to do
18	the same.
19	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Stay right there a
20	second.
21	Any questions to Mr. Stidham, from the Board
22	members to Mr. Stidham regarding this?
23	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Just a couple points of
24	clarification. The initial tow rate fee was what cost?
25	MR. STIDHAM: It is \$125 is the proposed



1	rate.
2	COMMISSIONER WHITE: The current rate?
3	MR. STIDHAM: The current rate is \$75.
4	COMMISSIONER WHITE: How does that \$75 break
5	down for the record?
6	MR. STIDHAM: How does it break down?
7	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Right. Is that storage?
8	Towing?
9	MR. STIDHAM: Currently the City is getting
10	zero administration fee. The City's administration fee
11	is new for the City. The City is going to allow the
12	City to realize and recognize a new revenue stream from
13	the towing of all vehicles.
14	COMMISSIONER WHITE: The last question. How
15	does this so this new fee will be implemented on all
16	cars that are towed within the City of Detroit?
17	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Police-authorized. They
18	have to be police-authorized tows in Detroit. And one
19	thing to point out, too, with these fees. These fees
20	are even less than what a private insurance tow. You
21	are looking at \$200 for a private tow, if you call your
22	insurance to have them do it, if your insurance bills,
23	but right now that is one of the issues that the City
24	is looking at across the board. Right now, again, you
25	are looking at Commissioner just \$75 is what a person



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Now, here is the issue then, and we have done
studies, the towers have done studies where they have
actually looked and sat on the border of Eight Mile,
and it is interesting that when people cross the border
over Eight Mile, because the tow fee is a little bit
more hefty if they get caught and their car get taken,
they put their seat belts on, they put their feet off
the pedal, and they drive a little bit more safer
across Eight Mile when we sit there and watch this
behavior. And there is a difference.

And so we say that that same type of care should be taken in the city of Detroit, as well. We are not here to penalize those citizens certainly who are following the law who are doing what they are supposed to do. But these are certainly for those who need a police at the scene for whatever reason to tow those cars.

Right now the City is not collecting anything, and there is only a \$75 fee that is being incurred by the citizens. And again, that goes back 17 years. If you do the math on that, 17 years ago, and you deal — and you, let's say, did a cost of what a shoe would cost 17 years ago, I mean, you will see the appreciable difference there.

Τ	MR. SIIDHAM: Did I answer your questions,
2	Commissioner White?
3	COMMISSIONER WHITE: I am good. And to be
4	clear, I would just reiterate some of my earlier
5	concern as relates to a tow rate increase. If my math
6	is correct, that's a 53 percent increase. And as we
7	look at challenges to individuals who reside within the
8	city of Detroit, with high cost of insurance and other
9	high costs of living, I would just caution us to
10	keeping in mind as rates increase, keeping in mind
11	other large municipalities' tow rates may be higher
12	than our rates. Detroit is a unique environment. It
13	is an environment that does not have yet a concrete
14	plan for regionalized transportation. And again, I
15	won't get on my soap box, but there is some very real
16	challenges that we have. And to me, this will continue
17	to perpetuate a situation if we try to apply and change
18	overnight to this magnitude. So I would just caution
19	this body and this commission to be sensitive to those
20	individuals who rely heavily on their transportation to
21	get to work, to effectuate childcare, to take care of
22	normal business throughout the city.
23	MR. STIDHAM: And may I just respond to that?
24	One thing I do want to point out to the public and to
25	you, Commissioner White, and all of the entire Board is

that, again, this process actually began with the Tow
Rate Commission convening for the first time in years
and years and years. And I believe they started in
March of 2012. So it has taken over a year to get
where we are right now. And I just want to really I
know I probably won't address entirely all your
concerns, but the Tow Rate Commission, because I was
at attended all of the meetings, there was a lot of
input from the citizens, from the community, from the
towers, from the police-authorized towers, from other
City agencies. There was a careful study deliberation
of best practices with respect to rates, the employment
of new revenue or opportunities for new revenue for the
City. So there was a lot of study and careful
deliberation on some of the very issues that you have
raised. They were raised, considered, deliberated by
the Tow Rate Commission. I am not part of the Tow Rate
Commission, but again, I attended those meetings, and
they did take all of those factors into account.
And while it may seem like an inordinate
increase, again, when you look back historically, there

increase, again, when you look back historically, there has been no rate increase for nearly 17 years. And if it's just been a couple dollars a year increase, we would be about to where it is, the proposal is. So we think that this rate increase, coupled with the

1	component of raising revenue for the City, is fair to
2	all the stakeholders, the citizens, the
3	police-authorized towers in the City of Detroit. And
4	we think it is in the best interest of the City.
5	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Any other questions of
6	Mr. Stidham?
7	Thank you, sir.
8	MR. STIDHAM: Thank you.
9	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: That is all I have from
10	my report this evening. And so I certainly want to
11	thank you for hearing out all those issues.
12	At this time, we will turn to the Chief's
13	Office and Chief Tolbert.
14	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Good evening. Through
15	the Chair, good evening everyone.
16	Today we have a presentation from the
17	Northeast District. Representing the Northeast
18	District is Inspector Allen. Turn it over to Inspector
19	Allen.
20	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
21	INSPECTOR ALLEN: Good evening. It's always
22	a pleasure to address this Board.
23	I am going to follow the four Bs of public
24	speaking as taught to me by Deputy Chief Ewing
25	Be Brief, Brother, Be Brief.



1	I will give you just a little bit of
2	demographics. We are located at 51 East Nevada. We
3	encompass approximately 28.16 square miles. And
4	according to the last census, we have in the
5	neighborhood of 126,000 residents.
6	Inspector Garv Sroka and myself, Inspector

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Inspector Gary Sroka and myself, Inspector

Daniel Allen, are assigned to the district as

commanding officers of the 11th and 7th precinct,

respectively. The 11th precinct also is commonly

referred to as the North End of the district. And the

7th precinct as the South End. Miller Road through Van

Dyke is the dividing area.

I would just like to briefly talk about some of our goals and initiatives, which -- it is listed as number 3 here, but I am going to bump it up to number 1. And that's to accelerate compliance with the two federal consent decrees. We have just had an inspection. Preliminarily, I am told we did well on the inspection. We are going to continue to implement plans to increase police visibility. We have opened up three mini stations, and I will let you know where those are at. Butzel Center, 7737 Kercheval, which is staffed by Officer Labrie McClendon. The Belmont at 20500 Conant, staffed by Officer Chambers. And the Belaire at 9560 East Eight Mile which is staffed by



1	Officer Doug Nichols.
2	I would also like to introduce Sergeant
3	Charles Spruce. He was our Community Relations
4	Sergeant. And he is in charge of those mini stations.
5	As well, I would be remiss if I did not do this. We
6	have several very ardent community supporters in the
7	audience with us. And they are as much on staff as any
8	of us that wear a uniform. At any function, they are
9	always there. That would be Mr. and Mrs. McCants,
10	Mr. Russo, Ms. Kim Jackson, I don't know if Ms. Jackson
11	is here, and Ms. Dora Hatcher, and I don't Anna? So
12	we have a very active staff.
13	(Applause).
14	INSPECTOR ALLEN: We can't operate without
15	them. And then we have Romano. My apologies there.
16	A few things, business development wise, the
17	Gateway Shopping Complex is going to be located in our
18	district. It is going to be at Eight Mile and
19	Woodward. The cornerstone of that is going to be a
20	Meijer store with a gas station. Various other vendors
21	will share this complex. We recently met with the
22	individuals in charge of Meijer and addressing security
23	concerns. And I think it is going to be a very healthy
24	development for the City.
25	Our Eastern Market Business District will be



1	holding its Annual Flower Day event on May 11th.
2	Several community events and programs we have had, and
3	I won't go over them all, but some of my favorites,
4	November is our Veterans Day Luncheon. We held that.
5	It had approximately 200 participants. And we pay
6	homage to those that serve us overseas.
7	In February, we had our Senior Valentine's
8	Day Dance and Luncheon, and it was attended by
9	approximately 100 senior citizens.
10	Just this last March, March 30th, we had my
11	favorite event, which is the Easter Egg Hunt with the
12	children. It is all about the kids. And that's what
13	makes it such a great event.
14	In conclusion, it is my hope this report
15	gives the Board of Police Commissioners and the
16	citizens of the Northeastern District a brief synopsis
17	of the Missions and Directives as mandated by Interim
18	Chief of Police Chester Logan. The members assigned to
19	the Northeastern District are police officers dedicated
20	and committed to providing safety and stability.
21	I would add one thing to that. It is a
22	citywide initiative, so it is not strictly at the
23	Northeastern District. But it is called Detroit One.
24	It is a collaborative effort. Many of you have heard



of it with the federal prosecutor's office. We are all

1	on board at the Northeastern District. What it does is
2	targets individuals who carry guns illegally. And to
3	date, we have two individuals sitting in federal
4	custody looking at very long prison terms for carrying
5	illegal guns. So we are all on that.
6	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
7	Appreciate, Inspector. Any questions?
8	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I don't have a
9	question, but I would just like to congratulate you.
10	You seem to be doing a fine job.
11	INSPECTOR ALLEN: Thank you so much,
12	Commissioner. I appreciate that.
13	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
14	Thank you, Inspector.
15	Previously when we had a conversation about
16	Northeastern there was a conversation centered around
17	the prevalence of violence at gas stations. Have we
18	seen that fluctuate up or down?
19	INSPECTOR ALLEN: Well, now I am going to
20	have to knock wood here. We have seen it fluctuate
21	down. And we are going to drive it down some more
22	because a lot of these individuals carrying these
23	illegal guns are hanging around these gas stations, and
24	they are causing a great deal of that issue at the gas
25	stations, as well as party stores and other 24-hour

1	establishments. We have had some success there. We
2	are going to continue to have some success as we ramp
3	up this Detroit One project. And word of that is
4	getting out, slowly but surely. I think that's going
5	to have a real dampening effect on some of these
6	individuals that are out there carrying guns.
7	The one individual that we just placed into
8	federal custody last Friday is looking at 10 to
9	12 years of federal incarceration. That's based upon
10	his past record; in fact, that he was a felon in
11	possession of a firearm. So the sentences are
12	extremely stiff. And there is no probation in the
13	federal system. So when you get the time, you do it.
14	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, sir.
15	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: A couple questions. The
16	mini stations, are they being staffed by community
17	officers or regular police officers?
18	INSPECTOR ALLEN: They are being staffed by
19	community police officers.
20	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Great. And I also want
21	to say, I have known you announced some members here
22	from the Northeast District. And I wanted to highlight
23	Ms. McCants who was featured in the news for helping to

helping catch a dumpster.

2	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Amen.
3	(Applause).
4	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Awesome job. Awesome
5	job. Thank you, sir.
6	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Thank you.
7	Through the Chair, I know Chief Logan has
8	been giving you updates on Operation Nip-It. I am
9	going to give you figures for week five.
10	For week five, which is, again, I want to
11	remind the Board that is Thursday, Friday, Saturday,
12	the numbers are as such. Seventy-four arrests, 1,180
13	persons investigated, 886 vehicles investigated, of
14	which 177 vehicles were towed. There were 25 weapons
15	confiscated. There were over street value of over
16	\$2.7 million of drugs. And over \$34,000 in cash money
17	confiscated. And that was just for week five.
18	So the Nip-It is a resource brought to bear.
19	Focus currently is on the Eastern and Northwestern
20	areas, and we are that's one of the reasons why we
21	are seeing a reduction in some of the crime in these
22	areas, because what we are doing is we are putting
23	pressure to bear on the areas that are constantly
24	causing this trouble. And when you look at the

deployment and you say in an area is constantly a

16	At this time, I ask if Commander Romeo could
17	come on down to the mic so that we can look at
18	Directives and approve some Directives.
19	Commander Jeff Romeo.
20	COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: Thank you, sir.
21	Commander Jeff Romeo.
22	I just wanted to revisit four policies
23	previously presented to this Board. Additionally,
24	there's three that we want to present to the Board this



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evening.

The first ones that were presented

2	approximately six weeks ago were posted on the
3	Internet. Just so if you want to open up to that too.
4	The policies we discussed that have been presented
5	before this Board have been posted on the Internet. At
6	the previous meeting, they were distributed at the
7	meeting so the public could have a chance to review the
8	policies and give any input. To date we haven't
9	received any response on any of the posted policies on
10	the Internet or any feedback through telephone calls or
11	fax or e-mails. So we also currently have the other
12	policies that we are going to discuss posted on the
13	Internet for public review and comment, as well.
14	And I will start out with Patrol Related
15	Reports. I will just briefly go over a couple of the
16	changes that were made to it. This is what we are
17	seeking approval on. It is Directive 201.2, Patrol
18	Related Reports.
19	Some of the major changes were incorporated
20	in the process of CRISNET reports, how it is routed.
21	As opposed to having paper copies routed, there is a
22	routing feature in the system, so it explains more in
23	detail. If there is a certain crime like a sex crime,
24	it can be routed to Sex Crimes so they get to pull it
25	up and review the report. So that's incorporated into



1	the	policy.

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We also added information in there related to
documenting evidence within the CRISNET report more
effectively. Also, the activity log, the daily
activities logs that officers prepare on a daily basis,
it gives more detail about stopping, proper
documentation related to the consent decree is used,
and documenting reasonable suspicion for traffic for
traffic stops, a reason to stop and/or frisk someone.

And those are -- some of those were -- like the stop frisk requirement is a policy related to the Department. We just thought it important to put it in this policy, as well.

The next directive, 204.8, Environmental Ordinances. Changes in there was the addition of Blight Ordinances and Blight Violation Notices. And how to issue those. And the Department administrative blight code, and also we incorporated -- someone that's been in the Department as long as I know too or going back in the '90s, B tickets, they are tickets that's been processed through the department through 36th District Court for many years. It has not been in our policy, per se. There were other documents summarized it. We got -- we did a very good job, we got with the Law Department, as well as the court, 36th District

Court,	to	make	sure	we	got	the	policy	more	effectively.
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Moving on to Detroit 302.1, Detroit Police
Reserves. This policy was revised. It also addresses
when Reserves discontinue service for the City, when
they no longer are going to provide reserve duty, it is
a volunteer effort, obviously. They are also given the
option of requesting and receiving a retirement badge
and I.D. And there is documentation in there on how
that's handled. And we also incorporated what's in our
other policies, the very critical issue of firing at or
from a moving vehicle. That is incorporated into the
policy. Same way we do on that issue, we just wanted
to make sure it was in their policy related to that, as
well.

The next directive, 302.3, Licenses and

Permits. This was revised to incorporate procedures,

more details about processing and requesting party -
block party event requests, as well as registration

requirements. And another -- we had this in another

procedure. We thought it important also to incorporate

some of the precious metal and gem dealers, there is

certain city ordinances that had to be filed, so we

incorporated that information into this policy to make

sure it was followed, followed properly, had to get a

certificate from the City Police Department

1	specifically, when they do artisan-type work. And also
2	incorporates the concealed pistol license procedure.
3	Basically, people have to go to the County to seek
4	that, and seek a permit through that process.
5	So those are the four we are seeking approval
6	on from this Board, currently. And I will go into the
7	other policies if there are no questions, I will maybe
8	entertain questions possibly before I go into the next
9	policies, if that's okay.
10	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Sure. Any questions of
11	the Commissioners?
12	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Yes, I have a couple
13	questions. 201.2, the Directives for the CRISNET, is
14	that, in your estimation, review time for officers
15	inputting I know stop and frisk, so after each kind
16	of investigation, is that going to be a new process
17	they have to go to report at that moment or
18	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: No, for investigatory,
19	handle frisk, they just have a check box now. They
20	check the box, if there is a frisk, they check the
21	frisk. They just have to document within the
22	circumstances of the note portion the reasonable
23	suspicion for the stop or the reason for the stop. It
24	could be they ran a red light. We have seen times
25	officers don't write the original, they wouldn't note

1	the registration form, so they put the reason so we
2	make it more very clear, they have got to write down
3	reason for stop, as well as if there is a frisk, they
4	have to document reasonable suspicion, they thought the
5	person was armed, possibly a danger, so they have to
6	document that information in there, as well.
7	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, sir.
8	And also under 302.3, License and Permits, so
9	in effect, particularly with the safety inspection of
10	handguns, could we be in the position to approve the
11	licensing of individuals that purchase firearms or
12	register firearms but, in fact, they have an unsafe
13	firearm in their possession? Who would be charged with
14	the safety inspection if not DPD?
15	COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: That type of thing
16	well, for them to be able to be able to carry a weapon,
17	under the concealed pistol license, they have to go
18	through the County on that. They still do have to
19	register the firearm with the City though the Police
20	Department, so we still would be responsible for that
21	function.
22	COMMISSIONER WHITE: But on the page that I
23	have, it states, This subsection was deleted per
24	Sergeant Lightfoot, states DPD no longer



conducts safety inspections.

2	the safety inspections, we no longer do that. I am
3	sorry. I misunderstood the question.
4	COMMISSIONER WHITE: So are you aware of what
5	transpires when an individual comes to DPD to register
6	that firearm? What does happen?
7	COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: You know, I couldn't
8	go into detail. We have our subject matter experts
9	review this when they do review it. I couldn't tell
10	you the exact, you know, hands-on detail how they
11	proceed, process it, but I know we did have them review
12	this and give us the information about the policy on
13	it.
14	COMMISSIONER WHITE: The secretary had stated
15	the need for safety inspections before. I guess that
16	was why my concern. We just weren't in that position
17	of liability. That in effect we would have licenses
18	for equipment that was faulty, to begin with.
19	COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: Oh, okay.
20	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Chair.
21	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I want to go back to
22	201.2 for a minute. If the system is down, do they
23	pick it back up?
24	THE WITNESS: Yes, sir. We have the old PCR,



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we call it, preliminary complaint report, we utilize in

1	those instances.
2	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. And the License
3	and Permits, for 302.3, again, that's being done away
4	with as relates to dances for teenagers and special
5	dances?
6	COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: Could you refer to
7	the
8	CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: 302.3.
9	COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: Okay.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. Then under that same section, keep going down, regarding street closing permits. I am trying to see what the exact change is there on the street closing. It says revised approving the application process for obtaining a special event and application process guidelines and restrictions for block parties. So are you saying that there is more — a different application or paperwork or —

COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: Yeah, one thing that we noticed, too, in this procedure was that in the guidelines, that was pretty extensive. They start on page 3 and go on through page 5. We know that sometimes the policy didn't have enough information in there, and then we updated guidelines, as well. And a lot of times, we have paper forms that were not posted on the Intranet within the Department for access, so we are trying to get as many policies or forms up on the Intranet as possible to make sure they are updated and the guidelines are updated, as well. So we updated the guidelines, as well as the policy, and just to make sure it is thoroughly explained what the process is.

22	short policy, two-page policy on transfers.
23	We updated the language in the policy with
24	the help of Sergeant Henning, thankfully,
25	police personnel, and also there weren't very



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significant changes. One of the things that the policy
did require was the officers to be notified
specifically if their transfer was processed and
approved. You know, first police personnel maintains
transfer lists for all these, and they update on a
regular basis, so that was taken out. The officers
need to check once their transfer is approved, whether
it is on the list or not.

One of the other significant changes we had, this was an initial policy also, for our Management Awareness System. It requires that a patrol supervisor within seven days of them being transferred into that entity, say someone actually works where I work, my sergeant gets assigned to that police officer, has to review that member's profile within the Management Awareness System to look at their training issues, training needs, whether they have had any support issues or citizen complaints. Look at their record related to any type of work performance issues so that they're aware of what type of worker they are going to have coming. So it is not going to tell them the whole story. It is going to give them a slice of what that person is about. So we incorporated that into this policy. It is in the Management Awareness Policy, as well.

1	And then the next directive is 203.7,
2	Organized Crime, Vice and Narcotics. The policy was
3	updated, too, similar to the other policy we talked
4	about, about routing reports. It was updated clearly
5	to delineate the personnel reports related to illegal
6	gambling, liquor activities routed to vice, via this
7	process. There weren't a whole lot of changes in this
8	policy. Sometimes it is just language, made up a
9	little bit of modification to the language issues.
10	There weren't any other significant change in that
11	policy.
12	One other of the other policies, Lieutenant
13	Bliss wishes he could be here too, but
14	202.2, the search and seizure policy, there were a lot
15	of changes made to this policy. Second Deputy Chief
16	Falvo and Lieutenant Bliss
17	collaborated on this policy to update it to make sure
18	that it met all the standards for constitutionality
19	issues, and issues related to the consent decree, as
20	well. And they expanded the policy. It was about
21	10 pages, it's 16 pages now. They expanded the issues
22	related to consent searches significantly. Some of the
23	issues are trained by our legal instructor, who was
24	Second Deputy Chief Falvo, are incorporated in here.
25	You will see on certain aspects that he teaches is

1	about tier one encounters with citizens, which are
2	informational encounters. You have got tier two
3	encounters with citizens, which are investigative
4	detentions of citizens. And then tier three, which are
5	arrests. And he goes into detail what all those mean.
6	What you can do. What you can't do. He goes into
7	information about stops and frisks, as well as
8	consensual pat downs, information like that. And also
9	here we had information on routing and frisk reports
10	or no, I am sorry, I am looking at the other policy for
11	a second. But it covers a lot of information. They
12	collaborated for months on this, so the last time they
13	finally sent e-mails, communications about this, Second
14	Deputy Chief Falvo said this was about 20 updated
15	revision they had between them trying to get this thing
16	to fruition. So they are very proud of this work. And
17	I am, as well.
18	So like I said, we have posted this policy or
19	the Internet and made it available for the public to
20	review and for any input. And we will keep it posted
21	until the next time the Board entertains it for
22	approval. Hopefully in the next few weeks or so.

3	judgment, we are in compliance with approximately
4	96 percent of or 86 percent of the paragraphs. So
5	we are very progressing very well with this. And
6	the Board support with every all the efforts we have
7	had with the consent decree, we appreciate. As well as
8	OCI's, tremendous work related to efforts towards the
9	plans, as well. It has been a very long, long modern
10	use of the word "slog" is a summary. I made sure that
11	I looked at the definition. It said it is a long,
12	hardworking process, so it is like people are working
13	hard to get through this process, and definitely have.
14	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: And if I may, what's

DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: And if I may, what's significant about achieving the 95 percent in the district? That means we have achieved better than 94 percent, so we have actually satisfied that conditions of compliance. However, we talked about fatality, that's totality, that's why we are in the 90s uses forward, moving forward with all processes, our policy. What it shows is that we are doing things right. And again, we are at a point where it is just crossing Ts and dotting Is. There is a lot of documenting issues, but we are definitely working on policy, organization, culture change, about the way

they do business, and people should know that your
police, Detroit Police Department, are doing things the
right way. All of the things that cause us to have
this change in policy, is now becoming ingrained as
department culture. So I think all especially
Commander Romeo and all the people over at fullner crib

rating, they have been doing this for a long time, I
think about 10 years, and I think they deserve a round

It has been almost like lightening speed, if you consider the significant amount of progress that's been made in that time period. I certainly want to thank the Chief's staff and command staff and all of the officers, certainly, so it has been a collective for which is again, this is not a consent decree thing, these are new policies, and you are actually right, Chief, tells the new culture, new culture in the Department, Police Department. Thank you.

If you are not going to identify yourself by operator number, you should operate you should identify yourself at least by a badge number, and that is not taking place.

So I just wanted to make sure that I made you all aware that I am still not getting the help. And I am still am being played by these two gentlemen that



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are illegally soliciting right now as we are in this
meeting, at Motor City Casino, which is a Joe Perry and
an Eric Sykes, and it has not stopped. I am still yet
being threatened. I have went and took the advice from
City Council and took pictures and showing how this
gentleman approaches me, and threatening coming up to
me. And I have pictures to show any of you that might
be concerned. Looking at the faces, I don't see that

I also wanted it to be noted in the last session when I came to 1300 Beaubien, when Chief Lester Logan -- not -- Logan was here, I was given a phone number for the owner of Checker Cab where he proceeded in making me aware that he has never been contacted by no officer, no sergeant, no commander, no inspector, that this kind of behavior is going on with his drivers. Had he been contacted, he would have immediately sought disciplinary action. And disciplinary action, according to him, dismissal. And that has not happened.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. Ms. Campbell, if you can stay right there. You don't have to sit down. Commissioner White also wants to address you.

4	everything for the citizens, the City of Detroit, the
5	towers, and everybody involved, with our increases that
6	we are faced with every day. As Mr. Wild said, the
7	increases are more than 53 percent across the board.
8	We haven't got an increase since '96. What would put
9	us back in line is if we went back to 125, \$15 after
10	the first day, and \$50 a car to the City of Detroit.
11	Because 53 percent increase comes out, the City is
12	asking for \$75 per car increase. The City deservingly
13	should get money. But at the expense of the towers,
14	what we have to put out to operate our daily business
15	shouldn't get penalized for the City wanting \$2,500 a
16	car. I was very happy with giving them the \$50 a car,
17	plus they took our ABANs, which they are getting the
18	scrap from. That's a big, big, big cut into our
19	pie. The scrap is what we were making our living on.
20	Now the biggest percentage of our scrap which is your
21	ABANs, we don't have anymore. The City of Detroit has

And I think the true measure of the culture changing is to render a consequence for those who do not follow. And you have been consistent with making sure that that happens. And I would encourage you to continue that.

been remiss and some have been remiss, in terms of following the online presence about the Directives.

Because I am concerned about the ones which focus on the interface between probable cause and reasonable suspicion. I think that's where we get into trouble in terms of the Fourth Amendment. I would ask the body if you would consider a discussion, a larger discussion with the community, about probable cause and reasonable suspicion, so that we can talk about that. And also voluntary searches. We have had many people come to our office who are voluntary, may not have been as voluntary as one might expect.

So within that context, the final thing I
