- 4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Good afternoon, ladies
- 5 and gentlemen. Welcome to the Board of Police
- 6 Commissioners Meeting. My name is Jerome Warfield,
- 7 Chairman of the Board of Police Commissioners. Serving
- 8 here at the table with me today is Commissioner Donnell
- 9 White. And representing the Chief's Office is Deputy
- 10 Chief Tolbert. Good to have you here, sir.
- 11 D.C. TOLBERT: Thank you, sir.
- 12 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Also sitting at the
- 13 table is our Board Attorney, Attorney Celia Banks
- 14 Washington. I'm going to ask if Attorney Washington
- 15 can introduce the rest of our staff that's here today.
- 16 ATTORNEY WASHINGTON: Thank your, Mr. Chair.
- 17 We have today our Director of Police Personnel Loletha
- 18 Porter Coleman; standing in for Chief Investigator
- 19 Pamela Davis Drake is Lieutenant Timothy Leach who is
- 20 enroute. He is actually at the 1300 in error. We have
- 21 Mr. Robert Brown. We have recording, Sergeant Alan
- 22 Quinn, Ms. Elizabeth Koller is our court reporter, and
- 23 I believe that includes everyone, sir.
- 24 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am. At
- 25 this time I'm going to ask Pastor Penson, Chaplain for



- 1 Detroit Police Department can come and lead us in our
- 2 invocation.
- 3 CHAPLAIN PENSON: May we all bow our heads
- 4 in a word of prayer. Oh Gracious God, and Heavenly
- 5 Father, we come before you to say thank you for the
- 6 gift of life that you blessed on us today. Now today,
- 7 God, we just ask your blessings upon this meeting.
- 8 Bless this Board and continue to bless our Department
- 9 and it is utilized as a vehicle that gives us security
- 10 for the City of Detroit.
- 11 We bless you and we honor you, Lord God. In
- 12 Jesus name. Amen.
- 13 AUDIENCE: Amen.
- 14 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, Pastor.
- We do not have a quorum as you can see, so we
- 16 will proceed through the agenda and just meet as a
- 17 committee of the whole without taking any voting
- 18 measures today.
- I want to thank the entire towing committee,
- 20 community, I'm sorry, the entire towing community for
- 21 coming together and presenting a plan for City Council
- 22 that was approved yesterday. Just an outstanding job
- 23 by you all for the work that you -- the hard work and
- 24 many hours that you put in making sure that everybody
- 25 was made whole and everybody was satisfied. Everybody



- 1 gave a little bit. And so we thank you so very much
- 2 just for making that process a very easy and a very
- 3 smooth process.
- 4 As relates to the search for the Chief of
- 5 Police we are still in process. And so as soon as we
- 6 move forward and we're to, you know, the Mayor's ready
- 7 to announce who the candidates are certainly we will
- 8 bring that to your as well, but that is still in
- 9 process.
- Is there a Secretary's Report today?
- 11 ATTORNEY WASHINGTON: Yes, sir, Mr. Chair.
- 12 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I'm going to ask if
- 13 Celia Banks Washington can give the Secretary's Report.
- 14 Mr. Anthony is away on vacation.
- 15 ATTORNEY WASHINGTON: Thank you, sir. 2013
- 16 monthly count of complaints March 76, year-to-date 248
- 17 as compared to 2012 in March there was 132, that
- 18 represents a 42 percent decrease, the year-to-date as
- 19 compared to 2012 last year there were 332, this year
- 20 248 which represents a 25 percent decrease.
- 21 At the end of March 2013 the Office of the
- 22 Chief Investigator had 207 open investigations. There
- 23 were 248 new cases filed, 258 cases closed. Of the
- 24 76 cases filed 41 percent involved unknown officers.
- 25 The alleged Known Units involved leading in complaints



- 1 filed in March 2013 were Communications at 12 percent,
- 2 Eastern District at 9 percent, the 8th, 12th Precincts
- 3 and Northeastern District, 5 percent.
- The 76 cases filed in March involve 110
- 5 allegations where the leading areas of concern were
- 6 demeanor 26 percent, procedure 24 percent, service
- 7 15 percent, force and harassment 12 percent. That
- 8 would conclude the Secretary's Report, Mr. Chair.
- 9 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Any questions regarding
- 10 the Secretary's Report, sir?
- 11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: No questions, Mr. Chair.
- 12 Only, Counsel, once the Secretary's returned, I know we
- 13 had the Matrix that showed the unknown officers based
- on priors and year-to-date numbers.
- 15 ATTORNEY WASHINGTON: Yes, sir.
- 16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: If we can just have that
- included at our next or subsequent meetings, one of our
- 18 subsequent meetings.
- 19 ATTORNEY WASHINGTON: I'll make sure I relay
- 20 that to him.
- 21 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you.
- 22 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
- 23 Madam Attorney, in lieu of Lieutenant Leach making his
- 24 way here can you go over the OCI Report, please?
- 25 ATTORNEY WASHINGTON: If I could I can talk a



- 1 little bit about some of the things going on at OCI.
- 2 But in terms of actually statistics Lieutenant Leach
- 3 would have those current numbers today.
- 4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sure.
- 5 ATTORNEY WASHINGTON: There was as I think
- 6 it's pretty known to everybody there was an issue when
- 7 the Monitors were here with regard to certain cases not
- 8 having been submitted timely to the Chief's Office.
- 9 That matter has been resolved.
- We made sure that we did get those cases to
- 11 the Chief's Office, and I would like to personally
- 12 thank D.C. Ewing for being very accommodating to us and
- 13 allowing us to overload him with those cases, but they
- 14 were delivered and received acknowledgment of them.
- We've developed some plans, safeguards to
- 16 make sure that this doesn't happen in the future.
- 17 Those plans include closer monitoring and additional
- 18 supervision of our clerical staff and working very
- 19 closely with the Director of Personnel to fill our
- 20 clerical vacancy.
- 21 Also as a followup to last month's report,
- 22 Chief Davis Drake is working with IT to reschedule the
- 23 Data 911 training, that should be completed within the
- 24 next two weeks. Finally, Chief Investigator asked me
- 25 to mention that the Board is in receipt of the final



- 1 draft of the "tracked changes" version of the revised
- 2 Standard Operating Procedure for us or OCI, and OCI is
- 3 awaiting approval and adoption of that document.
- 4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. Thank you, ma'am.
- 5 Anything, sir?
- 6 COMMISSIONER WHITE: No.
- 7 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: At this time we'll
- 8 turn it over to the Chief's Office.
- 9 D.C. TOLBERT: We had a presentation
- 10 scheduled by Internal Controls. However, since we had
- 11 some technical difficulties and we weren't able to set
- 12 up we're going to postpone that if you don't mind until
- 13 next week.
- 14 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: No problem. Anything
- 15 else?
- D.C. TOLBERT: That's it.
- 17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Wonderful. Because we do
- 18 not have a quorum we cannot vote, but I do want to read
- 19 a Resolution honoring the retirement of Deputy Chief
- 20 Benjamin Lee into the record for today. I'm going to
- 21 ask if Commissioner White would read that Resolution
- 22 for us, please, sir.
- 23 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Certainly. Thank you,
- 24 Mr. Chair, and I would like to say it's definitely an
- 25 honor to read this Resolution in honor of Deputy Chief



- 1 Benjamin Lee. Someone I've know to be very much so the
- 2 consummate professional that I've had a chance to know.
- 3 And I don't know if it's because he is retiring,
- 4 Mr. Chair, that he came in smiling today or if the sun
- 5 just happens to be shining his way as the rain falls on
- 6 the rest of us today, but we're glad to see the Deputy
- 7 Chief smiling today.
- 8 A Resolution Honoring Retirement of Deputy
- 9 Chief Benjamin Lee.
- 10 Whereas Benjamin Lee was appointed to the
- 11 Detroit Police Department on March 27th, 1978. After
- 12 graduating from the Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy
- 13 Officer Lee was assigned to the Central Events and
- 14 later to the 3rd Precinct, 12th Precinct as well as
- 15 Narcotic Division-Street Enforcement Section.
- And whereas Lee was promoted to the rank of
- 17 Sergeant on May 12, 1989 and was assigned to 8th
- 18 Precinct. Subsequently Sergeant Lee was reassigned to
- 19 the Narcotic Enforcement Division, the 4th Precinct,
- 20 resigned to the Narcotics Enforcement Division, the
- 21 13th Precinct and the 10th Precinct. While assigned to
- 22 the Narcotic Street Enforcement Section, under his
- 23 leadership and direction his unit seized 71 kilograms
- 24 of cocaine, the largest single seizure of cocaine in
- 25 the history of the Detroit Police Department.



1	And whereas Lee continually displayed his
2	commitment to excellence in the performance of his
3	administrative and supervisory assignments. He was
4	promoted to the rank of Lieutenant on October 3rd, 1995
5	whereupon he was assigned to the 2nd Precinct. His
6	other assignments as Lieutenant included 1st Precinct,
7	the Support Services Division and Tactical Operations
8	Section.
9	And whereas Lieutenant Lee was appointed to
10	the rank Inspector on July 29th, 2002 and reassigned to
11	the Tactical Operations Section and later to the
12	1st Precinct. Inspector Lee successfully coordinated
13	and executed security plans for G8 Energy Submit,
14	Detroit Red Wing's Stanley Cup, Detroit Pistons
15	Parades, and Annual Target Fireworks Display. In
16	September 2005 Inspector Lee was appointed to the rank
17	of Commander. His assignments included Grants and
18	Contracts and Management Services Bureau. As Commander
19	he continued to coordinate security plans for the 2005
20	Major League All Star Game and the NFL Experience for
21	the 2006 Super Bowl.
22	And whereas Commander Lee was appointed to
23	the rank of Deputy Chief on September 23rd, 2010 and
24	remained in command of the Management Service Bureau
25	and later Patrol Operations Bureau-East until his



- 1 retirement on April 12th, 2013.
- 2 And whereas Deputy Chief Lee has dutifully
- 3 served the citizens of Detroit for more than 29 years.
- 4 He was the deserving recipient of the Chief's Merit
- 5 Award, Chief's Unit Award, All Star Baseball Award, (1)
- 6 Rosa Park Award, Super Bowl, and numerous letters of
- 7 appreciation and commendations from citizens and
- 8 businesses.
- 9 Whereas Deputy Lee recognized the value of
- 10 education, and enhanced his career by earning a
- 11 Bachelor of Science Degree in Criminal Justice from the
- 12 University of Detroit Mercy. He is also a graduate of
- 13 the prestigious Northwestern University School of
- 14 Police Staff and Command, as well as the Michigan State
- 15 University Command Officers Development curriculum.
- Now therefore be it resolved that the Board
- of Police Commissioners speaking on behalf of the
- 18 citizens of the City of Detroit and the Detroit Police
- 19 Department recognize and honor the longevity,
- 20 professionalism and contributions of Deputy Chief
- 21 Benjamin F. Lee. His tenacious spirit and dedication
- 22 to improving the quality of life for the citizens of
- 23 Detroit and it's neighboring communities merit our
- 24 highest regard.
- We thank and congratulate you, Deputy Chief



- 1 Benjamin F. Lee. Signed the Detroit Board of Police
- 2 Commissioners, and adopted this day April 25th, 2013.
- 3 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Will you come on up,
- 4 sir.
- 5 (Applause and pictures were taken.)
- D.C. TOLBERT: We just want to ask one more
- 7 question about towing, though.
- 8 MS. SMITH: That's not nice.
- 9 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Do you want to say
- 10 something, sir? Okay. Good.
- D.C. LEE: Humbly, I want to thank you for
- 12 this Resolution. It was a very good career for me with
- 13 the Police Department. I came on in '78. I was laid
- off in 1979, came back and continued to work. It was
- indeed a pleasure to work with this Board. It was
- indeed a pleasure even working on towing.
- 17 A lot of people from these meetings, you
- 18 know, some of the issues that was with towing we were
- 19 able to work through that. And I think we were able to
- 20 resolve a lot of the issues, not all of the issues that
- 21 we had, but we attempted to. Especially where it came
- 22 to a fair rotation. I don't think anybody's been to a
- 23 meeting of late -- I hope everybody's here today that
- 24 asked about fair rotation. We've cleared that hurtle.
- It was indeed a pleasure to serve with all of



- 1 the Command Officers that I served with. It was
- 2 especially pleasing when I did announce to the Chief
- 3 that I was leaving that he allowed me to leave on my
- 4 own terms.
- 5 Contrary to any beliefs or anything, I was
- 6 not forced out, I was not sick, none of that. I left
- 7 on my own terms, and that's the way you like to leave
- 8 as an executive. You don't want to get that phone
- 9 call. Because I was always friends with every person
- in the Department. And whenever I got a call on 5:00
- 11 to come to the Chief's Office, I would call that person
- 12 up and, say, where are you? The personnel director's
- 13 going to be there telling you that may be your last
- 14 day, so I was always friends with all personnel
- 15 directors, so I'd have an advanced warning.
- But I thank you. My coffee and cake is
- 17 tomorrow. All invited. It's 11:00 at the Training
- 18 Center 6050 Linwood. I'll be there. I'll have a few
- 19 words to say I'm sure when everything's over. But
- 20 publicly now I thank the Board for this. Thank you.
- 21 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Well, thank you, sir.
- 22 (Applause and pictures were taken.)
- 23 D.C. LEE: Linwood and Marquette. I do have
- 24 something about towing if there's time for a comment.
- 25 (Laughter.)



- 1 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: We do have another
- 2 Resolution honoring Parrie L. Highgate, and we can read
- 3 that one into the record as well and we'll vote it into
- 4 our archives and accept these at our next meeting when
- 5 we have a quorum. Is Sergeant Highgate here? Okay.
- 6 COMMISSIONER WHITE: A Resolution honoring
- 7 Sergeant Parrie L. Highgate. We'll read the Resolved
- 8 clause and the permanent Resolution will be entered
- 9 into the archives.
- Now therefore be it resolved that the Detroit
- 11 Board of Police Commissioners speaking for the citizens
- of Detroit and the Detroit Police Department award this
- 13 Resolution in recognition of Sergeant Parrie L.
- 14 Highgate 25 years of dedicated and diligent public
- 15 service. Her professionalism, integrity and level of
- 16 commitment to the City of Detroit and its citizens
- 17 merit our highest regards and best wishes for continued
- 18 success.
- 19 We salute and congratulate you, Sergeant
- 20 Parrie L. Highgate. Signed the Detroit Board of Police
- 21 Commissioners adopted this day April 25th, 2013.
- 22 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, sir.
- I'm going to move back up in the agenda just
- 24 a moment to ask Lieutenant Leach if he can come to the
- 25 podium and review the OCI monthly report numbers for



- 1 us?
- 2 LIEUTENANT LEACH: Good afternoon, Board,
- 3 Lieutenant Timothy Leach. Our current status as of
- 4 today April 25th, 190 open cases compared to last year
- 5 480, and at this time we have zero cases over 90
- 6 compared to last year 220. Any questions?
- 7 COMMISSIONER WHITE: No.
- 8 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir. All
- 9 right. Our next meeting for the Board of Police
- 10 Commissioner will be Thursday, May 2nd, 3:00 p.m., at
- 11 1300 Beaubien, Room 328A.
- 12 At this time the agenda calls for oral
- 13 communications. If you wish to address the Board of
- 14 Police Commissioners you may come to the podium at this
- 15 time, give us your name for the record and we ask that
- 16 you abide by our two-minute time limit for our
- 17 timekeeper.
- 18 Are there any comments at this time? Yes,
- 19 sir, you can come to the podium.
- MR. FORSYTHE: Hello, may name is Peter
- 21 Forsythe. I live in the Woodbridge neighborhood near
- 22 Wayne State in Midtown. I'm here, I've been following
- a murder case which took place in our neighborhood on
- 24 April 21st of this year. And I have been doing
- 25 whatever I can to assist Detroit Police Department in



- 1 apprehending of the criminal in the case. This is a
- 2 murder case. A AK 47 was used. Basically I'm here not
- 3 to make any particular announcements to this group. I
- 4 would just like to talk to someone about the way the
- 5 investigation is going.
- I am aware of information that's out there in
- 7 the City that could help in -- that I think could help
- 8 in solution of this crime and apprehending a criminal.
- 9 And I'm not going to announce, make public what this
- 10 information is.
- But I'd like to talk to somebody to whom I
- 12 could share this information just to see that this
- does, that information is going to make it to the right
- 14 person because so far this information I know has not
- 15 been followed up on, and I'm concerned. I feel like,
- 16 hey, this is important. If I were making this
- 17 investigation I would want to be talking to this
- 18 particular, one particular person. So that's pretty
- 19 much it. I would like to talk to somebody that I could
- 20 relay some information. Thank you.
- D.C. TOLBERT: Mr. Forsythe, I'd like to
- 22 thank you for coming. I applaud you that you want to
- 23 come out in public and especially in the public forum
- 24 to say you have some information, and that's exactly
- 25 what we want to happen with all of our citizens, if



- 1 they have any information to make sure that it comes to
- 2 us.
- 3 What I'm going to do is right behind you is
- 4 Commander Frankie Lewis of Major Crimes under which is
- 5 Homicide. I'm sure you can have a conversation with
- 6 him and the information you have I absolutely
- 7 quaranteed will be followed up on.
- 8 MR. FORSYTHE: Great. Thank's a lot.
- 9 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
- 10 Mr. Forsythe.
- MS. PANNELL: Good afternoon, Sharon Pannell.
- 12 I'm just telling you that the Second Precinct is having
- 13 a cleanup Saturday at Grand River and Greenfield, 9:00.
- 14 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am.
- MS. PANNELL: Thank you.
- MS. SMITH: Good afternoon.
- 17 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Good afternoon.
- 18 MS. SMITH: Bernice Smith, Political
- 19 Activist. To you Deputy, to our Board, to Donnell,
- 20 what a beautiful speech he made this morning on our
- 21 program in regards to the NAACP, and I do wish that
- 22 more people that would be able to come.
- What I want to ask, you the Board, is it true
- that we have police that are surveying the downtown
- area especially in Greektown area and they're picking



- 1 up the homeless people and vagrants and taking them to
- 2 outside areas of Detroit. And in one instance someone
- 3 was taken to over by the neighborhood Buchanan and
- 4 Warren.
- 5 And I was just wondering, come to the Board
- 6 and ask them are they aware that there are certain
- 7 policemen that are doing this to the homeless taking
- 8 them to the various neighborhoods and they have to walk
- 9 back. One was taken to where the tire was on 94. So I
- 10 would like to know are you aware of this going on in
- 11 our City?
- 12 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I am not. The Board is
- 13 not.
- D.C. TOLBERT: I've heard allegations just
- 15 similarly as you have. One thing I like to caution,
- 16 when we hear stories they're just that until we can
- 17 prove them. And we're in the process now of conducting
- 18 an investigation. So I can't comment on the validity
- 19 of the accusations.
- However, if we do find that there are, we're
- 21 going to investigate thoroughly and if we do find there
- 22 are violations of our Department Policy or individual's
- 23 civil rights we'll deal with them accordingly.
- MS. SMITH: All right. If I find out
- 25 anything else then I'll definitely come to you and let



- 1 you know.
- D.C. TOLBERT: Absolutely.
- 3 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Ms. Smith, if you know of
- 4 any individuals, if you actually know the individuals
- 5 you can certainly put them contact with our OCI Staff
- 6 and they will follow up and investigate as well.
- 7 MS. SMITH: All right, then, thank you so
- 8 much.
- 9 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you. Yes, sir.
- 10 LIEUTENANT LEACH: Lieutenant Leach. The
- 11 last couple meetings I've been hearing about it so I
- 12 did a database check and I went all the way back to
- 13 2007. We have no complaints of anything of that nature
- 14 from the Office of the Chief Investigators.
- 15 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Okay. Yes, ma'am,
- 16 come on.
- MS. CLARK: Good afternoon.
- 18 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Good afternoon.
- 19 MS. CLARK: I'm Barbara Lewis Clark, and I am
- 20 the founder and president of the Henry Clark Stroke
- 21 Foundation. And I am interested in promoting social
- 22 awareness to the City employees. Our organization is
- 23 the first stroke foundation in the State of Michigan.
- I was a City of Detroit employee until 2001.
- 25 I retired in 2001. I worked for the Detroit Police for



- 1 16 years or actually for 21 years. I was a fingerprint
- 2 technician for 16 years.
- 3 My husband, Henry, suffered a massive stroke
- 4 at age of 47. Today more people in their fifties,
- 5 forties, thirties, twenties, and teens are suffering
- 6 strokes. We are having our 10th annual stroke
- 7 conference on Saturday, May 4th, at the U of M Detroit
- 8 Center located at 3663 Woodward at Mack from 9:00 to
- 9 1:00.
- But I did speak to someone. I am to contact
- 11 actually I think Sergeant Stephens to get assistance in
- 12 setting up booths for police work at different
- 13 districts. I'm looking forward to that. We are busy
- 14 year round promoting stroke awareness. We have our own
- 15 events. Not only do we have our stroke conference. We
- 16 have a ACU Club where we educate young people. We do
- 17 blood pressure screening. We give seminars and go
- 18 anywhere and everywhere to do so. We do it all free.
- 19 We are all about prevention. We do not do any
- 20 research. I thank you for your time.
- 21 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Ms. Clark, we appreciate
- 22 you telling us that.
- Are there others? Once, going twice. All
- 24 right. We'll close that section of our meeting. At
- 25 this time if there's nothing else? Anything else?
