4	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Good
5	afternoon, ladies and gentlemen. We are about to
6	start the meeting. We were trying to improve the
7	lighting conditions just a little bit, but we
8	will work with what we have.
9	Certainly we're grateful to be here
10	tonight in the Westminster Church and certainly
11	we want to give a great big thank you to our host
12	tonight, those who are members of the Westminster
13	Church and the officials here.
14	My name is Jerome Warfield, Chairman of
15	the Board of Police Commissioners. Serving with
16	me tonight is the Vice-Chairperson of the Board
17	Commissioner Jessica Taylor as well as
18	Commissioner Donnell White.
19	Representing the Chief of Police Office
20	is Deputy Chief James Tolbert. Sir, good to have
21	you at the table.
22	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Thank you.
23	Good evening, sir.
24	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Also sitting at



the table this evening is our Board Secretary

Page 4 1 Attorney George Anthony. I'm going to ask 2 Mr. Anthony if he could introduce the rest of our staff for the audience tonight. 3 4 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, 5 Mr. Chair. For the record, George Anthony, 6 Secretary to the Board. We have present seated in the front of the hall is Ms. Pamela 7 Davis-Drake in the front row. She is our Chief 8 Investigator for the Office of the Chief 9 10 Investigator. We have Ms. Loletha Porter-Coleman who 11 12 is our Director of Police Personnel. We have 13 Ms. Celia Banks Washington who is our attorney to 14 the Board. 15 We also have Officer Kent Cooper from 16 the Office of the Chief Investigator, and 17 Mr. Robert Brown who is our office manager. 18 Recording our proceedings is Sgt. Alan Ouinn and Mr. Dale Rose from Hanson Court 19 20 Reporting Service and that completes the 2.1 introduction. 2.2 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, 23 Mr. Anthony. Certainly we appreciate that again. 24 We're so grateful to those who have hosted us



here today at Westminster Church and we thank God

1	for you for allowing us to meet here in our
2	community setting.
3	At this time I'm going to ask if Lt.
4	Hall, Lt. Rene Hall, could come to the podium,
5	please, ma'am, and lead us in our invocation for
6	tonight. Thank you.
7	ACTING INSP. HALL: Yes, sir. Good
8	evening.
9	(INVOCATION WAS GIVEN.)
10	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
11	lieutenant, we appreciate that, ma'am. At this
12	time I'm going to ask if the Vice-Chairperson,
13	Commissioner Taylor, could review the duties and
14	responsibilities of the Board of Police
15	Commissioners.
16	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: The Board of
17	Police Commissioners was created by City Charter
18	July 1, 1974, five members appointed by the Mayor
19	and confirmed by City Council.
20	Commissioners serve five-year terms and
21	may not serve more than five years consecutively.
22	Meets once a week 52 weeks out of the year and
23	all meetings are open to the public.
24	Duties: Establish policy, rules and



regulations in consultation with the Chief and

1	approval of the Mayor. Review and approve
2	department budget, review and approve department
3	promotions, receive and resolve complaints
4	concerning the operation of the police
5	department, final authority to impose and/or
6	review discipline of police department employees,
7	appoint civilian personnel director, prepare an
8	annual report of department activities for the
9	public, Mayor and City Council.
10	Staff: Executive Secretary who serves
11	as Secretary to the Board and attends all
12	meetings, Chief Investigator and additional
13	investigators, other staff as necessary to
14	provide support to the Board.
15	The Police Commission considers itself
16	a liaison between the citizens of the city of
17	Detroit and the Detroit Police Department.
18	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
19	Commissioner Taylor. At this time we will
20	entertain a motion to approve tonight's agenda,
21	Thursday May 9, 2013.
22	COMMISSIONER WHITE: So moved.
23	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Support.
24	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's been
25	properly moved and supported. All those in



1	favor?
2	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
3	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those
4	opposed? Motion carries. In addition, we will
5	entertain a motion to approve Thursday's minutes
6	from April 18, 2013.
7	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So moved.
8	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.
9	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Without
10	objection, all those in favor?
11	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
12	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those
13	opposed? Motion carried. We additionally will
14	entertain a motion to approve the minutes from
15	Thursday, April 25, 2013.
16	COMMISSIONER WHITE: So moved.
17	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Support.
18	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Without
19	objection, all those in favor?
20	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
21	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: And then
22	finally we move or we'll entertain a motion to
23	approve the minutes from Thursday, May 2, 2013.
24	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So moved.
25	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.



1	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Without
2	objection, all those in favor?
3	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
4	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Again, thank
5	you all for being here today. It's always a
6	pleasure for us to come out here to the community
7	and just bring to the community what the Board of
8	Police Commissioners do on a week in and week out
9	basis and give you an opportunity to hear from
10	us, but more importantly for us an opportunity to
11	hear from you.
12	I do want to give a brief update as
13	relates to the search for the Police Chief. As
14	we've said for the last almost three weeks now
15	we've turned the names of the five candidates
16	that were given to us from the search company
17	over to the Mayor and to the Emergency Manager
18	and they have those names in their hands and
19	they're doing their process, whatever the Mayor's
20	process is, whatever the Emergency Manager's
21	process is, they're doing that and certainly I'm
22	expecting that when they have decided on a
23	candidate, then we will hear from them.
24	We know that in the news media there is
25	a lot of talk about one person in particular.



1	However,	all of	the	cand	didates	are	in	very	7
2	serious c	ontenti	on,	you	know.	I h	ave	not	been
3	told anyt	hing ot	herw	ise.					

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Unfortunately one person put themselves out there in the media and now they are the favorite. And maybe it turns out that that person maybe could be selected, but everything that this Board knows right now is that all of the candidates that we've turned over to the Mayor and to the Emergency Manager are still in very serious contention of that position.

And so we're going to let the process do its job and we believe that at the end of the day no matter which candidate gets picked that we will have an excellent candidate for Chief of Police for the City of Detroit based on the things that we've been able to understand about the candidates.

So we just ask for your indulgence and your patience with the Mayor's office and with the Office of Emergency Manager as they work together to make sure that they pick the very best person for this important job.

I've said this before, but it bears to be repeated and I've said it many times within

1	the last probably week and a half.
2	I want to give just kudos to Chief
3	Chester Logan for just an outstanding job.
4	(APPLAUSE.)
5	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: And I know that
6	he's not here tonight, but the public needs to
7	understand that Asst. Chief Logan came out of
8	retirement to serve under the administration of
9	the former Chief of Police and when the
10	department needed high integrity and high ethics,
11	he stepped into those roles and fulfilled them
12	and exceeded everything that we've asked of him.
13	With all of the things that's on his
L 4	plate, be it personal, professional or within the
15	department he has never not come to work with
16	expectations that this department as he says is
17	as good as some and better than most.
18	And so our hats are off to him, we pay
19	homage to him and we thank God for him for a job
20	that's well done. He still is our Chief of
21	Police and so we ask that when you do see him
22	that you just give him a pat on the back or give
23	him a hug, just let him know or send him an
24	e-mail and let him know that he really has, has



done just an outstanding job as Chief of Police.

1	Moving on, we will move to the Chief's
2	Office, having said that, with Deputy Chief
3	Tolbert to hear from the Northwestern District.
4	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Good evening
5	through the Chair, good evening everyone.
6	Today we have a presentation from the
7	Northwestern District/8th precinct. I'm going to
8	bring up the commanding officer of the Northwest
9	District, Inspector Darryl Brown.
10	INSPECTOR BROWN: The Great.
11	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: The Great
12	Northwestern District, that's right, that's
13	right.
14	(APPLAUSE.)
15	INSPECTOR BROWN: Good evening and
16	thanks all in attendance. I definitely was going
17	to say this is the Great Northwestern District
18	because not only do we say it do we speak it,
19	but we actually believe it.
20	Here at the Northwest District we are
21	committed to serving the community. We believe
22	in reducing crime, reducing blight and increasing
23	investment in the Northwest District.
24	I'm not going to talk long today. My



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Acting Inspector who is extremely capable of

1	doing her job, my job and some other jobs on the
2	police department is anxious to get up here with
3	her presentation, so without further adieux I'd
4	like to bring up Acting Inspector Rene Hall.
5	ACTING INSP. HALL: I don't know,
6	Inspector, I don't know about eager. Good
7	evening.
8	I first want to also thank Westminster
9	Church of Detroit for hosting this Board of
10	Police Commissioners meeting tonight and I also
11	want to thank Al Shalah who has providing
12	refreshments in the back for all of us.
13	I want to start with the numbers of the
14	8th Precinct. The 8th Precinct is the largest
15	precinct in the city of Detroit. We have the
16	most real estate and we have the highest volume
17	of calls for service.
18	We're currently 15.25 square miles,
19	we're bounded on the south by Fenkell, the north
20	by Eight Mile, west at Five Points, John C. Lodge
21	from Eight Mile to Curtis and Schaefer from
22	Curtis to Fenkell bounds our west.
23	According to the latest statistics or
24	the census the 8th Precinct has approximately



94,000 people. We have six elementary schools,

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three middle schools, three high schools which
are Renaissance, Henry Ford, Jerry L. White and
we're also home to one of Wayne County Community
College's campuses.

We have approximately 200 churches, 400 business and seven senior or nursing homes in our community. Since I've taken command of the 8th Precinct we've created EPIC and that is the Eighth Precinct Initiatives on Crime.

Under this initiative we have a service and a spirit of excellence campaign. When you take a look at businesses like General Motors or Starbucks they identify who their customers are and they tailor their business for customer satisfaction.

Well, at the 8th Precinct we recognize, if you can look out, we recognize who our customers are and we've tailored police services for community satisfaction.

We operate in a spirit of excellence, excellence in response time, excellence in service and excellence is day-to-day involvement and we're priding ourselves right now on a 48-hour or less turn-around time to answer complaints.

1	As the Inspector said, we're committed
2	to crime reduction. We've increased our Special
3	Operations to 20 percent of our overall
4	population to ensure that those individuals who
5	are committing robberies and shootings in our
6	area are both identified and apprehended.
7	Our B&E Task Force is 5 percent of our
8	overall population. They're working together
9	along with Dr. George Kelling who is the author
10	of Broken Windows Theory out of New York and
11	Grandmont-Rosedale Community just to name one to
12	reduce B&Es or home envisions in the 8th
13	Precinct.
14	To date we're approximately 27 percent
15	lower in B&Es than we've been in 2012. NIPIT and
16	Detroit One, Narcotics Intensity Patrol and
17	initiative Team. It's a group that augments our
18	enforcement efforts in the 8th Precinct.
19	Lt. Baron will give you some additional
20	stats because he's here. He's the commanding
21	officer of Tac Support and he oversees the NIPIT
22	operation which is Narcotics and Tactical Support
23	together, but this entity is in our district
24	throughout the week ensuring that they're

augmenting our efforts to ensure that we're

1	reducing crime.
2	Detroit One is another initiative where
3	the individuals who are apprehended, if they are
4	identified as habitual offenders they're taken to
5	the federal prosecution to ensure that they're
6	prosecuted because the federal system has
7	mandatory minimums.
8	We're expanding our community
9	involvement with our block clubs, our youth and
10	our seniors. We're establishing new and
11	reactivating old organizations because we
12	recognize that this works. Community police
13	partnerships have always worked. They will
14	continue to work because we recognize that united
15	we stand and divided we fall.
16	We're hosting weekly blight meetings.
17	Every Monday morning at 9 AM the citizens that
18	sit before you come to our district with all of
19	their qualify-of-life concerns and we have
20	committed to handle those concerns within 48
21	hours.
22	When I talk about community programs or
23	community organizations we currently have 45
24	active organizations and 15 active CB patrols.
25	It has been statistically proven that those areas



1	who have active CB patrols and community
2	organizations have a significantly lower
3	incidence of crime than those areas who do not
4	have those organizations.
5	Community programs have a great
6	relationship with our Community Relations
7	officers, or Aban and our Environmental officers.
8	We're moved into the 21st century and
9	so has our community. We're communicating via
10	technology, we have e-mail crime alerts, we're
11	able to get realtime data on cars that are
12	suspicious in the area, pictures of license
13	plates and we're able to get that information to
L 4	our Special Ops and our Patrol in a timely manner
15	and we're also using Yahoo Account.
16	Our businesses in the area and I
17	spoke about having 400 they're a huge part of
18	what we do in the 8th Precinct.
19	Businesses United with Officers and
20	Youth has existed since 1994 and they
21	continuously identify those youth in our
22	community and give them an opportunity that they
23	would not normally have under normal
24	circumstances.



We have a B&E Follow-up Program which

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1	is centered around prevention of future
2	burglaries and it teaches our citizens to enhance
3	their current burglary systems. We also have a
4	False Alarm Reduction Program and this is a
5	comprehensive program that educates our community
6	on limiting the number of false alarms that we're
7	having and it gives them common sense mistakes
8	that typically are done that trigger false
9	alarms.
10	We have youth programs, Cops Read to
11	Kids is a pre-K and elementary school program
12	geared toward kids three to eight. Now, you say
13	why is this important.
14	Well, we recognize if we're able to
15	build relationships with these individuals when
16	they're young, that means less interaction from
17	an enforcement standpoint when they grow to be
18	older. Our law enforcement explorers or our Post

23 life of a law enforcement officer.

24 Our Operation Safe Passage is our

808 Program is geared to 14 to 21 and these

individuals have a desire to pursue a career in

law enforcement. And we interact with them on a

early morning monitoring of bus stops as well as

day-to-day basis so they can see the real true

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1	walking	routes	SO	we	can	ensure	that	our	students
2	are gett	ting to	sch	nool	saf	Tely.			

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The next youth initiative is a new one and I'm truly truly excited about it. We recognize that we have two gangs in the 8th Precinct and that is RCM and 22 Band.

We're currently working with Cody High School and Henry Ford High School to engage these individuals in intermural sports where they will compete against the 8th Precinct and 6th Precinct officers in flag football, basketball and softball because we recognize that an idle mind is a devil's workshop.

So if we can get these individuals engaged in some positive recreation activities, we can limit or eliminate their interaction in violent crime. So we're going to be asking at this event that the police and the gangs check their weapons.

We have senior programs and these are basically geared toward crime prevention. We educate our seniors on the con games and some of the scams that are typically geared towards them.

Our senior 911 or data system program is in the 8th Precinct as well as throughout the



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city of Detroit. What we in this program
seniors aged 65 and over are placed into a data
system at Communications as well as the district
so when they call for 9-1-1 we ensure that they
get a scout car.

We have some future endeavors and to the Board you will be getting a write-up on these future endeavors for your approval in the very near future. But we're striving to create a Citizen Advisory Board and that is to solicit the community for ideas and suggestions on how to continue these community partnerships.

This is a team concept because we understand that teamwork makes the dream work. We're going to be introducing block-by-block program where we're going to have specific officers assigned to a geographical location and they're going to be identifying the root causes of problems and the quality of life concerns and identifying sustainable solutions for these problems.

Our overall goal is to create a coalition of the willing, if you will, and that is the Detroit Police Department, Building Safety and Engineering, Public Lighting, DPW, because

L	what we understand is it takes all hands on deck
2	in order for you to create a great place for our
3	citizens to live, work and play.

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In parting, I just want to share some specifics with you. I talked about how we're committed to reducing crime in the city of Detroit and in the 8th Precinct specifically right now.

If you take a look on the board, turn your attention to the board, with the 8th Precinct and the NIPIT operation we've been able to effect almost 700 felony arrests, 300 misdemeanor arrests, 200 juvenile detentions.

We've taken 200 guns off the street including 18 assault rifles and we've answered almost 48,000 calls for service.

So as you traverse through the 8th Precinct I want you to engage our citizens and we want you to ask them to grade the 8th Precinct and the grade we're looking for is an E, an E for excellent, an E for epic and E for engagement and an E for excitement because we're excited about what we're doing in the 8th Precinct and we're all on board and we're just asking you to come aboard. Thank you.

1	(APPLAUSE.)
2	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: We're going to
3	have you come back as soon as the lieutenant gets
4	through. Yes, sir.
5	LT. BARON: Good evening. Lt. Alvin
6	Baron for the record, commanding officer of
7	Tactical Support and also the incident commander
8	for NIPIT operations.
9	Under the direction of Chief Chester L.
10	Logan NIPIT operations did begin. We're
11	currently in the eighth week. Chief Logan's
12	direction was to assemble a combination of Patrol
13	and Narcotic Enforcement personnel to attack high
14	crime areas in some of the most dangerous areas
15	in the city.
16	Last week we did go over to the
17	Southwest District due to the Cinco de Mayo
18	activities. Good thing we did because large
19	crowds did gather. There were a few incidents,
20	but the officers were able to keep it contained.
21	Just to go over some of the stats from
22	last week, as I mentioned before we were in the
23	Southwest District. For arrests for the week
24	there were a total of 126. Out of those 41 were
25	felony, 61 were misdemeanor and two juveniles



1	detained. Investigations, persons investigated
2	were 591, vehicles 292, handguns confiscated was
3	20, long guns 15, assault rifles nine.
4	There were 57 raids conducted and nine

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There were 57 raids conducted and nine street enforcements. There was 71 misdemeanor tickets written and 593 moving violations. There were 58 tows, vehicles towed, and I'm going to move into the stats for the narcotics aspect of NIPIT.

At it relates to cocaine there was 3,153.1 grams of cocaine confiscated which equates to a street value of \$1,261.240. For heroin there was 12.6 grams recovered for a street value of \$22,680. Marijuana which as everybody knows is probably the highest or biggest drug usage, we were able to confiscate 14,245.2 grams which equated to \$142,452 in street value.

The total street value of narcotics was \$1,426,372 and the total currency that we were able to gather was \$20,361. So NIPIT under the direction of Chief Logan is scheduled to go throughout the summer into the fall months and from there it's scheduled to conclude.

COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, Lt.

1	Baron.
2	(APPLAUSE.)
3	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: If you can
4	stay close to the mic too, sir, we'd greatly
5	appreciate it.
6	Certainly, Acting Inspector, you have
7	us excited
8	ACTING INSP. HALL: I'm glad.
9	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: about what's
10	going on in the Great Northwestern District. Any
11	question, ma'am?
12	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I just have one,
13	but it's an excellent job you're doing.
14	ACTING INSP. HALL: Thank you.
15	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: And I'm very
16	excited.
17	ACTING INSP. HALL: Join us, we're also
18	excited.
19	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I just want to
20	know, can you tell me something specific that the
21	businesses, the opportunities that they give to
22	the youth?
23	ACTING INSP. HALL: Well, actually last
24	month well, actually coming up they're going
2.5	to be sending several youth to the Grand Prix



1	They send them to the Auto Show, they did Winter
2	Blast and they do different camping trips, just
3	different things, what's exciting to the youth.
4	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: And the churches,
5	what role do they play?
6	ACTING INSP. HALL: I'm glad you asked
7	me that question. I recently met with Bishop
8	Ellis from Greater Grace about two weeks ago and
9	we're currently working on a city-wide cleanup
LO	that's going to involve our community, the
11	churches and the businesses.
12	We recognize that Motor City Makeovers
13	and cleanup and then we'll have a cleanup over
L 4	here, but our goal is to keep the Great Northwest
15	clean, so this is going to be an ongoing campaign
16	where we'll be out there every other Saturday.
L 7	We'll be engaging the schools and everyone so
18	that we can continue to keep the blight out of
19	our area.
20	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: All right, thank
21	you.
22	(APPLAUSE.).
23	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Commissioner?
24	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Madam



Inspector and certainly Insp. Brown as well for

1	the very fine job coming out of the Northwestern
2	District. I want to start if I could with the
3	lieutenant as related in the NIPIT data that was
4	given.
5	The presence in Southwest, is that
6	ongoing or is this event oriented?
7	LT. BARON: The NIPIT detail is
8	designed to hit high crime areas. However, for
9	the 4th Precinct last weekend they had that
10	event, so we wanted to make sure we covered that
11	due to the history of problems that surrounded
12	that event.
13	The detail does move. We try to stay
14	in areas where high crime continues, so we have
15	found ourself, without relaying the deployment
16	strategy, we have found ourselves staying in a
17	couple of precincts in particular.
18	COMMISSIONER WHITE: The efforts with
19	NIPIT, is it a if I'm not mistaken, is it
20	cross-agencies involved, is there multiple
21	agencies involved?
22	LT. BARON: Yes, Michigan State Police
23	from time to time, they will join the operation
24	depending on their needs and their deployments,
25	but they have joined our operation.



1	COMMISSIONER WHITE: And that leads to
2	my question, how are the drug forfeiture funds
3	divided?
4	LT. BARON: They're taken in and given
5	over to the Forfeiture Unit. Those funds are
6	regulated by the federal government and then they
7	are disbursed back to the department on a need
8	basis. So basically we have to put in for those
9	funds to be released to the department, but it's
10	regulated by the federal government.
11	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: If I can answer
12	that, and then most of narcotic forfeiture funds,
13	it depends on how the person, the individuals who
14	are charged, state or federal. If they're
15	charged on the state side, it goes to a state
16	forfeiture fund, and if it goes on the federal
17	side, it's a federal forfeiture fund.
18	If it's a federal forfeiture, there are
19	and the individuals are entitled to a share if
20	they were involved in the investigation in any
21	way and there's a formula that you have to do
22	when you call it's called the Department of
23	Attorney General, a DAG form, that's filled out
24	and once that's submitted to the federal
25	government they will tell you what portion of the



1	forfeiture money you receive.
2	On the state side, it's also some
3	sharing, but the formula isn't the same, but it
4	goes back to the State. All the funds, the state
5	and the federal funds, are in separate accounts
6	and they're regulated by what we call forfeiture
7	fund rules and regulations.
8	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Deputy Chief, one
9	follow-up to what you were just asking. So is
10	there a mechanism in place how do we track
11	what we have present in those funds before we
12	make application? Who oversees that?
13	So do we know that we can access X
14	number of dollars on the state and federal side?
15	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Yes, that's
16	tracked by Budget. Deputy Chief Toliver has that
17	information. Let me just say this one caveat.
18	There are rules how that money can be spent.
19	Certain monies have to be spent in certain
20	percentages of money has to be spent in a certain
21	allotted time and it can only be spent on certain
22	things.
23	The state forfeiture fund is very
24	restrictive at first where the monies could only
25	be spent for enforcement-related activities,



1	narcotic enforcement-related activities.
2	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, sir.
3	Madam Inspector? Thank you, lieutenant.
4	The success from NIPIT and I think
5	everyone would agree has been extremely
6	successful and with the presence being currently
7	in the 8th Precinct in the Northwestern District
8	how or what is your plan to sustain if its
9	success should in fact get moved to another area
10	of the city as the Chief has anticipated?
11	ACTING INSP. HALL: Well, we do have
12	our deployment strategies, would be Traffic,
13	Special Operations, B&E Task Force, so they are
14	deployed at the same time that NIPIT is out
15	there.
16	Of course we know that we're able to be
17	much more effective when we have a larger number
18	of officers on the street, but the days they
19	aren't out there, we're getting just as many
20	guns, just as many lockups, so we're able to
21	sustain.
22	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Okay. Last
23	question, Mr. Chair. Madam Inspector, the Cops
24	Read to Kids, Explorers and your other
25	community-oriented initiatives, are these



1	Community Relations officers staffing these
2	functions or
3	ACTING INSP. HALL: Actually we also
4	have Patrol officers who go out. We do have a
5	Patrol unit who patrols around the schools, so
6	they participate in the Read to Kids and also
7	some of our Traffic officers volunteer to read to
8	kids, so it's spread out.
9	COMMISSIONER WHITE: So this is a
10	volunteer effort or is this during the normal
11	course of their workday?
12	ACTING INSP. HALL: It's during the
13	normal course of their workday. Community
14	Relations officers typically handle these things,
15	but if we have officers on patrol who want to
16	reach out and be a part of the youth's lives, we
17	also allow that.
18	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you. Thank
19	you, Mr. Chair.
20	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
21	Just I think just one question from me, Acting
22	Inspector. You have mentioned the senior
23	citizens will be registered so that we can make
24	sure that they get a car when they call.



Can they pre-register or do they only

1	get registered when they call 9-1-1? How does
2	that work?
3	ACTING INSP. HALL: No. We actively go
4	through most of my community can tell you I'm
5	at the meetings every night. We're signing these
6	individuals up through the district Community
7	Relations officers at community meetings and
8	there's a form that they fill out and then we
9	enter them into the database system.
10	And this is not just in the 8th
11	Precinct, this is actually city-wide.
12	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Okay, great.
13	And let me say thank you too for just your
14	assistance and your help with something that's
15	going on in Northwest District on the 18th and
16	that is the May Day Parade, an activity, and we
17	know that the department will have a big presence
18	there so that the public can come out and see
19	some of the things that the department has in
20	store and thank you for all of your assistance in
21	making sure the department's presence is there,
22	appreciate that.
23	ACTING INSP. HALL: Thank you, sir,
24	you're welcome.



COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Anything else

1	for thank you, ma'am; thank you, sir.
2	(APPLAUSE).
3	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: At this time I
4	just want to
5	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: If I may just
6	add a little bit to that. It's obvious from what
7	we see with the 8th Precinct that we have to
8	engage our citizens and engage them from 8 to 80,
9	so what we want in any community, and all our
10	communities, is that engaging with the community
11	and very shortly you will see other initiatives
12	coming forth from the department that will
13	require us all, us all, to give an extraordinary
14	effort.
15	And when you look at the word
16	"extraordinary", what's the difference between
17	ordinary and extraordinary, it's a little bit
18	extra and we're going to need everybody to get
19	together and give a little bit extra effort.
20	And when we talk about programs which
21	reach out to the children or the seniors, we want
22	all our officers to be community policing
23	officers, not just certain officers, because we
24	all engage and interact with the community and we
25	have to look at the way we interact with the



1	community.
2	One of the things I really applaud
3	Insp. Brown about, he's about service, and
4	service has to be a staple for the department
5	going forward and I think and I applaud him
6	for pushing service because so many times we get
7	so caught up in reactionary policing we forget
8	about service.
9	And at the end of the day, when you
10	have an interaction with the police department it
11	needs to be an interaction that at the end of the
12	day you have felt that you were serviced
13	properly, and I think that's the way we should
14	always think of our interactions with the police
15	department.
16	So kudos to the Inspector and his staff
17	and we can move forward.
18	(APPLAUSE.)
19	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Absolutely.
20	Is that it, sir?
21	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: That's it.
22	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I was just
23	handed I think what is an explanation and
24	application for the Senior 9-1-1 Profile. Are
25	these available here tonight? They are?



1	So if there's any seniors in the crowd,
2	if you would like to pick up a profile and hand
3	it in tonight, you can certainly do that or mail
4	it or fax it back in to the Great Northwestern
5	District, you can do that as well. Thank you,
6	thank you again, thank you, sir.
7	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Point of
8	information. Deputy Chief, is this going to be
9	department-wide or is this strictly in
10	Northwestern District.
11	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Yes, that's
12	going to be department-wide. Actually I believe
13	there is a more official rollout of that form and
14	some actually in addition to that form which
15	will deal with veterans as scheduled in the next
16	couple of weeks, so you'll be hearing a little
17	bit more about that.
18	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Okay.
19	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
20	Anything else, sir? I want to recognize the
21	Honorable Councilman James Tate who's here with
22	us tonight, sir. Good to have you and if you
23	wish to come in and say some words, certainly the
24	floor is open for you, sir.



COUNCILMAN TATE: Good evening,

1	everyone. Just excited to be here in the Great
2	Northwestern District. Always got to make sure
3	you say that.
4	And just as excited about the
5	leadership in the district. You know, when
6	transitions occur, you know, you get kind of on
7	edge because you don't know what you're going to
8	get, but I think it's clear that we have a
9	tremendous leadership here in the district, so
10	kudos and hats off to you all for continuing what
11	was started and actually moving it further.
12	(APPLAUSE.)
13	COUNCILMAN TATE: So thank you for all
14	you do, all the officers and citizens, everyone
15	who's here. Thank you for participating as well.
16	I thank all of you for what you do because I know
17	it's not easy sitting on that side of the table
18	either, so thank you all.
19	(APPLAUSE.)
20	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir,
21	thank you for coming and hearing. There is a
22	Standing Committee issue that we need to discuss
23	regarding the department's budget.
24	As it is stated in the Detroit City



Charter it's the Board's responsibility to

1	approve t	the budget	for the	department	and then
2	send it o	on to the C	City Coun	ncil and to	the Mayor
3	for their	r approval.

This Board has not approved the department's budget to date. One prevailing issue for us is a couple of years ago, about two, two and a half years ago, we took the responsibility of approving the budget extremely seriously, and we asked and have been asking for the last couple of years for actuals, for the previous year's spending.

So in order for us to be able to make estimates on what the department is spending in its future budget we need actuals of what the department actually spent in its previous budget in order that we're making an intelligent decision on behalf of the citizens of the city of Detroit.

And so, again -- and our minutes will reflect it -- but consistently for as least two years we've been asking for actuals and this is one time when we do not feel comfortable in approving the department's budget until we get those actuals and we're able to make an informed intelligent decision, especially considering the

1	financial condition of the City of Detroit and
2	also considering the strains that are currently
3	on the department right now.
4	And so I'm going to ask if a
5	Commissioner would provide for us a motion and we
6	can discuss it further if you wish, what to do
7	with the budget.
8	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I so move.
9	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Can you make an
10	actual motion, please?
11	COMMISSIONER WHITE: One second,
12	Mr. Chair, let me frame this appropriately.
13	Mr. Chair, before us is an approval of
14	a budget request from the Office of the Chief and
15	I would move that this body not act upon this
16	request until such time that actuals can be
17	provided for our review prior to our forwarding
18	the budget for approval to the City Council and
19	the Mayor's office.
20	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second.
21	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's been
22	properly moved and supported that this Board not
23	move forward with the budget from the request
24	that comes from the Chief of Police until actuals
25	are provided. Any discussion on the motion?



1	COMMISSIONER WHITE: I would add, I do
2	believe in our previous discussions, and Deputy
3	Chief maybe as you're taking this information
4	back, that there was a concern that prior year
5	actuals may not be available, but what in effect
6	what we did is request at that time was the two
7	year prior actuals.
8	Because I believe what is listed is the
9	red book values and that had been used in the
10	past, but what we had said was even two year
11	prior actuals would be beneficial in terms of
12	evaluating the budget that our Chair has just
13	described.
14	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Through the
15	Chair, I am making a note and I will take that
16	information back.
17	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir,
18	appreciate that. Any other discussion on the
19	motion? Hearing or seeing none, all those in
20	favor of the motion?
21	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
22	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those
23	opposed? Motion carries. Thank you ma'am and
24	sir. We move to the portion of our meeting where
25	it gives us a great deal of joy just to honor and



1	to recognize those citizens of the city of
2	Detroit that have done outstanding jobs in their
3	respective districts and/or precincts.
4	And tonight because this is the Great
5	Northwestern District we don't honor just one,
6	but we honor two plus our Community Relations
7	officers as well.
8	And I'm going to ask if Commissioner
9	White could lead us in that effort and, sir, the
10	floor is years.
11	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,

How you doing tonight? 15 INSPECTOR GENERAL HEATH: I'm doing 16 fine. 17 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Mr. James 18 Heath. 19 INSPECTOR GENERAL HEATH: Yes, sir. 20 First of all, first of all I know you all have a 2.1 couple more resolutions and it's about 85 degrees 22 and so I'm not going to hold you very long, but I 23 wanted to join the chorus of folks congratulating 24 our winners or our recipients for recognition.



Everyone here today, and especially my

1	good friend Brother Buffington, he's a
2	contemporary of mine, always good to see someone
3	like that recognized for the work that he does.
4	Mr. Chairman, thank you for allowing me
5	to speak for very brief few minutes here today.
6	I'm the new kid on the block here in the city. I
7	was appointed as the Inspector General for the
8	City of Detroit back in August of last year. Our
9	office is getting off the ground.
10	Those of you who watched the media, you
11	may have seen that we had a pretty big launch
12	back in February of this year and our mission as
13	laid out in the Charter is very simple, and
14	that's to root out fraud, abuse, waste and
15	corruption in city government.
16	And that includes city contracts, city
17	employees, really anyone who has anything to do
18	with the City where the City is losing money that
19	we ought not, where corruption is happening that
20	certainly ought not be happening, our office has
21	a role. I'm not going to go over all the Charter
22	provisions.
23	I gave out flyers to everyone here. If
24	you don't have one, I'm going to be here until
25	the end. I'll give you one, but I would just



1	like to highlight a few things.
2	Our office has jurisdiction over all
3	public servants, that's employees, appointees,
4	elected and appointed officials, Board of Police
5	Commissioners, Inspectors General, and over
6	very importantly contractors and vendors.
7	I'll say that because, you know, money
8	does leave this city in a whole lot of different
9	ways, but one of the ways a lot of money leaves
10	this city is through contracts.
11	And I think it was Dillinger said well,
12	why do you rob banks. Well, that's where the
13	money is. Well, why do you spend so much time
14	working with our Procurement Directors over in
15	Purchasing, because that's where the money is,
16	Mr. Chairman, and so we have auditors,
17	investigators on staff.
18	I'm proud to say our two investigators
19	are retired DPD officers, both with experience in
20	Internal Affairs, who help us sift through along
21	with our auditors and attorneys looking through
22	contracts, looking through activities of

Internal Affairs, who help us sift through along
with our auditors and attorneys looking through
contracts, looking through activities of
contractors and employees to make sure if the
City pays for 50 widgets we are in fact getting
building



1	We have a hotline and before I go into
2	that I would like to admit something,
3	Mr. Chairman, I have stolen from you, your great
4	leader of the Office of Chief Investigator, the
5	Chief Investigator has been very very helpful to
6	us in getting our office off the ground with
7	policies and procedures, so I want to recognize
8	her for the help that she's given us in our
9	office.
10	We have a hotline and that number is
11	313-964-TIPS and that's on the card that you
12	have. If you know about an issue where you want
13	to complain, whether you think that funds are
14	being taken, you think waste is occurring, you
15	think that something just is not right, you can
16	call our office.
17	We are not law enforcement. There is
18	one police department in this city, so we don't
19	have arrest powers and we don't have the
20	authority to go get search warrants to kick in
21	doors.
22	But the Charter gives us very very
23	important powers and that's the keys to all the
24	doors to look into during business hours if we



think a contract is wrong, we have access to the

L	data, we have access to those documents, we have
2	access to employment records, we have access to
3	the things that will allow the citizens most
1	importantly to feel secure in the fact that they
5	are getting their money's worth.

2.1

We also have a website, you can contact us with complaints at www.detoig.org. You can file a secure online complaint with us there.

You can write as much as you want, write to your heart's desire and we will get the information to one of our talented investigators and auditors who will follow up.

We enjoy a great working relationship with the police department with OCI, with the Internal Affairs Department where we work with Commander Stair very very closely and we wish to continue that.

And so that's all I'm going to say. I will be available for questions certainly if the Board has any, I'll hear, but I'll be in the back of the room if citizens would like to -- I've already got a couple of complaints already here today.

If there are more, I'll be here, so thank you very much for your time, Mr. Chairman.



1	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Mr. Heath,
2	thank you. Before you leave, I want to make sure
3	if there are any questions from the Board?
4	COMMISSIONER WHITE: No, sir, thank you
5	very much.

24	Her pride and dedication have been



invaluable assets to the department and merit our

1	highest regard.
2	We thank and congratulate you, Sgt.
3	Anne M. Hunsaker, Detroit Board of Police
4	Commissioners adopted this day by the Board of
5	Police Commissioners.
6	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
7	ma'am. I would ask an adoption of all three
8	resolutions honoring those who are retiring from
9	the department.
10	COMMISSIONER WHITE: So moved.
11	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second.
12	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's been
13	properly moved and supported that we will adopt
14	all three resolutions honoring retired Deputy
15	Chief Benjamin Lee, retired Sgt. Parrie Highgate
16	and retired Sgt. Anne M. Hunsaker and these
17	resolutions will be a part of our permanent
18	archives.
19	All those in favor?
20	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
21	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those
22	opposed? Motion carried. We will move to and
23	we promise, Chief Investigator, next week we will
24	approve OIC's SOP if that's okay. Thank you,
25	ma'am, for your patience. We certainly



1	appreciate that.
2	And we have been instructed regarding
3	the directives that we will not do the department
4	directives. Yes, sir.
5	DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Yes, sir. Under
6	Old Business I would like to renew a request from
7	the Chief of Police for promotions for sergeants
8	and lieutenants.
9	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yes, sir, thank
10	you, appreciate that.
11	Our next Board of Police Commissioners
12	meeting will be held Thursday, May 16, 2013 at 3
13	o'clock PM at police headquarters, 1300 Beaubien,
14	Room 328-A and certainly we hope to see you all
15	there as well.
16	At this time the agenda calls for oral

6	because, you know, with the way it is right now I
7	would hate to think or even try to fathom what it
8	would be without them. And my hat goes off to
9	them.
10	So I think if anybody should be
11	applauded and given resolutions and Spirits of
12	Detroit, it should go to the men and women of the
13	Detroit Police Department, Detroit's finest.
14	Thank you.
15	(APPLAUSE.)
16	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
17	Mr. Wilson. We certainly we certainly concur
18	with your remarks.
19	MS. THOMAS: My name is Ollie Thomas
20	from the Great Northwestern 6th and 8th District.
21	I want to come out to the front here,
22	Inspector, please.
23	Two weeks ago one of the Tuskegee
24	Airmen passed and it was the father of the
25	treasurer of the 16000 Tracy Block Club.



1	So we knew it was going to be a big
2	funeral. So the secretary the treasurer
3	called me and says, "Ollie, what should we do?"
4	I said, "Okay, I think I know how to do
5	this. Thank you." I got on the phone and I
6	called Inspector Rene Hall and I told her the
7	situation.
8	And I have you to know that she had
9	police officers on Woodward at People's Community
10	Church and it was on a Saturday, and she had
11	those officers there, and they really really
12	needed to be there. His name was his name was
13	Brother Burkes Esaw, he was a Sr and Burkes Esaw,
14	Jr was the son.
15	So I want to say thank you, thank you,
16	thank you so very much for doing that.
17	(APPLAUSE.)
18	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
19	Ms. Thomas. Are there others who wish to address
20	the Board tonight. You may step forward at this
21	time if you do.
22	Going once yes, ma'am.
23	You look good.
24	MS. SMITH: How dare you embarrass me.

Now, you know my aim when I come before you is either to commend you on what you do right and to tell you when you do something wrong.

Now, I feel as though that this young man needs a promotion to maybe Deputy Chief or something. Tolbert, you don't mind stepping up and letting him have some space.

But seriously speaking we do have so many police that are retiring and I feel as though -- matter of fact, Lee, he just retired and I know his position is open, so think about it.

Now, let me ask you something else.

How long will it take for us to make -- for the

Mayor and your Chief, also the City Council and

the EM who I haven't seen yet, he keep on ducking

and dodging me, but anyway how long will it take



1	for us to have a Chief?
2	And I know you're waiting for the
3	response from the three of them, but I was just
4	wondering, is it going to be before the election
5	of August or do you know?
6	Have you been notified in any way
7	whatsoever?
8	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Ma'am, we have
9	not been notified as of yet, so and you bring
10	up an excellent question. The Charter did not
11	dictate as relates to how long they have to make
12	their decision once we turn the list over to
13	them, and so there is no time limit, so we're
14	just waiting on them to make that decision.
15	And we try to stay in our own lane.
16	We've done our job and we try to stay in our
17	lane, so when they're ready to reveal that, we're
18	ready to receive it.
19	MS. SMITH: All right, I'll make a
20	telephone call to in the meantime, you have a
21	project that you're involved with.
22	I understand that you're the summer
23	is coming and you're going to help with the
24	youngsters and get them jobs. Would you please
25	tell the audience what that's all about and maybe



1	somebody have their sons or daughters I don't
2	know if you want it to be publicized now, I'm
3	sorry, I brought it out, so I'm sorry.
4	The kids need jobs. I thank you so
5	much for your time and you, Mr. Brown, I love you
6	still.
7	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
8	Ms. Smith, as always you are informative and
9	enlightening. And just to follow up, we are
10	hiring over 225 young people to work this summer
11	from the ages of 14 through 24.
12	Unfortunately the time to sign up for
13	the program is past. We have over 224 jobs, we
14	have over 740 kids who actually signed up.
15	They will be competing for those jobs,
16	they will be interviewing for those jobs, they
17	will be working in jobs throughout the city of
18	Detroit in a number of different businesses for
19	engineering firms, for Detroit Police Department,
20	for non-profits, for gleaners and just a host
21	for judges and attorneys, so just a host of
22	different opportunities for young people to work
23	in.
24	And certainly thank you, Ms. Smith, for



announcing that.

1	MR. LELAND: Commissioners, my name is
2	Gabe Leland and to my friends on the Commission,
3	Reverend Chairman Warfield as well as
4	Commissioner White, hello, good evening.

I know we've had in our recent meetings a number of complaints regarding the treatment of our homeless citizens in the city and so we just want to make sure that — and we know that, again, we say the department does an outstanding job 99.9 percent of the time, but we just want to make sure that the message is clear that each citizen of the city of valued, a valued member of this community regardless of where they sleep or where they call their abode, either whether it's in a dwelling place or outside and we just want to make sure we treat everyone with respect.

We would turn those findings over and give you even preliminary information, sir, so that the department can do their investigation as well.

DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Yes, sir, and if I may, through the Chair, I did have an opportunity, I personally had a meeting with the group advocating for the homeless and displaced.

We are in the process of setting up a



1	monthly meeting with them where we can address
2	their concerns, where we can find a way for
3	homeless people to get their complaints to us
4	through this service organization.
5	Since they are displaced, we can't
6	always go back and interview them and find them,
7	so we're trying to devise a process to where they
8	can report the issue through the service
9	organization and we can interview them at the
10	service organization so we can follow up on these
11	complaints because, as you know, a lot of the
12	complaints we can't find them after the original
13	complaint.
14	So we're very serious about this and
15	there will be monthly meetings with the service
16	organization to address these issues.
17	COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir,
18	appreciate it. I'll entertain a motion to
19	adjourn, but before I do that, remember we're
20	about to take a group picture, so all of you from
21	the Great Northwest District let us gather under
22	a good light that we may take a group picture,
23	okay?
