CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen. Welcome to the Board of Police Commissioners meeting. Certainly we are happy and pleased to be here tonight in Southwest District here at the Patton Community Center, and it's so good to see all of you here. My name is Jerome Warfield, Chairman of the Board of Police Commissioners.

At this time $I$ want to introduce some of the members here at the table. Serving with me tonight is our Vice-Chairperson Commissioner Jessica Taylor, as well as Commissioner Donnell White sitting to my right and your left. Representing the Chief's Office tonight is Commander McKissic. Sir, good to have you.

COMMANDER MCKISSIC: Good to be here.
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Also sitting at the table in front of you is Board Secretary Attorney George Anthony. I'm going ask if Mr. Anthony can introduce the rest of our staff that's here tonight.

SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Mr. Chair. For the record, George Anthony, Secretary to the Board. We have present our Chief Investigator Ms. Pamela Davis Drake seated in the front. We have our Personnel

Director Ms. Loletha Coleman Porter, also seated in the front. We have Mr. Robert Brown our Office Manager, Officer Dan Donakowski recording our proceedings, and Ms. Beth Koller from Hanson Court Reporting Service. Sir, we also have one of our newest Investigators in the audience, Ms. Tiffany Stewart is also seated in the audience. She is one of our newest investigators. That completes the introductions, sir.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir. We appreciate that. At this time I'm going to ask is Supervisor Carla Williamson here, and if so could you come to the podium, and again we want to thank you. She's a Supervisor here at Patton Community Center. We want to thank you for having us, and if you have any words you can give them at this time.

SUPERVISOR WILLIAMSON: Well, thank you very much for choosing to come Patton. This is a community recreation center. It's just a privilege to see everyone here today. If this is your first time to Patton I hope it's not your last. If it's not your first I hope to see you some more.

Tomorrow will be our open house for all our summer programs we're having, our swim lessons, Zumba classes, our day camp. We will have a nine week day camp at Patton which is sponsored by Ford Motor

1 Company. We have a few scholarships that are available for our day camp, so if anybody has any questions about that they can ask at the front desk.

Thank you very much for having me. I do want to thank a couple people that are not here. I'm not going to call them by name because there's a lot of them. But at Patton Community Center we have a true community spirit and so the decorations you see set up for today, chairs, tables, and the like, were done by one of our two groups Live Action which is our teen council ages 13 to 18, and Action Packed which is a our peewee council and their ages twelve and under, so they were responsible for everything today.

Officer Mike gave us the setup and they saw the layout and did it. They did the refreshments and they got it done. So that's what we're doing here. We're building lives of young people so that they can know to come sit in a seat like you are today. So thank you again for having us and we hope to have you here again in the future.
(Applause.)
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you,
Ms. Williamson. At this time we're going to ask if Chaplain Renee Taylor can come -- I'm sorry, Avis Renee Taylor can come and lead us in or invocation. If you
can come to the mic, we appreciate it. Again, it's Chaplain Avis Renee Taylor. Thank you, ma'am, good to see you.

CHAPLAIN TAYLOR: Thank you, sir. In the presence of the Detroit Police Commission Southwest Detroit, citizens, personnel, let us stand so that we can say a prayer.
(Invocation led by Chaplain Taylor.)
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am, thank you, Chaplain Taylor.

At this time, $I ' m$ going to ask if
Commissioner who's the Vice-Chairperson of our Commission would read the responsibilities and the duties of the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners.

VICE-CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Created by City Charter July 1st, 1974. Composition: Five members appointed by the Mayor confirmed by City Council. Commissioners serve five year terms and may not serve more than five years consecutively, meets once a week 52 weeks out of the year and all meetings are open to the public.

The Duties: Establish policy, rules and regulations in consultation with the Chief and approval of the Mayor. Review and approve Department budget, review and approve Department promotions, receive and
resolve complaints concerning the operation of the Police Department. Final authority to impose and review discipline of Police Department employees. Appoint Civilian Personnel Director, prepares an annual report of Department activities for the public, Mayor and the City Council.

Staff: Executive Secretary who serves as Secretary to the Board and attends all Board meetings, Chief Investigator and additional Investigators, other staff as necessary to provided support to the Board. The Police Commission considers itself a liaison between the citizens of the City of Detroit and the Police Department.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am, we certainly appreciate that. At this time we will entertain a motion to approve today's Agenda.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: So move.
VICE-CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Support.
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved and supported without objection. All those in favor?

COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Again, we'll entertain a motion to approve the minutes from Thursday, June 6th, 2013.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair, so move with
one correction, the date be adjusted to reflect June 6th, 2013.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: So move.
VICE CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Supported.
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved and support with the necessary correction without objection. All those in favor?

COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed?
Motion carries. As is already been mentioned by Chaplain Taylor, certainly our hearts and prayers go out to Chief Chester Logan and his family of the transition of his wonderful wife. Certainly he's been in our prayers and thoughts since we've learned of her transition. I left the house on the way here and certainly we would wish he could be here, but certainly we let them know we care for him and we love them.

For those of you, and we'll give the arrangements out a little bit later, but for those of you who wish to show your condolences there's a fund set up in lieu of flowers. They're asking that you will send a monetary donation to Good Fellows, again, that's Good Fellows, and that's PO Box 44444 , PO Box 44444, Detroit, Michigan, 48244 and that would be in Mrs. Ella M. Again, we want just to thank Chief Logan for just serving under such great a weight and we understood when he took over and came out of retirement what he was challenged and faced with but he had decided to serve anyway. Certainly, again, our thoughts and our prayers are with him tonight.

That's all the information from the Chair. At this time we'll turn it over to Commander McKissic.

COMMANDER MCKISSIC: Good evening, Board, Officers, citizens. I do not have a formal report from the Chief's Office at this time. However, I would like to give some information regarding Ella M. Logan the wife of Chief Logan and mother of Sergeant Kimberly Blackwell. The two visitations will be held Saturday, June 15th, 2013, 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m., the second will be held Sunday, June 16th, from 10:00 to 9:00 p.m. at the Swanson Funeral Home located at 806 East Grand Boulevard, Detroit, Michigan 48207.

The family hour will be held from Monday, June 17, 2013, 10:00, service will be conducted on Monday, June 17, 2013 at 11:00 a.m., located at Sacred Heart Church at 1000 Elliot, south of Mack, east of I75

1 Freeway, Detroit, Michigan 48207.

At this time $I$ request you join me in a moment of silence on behalf of Ms. Logan.
(Silence.)
COMMANDER MCKISSIC: Thank you.
Additionally, I'd like you guys to know a fireworks curfew is in effect on June 24 th, the rain date of June 25th; 17 and under must be accompanied by parents and/or guardians. The curfew takes effect from 6:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.

If it's all right with you, Chair, I'd like to introduce Inspector Yost with the presentation for the 4 th Precinct?

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Yes.
COMMANDER MCKISSIC: Inspector Vicky Yost of the 4 th Precinct.

INSPECTOR YOST: Through the Chair, Inspector Yost, Commanding Officer of the Southwestern District. Good evening.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Good evening.
INSPECTOR YOST: I'd like to thank you all for coming out to the 4th Precinct. We've got a good presentation. It's a slide show that Lieutenant Pierce put together and she'll be walking you through it.

Before we get there I'd like to announce that we have a precinct-wide community relations meeting the second Tuesday of every month with the exception of July and August at the Precinct and we invite all of our citizens to attend. It's at 6:00 p.m.

I also want to thank Lieutenant Pierce and our Community Relations staff for the food in the back. It is a local business. They did a really good job with it. So without further ado, Lieutenant Lori Pierce, CO of Number 4.

LT. PIERCE: Good afternoon everybody. For those of you that come to these type of meetings, typically do a Power Point Presentation. We tried to do a little something different to show you sights of the 4 th Precinct and show you the rich culture at the 4th Precinct.

Everyone know the Ambassador Bridge located in the 4th Precinct. It is a very busy border crossing. It is the busiest border crossing, international border crossing in American in terms of

1 trade volume.

That is the location of the 4 th Precinct known as Southwest Public Safety Center. We're located at Fort and Clark. We also have the Fire Department attached to our building on the other side.

This is our staff at the Precinct and we have many Officers of various ethnicity that speak numerous languages to better serve people that come in. Here's our statistics in terms of how we've reduced crime and that's the current year. We're also down in almost all categories last year, as well.

Last year our Officers serviced over 106,000 police runs when they're combined as the Southwestern District. We're both 2nd and 4th Precincts. This is one of the biggest landmarks in the City, the old train station which is also located in the 4 th Precinct.

That's Roosevelt Park is right in front of the train station. This is River Side Park. There's a lot of activity -- there used to be a lot of activity. I believe it's closed at the moment. The J. Wescott if anyone's familiar with that. As the freighters make their travels and -- they do get mail delivered to them through the wescott. I don't know if there's any old people like me here who remember Boblo? Some more freighters.

Does that look familiar to anybody, the drawbridge, which is due to go under construction soon? That was Fort Street. That one's due to go under construction soon. Our Precinct is 14.4 square miles. We have a population of 70,529 . We have 34 churches. The 4th Precinct with a couple pictures of them, very old historic beautiful churches, just goes to show you the culture and diversity of Number 4.

Anyone who drives to Number 4 will notice a lot of wall murals and graffiti. Some consider it to be artwork, others, not so much. I think everyone's probably seen that at one point or another.

We have a lot of businesses, over 1,000 business successfully operating in the 4th Precinct. These are some ones that stand out. The best coffee. We all know Telway's, right? We also have what we call critical infrastructures in the 4 th Precinct which means that basically in layman terms give very special attention to these locations because they could be locations for terrorist activity or terrorist targets. The water sewage department, the water treatment center is one them. The bridge is another. This is an aerial view of the water treatment center. Another one is the Marathon Oil Refinery. You're all familiar with that at Fort and Schaefer. I think
that's a very familiar sight to many of us.
We have 17 schools and 12 parks. You are here. A lot of you might know the Kennedy Center. You vote there. And good old 48217. Also Historic Fort Wayne is located in the 4 th Precinct. One of our closed fire houses.

That's pretty much it. I'll give a little bit of additional information just so you know we're trying hard to reduce crime in the community. Just year-to-date as of the June 2 nd we've made 367 felony arrests, 135 misdemeanor arrests, detained 69 juveniles, issued close to 3,000 tickets, investigated almost 12,000, over 12,000 vehicles, and initiated 3,284 traffic stops. We're trying our best to keep those crime numbers to come down. And that's it.
(Applause.)
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you. Any questions for the Lieutenant?

VICE CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: I have none.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Lieutenant, if there are areas of concern with the Southwest what would you attribute those to as relates to crime patterns?

LT. PIERCE: What areas of concern we have?

We do try to pay particular attention to the 48217 area on the other side of the bridge near Marathon. Because of the structure of our geography it's very hard to get down there. Basically there's only two ways to get down there by Fort Street or I75. And soon -- it's called the Besttoon Bridge, in Detroit, is about to be closed for over a year I believe which posses a particular problem because if there's crime going on down there and we have to always have someone down there, but if you need additional reinforcements down there we're going to be hindered in a way. So we do have a plan in place. But basically we do kind of pay extra attention to that area just due to the geography of the area.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: For the record, Lieutenant, your boundaries?

LT. PIERCE: Our boundaries, we go all the way to Warren. We travel down the Lincoln Park Border like Outer Drive to Fort Street. We have a very crooked border because we border like Jefferson to 14, and Michigan. It's a very crooked border.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you. Lieutenant, you might be able to answer this question. Inspector Yost mentioned earlier about the business that supplied
the food tonight. She didn't mention the name. Would you happen to know the name so we can all know it?

LT. PIERCE: Yes, I do know it's Gonellas for the subs. What about the pastry? Mexican Town Bakery for the pastries.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: I'm sorry, Mexican
Town --
LT. PIERCE: Bakery.
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: What was the other
restaurant?
LT. PIERCE: Gonellas.
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Great. Thank you. We appreciate it. Excellent presentation. Thank you. Sir, is there anything else?
(Applause.)
COMMANDER MCKISSIC: There's nothing else on our agenda at this time.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir, appreciate that. At this time we're going to ask if Commissioner White would lead us as we honor and recognize Mr. Jesse Gonzales for his outstanding work here in the Southwest District.

Mr. Gonzales, could you come forward at this time, you may come right on down here, sir. Give him a hand, would you please.
(Applause.)
COMMISSIONER WHITE: That's right. I started my morning off with Mr. Gonzales. He didn't know I was there, but 7:30, he was also the recipient of a community award for the Southwest Business Association. So I said, two for today. He said, no, that was three, I had a Spirit of Detroit Award, too. We're going to pile onto your running total today, Mr. Gonzales.

Before us, Commissioners, is a Resolution honoring Mr. Jesse Gonzales. Whereas, Mr. Jesse Gonzales is a proud and lifelong resident of Southwest Detroit for more than 54 years and remains an active member of the Southwest Community Relations Council.

Mr. Gonzales graduated from Western High School which is located within the 4 th Precinct boundaries. Mr. Gonzales worked for Ford Motor Company for 37 years and currently serves as the liaison for the Wayne County Commission.

And whereas, Mr. Gonzales previously served as a member of the Weed and Seed for the Southwest District Sector 5 for over two years. As a member of the C.E.R.T., Citizens Emergency Response Team, three years an active member of Alpact which is facilitated by the National Conference of Community and Justice as well as the Michigan Round Table which promotes
diversity and inclusion.
And whereas, Mr. Gonzales is a police liaison for implementing safety programs with the surrounding communities such as Melvindale and Lincoln Park. Mr. Gonzales was very active in organizing a group of young people to clean up at the park as well as other community arts projects.

And whereas, Mr. Gonzales has always been interested in police community relations and has always contributed in efforts to improve neighbor safety and quality of life. His participation and community organization goes back to the early years when he received his first paycheck from Ford and immediately started to donate a portion of his check back to the community in which he had lived in and loved since 1958.

And whereas, Mr. Gonzales has participated in numerous community forums, town hall summits and many events that include Motor City Makeover, Angels Night and Crime Walks. Mr. Gonzales continues to volunteer his time and service when called upon for any event. He is a living example of steadfastness and what it takes to build a city. He is very happy and outgoing. Two of his seven children have graduated with Criminal Justice Degrees and one of his daughters is a member of
the Detroit Police Department.
Now therefore be it resolved, that the Detroit Board of Commissioners speaking on behalf of the citizens of the City of Detroit and the Detroit Police Department acknowledge the dedication and persistence of Mr. Jesse Gonzales, his highly displayed commitment to community service, his ability to build sustainable community partnerships merit our highest regards.

We thank and congratulate, Mr. Jesse Gonzales, signed the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners and adopted this day by the Board of Police Commissioners, June 13th, 2013. It's our honor to bestow upon you your third award of the day, Mr. Gonzales. Congratulations.
(Applause and picture were taken.)
COMMANDER McKissic: On behalf of the Detroit Police Department, we present this Certificate of Recognition to Mr. Jesse Gonzales resident of the City of Detroit in appreciation for your contribution, your involvement in the community and service to the City of Detroit demonstrates the spirit of commitment that is worthy of recognition. Signed by Chief Chester L. Logan.
(Applause and pictures were taken.)

INSPECTOR YOST: This is seriously piling on. The spirit of Detroit Award is presented, herein, with an expression of gratitude and esteem of the Citizens of Detroit to Mr. Jesse Gonzales in recognition of exceptional achievement outstanding leadership and dedication to improving the quality of life. Signed by all the members of the Detroit City Council. Congratulations.
(Applause.)
MR. GONZALES: Well, I just got to say thank you so much. I do love my neighborhood. And I do it from my heart. It's not because I have to because it's something I love doing. I also with the help of the Commissioner Varges she has opened more doors for me.

And the 4th Precinct is also a good place to visit. I never had no trouble going in there and talking and getting my feedback from people from outside the streets. And we work together this way. And that's what I just love about our Southwest Detroit Police Department.

And like I said this week has been a blessing to me. My granddaughter graduated from school, my other daughter she graduated and got her Bachelor in Criminal Justice, my son's birthday, new baby in the family. So I'm honored with all these awards. It's
overwhelming to me. Thank you, Southwest Detroit. (Applause and photos.)

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: You're welcome and you are deserving. Thank you.

At this time I'm going to ask if Lieutenant Bliss could come to podium that we may hear some Directives. Sir, can you hold on one quick second, stay there, though.

Is there a motion regarding the Resolution honoring Mr. Jesse Gonzales?

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Motion to adopt.
VICE CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Support.
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved and supported that the Resolution honoring Mr. Jesse Gonzales be adopted and be a part of our permanent archives. Anymore discussion? Without objection, all those in favor?

COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you. Yes, sir, thank you.

LIEUTENANT BLISS: Good evening, Commissioners and Commander McKissic. Lieutenant Bliss from Planning and Accreditation. I'm here today to present for your review and approval Directive 204.1 Crash Investigation. This basically entails how an

Officer is supposed to investigate and document crash investigations. The changes that we've made are basically we did, well, there have been substantial changes. The investigation procedure for the Officers, the implementation of the MAS System for certain forms, and a new process for reviewing the UD10 which is a traffic crash investigation is now online and it's no longer being done on paper form, they've been implemented in this policy.

The policy is at the front of the recreation center for people to, if they want to review it and it's also posted online on the City website and at the Districts.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All of them or one at a time?

LIEUTENANT BLISS: Okay. The other two are for basically for approval.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. Say it again. LIEUTENANT BLISS: The other two are for approval. This is the first for the crash investigation.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you.
LIEUTENANT BLISS: The other two for approval are Manual Directive 401.2 Transfers, and Directive 203.7 Organized Crime Vice and Narcotics. I believe

Commander Romeo made the presentation prior. If there's any questions regarding these three Directives?

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Let me say this in regards to the transfers, $I$ know this is the first time that I have seen them, I can't speak for my colleagues, I would like to look over it and may be another week I feel comfortable --

SECRETARY ANTHONY: We can wait.
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: We're going to table this one.

LIEUTENANT BLISS: Just to give you a brief overview of the changes.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Yes, sir.
LIEUTENANT BLISS: All the information contained in the transfers are based on the current CBA which is the Collective Bargaining Agreements with the City. They've been in place for years. There has been no major change to the transfer process. The only thing that we did add other than minor grammar and punctuation is the MAS process and that is that when a new Command gets personnel they're required within a certain time period to update there MAS profile that they've been transferred to that new Command.

It was not in there prior and we were holding Commands responsible for doing that, but it was never
documented. So we did put that new policy in and then we just put small things that we checked with Personnel on. But the transfer process has not changed, just the documentation through MAS at the Commands for that.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay.
LIEUTENANT BLISS: Thank you, sir.
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you. At this time we want to ask Sergeant Stephens could come to the podium as we honor Quarter Awards members of the Department. Sergeant Stephens, it's always good to see you, ma'am.

SERGEANT STEPHENS: Okay. Good evening, everyone. At this time we would like to thank everyone for coming out tonight. And $I$ will ask if there's any of tonight's awardees if you have not checked in, please see Officer Cook, he's behind the screen, so they can make sure we acknowledge you.

Our first award recipient for the First Quarter in 2013 is Officer Borkowski from Central District, if you can come forward, please.

Police Officer Borkowski was appointed to the Detroit Police Department on January 17th, 1995. He is currently assigned to Central District. He is working with an investigative unit as a liaison officer preparing search warrants, arrest warrants, and
investigating crime.
During his investigation Officer Borkowski will meet on a regular basis with the prosecutor's office to assist in mediation issues that arise from the investigation. His skills in crime analysis has been a great asset in identifying several crime patterns, and strategies to help combat those issues. He is a Central District Crime Analysis Officer who is a respected Officer of the Downtown Detroit Partnership Safety and Security Committee and is well respected.

His input has been valuable in making the Downtown area and Central District a safer place. He has been instrumental in several investigations which have resulted in the closing of numerous larcenies, and motor vehicles cases that occur within the central business district.

Officer Borkowski did not use any sick time during this quarter. He is reliable, neat, and always well groomed and has an excellent understanding of the Detroit Police Department rules and regulations. His demonstration of that knowledge and skills which is typically associated with a veteran officer. Officer Borkowski diligence and dedication to duty maintains within the highest standards of the Detroit Police Department where he remains a role model and asset.

It was strongly recommended and proved that Officer Borkowski be selected as Central District's Officer of the First Quarter. Congratulations.
(Applause and photos.)
SERGEANT STEPHENS: Next from Eastern District Police Officer Chancellor Searcy and his partner Police Officer Charles Lynem. This is a first. We've never had partners recognized in the Quarter, so job well done. Officer Chancellor Searcy was appointed to the Detroit Police Department on November 21st, 2008. Officer Charles Lynem was appointed to the Department October 6th, 2008.

They have consistently performed their duties in a professional and courteous manner. During the period of January through March 2013 they had demonstrate enthusiasm as they patrolled the streets of Detroit. During this quarter they made 38 felony arrests, they recovered 29 illegal firearms, and they have demonstrated to the public by answering and responding to 100 police runs.

They maintained excellent attendance during this Quarter and are always neat and orderly in their professional appearance which reflect a positive image on the Department.

They have been selected to be Officers of the

Quarter for the First Quarter. They have the high degree of professionalism and outstanding service which they exhibit daily while they are working. Together, they're partners. We thank you. Congratulations.
(Applause and photos.)
SERGEANT STEPHENS: Thank you. Next we have from Northeastern District Police Officer Jana Greeno. Police Officer Jana Greeno was appointed to the Detroit Police Department on October the 6th, 2008. She was assigned to Northeastern District on August 12th, 2009. Since being assigned to Northeastern District she has gained a reputation for being a highly motivated productive Officer.

Her enthusiasm has earned her a position to work out of service on a threshold detail to address specific crime patterns in a given geographic location. Officer Greeno continued to volunteer for priority police runs which aids in providing citizens service.

Her attendance and enthusiasm and reliability have made her highly respected by her peers and Supervisors. Officer Greeno exhibits a high degree of professionalism and devotion to her duties. Therefore, Police Officer Jana Greeno will be recognize as Officer of the First Quarter. Congratulations.

SERGEANT STEPHENS: Next we will have from the 2nd Precinct Police Officer Christopher Champagne, please come forward. Police Officer Christopher Champagne was appointed to the Detroit Police Department on December the 29th, 2004. Office Champagne showed that he's extremely hard working, reliable, cooperative, and self-motivated.

He stays updated on the changes in the Department policies and State laws. He also strives to
keep himself aware of the relative crime patterns within the 2nd Precinct. He has also proficient knowledge of general and specific duties and maintains a stellar appearance. He has demonstrated tremendous courage when arresting some of the fiercest and dangerous criminals in the community and his leadership qualities are far beyond his years.

During the First Quarter Officer Champagne has demonstrated his strong commitment to the citizens of Detroit and the Department by producing the following statistics: He effected 16 misdemeanor arrests, issued 36 uniform citations, answered 249 police runs for service, and recovered $\$ 54,500$ worth of property.

Is it without hesitation that Officer Christopher Champaign be considered the Officer of the Quarter for the First Quarter 2013. Congratulations.

SERGEANT STEPHENS: From the 4th Precinct we have Police Officer Aref Algarrafi. Officer Algarrafi was appointed to the Detroit Police Department on February 26th, 2001. He has been instrumental in the reduction of violent crimes with more than 36 felony arrests. He's assigned to Special Operations and conducts a comprehensive review of all violent cases
within the 4 th Precinct.
Officer Algarrafi utilizes intelligence that has been gathered to identify potential suspects. He openly shares information with his colleagues to assist in the apprehension of wanted criminals. During this First Quarter of March 27th, 2013, Officer Algarrafi and his partner received and developed information regarding suspects believed to be connected to as many as five robberies and shootings that occurred in the north end of the 4 th Precinct.

The suspects were allegedly driving a black Ford Escape with a hanging rear bumper. He and his partner began canvassing the area for this vehicle and suspects were located. They conducted a traffic stop. The occupants fled from the vehicle and a foot pursuit ensued. All the suspects were apprehended and charged with multiple counts of armed robbery.

In addition to making the 36 felony arrests, Officer Algarrafi issued 30 uniform citations, investigated 257 individuals and 63 vehicles. He deserves to be recognized for being an outstanding Officer at the 4th Precinct. Officer Algarrafi, congratulations.

SERGEANT STEPHENS: Next we're going to have

Police Officer Christopher Salisbury and his partner Cak. Police Officer Christopher Salisbury is assigned to the Canine Unit. He is a canine's assistant trainer and is responsible for conducting weekly training and maintaining the Department's canines to ensure they're ready to patrol the streets when needed.

He reports to duty in a professional manner and needs little guidance from his immediate supervisor. During the first quarter he and his canine partner conducted five narcotic searches, two explosive searches, one building search, two article searches and tracked ten suspects. They investigates 42 males, 22 females, and 89 vehicles, and issued 93 civil infractions.

It is because of his and Cak their dedication is exemplary that they are being recognized as Officer of the Quarter. Congratulations.

Investigation Bureau we have Police Officer Robert Bolden, please come forward.

Police Officer Robert Bolden is assigned to the Detroit Fugitive Apprehension Team, D-FAT. He was appointed to the Detroit Police Department on October 31st, 1997. Officer Bolden was selected and
accepted the responsibilities to be the team leader for the D-FAT Enforcement Team.

Daily he exemplifies professionalism and keeps a positive attitude while apprehending the most dangerous criminals sought by law enforcement.

Officer Bolden investigates his crimes in a detailed manner which resulted in a very high number of suspects being apprehended closing a high number of cases. Officer Bolden was selected to receive this award not only because of his accomplishments during the First Quarter but for his years of determination and professional service to the citizens of Detroit. However, she has the background and experience which allows her to take on additional tasks often unasked which makes the flow and operation of the Unit effective and efficient.

She has an excellent working relationship with the various departmental personnel and the judges, clerks, and prosecutors within the court system. This partnership has assisted in timely processing of court proceedings.

At this time the agenda calls for Oral Communication from the audience. If you wish to addressed the Board of Police Commissioners we ask you to come to the podium in the center, please give us your first and last name and because of the echo, can you spell it for our recorder and we ask that you abide by our two minute time limit so that we may hear from as many individuals as possible. You may come at this time.

MS. DAVIS: Hello everybody. My name is Donna Davis. I used to be a resident of Detroit. But my family is still a resident in Detroit. I had a incident that happened back in August the 6th, 2012 that I would like to bring to everybody's attention here.

I have a daughter that's missing. She became missing August 6th, 2012. This is a female that I know as a mother knows their child, would not go missing, would answer your phone calls. Is a very well participant of a family, didn't have any kind of major problems, we all got problems, but didn't have any major problems.

I spoke to my daughter on August 6th, 2012 and that was the last call that $I$ have talked to her
since. I've been back and forth here since August 13th of 2012. I no longer live here. I live in Florida. So it's difficult for me to keep contact and to have on the phone participation with the Police Officer is null and void.

So I just want to bring awareness that Tamale Wells is missing and I don't know who else to reach out to. If it was your child or anybody's child we go as high as we go to go to bring our children or our family or our loved ones back home safe.

I understand this is a real high epidemic
here. And as I ride through the streets of the City of Detroit anything can happen, you know. And $I$ just want to bring awareness so that $I$ can get some type help in this matter. So if there's anyone $I$ can talk to afterwards I appreciate it.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Ms. Davis, could you stand there for one second, ma'am, please. We want to try and get you some help right now.

COMMANDER MCKISSIC: Tell me where she's missing from?

MS. DAVIS: 19703 Appleton was the last known that I know that she was supposed to left there. That was her home. She stayed with her boyfriend for fifteen years. So it was kind of like shaky. When the
little girl call you early in the morning August the 7th and tell you her mother didn't come home, you're in Florida, she's in Detroit, kind of raised some type of suspicious(sic). For five days I spoke to this little girl, my granddaughter, over the phone to reassure her that everything will be okay, but it wasn't, and it still hasn't been.

Now, the boyfriend never got on the phone to call me to tell me something happened, he made a police report, any concerns. This is a boyfriend that she had been with for 15 years. I want to know why didn't you get on phone?

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Ms. Davis, one of the things I'm sure Commander McKissic will do, I don't want to put too many details out there, there's probably an investigation.

MS. DAVIS: There is.
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: And we don't want to spoil that, so I'm going to ask if the Commander will follow up with someone for you right now.

COMMANDER MCKISSIC: Inspector Yost is going to assign someone to gather your information and do some followup.

MS. DAVIS: Okay.
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Ms. Davis, I think I
spoke with you on the phone.
MS. DAVIS: What's your name?
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Warfield.
MS. DAVIS: Yes, I did, yes, you was the pastor?

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Yes, ma'am.
MS. DAVIS: I never got a call back and I was hurt about that.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Yes, ma'am, yes, ma'am, and we're still checking. We're still looking into that. Absolutely. One of the things is not an excuse for, one of things we try and do is when we do call back is make sure we have something that's different than what we've already had discussed.

So that's still the notion. And as the Commander said, Inspector Yost will talk to you and give you an update as best we can. She'll get your information, your personal information while you're here and pass along to me and we'll follow up again. MS. DAVIS: Okay.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am.
MS. DAVIS: I appreciate that.
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: You're welcome. Are there others who wish to address the Board? You may come at this time.

MS. ZUNIGA: Hello to all. My name is Azalia
Zuniga, $A-Z-A-L-I-A, Z-U-N-I-G-A . \quad$ My house was broken into December and my cameras caught the person that broke into my house or the two people that came in. We had Detectives come out to our house. They knew who they were because them names were given, not to us but between them. We never heard from the Detectives or from anybody.

They attempted to break in again, same person in May. We tried to contact -- we got no response from anybody so we went to Channel 2. The following day $I$ did get a call saying in December $I$ had given an invalid phone number which I had an email where I sent videos about these two people that broke into my house. I haven't heard anything back. I mean, who do I go to next?

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am. COMMANDER MCKISSIC: You live in the 4th Precinct?

MS. ZUMIGA: Yes, I do.
COMMANDER MCKISSIC: Lieutenant Pierce will
gather your information and she'll provide a followup.
MS. ZUMIGA: Okay. Thank you.
MS. EDWARD: Good evening.
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Good evening.

MS. EDWARD: I'm the cousin of the young lady whose daughter is missing. I'm a life-long Detroit resident.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Your name, ma'am, for the record.

MS. EDWARD: Francine Edward. I chose to leave the City. Now I have chosen to move back into the City. I have faith in the City. I have faith in Detroit Police Department. And to prove to me that you guys are still the best please help us find her and bring her home. This is our family. This is my cousin. I love her. And $I$ know that this is a great team of people. But it's hurting her mom and she's disconnected, and we're also disconnected.

So again, I'm pleading on behalf of my family that somebody helps us and not just -- if you don't have any information just a phone call would be nice. A return phone call would be nice to say, Mrs. Davis, I haven't forgotten about you, we're still working on your case, just be patient with us. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am.
MS. SEMMA: Good evening. Julia Semma, on behalf of the Detroit Authorized Towers Association. I'm here in regards to the tow rates, the increase that we had. We went through a series of meetings with City
officials, City Council, Tow Rate Commissioners and everybody. And I'm under the understanding the City of Detroit Police Department now is changing our rates as far as what they want to pay us and I'd like to find out if you guys know anything about that. And I'm under the understanding that once the tow rate is set the standard that's the rate we're supposed to be getting paid, so. And this is going in regard to us getting paid for Gene's Towing, City Towing that does anything with the Detroit Police Department and anything going to forfeiture, they want to pay us less than what we're supposed to be allotted for.

So I just want to know if you guys know anything about it and if you can guide us or help with that, as well?

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am, for coming. Certainly it is the Tow Rate Commission who sets those rates. So unfortunately it's them who deals with that. I know the Department, and someone can correct me if I'm wrong, the Department's perspective it's not our job or responsibility to set those rates if those rate are set differently than what the Tow Rate Commission and the City Council because the City Council had actually approved -- approval, sorry, those tow rates that are in place and the Mayor and the

Emergency Manager signed off on them those are the rates that are in effect.

If they're different rates that come about we don't know anything about them, and so, you know, my colleagues -- so if there's something different please let us know.

MS. SEMMA: There's something extremely different right now and we've been told by Management Services Roland Clark and other people that work in his department that our rates are significantly getting paid less to perform our services.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Well, I'm going to ask then if Sergeant Clark or Lieutenant Adams can come to our next meeting and give us an update because we have not had that presentation to us.

Again, our understanding as relates to adjusting the tow rate, that comes from the Tow Rate Commission. Not us.

MS. SEMMA: Thank you.
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am.
Anybody else?
SERGEANT STEPHENS: I just want to invite you tomorrow we're going to be having a United States Flag Presentation at Central District at 10:00 a.m. We're having several flags that are being donated to be
presented to our Precincts and Districts. So if you're available please join us tomorrow 10:00 a.m., Central District, 7310 Woodward Avenue.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am.
MS. SMITH: Good evening.
CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Good evening.
MS. SMITH: Bernice Smith, Political
Activist. It is a sad fact period for all of us that have concerns about our Police Department especially our Chief. I met his wife one time and I feel as though that was a loving couple when I met her, and he was so devoted to her.

Due to the fact I was concerned about her health because $I$ would ask him each meeting how is she doing and would say pray for her. But, you know, God knows best. And most of us we don't even know how to pray to God but we should take time some time and just give him some of our time.

With me being an employee with Swanson I got inside on what the arrangements were. I understand, Chief, that you gave the address out so I don't have to give the address. But $I$ do advise you not to come before 6:00 because Saturday is a busy day at the funeral home.

I work mainly Friday and Saturday. So I
suggest that you do come after 6:00, maybe about 6:30 something like that because this way they'll be able to have her body shown and you won't have to be standing around waiting for her to come into the chapel.

Also I think it's a good idea because I believe that the Chief would want us to give a contribution rather than flowers because normally you don't have too many flowers at a Catholic church. So in the meantime $I$ do stress to each and everyone of you not only the Police Department but the people in the neighborhoods and citizens, in other words, that we will just abide by his wishes.

I didn't get a chance to go by the home. So I feel as though a lot of people would not want to go and disturb him. He needs his silence. So, again, I thank you much for making that announcement and let's keep up the good work.

The Police Department, I congratulate each and everyone of the Officers that were given awards. And they deserve it. They really do because they go out each and everyday and my thoughts are with them and I do speak to them and tell them to be careful when they're out there.

In the meantime I'm still wanting to get you to your pay increase again, and $I$ want you to get them
hours back to normal hours for you. Because I know you will be better than what you doing now. I know your morale is down. And we will see what's going to happen with the new Chief coming in because I'm waiting with all energy.

I did get a chance to see the EM the other night, so I got one more time we going to meet with the Chief again and see what he's going to do for the citizens here in the Detroit area. I thank you so much for your time.

CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am. Any others? Seeing that there are no others wishing to address the Board we will close that section of our meeting.

Again, our next meeting will be held Thursday, June 20th, 2013, 3:00 p.m., Police Headquarters 1300 Beaubien.

At this I'm going to entertain a motion to adjourn.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: So move.
