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1 Detroit, Michigan 2 Thursday, August 8, 2013 About 6:37 p.m. 3 4 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Good afternoon 5 and welcome to the Board of Police Commissioners 6 meeting. My name is Jessica Taylor, I'm the 7 Chairperson and to my left is Commissioner 8 Donnell White who's the Vice-Chairman, and we 9 also have with us AC James White from the Chief's 10 office. 11 And at this time I'm going to ask the 12 Secretary to introduce the rest of the staff. 13 Thank you, Madam SECRETARY ANTHONY: 14 Chair. For the record, George Anthony, 15 Secretary to the Board. 16 We have present from our staff 17 Ms. Pamela Davis-Drake who is seated in the 18 front. She is our Chief Investigator. 19 Our recorders today is Mr. Robert 20 Brown, our office manager, Sgt. Alan Quinn and 21 Mr. Dale Rose from Hanson Court Reporting 2.2 Service. 23 That's completes the introductions, 24 ma'am. 25 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Is Pastor Darrell



1	Reed here? Can you come up, sir, give us the
2	PASTOR REED: Let us bow our heads as I
3	pray.
4	(INVOCATION WAS GIVEN.)
5	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Okay, we're happy
6	to be here at the UAW/Chrysler Local 7. Is there
7	a representative here? There's no representative
8	here? Okay, well, we'd just like to give our
9	thanks for their hospitality.
10	At this time I'm going to ask
11	Commissioner White if he could read the duties
12	and responsibilities.
13	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Yes, ma'am.
14	Currently the composition of the Board
15	of Police Commissioners consists of five members
16	appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by City
17	Council.
18	Commissioners serve five-year terms and
19	may not serve more than five years consecutively.
20	The Commissioners meet once a week and may recess
21	during Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Years
22	holidays. All meetings are open to the public.
23	The duties of the Board of Police
24	Commissioners are to establish policy, rules and
25	regulations in consultation with the Chief and

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1 the approval of the Mayor, to review and approve department's budget, to review and approve 2 3 department promotions, to receive and resolve complaints concerning the operation of the police 4 department, and to act as final authority to 5 6 impose and review discipline of Detroit Police 7 Department employees, also to appoint the civilian personnel director, to prepare an annual 8 report of department activities for the public, 9 10 the Mayor and City Council.

11 Its staff includes an Executive 12 Secretary who serves as Secretary to the Board 13 and attends all meetings, the Chief Investigator 14 and additional investigators and other staff as 15 necessary to provide support to the Board.

16 The Police Commission considers itself 17 a liaison between the citizens of the city of 18 Detroit and the Detroit Police Department.

19 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you, 20 Commissioner and I'd just like to say at this 21 time that Commissioner Jerome Warfield will not 22 be present tonight, so we don't have a quorum and 23 we can't approve anything, so we're going to go 24 -- I'm going to turn this over to AC White for 25 the Eastern District presentation.

1	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: All right. Good
2	afternoon or actually good evening everybody. I
3	just want to take a minute to thank the command
4	officers and all the officers for that matter for
5	being here this evening.
6	Commander Duane McKissic, Inspector
7	Denny Allen, Deputy Chief James Tolbert, Interim
8	Commander Eric Jones, Interim Inspector Harold
9	Rochon, Interim Inspector Costello Williams,
10	Chief of Staff you know, when you're up here
11	you forget names of people you see every day ,
12	Charles Wilson, whatever you are.
13	Interim Inspector Barren and anybody
14	else who I forgot or name I forgot and
15	Inspector Duane Blackman. Thank you all for
16	being there.
17	I know these are very busy times in the
18	department and we are all doing a very good job
19	and also a special thank you once again to the
20	Northeastern District. We have launched our DDC,
21	Detroit Detention Center. They have worked
22	diligently, hard, extreme professionalism in
23	mastering that program over there, so again thank
24	you for getting that off the ground. It's going
25	to free up a lot of our officers to go to the

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1 street. I bring greetings from the Chief who 2 3 couldn't be here tonight, but wanted to be, but 4 other matters called to his attention tonight, so 5 he wanted to make sure that I let you all know 6 that he did want to be here tonight. With that, I will turn the mic over to 7 Interim Commander Jones for the presentation. 8 9 COMMANDER JONES: Good afternoon. May 10 it please this Honorable Board, Inspector Eric 11 Jones, commanding officer of the Eastern 12 District. 13 When we last met in February I informed you that we were in the process of moving toward 14 15 implementation of Operation Cease Fire. 16 Operation Cease Fire is a group 17 violence reduction strategy which leverages the community first and foremost, law enforcement and 18 19 social services to deliver the message that the 20 violence must stop. 21 Since we last met we have made 2.2 significant progress. On June 11 and 12 the 23 Eastern District Special Operations, the Homicide 24 Unit and our federal partners and University of 25 Cincinnati held a group member review session and

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1 a homicide review session. 2 At that session we identified 3 problematic groups and gangs and reviewed 4 homicides that potentially had a group or gang 5 After the review sessions were complete nexus. 6 the University of Cincinnati staff returned to their offices to compile and analyze the data. 7 The analysis revealed that the Eastern 8 9 District has 26 violent groups or gangs, 16 in 10 the 5th Precinct and 10 in the 9th Precinct with 11 approximately 400 members. 12 Further, the data revealed that of the 13 400 members, 35 of them are impact players and on 14 probation and parole. Our colleagues at the 15 Michigan Department of Corrections and the Courts 16 have prepared invite letters for the 35 impact 17 players to our first call-in session to be held 18 August 28 at the Matrix Center. 19 At the call-in the community, law 20 enforcement and social service entities will 21 present the message that the violence must stop 2.2 and that we will help you turn toward a positive 23 lifestyle. 24 Thank you. 25 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Any questions?



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1	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Not at this time.
2	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you, sir.
3	COMMANDER JONES: Thank you.
4	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: I guess we have a
5	presentation.
6	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Yes, sir.
7	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Presentation for
8	the Eastern District regarding the citizen.
9	COMMISSIONER WHITE: We'll start with
10	this resolution. I think the Asst. Chief was
11	saying that he has some accolades that he would
12	like to pass on to Mr. Jim Grenwick.
13	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Okay, so we'll
14	do it after.
15	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Okay.
16	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: At this time
17	we're going to we have under new business
18	we have a resolution for Mr. Jim Grenwick and I'm
19	going to ask Commissioner White if he would do us
20	the honor.
21	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Is Mr. Grenwick
22	with us this evening? How are you, sir?
23	(APPLAUSE.)
24	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Before us this
25	evening is a resolution honoring Mr. Jim



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1 Grenwick.

2 WHEREAS, Mr. Jim Grenwick is a proud lifelong resident of the city of Detroit who is 3 4 active within the Eastern District. Mr. Grenwick 5 graduated from Cass Technical High School in 6 Detroit, attended Wayne State University and later joined the United States Air Force. 7 After 20 years of living in several 8 9 states he chose to move back to Detroit and move 10 his family to Cornerstone Village neighborhood a 11 few blocks away from his childhood home, and 12 WHEREAS, Mr. Grenwick's desire to help 13 others prompted him to get involved with the 14 community and to empower others to improve their 15 own situations. The accomplishments have worked 16 to improve the quality of life for everyone 17 living or working in Cornerstone Village. For 18 the last 18 months he has served as president of Cornerstone Village Community Organization. 19 20 During his presidency Cornerstone had maintained 21 a monthly information flyer getting the youth 22 involved by delivering the newsletters, and 23 WHEREAS, Mr. Grenwick continues to 24 involve the youth by creating a collaborative 25 called Lawn Academy. The Lawn Academy unites the



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1 business community with the kids of the neighborhood to achieve the common goal of 2 3 maintaining Cornerstone Village's overgrown lots. The youth earn a wage as well as a sense of 4 5 community belonging with immediate results. The 6 Cornerstone Village is proud of its success with the academy under Mr. Grenwick's leadership and 7 is considering forming a college scholarship fund 8 9 for the youth who live in Cornerstone Village. 10 In April of this year Cornerstone 11 Village created their community garden by turning a vacant lot into a productive neighborhood 12 13 meeting spot. The garden produces lettuce, 14 tomatoes, peppers and flowers, and 15 WHEREAS, Mr. Grenwick has been 16 instrumental in building a common ground, 17 information sharing, relationship and partnership 18 between the community, the Detroit Police Department and other city agencies he and his 19 organization realize that grass root effort has 20 21 been tried and true in making our communities a 22 safer better place for all involved. 23 As a result of this collaborative 24 effort there has been a reduction in crime and 25 better quality of life for the Cornerstone

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1	Village community.
2	NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the
3	Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking on
4	behalf of the citizens of the city of Detroit and
5	the Detroit Police Department acknowledge the
6	dedication and persistence of Mr. Jim Grenwick.
7	His highly displayed commitment to community
8	service and his ability to build sustainable
9	community partnerships merit our highest regards.
10	We thank and congratulate you, Mr. Jim
11	Grenwick, signed the Detroit Board of Police
12	Commissioners adopted this day, August 8, 2013.
13	Congratulations.
14	(APPLAUSE.)
15	COMMANDER JONES: Spirit of Detroit
16	Award is presented herewith as an expression of
17	the gratitude and esteem of the citizens of
18	Detroit to Mr. Jim Grenwick in recognition of
19	exceptional achievement, outstanding leadership
20	and dedication to improving the quality of life.
21	(APPLAUSE.)
22	COMMANDER JONES: The Detroit Police
23	Department presents the Certificate of
24	Recognition to Mr. Jim Grenwick, resident of the
25	city of Detroit in appreciation of your



1 contribution. Your involvement in the community and service to the city of Detroit demonstrate a 2 3 spirit and commitment that is worthy of 4 recognition. 5 (APPLAUSE.) 6 None of us in public MR. GRENWICK: 7 service seek to be honored, but when it happens 8 it feels good, so thank you. MR. CHOPSKY: You know, I could hardly 9 10 wait to come up here to be a part of the Jim 11 Grenwick Show. First and foremost let me say can 12 I got an amen now? 13 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Sir, can you 14 state your name for the record? 15 MR. CHOPSKY: Oh, I'm sorry, I tried to 16 be anonymous. My name is Steven Chopsky, I'm the 17 captain of Cadieux Road in Detroit and I have red 18 geraniums so when you come by and you need to be 19 honked up, just honk and I'll wave back at you. 20 But what I want to do is just make 21 light of his beautiful occasion, these wonderful 22 officers and public servants, and I've been 23 thinking about what I could do, and so I wanted 24 to sing Jim a song if I could. He doesn't know 25 about this, but I want you to join me and the

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1	song is, "For He's a Jolly good Fellow."
2	Now, here we go. I'm leading this now.
3	All right, we got a presentation for you. We're
4	looking at you, Jim.
5	(SONG IS SUNG - APPLAUSE).
6	MR. CHOPSKY: I'm done.
7	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: There is no old
8	business, so announcements, Thursday, August 15,
9	2013 at 3 PM we'll have our next meeting and that
10	will be at the Detroit Public Safety Headquarters
11	at 1301 Third Avenue in the Media Room.
12	At this time we're going to ask for
13	oral communications from the audience and we're
14	just going to remind you to state your name and
15	please limit your comments to two minutes.
16	MR. DAVIS: Good afternoon. My name is
17	Elder Anthony Davis, Sr. I'm from AC Towing and
18	I since May 1st that the City ask us to pay
19	\$75 per car that comes into our yard and they
20	told us we have 30 days, they give us like seven
21	days or five days grace to make sure that money
22	is there every single month when they want us to
23	pay our money to them, but they not paying our
24	money to us.
25	They want us to be timely fashion, but

They want us to be timely fashion, but



1 they do what they want to do when it comes to 2 paying us. We have a problem. I turn all my 3 slips in. I have not received any money. Now, I 4 done gave the City almost \$20,000 within the last 5 two months and I have not got one penny from 6 them. Now, we take cars to forfeiture, 2121 7 8 Fort Street, we take them to 7800 Dix. Gene's 9 Towing has not paid us. The money, they sent me 10 a check for \$600 and they owe me about \$3,000. 11 They have not paid my money. I want to know what 12 can be done about it. 13 The City wants their money, I paid it 14 but they not paying me. Now, is that fair? I'm 15 not robbing Peter to pay Paul, I'm not stealing 16 from the City. I pay all my taxes, I live and I 17 worship right in the city of Detroit. 18 All my dues, everything, all my inspections, all my money is paid up but what 19 20 about the small people. I know a lot of these 21 billionaires, they don't even go after them. 22 They owe millions and they won't give a couple 23 thousand dollars that they owe me. They ready to 24 take me off the list if I don't pay them. 25 You know some of these billionaires owe

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1 \$80 million in taxes, don't even pay they rent. They don't go after them, but they go after the 2 3 small man. I want to know what can that be done. I need a response. 4 Thank you. 5 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Okay, you're 6 Just a minute. AC, is there anything welcome. 7 you want to say to the gentleman, to Mr. Davis? ASST. CHIEF WHITE: We can get his 8 9 information and unfortunately we're going to have 10 to turn them over to City Budget. 11 MR. DAVIS: Not only City Budget, what 12 They owe me money. I'm about the Gene's Towing. 13 taking cars, they supposed to pay us and they're 14 not paying us. 15 ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Unfortunately, sir, 16 Gene's Towing is not --17 MR. DAVIS: You say that we got to take 18 them cars to them and they supposed to pay us. 19 Now I paid my money every month. I just gave 20 almost \$7,300. 21 ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Can I respond? 22 MR. DAVIS: Yes, sir. 23 ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Gene's Towing is 24 not an entity of the police department. They 25 don't work -- they've not a part of the police



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1 department so at that point it becomes a civil matter, but what we can do is get your 2 3 information and get it to the right people in 4 City Budget. 5 But also I have a building MR. DAVIS: 6 myself. I don't have to take the prints to their place. I can being them to my place and I don't 7 8 have to worry about getting a penny from them. 9 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you, okay. 10 Ms. McCant. MS. McCANT: My name is Yolanda McCant 11 12 and I reside in the Northeastern District. Т 13 have some issues and I understand that we're just 14 changing over hands and we do have a new 15 commander. 16 I'm having problems with young people. 17 I was up to 3 AM this morning. Someone died and 18 they want to do a candlelight vigil. When they get through with the vigil they stays out there 19 20 from 6 o'clock yesterday afternoon or before 21 until 3 AM in the morning. I called -- they say 22 call 9-1-1, I called 9-1-1, I called the station. 23 I mean, I work in the community, I do a 24 lot of stuff in the community and all I'm asking 25 for if I have a problem in my community where I

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1	reside why is it that I cannot get a scout car.
2	You call 9-1-1, they say, "We'll send it."
3	I understand all the protocols, I
4	understand that we have priority runs that's over
5	others, but when there's more than one call made
6	to 9-1-1 it has to be a problem. That's one of
7	my problems.
8	The other problem is October 1 starts
9	the what is it breast cancer awareness and
10	we would like to put up some ribbons that was
11	down at the old 1300, if possible could we find
12	out if we could post them up at the new location
13	also.
14	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: AC?
15	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Yeah, we can help
16	you with both those matters, ma'am. If you would
17	though start with Comm. McKissic in the back of
18	the room, he's going to help you out with the
19	problem with the kids, and DC Tolbert will get
20	with you on the issue with the building.
21	MS. McCANT: Okay, thank you.
22	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Thank you.
23	MS. WOODS: Actually I'm here to say
24	something good he doesn't say it, but Lt.
25	Rochon. We attend the Eastern District meetings

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1 that we have with him and I want to commend him 2 how he goes the extra mile for us. He gives us 3 his number to call him personally and when we 4 call, he gets things done. 5 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Ma'am, state your 6 name. MS. WOODS: Oh, I'm sorry, my name is 7 Gwen Woods and I just really -- also his staff, 8 9 Officer Robins, Officer Curtis, they have been 10 such a blessing to us. And one of the things 11 that more people -- the meetings are not packed 12 out, there's not a lot of people attending and he 13 wants more people to come. 14 So what I want to say that we need to 15 attend those meetings because he has made himself 16 available to us and I have seen an impact in the 17 neighborhood. And like I said, he may not be 18 able to answer me at that moment, but I quarantee 19 he does get back with us and he does follow up, 20 so I just want to thank you for that, and thank 21 you for giving us a little peace of mind in the 22 neighborhood. 23 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: All right, thank 24 you, ma'am. 25 (APPLAUSE.)



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1 MS. THOMPSON: Hi, my name is Mary 2 Thompson and my son Jeremy Thompson was murdered on May 1st and it actually was in the Northeast 3 4 District, I've been hearing that tonight. 5 I have never thought I would be in this 6 position or know anything about the city of Detroit's police department, but I know too much 7 8 now and I just feel like the police officers 9 should call you back in the Homicide Department. 10 It's impossible to get a police officer to call 11 you back. 12 Every question I've ever had answered 13 has had to have gone through the Crimestoppers or 14 I wouldn't have it answered. When I finally get 15 ahold of a police officer which I had to -- it 16 was hard -- he wanted to know why I was asking these questions that I was asking and he seemed 17 18 to be quite annoyed that I was calling him. 19 And even the police station in the area 20 that this crime happened, they didn't even seem 21 to know about it at all and that worries me 22 because this guy could get brought in for 23 anything. 24 This was not his first crime and he 25 obviously lives in that area. I do understand

that the police officers have -- especially 1 Homicide -- way more cases that they can handle. 2 3 I honestly don't even know how they can function as normal people when they go home at night with 4 what they deal with during the day. 5 6 But I asked three things of the police. I asked them if they would share information with 7 a private investigator so I could get someone to 8 look at my case; they said no. 9 10 I asked them if the one witness that says she can identify this guy could look at 11 12 mugshots, they said no. I asked them if they 13 tested the shell casing for fingerprints, they 14 said no, they do not do that. 15 However, I do know that they do in 16 Oakland County and I offered to pay for that to 17 be done myself, and they said no. And I just 18 want to ask the Police Chief to make them let me 19 have that shell casing tested. I can leave these 20 with you. 21 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you, ma'am. 22 First we want to offer our condolences to you and 23 then I'm going to have AC White to see if he can 24 help you with that. 25 MS. THOMPSON: Thank you.



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1 ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Yes, ma'am. 2 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: And also I want you to see our Chief Investigator, she's right 3 4 here. You can come back up to the mic. 5 MS. THOMPSON: I'm sorry, I don't know 6 the protocol. ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Yes, ma'am. 7 First 8 and foremost, I'm so sorry for your loss. 9 MS. THOMPSON: Thank you. 10 ASST. CHIEF WHITE: It is not 11 unreasonable for you to expect a return phone 12 call. With regard to the issues that you bring 13 forward today, as you have been told they're very 14 complex issues, but we're here to attempt to help 15 you. 16 Insp. Blackman is the commanding 17 officer -- will you raise your hand -- of 18 Homicide. He's here tonight, he'll be able to talk to you through some of these issues, okay? 19 20 MS. THOMPSON: Oh, thank you very much, 21 I appreciate that. 22 ASST. CHIEF WHITE: But you can start 23 with the Chief Investigator. 24 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Madam Chair, if I 25 could through the Chair, and Chief, this has been

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1 a -- I wouldn't say the norm, probably more so not the case, but is there a mechanism where we 2 3 track the number of calls that are coming into particularly Homicide seeking questions and is it 4 tracked in terms of a time frame that individuals 5 6 are being responded to or how do we -- is there a measurement, is there a standard that is in place 7 that an individual should expect a phone call 8 9 back within 24 or 48-hour time period, so what 10 can we say to individuals that is a standard in 11 terms of what they can expect back then in the 12 form of a response? 13 This is Insp. Duane INSP. BLACKMAN:

14 Blackman, Homicide. A couple of the comments 15 that you made, there would not be a mechanism to 16 track other than the fact that they would call 17 and leave a message with the investigator, but 18 one of the things I would encourage anyone when they do call the investigator, if that is not --19 20 they're not receiving a phone call back that they 21 would call a supervisor so that that supervisor 22 can make sure that whatever information they need 23 is given back to them; that's Number 1.

24 But Number 2 -- and understanding that 25 there is -- this is a complex and a continuous

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problem and it's based on the fact that my investigators are normally not sitting at their desks and fielding phone calls because, as stated, there are several cases they're investigating.

6 But we are attempting to rectify that by having a liaison be in place and hopefully it 7 8 should be started sooner than later, and that's 9 utilizing some of the individuals from the 10 Citizens Police Academy to be able to be that liaison so that there is someone that they can 11 12 speak to so that they're not just receiving 13 either a busy signal or receiving a voice 14 message.

And so that's something that's going to be implemented shortly, very shortly. And from the information I'm hearing that is being indicated, that she just has not received any information and she does not have any direct contact with this investigator.

I will address the issues about what was told to her, but not receiving those phone calls back after a message is sent to the investigator is something I'm dealing with right now.



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1	COMMISSIONER WHITE: If I could through
2	the Chair, Insp. Blackman, when individuals make
3	contact with the community, is that within an
4	investigator's log or should it be reflected that
5	they have made contact?
6	INSP. BLACKMAN: Yes, sir.
7	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Okay, thank you.
8	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you.
9	PASTOR IRVIN: Good evening. My name
10	is pastor Gerald Irvin. I have had a couple of
11	issues on my block. We started Faircrest Block
12	Club and we was having people squatting in the
13	houses and tearing down the awnings off the
14	houses, taking the license plates off they cars
15	and having a lot of drug guys trying to get into
16	the house.
17	We had one incident on the corner where
18	we had the drug dealers was taking over this
19	house and I went to the community affair meeting
20	and I met Officer Rochon and he gave me his
21	telephone number so he told me to let him know if
22	any activity goes on in the neighborhood.
23	So I dialed the number and a lot of
24	cleaning up had taken place after I had called
25	him, so the precinct came through the

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neighborhood and cleaned up the area where the drug dealers was in there with guns and Uzi's and stuff and they had a house party right directly in front of my house and I called them again, and the officers came and cleaned up the neighborhood.

So the issue -- I think if we can get 7 more contact with the police officers we can get 8 9 the area cleaned up, so it's been a job because 10 we started our block club and it was like they 11 was coming taking over the block. We've got two houses, squatters are there now, and one directly 12 13 across from my house they were selling drugs, 14 trying to take over the house, so I called the 15 They said they couldn't do anything about City. 16 it.

17 I asked them could they board it up. 18 They couldn't do anything about it. So I met 19 Officer Rochon and he sent the police over there 20 and they kind of cleaned up the area. So the 21 tactics that he uses, it works, you know, and I think if there are more officers that would 22 23 probably agree with that, if you have a contact 24 with someone that can directly get to the 25 problem.

1	Because I call 9-1-1 it was like a
2	joke. I called called a bunch of numbers, but
3	the response was second to none, I didn't get
4	anything, but when I called Officer Rochon I want
5	to commend him and the precinct for taking care
6	of the Faircrest Block Club. Thank you.
7	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: All right, thank
8	you.
9	(APPLAUSE.)
10	MS. HATCHER: My name is Evangelist
11	Dora Hatcher. I am not here to bash our
12	officers. I know we're short. I'm here to say
13	thank you. I may be one in a 100 that can get a
14	response and I know that there are people that
15	don't and I know that you're short.
16	But I know I thank God for a new Chief
17	that I do believe is going to help get this
18	straightened out with God's help.
19	I was at the Board of Police
20	Commissioners meetings at Focus Hope and the next
21	morning our doors were open to our precinct, yes.
22	They weren't locked at 4 o'clock any more and I
23	want to say I can't say this enough.
24	If you don't come to a meeting until
25	you have a problem, you don't know who to



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1 contact. I want to say to the preacher that just sat down, there is a Building & Safety 2 Department. I don't like to throw out names, but 3 4 Arthur Edge is one of them, and sometimes you 5 just have to step out and do what you have to do. 6 I had a drug problem on the corner of Emery and Hawthorn. I learned a lot from Rochon 7 8 over there. And I went over to help the young 9 man clean up where they had dumped behind his 10 house, but I knew he was allowing this boy to do drugs because I'm watching my neighbor do it 11 12 every day, all of us are. 13 I'm the second oldest on my block and 14 we keep it clean and I went over and I said, "You 15 know, young man, I knew your dad and your 16 grandma. Now, I know you don't want to go to 17 jail so you need to keep yourself a little clean, 18 you know." He wasn't doing it, but he was allowing this young man to use his home. He just 19 20 opened up to me. 21 He said, "You're right, Ms. Hatcher. He will stop being on my porch" and I broke it 22 23 up. And they know I don't play. I'm not saying 24 put yourself out there in harm's way, but you got 25 to let these people know you are not playing.

1	And I want to commend is it Lt.
2	Rochon or Insp. Rochon? Okay. When he was in
3	Northeastern there's not one of us that couldn't
4	call and he didn't take care of business and we
5	lost him I'd say a little bit, but I still bugs
6	him. Thank you all.
7	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Thank you.
8	MS. BROWN: Hi, my name is Beverly
9	Brown. I'm the vice-president of the Eastern
10	District Community Relations Council. And excuse
11	me if I'm shaking because I don't do this well.
12	On the piggyback of what the other
13	people just got through saying, the person that
14	was supposed to present this is not here so I
15	have the special honor or honoring Lt. Rochon.
16	(APPLAUSE.)
17	MS. BROWN: This is not how he acts at
18	the Eastern District meetings.
19	Certificate of Congratulations, Wayne
20	County Commission, Inspector Harold Rochon.

BROWN: 14 does what he says he's going to do, and not only that you get a feeling of comfort, you know what 15 16 I'm saying, because a lot of times you feel like 17 there's no use, there's no reason to take the 18 next breath, but he encourages us to keep taking 19 that next step and keep taking that next breath. 20 Thank you. 21 (APPLAUSE.) 22 ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Anyone else for 23 Harold Rochon, anyone else? 24 MR. WOODS: To the Commissioners, my 25 name is Gene Woods. My wife was up a few minutes



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1 ago. Our neighborhood association is Lasalle. We're on roughly Connor and Six Mile area right 2 3 by the airport and I raised my hand when you 4 asked.

I too have to commend Lt. Rochon and 5 6 his -- those that work with him because he 7 encourages us at the meetings that we have once a month and we see action. And like the lady that 8 9 was here before me, that makes a difference. 10 We've been in the neighborhood and in our area 11 for almost 30 years and we've seen some come and 12 go on behalf of the community relations, the 13 police and they get up and read a report and 14 that's basically what it is, a few this and that. 15 But when we come to meetings 16 Lt. Rochon, he gives us advice and encourages us 17 and lets us know that we can depend on him. 18 So to him and all of the police in 19 Detroit -- and we realize what they're going 20 through at this time is strenuous, it's a 21 challenge and it is very demanding, so we try to 22 let them know that we appreciate them; thank you. 23 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: And I think you 24

should all stand and give Lt. Rochon a hand.

(APPLAUSE.)

1 MS. PANNELL: Good evening, my name is 2 Sharon Pannell. I just want to thank the Chief for opening back up Gang Squad. My other problem 3 4 is he keeps planning meetings for the community, 5 but he's not keeping them. 6 We need to know when he's going to have a meeting with us, the community because he had 7 8 one scheduled for Monday and I got a call 9 Saturday afternoon saying it was cancelled again. 10 ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Okay. 11 MS. PANNELL: That's all I need to 12 know. 13 FROM THE AUDIENCE: It will be on the 14 19th at AM. 15 MR. SCOTT: Good evening, 16 Commissioners. I'm Ron Scott, Detroit Coalition 17 Against Police Brutality. 18 I'm coming before you tonight to mention -- I know Ms. Pannell is a friend of mine 19 20 and I can understand her fervor in mentioning 21 Gang Squad coming back. 22 We opposed it and we opposed it for a 23 I'm asking the Commission to go back reason. 24 into the Civil Rights Integrity Bureau and find 25 out how many officers in this unit in fact were

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1 involved in issues related to use of force, 2 because that was the main thing. 30 percent of the use of force 3 complaints that were rendered when they were in 4 existence, 30 percent of those came from that 5 6 unit, that unit alone. In addition to the fact, I just want to 7 raise one that I know of where there was an 8 incident in Sherwood Forest where there was a 9 10 lawsuit filed where there was an 11 year old girl 11 that was thrown against the wall and an 8 year 12 old that was hit. Now, that's not policing, that 13 is not policing, that's brutality. 14 And so the reality is I'm in favor of 15 policing like anyone else, but I'm in favor of it 16 like Dora Hatcher said where the community comes 17 together with the police, not in favor of a 18 military solution to a larger social issue. That's public safety. 19 20 And so within that context the Chief 21 needs to bring his proposal to this body before he takes them to the Crime Commission. 22 23 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Okay, and AC, you 24 want to maybe talk to him about what the Chief 25 said about the Gang Squad at the press conference

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1	this morning?
2	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Yes. First, thank
3	you for your concerns. The media has reported
4	that the Gang Squad is coming back. That is not
5	correct. The Chief is looking at and we meet
6	on these issues daily. He's looking at a gang
7	component to attach to the new TSS once the new
8	TSS gets off the ground from an intelligence
9	standpoint, but Gang Squad as we know it, the
10	iteration that we saw of Gang Squad, at this
11	stage there's no intentions of bringing that
12	back.
13	MR. SCOTT: Is there going to be any
14	evaluation per the Consent Decrees as to the
15	civil rights integrity issues of individuals who
16	might be assigned to those units?
17	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Oh, absolutely, and
18	that's with every assignment that's made in the
19	police department by policy as well as by consent
20	judgment. We do a risk assessment of literally
21	every officer in the police department.
22	MR. SCOTT: And I want to say to
23	Inspector I want to say Jones, my brother over
24	there, and I know I didn't challenge his
25	research, but maybe we can look at it, but he and

1 I have done something and talked about something I think is a harbinger for the future. 2 I told him about our Peace Zones for 3 Life program. He said anything you can do to 4 5 save life, come and meet with us. And therefore 6 I'm willing to do that and we're willing to do that and that's what's going to resolve the 7 outstanding issues in this community. 8 9 I offered to talk to him, he offered to 10 talk to me and we're going to take it further. 11 ASST. CHIEF WHITE: All right, thank 12 you and we appreciate that. And also with 13 regards to the Eastern District and the Harold 14 Rochon Show tonight, we are very proud -- in all 15 seriousness, we're very proud of the work that 16 the Eastern District and Harold Rochon -- the 17 entire staff, Insp. Jones, Insp. Williams, the 18 work that they do under extremely trying circumstances at the Eastern District. 19 20 So thank you, and you guys do deserve a 21 big hand. 22 (APPLAUSE.) 23 MS. ROMANO: Good evening, Anna Romano. 24 Madam Chairwoman. I just heard a comment. When 25 there was a reorg -- the reorg that went through



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1 on March 4th, prior to that there was meetings that a lot of the students from Denby High School 2 3 attended concerning Gang Squad. Those students went out into the 4 community and they obtained over 500 signatures 5 6 because they were upset that Gang Squad was being disbanded, also with Tact Mobile, and their 7 issues were that they said that on their way to 8 9 school they were afraid. 10 We've had parents that came in and said 11 their kids were robbed, beaten and they were 12 concerned. So now that the Chief is relooking at 13 this for Tact Mobile and Gang Squad coming back, 14 I think that's great because we need them. 15 If the kids are telling us, if the 16 children of Detroit are saying we have a gang 17 problem and we need Tact Mobile and Gang Squad, 18 we need to listen to them. They're in the streets, they're the 19 20 ones that walk to school every day. They're the ones that go to the corner store and live in 21 22 these neighborhood. 23 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: And I do think 24 that I'm going to let AC White, if you want to 25 speak to the Tactical Mobile Unit and the Gang --

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how that's going to be arranged. I don't think it's going to be the same, but you can address that.

ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Well, it's still in the planning stages to be frank. We're looking at a lot of different components, but to say that Gang Squad is really the only avenue for getting a child to school safely, to say that's kind of a -- I don't ascribe to that, let me just say that.

10 There were a lot of different things 11 that we're looking at. You know, Safe Passage, 12 we're working with DPS, and we're getting ready 13 to roll out a few other initiatives with regards 14 to Safe Passage, Safe Walk, the walking school 15 bus, a lot of different things that we're looking 16 at doing with kids this fall.

When we initially eliminated the Gang Squad Unit the impression was given to the community that we had no gang response and that's certainly -- nothing could be further from the truth on that.

Each precinct has a Special Ops. Each precinct has a response to gang problems. Each precinct has officers dedicated to the schools, so we're still very active in the schools. We're



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still working with DPS. We're still -- our 30 Series is still engaged with the gang members in the various communities, but that individual unit was disbanded.

5 Our response to gangs was not 6 disbanded, if that makes any sense.

MS. ROMANO: Yeah, it does make sense and I understand that because when the units were out there from listening to the children that did come to the meetings they just expressed their concerns.

12 And a lot of them had a good rapport 13 with the members from Gang Squad and a lot of 14 them also had rapport with some from Tact Mobile 15 because when they were hanging out on the gas 16 stations after 7 or 8 o'clock at night just 17 hanging there, the officers would ask them to go 18 home, what are you doing here and things like that. 19

20 So that was understandable that 21 eventually they knew not to hang out at gas 22 stations and party stores at night when Tact 23 Mobile was out there because Tact Mobile doesn't 24 respond to runs, so they had that liberty to go 25 city-wide and back up districts when they were in

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1 need. 2 And Gang Squad, I understand that the kids did have a good rapport with them and I know 3 4 there was an issue at Pershing High School and 5 there was numerous arrests prior to Gang Squad 6 being disbanded. COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: And from what I 7 heard the Chief say this morning, I think that 8 9 will be explained later and it will be fine, he 10 has a good plan and I'm sure --11 MS. ROMANO: I trust he does. It just 12 hurts me when I hear people saying that there was 13 so much conflict and things when there was a lot 14 of good that came from that unit. 15 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: We're going to 16 let the lady -- thank you. 17 ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Thank you. MS. JOINER: Good evening. My name is 18 19 Rhonda Joiner, I'm a Detroit DPS teacher, I teach 20 at a K-8 school on the west side and I'm also a 21 Detroit Police reserve officer. 22 And I do support the Gang Squad. Ιf 23 you all can recall the movie "Lean on Me", that's 24 what this school is about. These kids, the Joy 25 Road Boys, take over the school. You need Gang

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1	Squad to come knock them down, yes, we do.
2	(APPLAUSE.)
3	MR. CURTIS: Hello, Police
4	Commissioners, my name is Wayne Curtis and I live
5	on Manistique. We have a garden/farm there and
6	we do more than just grow food. We have several
7	programs with the young people in the
8	neighborhood from two to eight and teenagers from
9	11 to 15.
10	With the teenagers from 11 to 15 this
11	is our fifth season and they give neighborhood
12	round tables discussions, they lead them and they
13	bring up the topics, and this seems to be working
14	quite well in the neighborhood.
15	I mean, there's a lot of other problems
16	that have been going on for a long period of
17	time, but the results are very good as far as
18	getting a small amount of participation in the
19	neighborhood. I guess we're creating a Peace
20	Zone for Life there where everyone participates.
21	The next meeting round table discussion
22	that the youth will he handling is it will be
23	on marginalization, not marginalization within
24	the system, but marginalization within their own
25	neighborhoods where they can start bringing

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1 response and having discussions with people in 2 the neighborhood about certain problems that they 3 may be having. 4 Okay, thank you. 5 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you. Ιs 6 there any information on when you meet, sir? You say you have these meetings. Can anybody attend 7 8 those meetings? MR. CURTIS: Yes, we have meetings on 9 10 Saturday. My number is 313-898-5978 and we have 11 art in the garden program, we have live fresh, 12 eat fresh program also. 13 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: All right, thank 14 you. 15 L.V.: Hi, my name is L.V. and I just 16 want to briefly thank the commanding officer 17 Rochon for inviting us here. I'm with an organization which Mr. Al Brassy (sp) is the 18 executive director and what we want to do is 19 20 bridge the gap between the community and the 21 officers by showing the officers that we care 22 because we know they have to deal with a lot of 23 issues around morale and it's hard in these 24 difficult situations to help with a difficult 25 situation.

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1 And I have seen these meetings -- you 2 know, I was born and raised in Detroit. I've been out of Detroit a few years now, but I've 3 4 seen these meetings on TV, you look at it and you 5 don't really realize what's going on. 6 So, you know, we were supposed to have a meeting with him earlier today and then he said 7 8 he would be here, so we came here and we're both 9 sitting there saying how happy we are and how 10 thankful we are that we came here today because 11 we needed to be at this meeting. And I don't know why it's not all the 12 13 way back there to the wall with the situation 14 that's in the city right now. So one of the 15 things we want to do as we engage more fully with 16 Officer Rochon and the Chief is really being a 17 liaison between the officers and the community 18 and really do something to help the situation that the officers are dealing with so they will 19 20 able to be more empowered to do the work to 21 protect the community. 22 I grew up in Detroit. I was one of 23 those children who were scared. The reason I 24 worked real hard and went to Cass was because I 25 didn't want to go to school in the neighborhood



Page 43 1 because I didn't know who was going to beat me up going to the store. 2 So I feel for the kids. So I just 3 4 thank you all, thank you Officer Rochon, I'm glad 5 we came tonight and I'm just looking forward to 6 what we all do together and moving forward. 7 Thank you. 8 (APPLAUSE.) 9 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Are there any 10 more communications? 11 MS. SMITH: Good evening, Commissioner. 12 And welcome. 13 ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Thank you. 14 MS. SMITH: Good to see you. I'm 15 Bernice Smith, political activist. My concern is 16 not so much too seriously, but I do want to 17 congratulate that young man. I didn't know that 18 he was world famous here in the Eastern District. 19 So we're going to have to get 20 acquainted with him and see what all he can do. 21 In the meantime, I went to the Meijers store out 22 at Eight Mile there and Woodward because I live 23 in Midtown and I was quite surprised to see city 24 cars out there patrolling the area. 25 And my concern was why was the city

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1 police cars patrolling Meijers. After investigating, you know I did, I asked one of the 2 officers, I said, "Is it standard procedure for 3 you to have city cars out here?" because one was 4 parked and then the other one was surrounding 5 6 the parking lot. So he did state that we're assigned 7 In the meantime when I went inside the 8 there. 9 store I saw a young man, he wasn't in uniform but 10 he was in blues and he had his city badge right here on his -- I said, "Wait a minute, are you 11 12 Detroit police?" and so he stated, "Yes." 13 It was two of them in there along with 14 the private security that I imagine that the 15 Meijers have hired because I understand that 16 Chief McKinnon, he had something to do with the 17 contract with Meijers and having security. 18 Now, my concern is as most other people 19 will be concerned, I know we look out for the 20 robberies and everything and it's visible for the 21 cars to be out there and we do contain it in that 22 respect, but are they being paid to be out there 23 other than their regular city duties?
