CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Good afternoon and welcome to the Board of Police Commissioners meeting. My name is Jessica Taylor, and I am joined by Commissioner Donnell White, Vice Chair, and Immediate Past Chair, Commissioner Jerome Warfield. And from the Chief's Office is Deputy Chief Vickie Yost.

DEPUTY CHIEF YOST: Good afternoon.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: And Mr. Secretary, will
you introduce the rest of the staff?
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you. For the record, George Anthony, Secretary to the Board.

We have seated in front Ms. Pamela
Davis-Drake, our Chief Investigator.
We also have Ms. Gail Oxendine, who is our Director of Human Resources. Ma'am, congratulations and welcome.

MS. OXENDINE: Thank you.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: And we have Mr. Robert Brown, who is our Office Manager.

Our recorders are Sergeant Alan Quinn, and Ms. Rhonda Foster from Hanson Court Reporting Service.

That completes the introduction.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: At this time, I don't see a chaplain, so I am going to ask Commissioner Warfield if he could lead us in prayer.

COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Let us pray.
Father, we come this afternoon to give you thanks for just another day, and for giving us this part of our day. We thank you for the ending of an election process. We ask that you would anoint and direct those who are charged now with leading the City forward. We pray for the safety of this City. And we pray, Lord, that your hand of grace and mercy will be upon them. We pray for those families that suffered the loss of loved ones just last night; those who are yet still injured. We ask, Lord, that you would remove the stain of violence from this city and that you would issue in the spirit of peace. And so, Lord, bless us now as we move forward in this meeting with your presence. In Christ's name we pray. Amen.

AUDIENCE: Amen.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: So moving forward, I
would like to -- is there a motion to approve the agenda for --

COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: So moved, ma'am. COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: It has been moved and
supported, seconded. Is there any discussion?
If not, all in favor say "aye."
COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All opposed, say "no."
The motion carries.
Now I would ask for a motion for the approval
of the minutes for Thursday, October 31st, 2013.
COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: So moved.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: It has been moved and
supported. Are there any discussion?
All in favor?
COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All opposed?
Motion carries.
The next item is the Chairperson's report.
I don't have a report, but $I$ would like to
mention that we got a message from the Chief's Office, and telling us about the promotions of 40 police officers who will be promoted to sergeants and 21 sergeants who will be promoted to lieutenant, and a promotion of ceremony has been tentatively scheduled for November 22nd, 2013. So I just wanted to make mention of that.

Now I would ask Deputy Chief Yost, do you

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have a report or presentation?
COMMISSIONER WHITE: Madam Chair, if I could, prior to the Deputy Chief's report from the Office of the Chief, I would just like to take this opportunity behind the Chairperson's report to reiterate the Board's position from our previous meeting on last week that we communicate to a number of entities when we believe that the powers given to this body have been usurped. And so I think this would be another clear instance based on the communication you just read that should be included, Mr. Secretary, through the Chair, in our communication as it is prepared.

Thank you, Madam Chair.
COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Ma'am, I support my colleague in that effort.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Is that a motion?
COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: No, not a motion, just that we send that communication.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay.
Go ahead.
DEPUTY CHIEF YOST: At this time, through the Chair, Deputy Chief Yost.

At this time I will update you on the numbers, the shooting numbers as of today, year-to-date 2013. We have 289 fatal shootings and 1,054 nonfatal

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shootings.
The presentation from Homicide has been canceled due to their involvement in the investigation from last night, so we apologize for that.

That concludes my report.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you.
Go ahead, Commissioner Warfield.
COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Through the Chair, Deputy Chief, is that an increase or a decrease or the same from last year at this time?

DEPUTY CHIEF YOST: Homicides and nonfatal shootings are both down.

COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Down, okay. By about how much approximately?

DEPUTY CHIEF YOST: Over 12 percent for homicides, and between 3 and 4 percent for nonfatals.

COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: And on the standing committee reports, the Board and staff have worked on revising the bylaws to reflect changes in the Charter.

Mr. Secretary, will you put on the record the proposed changes?

SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yes, ma'am.
For the record, George Anthony, Secretary to the Board.

To the Board, you have directed that bylaw changes or changes be made to the bylaws to better reflect the current circumstances, especially under the 2012 Charter. I would ask the Board that we just consider the first two articles. There are several articles in your bylaws, and I would ask that the Board today just consider the first two articles. And I will put those two articles on the record, if I may.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Under Article 1 which deals with the name, purpose, and governing law, formerly, it was -- the article read, name, the purpose, creation and governing law. We have eliminated creation. And we moved into Section 1 which is the name, that remains unchanged, this is the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners, so that remains unchanged.

Section 2 remains unchanged from the former bylaws, the purpose.

But Section 3 does have some changes in it, and it deals with creation. I would like to read those changes now. And they reflect the 2012 City Charter.

The Board was created by the 1974 Detroit City Charter, in Article 7, Chapter 11, Section 7-1102, and was adopted by a vote of the People of the City of

Detroit.
The 1974 Charter was subsequently revised and set for vote on November 8, 2011. The revised Charter was adopted by the People of the City of Detroit to take effect on January 1, 2012, Article 7, Chapter 8, Section 7-802, hereinafter the Charter.

Those are the changes. You can see on your redlined version what was there previously.

All powers and duties of the Board are derived from the Charter. Nothing in these bylaws shall be construed as expanding or contracting the authority conferred upon the Board by the Charter in Article 7, Chapter 8. Formerly that was Chapter 11 under the old Charter.

And again, the Section 3 of Article 1 references the old Charter and Article numbers. It has been updated with references to the revised 2012 Charter information.

Under Section 4 of Article 1, the governing law, as you know, the governing law, of course, will be the Constitution of the United States, State of Michigan, statute and rules of the Federal, State or City, and those -- that provision has not been changed.

That completes really Article 1 of the proposed bylaws.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: I would ask for a motion to adopt the Section 3 of Article 1 to -- that reflects the 2012 City Charter.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Just a point of information, Madam Chairman, when you say a motion to accept Section 3, would in effect we not be a motion to accept the entire article?

SECRETARY ANTHONY: The entire article, yes.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Article 1.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Article 1, yes.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Section 3 of Article 1.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: Yes, ma'am.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Well, the entire article,
1, 2, 3 and 4 .
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: The entire article?
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay. I'm sorry.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: Madam Chair, I make a
motion to accept the revisions of the bylaws of the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners as it relates to Article 1 which was inclusive of Sections 1, 2, 3, and 4.

COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Support.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: It has been moved and seconded. Is there any discussion?

All in favor?
COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All opposed?
Motion carries.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you.
Article 2 deals with the powers and duties of the Board. Section 1 is entitled General. And there were some revisions here. Most of the revisions are those that deal with section number, and the Board's authority was restated to conform to the new Charter provision.

So under Section 1, it says Section 7-802 which is a change from the former section number of the Charter vests the Board with supervisory authority or supervisory control and oversight of the Detroit Police Department.

Notice that the change here dealt with supervisory authority over the Department, which is a change from the former Charter, as set forth in the Charter, and that that governs the entire change there.

Under Section 2, the duties of the Board of Police Commissioners, these are the duties that are really contained in the 2012 Charter, and it says that the Board shall perform the duties enumerated in Article -- or in Section 7-803 of the Charter.

And Section 7-803 states that the Board shall:
A. In consultation with the Chief of Police and with the approval of the Mayor establish policy, rules and regulations;
B. Review and approve the departmental budget before its submission to the Mayor;
C. Receive and resolve as provided in this Charter any complaint concerning the operation of the Police Department and forward all allegations of criminality to the appropriate internal or external law enforcement agency for further investigation;
D. Act as a final authority in imposing or reviewing discipline of employees of the Department;
E. Make an annual report to the Mayor, the City Council and the public of the Department's activities during the previous year including the handling of crime and complaints and of future plans.

Other duties include the following:
A. Exercise preliminary authority over citizen complaints except those containing allegations of criminality which shall be referred to the appropriate internal or external law enforcement agency for further investigation, reference Section 7-803.3, and 7-808.

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B. Appoint key Board and Department
personnel including the Secretary to the Board, reference 7-804.1; a Chief Investigator and investigative staff, reference Section 7-804.2; and the Department's Director of Police Personnel, Section 7-810.
C. Conduct a professional search to identify candidates for Chief of Police, when that office becomes vacant, and submit a list of qualified candidates to the mayor, Section 7-805.
D. Approve all promotions within the Department through the rank of lieutenant, and approve all appointments to the ranks above lieutenant including Deputy Chiefs, Section 7-806 and 7-814.
E. The authority to suspend employees without pay with the concurrence of a two-third majority of members of the Board, Section 7-809.
F. Review and approve the Department's reorganization plan, Section 7-806.1.

Again, the Charter sections were renumbered. The Charter provisions listed under Section 7-803 are listed above. And the other duties contain citations to where the provisions may be found within these bylaws.

Madam Chair, that completes Article 2.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Is there a motion to adopt Article 2 that reflects the 2012 City Charter changes?

COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Ma'am, I am going to move adoption for Article 2 of the bylaws containing Sections 1 and Sections 2 of Article 2.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: It has been moved and supported. Is there any discussion?

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Madam Chair, I do have a few questions. Mr. Secretary --

SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yes, sir.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: -- just for point of the record, the majority of the information that was outlined, particularly in Other Board duties include the following, that is not new to the document, correct? This is just a reaffirmation?

SECRETARY ANTHONY: Some of this is a reaffirmation. Then some is new. The provision, especially with regards to the search for Police Chief, that is a brand new provision of the Charter. So that is absolutely new. Previously, it was -- the Board was not included.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Sure. And for the record, the majority of members, I am sorry,
particularly as it relates to Section E --
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yes.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: -- the authority to suspend employees without pay with the concurrence of a two-third majority of members, is that -- I would assume that this is going to be members of the entire body --

SECRETARY ANTHONY: That's correct.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: -- and not members present? And it may warrant -- be explicit in this document of -- that it is two-thirds of the body in totality versus two-thirds majority -- well, I guess it does spell that out, two-third majority of the members of the Board.

SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yes, sir, which would be I think 8 -- 7 point something.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Yes.
COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Just a point of us
shows up?
COMMISSIONER WHITE: No comment.
Commissioners, if you will weigh in, but maybe that is explicit enough that we do not need to go any further than that, two-third majority of the members of the Board?

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: I think so.

COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: For -- but I would
say for clarity, I might want to put in parentheses the actual number there, whether it is 7 or 8 or $9--$

SECRETARY ANTHONY: I can do that.
COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: -- for reference.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: I think that would add the clarity $I$ am seeking.

SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you. COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Absolutely.

SECRETARY ANTHONY: Okay.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: So there is no ambiguity
there.
COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Exactly.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: I was just going to say,
Madam Chair, I would just offer that as a friendly
amendment to Commissioner Warfield's motion --
COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I certainly accept.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: -- and end my discussion
there.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Do $I$ need to make a motion for that amendment?

COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: No.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Are there any other discussions?

All in favor?

COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All opposed?
Motion carries.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Again, to the Board members, I would ask that these -- just these two articles be considered for today, and that Article 3 be considered at our next meeting.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Just for clarity, Madam Chair, would we be looking at this coming Thursday?

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Yes, and I think I will be back because it is 6:00. I was thinking I had a 3:00 meeting.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Through the Chair, Mr. Secretary, that would be Sections 3 -- I am sorry, Article 3 --

SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yes.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: $--4,5$, is 5 the last?
and 6 which is --
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Well, the reason I was asking is that Article 3 is really lengthy. It is several pages. So I wanted to, you know, break it up for time.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: What I wanted to try to get to is if we could possibly agree to a date, because I know schedules can vary from times, and so if we
know, and maybe not try to hash it out now, Mr. Secretary, but if we could possibly come up with a schedule where commissioners would know on these dates, these portions of the document will be handled.

SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yes, sir.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: And that way if -- maybe commissioners, if we are not available, we may be able to alter our meeting date that week, that would account for all of us to be present to deal with this document. COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Absolutely. CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: I agree. SECRETARY ANTHONY: Not a problem. COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Mr. Secretary. SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you very much. CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: The next item is new business. Is there any new business? The new Director of Personnel, do you want to come to the mic and introduce yourself? MS. OXENDINE: Yes, ma'am. Good afternoon. COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon. MS. OXENDINE: My name is Gail Oxendine. I am happy to be here. I commonly use my middle initial A. because there is another Gail Oxendine that lives in the city of Detroit. And so I use my middle initial
A., but I am so pleased to be here. And thank you so much for your trust and support for my being here, and I hope to serve the Department well.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you. Well, I had the opportunity to sit in on the interview process and $I$ was very impressed. So... MS. OXENDINE: Thank you so much. Thank you so much.

Are there any questions that $I$ can answer for you?

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Madam Director, just for the record, the spelling of your last name? MS. OXENDINE: $O-x-e-n-d-i-n-e$. COMMISSIONER WHITE: Just to say welcome on board. I haven't personally met you, but I have heard a few individuals who have spoke very highly of you, and I look forward to working with you in your new role as Director of Personnel.

MS. OXENDINE: Thank you so much, sir. COMMISSIONER WHITE: You are welcome. COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I just want to echo my colleague's sentiments, and welcome on board. Certainly anything we can do to help you make your job better, we will make sure we avail ourselves of that, as well.

MS. OXENDINE: I appreciate that. Thank you, sir.

COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: You are welcome. CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: The other Oxendine I believe is your cousin.

MS. OXENDINE: Yes, that's true.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: The next item is old
business. Is there any unfinished business?
If not, we have the announcements.
Next week, the meeting will be on Thursday, November the 14 th, at the 6 th precinct at the Bushnell Congregational Church. And that's located at 15000 Southfield Road. Again, the Thursday, November the 14 th, at the 6 th precinct, the Bushnell Congregational Church, 15000 Southfield Road.

And now we will have oral communications from the audience. Please give your name and limit your comments to two minutes.

Are there any communications?
MS. ROMANO: Good afternoon.
COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Good afternoon.
MS. ROMANO: Anna Romano.
I just want to notify everyone and remind them of the Veterans Day Luncheon on Monday, November 11th. The doors open at 10:00. The ceremony
starts at 11:00. Lunch will be served at noon. So everyone is welcome to attend. Thank you.

COMMISSIONERS: Thank you. COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Location? MS. ROMANO: Oh, the location is at the James Europe Post at 18651 Mound Road. It is between East Nevada and East Seven Mile, and I do have flyers here for everyone.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay. MS. ROMANO: This is the third annual one that the Department has done. Thank you. COMMISSIONERS: Thank you. MS. SMITH: Good afternoon, Bernice Smith, political activist. COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon. MS. SMITH: Welcome. Congratulations. DEPUTY CHIEF YOST: Thank you. MS. SMITH: I am kind of upset this morning for two reasons. We haven't heard results from our campaign. Of all of the regions, we were the only ones that have not been completed in giving us results, whether we run -- we won or we lost, either way. Also -- and that was the only region that was absent in getting the results. I called before I came, so we will know tomorrow morning.

In the meantime, what really upset me again, the news, as most of you know, we give a news report on 1200 each day, on Angelo's Show, on which I am one of the commentaries.

Dearborn police, I don't know whether you are aware of it, apprehend two felons that were burglarizing a car or trying to strip a car there in Dearborn. They tried to escape. They were in a U-Haul van or whatever. And the police caught them. They arrested them. In other words, they detained them. They got their ID and so forth, but in the meantime, they were on the other side of Dearborn. And would you know, they let them go. For what reason, I am really amazed. And I was really upset about it because of the fact, what was their reason for letting them go if they found them in the commission of a crime?

Now, we don't need any more criminals in our city. Now, if they couldn't take them to the police station to lock up there on Michigan, why would they let them go? And I intend when I leave here to call Haddad, because most of you know Haddad was one of our former police chiefs here in Detroit, and I am sure he may not be aware of this action of his policemen. So that's another thing I think we should have something to say about. I don't know whether it is in your realm
to call him or what, but $I$ would let him be aware of what happened as far as these felons are concerned and why -- the reason for them -- the police letting them go.

Another thing. There were so many write-ins, I was really surprised and upset that I encountered. Because number one, the people that I saw that were giving out the literature, never seen them before at any police meeting. They don't know a hill of beans about what your organization and your commissioner do here each week. And I am not putting everything -bragging myself, but if you are going to be a police commissioner, as far as I am concerned, you have got to know the details on what you do and how you operate. If they have a job, then they don't need to be running for police commissioner. I am retired. I know what it is all about. At least I think I do because of the fact that I am interested in what happens to the police department and plus the fire department. I constantly say that I want more monies for you guys, for the police. Because you deserve it. You are out here, you are risking your lives, and you need the money, and you need your medical insurance again. So these are things that I stress along with crime and trying to combat crime and hire more policemen, so they can be out here on the street, walking up and down if need be. And give you monies in your budget.

But it is not happening if we have got fly-by-night people trying to run for the Police Commission. And I am very upset about it because one flyer I saw, she is a school teacher. I have never seen her sit at any of these seats. There is another gentleman that's running. I never seen him down here. So I feel as though that there should be some kind of requirements once they get on board, that at least ten meetings, three times -- each meeting, or at least three times be required to attend their meetings, all right, because $I$ feel as though some of them are not going to be here because they work.

And also another requirement that I would like, for the Chief to attend meetings, to let us know what he is doing, and not constantly send a deputy chief, which I have no problem with it, baby, but the fact is we would like to see him sometimes. I haven't seen him in over a month. The only time I see him is on TV. So I would like to see him about things that I want to discuss with him.

So I am just kind of upset this morning because we are being neglected. And they are taking us for granted. And I don't like it. I don't like it at
all. People are running for office that don't deserve it. Not only the police department, the other offices. But I am interested mainly in the police department. Because I have an interest in what happens out here in this city. And I feel as though that people should be very much interested in knowing that the police is who we depend on each and every day. And we should take more interest in their welfare. And we don't; we take them for granted. And I don't like that at all.

I thank you for your time.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you. COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am. DEPUTY CHIEF YOST: Through the Chair, actually, ma'am, I just want to put you at ease about the Dearborn situation. DPD has had direct conversation with Dearborn PD to resolve the matter. MS. SMITH: All right. DEPUTY CHIEF YOST: We are discussing it. MS. SMITH: Thank you. Thanks, baby. CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Are there any other comments? Any other communications? MR. STIDHAM: Good afternoon, Board, Deputy Chief. Tom Stidham. And I did want to just bring the Board up to speed on what occurred yesterday. I think at

Commissioner Warfield's request, some of the tower representatives did meet with Norman White, the Director of Municipal Parking. Mr. White used it -- I think fairly stated -- as a fact finding mission. And he did indicate to us, anyways, that he was -- or would be attempting to reach out to some other people in the city and perhaps the Chief Operating Officer to gather some more information. But he did say that he intended to have another meeting with those people. And I was just wondering, Commissioner, or the Board, whether or not you would be willing to again reach out to them and make sure that we are made a part of that conversation. CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Mr. Warfield? COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, ma'am. Through the Chair, unfortunately I wasn't able to make the meeting yesterday, as you know. I had to rush my wife to the emergency room. And so I will be reaching out to Mr. White to see what his plans are moving forward. And I did hear some things about the meeting, and so I need to follow up with him because from my initial discussion with him, we were going to have a very frank and a very candid meeting, and from what I understand, that probably was not the case, that there were questions that were at the table that were not being answered. And so I will have that

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conversation with him and ask that you all be included because I think if we are going to get the system right, I think all hands who are involved need to be on deck so that we can move it forward. We know that we believe we have a plan that if implemented is easy, it is doable. It covers the City. There is virtual no liability for the City, no cost. There is revenue generation for the City. And the citizens are made safe.

Right now we do know there are issues at the number 1 impound as relates to cars coming up missing, cars coming up with things missing from them. As it relates to just the zoning of the number 1 impound, we know it is not zoned correctly. So there are some things that we definitely need to square away with.

Unfortunately, we are also in this transition period, and so I am also reaching out to the new administration to see if they would be willing, as well, to sit down and meet, and maybe we can come up with a resolution to this fairly quickly. Again, the plans have already been agreed upon by this Commission and the towers, and so it should not be a big to-do for people who want to do the right thing. So I would definitely do that.

MR. STIDHAM: Thank you, Commissioner.

Also, through the Chair, are part of those discussions still involved the technology component and enhancement?

COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Through the Chair, yes, sir.

MR. STIDHAM: Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you.
MR. WELBORNE: Bill Welborne, President of Citywide. I was going to piggyback on what Ms. Smith said. I back her all the way on these guys running for the Commission. And I have talked to several people. And they don't go to a community relations meeting. They don't come down here. They don't know anything of what's going on. And I think in order to get into this thing, you have got to have some conception of what is going on. You have got to have it. If you don't have that, get out the way. Okay. Enough on that.

As President of Citywide, I have initiated a new program that we will start next week. The guys -the police officers, the ones -- the grunts on the street I call them, they never get recognized for all the -- some of the things they do. And I want to put a stop to that. Starting next week, we are going to recognize two officers from the 4 th precinct that went above and beyond the thing they had to do. Two ladies
broke down in a car. They didn't have any money.
These guys paid for the wrecker to pick their car up. They stayed there with these people. They followed them down to the yard to take care of their business. And they didn't have to do all that. All they had to do is write the report up and go about their business. But they didn't leave. And I think these guys should be recognized for that.

When I was in the military, I got all the accolades for all my men doing things. And people come to me say, well, you did this. I didn't do a doggone thing. They did it. They made me. They made me look good.

And Deputy Chief Yost, as a Deputy Chief, she can attest to this, I hope she can, that any time that people are working for you, they all -- they can make you or break you. If you don't take care of them, they are not going to take care of you.

A long time ago we used to have an awards dinner. For some reason, it stopped. Well, I want to get it started again so $I$ am raising money to get this awards dinner. We are going to have this thing -- we are going to award them a certificate at each precinct. And in June, we are going to have a combined dinner. We are going to award these guys a plaque. And I want

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to get these guys the recognition they due. I tell you, I spent time in Viet Nam, and Viet Nam is right out that door there. It is really tough out there. And I know how it is to be shot at, and you don't know where it is coming from. It is hard. I mean, really hard.

So I just want to let you all know that. And as I get the names of these officers, I have got a committee together, I am going to send you the names of these officers, officers and civilians. In fact, we have got two officers and two civilians. We have got two homeless men that saw them first. They stayed there with them until the police came. These guys wouldn't leave these ladies. And I thought that was commendable of them. And I want to make sure they are recognized too, even though they out there homeless, you know, they still do good things. And we should all recognize that.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you, sir. I am sure that is going to be really appreciated.

DEPUTY CHIEF YOST: Yes. And through the Chair, there are Department awards that we can also give them if you can forward me the information regarding the specific deed, we can also include an internal write-up for them, as well. And we just had

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an honor award banquet within the past -- I think it was the past month, maybe six weeks, where we did honor our officers for the good works they do. And it doesn't always have to be a lifesaving or something like that.

MR. WELBORNE: Right.
DEPUTY CHIEF YOST: It can be just something like this giving back to the community, where they do the right thing and where they make this Department look good and they are emblematic of the pride we have in our job and our community. So if you could forward that information to the Neighborhood Policing Bureau, I would appreciate it.

MR. WELBORNE: Okay. What I did last night, I gave -- I was online last night, I gave them a form where they can pick officers they want to pick between the president of the community organizations, and the Commission people, they can pick the commander or the captain, if they want to and send them back to me, and we will try to pick the best one, because we might have four or five in one month, but we can only do a couple a month, but we want to try to pick the best ones each month and try to get something going for these guys. DEPUTY CHIEF YOST: Through the Chair, we appreciate your support.

MR. WELBORNE: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All right. Thank you.
Are there any more communications? Are there any more communications? Are there any more communications?

Okay. Well, I would like to ask for a motion to adjourn.

COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: So moved.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: It has been moved and supported.

Meeting adjourned.
