CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: If you'd take a seat please, we will get started. The meeting is called to order at 3:00, p.m., Thursday, May 1st, 2014. I am Commissioner Jessica Taylor, Chairperson of the Board. And I'm going to ask our Secretary if he would call role, please.

SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Madame Chair. For the record, George Anthony, Secretary to the Board. Commissioner Donnell R. White has called in. He will not be here today. Commissioner Richard Shelby? COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Here.

SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Wendell L. Byrd?

COMMISSIONER BYRD: Here.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Reginald
Crawford? Commissioner Willie E. Bell?
COMMISSIONER BELL: Here.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Willie E.
Burton?
COMMISSIONER BURTON: Present. SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Lisa Carter?

COMMISSIONER CARTER: Present.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Ricardo R. Moore?

COMMISSIONER MOORE: Present.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Madame Chair, you have a quorum.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you. I'd like to introduce from the Chief's Office, First Deputy Chief -First Assistant Chief Lashinda Houser.

ASSISTANT CHIEF HOUSER: Thank you. Happy to be here. I'd just like to state for the record through the Chair that the Chief will be present at next weeks community meeting.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay. Thank you. Mr. Secretary, will you introduce the rest of the staff, please?

SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Madame Chair. We have seated in the front Ms. Aliyah Sabree, who is our attorney to the Board, and Ms. Pamela Davis-Drake, our chief investigator from the Office of the Chief Investigator, Mr. Robert Brown, our office manager to my right, Officer Dan Danokowski who is recording our proceedings and Ms. Wendy Boer from Hanson Court Reporting Service. That completes the introductions. CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All right, thank you,
sir. I'm going to ask, do we have a Chaplain? Deacon Adams, will you do us the honor, please?

DEACON ADAMS: It's always an honor to pray. Great, awesome and wonderful God, we're here uplifting and glorifying your holy name, oh Heavenly Father. Please bless us and touch us and let us carry out your mission in order to represent your people and to be fair in deliberation, oh Heavenly Father, that all decisions that we make be thoughtful and this process is going to be a benefit to those that we serve, as right as we possibly can be, oh Heavenly Father, touching each and every person here, whether they be commission or whether they be audience or whether they be just citizens in general. All these things we do and ask in the name of your son, Jesus Christ, in his name, Amen.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you. I call for a motion to approve the agenda for Thursday, May 1st, 2014.

COMMISSIONER BELL: So moved.
COMMISSIONER MOORE: Second.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: It's been moved and
seconded. Any discussion? All in favor?
COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All opposed? Agenda stands approved. I'd like to call for a motion to approve the minutes for Thursday, April 24th, 2014.

COMMISSIONER BYRD: So moved.
COMMISSIONER BELL: Second.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: It's been moved and seconded. Any discussion? All those in favor? COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All opposed? Minutes stand approved as written. The report presentation by the Department, do we have a report?

ASSISTANT CHIEF HOUSER: No, not this week, ma'am.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay. Thank you. Standing committee reports? Any new business? Old business? Any business? Well, our next meeting will be Thursday, May 8th, 2014, 6:30, at the Bushnell Congregational Church, the Eighth Precinct. That's at 15000 Southfield Freeway in Detroit. At this time, we'll move to oral communications from the audience.

SECRETARY ANTHONY: Madame Chair, if I can just make an -- or just remind you too that there is the interfaith memorial service tomorrow. It's -- the information is in your package of material.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay. All the Commissioners have a copy? SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yes, ma'am.

ASSISTANT CHIEF HOUSER: Through the Chair, I'd also like to make an announcement. You may have heard, Assistant Chief Eric Jones is going to be retiring from the police department after 25 years of dedicated service. He's going to have a coffee and cake on May 9th here in this room. However, the Chief wanted me to invite you all to what we are doing as relates to replacing his position. There's going to be what we are calling a professional promotional assessment. And he wanted to invite the Board members to participate as evaluators on that particular assessment. Right now, it's been tentatively set for May 16th on Friday. We do not have a time yet. But $I$ will forward it to your office.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All right. Thank you, ma'am. Are there any more announcements?

COMMISSIONER BELL: Sure. I think the First Assistant Chief should mention the groundbreaking ceremony that took place this morning in the Fourth District. I think this is an oversight on her part. ASSISTANT CHIEF HOUSER: Commissioner Willie Bell, he was standing right there next to me and so was the Chair and so was Commissioner Shelby, yes. So, this morning, this morning at 10:00 the groundbreaking for the Fifth Precinct at 3500 Conner I believe was the
address. So, it's going to be an awesome safe haven for community members in that area, Conner and south of Mack.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Nice building, nice building too.

COMMISSIONER BELL: Madame Chair, I just want to say that we are really pleased in District Four and also the City of Detroit. This really is historic, restoring the precincts. So, I'm just elated the people that responded and most important have gotten the word out. So, hopefully, I think it's opening up around December of this year.

ASSISTANT CHIEF HOUSER: Yes, sir.
COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Is there any other announcements? If not, now we will move to oral communications from the audience.

MR. WELBORNE: Good afternoon to the Board. Bill Welborne, W-e-l-b-o-r-n-e, president of City Wide. I got some people calling me asking me a couple questions which I didn't know the answer to. One of them -- I don't think you do that -- a lady called me and asked me do the police department put out an arrest list every day. And I told her, that's just about impossible for a city like this, this size. I guess she
is from some small city somewhere that put out an arrest list every day. But $I$ never heard of it.

ASSISTANT CHIEF HOUSER: No, sir. Through the Chair, no, sir, we do not.

MR. WELBORNE: And another call I got, where is the best place to ask for copies of the Most Wanted List, the Ten Most Wanted List for $I$ guess the FBI list.

ASSISTANT CHIEF HOUSER: Through the Chair, I believe it can be captured on line. It's a website, FBI website.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Probably Google it.
MR. WELBORNE: Okay, because I wasn't sure on that. I heard that, but I didn't try to Google it myself. I just wanted to make -- get the right information before I even tried myself. Also, on the -let me get my specs out so I can see. You know, I'm working with the Chief's city camp thing. And we are going to have our first graduating class next week on the 9th of May at Don Bosco Hall at 4:30 p.m. The kids going to graduate. I only got about half the class graduating.

We lost a lot of kids because some of the kids, I will be honest with you, I just want to ring their necks, a couple youngsters that I just, oh. But then you got a couple kids there that's really really
excellent, and I'm proud of them. And I told them that today when I left there today. And they have come forward, and they help me with the other kids. And they are changed, you know. When a kid goes from first walk in there, they curse me out, call me all kinds of names, blah, blah this and blah, blah that.

Now I walk in, they shake my hand, how you doing, Mr. Welborne? And I appreciate that. And we did the best we could. But this is the first year. We will do it better next time. So, but they're graduating next on the 10th, on the 9 th rather next month, this month. It's May already. I just want to let you all know.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Excellent. Thank you, Mr. Welborne. Miss Bernice, you have to come on the first call because you know the Commissioners told me I can only ask one time now.

MS. SMITH: Bernice Smith, human resources. Well, shall I begin? Brown, please don't time me because this is important. Last week -- no, it was this week -- it was very disappointing to see on the news, and you know I'm going to come to you whenever I have a problem with the police department. And then I'm going to tell you also when you do good.

I was very shocked to hear about 27 police officers with tickets. And wasn't no big deal for a lot of people but it was for me because of the fact that the police department supposed to be an example for the citizens of Detroit or anywhere else that they go because they wear the badge. And the majority of it was moving -- well, moving and parking violations, nothing really serious. And other than that, and that's serious enough.

And I feel as though that we should be careful what we do. The citizens, they need to pay their tickets also and the police also. And I don't think that there should be an exception to the rules. And I do hope that this won't happen again next year when we have another accounting. You will have an accounting twice a year. So, I feel maybe you better do it three times a year. This way, you will keep abreast on how you're doing as far as your traffic violations are concerned. Now, with that being said --

ASSISTANT CHIEF HOUSER: Madame Chair, can I speak on that first? It should be noted for the record that this is an audit that we did. Nobody else did the audit for us. And certainly, the majority of those tickets that created warrants in some issues were parking tickets. And the others, there were members who maybe didn't cut their grass or something like that. And then depending upon which municipality they lived
in, they would get tickets.
And in some cases, if you have children, you know, your kids get all these parking tickets in your name and you don't know. So, there were an array of reasons why this happened. And certainly some of the officers did not know. But once everyone was notified, everyone took care of it. Yes, ma'am.

MS. SMITH: Yes, they did, because the Chief was right on it I understand. So, we don't want to make that no habit. And we certainly don't want to be in the paper for people to read because all they want to know and think that we are -- Detroit did this and Detroit done did that. All right.

Yesterday on our radio program, you know, most of you know I do commentary. And Cliff Russell, he's our mediator now. The subject was the state police, the people having complaints against the state police. The mayor was stopped. Of course we know he drives fast anyway. But he was stopped and by the DNR, not the state police, the DNR. And the reason why I know that, I went there. So, he was stopped. And then the next one was stopped was the president of the city council, Jones. She got upset because she was stopped. And then Ashley Winfrey was stopped.

They made the remark as most of you know saying that we trying to get the riffraff out of the island. Well, it upset me when $I$ heard all of this. So, I said, well, when I talk with Cliff on the air and it was brought up to our attention, people that was listening. And I stated that I was going to go out there to Belle Isle and check on it myself.

And that's what I did. I called. That's when I called Brown to get the state police. He is very handy in giving me information when $I$ can't get it. So, I got the state police number. And then I asked to speak to the person who was in charge of Belle Isle. So, I got the name, which is Michael Shaw in case any of you would like to know. And I did leave a message on his machine, and then he called me back within 30 minutes.

And I spoke to him and told him what I wanted to see him about and what the problem was with the citizens here in Detroit. So, he gladly stated that I can come out to Belle Isle, where he would be at 2:00. I got out there about 2:30, going on three. And in the meantime -- they're in that white house back there in case you want to know where they are.

And I was surveying the area when I was driving. And it did say 20. And I have no problem with that because I was looking to see what they are doing.

They are putting up barricades up and everything. And one thing I did notice, not one of us was working there. So, that's something else I'm going to ask about. In the meantime, I get there; and a lot of the police were standing out in front, about eight or nine of them. And it was only two women of my color and one of your color. And the rest of them were all white.

So, when I get out of the car, they told me where I can park because one was pulling out. So, I parked there. And then I went up to them and I said, I understand you fellows is having problems here with the citizens of Detroit. And they wanted to know what I was speaking about. I said, well, first of all, I want to see Lieutenant Shaw. They told me he was in the building.

So, I said, I will talk to you if you are out here when I come back. So, I go inside the building. I asked a gentleman that was coming down the steps about where Lieutenant Shaw was. So, in the meantime, he was coming out of his office. And I introduced myself to him and told him that I wanted to, you know, wanted to talk about what we spoke about. So, in the interim, to make all this short, $I$ did tell him about different comments that was made about the police department, the state police there.

And he did make it clear to me that he would be glad to come on the program and explain because that's really what I wanted him to do because I couldn't bring all what we talked about to the audience, you know. So, he did give me his card. And he promised me that he would be on the air. And he was. He was on the air this morning. So, the people, they were just -they called in. It was flooded for call in. They were very nice about it.

But one thing I want to let us know here, the state police have a job to do just like you have a job to do. I was very dubious about how their attitude was towards us because I never been stopped by a state police. But what comments was said by not only the mayor but also Jones and Winfrey. So, I wanted to get that straight in my mind. And they did state that one of the police did make that reference about riffraff.

But what he meant as we all know because we all been out there on Belle Isle, we know how they are in that little circle there. You can't hardly go through there because the music is playing loud, and you do smell the weed. But of course I don't go through there, but I have seen it and heard about it. But anyway, as I stated, we do know that area. And I would call the riffraff myself, you know, hoodlums.

So, anyway, that is some of the things that's going to be corrected because I did see in the paper the other day, four fellows was in a car. They stopped the car. Guess what? Weed came out. Two didn't have no driver's license, and one had a warrant. So, they are doing out there, the same job that you guys are doing here in the city. They are stopping them. And you can't blame them because look what they confiscated in that short of time.

So, we are not blaming the police for doing their job. So, let us understand and I want the public to understand and I am not on they side or anything. I'm being very plain about what $I$ learned in that one time visit coming out there. They got a job to do as far as keeping Belle Isle clean and keeping out the riffraff as we want to -- you know, going to say. So, I just want you guys to know, watch yourself and do the 20 miles. There's nothing wrong with just cruising along. I don't see nothing wrong with it.

But they are going to raise it up to 25. Some areas is 20 and over on that side was 25. But the area where it was 20 was because people are walking there and they have the bikes. So, therefore, they are going to raise it up they stated to 25 so it will be a comfortable drive for people.

But in the meantime, they are doing their job out there. And I will be -- I will be watching to see if anything going to go wrong. But the fact is, I was satisfied that we are not being harassed as lot of the people say that we are. They must have been doing something because they did state that some cars are doing 60 and 70 coming through there. And, you know, you have seen cars speeding through Belle Isle yourself. So, if they are going to stop it, fine. Do it in a decent way and respect the Detroiters and for Detroiters to respect the police. That's all I say, and you won't have no problem.

Of course, I got respect out of them because I did talk to them. Some came from Gaylord. All of them don't come from Detroit or the surrounding areas. They come from the upper part of Michigan. And they volunteer to come down here and work with us. So, I think that was a good suggestion for them to be here. But we must be careful even on the city streets in driving and then also in Belle Isle so we won't be able to get a ticket for them to stop us.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: I agree with you,
Miss Bernice. I have been going around Belle Isle every day for the past two weeks, and I have had no trouble. I like what I see. I like to see them enforcing the
law. They are not doing -- and they are not targeting anybody because they are stopping everybody and anybody that's not abiding by the law.

And we -- and I hope that we don't set it up where they stop, you know, try to stop them from doing their job. I mean, if you want change, everything has to change, and the way we do it has to change. So, I didn't have a problem with them, and I haven't been stopped. And I'm out there every night. I am going back again today.

MS. SMITH: I don't think people think they are doing a bad job, the majority of it. I don't think if we go out there and find out exactly what they are doing. And then one Detroiter said on the radio that, well, you know, they have -- they are going to have those beer cans and they are going to be drinking out there when the races come. Well, I found out about that. They don't have -- the state police don't have anything to do with it. The contractors that contract this racing, they are the ones that give them the authority and give them the okay to have the beer and whatever they want to, you know, have out there.

That's the contract that they got with the racing people. So, there's nothing we can do about that. But in the meantime, we will be watching them and
seeing what's going on and make sure that people do not, you know, break the law in any way whatsoever. So, Byrd, is that all right with you? You seem like you bored stiff. Am I talking to you all right? Is it okay what I'm saying, you ain't bored?

COMMISSIONER BYRD: I'm good.
MS. SMITH: I appreciate that. That's my report for the day. And I just want you guys to be careful, that's all, wherever you go in this city because we are being watched constantly, that's for certain. And I know my sergeant, my chief here is going to do a good job wherever he goes. I don't have to worry about him.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Bernice, Mr. Brown say your two minutes are up.

MS. SMITH: Thank you very much.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Are there any other
comments? If not, move to adjourn?
COMMISSIONER BURTON: So moved.
COMMISSIONER MOORE: Second.
CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Meeting adjourned.
