19	SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Madam
20	Chair. Sitting in for our Chief Investigator is
21	Supervising Investigator Abdullah Nelson seated
22	in front. Also we have our new attorney to the
23	Board Ms. Linda Bernard seated in front.
24	Sgt. Alan Quinn is taking a recording



and Mr. Dale Rose from Hanson Court Reporting

1	Service is recording the transcript. That
2	completes the introductions.
3	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you,
4	Mr. Secretary. At this time I'd like to
5	introduce Deputy Chief Renee Hall.
6	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Hi, good evening
7	everyone. I just wanted to say good evening to
8	everyone. I will be sitting in for Chief Craig
9	today.
10	We are having the Detroit Police
11	Department through the leadership of Chief Craig
12	has organized a fund-raiser. I'm sure that most
13	of you remember some weeks ago when
14	seven-year-old India Williams was gunned down on
15	the east side. She has since been in the
16	hospital recovering and tonight is a fund-raiser
17	at Bonanza Bowling Lanes at 24600 Hoover Avenue
18	and that is where the Chief and the rest of the
19	executives are holding a fund-raiser.
20	We have been very very successful in
21	this effort. We were able to raise a tremendous
22	amount of funds, toys, not only for India but her
23	brother as well, and we were able to provide her
24	family, her mother with a substantial amount of
25	money, so we are very blessed today to be able to

1	do that for her family.
2	Just a couple of announcements from the
3	police department if I can?
4	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.
5	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: On December 18,
6	2014 we will be participating in the Sgt. Santa
7	Program. The Chief will be Chief Kringle. What
8	we've done as a police department as each
9	precinct has identified a family to adopt we will
10	be delivering Christmas toys and presents to the
11	children in those homes, so that's 12 different
12	families and the Chief Kringle's sleigh will
13	leave 1301 Third Avenue at about 11:30 AM and we
14	will be distributing toys throughout the city.
15	We recognize that our responsibilities
16	are to enforce the laws, but we are we have a
17	human factor and we take that very seriously. We
18	have a great partnership with our community and
19	we let them know that we care so those that's
20	just one of the things we're doing as we're
21	reaching out during this holiday season.
22	Just to acknowledge some of the police
23	officers that and command staff that are in
24	the audience today. We have Commander Wilson
25	who's Patrol-West. We have Commander Mahone who



1	is Patrol-East. We have Captain Roshane who will
2	be presenting from the 2nd Precinct today.
3	We have Captain Tosky from the 3rd
4	Precinct, we have Captain Chambers from the 4th
5	Precinct, Captain Bleitz from the 5th Precinct,
6	Captain Walton from the 6th Precinct, Captain
7	Pridgett from the 8th Precinct.
8	I also want to acknowledge Captain
9	Roshane's staff in the back, his NPOs. He will
10	introduce them when he comes up to present today,
11	but I just wanted to thank you for presenting
12	this Board meeting today and organizing it with
13	food and all those things and gracing us in this
14	wonderful place with ballroom classes at 5
15	o'clock right before we got ready for the Board
16	meeting, so that ends the Chief's report.
17	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Deputy
18	Chief Hall. At this time I just want to extend a
19	warm thank you to the Butzel Recreational Complex
20	for their hospitality in housing us today or
21	hosting us today and at this time, Board, you
22	have before you the agenda. What is your
23	pleasure?
24	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So moved.
25	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Second.



1	COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved
2	and seconded that we adopt the agenda for today.
3	Ready for the question? All in favor?
4	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
5	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Opposed? The
6	ayes have it. Board, you have before you the
7	approval of the minutes for Thursday, December 4
8	2014. What is your pleasure?
9	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So moved.
10	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Second.
11	COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved
12	and seconded. Ready for the question? All in
13	favor?
14	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
15	COMMISSIONER CARTER: All opposed? At
16	this time, we are going to have the Board of
17	Police Commissioners officers report. We're
18	actually waiting for the Chair to come, Willie
19	Bell. He's en route, so I do not have anything
20	to report.
21	Mr. Adams, if you would come forward,
22	can you do a prayer for us, please.
23	(INVOCATION WAS GIVEN.)
24	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you,
25	Mr. Adams. Is Pastor Warfield here, Jerome



1	Warfield?
2	Okay. We'll move right along for the
3	presentation by the Detroit Police Department at
4	this time.
5	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: We'll call up
6	Captain Roshane from the 2nd Precinct. Also want
7	to acknowledge Commander Dushane Sims who just
8	walked in and also Commander Bettison.
9	CAPT. ROCHANE: Good evening, everyone,
10	Board and the Chief of Police, in his absence
11	Deputy Chief Hall.
12	The 2nd Precinct encompasses
13	approximately five square miles, which is
14	northern boundary is McNichols, Livernois, Warren
15	and Greenfield.
16	Our closest bordering city is Dearborn.
17	I'm going to we have made several our crime
18	is decreasing consistently in the 2nd Precinct.
19	One of the reasons that it's decreasing is not
20	just because of the number of arrests that we
21	make, but the way that we educate our citizens
22	and the way that we have collaborated with the
23	community as well.
24	One of the things that's written on
25	this piece of paper is that we have increased the



1	number of traffic stops. Well, just because we
2	increase the number of traffic stops does not
3	mean we're increasing the number of tickets.
4	One of the things that I encourage when
5	we make the number of traffic stops that we make
6	is that we educate.
7	We talk about things like seatbelts.
8	We don't have to give a ticket every time someone
9	does not have a seatbelt on. Every time someone
10	is speeding because they're in a rush somewhere
11	we don't write the ticket every single time.
12	I try to encourage the officers to
13	write tickets for egregious incidents rather than
14	just because someone is speeding or slowed
15	through a traffic stop.
16	I'd rather for our citizens to be
17	educated as opposed to issuing an enormous amount
18	of citations. One of the things we've done in
19	our precinct is we have increased the number of
20	community participants in our community relations
21	as it relates to our citizens, not just the
22	number of police officers, but the number of
23	citizens.
24	Another thing that I've done in our



precinct is I've combined our NPOs with our

Special Operations. They communicate on a
regular basis. So the information that we
receive that some would suspect as being minor I
consider to be major.
One example is I got a phone call about
it was probably about 3 o'clock in the morning
about a group of people gathering on the corner
in a couple of vehicles and they were
communicating with one another.
Well, a citizen called me. To me to
some that might be seen like it was minor, but to
that citizen it was considered major. So I got a
car to go out there and talk to them. What it
ended up being is some guys trying to communicate
with some girls. That's what it amounted to.
But because that citizen called and we
got a response it wasn't a homicide, it wasn't a
robbery, it was something as simple as cars
gathering on the corner.
I encourage those type of
communications with our police department. We
are going to respond very quickly to a homicide.
We're going to respond very quickly to robberies,
but I think it's just as important to respond as



fast as we can to things that are considered

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minor, so that's one of the things we've done
that's a little bit I call it thinking outside
the box as opposed to trying to deal with the top
down. We deal with it from the major crimes, but
we also deal we take the minor crimes or the
suspected crimes just as serious as we do some of
the major crimes, and it's making a significant
impact that will absolutely be seen throughout
our community over the next year.

Something else that I've done -- I shouldn't say I've done, but something else that we've done inside the precinct is that we're going to call our precinct next year the urban-suburban precinct. What do you mean?

It's going to be clean, it's going to be community -- you know, the community can come in and assist us. Rather than paying a police officer to sit behind a desk and answer a phone to take a complaint, we're getting the citizens involved and they come and will answer the phones for us in the daytime. I'm talking about like the -- what do they call -- the candy stripers. Well, we've instituted that in our precinct where citizens come in, they sit behind the desk throughout the day and as we get those



1	complaints, the trash complaints, the dumping
2	complaints, the parking complaints, they're there
3	and they're able to take those phone calls and
4	our NPOs respond to it.
5	So that's pretty much the overall view
6	of our precinct and kind of the update of what
7	we're doing since I've been there.
8	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Any questions
9	from the Board? Did you introduce your NPOs?
10	CAPT. ROSHANE: I'm sorry. I'd like to
11	introduce my NPOs. Heading up my NPOs is Sgt.
12	Vanessa Wyatt. NPO Colette Burke, Officer
13	Yolanda Sharp and I think I don't see Officer
14	Mengus, he's running in out making sure you guys
15	have a delicious meal.
16	So that's my solid team. I also have
17	here from the officer in charge of Platoon 3 Lt.
18	Dennis Johnson.
19	COMMISSIONER MOORE: If someone wants
20	to get in contact with you or the NPOs, do you
21	have a phone number for them?
22	(COMMISSIONER BELL ARRIVES.)
23	CAPT. ROSHANE: The NPO's number,
24	direct line is 313-600-5756.



CAPT. ROCHANE: The inside office, what

1	is that number?
2	NPO OFFICER: 313-596-5272.
3	CAPT. ROSHANE: That's the main number.
4	When you call that number, you'll be able to get
5	the additional numbers from our neighborhood
6	police officers.
7	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. Are
8	there any other additional questions? Great
9	report, thank you, captain.
10	At this time I'D like to acknowledge
11	the presence of the Chair, Willie Bell and I'm
12	going to turn it over to him.
13	COMMISSIONER BELL: Good evening. I
14	apologize for being late, but I had to conduct
15	business on behalf of the Board with Rev. Anthony
16	at the NAACP. As you well know, it's difficult
17	to say no to the pastor, so that's why I'm late,
18	but it was a good format, so.
19	Excuse me just one second. Committee
20	reports?
21	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair,
22	I don't have a committee report, but I would like
23	to say welcome to the citizens of the 2nd
24	Precinct and to District 7 as a whole and also to
25	acknowledge Ladon Davis from City Councilman Gabe



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1	Leland's office. So if anyone has any questions
2	on that end, and in the rear of the room from the
3	Mayor's office is Marshall Bullock from the
4	Mayor's office. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
5	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir.
6	Do I see Commissioner Vann to my left?
7	COMMISSIONER VANN: Yes, sir.
8	COMMISSIONER BELL: Good to see you,
9	sir?
10	COMMISSIONER VANN: Yes, sir.
11	COMMISSIONER BELL: We've worked
12	together years ago over at the Office of Chief
13	Investigator, but I was sitting on that side.
14	Welcome back.
15	COMMISSIONER VANN: Thank you, sir.
16	COMMISSIONER BELL: Looking forward to
17	your input.
18	COMMISSIONER VANN: Thank you very
19	much.
20	COMMISSIONER BELL: I'm sorry, we're
21	under new business and we have a resolution we
22	have two and I assume that we have a Commissioner
23	that's been designated to present the resolution?
24	Commissioner Moore, would you come forward,
25	please?



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1	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes, sir.
2	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.
3	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Good evening. Is
4	police officer Leonard Barszcz available? I'll
5	read the last part so we can enter it into the
6	record.
7	"NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED,
8	that the Detroit Board of Police
9	Commissioners speaking for the citizens
10	of Detroit and the Detroit Police
11	Department award this resolution in
12	recognition of Police Officer Leonard
13	J. Barszcz' 26 years of dedication and

2	We also have a Spirit of Detroit Award

6	exceptional achievement, outstanding leadership
7	and dedication to improving the quality of life,
8	by the City Council of Detroit, Michigan and it's

10	If you could present that to her, thank

12	(APPLAUSE.)
13	COMMISSIONER BELL: Any old business,
14	Commissioners? I'm sorry, we're going to pause
15	for one second. The Chair will entertain a
16	motion to receive both resolutions.
17	COMMISSIONER MOORE: So moved.
18	COMMISSIONER BURTON: Support.
19	COMMISSIONER BELL: Ready for the
20	question? Those in favor?
21	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
22	COMMISSIONER BELL: Those opposed?
23	Motion carries; thank you. Now, any old
24	business?
25	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the



1	Chair, yes, sir. Last week there was a
2	discussion about the what was in the media
3	about the ticket quota issue from the well, it
4	was from the 11 Precinct, and Captain Leach was
5	the individual involved.

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I just want to -- well, first of all I want to acknowledge the teletype that was issued December 10th. Detroit Police Department Traffic Enforcement objectives and Teletype 14-1485 and I want to thank the department for issuing this teletype and it references the fact that -- about the issuing of tickets and there aren't any quotas in short.

Also too I just wanted to say I received a -- for the sake of transparency -- I received an e-mail earlier today and also that e-mail contained I believe it was 14 pages of the -- from the manual, Detroit Police Manual, which was explicit in terms of the process of ticketing citizens in traffic stops and the procedure for that.

The e-mail also expressed that Capt.

Leach would not be here at this meeting which was requested last week. If Capt. Leach is not here, in my opinion that represents a lack of



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transparency on his part and also too a lack of
courage because it was in the media and he spoke
pretty much in the media on all the networks in
terms of this issue or controversy that came
about in terms of ticket quota.

So I am -- well, let's just say it is disappointing that he didn't come before us to explain it because I represent the 3rd District and the 11th Precinct is in the 3rd District, so that's all I wanted to voice my disappointment.

COMMISSIONER BELL: Well, let me chime in on that, somewhat due to my responsibility as chairman and I would take the -- I didn't get a chance to talk to you about that on my arrival late, but I was hoping that the DC, Deputy Chief Hall, would probably respond. It's been cleared up, it was miscommunication. He addressed it in terms of through the chain and the Chief of Police.

So therefore it was not necessary for the captain to respond because as Commissioner White indicated he works for the Chief of Police and there was miscommunication at that level and they clarified it and therefore that was acceptable. I don't know if Deputy Chief Hall

1	wants to elaborate a little bit further, I would
2	appreciate that, in terms of it's not the
3	responsibility of the captain. That was
4	miscommunication in reference to that item and
5	they cleared it up and that's why they even sent
6	out a director of that particular Traffic
7	Enforcement.
8	Deputy Chief Hall, would you want to
9	respond?
10	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Absolutely. I
11	think you basically stated it, and Commissioner
12	White, that there was a miscommunication between
13	the captain and his staff and that was a
14	misprint. The captain did not encourage any
15	quotas to the police department because we don't
16	have quotas.
17	What we do is we recognize when our
18	citizens, when certain areas need a little bit
19	more attention and our officers are encouraged to
20	do more when the citizens require more as I'm
21	sure as a Board we're encouraged to do more for
22	the citizens when they ask.
23	So that was what the memo should have
24	stated and it was a misprint, miscommunications,



and as you said, Commissioner, he spoke to the

direct report and me being the Deputy Chief in charge of the entire bureau and the Chief of	L	news media as well as myself being his direct
charge of the entire bureau and the Chief of Police and we were satisfied with the fact tha	2	report I'm sorry, Commander Mahone being his
Police and we were satisfied with the fact tha	3	direct report and me being the Deputy Chief in
	1	charge of the entire bureau and the Chief of
there was miscommunication.	5	Police and we were satisfied with the fact that
	ō	there was miscommunication.

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We also did get some communication that he was not required to appear before the Board. There is no way that we would disrespect the request of the Board. We do acknowledge you as a full body and an oversight of the Detroit Police Department, we respect you as such, and the direction from the Board was that he did not need to appear. Because if he had, he would definitely be here.

COMMISSIONER BELL: And we will talk afterwards, but I wanted to reassure you that the command office, the Chief, the Deputy Chief, and Commander Mahone was going to speak to it, but the Deputy Chief is his boss is terms of patrol and we want to make sure that there's accountability.

We don't want to put any captain on the spot in terms of further scrutiny by this Board without having their immediate supervisor and the



1	Chief of Police and the Deputy Chief weigh in on
2	it, and they weighed in on it in terms of to my
3	satisfaction there was interaction with the Board
4	Secretary in terms of communication.
5	So on that note and I'm sorry in
6	terms of my late arrival I would have explained
7	that to you, so I want to apologize.
8	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Apology
9	accepted, but through the Chair, on this whole
10	issue there was a miscommunication and today it's
11	a lack of communication because I didn't get that
12	communique other than and like I said, I
13	considered what was in the e-mail kind of
14	offensive to that piece, but if you had
15	communicated with those individuals prior, okay,
16	I understand.
17	COMMISSIONER BELL: I would have
18	communicated to you, but that was my intent even
19	prior to the meeting, but unfortunately it didn't
20	work out this way this evening and I apologize
21	once again.
22	So we can move on if that's the
23	pleasure of the Board. I would like to have
24	Commissioner White, if he has had an opportunity
25	to respond to the Board directed me and a

1	board commissioner be involved with the NAACP
2	initiative last meeting and I took those steps
3	and I asked Commissioner White to report out in
4	reference to that type of interaction of the
5	coalition.
6	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Certainly.
7	Mr. Chair, if we could, before we move off of
8	that issue, I did want to echo some of the
9	sentiments as relates to the administrative
10	message that was put out and commend the
11	department for a very precise and thorough
12	message as relates to this issue of quotas in the
13	Detroit Police Department.
14	Also as a question that I would pose
15	through the Chair to Deputy Chief to the Chief,
16	the ticket policy that was furnished to this
17	body, and I thank Deputy Chief Levalley for
18	furnishing that, but it referenced a revision
19	date of September 9, 2014.

So I would just pose a question in terms of what revisions were made to the policy on September 9th, and also through the Chair, Mr. Chair, I think it also would warrant this body also asking or posing the question which other policies have been changed since we've

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1	moved away from what is charter-mandated policy
2	that policy changes come before the body, but
3	just as a question I would be very interested to
4	have information sharing if you will even though
5	we may not be in a position to weigh in, but to
6	ask the question what other policies have changed
7	without the Board's involvement.

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DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: And I will have that information sent to you as soon as possible. COMMISSIONER WHITE:

Thank you.

COMMISSIONER BELL: And as you well know, I have requested that type of interaction and dialog with the Chief not just at a board meeting, but I think we need to have those type of informal discussions to make sure we all on the same page, and I'm hoping if that's not going to happen during the holiday I'm looking forward to 2015 the month of January that as we move forward in terms of the Chief reporting out on his annual report indicated that the Mayor in reference to the Council, even though we are not charter mandated, we're under Emergency Order 42, he wanted a spirit of cooperation in terms of public safety that we be involved within that process, so I just want to re-emphasize that;



1	thank you. Yes, sir.
2	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
3	Mr. Chair. First and foremost, let me commend
4	our Chair who did an excellent job on not only
5	today on the Mildred Gaddis Show in representing
6	this body as Chairman of the Board of Police
7	Commissioners, but also at the recent press
8	conference held at the Detroit NAACP office where
9	you represented as a member of the coalition in
10	speaking as we talk about the policy changes and
11	other areas where this body as mandated by you,
12	the citizens of this great city, to weigh in on a
13	number of areas have been hampered in doing so
14	vis-a-vis Emergency Order Number 42.
15	And so a number of individuals
16	including the Detroit Board of Police
17	Commissioners, I see Brother Ron Scott here from
18	the Coalition Against Police Brutality, the
19	NAACP, ACLU, Change, Agent Consortium, and I
20	could go on and on, but I won't belabor the
21	point. But there's a wide effort and
22	organizations signing up daily to not only
23	address the issue of the Detroit Board of Police
24	Commissioners being empowered as a charter
25	mandated by your vote, but also to deal with



L	issues that we see from Ferguson to Staten Island
2	to talk about issues of police militarization, to
3	talk about some very concise public policy
1	initiatives that need to be on the radar to talk
5	about education and training.

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And I want to be very clear that this isn't an opportunity for community to be adversarial with our law enforcement agency.

This is the community coming together to work side by side with our law enforcement agency so that Detroit does not see a Ferguson incident or Staten Island incident.

And we believe that the more communication the better. We believe the more transparency the better. So you can expect to hear more from this coalition moving forward.

Mr. Chair, we are inviting the community out this coming Thursday, December 18 as 6 PM at the Detroit NAACP headquarters which is 8220 Second Avenue.

You have all the members of the coalition present and what we will be doing is taking a public record as we formulate a joint statement which will be signed by all members of this coalition and, Mr. Chair, just as of today

1	we received calls from the Mayor's office, the
2	Governor's office, asking when can this meeting
3	happen. So the temperature is rising in a good
4	way, that we are coming together if you will for
5	the good of our community.
6	I understand there's a lot of
7	frustration and people are saying well, what can
8	we do, why haven't the leadership organized or
9	marched. Well, we march to get to a means and I
10	think this is putting on the base, the
11	foundation, in terms of what we've asking of our
12	elected officials, what we are asking of our law
13	enforcement officials to be transparent about, to
14	work with the community on so that we can move
15	forward together.
16	So again, I applaud the leadership of
L 7	our Chair and all those members of the coalition
18	for stepping up on this issue.
19	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the
20	Chair, you said next Thursday, what time?
21	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Yes, sir, 6 p.m.
22	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Okay.
23	COMMISSIONER BELL: Any other questions
24	or concerns in reference to the coalition? And I



really appreciate Commissioner White's

1	involvement as executive director and Pastor
2	Anthony in terms of his leadership. That was one
3	of the reasons why my lateness.
4	I wanted to continue that dialog and it
5	presented itself, so I didn't want to say no, and
6	I attended a Coalition Against Police Brutality
7	at Local 7 with Ron Scott. He gave me the
8	opportunity to speak and that was a great
9	opportunity there in terms of having ongoing
10	dialog in reference to police reform.
11	That afternoon, yesterday afternoon,
12	also attended a forum where ministerial alliance,
13	different groups, even as this morning I had met
14	with four different groups in terms of
15	ministerial alliance in terms of the issues we
16	face in Detroit and all over this country.
17	And so we didn't get beyond lip
18	service. As Commissioner White indicated, we
19	must be engaging and we must be involved with
20	that process in reference to the issues.
21	The issues are glaring and people are
22	concerned, so I'm glad that people from all walks
23	of life are coming together. It will give us the
24	opportunity that this Board, it's extremely
25	important to be engaging, to really represent the



1	community on the cutting edge of police reform.
2	We don't want to revisit the '50s and
3	'60s and the 70s that we fought so hard in terms
4	of gaining effort in terms of equality and equal
5	justice to all, especially people of color,
6	people brown and the whole issue is that
7	people now, not just on the street corners, but
8	people from all walks of life LaBron James in
9	terms of his efforts you see athletes stepping
10	out now which is rather unique because in the
11	past they're been rather quiet because they don't
12	want to offend nobody as far as their
13	sponsorship, but to go back to Jackie Robinson
14	42, we must stand on the legacy of people who
15	have fought for us to get here.
16	That's why we have this freedom now
17	sitting in this room and you see these ranking
18	officers. That did that come by accident.
19	That's because of Coleman C. Young took the
20	initiative to address the Detroit Police
21	Department and we are thankful for that, so
22	that's why we will engage and we need a full
23	charter commission.
24	So that is the task, that is the goal.
25	We are stepping up in 2015 to enlighten people

1	the necessity we shouldn't have to explain it
2	because you in Detroit know why we need a strong
3	chartered Board of Police Commissioners, not a
4	review board. And everybody is on the same page
5	and that is my charge and that is my
6	responsibility. That's why I ran for office,
7	that's why this board looks like it is now in
8	terms of seven and four.
9	So I'm happy with the appointees. We
10	just have to be engaged. Bishop Vann has
11	extensive knowledge in terms of sitting on this
12	board for about four or five years, so I know
13	and we had a Justice Mallett, I think he would
14	bring a whole lot to the table, so we're looking

So we're looking forward 364 days that the Council can vote, but we're going to make sure they understand the people's position on this issue. That is crystal clear, and we're getting that type of support, so that the challenge and I'm looking forward to that. I'm thankful that I have the opportunity.

forward to that mandate of the charter to be --

the countdown starts now Day 1.

So we can move on. Any other old business? Our next meeting announcement would



1	be on January correction on that. Our next
2	community meeting would be on January 8, Wesley
3	Community Center, 10241 West Seven Mile, I think
4	that's on your agenda, right at 6:30. That is
5	our next community meeting in January.
6	Our next Board meeting will next place
7	next week, December 18 at 3 PM at Detroit Public
8	Safety Headquarters, 1301 Third Street at 3
9	o'clock. That's our last meeting of the year, so
10	that gives you the opportunity to come out.
11	Now I'm getting to the point of your
12	time, that's why you here. Unlike the Council,
13	you don't have to make an appointment, you just
14	need to show up, and we have that type of dialog,
15	interaction.
16	You have two minutes. I just ask that
17	you be respectful because we are respectful for
18	you to give you the opportunity.
19	I don't know is Mr. Brown here?
20	Okay, we got it covered though. So we're
21	somewhat liberal, but we want to keep it in the
22	framework of the time allotted, so and I
23	assume that Pastor Warfield is on his way.
24	SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yes.



MS. BROGETTE: Good evening. My name

1	is Theo Brogette, I'm vice-president of
2	Neighborhood Association. I was at the last
3	community meeting that was held at Sacred Heart
4	and I asked the question what is the ethnic
5	breakdown of the three classes that have been
6	graduated now of officers into the Detroit Police
7	Department.

Secondly, before you answer that, it's interesting to me that the statement keeps coming out well, you will only be suspended from your powers for one year. The real question is why were the powers taken in the first place. Nobody seems to want to talk about that.

COMMISSIONER BELL: I can say this, that we know the answer but the public are now pursuing that answer and hopefully they get an answer then we get clarity on that. The coalition raised that question, the minister raised that question, citizen raised that question.

We cannot speak for the Mayor, we cannot speak for the Council, but we was told that Mr. Orr, the emergency manager, has the authority by state law, but nevertheless we will hopefully have more engaging dialog with the



1	Mayor and Council that we went before the
2	Council and they indicated that their hands were
3	tied, but they have the opportunity in one year
4	to address it.
5	And if you look at our newsletter,
6	we're looking at every avenue even come down to
7	legal avenue, we want a legal opinion from the
8	corporation counsel because he represents the
9	charter, he represents the elected officers in
10	the city of Detroit, so we're looking for that
11	response and then we can take it from there.
12	The first part of your question would
13	be perhaps DC Hall can respond to the
14	composition of the last three classes that have
15	graduated. I don't know.
16	I think we failed to get those numbers,
17	but perhaps in the future we will.
18	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Please pardon me, I
19	was not here for the previous Board meeting and I
20	was not aware that that information had been
21	requested, so I will ensure that the Board gets
22	that information at least by tomorrow you should
23	have the breakdown.
24	But I do want to let the community know



the Detroit Police Department is not in the

1	process of hiring colored officers or Caucasian
2	officers. We hire the best qualified candidates
3	for the job. We're looking for a world class
4	police department, we want world class officers
5	and that's how we hire.
6	So I'll get that information for you as
7	quickly as I can.
8	COMMISSIONER BELL: And we can respond
9	perhaps by e-mail as soon as we get it to you if
10	you have your e-mail address and we definitely
11	will report out at the next meeting and I
12	apologize for not doing a follow-up on that. I
13	recall that question.
14	MS. BROGETTE: I appreciate that.
15	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the
16	chair, Ms. Brogette, you referenced something
17	about power. Those who take power take power
18	because they want power. The only way to get
19	power back is to take power back.
20	So as long as we're in you know, the
21	Detroit Police Department has a they're on a
22	mission and they have the statement that says
23	they want to restore order. Well, we want to
24	restore power to the commission, and while I'm



sitting here I guarantee you one day -- and I'm

1	not talking about waiting a year for somebody to
2	vote it back. You know, I received votes from
3	the citizens within my district, that's why I'm
4	sitting here.
5	MS. BROGETTE: And I'm supportive of
6	the Police Commission.
7	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: No power, no
8	peace.
9	MS. BROGETTE: Does anybody know if
10	there are any black police officers on the
11	Livonia Police Department?
12	COMMISSIONER BELL: I have no idea,
13	ma'am.
14	MS. BROGETTE: Okay. Last question,
15	who are the appointees on the Police Commission
16	besides Conrad Mallett and Edgar Vann?
17	COMMISSIONER BELL: Commissioner
18	Taylor, Commissioner Vann, Commissioner White and
19	Conrad Mallett are the newly appointed two just
20	recently and the two you're familiar with,
21	Commissioner White and Taylor, their term does
22	not expire until next year, June of next year.
23	But basically we happy to receive the
24	two that we have, but basically we all in accord
25	that we're all charter mandated and we're



1	obligated to the Charter.
2	Whether you're elected or appointed,
3	we're all on the should be on the same page.
4	We got a mandate because we raised our right
5	hands and take that charter, so that's as simple
6	as that. Thank you and we will do a follow-up
7	with you.
8	MS. BORGETTE: All right.
9	COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, ma'am.
10	MS. WELLS: Good evening. My name is
11	Tonya Wells. On December 10, 2 days ago, at 3:30
12	PM I was in a policing situation in the city of
13	Detroit. I had a drunk patron in the back seat
14	of my car I'm a cab driver.
15	He began to be belligerent and
16	disorderly and he was calling me epithet names.
17	I wanted him out of my car.
18	I drove from West Grand Boulevard and
19	Woodward to Linwood and Joy Road and in the
20	process I called the 10th Precinct to let them
21	know that I was on my way with a policing
22	scenario.
23	I was stopped by two white male
24	officers in a marked car. White Male Officer



Number 1 who was the driver brandished his

1	weapon, he put his hand on his gun, he took his
2	gun out of the holster, he pointed it down, he
3	walked up to my window and pointed this gun at
4	me. He pointed his gun at me.
5	He said, "Roll your window down." He
6	wasn't as calm as I am right now. "Roll your
7	window down, cut the engine off. Why did you run
8	the red light?"
9	I was made to say that I ran a red
10	light. I was pointed at with a gun. It's hard
11	being black, beautiful and intelligent in this
12	country right now, but I won't have it. I want
13	this officer suspended, looked at. The whole
14	situation was wrong.
15	COMMISSIONER BELL: Ms. Wells, can I
16	pause at this particular time? Do you care to
17	formulate a citizen complaint because
18	MS. WELL: Oh, I'm sorry. I didn't get
19	to that part. I did do that.
20	COMMISSIONER BELL: You initiated it
21	already?
22	MS. WELLS: Yes, I did.
23	COMMISSIONER BELL: So we don't need to
24	talk to you at this time. You have formulated



the complaint. The Chief Investigator will look

1	into it and initiate the process.
2	MS. WELL: The problem with that, sir,
3	is that the Office of the Chief Investigator
4	called me today and the particulars of what I'm
5	concerned with were not discussed.
6	I'm here to tell you that, again, a
7	white male officer pointed his gun at me. That
8	is unacceptable.
9	COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, ma'am.
10	MS. WELLS: You can only use deadly
11	force when there is a felony in process. There
12	was no felony in process. I was not a danger to
13	the community. In fact, I had a man in the back
14	seat of my car that was not addressed for almost
15	about 20 minutes.
16	COMMISSIONER BELL: Ms. Wells, can I
17	just interject this? If you filed a complaint,
18	the Chief Investigator will assign an
19	investigator to your case. If you want to talk
20	to Supervising Investigator Nelson at the end of
21	this meeting you can initiate that, but that is
22	the process.
23	I think you are familiar with that.
24	Give us the opportunity to respond and we hear
25	you loud and clear. Thank you.



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1	MS. WELLS: I was just saying that
2	COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, ma'am, we
3	understand.
4	MS. WELLS: We got our own Fergusons
5	here in the city of Detroit.
6	COMMISSIONER BELL: We understand,
7	thank you for bringing this to our attention.
8	Yes, sir.
9	MR. WOODS: Good evening, everyone.
10	Thank you for your time. I just more so have a
11	comment. Oh, my name is Jerome Woods and I'll
12	try to keep it under two minutes.
13	COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir, thank
14	you, we appreciate it.
15	MR. WOODS: Actually I was born and
16	raised in St. Louis, Missouri. I've been in
17	Detroit for a little over four years now and my
18	mom, she actually stays in Ferguson, she stays
19	right down the street from where Mike Brown was
20	murdered.
21	My comment is that, you know, I try to
22	treat everybody the same. I know citizens are
23	people, I know police officers are people and I
24	just try to treat people the same. But when I
25	see the Mike Brown incident or the other incident



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1	and like they weren't indicted, especially in the
2	Eric Gardner case where they weren't supposed to
3	use the choke hold, but he used it and they still
4	didn't indict him and it was clear that they
5	couldn't use a choke hold, but he did it anyway.
6	So I guess my comment is I just wanted
7	to come and say something and stand up and just
8	to say I'm not going to stand for it and I think
9	that it's like they're saying that the police
10	officers can pretty much do what they want to
11	people. You can kill a person if you need to
12	you know, if you want to and you won't be held
13	accountable for it.
14	So like I say, I try to treat everybody
15	the same, try to treat people good, police
16	officers, citizens, whatever, but that's pretty
17	much it.
18	I just wanted to say something and
19	stand up against these killings that the police
20	officers are just being told they can do it.
21	COMMISSIONER BELL: We have to say
22	thank you, your time is up and we appreciate your
23	remarks and your opinion and stand strong and
24	hopefully we are in the process, not just
25	locally, but it's a national effort to address



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1	these concerns. So thank you, sir.
2	MR. WOODS: Okay.
3	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Excuse me.
4	Through the Chair, Mr. Woods, I understand what
5	you're saying and I concur, agree with you. I
6	also want to say that there is this talk of
7	more training, police officers need more
8	training, sensitivity training, all this talk of
9	Tasers this, there's talk of body cams, you know.
10	What we need is some indictments. We
11	need some indictments, we need some prosecution,
12	we need some people to be tried by a jury and we
13	need some people to go to prison, it's just that
14	simple.
15	I'm an advocate of body cameras, I
16	think every police officer ought to have on a
17	body cam, but what good is it when what occurred
18	in New York Eric Gardner when everybody for the
19	world to see, that was on video and you still
20	didn't get an indictment.
21	So thank you.
22	MR. WOODS: Thank you, Mr. Crawford.
23	COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, ma'am.
24	MS. HARDING: Good evening. My name is
25	Barh Harding and my area is Grand Piver -



1	Greenfield and I want to say this because I
2	really don't understand it.
3	The gentleman spoke about the subject
4	community people helping them in the precinct and
5	blah, blah. My thing is this.
6	Back 20 some years there was a mini
7	station right here on Grand River and Grand River
8	there and Foyer. I was one of the community
9	people that volunteered and helped the police
10	officers back then.
11	And I'm wondering what's the deal with
12	this. You was going to open up some of those
13	mini stations that was back then which we still
14	have the building, the community, and one of the
15	reasons we fought to get that building is we
16	thought at some point it would go back and the
17	police would come back in the community.
18	And the citizens did help, but it was
19	Mini 2 which I didn't understand that because
20	I've been to the 6th Precinct, but it was people
21	from the 6th Precinct, the 2nd Precinct, 8th
22	Precinct. We're all transported back and forth
23	and volunteered to help the City and the police.
24	Now, what's the deal with this? We



couldn't even get anybody to help us rehab the

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1	building. We were up there and they were good,
2	so that's enough to that. That needs to be
3	addressed because they pretend they was going to
4	open up some of them mini stations. Which ones
5	was it, they friends or somebody they knew?
6	COMMISSIONER BELL: Ma'am, could I say
7	this?
8	MS. HARDING: That's what I want to
9	know.
10	COMMISSIONER BELL: I'm going to ask
11	MS. HARDING: We worked for nothing, we
12	didn't mind doing it again.
13	COMMISSIONER BELL: Ma'am, I'm going to
14	get Deputy Chief Hall to explain the neighborhood
15	police officer. I worked at a mini station and
16	but the program we have now is much more
17	effective than the program we had in mini
18	stations and I know that personally as a police
19	officer supervisor.
20	What we have now is like it's a
21	giant leap. The mini station was not that
22	effective. In most cases it was closed, but I'm
23	not going to elaborate any further because I
24	understand what you're saying.
25	I'll have the Deputy Chief to explain



1	the concept of what they have in place now.
2	Would you give her the opportunity?
3	MS. HARDING: Yeah, sure. I want to
4	know what was not effective about it because I
5	was up there.
6	COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay, but I'm just
7	going to pause, I'm not going to get into it but
8	let Deputy Chief Hall explain it.
9	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Good evening,
10	ma'am. The first thing that I want to say is
11	about the neighborhood police officers. Each
12	precinct has a group of neighborhood police
13	officers that are responsible for a specific
L 4	area.
15	That officer has an intimate knowledge
16	of exactly the quality of life issues, crime or
17	whatever that's taking place in those areas. So
18	you actually have an officer committed to a
19	certain area of your neighborhood and that has
20	proven to be much more effective because these
21	individuals are coupled with the Mayor's
22	neighborhood organization as well, so we're able
23	to identify issues in a respective area, work
24	with the Mayor's office to get whether it's



lighting, whether it's debris, graffiti, whatever

1	it is and get those issues rectified very
2	quickly.
3	As we go back to mini stations I just
4	want to caution everybody, we had mini stations
5	when we had 4,000 police officers and we had
6	officers that we could deploy for patrol and that
7	we could do investigations and we could also do
8	mini stations.
9	Our current manpower is only that of
10	about 2,300, so what we're doing is we're doing
11	everything that we were doing with 4,000 police
12	officers with 2,300. So what we've tried to do
13	is to make our services more effective.
14	And as the Commissioner said, what we
15	found when we did an assessment, we did an
16	analysis, we found that most citizens rarely ever
17	used the mini stations. When we talk about how
18	many reports that actually came into the area
19	MS. HARDING: That's not true.
20	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Now, maybe your
21	respective area had more than the next, but when
22	we look at it as a whole, people were still
23	coming to the precinct and we needed those
24	officers to be deployed for patrol.
25	So that's why we went to a neighborhood



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1	police officer scenario or that's what we decided
2	to do. The Chief came up with that idea. Of
3	course, he had the experience from several
4	different agencies and it's very effective, so
5	we're going to continue with what we have.
6	We can do an assessment of your area to
7	see if there is a way that maybe we can have a
8	work station from some location, but what has to
9	happen is there has to be a police officer in
10	there with a citizen. So the problem is our
11	police officers are very limited.
12	MS. HARDING: I know.
13	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: So that's why we
14	are where we are today, and we're just asking
15	that you give our neighborhood police officers an

are where we are today, and we're just asking that you give our neighborhood police officers an opportunity. They've been doing a wonderful job. Most people who've come in contact with them and all the successes they've had in the respective areas, they're saying they're doing a great job and we're seeing the successes.

MS. HARDING: I'll agree, they are doing a great job, but the police officers would leave out of there, we manned the mini nation, we took complaints, we wrote down whatever needed to be -- they left there and went on patrol and



1	whatever they was doing. We kept it open.
2	COMMISSIONER BELL: Ma'am, could we
3	MS. HARDING: I'm fine with that. I
4	just wanted to bring that up.
5	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, we
6	appreciate that. You heard the Deputy Chief,
7	she's going to think about it; thank you.
8	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the
9	Chair, I have a question for the Deputy Chief.
10	So the mini stations were closed down because
11	they weren't effective according to your study or
12	was it because you didn't have enough officers?
13	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Well, they were
14	we had to eliminate them because of the manpower
15	issues, but then when we did an assessment to see
16	are we eliminating something that we truly
17	needed, we realized that most of them weren't
18	being used in the way that we thought they were
19	going to be used.
20	So we came up with the more innovative
21	way to do our neighborhood policing.
22	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the
23	Chair, historical fact here with the mini
24	stations because when I came on the job we worked
25	in and out of mini stations or just drop by even



1	if you're on patrol, the mini stations.
2	Deputy Chief Hall is absolutely
3	correct. She used a number of 4,000. It was
4	5,600 officers at its peak who were on the
5	Detroit Police Department, 5,600. So therefore
6	you had the officers to man those mini stations.
7	But I want to say this. There was the
8	Honorable Coleman A. Young who was the Mayor and
9	Chief Hart that implemented those mini stations
10	and we had people come in from around the world
11	to look at that model of the mini stations in the
12	city of Detroit.
13	And then as they closed the mini
14	stations, began to close them years ago, the
15	community or people who lived around those mini
16	stations and used those mini stations, that was
17	one of the hardest issues is when you close a
18	mini station because everybody even if they
19	weren't using it, they were just used to it just
20	being there.
21	But I do understand what you're talking
22	about. I understand the feeling of a mini
23	station because I utilized them too when we
24	worked patrol and it was over in the 7th
25	Precinct.



1	COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, ma'am.
2	MS. McCANT: Good afternoon, Board.
3	My name is Yolanda McCant and I'm a community
4	person in the 11th and the 7th Precinct. I have
5	a couple of concerns.
6	One is my station which is the 7th and
7	11th does not have a permanent person any more
8	for maintenance. Now, I don't know about none of
9	the other districts or precincts that we went
10	back to. It is almost essential that we have a
11	maintenance person on a daily basis, not every
12	other day or every day just to come in and empty
13	the trash. We need the floor mopped, we need
L 4	some work did.
15	I don't know I understand that the
16	person that was I guess the officer or whoever
L 7	was assigned to that is now back out on patrol,
18	but whoever hired this company to come in, to me
19	they're not doing a good job in my house.
20	And I say my house, that's the 7th and
21	11th Precinct because we're both in the same
22	building, okay. And with the amount of traffic
23	from the officers, the citizens that come in and
24	out, I do have some concerns with that.



Now, the community do come in, we

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1	sweep, we mop, we help paint, we do all of that.
2	But some of that we need some help on the City's
3	side of it.
4	The other thing is, I'm also a member
5	of the DPAA, the Police Citizen Academy. At one
6	point we asked that we would come in and do desk
7	work. It was told to us at that time that it was
8	a union issue. I understand union issues, but
9	then they went and hired some people to come in
10	and do the same job that we were trained to do.
11	So I don't have anything to do with
12	that, but I'm just saying you train us as
13	citizens to do certain things and then you like
14	slap us in the face or you take it away from us.
15	COMMISSIONER BELL: Can we pause and
16	allow the Deputy Chief Hall to respond to your
17	concern?
18	MS. McCANT: Yes, sir.
19	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Yes, ma'am. We do
20	have the union issues as it relates to our desk
21	operations, but as Comm. Bettison and myself
22	attended the DPAA Christmas party yesterday and
23	we informed you that we have identified several
24	jobs that we want you guys to fill because you



are the ones who's been to our communications,

1	you see how the runs come in, you've actually
2	participated in the ride-alongs, so you know the
3	actual day-to-day workings of the police
4	department and we have identified different areas
5	where we need you and your assistance.
6	So in the very near future we will be
7	reaching out to you for your assistance and to
8	assist the police department.
9	But the desk operations, it's
10	definitely a union issue and the individuals that
11	are hired are actually still part of a union.
12	MS. McCANT: What about maintenance?
13	COMMISSIONER BELL: And second part of
14	the question on maintenance?
15	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: The maintenance
16	issue, that is a City of Detroit company that's
17	contracted in and I do hear you as it relates to
18	the cleanliness of the building.
19	We will ensure that that company is
20	held accountable for the cleanliness of those
21	buildings because that is what they're contracted
22	to do, so we'll definitely make sure that we're
23	following up with them to ensure the cleanliness
24	of the building.



But I also encourage you if you guys

1	want to volunteer to help us clean that building,
2	I'll be you do it on a Saturday because I
3	can't say I have any other time, but I will come
4	out with you to the 11th Precinct, 9th Precinct,
5	4th Precinct, anywhere, and clean up.
6	MS. McCANT: Okay.
7	COMMISSIONER BELL: Commissioner
8	Crawford?
9	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the
10	Chair, Ms. McCant, you reside in my district and
11	after the meeting I'd like to talk to you about
12	the lack of cleanliness for the 11th Precinct.
13	MS. McCANT: Okay.
14	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, ma'am.
15	Yes, sir?
16	MR. ANDRAESON: Good evening, Police
17	Commission. My name is Gus Andraeson, I'm a
18	community safety coordinator in the southwest
19	area of Detroit. I just wanted to report on some
20	things a couple of citizens have reported to me
21	that is very difficult for them to report crimes.
22	The $9-1-1$ number is obviously used for
23	crimes in progress or crimes of a violent nature.
24	These are crimes that are, you know, thefts,
25	break-ins of a car. A store owner, for example,



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had a couple of guys walk into his store, grab a	
case of beer, run out without paying, get in a	
car and go.	

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He called 9-1-1, 9-1-1 referred him to the other number where you report crimes that have already occurred. After about 15 minutes of being on hold with this number his call was dropped. He called the number back, he was on hold for another 15 minutes because his call was dropped again.

One of the biggest issues we face is the people not being able to report crimes in an easy way. This is a store owner who has to be at work. He doesn't have time to wait on hold for 30 minutes. This could have been an isolated incident, but there's other citizens in the community who have also expressed how hard it is to report crime, the crimes that have already occurred, and I'm afraid that it's becoming so hard that they are going to — they're not going to report crime at all and we're going to see statistics that show that crime is going down when really it's either going up or staying the same.

So I wanted to know from my position is



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1	there anything being done to address this, has
2	this come up in the past, if it has what is being
3	done.
4	COMMISSIONER BELL: I assume that
5	Deputy Chief Hall is ready to respond to your
6	concern.
7	MR. ANDRAESON: Okay, thank you.
8	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: I'm very saddened
9	to hear that you're having those issues. TCRU is
10	our number that reports those crimes that are not
11	in process at this particular time. What I want
12	to do is refer you to Comm. Bettison because what
13	we're going to do is we'll look at our TCRU and
14	Capt. Chambers is the 4th Precinct Captain.
15	I just want you to get with him, let
16	our NPOs know which area that you're having these
17	concerns where you're having issues with
18	reporting crimes.
19	Because the one thing is reporting
20	crime after it happens, another thing is
21	preventing, so if we can find out what areas that
22	you're in, what crimes are taking place and
23	figure out a way to prevent those crimes from
24	happening, then we won't have to report crime,



but we do need to as Detroit Police Department

1	figure out what the issue is as it relates to
2	calling in and being put on hold.
3	So they will address both those issues
4	with you.
5	MR. ANDRAESON: Okay, thank you.
6	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir.
7	Yes, ma'am.
8	MS. SHAROBI: Hi, everyone. My name is
9	Kim Sharobi and I want to go in record saying
10	that I really believe that we need to put less
11	emphasis on policing and more emphasis on safety.
12	Policing is hierarchical and safety has
13	to do with emotional safety as well as physical
14	safely.
15	I know the police officers as well as
16	the residents, that's what we have in common, we
17	all want to be safe and I cannot think of a
18	better way to be safe than to have good
19	relationships, to really build relationships, to
20	be preventative measures and to focus in on that,
21	because policing is quite different.
22	So I really want to leave everybody in
23	the room, not just the Commission, but to really
24	think about the concept of safety.



I know in the past, I know some people

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1	have had issues with peace zones. I've talked to
2	Ron about it, but I think that there's a lot of
3	potential in that and I want you all to consider
4	even the peace zone concept. I think, Mr. White,
5	you said that the coalition or the community was
6	invited to that to talk about that next week?
7	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Yes.
8	MS. SHAROBI: And so but to look at
9	whatever concepts we can because we're not going
10	very far and a lot of people are dying. I don't
11	know, I just want to tell you one real quick
12	story and I think my two minutes will be up, but
13	I was at the event that was held last that Ron
14	had and a parent who was a social worker said
15	that her young son is having nightmares now
16	because he was seeing the Eric Gardner film shown
17	over and over again; he couldn't sleep.
18	And he woke up, I said, "What's wrong?"
19	He said, "I'm going to die." So our kids are
20	they're not just kids, but everybody now is
21	feeling I mean, so many people are feeling
22	unsafe, so I just want to again encourage all of
23	us to think about safety versus policing. It's
24	quite different, it's two different concepts.

COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, ma'am.

1	Yes, ma'am.
2	MS. HINES: My name is Theresa Hines
3	and I have a question. Do the police run the
4	Transit Center?
5	COMMISSIONER BELL: That's your
6	question?
7	MS. HINES: Yes, that's the question.
8	The police department, is that a part of the
9	Transit Center.
10	COMMISSIONER BELL: Deputy Chief Hall
11	probably would respond to that question.
12	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: The Transit Center
13	has their own police department, they are
14	separate from the Detroit Police Department. We
15	work in conjunction with them to provide support
16	if they need it, but they have their own police
17	department.
18	MS. HINES: Okay because I was
19	wondering why the Transit Center looks so bad on
20	a regular basis, and when you go to the Transit
21	Center, the board that they have up to show
22	scheduling for the buses, it never works. Trash
23	is everywhere. The bathrooms are okay, but you
24	know, when you walk in it's like those police
25	officers they just sitting there



1	They just bunched up in the little
2	office, the little information booth and they
3	just sitting there. Is that what part of the
4	protection part is supposed to be?
5	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: I'm sure that is
6	not what their responsibilities are, but I will
7	do, even though that's not up under my purview, I
8	will reach out to their Deputy Chief who is
9	actually a former Detroit Police commander, so
10	I'll reach out to him and address your concerns
11	and hopefully within the next few days or so
12	we'll see some improvement.
13	MS. HINES: Okay, thank you.
14	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Excuse me,
15	through the Chair and I will also call Sid Bogen
16	who is the Chief of the Transit Police, I just
17	want to say
18	MS. HINES: They ride around in they
19	cars and harass the teenagers. One night I was
20	there and a boy was playing with a couple of
21	girls, you know like teenagers do
22	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Ma'am
23	MS. HINES: And they handcuffed him.
24	COMMISSIONER BELL: Could you pause
25	and let the Commissioner speak?



1	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Unfortunately
2	there's been a lot of issues with the Transit
3	Center and it's really despicable because it's
4	named the Rosa Parks Transit Center and in 1954
5	she refused to give up her seat on the bus, so
6	that should be ground zero. Like the Rosa Parks
7	Transit Center, it should be clean, it should be
8	safe and it should be ground zero.
9	It's just like the Detroit Police
10	Department went into the was it Martin Luther
11	King Homes a number of times. I consider that
12	ground zero also.
13	Those are places that just for the
14	namesake, we ought to keep it clean and make sure
15	the people are safe and that people can come
16	there and sit and wait on the next bus or
17	whatever, but I will make a phone call too
18	because that I mean. It's been issues
19	historically down there in terms of how it's kept
20	and also issues pertaining to crime that was
21	going on down there. Yes, ma'am.
22	MS. HINES: Yes.
23	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, ma'am.
24	Yes, ma'am.
25	MS. NORRIS: Once again, I'm Kelly



Norris	here	again	beca	ause	e I	still	_ (	can'	t	get	any
reasona	able a	answers	to	my	bro	other'	s	mur	:de	er.	

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I tried to contact you, Ms. Hall. I haven't received a call back. Mr. Ron Scott has helped our family in regarding the police trying to burn evidence. When my bother was first murdered Mr. Scott found out that the officers were trying to burn his clothing.

He contacted Commander Bettison who instructed the officers not to do that. Right now my brother's clothes cannot be found. That's important because that said my brother tried to shoot the bar owner and also burned the building down.

The evidence inside of the FOIA says that my brother's prints were not on the gun. The witness that shot my brother, his statement was he didn't see my brother with a gun, that he heard some shots and he just was scared when he seen my brother running.

When people are at a bar and they hear shots, they run. My brother and the bar owner never knew each other. After three years I finally got Deputy Chief Levalley to reopen the case. Captain Decker refused to reopen the case



1	numerous of times that I contacted him.
2	Deputy Chief Levalley said that there
3	were too many discrepancies in the case. He had
4	a problem with the shooter saying that when he
5	got finished shooting my brother, he went back in
6	the building and finished counting money. There
7	was no aggressive questioning in these witnesses
8	or the shooter.
9	COMMISSIONER BELL: Ma'am, this is an
L O	ongoing homicide investigation.
11	MS. NORRIS: It's not any more.
12	COMMISSIONER BELL: Well, I think you
13	want to communicate to the Deputy Chief. It's a
L 4	homicide investigation, is that correct?
15	MS. NORRIS: It's closed.
16	COMMISSIONER BELL: Well, you
L 7	communicated with Deputy Chief Levalley and you
18	also talked to Deputy Chief Hall in reference to
19	that. It's something that we cannot engage in if
20	it's an ongoing homicide investigation. No case
21	is really closed until I'll let you expound or
22	that.
23	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Basically you have
24	spoken to Deputy Chief Levalley and it is to my
25	understanding I have not received any call



1	from you, so I apologize, I'm not aware of you
2	actually calling.
3	MS. NORRIS: I can show you my phone
4	where I've called your office, I spoke with your
5	secretary. I applauded you for being a black
6	female Deputy Chief here in the city of Detroit.
7	I seen you on the news and I was very impressed
8	on how you spoke and how you handled yourself in
9	the media. That's why I reached out to you.
10	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: But I have not
11	received a message from you, so I apologize if
12	that's my staff.
13	MS. NORRIS: That's the way the City
14	works. When you call people, they don't get the
15	message.
16	COMMISSIONER BELL: Ma'am, ma'am
17	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: But I do want to
18	let you know that it is to my understanding that
19	Deputy Chief Levalley has basically opened this
20	case and looked at it ad nauseam and that the
21	answers that you have been given are the only
22	answers that are available.
23	We can definitely talk if you leave me
24	we can talk tonight or you're welcome to come
25	by my office.



1	MS. NORRIS: How do you know that
2	Deputy Levalley
3	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Because I've been
4	here at the board meetings when he's spoken about
5	it.
6	MS. NORRIS: I understand. The other
7	thing I wanted to say about the Commission Board
8	is that when I came to you and I brought the case
9	before you, I have the FOIA, I have the flat out
10	police report, that fabrication of evidence and
11	intentional lies that the police officers told
12	and you guys turned me down.
13	COMMISSIONER BELL: Ma'am, can I
14	interrupt you? We're going to have to end the
15	discussion. I explained to you, we do not handle
16	or process ongoing criminality. It's a homicide.
17	We have no authority.
18	The Deputy Chief already responded. If
19	you want to talk with her after, you can
20	entertain that, but we have to cut off the
21	discussion. Thank you.
22	MS. NORRIS: When I made a complaint
23	with you guys, that was it was an ongoing
24	discussion. It was an ongoing investigation when
25	I made a complaint.

1	COMMISSIONER BELL: Why don't you meet
2	with our Supervising Investigator right there and
3	we can talk about it.
4	MS. NORRIS: And that's what I'm trying
5	to tell you. I've met with Investigator McConico
6	for two hours. They refused to reopen the
7	investigation and they wouldn't even let her look
8	at the file. Now, why couldn't she look at the
9	file? The police sabotaged my brother's case.
10	COMMISSIONER BELL: Ma'am, thank you.
11	Yes, sir.
12	MR. YOUNG: Good evening, Board. My
13	name is Daniel Young and I represent the
14	Metropolitan Cab Association. I have a couple of
15	questions.
16	First question I have is why are the
17	cabs, city cabs, getting tickets the way they
18	getting tickets? They're getting not a civil
19	infraction ticket, but misdemeanor tickets which
20	are civil infraction. And my other complaint is
21	why are the police talking to us like we are
22	kids? They're talking to grown men like we are
23	kids.
24	That's the questions I have for you to



address.

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1	COMMISSIONER BELL: Deputy Chief Hall,
2	would you respond, please?
3	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Your first question
4	is why are the
5	MR. YOUNG: In the downtown area why
6	are the cabs getting tickets the way they're
7	getting tickets?
8	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: I'm not well,
9	we've visited this through City Council and cab
10	drivers, we've been instructed not to issue
11	tickets for certain offenses, but cab drivers are
12	not exempt from receiving tickets at all.
13	If you commit a crime, some civil
14	infraction, you will be ticketed. If there are
15	certain is Capt. Petty still here? Capt.
16	Petty, can you come to the podium?
17	Cab drivers for the city of Detroit,
18	there are certain areas where we have not
19	solidified certain areas of your responsibility
20	so those areas, officers are not able to ticket
21	you, but they are able to ticket you in other
22	areas and that's why you're receiving tickets.
23	To talk about how why officers are
24	speaking to you like you're children, I would
25	need to know which officers you're speaking of.



1	It is my understanding, it is my
2	mandate as a Deputy Chief of Police that we
3	respect all citizens so I have no idea who you've
4	come in contact with, but if you can tell me that
5	officer's name I will ensure that that officer
6	never speaks to you in that manner again.
7	MR. YOUNG: An officer down at Atwater,
8	there's a guy called Cranston
9	COMMISSIONER BELL: Why don't we do
10	this.
11	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Let Capt. Petty
12	can Capt. Petty speak.
13	COMMISSIONER BELL: Let the captain
14	respond. If you have a specific complaint
15	against a police officer, you can see our
16	supervisor Nelson over here to my left and he can
17	entertain that after the meeting, okay.
18	So I'll let the captain respond and we
19	have met extensively in reference to this issue
20	with Council and also the Chief had a meeting
21	with the Cab Drivers Association. I don't know
22	if you was involved with that, but Captain, go
23	ahead.
24	CAPT. PETTY: Yeah, through the Chair.



We met with the Mayor's office and we had a

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mandated moratorium to reduce two infractions on
the cabs and that was the trip sheets where they
weren't putting addresses down. They still had
to have a proper trip sheet, but they didn't have
to write the addresses and we relaxed the
standing zones because with all the buildings
coming up, they don't have the proper areas to
handle that.

Now, Cranston works for me, so I'll deal with that sidebar with him and find out what's going on. But we've been working with the cabs and meeting with City Council and I've been meeting with the Chief and the DC almost monthly to try to fix, because what has happened is in the downtown area there hasn't been any enforcement for years, pretty much my whole career.

Now, you have a Traffic Enforcement
Unit, so now it seems like they're being picked
on and they're just every day doing it, so I talk
to my guys every day and I say if they're doing
something wrong, deal with it. They don't have
like a free-for-all to just go through the city,
but those two things and if it's something that
needs discretion, I talk to the association on a



1	regular basis, so it's still a work in progress,
2	but we're working on it.
3	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir.
4	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the
5	Chair, also Capt. Petty I attended some of those
6	with you some of those forums pertaining
7	with the cab drivers. Ron Scott was also there,
8	Coalition Against Police Brutality, and the Chief
9	of course.
10	And there was an administrative message
11	that was issued a few months back, I recall
12	reading it, pertaining to the ticketing and also
13	too there was a discussion at the forums about
14	the cab what is it cab taxi stands
15	downtown, that they were limited and that you
16	were going to move them I guess to different
17	areas as the construction proceeded to take some
18	of these downtown construction proceeded to
19	take up some of these taxi stands.
20	CAPT. PETTY: Correct, and we're doing
21	an assessment now and each event is different, so
22	depending on if it's hockey which it's hockey
23	season, then we're giving them alternative areas
24	where they can park and I've given my guys
25	instructions if they're in a bad spot, ask them



1	to move as opposed to writing them tickets.
2	So I mean I'm still getting a few
3	incidents, but I'll talk to this gentleman out
4	here and I'll square that away.
5	COMMISSIONER BELL: There's been a
6	formal process. I don't know if this young man
7	is involved with that, but hopefully there is an
8	entity that represents you that we've been
9	engaging for quite some time now, so hopefully
10	you'll take advantage of that, but the captain
11	will speak to you afterwards.
12	Thank you, sir, for bringing this to
13	our attention.
14	MS. HINES: My name is Sandra Hines
15	and the statement I would like to make is that
16	Chief Craig indicated on the news this past week
17	that he was going to be issuing Tasers or that
18	there was some concern about whether or not the
19	Detroit Police Department should carry Tasers.
20	I just wanted to make sure that the
21	Commission understands that there is a large
22	majority of people in the community that is not
23	in favor of that particular in other words,
24	for him to procedure, whatever it is, weapons.
25	If another weapon we view this as



1	another weapon. It goes back to what Ms. Kim
2	Sharobi was saying in terms of the difference
3	between policing and the difference between
4	safety. We view that as another weapon that will
5	hurt a lot of people who may be Tased for
6	something that's really not major, but because
7	they trying to get the person in control instead
8	of them using their training that they receive
9	from the academy of how you talk people down and
10	de-escalate and how you treat and like my
11	sister was talking about in the cab driver in
12	terms of being friendly, you know, it's more
13	hostility.
14	It's more hostility towards the
15	community. It's another way to just kill people
16	and to say that you get zapped that you might not
17	die, who's willing to take that chance. Who
18	wants to be electrocuted, even if it ain't
19	nothing but for one second.
20	I saw them when we stopped it when they
21	tried to implement Tasers back in '11, 2011, and
22	we stopped it and we protested and we shot them
23	down. Here they coming back with it again.

I saw the police -- the Commissioner, the Police Commissioner get zapped and fall down



24

1	and moan and scream. I was there when they just
2	said shook and had a seizure, and so we're
3	saying that just we don't want them to think
4	that it's a large number of people out there
5	supporting that we implement Tasers.

We want to see like Kim said and all the other people that came up anything you guys said in terms of the coalition. We want to see that happen as opposed to him implement Tasers. We're going to fight that. I just want you to know, he's up against a major fight if he does that.

COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay, ma'am. It's been duly noted. It's not before this body at this time, but this Commission, this Board has addressed that in the past and I'm pretty sure that we'll have an opportunity in the future if that's going to come about in some form, we will have dialog and discussion on that issue, and thank you for standing your ground in terms of stating how you feel about it.

I'm pretty sure others have too, but it's not before us at this time, but I can't respond to what the Chief has said in public, but we are aware. It's been duly noted, we recorded

1	that.
2	Yes, ma'am.
3	MS. PANNELL: Good evening, Sharon
4	Pannell, 2nd Precinct volunteer and I wear
5	several hats. I'm an AT&T retiree. I'm going to
6	piggyback on that lady's safety. I was over at
7	Enjoy Again on West Eight Mile and Telegraph.
8	We wasn't in there for five minutes
9	before my friend's brand new Chrysler got broke
10	into. We like to patronize all the businesses in
11	Detroit. We want to give back and go around and
12	enjoy our meal and we want to enjoy it in safety.
13	We don't want to be afraid.
14	I had two girls jump up and run because
15	the girl's car got broke into. We shouldn't have
16	to live in fear like that, especially at 2
17	o'clock in the afternoon.
18	COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, ma'am, I
19	understand.
20	MS. PANNELL: I've already addressed
21	the captain. I just wanted to be on record.
22	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.
23	MS. PANNELL: And Deputy Hall said she
24	was going to speak on it.
25	COMMISSIONER BELL: Deputy Chief Hall,



1	you want to speak on it?	
2	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: We talked about it	
3	yesterday, you brought it up to me and we are on	
4	top of it as we speak.	
5	MS. PANNELL: Thank you very much	
6	because we like to patronize not only the black	
7	people in Detroit, we got Detroit period.	
8	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Absolutely.	
9	MS. PANNELL: And we want to be safe	
10	because we're all over 60.	
11	DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Yes, ma'am.	
12	MS. PANNELL: Okay, thank you very much	
13	and merry Christmas.	
14	MR. SCOTT. I can't outdo Mr. Pannell.	
15	Commissioners and Commissioner Vann and new	
16	commissioners, thank you.	
17	I just wanted to say that I believe	
18	that this point in history represents an	
19	opportunity for we as people in this city to come	
20	together and to avoid some of the things that	
21	created this Commission.	
22	Ferguson is where Detroit was in 1967	
23	or 1971 or '72. Ferguson is where you had STRESS	
24	officers shooting individuals from another	
25	department. We come this long road where we	



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1	started in 1996. We've had 10 years of Consent
2	Decree and I might add we have two more years to
3	have oversight to look at that.
4	So I would suggest to the Commission

2.1

So I would suggest to the Commission that since we have two years to evaluate what's going on that we have Barbara McQuade come in and that we ask Eric Holder to instruct her if she won't come in to address how the Police Commission's powers and the trust that people have in it in terms of adjudicating as an administrative law function ascertaining their rights under the Constitution, U.S. Constitution, not only the Charter, how that would compromise the retreat or the removal of the Consent Decree.

She has been silent on it. She has not said a word about it and that relates directly to the civil rights component of the U.S. Justice Department.

As we know, Mr. Holder has spoke very strongly recently and he needs to speak strongly about these kinds of things because this body has been asked by other oversight bodies around the country to give your insight in relationship to the oversight of the military.

Secondly, since we have a



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1	representative of the Mayor's office here, I look
2	forward to ascertaining from the Mayor how is it
3	that as a Mayor you take the oath of office to
4	defend and protect the U.S. Constitution and the
5	13th Amendment in terms of citizenship rights,
6	the 14th amendment in terms of equal protection,
7	all of them fall under this body.
8	So I'm standing here and I would have
9	to say I'm not going to wait a year for this body
10	to have its power. These young people who've
11	stood out in the cold have shown us the way in
12	terms of some things that we may need to do.
13	I don't want to be disrespectful, but I
14	think any time my rights as a citizen, as a
15	voting citizen, have been abrogated by virtue of
16	saying I have to wait a year to have my rights,
17	then I'm willing to throw a left to get my
18	rights.
19	So I'm saying it's a Federal
20	Constitutional issue and I don't we can have
21	the meeting and I appreciate Donnell and what the
22	NAACP is doing and what we're doing and I'm
23	willing to talk when talking is reasonable.
24	But at this point, and you know,



25

Commissioner Bell, and thank you for giving me

1	the deference for a little extra time, you know
2	as well as I do when your office and you know
3	some things behind the scenes that you might not
4	want to say here when the disrespect of this
5	body, the utter disrespect of the citizens who
6	went out and voted for this matter is abrogated,
7	you ask me to wait, I'm going to say like the old
8	civil rights phrase, it's freedom now, I ain't
9	waiting for nothing.
10	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you,
11	Mr. Scott. As you well know, we are not waiting,
12	we are going to exercise every opportunity to
13	pursue this in so many different ways and that's
14	quite clear.
15	I think this Board was committed to
16	that task. I assume there's no other oral
17	communications from the audience.
18	Ma'am?
19	MS. HARDING: I just need to say
20	briefly, I need since the mini station wasn't
21	I'm going back to that.
22	COMMISSIONER BELL: Ma'am, I'm sorry,
23	you cannot go back to that.
24	MS. HARDING: Oh, no, just a minute,



please. I just needed some room so I can share

25

1	see, I'm a community person.
2	COMMISSIONER BELL: Ma'am, could I say
3	this? You're going to meet with the Deputy
4	Chief, yes, after the meeting and
5	MS. HARDING: Okay.
6	COMMISSIONER BELL: And the captain of
7	the precinct and you can address your concerns
8	one-on-one and I'm pretty sure you're going to be
9	satisfied with that type of explanation.
10	MS. HARDING: Okay.
11	COMMISSIONER BELL: And thank you.
12	Once again, I want to apologize for being late.
13	I know the 2nd Precinct had a welcome format and
14	it's good to see all of you here.
15	If this is your first meeting, make
16	sure it's not your last. This Board of
17	Commissioners represents you, the people, and we
18	are duly charged to engage and hear your
19	concerns, address those concerns, so you do not
20	have to wait until a meeting, you can contact
21	this office, whether it be a formal complaint or
22	informal inquiry, either a Commissioner in your
