Meeting is called to order at 3, about 3:04. My name is Commissioner Jessica Taylor and 6 7 I'm going to ask the Secretary if he would call the role, please. 8 9 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Madam Chair. 10 For the record, George Anthony, Secretary to the Board. 9	introduce from the Chief's Office A.C. White and also
10	joining us now is the vice-chair Donnell White.
11	VICE-CHAIRPERSON WHITE: Thank you.
12	CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Mr. Secretary, would you
13	introduce the rest of the staff?
14	SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, ma'am. We
15	have present Mr. Ainsley Cromwell seated in the front.
16	He is representing the Office of the Chief
17	Investigator. He is our Senior Supervising
18	Investigators for the office of the Chief Investigator.
19	We also have Mr. Robert Brown who is our Office
20	Manager, Sergeant Allen Quinn who is recording our
21	proceedings in the back and Miss Mindy Womack from
22	Hanson Court Reporting Service. That completes the
23	introduction, ma'am.
24	CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay. At this time we'd
25	like to have our prayer. I don't so I'm going to

Page 5 1 ask Vice-Chair if he would lead us in a word of prayer. VICE-CHAIRPERSON WHITE: Let us pause. Dear 2 Heavenly Father we graciously ask you to protect those 3 4 who are daring to serve this great city, those who suit up each and every day. We ask that you bless this 5 meeting, put us all on one accord of like mindedness 6 that we may further the agenda serving your people. We 7 ask all these things in the Mighty Name of our Lord and 8 9 Savior we pray, amen. 10 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: At this time I entertain a motion to approve the agenda for Thursday, May the 11 15th, 2014. 12 13 COMMISSIONER BELL: So moved. COMMISSIONER SHELBY: 14 Second. CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: It's been moved and 15 16 supported. Are there any discussion? All in favor? 17 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. 18 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All opposed? Agenda stands approved. 19 20 I entertain a motion to approve the minutes 21 for Thursday May the 8th, 2014? 22 COMMISSIONER BELL: So moved. 23 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Second. CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: It's been moved and 24 25 seconded. Any discussion? All in favor?



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1 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. 2 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All opposed? The minutes stand approved as written. 3 4 At this time we're going to move to our 5 Are there any reports, officers reports? reports. No officers reports. 6 We move to the presentation from the Chief's 7 Office. We have the downtown services. 8 9 COMMANDER HALL: Good afternoon Board and 10 Chair. I am Commander Rennee Hall. I am in charge of the Downtown Services Division. I want to ask you to 11 12 excuse my appearance. We had training today, that's 13 why I am not in full uniform, as the A.C. is not as well. Other than that, I would have been in full 14 15 uniform. But good afternoon. Basically I want to tell you about the 16 Downtown Services Division. The Downtown Services 17 18 Division was created in October of 2014 by the Chief of Police. Currently we fall under the -- I'm sorry you 19 20 guys don't have a picture. If you take a look at the 21 screens, currently this is how we fall under the 22 organizational chart. Under the Assistant Chief of 23 Operations, Enforcement Operations, under the 24 Neighborhood Policing Bureau, which is headed by Deputy 25 Chief Darryl Brown, and there is Downtown Services,

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myself. We fall under the Neighborhood Policing Bureau
 much like all of the other precincts.

As I stated earlier, Downtown Services 3 Division was established in October 2013. The Chief 4 saw the need for downtown which was growing as a 5 residential area as well as businesses and a lot of 6 economic growth and that this too needed to have its 7 own entity, own police services and to bring together 8 9 the visitors, the residents, the key stakeholders and 10 to create a community atmosphere. So Downtown Services Division was created. 11

12 I am in charge of three precincts. The 1st 13 Precinct, special events planning, which is all of our 14 major events, casino operations, the 3rd Precinct, and the 4th Precinct all fall up under the Downtown 15 16 Services Division. 1st Precinct is headed up by 17 Captain Petty, and as you take a look at the screen, he 18 has special events planning as well as gaming. You have 3rd Precinct who is headed by Captain Tosqui and 19 20 4th Precinct which is headed by Captain Chambers.

I know you ask yourselves how do these things link and how do they fall under Downtown Services. The 1st, 3rd and the 4th precinct share all of the critical infrastructure from the Tunnel, the Bridge, the Marathon Oil Plant, as well as our Detroit River.



Additionally we have increasing economic 1 2 growth and population in each one of these areas. The Southwest District, the 4th Precinct is one of the 3 4 fastest growing neighborhood populations in the City of 5 Detroit, as well as the Downtown and Midtown 6 Associations as we look at their productivity, their growth, all of the economic growth that's coming into 7 the city is formulating through these respective 8 9 precincts. They all share grants and programs that 10 stimulate the growth in the city, and under my leadership up under the A.C., and A.C.Y. and the Chief 11 12 of Police, we are expanding those growths to the 13 neighborhoods. Gaming operations is also under the auspices of this. 14

15 What is our mission you ask? It's no 16 different than any other precinct within the City of 17 Detroit. These three precincts are linked to combine 18 community, business and the police working together to 19 solve neighborhood crime and quality of life issues.

There are some programs that are instituted in the downtown area much like the Lighthouse Project. This is a project where all the security directors in the downtown area got together, placed phones and a light in the downtown area to identify safe havens in the event that individuals encounter some kind of

emergency. Well this program, we've expanded the Lighthouse Program to the west side and it's at our gas stations and now we're moving it to McDonald's. So what we're doing is taking those things that work, those community resources and we're branching them out into the City of Detroit so we're all one big, happy neighborhood.

Some of the programs and initiatives that are 8 9 going on throughout all of these three precincts, as I 10 stated before, policing the growing population in the entertainment district. Right now we're experiencing 11 12 three casinos, we have two side-by-side stadiums, and 13 in the near future we will have two separate entertainment districts. The Ilitches will host an 14 15 entertainment district at Woodward and Chrysler Service 16 Drive area that will extend to Mack, and then Mr. 17 Gilbert will also be building an additional entertainment center in the area where the courts are. 18 That 36th District Court, 3rd Circuit Court, as well as 19 20 the county jail is slated to move to the Mound Road 21 area and that area is going to be much like L.A. LIVE. 22 If you're familiar with L.A. LIVE, it's going to be 23 music, restaurants as well as residential living in that particular area. 24

How does the

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How does this affect what we do in law



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enforcement? Secondary employment. Because we are a 1 police department that is diminishing as it relates to 2 numbers, we encourage secondary employment. A lot of 3 these individuals hire off-duty police officers in full 4 5 uniform to police a lot of these activities because our goal is to not take away from anything that the 6 citizens in the City of Detroit need for the 7 entertainment aspect specifically. So they work 8 9 together with us, it generates revenue for the City of 10 Detroit and a safer atmosphere for everybody.

11 Neighborhood police officers, this is 12 duplicated throughout the city. Each precinct has 13 neighborhood police officers, and again, whether it's 14 entertainment, whether it's residential, business, 15 sporting events, we work together to find viable 16 solutions to any issues or concerns that these areas 17 face.

18 These are some of the community groups that exist in both the 1st, in all the 1st, 3rd and 4th 19 20 Precincts. You have the Central Business District, and 21 they all have neighborhood watch programs, the Greek Merchant Association. In the 3rd Precinct, Woodbridge, 22 23 Corktown and Midtown Association, as well as in 4th Precinct the Congress of Community, Urban Neighborhood, 24 25 and Southwest Detroit Business Association. These

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individuals share Hudson-Webber grants. They are
directly responsible for some of the secondary
employment contracts that we have, whether it's the
Bridge. They also have the DTE contract, and the
Corkcork has a secondary beat that works up and down
Michigan Avenue, again, providing police services on a
continuous basis and more safety in our community.

When we look at crime, oftentimes people look 8 at Downtown Services and say, you know, how does that 9 have anything to do with what we do in the city. Well 10 each one of us experiences our own levels of crime, 11 12 although crime is not the same in the 1st Precinct as 13 it is in 9th Precinct, we still have our share of issues, and our goal is to drive that down no matter 14 15 where we are. If you look at the numbers on the board, 16 they fluctuate a little bit since the inception of this 17 particular Powerpointe presentation, but we're 18 experiencing dramatic decreases through the City of Detroit, and that's no different from the 1st, the 3rd, 19 20 and the 4th Precinct.

Also you look at the boundaries of the 1st Precinct, the 1st Precinct's boundaries have changed just a little bit since our, the birth of the 1st Precinct. It opened March 31st, 2014. We go to the north at Mack, to the east at the Chrysler Freeway, to



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Schweitzer Place. We go to the south to the Detroit
 River and north to Mack.

On the 3rd Precinct we go to 14th Michigan 3 4 Avenue for the west, Woodward to Woodland Street near Highland Park, to the east we go to Chrysler, and to 5 the south we go to the river. And the 4th Precinct 6 boundaries are listed as well. We have that entire 7 southwest area, West Outer Drive to the west, to the 8 north we go to Warren, east of 14th Street and south to 9 10 Detroit River.

When you look at these screws, is what we 11 12 call them, police downtown business neighborhood 13 community, our goal is to recognize that the downtown 14 community does have the financial stability, the 15 workability, the plan that is going to stimulate growth 16 in the City of Detroit. These things we're working 17 together to combine, to branch out so these things are reflective on the east side, the west side, the south 18 side, and the north side of the City of Detroit. 19 And I 20 think that we're doing a great job as a police 21 department in bridging those gaps. Any questions? 2.2 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Commissioner's, do you 23 have any questions for Commander Hall? COMMISSIONER SHELBY: With regard to the 24 25 Lighthouse Program, you said they expanded to the west



side. Do you have a list of those locations? 1 That's something I would like to share with my district. 2 COMMANDER HALL: I can get that for you, sir. 3 4 I don't have them ready available for me, but I'll have those available for you. 5 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: You said gas stations? 6 COMMANDER HALL: Yes. We went to one gas 7 station. That was March, the middle of March and we're 8 9 expanding to most of the McDonald's that are throughout 10 the city. COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Thank you. 11 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Commissioner? 12 13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Madam Chair. I have two questions. The first one we talked about 14 early. What is actually considered downtown? 15 16 COMMANDER HALL: Downtown borders is Mack, 17 which is the Cental Business District in essence, Mack 18 to the north, the River to the south, east over to Schweitzer Place, which is right a block over from 19 20 Rivard, and then to the west, which is the Lodge 21 Freeway, and that makes up your downtown area, which is what we consider to be the Central Business District. 22 23 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay. My follow-up question is what determines the manpower employment in 24 25 terms of manpower employment?



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1	COMMANDER HALL: Our manpower is deployed
2	based on, we do an overall assessment of residents,
3	businesses. It's based on everything else around the
4	city how we said if you have X number of residents, I
5	think the 8th Precinct is one of the largest residents,
6	residential areas. They have close to 100,000 people
7	so they have about 129 police officers. Well the
8	downtown area doesn't have 100,000 police officers I
9	mean 100,000 residents, but at any point in time we
10	have more than 200,000 people visiting at any one
11	particular time with about 8000 people living in the
12	Central Business District. So based on that, we came
13	up with an assessment and analysis and deployed the
14	number of officers that we thought was acceptable to
15	that respective area.
16	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.
17	A.C. WHITE: And if I may through the Chair
18	to piggyback what the Commander's offered. Was it
19	January we did that assessment?
20	COMMANDER HALL: Yes, sir.
21	A.C. WHITE: We looked at the footprint that
22	each precinct represented, and we also took a look at
23	the crime and we based the resource needs on to put
24	it in simple terms, if they represented 50% of our
25	crime, they got 50% of the resources. We tried to tie



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1 the responding units to the amount of resources that they needed, the crime, the demographics and issues 2 such as that. That process worked very well and we're 3 4 constantly reevaluating it. 5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the chair, I have a question. How many officers do we have for the 6 downtown area? My community, which is Harbortown, 7 which is pretty close to downtown, I'm curious. 8 9 COMMANDER HALL: Right now we have 70 10 officers that are assigned to the 1st Precinct. Harbortown actually falls in the 7th Precinct, but we 11 12 do a lot of overlapping. We work really closely with 13 the East Jefferson Coalition, we do Community Comp Stats with those individuals, so whenever there's an 14 15 overlap of crime, then we deploy the resources 16 respectfully. 17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you. 18 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Any other questions? COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Under the Chair. 19 20 Commander Hall, on the secondary employment, where is Mr. Ilitch on this today because I do recall years ago 21 22 when Dennis Archer was the mayor, then Chief Benny 23 Napoleon, Mr. Ilitch said he didn't mind paying for the secondary employment out of pocket. And I have a lot 24 25 of history with this that goes back from the very first

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election when Mayor Archer was elected in terms of the secondary employment because I did that for five years when I was in Atlanta for Atlanta PD, and they cover, secondary employment covers all the stadiums, all the downtown events. So where are we today in terms of the mega business owners paying for?

COMMANDER HALL: I'm glad you asked that 7 question. I actually had the fortune of as a 8 9 Lieutenant in the Commanding Officer Tactical 10 Operations working with all of the key stakeholders as it relates to secondary employment when secondary 11 12 employment was first being introduced, and initially 13 coming off in its inception, there was a little pushback and, you know, some resentment in the fact 14 that they needed to pay for additional police. 15 I'm happy to say to date all of our key stakeholders are 16 17 paying for secondary employment.

18 Currently the Ilitches have a contract, not 19 for the current baseball season, but the upcoming 20 stadium that's being built as well as the next season of baseball there on board, and we work really well 21 22 together as well as the Fords, Dan Gilbert, and his 23 crew, Quicken Loans, everybody's on board and we have several entities throughout the downtown area that are 24 25 actively engaged with secondary employment.

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COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: 1 Yes, ma'am, thank 2 you, because that's so important that we get the officers back in the neighborhoods. 3 4 COMMANDER HALL: Absolutely. And they recognize that we as a department can't do it alone. 5 6 And in order to get the resources that are needed, they have to do secondary employment. So everybody's on 7 board and we're working on that each and every day. 8 9 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I'm glad to hear that 10 because it's been years, trust me. I've been on the forefront of that fight. 11 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Commissioner White. 12 13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Commander, for a very informative report. Two things under DSD, 14 does that include Homeland Security and/or Belle Isle? 15 16 COMMANDER HALL: No. Homeland Security is a 17 separate entity. Actually it falls up under the city. 18 Help me A.C. White. A.C. WHITE: It's under the Chief's Homeland 19 20 Security, direct report to the Chief's Office. 21 COMMANDER HALL: And Belle Isle, there is no 22 more detail for the Detroit Police Department as it 23 relates to Belle Isle, it falls up under the state so 24 we no longer police Belle Isle. We do have a great 25 working relationship with MSP.



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1 COMMANDER WHITE: So the physical edifice 2 that we were using on Belle Isle, we no longer use that 3 at all?

4 A.C. WHITE: That's a good question. Through 5 the Chair, we have started a park detail because what 6 we recognize with some of the changes that have taken place at Belle Isle, we've actually seen an uptick with 7 8 the use of some of our other community parks, so we 9 found it necessary to take those officers that we would 10 normally deploy at Belle Isle and put a park unit out 11 to police those other park areas in the community.

12 VICE-CHAIR WHITE: That would include Rouge13 Park.

A.C. WHITE: Every one on the list. In fact, we have an opportunity to physically move some officers to Rouge Park. We're in negotiation right now with GSC to try to get it going so it will be running right out of the park area.

19 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Commissioner?
20 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Pardon me, through
21 the Chair. Yes, sir, Assistant Chief White, I noticed
22 the uptick too on the River Walk. Since the state has
23 taken over Belle Isle, there are more people on the
24 River Walk now.

COMMANDER HALL: We are addressing that



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1 through our deployment efforts in the downtown area.
2 We're using officers as well as our reserves, and the
3 county also has a contingency of the Riverfront. So we
4 work with the Riverfront Conservancy on curfews and
5 things like that, so that is on our radar, something
6 that we do.

7 VICE-CHAIR WHITE: I did have one last point,
8 Madam Chair. Commander, with the upcoming fireworks at
9 Hart Plaza, I'm assuming the A.C. includes Hart Plaza.
10 I just wanted to know, are plans underway with the
11 planning for the fireworks for this year?

12 COMMANDER HALL: Absolutely, and that's a 13 touchy subject for me, but yes, we are. I'm actually 14 presenting on Monday to the entire executive staff as 15 it relates to the current plans. We have been in constant communication with all of the law enforcement 16 entities relative to the fireworks and I will be 17 presenting to the mayor on Wednesday of next week the 18 19 plans.

20 VICE-CHAIR WHITE: And through the Chair, 21 Commander, I would be interested in seeing that plan, 22 particularly in how we're handling the juveniles who 23 are coming down. I know that was a concern in previous 24 years, and how we were busting and or handling the 25 young people who were coming downtown. So we would be



very interested in reviewing that and/or specifically 1 that component of how we're handling young juveniles. 2 COMMANDER HALL: Yes, sir. And just so you 3 4 know, the plan is pretty much the same. We do have a, a curfew ordinance that's instituted every year through 5 6 the City Counsel. I can share that with you, and we plan to do it the same way that we have done in the 7 past because it has rendered to be somewhat successful. 8 I do know that there's a lot of individuals whose 9 10 parents are concerned about the roundup, so to speak, and that is where I'm, you know, a little, you know, 11 12 indifferent with the fireworks. It takes a lot of 13 resources to put on fireworks. And although the City of Detroit we've done I think a good job in past of 14 15 doing it, there are some concerns, and as a city, we 16 need to learn how to act as a city before we can just 17 release the reigns on curfews and things like that. So 18 we will be pushing that out, and I can get that information to you as soon as the A.C. tells me it's 19 20 okay. 21 It's okay. A.C. WHITE: 22 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Through the Chair. 23 With regard to the Marathon Oil, do we have a good

working relationship with them as it relates to the 24 25 emergency contingency plan?



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COMMANDER HALL: Absolutely. We work hand in 1 2 hand Director Simon who is in charge of our Homeland Security. We meet actually quarterly. We do have 3 4 secondary employment officers over there. We actually 5 meet at a critical infrastructure group, and that's 6 with the Bridge, the Tunnel as as well as the Marathon Oil plant to ensure that we are all in sync when it 7 8 relates, relates as it relates to deployment and 9 critical incidents. 10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair. CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: 11 Yes. 12 COMMISSIONER CARTER: There was a concern a 13 few months ago that was raised about the evacuation 14 plan and the lack of communication between Marathon and 15 the residents of the community that's never been 16 addressed. The head of Homeland Security was supposed to come and address it, and he never did. 17 A.C. WHITE: He did not, ma'am? 18 19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No, he did not. 20 A.C. WHITE: Okay. If I may through the 21 Chair. I will ensure that that's done. He may not 22 have come and addressed this Board, which was not my 23 directive, it was that he did in fact come and address the board, but we did have a conversation about it. 24 I 25 looked at the plan. I believe the city in question was

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Melvindale where the residents of Melvindale were treated one way and the residents of Detroit were treated another. If you look at the plan, which I in fact did, and I asked him to provide you with a copy of the plan. If you look at them side by side the only difference really is the name Detroit versus Melvindale.

Very comprehensive strategies in both. 8 9 Frankly where the ball is dropped is the communication, 10 the communication from the police department as well as communication from Marathon. And I don't want to blame 11 12 Marathon because we should be taking the lead on that, 13 and I've asked him to do some educational work with 14 that and push the word out to the community. So I will 15 make sure that he is here at the next meeting.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Commission Burton? 16 17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, through the Chair. 18 Commander Hall, I'd like to know what is your plan reducing crime for the downtown neighborhoods, which is 19 which falls under the 5th District. I have a lot of 20 21 the condo associations in the downtown area talk to me 22 about during the Lion's season, the football season, 23 how cars are being broken into right off of Rivard and 24 Lafayette area, so they have a lot of strong concerns 25 that they have brought up to me as their commissioner

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1 for the district. And I'd like to hear more about how 2 you and, you know, plans to reduce crime in the 3 downtown area.

4 COMMANDER HALL: That's actually something 5 that we just address at Com Stat on Wednesday. The 1st 6 Precinct, as I said, just became operational on March 31st. What we have decided to do, because we're 7 recognizing that there are larcenies and crime in the 8 9 downtown area, so we have officers additionally than 10 the ones that are assigned to the 1st Precinct who come in for various football and baseball games. 11

12 In addition to patrolling the stadiums they 13 will now be deployed into those parking structures around those various areas where these larcenies are 14 15 taking place and they will be directly responsible for 16 reducing the larcenies in those areas. We do a monthly Com Stat with all of the individuals in the 1st 17 18 Precinct, the businesses, communities, stakeholders alike and we find out where those hotspots are, where 19 20 they're actually occurring, what time, what day, and 21 that's how we're deploying.

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Commander 23 Hall.

24 COMMANDER HALL: You're welcome.

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CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Are there anymore



Page 24 questions for Commander Hall? If not, thank you, COMMANDER HALL: Thank you very much. CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Great report. COMMISSIONER MOORE: Madam Chair, I have a question for A.C. White. CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Yes. COMMISSIONER MOORE: Have the precincts been realigned yet? Has that project been completed?

10 A.C. WHITE: Yes, sir. The boundaries of the 11 precincts, yes, sir, it has been.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Can we get a copy of 13 those?

A.C. WHITE: Yes, sir. 14

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ma'am.

15 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.

16 A.C. WHITE: You'll have that by the next 17 meeting as well.

18 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Sir, yes, sir.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Do we have any standing 19 20 committee reports? If not, let's move to new business. Any new business? Old business? 21

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I'd like to 23 address the Assistant Chief White in deference to the 24 issue about the Belle Isle, you know, the high profile 25 from the counsel people and the Mayor, I guess. Is

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1 there any type of -- I know Miss Bernice went out there and talked with the lieutenant. Is there any type of 2 rapport that DPD could share with the Michigan State 3 Police and DNR in terms of the issue that's before us 4 5 Detroiters with this transition period? I understand 6 it's a transition period. Is there any type of rapport that we might try to establish with the issues at hand, 7 for what it's worth? 8

9 A.C. WHITE: Most certainly. Through the 10 Chair. I certainly didn't want to associate my 11 comments earlier with the uptick at the parks with a 12 negative association with something that's happening at 13 Belle Isle, that wasn't my intention, but we are in 14 fact seeing an uptick of other parks, that's a fact.

15 With regard to relationship with Michigan 16 State Police, we enjoy a very good working relationship 17 with the Michigan State Police. Like you, I'm aware of 18 some of the concerns from the community. I saw the 19 news reports as well. We are in constant conversation, 20 the Commander and her team, my office so, you know, 21 when issues are brought to us and I have not seen an uptick in complaints. 22

A.C. you may -- Cromwell, you may be able to speak more to that. I don't know if you're getting the complaints, even though it involves the State Police,



but I have not specifically seen a large number of complaints. I've heard of a couple of instances where citizens were walking across the bridge and being approached. My understanding is there was an issue with some bikers, bike riders that were potentially unsafe.

7 But with regards to our relationship with the 8 State Police, it's good, it's strong, they are open to 9 understanding our community. They have been open to 10 working with us and we don't see any reason why we 11 can't foster a very positive relationship.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Maybe perhaps it might be 13 appropriate that we make request of Michigan State Police to come before this Board and address some of 14 15 those concerns directly. I think that would be 16 reassuring the community and us that we're all 17 concerned. This issue's come up in the community and forums in reference to -- and while misinformation, 18 understand that it's a new day, it's new entity out 19 20 there so we got to make that adjustment. But it's also 21 sensitive in terms of the race question and stuff like, 22 you know, that race too about the profile. Someone 23 indicated that the State Police graduating class that's only one or two African-Americans in that class. 24 So I 25 know one time the State Police used to get a bonus when

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they first came into Detroit for working in Detroit, like a combat zone. I just think maybe we should take that initiative as the Board of Police Commission, not to burden on you, but just to get for the reassurance we represent the community more or less in that forum.

COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am. I just 6 wanted to add to what Commissioner Bell stated. 7 Also too we know now that Belle Isle is under the, under the 8 9 State now and so we as a Commission, it doesn't even 10 reference that as Commission as the Commission, it doesn't reference that even in the City Charter now. 11 12 So I think it would behoove us to get on the front end 13 of this and get with all the individuals involved, activists like Ron Scott, Brendan Jones. I'm sorry, 14 15 Counsel Member Brenda Jones, and the clerks. And, and communication set -- all of this sit down together as 16 17 Commissioners, the State Police, DNR, they're out there 18 too, to getting on the front end, NAACP, etcetera, bring all of the stakeholders to the table so that we 19 20 can resolve this issue and find out, you know.

There evidently is, I strongly suspect, some need for some sensitivity training, if you want to call it that. I've always had an issue you had to train people how to treat people. But I really think before this escalates that something needs to be done, and us

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1	as Commissioners because we represent the City and the
2	community in various district too so.

3 A.C. WHITE: If I may through the chair. 4 Certainly I don't want to speak for the State Police. 5 I've work closely with them on a variety of different projects, and I know that this is not the only urban 6 7 community that they've serviced, we're all aware of that. I think, though, it would serve us in addition 8 9 to that a, some form of community educational 10 engagement opportunity we should take because the DNR is different than what we've seen in the city, you 11 12 know. They are going to be looking for things on the waterways and in the, you know, such as fishing 13 licenses and things like that. Those of us who've gone 14 15 to state parks know that you've got to have your fishing license. I don't think I've ever seen anybody 16 17 ask for fishing license at Belle Isle so, you know, that's going to create some real serious issues. So we 18 19 need to educate the community as well. So I don't know 20 if Comcast or any other cable companies can assist us, 21 but some form of public service address might be 22 helpful.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.
24 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: At this time I'm going
25 to ask if the budget director ask if you could come



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1	forward with the budget report.
2	BUDGET DIRECTOR: Good afternoon.
3	CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Good afternoon.
4	BUDGET DIRECTOR: There were a few additional
5	items that were open as a result of yesterday's
6	meeting, and I just wanted to follow up and ensure that
7	you guys received information that was needed.
8	There were a couple binders that were
9	delivered today to George. I asked him if he needed
10	additional ones to definitely let us know, we will go
11	through that process and let you guys have more copies.
12	So through the items that I wanted to give
13	you the answers for were capital expenditures, CB
14	patrol and to restore the 10% pay cuts. So to answer
15	the question, capital improvements the question was how
16	often, how soon and what amount of money was going to
17	be spent and what timeframe. So the capital
18	improvements is 34.2 million dollars, it's projected to
19	be spent over ten years. The majority of the money is
20	going to be spent about 13 million in 2015, and 6.5
21	million in 2016.
22	Now as we had discussed yesterday, this is a
23	restructuring initiative, what the process was
24	submitting restructuring initiative would be put
25	together the plan, the purpose, recommendation, and

then submit it through the Chief Financial Officer
Hill, and then he would give us the approval to move
forward with project, depending on the availability or
the quality of life funding. So that has -- we are in
the process of submitting that plan and we'll move
forward once approval is given.

7 The next question is CB patrol, how much 8 money was set aside for funding and what was it for. 9 There are -- there's \$205,000 set aside for CB patrol 10 for belts, holsters, magazine holders, handcuffs, 11 carriers, protective vests and radios. That money will 12 be spent in two different years \$102,000 each year in 13 2015 and 2020.

The last question was when is the -- what is 14 15 the intent to restore the 10% pay cuts, is it initial 16 or what was the plan. I've been advised to defer you 17 guys to Jones Day as that negotiation is still in 18 process with the union, but the remaining question was in the restructuring plan today how long is it going to 19 20 take to restore the 10% and it's going to be four 21 years. The initial plan includes a five-year increase in 2015, zero for '16, and 3% for '17. 22

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Are there any questionsfor the Director.

COMMISSIONER MOORE: I have a quick question.



25

The 8th Precinct, what are the plans for the 8th 1 precinct as far as the status of the emergency? 2 BUDGET DIRECTOR: There is a plan to add 3 4 three new precincts this year. Let me just get to my 5 notes real quick. And there are -- there's a plan 5th Precinct, 7th Precinct and 8th Precinct. The initial 6 spending would start before June 2014, carry on through 7 8 '15 and in '16. A.C. can probably speak further as to 9 whether or not the project was actually started. Ι 10 know that the 8th Precinct itself I don't believe has 11 been --12 A.C. WHITE: I was actually trying to relay 13 something too. I apologize. What was your question? 14 BUDGET DIRECTOR: What are the plans for 8th 15 Precinct? 16 A.C. WHITE: Okay. The 8th Precinct -- okay. 17 The 8th Precinct they're in negotiation with Meijers. 18 I don't know if you are aware, but the Meijers store is building a location at the -- right across from the old 19 20 8th Precinct, I think that was Redford High School. We've had some preliminary discussions with them about 21 22 partnering with them on a facility, and there is a 23 building that is currently on that property that used to be a Wellness Center. It's really in great shape. 24 25 There's been some looting there, but it's not going to

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1 take us much to transform it into a police precinct. 2 It actually kind of looks like a police precinct now. Meijers is not only willing to assist us in obtaining 3 4 the property, but to also add some financial support as 5 well. So that is something that they're looking to launch if we can get all the approvals with their build 6 out, the Meijers location, which is scheduled to 7 commence late this summer. 8 9 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Any other questions? 10 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Just a quick follow-up. So the budget, the budget amount, what year were they 11 12 talking about or you stated about the 8th Precinct? Is 13 that like '13/'14 budget or '12/'13 budget? A.C. WHITE: Well it's, it's actually drawn 14 15 out over the course of ten years how the monies are going to be used. The first -- what we've tried to do 16 17 is we're looking at how much is it going to cost to build the 8th Precinct, and then once that's 18

established, we will look to take the first couple of years of the money and use those, you know, on the -early on.

There's also some discussion about having Meijers build it and, and just basically rent it from them until like a rent-to-own type situation. So there's a lot of moving parts with Meijers.

I'm confident that something will get done. 1 2 I just don't know what it will look like, but I don't want to misrepresent how the budget piece is going to 3 play out, because if I say to you, you know, we're 4 5 going to use a ten-year budgeted dollar and then next year we're standing in front of you saying well, we 6 want to do something different. You know, I'd rather 7 wait until those things cement. 8

But I will tell you with regards to this 9 10 process, which is unlike anything we've ever seen, so the plan of adjustment monies are almost in like a 11 12 competitive sector of the department where you have to 13 present a plan that will allow you to obtain those funds. So simply because they're there doesn't 14 15 necessarily mean we're going to get them. We have 13 16 priorities for the department in the budget, and hopefully we got all 13, but we may not, and so 17 something's going to fall off. But the facilities are 18 19 most important because we have the Cain facilities in 20 regards to 8th Precinct, one of most densely populated 21 precincts in the city doesn't have a precinct. So that 22 is a priority.

23 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.
24 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Any other questions?
25 COMMISSIONER BYRD: Through the Chair, just

one question. I kind of reviewed the budget just last 1 2 night, and actually I had the opportunity to go through it thoroughly, but this year it appears as though it's 3 4 not to normal budget proceeding, being that we are 5 under the direction of emergency manager. Am I correct in that assumption? 6 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: That is correct. 7 8 COMMISSIONER BYRD: So the Charter says that 9 the police budget is to be submitted annually. Why 10 would we want to go three years out for a budget that basically we're not having a lot of input in, and what 11 12 role does this body play this year? Why wouldn't we 13 want to go one year and wait for the budget process to revert back to the normal proceedings that's detailed 14 15 in the Charter? Why go three years out over a budget that basically we're not in control of? 16 17 BUDGET DIRECTOR: The City mandated that each unit of the City of Detroit submit a triennial budget. 18

19 This is completely different than anything that's ever 20 happened in the past. And the reason for the three 21 years is to project what is going to happen moving 22 forward in the bankruptcy process. The actual plan of 23 adjustment is actually forecasting ten years. The City 24 of Detroit has said that the plan of adjustment needs 25 to correspond with the budget that was submitted in the

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same format that you guys are used to. So Budget has 1 mandated that we submit a triennial plan. 2 Now as far as the Charter goes, I don't have 3 4 an answer to that question. I did ask whether or not that was still a requirement for your approval. I 5 don't have an answer at this time. 6 COMMISSIONER BYRD: Okay. So if we go out 7 8 three years, next year will we be able to come back and 9 amend that budget? 10 BUDGET DIRECTOR: Yes, just like every other 11 budget. 12 COMMISSIONER BYRD: Will it require approval 13 of this body to do the amendment or will it be something that's already been settled? 14 Well, again, as I indicated 15 A.C. WHITE: 16 earlier through the Chair, this is unlike anything we've ever seen so um, you know, this is part of the 17 18 bankruptcy process. I would highly encourage this honorable board to take a strong look at the three-year 19 20 projected budget, and if you have concerns, note those 21 concerns now because we are operating with that three years, I mean that's real, that's not, you know, 22 23 theory. I mean that's where we're at. 24 I do, sir, understand, your concerns about

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the Charter indicating an annual review, and I'm

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certainly not giving advice to this panel, but just 1 from where I sit, I'm looking at what the City is 2 telling us we have to do in order to meet the 3 4 requirements of the budget, and we looked at the full 5 ten years. COMMISSIONER BYRD: So in actuality, the City 6 is telling us to violate the Charter. 7 COMMISSIONER BELL: I wouldn't answer that. 8 9 Madam Chair, since Assistant Chief is pausing for a 10 long time, I'm not an attorney, but I would advise him. But I would like to raise the question since we're 11 12 talking about facilities. What is the update on Palmer 13 Park facilities in reference to office of the Chief of Investigator moving there from downtown to that 14 15 location? Is that in the budget? I'm not familiar with the budget, but I just know there's supposed to 16 17 been some transition or a movement there. 18 A.C. WHITE: What facility was that? COMMISSIONER BELL: Office of Chief 19 20 Investigator to move to Palmer Park. 21 A.C. WHITE: Okay. That's the Merrill 2.2 Plaisance location. That is still part -- or that is 23 still in consideration as one of the buildings that we 24 did ask for, yes. 25 COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay. My concern is



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1 this, that we have always been centrally located as far as Office of Chief Investigator, and I understand the 2 leasing issue somewhat, but without any thought to 3 4 moving that facilities to that location, which is 5 Northwest, and we have serious transportation issue in the City of Detroit and I don't think that -- I don't 6 know, was there any thought to that process of the 7 citizen coming to that location versus downtown area, 8 9 which is -- seemed to be more convenient for the citizens who really have issue. My understanding we 10 moved into this facility because we wanted to be 11 12 separated from DPD. However, my understanding that 13 mounted is in that facility area, is that correct, in 14 the same building or is that separate? A.C. WHITE: Mounted should not be in Merrill 15 16 Plaisance. COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay. Getting back to my 17 18 original question, was there any thought to the location of the facilities? 19 20 A.C. WHITE: Yes, there were, there was a lot 21 of thought put into the location of the facilities. 22 The mandate that we received, and I can speak to this 23 because it was in my office that handled it, was that we must move to facilities in which the City owned for 24 25 the purpose of saving money. There were a number of

1 facilities that we looked at. Currently OCI's in a lease, as you know, and when we looked at the buildings 2 that we owned and we considered A, bus lines, you know, 3 4 how can -- there's a bus line that runs right through 5 there. B, has to be -- OCI should be closely linked to 6 the community. Merrill Plaisance is literally in the community, it's in a residential area. And size and 7 location. So we looked at that from a disciplinary as 8 9 well as OCI, and then the money that we had set aside 10 for build-out purposes, it fit right into the budgetary number, so we did look at all those issues. 11

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: I guess my thought, Madam 13 Chair, is that this is a newly constituted board and I 14 don't know, you know, in the past, but I think there's 15 something that we should really weigh in and that we should weigh in on it versus DPD weighing in on it and 16 17 making the final decision. I just think that we need to revisit that issue, for what it's worth, if that's 18 appropriate. 19

20 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Yes, and we did go 21 because Pam, you know, advised me too, but I still 22 think this board, the new board should also maybe take 23 a look at that and understand that whole process and 24 what's going on.

A.C. WHITE: For the record, as Madam Chair



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1 indicated, there was a number of discussions that happened with regards to this location, some concerns 2 that were raised, some visits to the facility. 3 It was not -- the decision was not made in a vacuum but it was 4 5 prior to this board, previous board. 6 COMMISSIONER BELL: My position is this, since there's not finalization, you haven't started 7 renovating this facility? 8 9 A.C. WHITE: Yes, we have. 10 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I just think we need to be brought up to speed in reference to that 11 12 particular item, you know. 13 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Yeah, I agree. 14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. You 15 know, anybody ever thought about moving OCI to police 16 headquarters? We do have Internal Affairs here, and I think with our staff, I think the rest of our staff 17 should be here with us. Anyone thought about that? 18 A.C. WHITE: Yes, through the Chair. 19 It was 20 considered, but the concern that was raised is that the 21 community would not feel comfortable amongst police officers complaining about police officers and may be 22 23 some reluctance to come into the building so we felt --24 and I agree with that. I think it should be a separate 25 facility.

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CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: 1 That was a concern, 2 Commissioner, that people wouldn't feel comfortable coming in filing a complaint against police in the 3 4 police station so. 5 Are there any other questions? COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Yeah, through the 6 Chair. The budget that we presented, the final say is 7 going to be by the EM, is that correct, the Emergency 8 9 Manager? 10 BUDGET DIRECTOR: I believe it's going to be by the EM as well as the creditors. 11 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: So this could all 12 13 change. BUDGET DIRECTOR: It could. And as I 14 15 indicated yesterday, this is still changing, so this 16 may not be the final version that you guys have. Ιt could change tomorrow. It could have already changed 17 last week. We are kind of rolling the dice at this 18 point trying to stay with a consistent plan. As A.C. 19 20 White had indicated with the facilities plan changing 21 and money changing as to for spending in the 2014 or spending in 2015, that changes everything. 22 23 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Are there any other 24 questions? 25 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am.



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CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Go ahead. 1 2 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair. For the record, I certainly hope that the 10%, restore 3 4 the 10% doesn't take four years. I hope that changes like immediately. Thank you. 5 6 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay. Are there any other questions? If not, thank you. 7 8 BUDGET DIRECTOR: Thank you. 9 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Now we can move to 10 announcements. Our next meeting is Thursday, June 22nd, 2014 3 p.m. here at the headquarters. 11 12 There's, Commissioners, you have in your 13 packet two district community meeting fliers, and I 14 just would like to suggest that as many of us attend 15 these meetings, especially the commissioners of that district, District 6 and 7. The Mayor will be doing, 16 17 is doing his district community meeting tour so just wanted to bring that to your attention. Are there any 18 other announcements? 19 20 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair. 21 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Yes. Commissioner BELL: I would just like to 22 23 announce that councilman, James Spivey, is having a District 4 meeting on the 21st of this month at 6 p.m. 24 25 at St. Mary's church. Hopefully you got something that



1	was shared through the e-mail process for District 4
2	people on the east side of Detroit in that District 4.
3	CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay.
4	A.C. WHITE: Madam Chair, I have an
5	announcement as well.
6	CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Yes.
7	A.C. WHITE: I'd like to invite any member of
8	the board, as well as community members, to Wayne
9	County Community College tomorrow at 10 a.m. We're in
10	the process of selecting the Chief is in the process
11	of selecting a new Assistant Chief and potentially a
12	Deputy Chief and there's a program that will be where
13	each group will present tomorrow as part of the
14	selection process so everyone here is welcome to
15	attend.
16	COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Which location?
17	A.C. WHITE: Downtown campus. Downtown, main
18	building. It's 1001 West Fort Street. It's the
19	campus, not the Administration Building.
20	CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Commissioner, let me
21	just add to that. When I was talking about the
22	District meeting, try to have as many of your people in
23	the community out as possible, and one of them is my
24	district, so Commissioner Carter.
25	Okay. Let's move to our Oral Communications.



1 Please give your name and limit your comments to two minutes as you come forward. Are there any comments? 2 MR. SCOTT: Thank you. I have to leave 3 4 shortly. Ron Scott. I just wanted to make a couple 5 comments today. I'd like to thank Commissioner Byrd 6 for raising the question about the juxtaposition between the Emergency Occupation and the, and the 7 Charter, and I won't dignify it by calling it emergency 8 9 management. I think when democracy is under threat, 10 this is the anniversary, 50th anniversary of the freedom, freedom struggle in Mississippi. And I think 11 12 we're under a freedom struggle in Michigan so, 13 therefore, I won't dignify it in relationship to that, capital takeover or any other takeover, that diminishes 14 15 democracy. And I might add that the group that's 16 challenging the emergency managers raising the 13th 17 Amendment as an objection to that and that deals with 18 involuntary servitude and denial of the vote, so within that context, that's the way I see it. So especially 19 20 when you have large law firms that are making money 21 here and are sending it offshore as far as Singapore in 22 fact.

23 So essentially, having said that, I think 24 this august body would do well in terms of raising 25 those questions as vociferously and as particularly and



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1 within the legal forums as you can in terms of the sanctity of the Charter. This body was created 2 primarily for the purpose, which I'm sure all of you 3 understand, to be its purpose and, therefore, I think 4 that should be validated. And I think continued 5 oversight of the budget was one of the major functions 6 of this entity, so I appreciate that, and I do believe 7 that there may be a framework where this could be 8 9 raised. And even if it can't be raised in court, it 10 certainly can be publicly dispensed. And Commissioner Bell similarly raised that in terms of 11 12 location of this body for the public. It's absolutely 13 significant, and I think that the mayor and the individuals in the EM's office should do something 14 15 similar to what was happening. Dan Gilbert has a lot 16 of property I think he could possibly donate to the 17 city because the city's donating a lot of to him so, therefore, a portion of that new entertainment district 18 that he's pushing for might do well to be a location 19 20 for a place where the Office of the Chief Investigator 21 could find its way to do that. 22 The other thing is, having been involved in

22 The other thing is, having been involved in 23 Belle Isle situation, I would like to invite all of you 24 when we do it to join us on our Freedom Ride. We're 25 using the nomenclature 50 years ago, since some of us



are sliding backwards, to use that because we're going 1 to do that with cycles and classic cars and we intend 2 to be very respectful. We're not confrontational and, 3 4 in fact, A.C., we held our little gathering across the 5 street from the old precinct on Belle Isle in the old 6 location, and we more than likely will be doing that this weekend and say that I welcome our organization. 7 We have a component of our organization to focus on --8 9 focuses on cycles.

10 And if I can have a deference at least for one minute. When we had the licensing issue with 11 12 cycles that came up about people having to have 13 licenses, the former chief, Chief Bully-Cummings, we negotiated that and they joined us in an information 14 15 ride, and that was resolved very peacefully, it wasn't 16 confrontational. In this context what we're asking, we 17 have about 13 very specific items which we can share 18 with you that we have concerns about, and some of them are sensitivity issues, but members of the conservancy 19 20 had asked about sensitivity before. So one of the 21 things we want to know is who's conducting sensitivity 22 training and whether or not the sensitivity training 23 needs sensitivity because, in effect, the matters that 24 have come up with the DNR and the state police are 25 certainly in need of vetting and assessing in terms of

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1 whether or not that process is working. So we welcome all of you and we welcome this body in terms of being 2 involved. And I mentioned it briefly to Donnell and to 3 4 others in the Civil Rights community about this. So we 5 welcome that, we welcome you to come along and ride with us because part of our riding is to basically gain 6 an assessment as to what actually is happening on the 7 island. 8

9 Can say for those who ride cycles that the 10 bike lanes talked about how dirty it is, the bike lanes are replete with glass, so individuals who go out to 11 12 cycle have a very difficult time doing that. And I 13 think the DNR and state police should do well to try to make those things safe as opposed to, you know, looking 14 15 at only the stops that are taking place. So we've 16 asked for and we've submitted for your request to find 17 out who's being stopped, why, we want to get the ethnicity, race, background and so forth and find that 18 out in terms of what actually has been done. 19

And then subsequently we'd like to speak not only with the -- and we sent letters to this respect, not only to conservancy and not only to DNR Chief as well as the state police, but also we want to speak with the representatives of the governor's office because the governor weighing in on what we think, so

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we think it would be reasonable for us to meet with his office, especially in this election year, to find out what he's going to do to make sure that we have a more peaceful island.

And I'm thankful to the citizens of the City 5 of Detroit that the ire has been raised because the 6 island is more than just a place to go and fish and 7 hang out, it's a place where it's been one of the 8 9 safest places in the City of Detroit, and that's 10 because the citizens of Detroit have deemed it to be, like what we say, a peace zone where they go out and 11 12 enjoy the island. And we certainly would like for our 13 young people this summer to have similar experiences that we have without having any confrontation. And in 14 15 that context, I thank you for raising it, and we invite 16 everybody to the table to be involved in that.

And then finally, if I can conclude, I have 17 some questions for Commander Hall. I'd like to thank 18 her, for one thing, because the demeanor that has been 19 20 illustrated by officers in the downtown area, and I 21 live downtown, has been, has been different, that's all 22 I can say, and it's been engaging with people in the 23 downtown area. I'd just like to encourage to make sure 24 that the gentrification process goes peacefully in the 25 area, but I think she's been very diligent in that

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context and I just wanted to put that on the table.
 Very professional, that's what I can say. That's the
 term. And we see each other at Whole Foods all the
 time. So at any rate, thank you very much, and on this
 and I'll send out the information about Belle Isle as
 we proceed with that. Thank you.
 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Excuse me, through

the Chair. When is the next Freedom Ride?

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9 MR. SCOTT: Well we're looking at Sunday, we 10 were looking at Friday, but we didn't know whether or not it was going to rain so now we're looking at Sunday 11 12 afternoon. And I know you told me that you had to 13 work, but we're essentially doing it on most Fridays, and then roughly 5:00 riding from Milliken Park at the 14 15 Downriver walk, those of you have cycles you can do 16 that, we go across the bridge, which is a good thing.

17 So all officers who haven't been that way 18 since the Academy, you can come out and join us. And 19 then we ride around where the old police building was, 20 and then we ride back and that's basically it. And, 21 like I said, we're going to have classic cars in the 22 future.

And I might add that Hoods Tire Services, which is located across from Cantrell Funeral home on the east side on Mack and Bewick, it's like a fourth



Page 49 1 generation African-American business. And Eric Hood who graduated from King High School told me that he and 2 his car club that we were going to have come on the 3 4 Island, that they were afraid to come on the Island. 5 And I think that's very significant. These quys put 6 50, 60, \$70,000 dollars in cars, and they only want to do the same thing that the Dream Cruise does, and the 7 fact that they don't feel comfortable I think, 8 9 Commissioner Bell, is very significant, so we want to 10 make it comfortable for people. CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All right. Thank you, 11 12 sir. 13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: What is the status of Harbor Master? Is it still there? 14 15 A.C. WHITE: Yeah. We're going to work with 16 the state police. There's some unresolved issues 17 there. But the Harbor Master, to answer your question, is still intact. 18 COMMISSIONER MOORE: 19 Thank you. 20 MR. MANDONA. Good after noon. Gerald, Gerry 21 I've been a resident here for just over 25 Mandona. 22 years, grew up on the east side near Mack and Outer 23 Drive, Warren and Outer Drive, Old Wine Basket for all

24 you guys on the east side. So I moved just west of 25 here about two blocks five years ago and I applaud the

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increased presence and visibility of our police officers. They've been wonderful to work with and it's to the point now where my father, who's a retired employee that moved to the suburbs, is now open to moving back, and I think that's the direction we need to get to to start growing our tax base.

7 We still have a lot of work to do and I 8 wanted to bring a few things to your attention. One is 9 that auto burglary is still a real problem. I know 10 that there are other priority items that are taking 11 consideration but it's still pretty bad and those are 12 the kinds of things that keep people from moving back.

13 The second, I'd really more like your advice There is an establishment called the TV 14 on this. 15 Lounge that's right by the Motor City Casino, and 16 especially when they bring big-name acts, noise is 17 heard well past 2 a.m. all the way out here where a live, and they're serving alcohol after 2 a.m.. 18 there's rampant drug use and possible drug sales. 19 The 20 problem is that when you call 911 on Saturday at 2 21 a.m., there's about 1000 other priority calls that are 22 going to take precedence. And so I'm wondering what, 23 what I can do, what can we do to maybe pare that kind of stuff back because their patrons, many from the 24 25 suburbs, need to get the message too that it's a new

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1 day in Detroit. Thank you guys. 2 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Commander Hall. A.C. WHITE: Chair you've already done it. 3 Thank you, sir. Commander Hall, can you meet with me? 4 5 COMMANDER HALL: Yes. I just did want to address one thing, though. Because the TV Lounge Does 6 fall under my purview that we have -- we're on a 7 regular basis are outside of the TV Lounge on the 8 9 weekends when the crowds are pretty large, and we have 10 done some vice enforcement at that location. Vice has been given that location. 11 I'm not sure about the calls for service. 12 Τf 13 you know, our calls for service, we've gone from a what, 50, 45 minutes to we're out 8.8 minutes in the 14 downtown area. So I'm not sure what calls for service 15 are not being answered, but we'll go outside and I'll 16 17 get your information and we can talk further. 18 MR. MANDONA: Thank you very much. 19 MR. LUND: As well I am Dana Lund again. I'm 20 always coming up here to address you guys with a 21 problem that's always going on in my neighborhood. 22 First of all, do you have a listing of your names of 23 all of you that I can get of who you are? CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: You can see secretary 24 25 George Anthony.

1 MR. ANTHONY: And it should be also on the 2 top of the agendas that are in the back as soon as you 3 walk in.

MR. LUND: My problem again here is the 9th 4 5 Precinct and in my area. I called the 9th Precinct after I called 911 about a situation about things 6 7 that's going on in my neighborhood about a basketball rim. I called and an officer answered, answered the 8 9 phone. She answered the phone with a nasty attitude. 10 I asked for her name or a badge number. She gave me a very nasty attitude like she didn't want to give me her 11 name so forth and so on. And I had to call back. I 12 13 asked for the commander or the sergeant, could I speak 14 with them, she hung up the phone.

And I had called back again. Then a lieutenant answered the phone. So I had to file a report, which I really don't want to have to go through all that foolishness. I got, you know, the report number and all that. I never -- I got, you know, some paper work and so forth and so on.

I had to go through that process. I'm trying to keep my neighborhood up because I own a house in that neighborhood. The kids hit my truck, they ran out in front of my truck. I wasn't drinking or anything. I don't want to hurt nobody's kid, I got grandkids.



1 And that's a foolish thing. And I want -- I don't know 2 if I have to go to address it down at the Mayor's 3 office. Can they give out tickets to these people 4 that's bringing my neighborhood down by parking on 5 their grass? That's totally ridiculous, parking on the 6 grass and having these kids put these basketball rims 7 right there on the street.

And another thing, which is a sad thing, I 8 9 know you all heard it on the news, a little 10 two-year-old girl, the father, I don't know how it was that he ran over his baby. And I called 911 so many 11 12 times about these speeders. I'll give you my address, 13 19526 Waltham. I done called the 9th Precinct. I done called 911. My granddaughter is tell me granddaddy, 14 15 granddaddy she wants to ride her bike. I'll be 50 this 16 year, but I mean I'm in good shape enough to walk her, I walk her around the block. I got to deal with dogs 17 and everything and all of this, but I got to call 911. 18

I don't have to address threats to somebody at the police department not directly to them and tell them if somebody hit my grandbaby and I'm going to say this to you guys, and I'm not threatening no one, if they hit my grandbaby, you can look at he news, there will never be a 12 jury judging them, there will be six carrying them because they hurt my child, I'm not going

Page 54 1 to let them go to court. I'm just telling you because I called for years asking them can they put a 2 patrolman. They can sit in my yard. I got a big yard. 3 4 They can sit on Pinewood, they can sit on Manning. 5 There's not a stop sign from 7 Mile to State Fair. I've been doing this for years begging them to come on 6 that block, asking the officers to sit. He can wear 7 out several books, that's how fast they come down there 8 9 60 miles an hour down that block. 10 I came here asking can I be a reserve. I done even got my whatever. 11 12 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: I'm doing some reentry 13 training at the 9th Precinct with Captain Roche, and I 14 would definitely talk to him about that Monday. I just 15 need to -- if you can give A.C., gentleman there, give him your contact information. 16 MR. LUND: I'm sorry. In didn't mean to get 17 18 upset or anything. CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: You're fine. 19 20 MR. LUND: I just come down here every time 21 and I just never get anything done. I don't mean to be 22 rude. 23 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: I'll take care of that for you on Monday. Just give him your information. 24

25 One of the commissioners want to address that?

Page 55 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, I will also call 1 2 Captain Roche because you live in the 3rd District. That's my district. 3 MR. LUND: I'm not trying to by rude or 4 5 anything. COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: No, you're not being 6 rude. 7 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: That's good information 8 9 to know because I'm sure that didn't get to him so I'll 10 make sure that Captain Roche. MR. LUND: Thank you. 11 MS. PANNELL: Good afternoon. Sharon 12 13 Pannell, P-A-N-N-E-L-L. First of all, I just want to know, I heard Wilson is retiring, is that correct? 14 A.C. WHITE: Yes, that is correct. 15 16 MS. PANNELL: And the Emergency Manager is leaving in July, so will the Chief leave too and we'll 17 have to go back through getting another chief? 18 19 A.C. WHITE: I mean I don't anticipate that 20 happening, ma'am, but I don't know. I mean there's no 21 indication that the chief is leaving or planning to 22 leave. 23 MS. PANNELL: Okay. Thank you. 24 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon, Deputy, 25 Commissioners.

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CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Good afternoon. 1 2 MS. SMITH: Commander Hall, that was a very very good report. With me being a resident in that 3 4 particular area, I appreciate the fact that you did a 5 very good report, but there was some things that the commissioners didn't ask. As we all know, there's 6 7 going to be rebuilt, not only Iliches did buy, but it was given away from the city council. But my thing was 8 9 when I heard about it a couple of weeks later, the 10 price or whatever, the negotiations was, I was very upset about it because the fact that they neglected, 11 they got a speech saying they're going to do this and 12 13 do that. Well we all know people will say anything to get what they want, especially millionaires and 14 15 contractors and everything else in this town, people that have business. My thing was the fact that they 16 17 did not get a written contract. As I understand it, speaking about the 18 19 Iliches now, what they have done, they got their own 20 consulting companies and they're going to have the job 21 of choosing whoever companies that they're going to

have or employees to come and work there. Their choosing, not the City or anybody in the Mayor's office because with me being in the Mayor's -- did I say my name? I'm sorry.



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1	But anyway, I'm just upset because the city
2	is not doing what they should do in regards to giving
3	this land away and giving all this property to people
4	who they don't deserve it in a way because we got to
5	watch them, and I mean we got to watch them.
6	All right. As far as what else? I wrote my
7	notes down here. The contract. As I stated, we do not
8	have that much crime down in Midtown, I'm glad to tell
9	you, and I think the way they have it all situated and
10	how the police are going to be spread out in the
11	different districts and everything, that's a very good
12	idea. But I do want to ask one thing, how is the class
13	of the police department coming along? Are we given
14	anymore recruits because, you know, crime is on the
15	uprise in some areas, and they do need police officers,
16	and I just want to know, do we have a class that's
17	going to be graduating? I was told last month that we
18	do have a class that will be out in the next three or
19	four months? Are you aware of that, Deputy?
20	A.C. WHITE: Yes, ma'am. We have classes
21	scheduled to graduate early June, and then there is a

class of 50 that will be starting late June. And we have a total of I believe it's two classes in now, one will be coming out in June and shortly thereafter the other class will be graduating.



1 MS. SMITH: And will they know about the 2 sensitivity when they get out there on the street? A.C. WHITE: Absolutely. 3 4 MS. SMITH: That's one of the main things. I 5 heard Ron state about the state police. Well I don't 6 have any problem with the state police. I was out there the times that I told you about, but since he's 7 8 been out there several times since I have, and he just 9 told me about the glass on the bike. I asked him did 10 he throw it down there, but he said he didn't. But in the meantime, I am going back out 11 12 there and I'm going to talk with Lieutenant Shaw and 13 I'm going to see if there's any change to what has happened since the time that I have. When I saw Ron in 14 15 the picture he was raising his hand and going on, so 16 that must have been something that he, he was saying to 17 them and trying to explain to them. 18 I don't have no problem with the police period, state police, N -- DNR, whatever they are, I 19 20 don't have no problem with them. But the fact is we 21 have to know how to treat them also. We're not asking 22 to kiss them, by no means, but the fact is we got to 23 let them know we're respectable and we are decent, honest people and we're not looking for any trouble. 24 25 We can talk to them in a way where we want them to talk

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to us. If they get out of order, then that's when we
 have to get a report on them.

But in the meantime, I will talk with the 3 lieutenant again, and I understand you want them to 4 come before you. I won't take that job away from 5 George because I know he's sufficient enough to call 6 and get a appointment for him because it would be nice 7 for Shaw to come here and talk with the commissioners 8 9 and then you could judge for yourself whether he's, you 10 know, telling the truth or whatever the case may be.

But I do suggest that most of you do go out there and just take a ride out there. But do 25 now because this way you won't have to worry about him stopping you, just do 25 and then you know you're not in the wrong, all right?

16 All right. Also I know that Burt is having trouble in his district. There is -- Burton. 17 There is a area down there where a couple of our church members 18 came to me and told me they live on the same street 19 20 where the Chief live and they said -- Former Chief 21 Logan, and they did state that his car was broken into and they asked me for any kind of cooperation in 2.2 23 regards to that. So I don't know how prevalent it is, I'm not aware of it, but I do know it has happened in 24 25 his particular case.

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1 So in the meantime I told them what to do. 2 And I'm glad that the gentleman that was here is in the district with Roche. Is that how you pronounce it? 3 4 Roche, he's a very good, good officer, and I'm glad 5 that he's in that precinct because I think he will straighten it out, and I know goodness well that we 6 give him all the kudos in the world because he was good 7 when he was down here. 8

9 And in the meantime, I want all of you to 10 have a blessed, blessed day. We had a good -- those 11 mothers that had Mother's Day, I know they had a good 12 day. But in the meantime, go to Belle Isle yourself 13 and see what's going on and then you will make your own 14 opinion about that, but be careful to do 25 though.

15 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair. I 16 take it you're going to do your Freedom Drive, not 17 Freedom Ride. But also I just want to add that you're absolutely correct. There's one issue with those, the 18 state police, DNR and those so-called law enforcement 19 20 officers out there, but the other part in terms of the 21 community too, we have to make sure our driver's 22 license is correct, fishing license, we're wearing our 23 seat belts, we're driving the speed limit, your car is correct, your tags aren't expired, etcetera. So that's 24 25 another educational of --

1	MS. SMITH: That would be a main thing for
2	them to stop you because they did stop those men what,
3	about a couple of weeks ago or am I off key on that?
4	There was four of them in the car if you recall. I did
5	report to you about it. Two of them had warrants on
6	them and one didn't have a driver's license. So you
7	got to be strict when you go out there.
8	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Absolutely.
9	MS. SMITH: And I don't blame at all for if
10	they're suspicious of a car. You know, just stop them
11	and do the right thing by talking to them right, but
12	the fact is, a lot of people get upset when the police
13	stop them. Well what's going on now? But if you're
14	right, you don't have to worry about being stopped. I
15	don't have no problem. I got my license, my handicap
16	and everything else so I don't worry about being
17	stopped. But I do give kudos to the police partnered
18	here in the city. And I want Hall to keep on doing a
19	fantastic job downtown because we love her down there
20	and she will have to have problems with the people
21	that's coming in this summer because we all know what
22	they do, they be going up and down the street drinking
23	their beer and so forth so we got to make sure that
24	they, you know, obey the law. And I do wish that the
25	business people will pay the police the right kind of,



you know, fee because they deserve to be down there. 1 And I understand they got a contract with them and so 2 forth, but Ilitch didn't have no contract, so I want 3 4 you guys to be sure that you get a contract with the 5 Ilitch folks. Olympia, that's the name of it. The Olympia Company. If you need their number, I will give 6 it to you. They getting away with murder. I thank you 7 so much for your time. 8 9 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Are there any other 10 comments? If not, we'll move to adjourn. COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, before we 11 12 adjourn, I have one minor question for Assistant Chief 13 White. We keep talking about 911, but at one time we had a non-emergency number. Is that still in existence 14 15 or did we promote that? 16 A.C. WHITE: I think you're talking about 17 311? 18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir. 19 The 311 in its original form A.C. WHITE: 20 doesn't exist. What we have now is we have the 21 opportunity to call TCRU to make a non-emergency police 22 report.

COMMISSIONER BELL: So we should promote that
with the community, and that's what we're not doing,
because I heard he called over and over again 911, and

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1	I know we have community forums coming up, and we need
2	to really speak to the TCR number. Thank you. Thank
3	you, Madam Chair.
4	COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Move for adjournment.
5	COMMISSIONER BELL: Second.
6	CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: It's been moved and
7	seconded. Meeting is adjourned.
