MR. WELBORNE: My name is Bill Welborne, W-e-l-b-o-r-n-e. I'm president of Detroit City Wide Community Relations. I'm kind of perturbed in a couple ways. In fact, I am real mad. First of all, I got 32 calls this morning and about ten e-mails from people, most from the 11th Precinct. They're mad over there. And as they say in Japan, they're (inaudible). They are really mad, and they want to know what's going on.

Captain Roshay who just got there in April has been transferred. And he is a guy -- I have known Captain Roshay for a long time. He's a guy everybody like. He's a good guy. He works hard as far as I'm concerned, and everybody like him. He is gone now. And they would like some answers. And I know lot of things the Chief can't tell the people, and I realize that. But they should be told something in my opinion. They got to know something, what's going on because these are people that back them up. And if he can't support them, then all is lost as far as I'm concerned, not only from the 8th Precinct. I got a call -- couple calls from there. Captain Job (phonetic) is gone. They want to know why over there.

There's been a lot of transfers. I don't know

because I have been a strong advocate of his. I volunteer for everything. And I help as much as possible. But I'm at the point now where I'm through, completely through as far as I'm concerned. And I'm writing a letter to the Chief and tell him that.

I'm not going to volunteer any more until I see some change. And I have been doing this for over 20 some years. And I think I deserve something, some kind of respect as far as City Wide is all the precincts together. We try to make so everybody is getting something and get information for each precinct and give it to the people. And the people can't get it back. That's it for me.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Mr. Welborne, let me just say, I'm going to let DC LaValley answer the part about the why. Mr. Welborne is referring to is Rochon. He was assigned to the -- earlier this week, the Chief did make two promotions of new captains. One of them is Tim Leach, and the other one is Nick Kyriacou, both promoted to captain.

The executive team of the Department had to make some decisions, personnel decisions on where people were best suited to work. And there are a number of factors that are taken into consideration. One is interaction with the community. But others include their crime fighting strategies, how effective those are. Administration, how effective the particular captain in that area is with dealing with areas of concern, with Consent Decree compliance, personnel management. And, I mean, there is a lot that goes into it other than just one of those factors.

So, there were decisions that were made. And ves, Captain Rochon is moving on to a different assignment. Tim Leach is the captain that will be taking over at the 11th Precinct, very enthusiastic, energetic. I think that you'll really like Tim Leach once you get to know him. And I'll make sure that there's an introductory meeting that takes place where he can introduce himself to the community groups in the area so that everybody knows who the captain is at

somebody come to that meeting next week. They are meeting next Tuesday night at the precinct at 6:30. I plan to be at that meeting. So, if somebody come there, explain to them because they have been getting on me all morning long you know. I can only take so much or I will be in the ground.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Perhaps DC LaValley can help you with that too.

MR. WELBORNE: Okay. Thank you very much. COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am. Through the Chair, I just had a question for Deputy Chief LaValley. Where was Captain Rochon moved to? DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: Captain Rochon, effective Monday, will be assigned to the Chief's duty officer, which is the night command. So, he will be the ranking member on duty in the evening citywide. COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you, sir. CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Commander --COMMISSIONER BELL: Madame Chair, I would like to also -- since we are talking about promotions, transfer, I'd like to direct this concern to the Chief's Office. It would help greatly that those promotions, assignments, would be -- at least the Board should be informed. It's somewhat of a disadvantage to come to a forum like this -- and I interacted with the captain on

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And I will also try to coordinate a meeting with the Chief of Police so that you can sit down with him and express some of your concerns. Maybe he can give you some answers as well.

MR. WELBORNE: I'm not from 11. I'm from 12. But since I am City Wide, everybody calls me. Everybody calls me for an answer. And I've said to them, hey, I'm dumbfounded. I don't know what to tell them, you know.

MR. WELBORNE: I know Captain Rochon, everybody want to grab him.

DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: Yes, sir. CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Commissioner White? COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Madame Chair. My colleague, Commissioner Bell, stated the essence I believe of what my comments were geared to. But I also wanted to -- to Mr. Welborne's point, I think past practice of this Board having the responsibility to approve promotions gave the community the opportunity,

one, to be updated. Many of you are ambassadors of not

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only this body but the entire department to citizens within the community. So, to be the first bearer of good news as it is. And I agree, Madame Chair, Timothy Leach being a great person who came out of OCI, worked closely with this Board prior to the Chief's Office.

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But when we get information secondhand, now you're in crisis management. Now you're dealing with a community that doesn't understand why, how, or who is coming in their place or their seat. So, I think there is a huge opportunity, Deputy Chief, as you reiterate this to the Chief's Office, for us to have some communication, understanding what Emergency Order Number 11 says and the direction and the posture that the Chief has taken then gives us a huge opportunity at minimal to be able to have open channels of communication certainly to this body but more importantly I believe to the public and the community. Thank you, Madame Chair. CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you. Yes, sir? COMMANDER BETTISON: Todd Bettison, commander,

just newly assigned to the Chief's Office. So, all of your concerns, I have heard them as well. And Commander Charles Wilson will be retiring soon. So, I'm going to be backfilling the commander. And if he could have just stayed for part of it before he was just snatched up, I mean, over night.

I called to relay some information, and they said he was in a meeting. I get a call, he is gone. I mean, we as citizens, we do a little bit. If we give a little bit, we do a little bit. And it's just in fairness. And this -- the Department or I should say maybe not the Department but the Chief's Office have

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to get you back. I'm not letting you go anywhere. We have worked together before over at Southwest. So. I promise you, we will be working very closely together, jumping in there. And I'll ensure that all communications are cyclical and everybody is notified. CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you, sir. COMMANDER BETTISON: Thank you all. COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair, I have a question for Commander Bettison. One question. What is the communication mode we can use with you? I do a lot of e-mails by the way. COMMANDER BETTISON: I'll be available for

e-mails, telephone.

And to this Board, like you say, you just found out. I mean, what, it has been in the past that we would receive information from you all. Now you all are not receiving information to bring it back to the community. This is totally, totally unfair.

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CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Did anyone want to -- DC LaValley, did you want to comment?

DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: I can comment and say that I know that one of Chief Craig's top priorities is community engagement. And that's one of the factors that are taken into consideration when he determines who to promote in addition to the other areas. But that is one of the biggest considerations that he makes. Like I said, there were a number of considerations that were made with regard to these recent transfers and to making sure that the right person is in all of the seats.

With regard to the project that you're working on, I'm sure that Captain Rochon will be happy to continue to participate in that and be there side by side with Captain Leach and make sure that there's a seamless transition. So, because we change the person sitting in that seat doesn't mean that the commission changes and doesn't mean that projects that are ongoing and the work that the officers are doing, the sergeants are doing, none of that changes.

So, Captain Rochon I'm sure is going to brief Captain Leach on everything that's on going in the precinct and make sure that there's a seamless transition.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Does that help you any,

job of getting information from the police department as well as the police department giving us that information because you, the citizens, deserve to have it. And I think the Chief is doing an excellent job with this communication gap to stabilize, especially at the precinct level and that the command level is crucial to this whole process. I'm just doing my job, you know what I'm saying? And I can understand their frustration. So, if they frustrated and they getting as I can say big dollars because I'm not working, okay?
