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1 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Present.  
 2 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Ricardo R.  
 3 Moore?  
 4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Present.  
 5 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Madame Chair, you have a  
 6 quorum.  
 7 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you. And from the  
 8 Chief's Office is DC LaValley.  
 9 DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: Yes, ma'am, Deputy  
 10 Chief David LaValley, Support Services Bureau sitting  
 11 instead of Chief Craig.  
 12 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you, sir.  
 13 Mr. Secretary, will you call the rest of the staff,  
 14 please?  
 15 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, ma'am. We have  
 16 seated in the front Miss Aliyah Sabree, our attorney to  
 17 the Board, Miss Pamela Davis-Drake, our chief  
 18 investigator, and Mr. Robert Brown to my right who is  
 19 our office manager. We have Sergeant Allen Quinn in the  
 20 back recording our proceedings and Miss Wendy Boer from  
 21 Hanson Court Reporting Service. That completes the  
 22 introductions.  
 23 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay. Do we have the  
 24 chaplain here? No. Okay. Well, I'm going to have to  
 25 call on Deacon Tom Adams if you'd come and give us a

 5 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Good afternoon. Welcome  
 6 to the Board of Police Commissioners meeting. The  
 7 meeting is called to order at 3:00 p.m. My name is  
 8 Commissioner Jessica Taylor, Chairperson. And I'll ask  
 9 if the Secretary would call the role.  
 10 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Madame Chair.  
 11 For the record, George Anthony, Secretary to the Board.  
 12 Commissioner Donnell R. White? Commissioner Richard  
 13 Shelby?  
 14 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Here.  
 15 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Wendell L.  
 16 Byrd?  
 17 COMMISSIONER BYRD: Present.  
 18 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Reginald  
 19 Crawford?  
 20 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Present.  
 21 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Willie E.  
 22 Bell?  
 23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Present.  
 24 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Willie E.  
 25 Burton? Commissioner Lisa Carter?

1 word of prayer, please, if you don't mind.  
 2 DEACON ADAMS: In honor of God, who is head of  
 3 my life, it's always an honor to pray. Dear awesome  
 4 wonderful God, we love you, we praise you, we glorify  
 5 you, we honor you, oh Heavenly Father. Please give us  
 6 the emphasis to do the things in your will, to be able  
 7 to come together and represent the people in the mind of  
 8 unity and a mind of right, oh Heavenly Father. Let  
 9 everybody be heard. Let deliberations be fair, oh  
 10 Heavenly Father, that we do you justice in all the  
 11 things we do. All this we ask in the name of your son

 15 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay. Call for a motion  
 16 to approve the agenda for Thursday, June 5th, 2014.  
 17 COMMISSIONER BYRD: So moved.  
 18 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Support.  
 19 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: It has been moved and  
 20 supported. Any discussion? All in favor?  
 21 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.  
 22 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All opposed? Agenda  
 23 stands approved. Call for a motion to approve the  
 24 minutes for Thursday, May 29, 2014.  
 25 COMMISSIONER BELL: So moved.

1 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Second.  
 2 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: It's been moved and  
 3 seconded. Any discussion? All in favor?  
 4 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.  
 5 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All opposed? Minutes  
 6 approved as written. Let's move to the officer's  
 7 report. I don't really have a report. But I did have  
 8 just something from last week we had. And I did have an  
 9 opportunity to visit the Detention Center. And I have  
 10 an appointment with Warden Stewart tomorrow to tour the  
 11 facility. Warden Stewart has also agreed to come in and  
 12 do a presentation before the Board. So, I thought maybe  
 13 we might want to do that before we call this big meeting  
 14 because I think he can make -- he can take care of all  
 15 that in his presentation. So, I'll let you know the  
 16 date as soon as I get it.  
 17 Okay. Is there a report from the Chief's  
 18 Office, presentation or report?  
 19 DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: There is no formal  
 20 presentation this week. In light of that, I do have  
 21 some crime statistics to report. These are unofficial  
 22 statistics, and I reiterate, unofficial. Cases are not  
 23 -- investigations are not complete yet. So, official  
 24 crime report, crime stats, come out after the first of  
 25 the year.

1 But as of June 4, 2014, year to date we are at  
 2 108 criminal homicides. Last year the same date we were  
 3 at 131, 23 less this year. That's a reduction of  
 4 17.5 percent. Non-fatal shootings, 2014, we're at 392.  
 5 Last year we were at 446, 54 fewer for a 12.1 percent  
 6 reduction. Armed robberies, 652 this year. Last year  
 7 we were at 1,001, 349 fewer armed robberies year to date  
 8 for a 35 percent reduction. Car jackings, 2014, we are  
 9 at 212. Last year we were at 268. We've had 56 fewer  
 10 car jackings this year for a 21 percent reduction.  
 11 Criminal sexual assaults -- and these are what  
 12 we refer to as stranger rapes. These don't include  
 13 domestic or known offender type situations, date rapes.  
 14 We are at 136 this year. Last year we were at 145, 9  
 15 fewer for a 6 percent reduction. The last category is  
 16 domestic violence. And this is the area that we are  
 17 struggling with this year. Right now we are at 3,503  
 18 cases. Last year we were at 3,058, for an increase of  
 19 445 or 14.5 percent increase for domestic violence.  
 20 That concludes the report.  
 21 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Any questions for DC  
 22 LaValley? Okay.  
 23 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Madame Chair, if I may, I  
 24 think Commissioner Burton and Commissioner White are  
 25 here.

1 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Yes. The vice chair,  
 2 Commissioner White, has joined us. And Commissioner  
 3 Burton was here but he had stepped out. So, he is back  
 4 now. Okay. Thank you, Mr. Secretary. Standing  
 5 committee reports? Are there any standing committee  
 6 reports?  
 7 New business? How about old business? Well,  
 8 let me -- we've got old business. Go ahead.  
 9 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am. Through  
 10 the Chair, last week, there was a request for the  
 11 results of the audit pertaining to the Commission, Chief  
 12 Investigator's Office, vehicle resources, I mean  
 13 equipment and other resources, et cetera. I'm sure all  
 14 the Commissioners have as I have received an e-mail  
 15 today a couple hours prior to this meeting as to the  
 16 results of that audit.  
 17 And I would like to put a motion on the table  
 18 that the next few weeks or some time in the next  
 19 two-week window that we as a commission discuss the  
 20 results of that audit and also make recommendations if  
 21 necessary in terms of some of the findings in that  
 22 particular audit.  
 23 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay. There's a motion  
 24 on the table to discuss the audit and make  
 25 recommendations. Is there support?

1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Second.  
 2 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: It's been moved and  
 3 supported. Any discussion?  
 4 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Madame Chair, just a  
 5 point of information. Through the Chair, Commissioner  
 6 Crawford, is it your intent that that would be discussed  
 7 in the open forum or is it your recommendation that we  
 8 go to sub-committee format?  
 9 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Let me correct myself,  
 10 sub-committee discussion.  
 11 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay. So, go to  
 12 sub-committee. So, the motion is for sub-committee.  
 13 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am.  
 14 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All in favor?  
 15 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.  
 16 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All opposed? Motion  
 17 carries. The next item -- well, it's not -- this is old  
 18 last week. I think, Commissioner White, you had put in  
 19 the reverend and his wife was here for their son with  
 20 the cleanup. And I want to ask, DC LaValley, do we have  
 21 any update on their son's -- it was a crime scene  
 22 involving their son.  
 23 DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: I know that particular  
 24 scene, Captain Decker found it. It was that the scene  
 25 was turned over to the victim's father. The reverend is

1 his step father. So, the scene was turned over to his  
2 natural father after we had been there for a number of  
3 hours and had the evidence techs at the scene, collected  
4 all the necessary evidence and interviewed everybody at  
5 the scene.

6 So, after that was presented to them, my  
7 understanding is that they were satisfied with who the  
8 scene was turned over to. I don't know right now the  
9 status of the investigation on the homicide. I can get  
10 an update for the Board on that. But I do know that  
11 there was no indication to Captain Decker after he  
12 looked into it that there was impropriety on the part of  
13 the officers at the scene.

14 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: But you will get us an  
15 update on the case?

16 DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: I can get an update on  
17 the status of the criminal investigation, yes.

18 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you. Now we move  
19 to announcements. Our next meeting is Thursday,  
20 June 12, 2014, at 6:30 p.m., at the 4th Precinct at the  
21 Southwestern Church of God. And that's at 3032 South  
22 Fort Street. Are there any other announcements? If  
23 not, we will move to oral communications from the  
24 audience.

25 If you would come forward and limit your

1 comments -- state your name and limit your comments to  
2 two minutes, please.

3 MR. WELBORNE: My name is Bill Welborne,  
4 W-e-l-b-o-r-n-e. I'm president of Detroit City Wide  
5 Community Relations. I'm kind of perturbed in a couple  
6 ways. In fact, I am real mad. First of all, I got 32  
7 calls this morning and about ten e-mails from people,  
8 most from the 11th Precinct. They're mad over there.  
9 And as they say in Japan, they're (inaudible). They are  
10 really mad, and they want to know what's going on.

11 Captain Roshay who just got there in April has  
12 been transferred. And he is a guy -- I have known  
13 Captain Roshay for a long time. He's a guy everybody  
14 like. He's a good guy. He works hard as far as I'm  
15 concerned, and everybody like him. He is gone now. And  
16 they would like some answers. And I know lot of things  
17 the Chief can't tell the people, and I realize that.  
18 But they should be told something in my opinion. They  
19 got to know something, what's going on because these are  
20 people that back them up. And if he can't support them,  
21 then all is lost as far as I'm concerned, not only from  
22 the 8th Precinct. I got a call -- couple calls from  
23 there. Captain Job (phonetic) is gone. They want to  
24 know why over there.

25 There's been a lot of transfers. I don't know

1 the reason why. And I'm not trying to point the finger  
2 at anybody. But I think the people deserve to know  
3 something. Also, I got an -- I don't know if I can say  
4 it -- a bitch with the Chief's Office. I think the  
5 communication between the Chief's Office and my  
6 organization and the president of all the precincts is  
7 bad.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madame Chair, may I call  
9 for a point of order? Sir, with all due respect, we  
10 cannot utilize profane language. I think we do need to  
11 pause and apologize to the Board and to the audience  
12 because that's just totally inappropriate.

13 MR. WELBORNE: I know it. That's why I  
14 said --

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Totally inappropriate. I  
16 would appreciate it if you would just apologize for that  
17 type of language.

18 MR. WELBORNE: I do. I apologize. I don't --  
19 I'm going -- I make an apology when I'm wrong. I can  
20 always do that.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir.

22 MR. WELBORNE: I think the communication has  
23 been nil and none. And I have tried to contact the  
24 Chief. I have written letters and haven't gotten an  
25 answer back, and I resent that. I really resent that

1 because I have been a strong advocate of his. I  
2 volunteer for everything. And I help as much as  
3 possible. But I'm at the point now where I'm through,  
4 completely through as far as I'm concerned. And I'm  
5 writing a letter to the Chief and tell him that.

6 I'm not going to volunteer any more until I  
7 see some change. And I have been doing this for over 20  
8 some years. And I think I deserve something, some kind  
9 of respect as far as City Wide is all the precincts  
10 together. We try to make so everybody is getting  
11 something and get information for each precinct and give  
12 it to the people. And the people can't get it back.  
13 That's it for me.

14 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Mr. Welborne, let me just  
15 say, I'm going to let DC LaValley answer the part about  
16 the why. But Captain Roshay is at the 9th Precinct,  
17 which is -- he's helping doing a lot of things with me  
18 with the reentry program. So, he is at the 9th  
19 Precinct. So, I don't know why he is there. But I'm  
20 happy he is there. But I'm sorry he had to leave.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: You plan to get him back I  
22 know. Excuse me.

23 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: DC LaValley is going to  
24 answer that.

25 DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: The captain

1 Mr. Welborne is referring to is Rochon. He was assigned  
 2 to the -- earlier this week, the Chief did make two  
 3 promotions of new captains. One of them is Tim Leach,  
 4 and the other one is Nick Kyriacou, both promoted to  
 5 captain.  
 6 The executive team of the Department had to  
 7 make some decisions, personnel decisions on where people  
 8 were best suited to work. And there are a number of  
 9 factors that are taken into consideration. One is  
 10 interaction with the community. But others include  
 11 their crime fighting strategies, how effective those  
 12 are. Administration, how effective the particular  
 13 captain in that area is with dealing with areas of  
 14 concern, with Consent Decree compliance, personnel  
 15 management. And, I mean, there is a lot that goes into  
 16 it other than just one of those factors.  
 17 So, there were decisions that were made. And  
 18 yes, Captain Rochon is moving on to a different  
 19 assignment. Tim Leach is the captain that will be  
 20 taking over at the 11th Precinct, very enthusiastic,  
 21 energetic. I think that you'll really like Tim Leach  
 22 once you get to know him. And I'll make sure that  
 23 there's an introductory meeting that takes place where  
 24 he can introduce himself to the community groups in the  
 25 area so that everybody knows who the captain is at

1 Number 11.  
 2 And I will also try to coordinate a meeting  
 3 with the Chief of Police so that you can sit down with  
 4 him and express some of your concerns. Maybe he can  
 5 give you some answers as well.  
 6 MR. WELBORNE: I'm not from 11. I'm from 12.  
 7 But since I am City Wide, everybody calls me. Everybody  
 8 calls me for an answer. And I've said to them, hey, I'm  
 9 dumbfounded. I don't know what to tell them, you know.  
 10 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Mr. Welborne, I can speak  
 11 on Captain Leach worked with OCI. And I sure did hate  
 12 to lose him. You will love him. He's a good guy.  
 13 MR. WELBORNE: I will get to know him before  
 14 my term is up. I'm going to stay until my term is up.  
 15 I'll get to know him because I try to meet all the  
 16 officers I can so they will know me, I know them if we  
 17 can help each other. But I don't know what to say. I  
 18 don't know him.  
 19 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: He is good. If I could  
 20 steal him, I would.  
 21 MR. WELBORNE: I know Captain Rochon,  
 22 everybody want to grab him.  
 23 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: You'll shake his hand.  
 24 You're okay.  
 25 MR. WELBORNE: What I would like to see is

1 somebody come to that meeting next week. They are  
 2 meeting next Tuesday night at the precinct at 6:30. I  
 3 plan to be at that meeting. So, if somebody come there,  
 4 explain to them because they have been getting on me all  
 5 morning long you know. I can only take so much or I  
 6 will be in the ground.  
 7 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Perhaps DC LaValley can  
 8 help you with that too.  
 9 MR. WELBORNE: Okay. Thank you very much.  
 10 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am. Through  
 11 the Chair, I just had a question for Deputy Chief  
 12 LaValley. Where was Captain Rochon moved to?  
 13 DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: Captain Rochon,  
 14 effective Monday, will be assigned to the Chief's duty  
 15 officer, which is the night command. So, he will be the  
 16 ranking member on duty in the evening citywide.  
 17 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you, sir.  
 18 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Commander --  
 19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madame Chair, I would like  
 20 to also -- since we are talking about promotions,  
 21 transfer, I'd like to direct this concern to the Chief's  
 22 Office. It would help greatly that those promotions,  
 23 assignments, would be -- at least the Board should be  
 24 informed. It's somewhat of a disadvantage to come to a  
 25 forum like this -- and I interacted with the captain on

1 Sunday. And I addressed him as the captain and one of  
 2 the neighborhood police officers' address where he is  
 3 now, you know, commander.  
 4 And I think that's somewhat -- I thought we  
 5 had a mutual understanding of communication at least.  
 6 If you notified the Secretary, he can inform the Board  
 7 members. And at least we would be in the communication  
 8 loop. Would that be too much to ask?  
 9 DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: It would not. I will  
 10 make sure that somebody handles that with the Chief's  
 11 office.  
 12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Would the Chief take duly  
 13 note of that, that we feel as though that would be a  
 14 little protocol to communicate that to us as the Board,  
 15 as the Board of Police Commissioner members? Thank you,  
 16 sir.  
 17 DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: Yes, sir.  
 18 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Commissioner White?  
 19 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Madame Chair.  
 20 My colleague, Commissioner Bell, stated the essence I  
 21 believe of what my comments were geared to. But I also  
 22 wanted to -- to Mr. Welborne's point, I think past  
 23 practice of this Board having the responsibility to  
 24 approve promotions gave the community the opportunity,  
 25 one, to be updated. Many of you are ambassadors of not

1 only this body but the entire department to citizens  
 2 within the community. So, to be the first bearer of  
 3 good news as it is. And I agree, Madame Chair, Timothy  
 4 Leach being a great person who came out of OCI, worked  
 5 closely with this Board prior to the Chief's Office.  
 6 But when we get information secondhand, now  
 7 you're in crisis management. Now you're dealing with a  
 8 community that doesn't understand why, how, or who is  
 9 coming in their place or their seat. So, I think there  
 10 is a huge opportunity, Deputy Chief, as you reiterate  
 11 this to the Chief's Office, for us to have some  
 12 communication, understanding what Emergency Order Number  
 13 11 says and the direction and the posture that the Chief  
 14 has taken then gives us a huge opportunity at minimal to  
 15 be able to have open channels of communication certainly  
 16 to this body but more importantly I believe to the  
 17 public and the community. Thank you, Madame Chair.  
 18 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you. Yes, sir?  
 19 COMMANDER BETTISON: Todd Bettison, commander,  
 20 just newly assigned to the Chief's Office. So, all of  
 21 your concerns, I have heard them as well. And Commander  
 22 Charles Wilson will be retiring soon. So, I'm going to  
 23 be backfilling the commander. So, I'm taking on that  
 24 role. And I will assure this Board and members of the  
 25 community that in my role -- and, Mr. Welborne, I want

1 to get you back. I'm not letting you go anywhere. We  
 2 have worked together before over at Southwest. So, I  
 3 promise you, we will be working very closely together,  
 4 jumping in there. And I'll ensure that all  
 5 communications are cyclical and everybody is notified.  
 6 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you, sir.  
 7 COMMANDER BETTISON: Thank you all.  
 8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair, I have  
 9 a question for Commander Bettison. One question. What  
 10 is the communication mode we can use with you? I do a  
 11 lot of e-mails by the way.  
 12 COMMANDER BETTISON: I'll be available for  
 13 e-mails, telephone.  
 14 COMMISSIONER MOORE: What's your e-mail  
 15 address?  
 16 COMMANDER BETTISON: I will get that to the  
 17 whole Board. I will get you all of my contact  
 18 information. I will go through George Anthony, and you  
 19 will all have it.  
 20 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.  
 21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.  
 22 COMMANDER BETTISON: Telephone, cell phone,  
 23 you will be able to get in contact with me.  
 24 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All right.  
 25 MS. McCANTS: Good afternoon to the Board of

1 Police Commissioners. I am Yolanda McCants also from  
 2 the Northeastern District, now the 11th Precinct. And  
 3 we do have some concerns because these changes has just  
 4 about destroyed the communication between the police  
 5 department and the community. Now, it's just been three  
 6 months ago we had someone else, and three months later  
 7 we have someone else. And at this time, it's a very  
 8 crucial time because we have a big event where we paid  
 9 to have flyers to do a community project. And the  
 10 project is running from Ryan Road to Mound Road, from  
 11 Nevada to 7 Mile.  
 12 And all of our information has Captain  
 13 Rochon's name on it. Even though we do make changes, I  
 14 know that your change is your change coming from the  
 15 Chief's Office, and I clearly understand that. But it  
 16 should have been taken into consideration that there was  
 17 a project getting ready to take place. And if he could  
 18 have just stayed for part of it before he was just  
 19 snatched up, I mean, over night.  
 20 I called to relay some information, and they  
 21 said he was in a meeting. I get a call, he is gone. I  
 22 mean, we as citizens, we do a little bit. If we give a  
 23 little bit, we do a little bit. And it's just in  
 24 fairness. And this -- the Department or I should say  
 25 maybe not the Department but the Chief's Office have

1 been totally unfair. We have went through with them for  
 2 the last year, four different people. And I'm one, I  
 3 hit the ground. I come to the -- I mean, I have been  
 4 here for a while. But I have been going to different  
 5 meetings and doing different things in the community.  
 6 So, we need something. I understand that, you  
 7 know, people get promotions, okay? You say that there's  
 8 a process that determines who goes where. And I  
 9 understand that too. But in the meantime, you're just  
 10 totally destroying the communities, okay? We had a hard  
 11 time when we came in as districts, okay? So, we've kind  
 12 of pooled everybody together. Now, we say we going back  
 13 to precincts. We have two precincts in one building,  
 14 then we are just separating us again.  
 15 Okay. Now we got a new person. Before I got  
 16 here, I got a lot of phone calls. Well, I'll just give  
 17 up. I just give up. We can't get anything going. What  
 18 do you all say? You saying he says, and I'm going back  
 19 to the Chief, that he is a community person. What he is  
 20 doing is not community, not at all.  
 21 And to this Board, like you say, you just  
 22 found out. I mean, what, it has been in the past that  
 23 we would receive information from you all. Now you all  
 24 are not receiving information to bring it back to the  
 25 community. This is totally, totally unfair.

1 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Did anyone want to -- DC  
 2 LaValley, did you want to comment?  
 3 DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: I can comment and say  
 4 that I know that one of Chief Craig's top priorities is  
 5 community engagement. And that's one of the factors  
 6 that are taken into consideration when he determines who  
 7 to promote in addition to the other areas. But that is  
 8 one of the biggest considerations that he makes. Like I  
 9 said, there were a number of considerations that were  
 10 made with regard to these recent transfers and to making  
 11 sure that the right person is in all of the seats.  
 12 With regard to the project that you're working  
 13 on, I'm sure that Captain Rochon will be happy to  
 14 continue to participate in that and be there side by  
 15 side with Captain Leach and make sure that there's a  
 16 seamless transition. So, because we change the person  
 17 sitting in that seat doesn't mean that the commission  
 18 changes and doesn't mean that projects that are ongoing  
 19 and the work that the officers are doing, the sergeants  
 20 are doing, none of that changes.  
 21 So, Captain Rochon I'm sure is going to brief  
 22 Captain Leach on everything that's on going in the  
 23 precinct and make sure that there's a seamless  
 24 transition.  
 25 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Does that help you any,

1 Ms. McCants?  
 2 MS. McCANTS: No.  
 3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madame Chair, I think the  
 4 point has been well taken that the community is really  
 5 concerned about all of these changes. And I think that  
 6 we all need to take heed in reference to this Board and  
 7 to the Chief of Police and his team, that they really  
 8 take the concerns of the community in reference to  
 9 consistency of leadership. And the concern, I think  
 10 really that's been one of the gray areas. And I think  
 11 the Chief is doing an excellent job with this  
 12 communication gap to stabilize, especially at the  
 13 precinct level and that the command level is crucial to  
 14 this whole process. I just want to emphasize I think  
 15 that I hear you. I think we hear you.  
 16 MS. McCANTS: It effects the community. And  
 17 if it effects us, then it effects the officers too  
 18 because then it's like okay, whatever. You know what  
 19 I am saying? I'm just coming to work. I'm just doing my  
 20 job, you know what I'm saying? And I can understand  
 21 their frustration. So, if they frustrated and they  
 22 getting as I can say big dollars because I'm not  
 23 working, okay?  
 24 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Ms. McCants, I think we  
 25 all can do better. I think the Board can do a better

1 job of getting information from the police department as  
 2 well as the police department giving us that information  
 3 because you, the citizens, deserve to have it. And from  
 4 this point on, that effort is going to be put forth.  
 5 And again, your event that you're having is going to be  
 6 -- is going to be on time. It's going to be right. And  
 7 the people that he is sending -- there may be a lot of  
 8 changes. But from what I'm seeing now, the quality of  
 9 those people is not -- he's not lowering quality. He's  
 10 putting quality people in those positions.  
 11 So, you're going to get the same type of  
 12 service. It's just a different person. The change must  
 13 take place. But there's a better way we can do this.  
 14 We can handle it better, and we will.  
 15 MS. McCANTS: I hope so.  
 16 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair,  
 17 yes, ma'am, I heard what you said. And Mr. Welborne and  
 18 all of those who rely in the 11th Precinct and the  
 19 Third District, which is my district, I am the  
 20 Commissioner there. I have known Captain Rochon I guess  
 21 from the day he came on the job. He worked the 7th  
 22 Precinct over 20 some years. And my sentiments are the  
 23 same as the community. And I live in that community  
 24 too. And Captain Rochon and I would call each other  
 25 from time to time. And this is the first time I have

1 heard this.  
 2 So, yes, ma'am, I'm hearing it for the first  
 3 time too. And I'm hearing it from you. So, I thank you  
 4 and everyone else who have -- those who in the community  
 5 have called you, Mr. Welborne, about this issue. And  
 6 Commissioner Bell already expressed and so did the Vice  
 7 Chair as to the communication issue. Thank you for  
 8 coming down.  
 9 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: We are going to take care  
 10 of you, Ms. McCants. Don't worry.  
 11 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair, I have  
 12 a quick question for you. Were those other transfers  
 13 department wide? You mentioned the precincts. What  
 14 about specialized units, were there any transfers or  
 15 demotions or anything?  
 16 DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: There were no  
 17 demotions. Two captains were promoted. One of the  
 18 captains, Nick Kyriacou, is going to be at the 10th  
 19 Precinct. Tim Leach is going to be at the 11th  
 20 Precinct. Captain Bliss who was the night command  
 21 captain, he is going to be assigned to the 5th Precinct.  
 22 Previously, the 5th Precinct was Captain Mahoney  
 23 (phonetic). He was promoted to commander, and he is now  
 24 overseeing organized crime. And Rodney Cox who is the  
 25 captain at Number 10 was sent to organized crime.

1 So, we have an entire new command staff at  
 2 organized crime, captain and commander.  
 3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Can you just forward us a  
 4 list? Is it possible you can do that, to our Secretary?  
 5 DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: Commander Bettison  
 6 will make sure that happens.  
 7 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Good evening, sir. I  
 8 apologize for the wait.  
 9 MS. SIMPSON: That's fine. I'm Ralph Simpson.  
 10 I'm here with reference to the Mound facility and  
 11 specifically Alana Harada's letter to the Commission.  
 12 As a criminal defense attorney, particularly when I  
 13 worked for the state, I've been familiar with the Mound  
 14 facility since its opening. And I have assisted Miss  
 15 Harada in preparing some of her questions. I understand  
 16 that there's been some interest and some investigation  
 17 with regard to the Mound facility. But I guess I'm not  
 18 entirely clear what the next steps are with regard to  
 19 presenting information to Miss Harada and the public  
 20 with regard to the procedures there, who is in charge,  
 21 the questions about the suitability of medical care and  
 22 some other procedures there. And if you can elaborate  
 23 further on that, I'd appreciate it.  
 24 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: I did talk with Warden  
 25 Stewart today. And I'm going over there to tour the

1 Commission? At the last meeting, Miss Harada's letter  
 2 was not acknowledged as being received by I think  
 3 anyone.  
 4 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: If you could let Robert  
 5 look at that information to make sure you have the right  
 6 e-mail addresses on there.  
 7 MR. SIMPSON: Well, it is the one that's on  
 8 the website.  
 9 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Well, maybe he needs to  
 10 check and see if it's updated.  
 11 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Madame Chair, I have  
 12 shared my card with him. And he can always contact me  
 13 directly.  
 14 MR. SIMPSON: Thank you. And then the final  
 15 thing is a comment that I -- regardless of how  
 16 outstanding the head of the new Mound facility is, I  
 17 think that there's a question about communicating the  
 18 procedures and who is in charge on the website or in  
 19 other ways to the public. That was a large part of the  
 20 complaint was that when people were taken there from  
 21 Belle Isle or from other places, that there was a  
 22 complete lack of understanding about how to find out  
 23 more about their loved one or relative.  
 24 Again, it is not as far as I can tell on the  
 25 Detroit Police or city website at all, how to

1 facility. I have been through the facility but not  
 2 while the inmates were there. Now, so I'm going to go  
 3 again. He has also agreed to come before the Board and  
 4 to answer any questions that you might have. He is you  
 5 know if -- and to you know bring you up to date on that  
 6 facility and the technology and the things that they are  
 7 using.  
 8 He's a very bright young man. I think he can  
 9 clear up anything that you have. And whatever is wrong,  
 10 then we'll just have to -- we will fix it. So, he's  
 11 agreed to do that. And I'll be meeting with him again  
 12 in the morning at nine.  
 13 MR. SIMPSON: So, you will report on when that  
 14 meeting will be, and that will be an opportunity to  
 15 follow up on those questions?  
 16 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Yes, sir, I will. And it  
 17 will be in a short time span. It won't be -- I'm hoping  
 18 he can do something at the next meeting, he can be there  
 19 at the next meeting because he was out of town today.  
 20 That's why he couldn't stay.  
 21 MR. SIMPSON: A couple of other minor related  
 22 issues. One, the fact that a message was sent through  
 23 the website of the Police Commission and there were  
 24 indications the members hadn't received it. Is that the  
 25 correct address to direct communications to the

1 communicate with that facility. And so, I think that  
 2 that's something that should be addressed regardless of  
 3 what other investigation there is.  
 4 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Warden Stewart is very  
 5 open to all of that. And he will get to the bottom of  
 6 it. And anything that you need to know, want to know,  
 7 you know, will be shared with you. I will get with  
 8 George or either one of the staff people will contact  
 9 you after tomorrow and give you an update on how, you  
 10 know, you want to proceed. And I just don't want to  
 11 commit. But I'm thinking that he's not going to have  
 12 any problem meeting with the public.  
 13 As a matter of fact, I want to even have one  
 14 of our meetings in that facility and maybe where people  
 15 can tour it and do things because he is very open. So,  
 16 I don't think you're going to have a problem with that.  
 17 And the Board's responsibility is to get that  
 18 information to you. And I guarantee he will get it to  
 19 you.  
 20 MR. SIMPSON: Fine. Appreciate that  
 21 information. Thank you.  
 22 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Next?  
 23 DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: Madame Chair, I'd also  
 24 like to have our captain commander there in charge of  
 25 the DDC, the Detroit Detention Center from the DPD end



1 involved in that as well. That's a joint venture with  
2 the Detroit Police Department and the State of Michigan.  
3 We play a part in that as well.

4 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay. All right. Well,  
5 are you talking about tomorrow, the 9:00 meeting that I  
6 have with him or the one that he's -- because he is  
7 going to set up one. And we can do a special meeting.  
8 I think that was the meeting that we said we would do.  
9 And I don't think we -- I'm doing this out front to see  
10 if it's really going to be necessary because if they can  
11 get their answer -- but certainly you can be a part of  
12 it. I mean, I will be there tomorrow.

13 DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: Tomorrow at 9:00? I  
14 will have the captain sit in that meeting as well.

15 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay. Thank you.

16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Madame Chair, before we  
17 proceed, through the Chair, Deputy Chief, are you aware  
18 of any outreach that has been done on behalf of the  
19 department? Given that we have gotten out of the  
20 business of detaining individuals, have we done any  
21 widespread outreach in terms of what happens when you're  
22 arrested within the City of Detroit by a Detroit Police  
23 Officer?

24 DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: I'm not aware of what  
25 type of outreach has occurred with regard to that.

1 Other than the bonding procedure, what changed most for  
2 us was the location that we took a person to. So, I'm  
3 not sure what type of campaign was conducted when that  
4 facility opened as to telling everybody that any time  
5 you're a resident, you go to this facility instead of  
6 your local precinct. But as far as our procedures for  
7 bonding for somebody who is arrested on traffic  
8 warrants, there's a front desk at the Detroit Detention  
9 Center that if somebody wants to post bond for a loved  
10 one, they can go there to the front desk, post the bond  
11 and we'll release them just like we always did except  
12 that we're doing it over at the Detention Center instead  
13 of the precinct. So, I will find out what happened and  
14 make sure that there is some further information  
15 released.

16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, sir.

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madame Chair, who do you  
18 call now in reference to inquiring about a police  
19 prisoner?

20 DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: There's a desk at the  
21 Detention Center that's staffed.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Telephone number?

23 DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: Yes, sir. I don't  
24 have it off the top of my head.

25 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: 368-3200.

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: I think that's the kind of  
2 communication we need to know and the public needs to  
3 know, who do you call. There needs to be a standard  
4 practice, call the precinct. They might refer you to  
5 whoever that is. So, we're not in that business. But  
6 they still need to know who you communicate with just on  
7 the basics.

8 DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: Yes, sir.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

10 MS. PANNELL: Good afternoon, Board, Sharon  
11 Pannell. 2nd Precinct is having a crime walk June 20th  
12 from 5 to 7:00 p.m. Just want to welcome everybody over  
13 to the 2nd Precinct.

14 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: 2nd Precinct, June --

15 MS. PANNELL: June 20th, 5:00, five to seven.

16 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Are you going to remind  
17 us again?

18 MS. PANNELL: Of course. Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All right. Any other  
20 comments?

21 MS. PANNELL: 2nd Precinct on Leshure and  
22 Grand River, right behind McDonald's.

23 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Miss Pannell, I think it  
24 was at a church on Strathmore.

25 MS. PANNELL: You're right. I can't open up

1 my e-mail here. Yes. Well, you read the e-mail. Why  
2 don't you finish it up?

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I send them, I read them  
4 too.

5 MS. PANNELL: It's at that church on  
6 Strathmore. I'm sorry. But it's the 2nd Precinct.  
7 Next week I will have the address right. I can't pull  
8 it up in here.

9 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All right. Thank you,  
10 Miss Pannell.

11 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon, Board, Chief, good  
12 to have you. Bernice Smith, human resources. Well, I  
13 have some good news. This morning, the Chief was on the  
14 air with us, well, with the Detroit listeners. And he  
15 wasn't on very long because I wasn't able to get in. I  
16 was quite upset about it because I had called Chief Knox  
17 this morning and let him know that he was going to be on  
18 the air. And I thought it would be nice for the two of  
19 them to communicate. But, like I said, I didn't get on.  
20 There was so many people that was calling in. And then  
21 Cliff was taking up all the time asking him questions  
22 because he was so delighted for him to be a guest on the  
23 program.

24 In the meantime, something that was very  
25 interesting, one of your police officers called from the

1 8th Precinct, and he expressed some bad news out of the  
2 precinct. And I'm very glad that the Chief accepted  
3 what he had said, and he is going to check into it.  
4 Also, what the news was, I know Reggie is looking for me  
5 to tell. So, I'm going to tell it. There were three  
6 things.

7 The morale is low in that precinct. Also, the  
8 urine of your wash room needs to be repaired. And also,  
9 they just want the Chief to come over there and do some  
10 investigation and see if he can solve the problems that  
11 they have over there. I was quite upset about the urine  
12 though. I didn't think that you should have that not  
13 repaired, you know, with you working there.

14 In the meantime, let me see what else. Oh,  
15 George, I did the little job that I was to do. I went  
16 after I left last week, I went over to and met the DNR  
17 officers. And I have their name and numbers. And I  
18 asked them about appearing before us at a public  
19 hearing, which that was what we had suggested. And they  
20 were very cordial about it, and they accepted the  
21 invitation. So, I will give George the number and name,  
22 and he can make arrangements.

23 I see on our list here we are going to be next  
24 week. So, I suggest that you get with them, George, and  
25 see. If the captain is not in his office, he's out of

1 Lansing. But he is going to give you -- I got a card  
2 for his substitute. The Chair. Sorry. Sorry. To the  
3 Commission, the Chair, I have the cards and the business  
4 card. So, he can translate it to George.

5 And in the meantime, I have been working also  
6 with Congressman Conyers. And I'm going to invite all  
7 of you -- at least I want to invite all of you to his  
8 open house, which is at 3939. And it's going to be on  
9 the 14th. That's next Saturday. And I'm looking  
10 forward to every one of you that's sitting in this seat  
11 to come and see me and let me know that you're welcome,  
12 that you're going to be welcome. It's 3939 Woodward  
13 there at Alexandrine. He's going to have the office  
14 ready by next week.

15 As most of you know, that area there is all of  
16 Wayne State -- no, Michigan State. And they have  
17 offices also in that particular building. And that's  
18 the building that George Stewart bought that whole area  
19 from Alexandrine all the way down to Stinson. It's a  
20 beautiful building. You should come in just to  
21 investigate.

22 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: What's the date?

23 MS. SMITH: The date of his affair is  
24 June 14th. And it's from 12 to 2, 12 to 2. And I would  
25 like to see all of you there, you know. If you have the

1 time, we would like to have you come in there and see  
2 what he is doing and talk to him and let him know what  
3 you think about what he is doing. In the meantime, I  
4 think that's all I have to tell you, to report to you.

5 And I wish sometimes, Chief LaValley, would  
6 the Chief come and sit in on some of our meetings here  
7 because some people would love to come to our meetings  
8 here in the building. I have invited so many people to  
9 come over here and let them express what they want to  
10 think about the Police Department. But we don't have  
11 the Chief. I know he has a busy schedule. But see if  
12 he would take time at least once a month and come and  
13 sit in with us and talk to the people because they would  
14 like to see him in person. That's all my report. I  
15 thank you for listening to me.

16 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you Miss B. Are  
17 there any other comments?

18 MR. WELBORNE: I forgot to mention, nobody  
19 mentioned that Officer Frickly (phonetic) at the 12th  
20 Precinct passed away yesterday. I was -- I don't know  
21 if anybody knew about it.

22 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Yes, sir.

23 MR. WELBORNE: If you want any of the  
24 information, call Sergeant Bledsoe at 596-1221. She  
25 passed away yesterday. And I don't know all the

1 situation, everything that happened. But she did pass  
2 away. She's in her 40's.

3 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you, Mr. Welborne.

4 MS. McCANTS: I'm sorry. I gave the gentleman  
5 at the desk some flyers about the program that I was  
6 speaking of. So, if you all would at least read it,  
7 please.

8 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Yes, ma'am.

9 COMMANDER BETTISON: Commander Bettison. I  
10 just wanted to give you all some information. The  
11 question was who can we call to find out about our loved  
12 ones that have been detained. The telephone number at  
13 the DDC, Detroit Detention Center, that number is area  
14 code 313-596-2242. And then we also have a prisoner  
15 information hotline. That number still exists. And I  
16 just walked up to the telephone crime reporting unit,  
17 talked to the sergeant. And the number you can call for  
18 that is 313-267-4601. So you have two choices. Thank  
19 you.

20 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you. Are there any  
21 other comments? Seeing none, we move to a motion to  
22 adjourn.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madame Chair, I'd like to  
24 depart on a good note. I think Deputy Chief LaValley  
25 needs to announce to the public that we had a graduating

1 class on Monday. That's good news that you should share  
2 with us and the public.

3 DEPUTY CHIEF LaVALLEY: Yes, sir. Thank you.  
4 We did have a graduating class of 29 new police officers  
5 Monday, also the promotion of one sergeant who was  
6 promoted, active duty in the military when the last  
7 groups of sergeants were promoted. And all 29 of those  
8 police officers for right now are going to be assigned  
9 to the downtown district. And all of the officers that  
10 were assigned into downtown from the precincts are being  
11 returned to the precincts. So, you will see a lot of  
12 those officers walking beats downtown, looking polished  
13 and ready to go I'm sure and whatnot.

14 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you. Are there any  
15 -- well, we passed the comments, didn't we? If there is  
16 no other comments, I'm going to move to adjourn.

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: So moved.

18 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Second.

19 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: It's been moved and  
20 seconded. Any discussion. All in favor?

21 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.


22 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Meeting adjourned.
