So that's basically all I have 4 to report at this time. I might reserve some comments 5 for a later time. 6 But now on item number 9 is the report in 7 reference to the Chief of Police. 8 9 Deputy Chief Brown? 10 D.C. BROWN: Yes, sir. Deputy Chief Brown on behalf of Chief James Craig. 11 The Board, Chair, I am just going to present 12 13 some preliminary criminal statistics with the week ending 8/17/2014. 14 15 As it relates to non-fatal shootings, we are 16 showing a reduction of 15.5 percent; the difference of 17 about 123 less individuals shot thus far this year. 18 As it relates to criminal homicides, we have a reduction of about 13.8 percent, trending still 19 20 downward, and about 29 would be the difference in the 21 individuals that have been criminally killed thus far this year. 22 23 Thirty-seven percent is our overall reduction 24 as far as robbery is concerned year-to-date. That 25 includes business and citizen robbery contacts. And

1 that represents about 644 less robberies. 2 I don't know if you guys have access to our CompStat page, but it is showing a 10 percent overall 3 reduction as far as violent crime is concerned, as well 4 as 26, 25, and 25 respectively with burglary, larceny, 5 and stolen vehicles. 6 So we are trending -- the Chief likes to say 7 we are trending downward as it relates to crime. 8 We 9 have a soft goal of about 10 percent, so we are on 10 track to make our goal, but we are also conducting additional operations in the weeks to come to try to 11 maintain our efforts as it relates to reductions in 12 13 crime. So that will be our report as far as crime is 14 concerned. And that's about all I have to add at this 15 16 time. 17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioners, any 18 questions or comments in reference to Deputy Chief Brown report? 19 20 (Commissioner Burton entered proceedings at 21 about 3:11 p.m.) CHAIRPERSON BELL: Seeing none, I guess it 22 23 appropriate to say thank you, sir. 24 Director Gail, do you want to take this 25 opportunity, do you have anything to share with us?

And in April 2014, this Board set forth a 6 policy that police officers should not be giving 7 criminal misdemeanor tickets to the low wage minimum 8 9 wage person behind the counter. Instead it should be 10 directed to the business owner, or the business manager. And you were talking about an Administrative 11 Order that was entered by Judge Nancy Blount of 36th 12 13 District Court.

14And when I was at that meeting, I said, this15is not going to work. And I was right.

16 Thursday, one week ago, I was at a seminar, 17 and the Water Department's Supervising Assistant Corporation Counsel Shannon Holmes stated that there is 18 a new policy of increased enforcement, that they would 19 20 be giving tickets to the employee on the other side of 21 the counter. That they are just going to consider him the manager or the owner, whether he is or not. And 22 23 worse yet, that they are going to actually change the 24 policy even more.

In the past, if a business came forward and



25

Page 18 1 showed that they were in compliance and had all their 2 paperwork, the case would be dismissed. But that's no longer the case. 3 The Law 4 Department has taken a new stand. And they are doing 5 this in cooperation with Police Officer Crawford of the Detroit Police Department. 6 Now, I am not upset. It was your policy, 7 this Board's policy, of April 2014, that is somehow 8 9 being undermined by Police Officer Crawford, who likes 10 to give out these tickets. I am just letting you know what's going on. 11 12 Good luck to you. 13 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: He is not a relative 14 of mine. 15 MR. ROADES: No. All right. 16 So anyway, you all have a good day. I know 17 that Ms. Washington, Second Deputy Chief Washington 18 knows of the problem. 20 MS. WELLS: My name is Investigator Tonya21 Wells.

I am very disappointed not to see Chief Craig again in his seat to my immediate right. The Vehicle For Hire Commission has not met. I have not been put on the agenda to address this particular issue. The



City of Detroit, through the Police Department, is not
 doing its job.

I saw with my own eyes the Police -- the Fire Department standing on the corner of East Dequindre and Eight Mile, and also on the corner of Grand River and Livernois, with their boots out literally begging for money.

8 These people have to have a permit, as well. 9 Anything that's sold or collected on a corner, has to 10 be gone through the City Code Department. That is a 11 code violation. That's a \$65 ticket per occurrence 12 violation. The police is to enforce the code in the 13 City of Detroit.

And I would like to see the Commissioners from both Districts to find out whether or not the Fire Department had a permit to stand on the corner and embarrass the City of Detroit the way that they did. They had their boots out begging for coins.

I am offended. You don't do that. Even if you are raising money for muscular dystrophy, I need to see the statistics. If you are going to stand out there, you need to be able to report to the City of Detroit how much money you collected. And there has to be accountability.

The second thing I would like to address is

1	that the vehicle impound lot, B and T Towing has made				
2	several errors that resulted in a young man in my				
3	district being taken to jail and his car was				
4	confiscated. And it was because his car was reported				
5	stolen and not taken out of the LEIN machine.				
6	Now, I have been wrestling with this since				
7	June 20th. It is now August 21st. His car needs to be				
8	returned to him. The City of Detroit Police Department				
9	should make the arrangements. I have had to put in two				
10	citizen complaints because the officers at the				
11	10th precinct is unwilling and unable to do their job.				
12	So I would like to speak to the Chief				
13	personally about the Vehicle For Hire Commission.				
14	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, ma'am.

16	relates to the vehicle being removed out of LEIN. My

Like right now, the L.A.P.D. is under investigation for -- they underestimated their major 19 20 crimes by 14 percent, because of stats, you know, so stats can mislead, as well as put out good information. 21 So just be mindful of that and stuff like that. 22 23 Mainly, I just want to bring that up about, 24 you know, citizen -- we trying to put more people in 25 the city. When things like this, people wind up
