A lot of good things going on in Homicide, last several months. We have instituted what we refer to as Case Trax. It is a case management system. It allows especially myself and other supervisors to track the work of the officers, case by case, a lot of different information as far as, you can see from the slides, our evidence, our progress notes, the victim information.

It also has some data that comes up helping us in our solvability. This system has been placed by Commander Giaquinto, actually wrote by him. Excellent, from my perspective and supervisors there, a very quick reference for me. I get into the system, I can follow the case, all the notes in there, I don't have to look for the file. Same for my lieutenants, we can follow it case by case; been helping us a lot.

As you may or may not know, our Homicide, probably about six months ago was totally revamped.

Got rid of a lot of people. Came up to squad -- geographic squad assignments. Follows our district assignments. We have six different squads, as you see on the left there. Each squad goes to -- geographically central, being one and third, so forth,

1	so there's six separate squads. Gives us a team
2	approach.
3	Our investigators basically start or
4	respond to the beginning of the crime scene to the end.
5	It is not being passed off. It comes as a team,
6	everybody is involved in that team. And again,
7	they they take it from the very beginning, to the
8	very end. So we are not passing information, we are
9	not losing information. It has been very successful.
10	Along with our six different squads, we have
11	a Homicide Task Force; very newly developed. It is
12	funded through the HIDTA program, which is federal
13	money, cooperative between the Detroit Police, Michigan
14	State Police, and Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and
15	Firearms. It is actually a 21-member team: Ten from
16	DP, ten from MSP, and one ATF agent.
17	They are responsible for murders involving
18	not less than three victims, of which two or more are
19	fatal. A couple recent cases that we have had is the
20	barber shop shooting in Northeast District; a triple
21	murder on Bentler Street, number six, which, by the
22	way, have been closed by the task force.
23	Also involves murders involving
24	kilogram-level narcotics trafficking, multistate drug
25	trafficking. They handle all police shootings in the



1	city of Detroit, and also high profile incidents.
2	Another case recently was the fatal shooting
3	of the security guard at CVS. The task force was
4	enacted for that and followed that through to
5	apprehension and arrest.
6	Another very important thing going on in
7	Homicide: Every day, 9:00, we hold a team or
8	everybody briefing. Great for information sharing. We
9	talk about the cases, what the officers, investigators
10	have been doing. Amazing how we do have geographic
11	separation, but a case, as the officers start talking
12	about their case today, another team will see
13	commonalities between victims and suspects. Very vital
14	to our current closure rate is our information sharing.
15	And this is basically where we are at today,
16	part of everything coming together. Currently we have
17	45 homicides, city of Detroit. It is down from 68 last
18	year. It is overall percentage decrease of
19	33.8 percent. Phenomenal.
20	Probably when you go back our current
21	record management system goes back to 2001. It's very
22	easy to track. I looked through it, it is the lowest
23	we have had in homicides in the City since 2001. It is
24	actually significantly lower than anything else.



And then under that is our year-to-date

1	closures. This is the number that it is the big
2	number. It is a big number for me. If you look on the
3	right, UCR by the FBI, Uniform Crime Reporting.
4	Homicide or all crimes are closed by two different
5	things: Arrest, with charges; or exceptional
6	clearance.
7	Exceptional clearance, there are several
8	different rules, but a lot of times it is the
9	offender we have identified the offender, we are
10	unable to locate or arrest that offender. Most of the
11	time it is because they are dead, actually, is
12	exceptional clearance happens in murder/suicide.
13	Another example was a defendant was killed by another
14	suburban police department after he murdered one of our
15	citizens.
16	If you look at the numbers, though,
17	especially that second number, total cases closed,
18	93.3 percent. That is our honest clearance rate. That
19	comes from closed cases in 2014, as well as previous
20	year closures. Not just 2013, but cases from 2010,
21	2011, '12, '13, all the way back to the '80s cases. So
22	currently this year we have closed 25 of the 45 current
23	homicides, giving us a clearance of 55.6 percent. Also
2.4	closed this is closed with a warrant and arrest, 17

additional cases, bringing that number to 42, 93.3.

1	If you look under that, we also have five
2	not-in-custody warrants. From my perspective, my
3	detectives have done everything they can. They have
4	identified a person. They have submitted a warrant.
5	They have obtained a warrant. It is just a matter of
6	other entities tracking that individual down and
7	arresting them. Brings us to over a hundred percent.
8	There's a couple other ones at the Prosecutor's Office.
9	Now, that actual number this was as of yesterday.
10	In fact, one of those or two of the not-in-custody
11	warrants, the subject was arrested yesterday. Our
12	clearance rate currently stands at 97.8 percent.
13	Any questions?
14	CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Commissioners?
15	COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Through the Chair, do
16	you have a cold case squad?
17	CAPTAIN DECKER: Not specifically. At one
18	time we did. Funding-wise, there was some funding for
19	it. All cases are open. No cases are closed without
20	clearance or arrest. We don't have a specific unit
21	member squad investigating cold cases. All our
22	information that comes in on a cold case goes to that
23	geographic squad.
24	COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Another question,
25	through the Chair, what about critical shootings? Are



1	you guys handling critical shootings or does the
2	precinct IOS handle those?
3	CAPTAIN DECKER: Precinct IOS.
4	COMMISSIONER SHELBY: If that person becomes
5	deceased, do they transfer the case over to you?
6	CAPTAIN DECKER: That is correct.
7	CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Are there any other
8	questions?
9	COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, Captain, the
10	definition of homicide in the past has been a
11	discrepancy with the Prosecutor Office and DPD.
12	Could you give us a definition at this
13	particular time in reference to your definition of a
14	homicide?
15	CAPTAIN DECKER: Well, homicide itself by
16	definition is the taking of another's life. We track
17	criminal homicides.
18	Of this number, justified homicides,
19	homicides that have been ruled by the Prosecutor to be
20	justified in nature, are taken out of that. Other
21	deaths as far as suicides are taken out of that
22	equation. The 45 is just criminal homicides.
23	COMMISSIONER BELL: My other question,
24	reference to, how do you respond to the victim's family
25	of a homicide? We have had two or three cases where



1	out-of-town mothers have come before this body here
2	expressing their anxiety of the sensitivity of the
3	homicide investigator, in terms of rapport, contact,
4	etcetera. They were dissatisfied, there was no
5	communication.

CAPTAIN DECKER: Absolutely very important. We work with the victims' advocates. Very crucial.

2.1

I just went to a luncheon speech with the Kresge Institute. Excellent people for us, dealing with victims and family.

You know, it is a touchy place. When I first got there -- I have only been at Homicide a little over three months, and I had some of the same complaints that have come to the Board where -- came down from the Chief's Office or something to that effect where I would personally call a victim's family. And I think in -- and that was one of the complaints, that nobody has talked to them. They don't know a case update.

So I asked at our briefing, 9:00 in the morning, I said, hey, can you guys just call them?

Make a six-month call, make a three-month call, put it on your calendar, call them. And I have all sorts of investigators saying, oh, don't start that. There's -- certainly you can contact citizens that their family members -- there's certain people that they want to

1	know. They would like to hear from us every day, even
2	if it is absolutely nothing. The majority don't. The
3	majority it just brings up bad memories to have that
4	phone call to say, nothing is going on, we are at the
5	same place. It brings up that emotion that they don't
6	want to go to. So it is a case-by-case. I think you
7	understand from the detectives, I think they can tell
8	right away the person, the families that want that
9	continual contact. We try to do that for them. Again,
10	we reach out to our victim advocates; very helpful for
11	us.
12	COMMISSIONER BELL: My final question would
13	be in the area of homicide, as we relate to homicide,
14	as far as domestic violence, narcotics, or a dispute or
15	gang, what is your finding in terms of homicides
16	stemming from one of those areas, or some more than
17	others?
18	CAPTAIN DECKER: Well, unfortunately,
19	narcotics has been a big driver of homicides in the
20	past. Domestic violence is currently, it is very high
21	in the City. And we have had some domestic-related
22	homicides. Narcotics is probably still the biggest.
23	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir.
24	CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay.



COMMISSIONER MOORE: One quick question.

1	Are there any plans in place to reduce
2	homicides before they even begin?
3	CAPTAIN DECKER: Absolutely, sir.
4	Unfortunately, my unit is the reactive unit. I think
5	right there actually has some beneficial some
6	benefits to this City, especially as that number gets
7	out, we are solving homicides. We are closing
8	homicides. And I think that can be very it is a
9	great tool, people, hey, I am going to get caught.
10	The other half in that, it's not really from
11	my house, is when you look at that number, 33.8 percent
12	overall reduction, that goes for most of the violent
13	crime in the city of Detroit right now. That's coming
14	from the proactive units out there, units like our
15	tactical response unit, special ops, and precincts. It
16	is actually removal of illegal weapons from the street,
17	my biggest opinion, is really putting our crime down.
18	That and going after known offenders.
19	So from my house, we are reactive. It
20	happens before we go out there. I think part of that
21	closure rate sends a message out there, but the other
22	half of that comes from the proactive units in the
23	department.
24	CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Any other questions?



COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am. A

1	question through the Chair.
2	CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Okay.
3	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Commissioner
4	Crawford.
5	Yes, sir, Captain. In terms of what
6	Commissioner Bell was talking about, I think it was
7	some insensitive or the insensitivity that was
8	expressed, and that was it was the missing persons,
9	that's the unit that it was, prior to you getting
10	the Homicide being even involved, and that was the
11	Missing Persons unit. So it wasn't your unit, I recall
12	that.
13	CAPTAIN DECKER: I am actually aware of both
14	of those cases.
15	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir.
16	CAPTAIN DECKER: And we are actually looking
17	at both of those cases. You know, that's a hard line
18	to go. Almost from a homicide, until we actually have
19	a body, it is not a homicide, but because of the
20	factors behind that, behind especially those two
21	incidents
22	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir.
23	CAPTAIN DECKER: we have looked at them.
24	We are currently investigating them. I can't say they
25	are in our numbers. They are it is not a homicide



1	investigation until a body is found, but we are
2	certainly going in that direction, and currently both
3	those cases you are referring to are being actively
4	worked.
5	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir. And one
6	other question, are your tips coming in from the
7	community now more so than they used to in the past?
8	CAPTAIN DECKER: You know, I can't base it or
9	prior experience. But from my experience in the last
LO	three months, have been incredible. I mean, CVS came
11	from a tip, I truly believe within it might have
12	been the next day, it might have been a couple days
13	later. My crew would have solved that without the
L 4	information, they were on that right track, but just
15	incredible information coming from the citizens. And
16	on a lot of cases, we are getting a lot of good
L 7	information coming through, especially through Crime
L 8	Stoppers.
L 9	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Okay. Well, I am
20	glad to hear that, because as some of us have said in
21	the community, is "Don't snitch, just tell." "Don't
22	just snitch, just tell."
23	CAPTAIN DECKER: I couldn't agree more, but
24	absolutely, it is vital. We can't do it ourselves.



Those cases -- crime doesn't happen in a bubble. For

Page 18 1 the most part, somebody knows something. And the more we have the community coming forward, the higher that's 2 going to continue to be. 3 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes. Thank you. 4 5 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Commissioner White? COMMISSIONER WHITE: Madam Chair. 6 7 Thank you, Captain Decker. Just a question. 8 Go back to the Case Trax. Did I hear you 9 correctly, if I am a detective, I am following up with 10 a family, would I enter my comments into Case Trax? Whether I called or did not call? Or could a second 11 individual, if I am no longer over that case, could 12 13 another individual ultimately come and see that this particular family had called on a certain date and had 14 received a call or not received a call? 15 16 CAPTAIN DECKER: Absolutely. And for me as a 17 manager, it happens all the time, when I go back 18 through those, and I might have a complaint, I have 19 never heard anything, and I go back through those Case 20 Trax, well, didn't you get a call on this date? And a call on this date? So absolutely, those are part of 2.1 2.2 that Case Trax. And it is an excellent tracking tool 23 for myself as a manager.

1	With that being said, are there any triggers,
2	much like the MAS system, where you know after the
3	third instance, there needs to be a consultation with
4	that officer, sergeant, or supervisor, whoever it is?
5	Is there some trigger that happens at a certain point,
6	if a date lapses or if an individual has not been
7	contacted, that it shows up on your desktop?
8	CAPTAIN DECKER: Not at this time. Not any
9	automatic triggers.
10	COMMISSIONER WHITE: Is there a review
11	interval that you know that you are sitting with
12	individual detectives where you are looking at the
13	does it generate a report or
14	CAPTAIN DECKER: Yes, it can. The system
15	is hm, not the one I am looking for. Yes. Up in
16	this report menu, I can pull, and we often do it, I can
17	pull everything year-to-date, and we go over the cases,
18	you know, almost on a monthly basis that we look at all
19	our cases from year-to-date, and we go over them, you
20	know, what's open, what's closed, where we are at on
21	the cases.
22	COMMISSIONER WHITE: And that's on a monthly
23	basis?
24	CAPTAIN DECKER: That's correct.



COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Madam Chair.

1	CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Any more questions?
2	COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, if I may ask
3	one more question.
4	CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Yes.
5	COMMISSIONER BELL: In reference to training
6	of homicide investigators, at one time articles in the
7	paper talk about there was a massive exit of personnel
8	from homicide experience. And I guess my twofold
9	question is that the training process for homicide
L 0	investigators, and have you reached out to any
L1	experienced people who have perhaps left the
L2	Department, have extensive background in homicide
L3	investigation? Would that be a fair question to pose?
L 4	CAPTAIN DECKER: I certainly haven't. I
L5	have in fact, the Chief has talked about sending
L6	myself, some of our others, out to other agencies
L 7	nationwide just to see what they are doing. You know,
L 8	our training process, we still have some phenomenal
L 9	talent that's been there, you know, I think it is
20	always a progression; that we had those senior
21	investigators, and as we bring new investigators in,
22	they get that experience. I personally haven't reached
23	out to anybody local with experience. But never a bad
24	idea.

COMMISSIONER BELL: I find that Homicide is a

1	unique field in terms of people skills. You have got
2	to know the community. You have got to know the
3	people, you have got to have a feel in terms of
4	interrogation or just interaction from people to
5	interact.
6	When we look at the consent decree in terms
7	of how we got into homicide, picking up June Bug
8	because June Bug didn't know Pete, you know, I just
9	want to make sure that we are more sensitive to what's
10	going on in the community. If officers are not part of
11	the Detroit scene, getting back to your concern, that
12	they don't really know the interaction, and training
13	won't do that, but somewhere along the line you have to
14	have that feel in terms of interacting with people to
15	come forward, feel comfortable with you in terms of
16	interaction. I just want to share that with you from
17	my personal experience, working the street, never
18	worked Homicide, but always appreciate those guys in
19	terms when they'd show up, they had those unique skills
20	to interact.
21	CAPTAIN DECKER: I think that's absolutely
22	true, sir.
23	COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Madam Chair?
24	CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Yes.



COMMISSIONER SHELBY: I have worked -- I

1	congratulate you and your unit. That 90 percent
2	closure rate you have is way above the national
3	average. So I thank you for your assistance and your
4	efforts of your team.
5	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: And also, too, you
6	said something about going out to other cities. It
7	seems like they may want to come here.
8	CAPTAIN DECKER: I sure hope so.
9	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Then they want to
10	come here with 93 percent.
11	CAPTAIN DECKER: I had a personal goal, too,
12	when the Chief called me and said, hey, I have got a
13	spot for you. Here you go. Never been a homicide
14	investigator in my career. My career was mainly
15	patrol. But I went there. And Chief said, I would
16	like 70 percent closure rate. And I mean I didn't know
17	enough to look back at the years and say, we are at 50,
18	that could be a huge jump. I mean, I had personal
19	goals. When you look at that year-to-date to see that
20	year-to-date 70, and not have to worry about the
21	previous year closures, it's very important, previous
22	year closures, because I think it shows that homicide
23	is never closed. They continue to work those cases.
24	They are phenomenal. I mean, almost every day, I
25	probably have six that aren't even in that number this

1	week, previous year cases that they are submitting
2	sitting at the Prosecutor's for a signature. But yeah,
3	I have personal goals, too. That 70 percent
4	year-to-date is mine. Everything else is bonus.
5	COMMISSIONER MOORE: What was it about your
6	skill set that you believe Chief chose you to come over
7	to Homicide?
8	D.C. BROWN: If I may.
9	CAPTAIN DECKER: Thank you.
10	D.C. BROWN: Through the Chair.
11	He is a hard charger. He is a leader. The
12	Chief realized that his leadership is setting the tone
13	from the top. As it relates to modeling behavior, when
14	he was a lieutenant, he probably was either the first
15	or the second best person on the platoon. He expected
16	for them to have, you know, substantial statistics.
17	And he has substantial statistics himself. It wasn't
18	uncommon for Captain Decker here to arrest individuals
19	with guns just as well as the individuals that he
20	expected to perform those tasks. So it is a
21	leadership, it is a tone, that is set from the top.
22	CAPTAIN DECKER: Thank you, sir.
23	CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Any more questions for
24	Captain Decker?

I was at an office building at 1936 Junction. And I was in there working. And a police officer — well, I didn't know at the time it was a police officer. He came to the door and he was banging on the door like he was just crazy, and I went to the front door and I said, well, who is it? He says, I am a police officer. But he was in a plain car, so anybody can say they are a police officer. I am not opening the door. And so he said, you need to open the door. He said, this man out here, and he showed me a piece of paper at the window, he said, he own this building.

So the building that I was in actually went through a Wayne County sale. Okay. The building -- yeah, they been doing that for me for months. The building that I was in went to a Wayne County sale, and the police officer, in other words, wasn't supposed to be at the building. He claimed that someone flashed him down on the street. He came to the building, banging on the door, threatening me. He ran my license plate. He didn't even know that was my car but it was parked outside the building. So he used his authority to do things that he had no business doing. He ran my

1	license plate, and that's why he got caught, because he
2	ran it. Because at the time, I had a warrant out for
3	my arrest, but it was for a ticket. Okay. And so I
4	knew it was for a ticket.

So he said, you need to open the door and you need to cooperate with me now. He said, I am calling for backup. And only because I called 911, because I told him I wasn't opening the door because I didn't know him.

And I just can't understand the findings that they had. And I have a whole documented list, I have letters that came from the Chief, Board of -- the Chief.

CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Chief Investigator.

MS. BOONE: It was written on February 7th.

I just got it yesterday in the mail. So it was a lot of things that was happening, and the Chief

Investigator, you know, people got mad at me because I had to call Internal Affairs because nobody was giving me answers. And so I am here today because they are trying to tell me that I have to write a letter of appeal, and I am not going to write a letter of appeal because I done been through this thing too long. I got lists, I got names, I got phone numbers, I have conversations, everything.

MR. RHOADES: I don't have a big problem. I
have a little, tiny problem about the way the Detroit
Police Department handles business license enforcement.
And since we are still waiting for the ultimate
decision to finally work its way through the system, I
will just use my two minutes, and in the past I have
used my two minutes to say that I have a vision that
maybe a civilian employee with a desktop computer could
handle all the business licenses in the City of Detroit
through the established Show Cause Hearing method, and
actually take care of all these problems without the
involvement of the police. And that would free up
police resources. It has run successfully many times,
even in Detroit.

Last week I had a vision that maybe the Board of Police Commissioners will actually be able to, after all this evaluation, set a policy for the Police Department, that the show cause system is a system that should be worked, and not giving minimum wage employees misdemeanor tickets for 90 days in jail and \$500.

Today, I am going to use my remaining

30 seconds to bring up another idea, you know, when the

Police Department has a business that is a problem

business, they can bring that business license problem

to a Show Cause Hearing officer who will actually

1	listen to the history surrounding that business, and
2	then either revoke or suspend the business license, and
3	that would resolve the problem.
4	We just had a homicide detective up here,
5	gave an excellent presentation. One of the incidents
6	last year had to do with a barber shop that had a
7	history of gambling in the backroom. Now, no one knows
8	if the gambling in the backroom was the spark that
9	caused a multiple homicide, but when the local precinct
10	knows that the barber shop has gambling in the
11	backroom, and it has been going on for a while, they
12	can bring that problem to a Show Cause Hearing officer,
13	who will listen to the evidence, listen to both sides,
14	and if appropriate, revoke the license. And that would
15	be one of those proactive things that would reduce
16	homicides in Detroit.
17	Thank you very much.
18	And some day, I know, we will get a
19	resolution to the small little problem that we have
20	concerning business licenses.
21	CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you, sir.
22	At this time, I am going to we are going
23	to go into closed session, and the meeting will

Now, these are middle school kids, not high school kids, these are kids from sixth to ninth grade, eighth grade, whatever it is. And these kids have — they walk out the classroom, they talk, and, you know, you sit down and you try to talk to them, try to explain to them that we have something to offer them, we are trying to help them to better themselves. But trying to get the point across is almost like talking to this wall over here. They get to school, they want to come just — the girls get in a fight right in the classroom.

We got four officers in classrooms, with guns; five people, volunteers, in the classroom. It has nine adults there. They couldn't give -- they couldn't care less about us. Say, get out my way. Who you think you are? That's what they say. And they call you all kinds of names.

The three girls -- the two girls that were missing about three weeks ago, was in that class. One girl is 12 years old. One girl is 13 years old. And instead of them going home from school, they met two guys. And the parents are looking for them. They

1	finally found where they were at, they spent the night
2	with guys 18, 19 years old.
3	And I don't want to see the program out,
4	myself. Myself, a lot of people know Coach Hammond.
5	He is there. A lot of officers come there every day,

9	bad. We got a couple kids in high school that, you
10	know, they ain't going to make it. We got some, we got

We have people that are breaking into the apartment building, coming over through the ceiling and down. We have an issue with NSO people moving in with seniors, and going through all types of tumultuous situations.

I was taken to 36th District Court about payment of rent. The judge said there has to be a management contract, to say who is authorized to take money. That didn't happen. And this family member of this drug lord is still harassing people, and trying to take rent and doing other things. And people have seen and heard things that relate to narcotics trafficking and other illegal kinds of activity. So we need some help in removing this person who is not authorized to take money or on any paperwork.


