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5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Good evening. We're
6 going to call the meeting to order at this time.

7 Good evening. Welcome everyone. My name
8 is Lisa Carter. I'm the Chair for the Detroit Board
9 of Police Commissioners.

10 At this time I'm going to have Commissioner
11 Bell do the prayer for us, please.

12 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: Madam Chair, if I
13 may, I would like to call up Deacon Don Johnson from
14 city-wide Fourth Precinct to open up with a prayer.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: That sounds good.
16 Okay. Thank you.

17 MR. JOHNSON: Thank you very much. I'm
18 honored and want to say happy new year to this
19 wonderful body of commissioners and people in blue.
20 And hopefully we have a year better than last year.

21 My name is Don Johnson. I'm president of
22 city-wide police community relations in the 12th
23 Precinct, police community relations center. I'm
24 studying to be a lay minister at Gracious Savior
25 Lutheran Church.

1 Let all hearts be calm and all minds be
2 still. Good and gracious, God, once again we come to
3 say thank you for all that you do and all that you've
4 done and all that you continue to do. And, Lord, help
5 us to be about your business and your work so that we
6 can love one another as you have taught us to love and
7 to love you first and do the work to further your
8 kingdom here on earth as it is in heaven. We thank
9 you for this wonderful place that have allowed us to
10 have our meeting here. And, Lord, we thank you for
11 the people who are willing to serve as Board of Police
12 Commissioners and other capacities to make this city a
13 better place for all who live, work and play here.

14 Lord, as we have this meeting tonight, let
15 the words of our mouths and the meditation of our
16 hearts be acceptable in your eyesight this day and
17 always, for you are Lord and our Redeemer.

18 And let the people of God say amen.

19 AUDIENCE: Amen.

20 MR. JOHNSON: Thank you very much.

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. At this
22 time I'm going to ask that each commissioner introduce
23 themselves starting with Commissioner Shelby.

24 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Commissioner Richard
25 Shelby, District 1.

1 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Hi. Conrad Mallett,
2 appointed by Mayor Mike Duggan.

3 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Commissioner
4 Reginald Crawford, commissioner of District 3.

5 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Commissioner Derrick
6 Sanders, appointed.

7 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Willie
8 Bell, Vice Chair, District 4.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioner Willie
10 Burton, District 5.

11 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Commissioner Eva
12 Garza Dewaelsche.

13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Police Commissioner
14 Ricardo Moore, District 7.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

16 And I am Lisa Carter representing District
17 6.

18 At this time I'd like to introduce
19 Assistant Chief James White. Thank you for joining
20 us, sir.

21 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time, Attorney
23 Bernard, could you introduce the rest of the staff,
24 please.

25 ATTORNEY BERNARD: Yes. Linda Bernard,

1 attorney to the board, acting for George Anthony,
2 secretary to the board.

3 Ms. Gail Oxendine is not here, is not
4 present. Pamela Davis-Drake the chief investigator,
5 and Robert Brown the administrative assistant are
6 present, Madam Chairperson, and George Anthony is
7 excused.

8 And the record should also reflect that
9 we've just been joined by Commissioner Elizabeth
10 Brooks.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

12 ATTORNEY BERNARD: Madam Chairperson, you
13 do have a quorum.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you Attorney
15 Bernard.

16 At this time, I'd like to give thanks to
17 the Arab-American and Chaldean Council for their
18 accommodations here. Is there anyone from the -- he's
19 not? Yes. Step to the podium, please.

20 Thank you. We'd just like to say thank you
21 for welcoming -- right here -- for having us here, and
22 if you'd like to say a few words. Thank you.

23 MR. PHILLIPS: Well, welcome to the ACC,
24 Arab-American Chaldean Council. This is your home as
25 well as ours in the neighborhood. I'm a 35-year

1 resident of this neighborhood, love it to death,
2 wouldn't move for nothing in the world. And we feel
3 that way at ACC. We're proud to have the outstanding
4 men and women in blue. Any time we can help you we're
5 here, me and Thayer (ph). We basically man this
6 building 24 hours a day, five, seven days a week. I
7 recognize some people in the crowd. You know, this is
8 family.

9 So welcome to ACC. If you ever need us, my
10 name is Virgil Phillips. I'm the after school
11 community liaison. And what I do is kind of like what
12 you're doing today, you know, help set up and help
13 welcome people to ACC and tell you what we do here. I
14 do a lot with the community kids here, and safety is a
15 main function of what I do. I try to involve the
16 community residents so we can participate in our own
17 safety. And that means just being involved in your
18 community. So I'm living proof that that's what we do
19 at ACC.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, sir.

21 (APPLAUSE)

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair, I
23 just want to add a few words.

24 Coach Virgil Phillips, man, you kept this
25 gym open, you know, when I was a kid coming up, and I

1 definitely took advantage of those resources that they
2 had. And want to say thank you, Coach Phillips.

3 MR. PHILLIPS: You're welcome, man.

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes.

5 MR. PHILLIPS: Good to see you, too.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. At this
7 time, Commissioners, you have before you the agenda
8 for Thursday, January 14th. Is there a motion to
9 approve?

10 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: So moved.

11 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
13 supported that we approve the agenda for Thursday,
14 January 14.

15 Is there any discussion? Those in favor?

16 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

18 The motion carries.

19 At this time, Commissioners, you have
20 before you the minutes from Thursday, January 7, 2016.
21 Is there a motion for approval?

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Abstain.

23 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: So moved.

24 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Support.

25 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Support.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
2 supported.

3 Is there any discussion?

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes. Through the
5 Chair, I'd like to abstain for January 7 for our
6 meeting, because I wasn't allowed to really speak.
7 And I felt like, you know, the hundred and some
8 thousand family people that I represent in my
9 district, you know, they were disenfranchised, you
10 know, when I was not able to speak. So I will abstain
11 on that.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those in favor of the
13 motion?

14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

16 The motion carries, noting one abstention.

17 At this time, I'm going to -- I do not have
18 anything to report, and we're going to move on to the
19 presentation.

20 A.C. White.

21 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Once again, good
22 evening.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Good evening.

24 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: The Chief of Police
25 sends his regrets. He has a meeting at New Era

1 Detroit that he had to attend this evening.

2 As you're aware, we continue to strive --

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I'm sorry, Chief, to
4 interrupt you, but can you introduce the rest of your
5 staff before we --

6 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Oh, I'm sorry.
7 Blazing through this.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: That's okay.

9 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: I'll have the staff
10 stand up and introduce themselves.

11 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: Captain Ken Balinski,
12 12th Precinct.

13 COMMANDER THOMAS: Commander Johnny Thomas,
14 Organized Crime.

15 COMMANDER BARREN: Commander Elvin Barren,
16 Metropolitan District.

17 DEPUTY CHIEF LEVALLEY: Deputy Chief David
18 LeValley, Neighborhood Precinct West.

19 CAPTAIN PRICHETT: Captain Jacqueline
20 Prichett, Eighth Precinct.

21 CAPTAIN BLISS: Captain Mark Bliss, Fifth
22 Precinct.

23 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Deputy Chief
24 Fitzgerald, Detective Bureau.

25 OFFICER WALTON: Steve Walton, Sixth

1 Precinct.

2 CAPTAIN JARVIS: Captain Donna Jarvis,
3 Communications.

4 (INAUDIBLE): Neighborhood Precinct Bureau
5 West.

6 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: And I want to
7 introduce the hardworking sergeant you have, too, from
8 your staff, don't forget.

9 (APPLAUSE).

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Somebody stood up on
11 this end as well.

12 CAPTAIN WILLIAMS: Captain Donald Williams,
13 Metropolitan Division.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

15 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: All right. Thank
16 you. Certainly not overlooking them, because they
17 work very, very hard. And we have a lot of
18 initiatives and a lot of wins because of this team.
19 So I'm going to give them a big hand.

20 (APPLAUSE)

21 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Okay. Back to my
22 very quick agenda. As I indicated, the Chief sends
23 his regrets for not being here tonight due to a
24 previously scheduled meeting.

25 As you're aware, the Auto Show is fully

1 engaged. Commander Barren is on top of it, is
2 engaged. We have our resources on the ground, and
3 we're prepared to have a safe, inviting event for all.
4 And so we ask the community to come out and enjoy.

5 We launched our Green Light initiative this
6 week. I believe the press conference was Monday. The
7 Green Light initiative will start with gas stations,
8 but we're hoping to grow that program. It's in a
9 testing phase now. The test phase is scheduled to
10 conclude early February. It will take lessons learned
11 from the test phase and look to grow the program.

12 For those that don't know, at the very
13 basic level it is video feed from gas stations into
14 the realtime crime center, which we use for a variety
15 of different reasons, not just crime, but gathering
16 intel. But at the high level we're doing a lot of
17 other things other than just monitoring gas stations
18 at realtime crime. There are a lot of things that
19 we're looking to do there from using technology to
20 help fight crime, everything from facial recognition
21 technology and a lot of other things that we're going
22 to do as we move forward with that program.

23 So we're excited about that. It's
24 certainly something that I haven't personally seen.
25 I'm not saying we're the only ones that's using this

1 format, but I haven't seen any other departments
2 that's doing it. And we're hoping that that's going
3 to be a very successful endeavor.

4 We graduated 21 students out of the police
5 academy last Friday. They started their field
6 training program at the police precincts. In addition
7 to that, the Fifth Precinct as you know it opened a
8 few weeks ago. It is now fully operational. There
9 are some growing pains, some technology issues that
10 we're working through, but for the most part the
11 precinct is up and operational with the assistance of
12 Captain Bliss.

13 We appointed seven detectives earlier
14 through today, this afternoon during our new concept
15 meeting. And I say new concept meeting, because
16 there's a new process that the first presentation of
17 it looks like it's going to be a success. Certainly
18 it moves a lot more rapid than the other process, and
19 it seems to get into the issues a lot cleaner. So we
20 invite the board to come out and view CompStat
21 whenever they wish. It is now moved to a two-week
22 format. So we will send you the schedule and let you
23 know when the next meeting is. The next meeting is
24 actually two weeks from today, and I believe we're
25 doing the west side precinct --

1 AUDIENCE MEMBER: East side.

2 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: East side precinct.

3 And with that, that concludes my report,
4 and we'll have a presentation from Captain Balinski
5 momentarily.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Commissioners,
7 do you have any questions for Assistant Chief White?

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair,
9 Assistant Chief, how are the gas station selected for
10 the Green Light project?

11 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Well, we opened it
12 up to all gas stations during a meeting. Commander
13 Bettison held a meeting with the gas station owners,
14 and these were the first group of eight that wanted to
15 participate.

16 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And do we have a
17 capacity to have more gas stations?

18 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Absolutely. We
19 have a capacity to have more businesses, but it
20 appears that the gas stations will be our primary
21 group that want to participate early on. But we've
22 heard from other businesses that want to engage as
23 well.

24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And have you heard
25 that, on a separate note, that some officers haven't

1 received their pay raises?

2 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: I'm sorry?

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Have you heard, on a
4 separate note, that some officers haven't received
5 their pay raises that they were promised?

6 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: No, I have not
7 heard that.

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And some retirees
9 haven't received some checks. I'll talk to you about
10 that offline.

11 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Okay.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions,
13 Commissioners?

14 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: Madam Chair, I just
15 want to say that I had an opportunity to represent you
16 as you well know at the press conference and along
17 with Commissioner Burton and Commissioner Dewaelsche
18 and our board attorney. And we also had opportunity
19 to review -- I will say to monitor the whole process
20 on the seventh floor. And we were really highly
21 impressed with the technology and high tech and high
22 definition. And you can see the license plate and you
23 can see the whole process. So that's a -- really a
24 step. I met all the service station owners, too, and
25 they have made a commitment to public safety in the

1 city of Detroit and participate in terms of the
2 format. People are really pleased with that. I'm
3 just getting feedback what they witnessed, but they
4 haven't really experienced it yet, but I just want to
5 say that it's high tech.

6 And also the graduation class I had an
7 opportunity, along with other commissioners here,
8 Brooks and Eva Dewaelsche and I think Commissioner
9 Crawford. That was a outstanding class. We had
10 opportunity to interact that Thursday and that Friday
11 morning, and as always they looked very, very sharp --

12 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Thank you.

13 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: -- in terms of the
14 academy class. So we're looking forward to more
15 graduations, more police officers on the city streets.

16 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Thank you very
17 much.

18 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam Chair?

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Crawford.

20 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Assistant Chief, on
21 the CompStat meetings are still downtown ten o'clock,
22 10 a.m.?

23 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: 10:30.

24 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: 10:30?

25 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: 10:30, third floor.

1 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir. Thank
2 you.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions?

4 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Madam Chair, I
5 don't have a question. I just have a comment that I'd
6 like to make, and I think this would be the most
7 appropriate time.

8 I've noticed -- I'm a lifelong resident of
9 the city of Detroit, and I've noticed that with the
10 real high profile crimes that have been taking place
11 in the city that the department has been exemplary in
12 capturing those people that are committing these
13 crimes in such a short period of time. And I've never
14 noticed that in the past as much as I have, you know,
15 this past few two or three years maybe.

16 And I just wonder do you attribute it -- is
17 there something that you can attribute it? I know
18 everybody's working very hard, but it just seems as
19 soon as we hear about it on the news, you know, a day
20 later they're captured. So I just want to commend
21 your department for the work that they're doing and
22 keep it up. And whatever it is -- whatever area is
23 helping you to achieve this success, you know, maybe
24 we need to help support it even more financially. I
25 would like to know.

1 And so thank you for your work. I feel
2 very safe in the city of Detroit.

3 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Well, I'm very glad
4 to hear that, and I have to be honest. We have a
5 dynamic team and one of the strongest teams I've ever
6 been associated with under the leadership of Chief
7 Craig. But we get the privilege of working with some
8 of the hardest working men and women that -- I mean
9 that are extraordinarily passionate. I'm going to
10 highlight three of them right now.

11 Is Chuck Fitzgerald here? Would you stand
12 up, Chuck. Dave LeValley. And is Nick Giaquinto in
13 the room?

14 Now, there's a lot of other people here
15 that -- and I don't want to undercut anybody, but
16 these are the guys I beat up every day, okay.

17 And Chuck Fitzgerald runs Organized Crime,
18 Homicide, very, very passionate, hardworking deputy
19 chief.

20 The gentleman in the middle, Nick
21 Giaquinto, also a lifelong Detroiter, leads from the
22 front. He's our analytics person.

23 And then Dave LeValley we just pretty much
24 blame him for everything that goes wrong, but I will
25 tell you he is very dynamic in coming up with

1 solution-based policing.

2 And with that group the Chief and all the
3 men and women you see here -- but again, I'm going to
4 point to the ones we beat up often. I'm in the
5 meetings with them every day. That's how we're
6 getting this done. There's no magic. I mean, we get
7 to work with some of the finest men and women in the
8 country. That's how we do it.

9 (APPLAUSE)

10 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you. All I
11 can say is thank you, because I feel very safe as a
12 resident of the city of Detroit. Thank you very much.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair,
14 I'd just like to acknowledge Captain Hope over there.
15 She does a lot of great work over in my district in,
16 you know, keeping the residents safe in the fifth
17 district, so ...

18 (APPLAUSE)

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: And Captain Balinski,
20 are you ready to --

21 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: I'm ready.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: -- do your report?
23 Thank you.

24 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: First of all, I'd like
25 to welcome the board, A.C. White, my colleagues and

1 the citizens for attending this meeting here in the
2 12th Precinct. I'm Ken Balinski, the captain of the
3 12th Precinct, presenting tonight.

4 A little bit about our precinct. We're
5 located at 1441 West Seven Mile Road, and we encompass
6 13 square miles. And we're bounded by Eight Mile to
7 the north, south by McNichols, Fenkell and the Lodge
8 freeway, west by Greenfield and Schaefer, and east by
9 John R and the Highland Park border.

10 The city of Detroit properties and private
11 property within the 12th Precinct consist of the
12 Northwest Activity Center, our Gateway Market that
13 includes Meijer's as the anchor store, and I might add
14 a new Planet Fitness that had just opened up over
15 there. And that continues to grow with our new
16 Applebee's, which is one fine restaurant over there,
17 great food, let me tell you. And also the Avenue of
18 Fashion that's making a comeback with Kuzzo's, at the
19 1917 American Bistro there and in the future the
20 Bucharest Grill. So business wise the 12th Precinct
21 is really growing strong at this time.

22 According to our most recent census, 12th
23 Precinct's population is approximately 75,000
24 citizens.

25 Other points of interest, within number 12

1 we have 20 learning facilities, four high schools, 14
2 elementary schools and middle schools along with two
3 centers of higher learning, U of D Mercy and Marygrove
4 College.

5 Just a little bit about the 12th Precinct.
6 We deploy a home invasion task force for a lot of our
7 property crimes, and this year they helped reduce home
8 invasions by five percent. Other notable crime
9 reductions were homicides in our precinct were down 17
10 percent, rapes were down 13 percent, robbery was down
11 17 percent, and stolen vehicles were down 19 percent
12 last year.

13 I want to introduce our neighborhood
14 policing officers, and they do a lot of work. I know
15 all the citizens in number 12, the neighborhood
16 organizations, know who their neighborhood policing
17 officers are.

18 I want to introduce NPO Michael Crowder.
19 Stand Mike.

20 (APPLAUSE)

21 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: NPO Nathaniel Womack.

22 (APPLAUSE)

23 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: NPO Shannon Bullock.

24 (APPLAUSE)

25 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: And NPO Tania Stribling.

1 (APPLAUSE)

2 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: And I want to give
3 Shirley her dos again, because she ramrods all of our
4 community relations, and that's Sergeant Bledsoe.

5 (APPLAUSE)

6 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: Currently at the 12th
7 Precinct we have ten youth explorers in our program,
8 and we hope to grow that this year.

9 Currently we're planning our 2016 Police
10 Week that we involve the neighborhoods in. We involve
11 children in so that they can see what we do at the
12 precinct. And we get a lot of help during that week
13 from our radio patrols, along with a lot of the
14 citizens who come in and take a look at what's going
15 on in our precinct.

16 A lot of the Police Week we also do a lot
17 of teaching about gun safety. Bike safety
18 presentations are made to the kids. And the students
19 we get make sure that they're fed that day, give them
20 a light lunch.

21 On August 2nd of this year we're going to
22 be doing our National Night Out. This year we had a
23 great National Night Out. It was back at the
24 precincts again, and it was very well attended I want
25 to say by at least 2- to 300 citizens who came and saw

1 the National Night Out to say goodbye to crime.

2 Our Angels Night task force, Sergeant
3 Bledsoe and the NPOs always have a haunted house for
4 the kids. That was also very well attended, but this
5 year was a little unique. We had a haunted hayride,
6 and the haunted hayride line from the time it started
7 until the time it ended was completely full all the
8 time.

9 Cheryl, how many people -- how many kids
10 and adults would you say --

11 NPO CROWDER: We had about 500.

12 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: And the hayride was
13 successful. Unfortunately we had a couple of the
14 kids, because it was so realistic with the ghosts
15 coming out of the woods, it was going through our
16 parking lot. And if you know the 12th Precinct,
17 there's a fence line that goes back into the woods by
18 Palmer Park, and that's exactly where the hayride
19 would go along and ghouls and goblins would pop out of
20 the trees and stuff. And it was very unique, very
21 well attended. And I thank the NPOs and Cheryl for
22 putting that on. It was a fantastic job.

23 (APPLAUSE)

24 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: Other things we
25 participate in, the Old Newsboy Goodfellow

1 organization. This year we passed out 4,300
2 Goodfellow boxes to low income residents. And also we
3 passed out holiday baskets, food.

4 And again, we were part of the Sergeant
5 Santa and Chief Kringle event where two of our
6 families were visited by the Chief. One of our
7 families was the family of the young man that was
8 mauled by the dog, and they were in need and they were
9 very, very thankful for what we did for them this
10 year.

11 Lastly I want to talk about -- Chief White
12 talked about the Green Light initiative. Okay. We
13 have our own gas station initiative also. And, by the
14 way, our Green Light is 8930 West McNichols, Marathon
15 gas station, Wyoming and McNichols. And I have to
16 give kudos to the owner, Nassar Beydoun, who put the
17 money and invested in that.

18 I will say without going into too much
19 depth, because it's an ongoing investigation, we were
20 doing a canvas on a shooting, and lo and behold that
21 camera picked up our suspect. Okay. It works. It
22 really works. And I want to be specific. The
23 shooting was not at the gas station. Just we had
24 information that that person may have been there for a
25 second buying something before they went and did their

1 dastardly deed, and we went there and that camera was
2 sharp. We received a lot of calls when that went out
3 to the media and identified the person.

4 Also, we have a project that was piloted by
5 the NPOs and Ms. Holly Clemons who lives in the
6 University District. And she's part of an
7 organization called No More Broken Windows. And we
8 had meetings with the gas station owners to get them
9 to help us with all the violations, loose cigarettes
10 and so on, and they came through. They ended up
11 buying signs to put up on their gas stations. We have
12 31 gas stations. All 31 participated in that.

13 And the signs, I will pull them out in a
14 second to show you, basically said we don't sell loose
15 cigarettes and, you know, that we're going to -- you
16 know, we don't want any loitering or trespassing on
17 the property.

18 And we were asked at a CompStat meeting one
19 time when we presented this program how are you going
20 to enforce this. Well, Lieutenant Henry, who's not
21 here today, Pride Henry, got two police officers and a
22 civilian together, and they inspected for three months
23 each and every gas station.

24 And the following -- there were 166
25 compliance checks made during this period of time.

1 There were 44 violations issued for different things,
2 not just loose cigarettes. There might have been
3 narcotic paraphernalia and so on. Five MLCC
4 violations. And out of all of those that were
5 violated, when we continued the program going through,
6 we only had 11 repeat offenders. And of those we had
7 one four-time offender, which we're currently working
8 on a nuisance abatement. On that particular the
9 hearing should be coming up in February.

10 And thus far we believe it has been a
11 success. We've gotten the gas station owners on our
12 side. We will be meeting with them early this year to
13 go over Phase 2 that we're going to come out and
14 enforce again. The key thing to it is it's not one of
15 those, hey, surprise, we're coming. We had meetings
16 with them. We told them you're accepting a
17 responsibility. When we give you these signs, when
18 you purchase these signs, we post them. It's your
19 responsibility to make sure you do what's on that
20 sign. And so we will bring them all back again and
21 warn them again.

22 So it's not a surprise. This isn't trying
23 to pick on anybody. This is, hey, we're coming. You
24 don't know when, you don't know what date, how or what
25 time, but we're coming, we're going to possibly have

1 somebody come in there that you don't even know and
2 you're going to sell them a loosey and then you're
3 going to get cited. So that's the -- what we've done
4 in the 12th Precinct.

5 Let me grab the signs really quick. Can I
6 shout a little bit or is that going to not get on the
7 record?

8 ATTORNEY BERNARD: I'm not sure. Can you
9 hear?

10 You have to use the microphone.

11 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: In the 12th Precinct if
12 you're going into a gas station you should see these
13 signs on the gas stations. And again, we will be
14 checking them out with sporadic checks to make sure
15 that we're getting the compliance that they said they
16 would give us. And as you can see by the enforcement
17 numbers that I gave you, we have really gotten a lot
18 of compliance out of the gas stations just based on
19 that. But again, we're going to check them again.

20 Our legal advisor, Celia Washington, also
21 assisted this, our group on it, to make sure that the
22 signs were legal and have some bite to them.

23 Any questions?

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Questions for Captain
25 Balinski?

1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes, ma'am.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner.

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Oh. Go ahead,
4 Commissioner Shelby.

5 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Captain Balinski,
6 what is the working relationship between you and the
7 Highland Park Police Department?

8 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: What's that, sir?

9 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: How is the working
10 relationship between 12th Precinct and the Highland
11 Park Police Department?

12 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: We have a good working
13 relationship. However, I have not contacted the new
14 chief yet, which I will be doing. And whenever we
15 have cross border problems, and it's the same at
16 Ferndale or any of our others, we contact -- I will
17 contact their chief and work things out. We have an
18 issue going right now that we're going to be working
19 with Ferndale and Oak Park on because of a certain
20 school over there that keeps causing us problems,
21 okay. So I know if they're causing us problems it's
22 got to be causing them problems. So we want to team
23 up and take care of that.

24 It's the same with Highland Park. If we
25 have known offenders that are from Highland Park and

1 such, we're going to make sure that we talk to the new
2 chief there and work together with them to help solve
3 those problems.

4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Captain Balinski, can
5 you talk about the stakeout that I heard about last
6 month from your precinct?

7 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: We had a meeting with
8 the business owners of the Avenue of Fashion. We had
9 noticed that there were several break-ins on the
10 Avenue of Fashion, and particularly one was getting
11 hit several times. Bear with me. And that was the
12 Flagship store. And there are other stores that were
13 being hit also. So I met with them and we came up
14 with a plan that we were going to plant officers
15 inside Flagship and do a stakeout figuring we'll take
16 the chance that they're going to come back and do it
17 again, seeing they'd already done it two times.

18 First night went by, nothing. Second night
19 went by, nothing. Third night went by, about five
20 o'clock in the morning when we were getting ready to
21 call it, all of a sudden, rattle, bing, bang and so
22 on. And I asked one of my officers. I said what did
23 you think was going on and besides they're coming in.
24 He says he just sat there, because they were in the
25 changing room. And he said he just sat there and go I

1 can't believe this is happening, because a lot of
2 times when we have these things -- we haven't done
3 that, and we decided to take that chance again and put
4 that stakeout there. It paid off. We arrested one
5 person. We're currently getting him to cooperate to
6 try to get the other two persons involved in that.

7 So in the future should we have any other
8 type of situations like that we're going to deploy
9 that way.

10 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you. I think
11 the word is on the street that the Detroit Police
12 Department as a whole would do stakeouts. So that's
13 kind of giving everyone credit citywide. So job well
14 done.

15 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: Correct. And I
16 appreciate the media coverage that was given to that,
17 because it was very important. And to date we have
18 not had another issue.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Other questions,
20 Commissioners?

21 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: Madam Chair, I just
22 have a comment.

23 I really like your approach in terms of the
24 signs dealing with the cigarettes. I think that's
25 really positive and enlightening about the city

1 ordinance and trying to get that type of cooperation.
2 So I like that initiative and appreciate that.

3 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: Thank you, sir.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Captain Balinski, how
5 are the signs paid for? And I might have missed that.
6 I'm sorry.

7 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: The gas station owners
8 buy them themselves.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: They buy them
10 themselves?

11 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: They pay for them
12 themselves.

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: And do you know
14 approximately how much it cost?

15 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: Mike?

16 NPO CROWDER: Twenty-six dollars a sign.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Per sign for this
18 steel one?

19 NPO CROWDER: I'm sorry?

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: For the steel one
21 and --

22 NPO CROWDER: Yes. Twenty-six dollars for
23 the steel sign, the metal and --

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The metal.

25 NPO CROWDER: -- approximately ten bucks

1 for the "no deuces."

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: All right. Thank you.

3 NPO CROWDER: You're welcome.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Captain.

5 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: Thank you very much.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Are there any standing
7 committee reports at this time, Commissioners?

8 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Yes, ma'am. Madam
9 Chairperson, we distributed -- or actually the chief
10 investigator's office distributed to all of the
11 commissioners the policy recommendations on the
12 chemical spray. The committee did not meet in person,
13 but met through the E-mail. Myself and the vice
14 chairman support the policy. The third member of the
15 committee, Commissioner Moore, abstained. And if he'd
16 like to offer an explanation obviously he's here and
17 can do so.

18 The committee hasn't voted on the policy,
19 Madam Chairperson. I would move the adoption of the
20 policy on providing our investigators chemical spray
21 devices.

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: I second that
23 motion, Madam Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
25 seconded that we provide the investigators of the

1 Board of Police Commissioners with pepper spray --
2 chemical spray.

3 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Chemical spray.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I'm sorry. Chemical
5 spray.

6 Is there any discussion?

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, through the
8 Chair. I'd like to know what other agencies and
9 departments as far as civilian boards such as ours
10 that their investigators are using chemical sprays.
11 I'd like to see as far as from NACOLE what NACOLE has
12 to say about this.

13 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Madam Chairperson,
14 with your permission. I did not, Commissioner Burton,
15 investigate what other jurisdictions were doing. I
16 might invite, Madam Chairperson, if you agree for the
17 chief investigator to comment.

18 MS. DAVIS-DRAKE: Thank you, Madam Chair.
19 Thank you, Commissioners.

20 I am not sure. I don't know if they carry
21 pepper spray. I know that several do carry firearms.
22 As you all know, our investigators are out on the
23 street canvassing and conducting inquiries through
24 businesses and also homes. And their safety obviously
25 is of the utmost concern to us.

1 So I'm certain that other jurisdictions do.
2 On a large scale, I don't know the answer to that, but
3 I do know that certain -- I know Cincinnati I believe
4 do carry firearms and some other areas do carry
5 firearms. I can't tell you how many actually carry
6 pepper spray. I know that DHS workers carry pepper
7 spray. I know that the post office, Postal Service,
8 they carry pepper spray.

9 And we've looked into all of those policies
10 in order to create this policy. It's also been
11 reviewed by our attorney for the board, Mr. Anthony,
12 the secretary of the board who's also an attorney, the
13 chief's legal counsel, by the -- A.C. White's staff,
14 Assistant Chief White's staff and so forth. So it has
15 been thoroughly vetted.

16 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam Chair?

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Mr. Crawford.

18 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: And also, too,
19 prior to this our investigators used to carry
20 firearms.

21 MS. DAVIS-DRAKE: Indeed they did, yes.

22 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you.

23 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: Madam Chair, I just
24 want to say this issue is crucial to the investigator
25 who served in that capacity out there different hours.

1 And I had the opportunity to work in an office about
2 five years along with Sergeant Bledsoe. And when they
3 were armed at one time that came about ten years they
4 had the opportunity, but this is a step in the right
5 direction.

6 And I would hope that we take the
7 initiative of this board to review that issue of the
8 firearm policy to thoroughly investigate it, because I
9 think it was arbitrarily, you know, taken away from
10 them. And now that we have oversight I think that's
11 the issue that we should really weigh in on in terms
12 of revisiting that issue, because -- I was not
13 familiar with the merits of it, but I know there was
14 no issue with an investigator carrying a firearm.
15 Even we had retired officers working in that office.
16 So that is crucial.

17 And you look at this day and age of being
18 on the city streets and the city car and you look like
19 the police, you walk like the police. And these are
20 challenging times. So anything that we can do,
21 especially tonight to vote this policy in, I think
22 would be really positive for those investigators to
23 feel somewhat safe in reference to this particular
24 item.

25 MS. DAVIS-DRAKE: I would appreciate that,

1 sir. Also, I'd like to add that the department is
2 going to provide us with the chemical weapon spray.
3 They have been very generous in assisting us through
4 this process, and I'd like to thank them as well for
5 moving this forward.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair, I
7 just want to add more -- may I, please?

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, I look at
10 it -- this is a civilian board, number one. Secondly,
11 you know, looking at our investigators, you know, they
12 are not the police, number one. And I don't think our
13 investigators for our office should be out there
14 carrying firearms.

15 But as far as the chemical spray I'd like
16 to see what NACOLE has to say about this and what
17 other civilian boards similar to Detroit Police Board
18 of Commissioners what are they using, and then we can
19 bring this back up for a later discussion, but -- you
20 know, I'm done.

21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair,
22 Chief Investigator, do our investigators have to go
23 outside the city of Detroit to conduct investigations?

24 MS. DAVIS-DRAKE: It's not something that's
25 mandated, but oftentimes they do go outside of the

1 city of Detroit to conduct an investigation. Local
2 areas, the metropolitan Detroit area, they have been
3 known to do that, but it's not a regular practice.

4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Does the policy
5 address that issue?

6 MS. DAVIS-DRAKE: The policy does not.
7 Well, let me -- I'm sorry. Let me say this. The
8 policy addresses the fact that they are carrying a
9 spray. So in whatever capacity it would cover them
10 carrying the spray. So if they go outside of the city
11 the policy stands firm.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Does the policy
13 address contact with outside agencies in that
14 particular jurisdiction?

15 MS. DAVIS-DRAKE: It does not.

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: Madam Chair, I call
17 for the question.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The motion is that we
19 adopt the policy to allow the investigators to carry
20 chemical spray.

21 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Yes.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any further
23 discussion?

24 Those in favor?

25 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Opposed.

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: One abstention.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: One abstention?

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: An abstention. Same
6 here -- I mean, yes.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay.

8 ATTORNEY BERNARD: Excuse me, Madam Chair.
9 Are there two abstentions?

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

11 The motion carries. The policy is adapted.
12 Thank you.

13 MS. DAVIS-DRAKE: Thank you, Madam Chair.
14 Thank you, Board.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Crawford?

16 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, Madam Chair.

17 Reporting out from the citizen complaint committee, I
18 read some 15 complaints this week. And I'm sure the
19 department and the executives are moving in perpetual
20 motion to change the culture of the department. I
21 might add -- and I've seen some progress, too, but
22 there's a lot of work that needs to be done in terms
23 of changing the culture of the department,
24 particularly concerning the officers.

25 At this time I want to thank Commander Sims

1 of Internal Affairs for the follow-up from last week's
2 question about the particular officer Trey Lyons (ph).
3 And lo and behold in my packet of 15 complaints he was
4 one who had a complaint filed against him.

5 However, I might add that the complaint was
6 not sustained. In another two areas he was
7 exonerated. But it just it speaks to the issue of not
8 only transparency, but accountability. Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Any other
10 committee reports?

11 All right. Is there any -- under new
12 business we have a resolution for Mrs. Margie McCall.
13 Is she in the audience?

14 MS. MCCALL: Yes.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Ms. McCall?

16 MS. MCCALL: Yes.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Step right up.
18 Commissioner Dewaelsche is going to present your award
19 to you. This area is represented by Commissioner Vann
20 who is not here tonight.

21 Step up here, ma'am.

22 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Would you step up
23 here, please, Mrs. Margie McCall. We have a
24 resolution honoring Mrs. Margie McCall. If you could
25 just face this way.

1 "So whereas Mrs. Margie McCall has been a
2 resident of the 12th Precinct for 30 years and has
3 been an active volunteer for the Community Relations
4 Unit. She is married to Lezely McCall."

5 Did I say that right?

6 MS. MCCALL: Yes.

7 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: "Lezely McCall.
8 And they both look forward to continuing their active
9 participation in the future.

10 "And whereas Mrs. McCall is a Lansing,
11 Michigan native and was awarded a four-year creative
12 arts scholarship in Michigan State University --

13 MS. MCCALL: Go green.

14 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: "-- with a
15 bachelor degree in English. She continued to pursue
16 higher education, obtaining a paralegal degree and
17 also took several classes toward a law degree. For
18 nearly 22 years she was an automotive litigation legal
19 assistant specializing in class action lawsuits and
20 governmental investigations for Ford Motor Company
21 until her retirement due to complications from kidney
22 disease.

23 "And whereas Mrs. McCall in 1994 became a
24 peer mentor certified by the National Kidney
25 Foundation of Michigan. In 2005 and 2006 she went to

1 Washington, D.C. as a lobbyist asking Congress to
2 maintain federal funding for the support and treatment
3 of kidney dialysis patients. Last year she was a
4 panelist for a national dialysis patient study that
5 will be presented to health care professionals in the
6 near future.

7 "And whereas Mrs. McCall is a devoted
8 advocate and spokesperson for the community of the
9 12th Precinct. She was an ambassador for the
10 Superbowl and a volunteer for the NCAA Final Four
11 Basketball Tournament held in Detroit.

12 "Now, therefore, be it resolved, that the
13 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners, speaking for
14 the citizens of the city of Detroit and the Detroit
15 Police Department, acknowledges the generous spirit of
16 Mrs. Margie McCall. Her unselfishness and dedication
17 to improving the quality of life for all citizens in
18 her community and throughout the city of Detroit
19 merits our highest regards.

20 "We thank and congratulate you, Mrs. Margie
21 McCall. The Board of Police Commissioners."

22 (APPLAUSE)

23 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: This is from the
24 Detroit Police Department. The Chief of Police sends
25 this "Certificate of Recognition and appreciation of

1 the following outstanding service and cooperation, for
2 your involvement in the community and services to the
3 city of Detroit, supporting our efforts in the
4 community, demonstrate spirit and commitment that is
5 truly worthy of recognition," presented to you this
6 evening.

7 Thank you.

8 (APPLAUSE)

9 CAPTAIN BALINSKI: Also, I want to present
10 you with a Spirit of Detroit Award from the Detroit
11 City Council. It is "presented herewith as an
12 expression of gratitude and esteem of the citizens of
13 Detroit to Mrs. Margie McCall in recognition of
14 exceptional achievement, outstanding leadership and
15 dedication to improving the quality of life," signed
16 by all the City Council members.

17 Thank you, Margie. Thank you.

18 (APPLAUSE)

19 PHOTOGRAPHER: Is your husband here with
20 you?

21 MS. MCCALL: Yes.

22 MR. MCCALL: By the way, my wife is a
23 published author.

24 PHOTOGRAPHER: Beautiful. Thank you.

25 (APPLAUSE)

1 MS. MCCALL: I was in a rather dark place
2 at the end of 2013. A dear person passed away and I
3 was feeling rather lost, and I wanted to do something
4 to honor the person that passed away. I heard on News
5 Radio 950 about the Sergeant Santa Toy Drive, and so I
6 called Community Relations and talked to Sergeant
7 Shirley Bledsoe. "What do you need? I need to do
8 something."

9 She said get some toys and bring them to
10 the 12th Precinct, so that's what I did and started
11 talking to sergeant Bledsoe. "Can I do something? I
12 need to do something to honor my dear friend."

13 We got to talking. Long story short, I
14 started answering phones at the 12th Precinct.

15 And I have to say I've gotten these awards,
16 but I have been so rewarded by the outstanding work
17 that the 12th Precinct Community Relations officers
18 do. And I have to admit, I had my stereotypes. I was
19 one of those people, I want a police officer now, come
20 to my house now, I pay taxes, where are you. And I
21 got to see the other side of how hard they work, how
22 dedicated they are.

23 Officer Tan (ph) and Womack and Bullock and
24 Crowder, they are an outstanding team of Shirley
25 Bledsoe. They really are.

1 (APPLAUSE)

2 MS. MCCALL: And I know that I couldn't do
3 this because of -- it's just a very difficult job, and
4 they do it graciously and with such passion and
5 dedication. So I got the awards, but you are my
6 reward.

7 (APPLAUSE)

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.
9 Commissioners, is there a motion for --

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: So moved.

11 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Second.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The motion is for the
14 adoption of the resolution for Ms. Margie McCall, and
15 it's been moved and supported that we adopt the
16 resolution for Ms. Margie McCall.

17 Is there any discussion?

18 Those in favor?

19 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

21 The motion carries.

22 Thank you, Ms. Margie McCall, for all that
23 you do.

24 (APPLAUSE)

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: We have 12th Precinct.

1 So hopefully there's a Ms. Margie McCall in every
2 precinct. We need one. And thank you for your
3 service.

4 At this time, Commissioners, I'd like to
5 acknowledge a few public officials that are here.
6 Judge David Perkins. I'm sorry.

7 AUDIENCE MEMBER: That's okay.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Judge David Perkins.

9 (APPLAUSE)

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Also representatives
11 from Councilwoman Brenda Jones' office and Councilman
12 Cushingberry's office, Mr. Divers, Linda from Council
13 President Brenda Jones' office. Thank you for coming
14 out.

15 Are there any other public officials or
16 representatives here?

17 Okay. Thank you. Under old business, is
18 there any old business?

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: Madam Chair, I'd
20 like to lift up two very, very important items. First
21 of all, we are aggressively hiring. We are seeking
22 police officers for the city of Detroit DPD. We
23 graduated 21 and we have another class scheduled for
24 March. And the mayor, Mayor Duggan, Chief Craig, they
25 are putting together a team of officers going to be

1 out there I guess eight hours a day and seeking police
2 officers.

3 There's also a bonus for police officers to
4 sign up people, and if they go through the academy
5 they get a bonus. But you the citizens we need to
6 share this with you. You need to tell somebody. You
7 need to talk it up, because we need you. People
8 complain about Detroiters not being hired in. Well,
9 you the resident know these young people. We have
10 four high schools in -- I heard the report from the
11 Captain, in this area, right, four high schools. So
12 we want to encourage them if they're not going to
13 Howard, they're not going to Michigan State right now,
14 or if they're even going, we also brought back tuition
15 reimbursement for officers. So this is the career
16 path. So we need you to share the good news.

17 The second item that we are looking for
18 Detroit Police reservists. That's another way you can
19 serve. We should be making this announcement at all
20 our meetings. We should have literature. We'll make
21 sure we rectify that.

22 So we need -- we're competing -- I just saw
23 just this weekend coming up Michigan State Police
24 looking for female officers, State Police, right.
25 Well, we're competing also. So we want the finest to

1 come out of our community. So you can be that voice.

2 Raise your right hand. You are recruiters
3 now. Thank you. Thank you.

4 We serious about this, and the council is
5 committed.

6 MS. PANNELL: The website where they --

7 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, the website.

8 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Of course I don't
9 have it. You can just go to the City of Detroit
10 website, follow the link to police and recruiting.

11 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: The pay raise is
12 going up. It kicked in January the 1st.

13 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE? January 1st.

14 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: But, as you well
15 know, we don't hire in this for the salary. We make a
16 commitment to serve. That is the history of people
17 joining, because you will never get compensated for
18 putting your life on the line. So it's a commitment.

19 And, as I spoke to the academy class, you
20 are now part of a family and we want more and more.
21 We need recruits. We graduated third and fourth
22 generation of police officers this past Friday at
23 Greater Grace. So that tells you something about the
24 family tradition. And especially for the
25 African-American community in terms of third and

1 fourth generation. So this is really a career path so
2 we need you to recruit.

3 Thank you, Madam Chair.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

5 Commissioner Crawford.

6 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam Chair, I know
7 the previous several meetings it's been stated who's
8 been the highest vote getter that sits at the table.
9 I am the highest vote getter that sits at the table.

10 And the reason I say this is -- and it's
11 really irrelevant to me about the number of votes.
12 Only thing I'm thankful for, and I love and respect
13 all those who voted for me in my district and I love
14 and respect everyone who resides in my district, but
15 for District 3 I got 11,597 votes. That was 97.23
16 percent. Mr. Burton received 10,049 votes. That's
17 55.23 percent. This is a matter of setting the record
18 straight and a matter of truth and fact.

19 Thank you.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair, I
21 want to acknowledge Officer Crowder. You did a fine
22 job as we were coming into this facility for the board
23 meeting. You did a fine job as far as observing all
24 of us as we was coming in and, you know, looking out
25 for everybody who's in the parking facility as we was

1 coming in. So thank you for your service.

2 NPO CROWDER: You're welcome.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

4 Any other old business?

5 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Through the Chair.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Shelby.

7 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Point of information.

8 Yesterday I attended a meeting in District 1. The
9 meeting was hosted by Councilman Tate. There was a
10 group of citizens came together to address gun
11 violence in the city of Detroit. We came together.
12 We offered solutions for addressing the gun violence
13 in the city of Detroit.

14 I want to personally thank Commander
15 Barren. He came out to the meeting. He offered a lot
16 of his insight to the meeting. It was a very
17 productive meeting. It's another meeting that
18 District 1 is going to have with solutions to
19 addressing gun violence in the city of Detroit.

20 So, Commander Barren, thank you again.

21 (APPLAUSE)

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Mr. Shelby. I'm
23 sorry. Is there -- did you say there was another
24 meeting?

25 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Yes. The meeting is

1 going to be on the 27th.

2 Is that correct?

3 COMMANDER BARREN: Yes, sir.

4 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: 27th. It's going to
5 be on Lahser right there off of Grand River. And they
6 have refreshments, too. They have nice food there.

7 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Where?

8 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: It starts at six
9 o'clock. I don't have the address. It's the --

10 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Can you send it to me?

11 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Yeah, I can send it
12 to you. It's the coffee house right there at Grand
13 River and Lahser where Councilman Tate has the
14 meetings every first and third Wednesday.

15 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Grand River?

16 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: The meeting's going
17 to take place at 6 p.m. on the 27th.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

19 Commissioner Moore.

20 COMMISSIONER MOORE: You mentioned
21 Commander Barren, and I thought about emergency
22 management right off the top.

23 How often do you do tabletop exercises?

24 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Commander Barren,
25 can you ...

1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And could you explain
2 what a tabletop exercise is?

3 COMMANDER BARREN: Commander Barren, for
4 the record, Metropolitan Division. We do them all.
5 We reach out to different businesses, whether it's the
6 Rock Ventures, whether it's the City of Detroit
7 Airport. We participate in tabletops from
8 Metropolitan Airport. We do annual tabletops and
9 practical on-hand exercises with our Border Patrol and
10 tunnel exercises.

11 So to explain to the group what a tabletop
12 exercise is is we go over a scenario. The most recent
13 one we did is with the Auto Show. So we had a
14 scenario based on what's happening around the country
15 and the Paris attacks, San Bernadino, California
16 attacks. We had a scenario where at the Auto Show
17 there was a group of protestors in the main corridor
18 of the Auto Show. They were armed with weapons. Yes,
19 just -- again, it's just the --

20 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Simulated.

21 COMMANDER BARREN: Simulated, yes. So part
22 of the exercise is they are exercising their open
23 carry rights.

24 And down at the Auto Show the main corridor
25 is open to the public and the People Mover is open to

1 the public, but the actual entrance of the Auto Show
2 is a private event. So the individuals were
3 conducting their open carry. A couple of them engaged
4 the crowd in an active shooter role and it detailed
5 how the Detroit Police Department, along with our
6 counterparts, respond to that situation to deal with
7 it, eliminate the threat and keep the people safe.

8 So as we on the subject of the Auto Show,
9 as the A.C. mentioned, we have reached out to the SWAT
10 teams from the FBI, Wayne County Sheriff's Department
11 and Michigan State Police where they're embedded with
12 our SWAT team for a coverage of the Auto Show through
13 the entire event.

14 Additionally, and it's been good over the
15 past five or six years, we had issues with what they
16 used to call a gang night where a lot of activity, a
17 lot of fights, and have brought negativity to the
18 event. So we have -- our units will be working those
19 events where there's our task forces, our
20 relationships with the viper units from the air
21 marshals. So we're going to have coverage from multi
22 agencies to assist us due to the high expectations of
23 crowd. And they're estimating about 850,000 will
24 attend this year.

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Commander.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Commander.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Commander.

3 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: If I can through
4 the Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

6 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: I have the website.
7 DetroitMI.gov/recruiting.

8 And the other thing I want to just take a
9 moment to acknowledge some other folks. You know, one
10 thing when you acknowledge or highlight, it's those
11 that you don't that get the most attention. It is
12 really the momentum of team that gets us where we are
13 today. Certainly I deal closely with the people that
14 I highlighted, but there's others that make the thing
15 go.

16 Commander Barren, his captain, Captain
17 Williams, day and night are out in the field dealing
18 with Homeland Security issues.

19 I don't see Captain Slappey, but I thought
20 I saw her earlier.

21 AUDIENCE MEMBER: She's out there.

22 AUDIENCE MEMBER: There she go.

23 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Captain Slappey
24 runs the Homicide Unit. So a lot of the success is
25 due to Captain Slappey's leadership in running

1 Homicide.

2 And then we have certainly one of the
3 biggest problems plaguing the city and that has a
4 homicide nexus is narcotics. And we've got Commander
5 Johnny Thomas that runs that operation.

6 And none of this is possible without the
7 community. And then we've got a lieutenant back here
8 and Lieutenant Miles that is very engaged in the
9 community.

10 (APPLAUSE)

11 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: So, as you can
12 imagine, I can go on and on and on. It is the
13 momentum of team that makes this work. So I just want
14 to make sure that I project that message that it's
15 everybody, but certainly those that I highlighted are
16 the ones I beat up on a daily basis. So it's thanks
17 to those people that we're realizing the success that
18 we have.

19 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Did you hand pick your
20 team, Assistant Chief?

21 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: No, I did not hand
22 pick the team. They were promoted on merit and hard
23 work.

24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, A.C. White.

1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair, I
2 just want to say Captain Slappey -- the first time I
3 met Captain Slappey over at headquarters is that I had
4 a issue with something or whatever. I brought it to
5 her. She was right on top of it, you know. She does
6 a great job, you know. So I love your leadership,
7 Captain Slappey.

8 CAPTAIN SLAPPEY: Thank you. Thank you
9 very much.

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

11 Thank you, Captain Slappey, for stepping
12 in. Appreciate it.

13 At this time under announcements, the next
14 Board of Police Commissioners meeting will be
15 Thursday, January 21st at 3 p.m. at the Detroit Public
16 Safety Headquarters located at 1301 Third Street in
17 the Michigan Room. Our next Board of Police
18 Commissioners community meeting will be in the Ninth
19 Precinct, February 11th, 2016 at the Grace Church of
20 the Nazarene located at 18020 Hoover Street, Detroit,
21 Michigan 48205.

22 At this time we will have oral
23 communications from the audience. Please give your
24 name and limit your comments to two minutes, please.

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Madam Chair, I think

1 we erred on the agenda. The next BOPC community
2 meeting is not at the 12th Precinct. We're in the
3 12th Precinct now.

4 AUDIENCE MEMBER: She said Ninth.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I said Ninth.

6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Well then I'm out of
7 turn. I'm sorry. I apologize.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Oral
9 communications at this time.

10 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: Hi. Deputy
11 Chief David LeValley. Real quick, I just want to
12 mention to everybody that you probably received a
13 Citizens Satisfaction Survey on your way in. Over the
14 next couple of months we're going to be passing those
15 out at a number of different locations throughout the
16 entire city of Detroit. So, if you received one and
17 you have something you wanted to tell us, please be
18 honest and -- be brutally honest. We can take it.
19 And a lot of times that's the best way to get some of
20 the information or some change that you want to see
21 implemented. I know we communicate a lot regularly
22 with the board, but if you tell one person it may not
23 change, but if I see it on these surveys at the end
24 then we can implement some changes and try to make
25 improvement. Thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Deputy
2 Chief.

3 MS. SMITH: I guess I'll be your first one.
4 Bernice Smith, community activist. Last week we had a
5 discussion, and we're not going to bring it up
6 tonight, but the fact is we had a long talk with the
7 person in question and I agree with some of things he
8 said.

9 First of all, congratulations that you're
10 still with us, White. We don't need you in Ann Arbor.

11 Also, I've got plenty of notes here. I
12 want to let all you guys know I talked with Chief
13 James Tolbert today. You know, I have to go out in
14 Flint and find out what's going on over there, because
15 our radio program went over there and broadcast. And
16 he gave me all the kudos at anybody can get. He's
17 doing okay over there, but he want to send his
18 extended hello to all the officers and find out what
19 you're doing. And I gave you good kudos and talked
20 about you, how good you're doing in getting all the
21 crooks out the city. So, in other words, you're doing
22 a good job as far as I'm concerned. So I will praise
23 you from now on.

24 I had a dream last night. I got to tell
25 you about it right quick. I thought I won that money,

1 and I was giving all the police officers a thousand
2 dollars. I dreamt that, I swear I did. So I just
3 have that much love for you. I really dreamt that,
4 but anyway I did have it, too, though.

5 What I would like to tell you, I was at
6 headquarters today by mistake, because I left another
7 meeting and came there by mistake, and I saw the Chief
8 there with his press conference. And he made -- gave
9 a lot of information in regards to the young man that
10 was killed. I didn't get his name, but anyway they
11 did catch two of the culprits in case you didn't know
12 it.

13 So, yes, the police department is doing a
14 great job in catching these crooks, and I'm proud of
15 you just like you were my children, because I am older
16 than all of you. But the fact is I want you to be
17 careful out there, as I always tell you, and watch
18 your back and don't be careless, because we want to
19 see you forever as far as I'm concerned as long as the
20 good Lord keeps you here on earth.

21 Again, I thank you for your time, and
22 everything is going to be all right. We're not going
23 to do anymore discussion like we had last week. We're
24 going to be fine. And I want you to cooperate with
25 each other.

1 You, Mallett, along with Brooks, I want you
2 to get that budget together and make sure that we're
3 aware of what's going on with the police commission
4 board, because it is important for all of us to know,
5 not only between the members, we all need to know what
6 -- yeah, I know, Brown.

7 So again, thank you very much for your
8 time.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

10 MS. PANSELL: Good evening. My name is
11 Sharon Pannell. I'm representing Detroit Police
12 Citizens Academy.

13 I'm just letting you know that we have a
14 new class starting up in March just in case anybody
15 want to get involved in it. It tells you about --
16 it's a six-week class about what the police does, you
17 know, different entities of the police. And they come
18 out and they explain stuff to you and shooting -- they
19 take us to the shooting range, they take you on a
20 ride-along. You go to 911. It's very rewarding. So
21 I would advise you if you haven't been you should try
22 that class. Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Ms.
24 Pannell.

25 AUDIENCE MEMBER: What's the name of

1 the ...

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Citizens Academy.

3 MS. WESLEY: Good evening, Commissioners.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Good evening.

5 MS. WESLEY: Happy new year. I give you
6 greetings on behalf of Council President Brenda Jones,
7 and I just wanted to let everyone know that Council
8 President is recuperating. She's doing well. She
9 wants you all to know that she is working from her
10 bed, and if you need her please feel free to give her
11 a call.

12 Also, we wanted to make sure that everyone
13 knows that the evening -- the City Council evening
14 community meeting is going to be Tuesday, January 26th
15 from 6 -- I'm sorry, from 7:00 to 8:30, and it will be
16 at the Northwest Activity Center in District 2.

17 We also want to invite anyone that's
18 interested in skilled trades to come out to our
19 skilled trades task force meeting that will also take
20 place on Tuesday, January 26th from 4 p.m. until
21 6 p.m., and that will be at WC3, the Northwest Campus
22 on West Outer Drive and Southfield Freeway in District
23 1.

24 We thank you so much, and if there's
25 anything that we can do to assist you, please feel

1 free to give us a call. Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, ma'am. And
3 please give the councilwoman our regards. Thank you.

4 Yes, ma'am.

5 MS. MINNIFIELD: Hello. My name is Cheryl
6 Minnifield, and I'm a community activist. I live --
7 we're in the Sixth and Eighth Precinct, and I'm also a
8 city of Detroit retiree. I drove a bus four or five
9 years, and I worked with the Water Department. I
10 retired from there in 2011 for -- with about 29 years.
11 So I did about 34 years with the city. I'm very
12 involved with my community with -- in Grandmont 1 and
13 with Grandmont-Rosedale Development Corporation and
14 the safety committee.

15 And the reason -- this is my first meeting,
16 my first time attending this meeting. I've heard
17 about the meetings, but I just really want to say I
18 was very -- I'm very impressed with what I'm hearing,
19 because I came here a little disgruntled. But I feel
20 a little more warm and fuzzy right now about the whole
21 -- but I do have -- I want to know -- the reason I'm
22 here -- one of the reasons I'm here is because I would
23 -- I have complaints with the way I -- the process of
24 filing a complaint with the Office of the Chief
25 Investigator regarding some incidences involving

1 myself with traffic accidents. And that happened in
2 October of this -- it happened October 8th, and I have
3 -- and I filed a complaint toward the end of October.
4 I have not gotten any response from that office.

5 I just received a letter saying that
6 they're still investigating this accident and -- this
7 letter dated January 4th. And I want to know about --
8 I mean, how long is this process supposed to take,
9 because I'm very upset about the whole matter. And I
10 don't have the time to go into all of that, okay, but
11 is there someone that I can speak with regarding that?

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Chief Investigator
13 Drake, right here, who's in charge of all the
14 investigations. She'll talk to you.

15 MS. MINNIFIELD: Okay.

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: Madam Chair, can we
17 have the Chief Investigator give a brief -- a overview
18 in reference to other people might be in the same
19 predicament, if we can enlighten them somewhat if that
20 will be helpful since that issue came up.

21 MS. DAVIS-DRAKE: Sure. And thank you for
22 the opportunity, Madam Chair and Vice Chair.

23 The Office of Chief Investigator, we have
24 -- well, first of all, we accept allegations of police
25 misconduct that are of a noncriminal nature. It takes

1 up to sometimes 90 days for us to complete the
2 investigation. It doesn't always take that long, but
3 sometimes it does. We have up until 90 days to
4 complete it.

5 So, if you decide to file, if you have a
6 complaint against the police department, allegations
7 of misconduct, again of a noncriminal nature, then you
8 can certainly call us. Our number is area code
9 (313) 596-2499.

10 Again, it takes about 90 days from start to
11 finish to complete the investigation. After the
12 investigation is completed, then it has to also go
13 through a process where the Board of Police
14 Commissioners, the subcommittee of the board, does
15 review each one of the findings and the reports for
16 accuracy. And they do read them, just so you know
17 that. They do read very intensely, and sometimes they
18 have questions. They call us on investigations. So
19 we appreciate that process.

20 After that period of time, if there are
21 sustained matters, meaning that the investigation
22 reveals that there actually is a problem, that what
23 you said happened as a citizen actually did happen, it
24 goes to the Chief of Police for his review or one of
25 his -- someone from his staff reviews that case.

1 So it's a pretty -- it's a lengthy process,
2 but understand that it is a very intense process. And
3 we do a stellar job. I have some wonderful
4 investigators that do an excellent job in creating
5 those reports, going out and canvassing, we talked
6 about that earlier, and conducting a very thorough
7 investigation for our citizens.

8 So certainly we're going to talk to you
9 afterwards. And I'm sorry. I should be addressing
10 the board. But we will be talking to any of the
11 citizens that are here that have issues. We will be
12 meeting with them and talking to them and getting more
13 information from them.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Chief
15 Investigator.

16 MS. DAVIS-DRAKE: You're quite welcome.

17 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair,
18 also, ma'am, Ms. Minnifield ...

19 MS. MINNIFIELD: Minnifield, yes.

20 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Minnifield? That's
21 your name?

22 MS. MINNIFIELD: Yes.

23 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am. Just
24 as a -- I mean, could you come back after this has
25 been resolved and tell us, you know, so what is the

1 outcome of this, too. So we welcome you back.

2 MS. MINNIFIELD: I certainly will. And I
3 really enjoyed the meeting and being here, learning
4 all that I've learned.

5 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you very
6 much, ma'am.

7 MS. MINNIFIELD: Okay.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

9 MR. JOHNSON: Good evening. I'm going to
10 make this short. My name is Don Johnson. I told you
11 the titles earlier.

12 But I don't know if you remember some
13 months ago I came before you to talk about the
14 30-percent pay cuts that the police took, the
15 ten-percent pay cut in addition to with their health
16 care. And it still disturbs me to this day, because
17 if I was a police officer, still a police officer long
18 ago, and my wife worked for the City of Detroit and we
19 lost 80 percent of our pay. Sitting at the dinner
20 table discussing how we go pay and what we go pay
21 could be a very difficult task.

22 What I'm saying is that, yes, I welcome the
23 \$5,000. It was wonderful for the entry level pay and
24 what have you. But I have a daughter right now that
25 is a professional teacher, child care development.

1 She works two jobs, 20 years at Meijer's, 15 years as
2 a preschool -- certified preschool teacher. She
3 doesn't even make \$35,000 a year because of what the
4 job pays, but that's her career.

5 The point I'm trying to make, folks, is
6 that it is very difficult for anybody, anybody to live
7 off of 35- or \$36,000 a year. I don't know who can do
8 anything, I don't know if the board can do anything,
9 but I will not be satisfied until the police officers
10 get their 30 percent back and the extra ten percent
11 they lost for health care, and then we can talk about
12 a pay raise. But that 5,000 is just something that
13 you gave them that you took from them.

14 Thank you, and may God bless you all.

15 (APPLAUSE)

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, sir. I
17 think we're making strides. We're doing the best that
18 we can, and the Mayor is committed to public safety.
19 And I think that for the 2016 that's what he's
20 committed to, public safety. And then he has made a
21 huge commitment. And I think we're on the right road
22 to recovery and it's going to take some time, but
23 hopefully the men and women will see a difference
24 soon. Thank you.

25 Any other oral communications? Oral

1 communications? Any other oral communications?

2 Is there a motion for adjournment?

3 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: Before we
4 adjourn, can I ask a quick question about the survey?

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Sure.

6 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: So is there a
7 place that we drop them off if we fill it out at the
8 precinct?

9 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Out there.

10 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: Out here?

11 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yes.

12 DEPUTY CHIEF LEVALLEY: Sergeant Russell is
13 outside. She'll collect --

14 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: If you don't fill
15 it out I'm saying.

16 DEPUTY CHIEF LEVALLEY: Oh, it can be
17 dropped off at headquarters. We'll be at future
18 meetings. She'll be at the City Council meeting that
19 you mentioned, or you can -- any time you're at
20 headquarters you can drop it off at our office.

21 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: All right. Thank
22 you.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

24 Motion for adjournment?

25 VICE CHAIRPERSON BELL: So moved.

1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.
2 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Support.
3 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Support.
4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
5 supported that we adjourn.
6 Is there any question?
7 Those in favor?
8 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The meeting is
10 adjourned. Thank you.
11 (The meeting was adjourned at 7:55 p.m.)

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
