23	At this time I'd like to introduce sitting in for
24	the Chief Assistant Chief Stair.
25	1st ASST CHIEF STAIR. Good afternoon



1	Chair, ma'am. How are you today?
2	COMMISSIONER CARTER: I'm fine, how are
3	you?
4	1st ASST. CHIEF STAIR: Very well.
5	Good afternoon, board. I am sitting in for the
6	Chief, he's coming back from a meeting, so he's
7	actually expected to sit in. However, if you
8	would like I could introduce our DPD members who
9	are present.
10	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yeah, thank you.
11	1st ASST. CHIEF STAIR: We have Deputy
12	Chief Renee Hall, Capt. Conway Petty of Downtown
13	Services who will be doing a presentation this
14	afternoon for you all.
15	Sgt. Lolita Carter from Downtown
16	Services, Officer Jason McWater who I heard did a
17	very good job on the promotional exam, so
18	congratulations.
19	Traffic Control Officer Rogan, good
20	afternoon, and then we also see in the back
21	Retired Lieutenant Roscoe Mayfield who is now a
22	police assistant.
23	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Okay, I saw him
24	in uniform a couple of days ago, but I was like I
25	thought he was retired, so okay. Well, welcome



1	back, sir, thank you.
2	Thank you. Commissioner Mallett, let
3	the record reflect that he's joined us. Thank
4	you for joining us, sir.
5	At this time Chief Investigator Drake,
6	would you please introduce the rest of the staff.
7	CHIEF INV. DAVIS-DRAKE: Certainly,
8	Madam Chair, seated in the front to the far left
9	is Director Gail Oxendine, the Police Human
10	Resources director.
11	Mr. Robert Brown, administrative
12	assistant is seated to my right for the he is
13	the administrative assistant for the Board of
14	Police Commissioners. We have Dale Rose, court
15	reporter from Hanson Court Reporting and seated
16	in the front to the far right is Supervising
17	Investigator Lauren Zacbar from the Office of the
18	Chief Investigator and that concludes the
19	introductions, ma'am.
20	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.
21	CHIEF INV. DAVIS-DRAKE: We also have
22	two representatives from the Detroit Media
23	Services, all right.
24	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. At
25	this time, Commissioners, you have before you the

11	The motion carries. Before you, Commissioners,
12	you have the minutes for Thursday, April 14. Is
13	there a motion to approve the minutes?
14	COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Support.
15	COMMISSIONER CARTER: So moved. Been
16	moved and supported that we accept the minutes
17	from Thursday, April 14. Is there any
18	discussion?
19	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes, Madam Chair.
20	Under Item 1, the call to order. That meeting
21	was held at Bishop Vann's church. It has on here
22	headquarters for Thursday, March 24. I want to
23	make that amendment to the minutes.
24	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Okay. Is there
25	any objection? Those in favor of the minutes



1	being approved as amended?
2	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
3	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed?
4	The motion carries. At this time I'm going to
5	reserve my report and proceed right to the
6	presentation from the police department.
7	1st ASST. CHIEF STAIR: Thank you,
8	Madam Chairperson. Prior to Capt. Petty coming
9	up I wanted to acknowledge the fact that Chief
10	Legal Advisor Celia Washington just came into the
11	room.
12	Capt. Petty?
13	CAPT. PETTY: Good afternoon. I'll be
14	brief. I'm going to speak on Downtown Services
15	of which I'm the captain in charge of, briefly
16	give you an overview.
17	Downtown Services is the gateway to the
18	city of Detroit. It also supports the
19	Detroit-Windsor Tunnel which is the second
20	busiest crossing between the United States and
21	Canada. Approximately 13,000 vehicles use the
22	tunnel daily.
23	Downtown Services also supports three
24	professional sports teams, Tigers, Lions and Red
25	Wings, three casinos and countless theatres and



1	other entertainment venues.
2	Downtown Services personnel consists of
3	Planning, Traffic, my NPOs, my Motor Unit, Gaming
4	Operations, Traffic Control officers and police
5	assistants. Officer McQuarter is one of my
6	traffic officers.
7	(Chief Craig arrives at the meeting.)
8	CAPT. PETTY: Sgt. Carter oversees my
9	planning and does a multitude of things there
10	and Ms. Ragoon is a newly appointed well,
11	she's actually my senior traffic control officer
12	that the Chief put in place to get some more
13	officers back into the neighborhoods, so we were
14	a starting program to put civilian traffic
15	officers downtown and they've been working really
16	well in the downtown area, probably see them on
17	Jefferson, on Randolph, Beaubien, around
18	Greektown and you can tell by their shoulder
19	patch which was created for them and the light
20	blue shirts and they have that infamous white hat
21	that the Chief loves so much.
22	Foot beats, foot traffic beats and
23	bicycle patrols. The foot beat component
24	proactively patrol in the downtown area. These



officers are the department's liaisons for the

1	community, stakeholders and business owners. The
2	traffic control officers which we call TCOs are
3	dedicated civilians who perform traffic control
4	duties during inbound and outbound rush hour
5	traffic.
6	The police assistants which are called
7	PAs are an added resource to provide uniform
8	presence in the downtown area. These officers
9	augment patrol units by responding to calls for
10	service for emergency and non-emergency
11	situations.
12	Planning. The Planning component
13	entity consists of seven police officers and two
14	sergeants. These officers serve as ambassadors
15	for the city. They are also responsible for
16	planning ad executing operation action plans for
17	all major events.
18	Planning personnel serve as department
19	liaisons with our business partners to help
20	facilitate major events as well as units of
21	government when major activities occur.
22	Planning also, these officers work in
23	conjunction with the U.S. Secret Service to
24	coordinate visits of the President and members of
25	his cabinet. They also collaborate with the U.S.

1	State Department to coordinate visits of foreign
2	dignitaries, coordinate the filming of major
3	motion pictures, television commercials and music
4	videos that are filmed around the Detroit area
5	that showcase the city of Detroit on the big
6	screen, as well as funerals of fallen officers
7	and city dignitaries.
3	Few of the events wehicle and

Few of the events, vehicle and pedestrian traffic controls, some of the areas that we control around as you can see, Comerica Park, Joe Louis, Fox, Ford Field, Filmore. I won't go through all of them, but these officers successfully ensure the safety and orderly flow of traffic and adequate safety for each spectator attending events.

Proactive enforcement in the entertainment district of downtown is also provided, uniformed presence and traffic coordination around the area of any protest or demonstrations.

Downtown Services Motor patrols

downtown to provide direct traffic enforcement of
city ordinances and state laws. They respond to
and investigate motor vehicle accidents, they
enforce traffic weights and measures and provide



1	escorts for funerals and traffic details
2	surrounding dignitary visits.
3	Directed patrol as a secondary
4	proactive crime reduction tactic.
5	NPOs are tasked with the following:
6	Conducting investigations of petitions from City
7	Clerk's office, working in partnership with beat
8	officers, businesses, community groups and clergy
9	for neighborhood support.
10	Also liaison with residents and
11	business owners, participation in Youth Services
12	programs and events, developing neighborhood and
13	business watch groups, educating communities in
14	crime prevention issues, answer calls of service
15	as needed, as yet another patrol support
16	component.
17	Gaming Operations is also under our
18	purview. Officers assigned to Gaming handle
19	monitoring the safety and welfare of casino
20	patrons, patrolling exterior of casinos and
21	hotels including the parking areas, directing
22	traffic during congestion.
23	In conclusion, there are multiple
24	facets that make up the Downtown Services. Each
25	entity provides critical services that contribute

1	to the revitalization of downtown Detroit. That
2	ends my presentation.
3	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Capt.
4	Petty and thank you, Chief, for joining us.
5	CHIEF CRAIG: You're welcome. Thank
6	you, Madam Chair and Board. I did have a
7	question about this presentation. I saw a police
8	car, looked like it was a police car from when
9	Willie Bell was still here.
10	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioners, do
11	you have any questions?
12	COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I have a
13	question. What are we doing with the bicyclists?
14	I know that came up before last year, the Slow
15	Riders, but on Sunday because the weather was so
16	nice I must have seen over 100 on the River Walk
17	coming out into Jefferson.
18	DEP. CHIEF HALL: One of the things
19	I've been tasked with by the Chief is to ensure
20	that Slow Roll actually benefits the community as
21	well as the citizens of the city and business
22	owners alike, so one of the things that we have
23	put in place is the Slow Roll organization pays
24	for law enforcement personnel to manage it.
25	It's much like a major event because we

have as the weather gets better we have
upwards of 1,500 riders, so it's actually a major
event that takes place every Monday at about 7 PM
and there will me some Sunday rides.

So what we've done is Planning, our downtown Planning because they handle all major events, they are the individuals who have been tasked with this. Slow Roll does pay for their services.

They're not on duty at that particular point in time, so Slow Roll submits two weeks in advance the routes that they choose to ride and what Planning does is they go out, they drive these routes to ensure that the traffic patterns, the businesses and the citizens won't be impacted. And if there is some controversy to the citizens or the business owners, they can change the routes. That has not happened.

They have done a fantastic job of ensuring that they're in areas that are kind of -- maybe a little desolate where there's very few homes, a lot of vacant locations and that they're going through the streets as well as some of the downtown areas.

Their goal is to just visit the city to

1	see what the city has to offer. If you've seen
2	them, most of the time they're very orderly. We
3	have not had a whole lot of complaints. If in
4	fact we do have some individuals who are not
5	following the rules, those individuals are dealt
6	with really rapidly and they're removed from the
7	organization.
8	So we're working very diligently with
9	Slow Roll. We actually are out on the regular
10	basis. When they're out I'm usually riding
11	around to make sure that everybody is okay and
12	taking any complaints if we have any from the
13	citizens to make sure that we're doing our part
14	to ensure that everybody is enjoying Slow Roll.
15	So it's an ongoing thing. We see it
16	getting larger and larger. Everybody is looking
17	to buy bikes. We have more bicycle lanes in the
18	downtown and throughout the city to encourage
19	people to get out, walk, ride, so we do
20	anticipate that it's going to get larger.
21	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam Chair,
22	thank you, Chief, and Commissioner Brooks, that



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was one of my questions also. They started the

season two weeks ago or whatever and they

cancelled the two previous Mondays which is

probably good I mean because I don't know how
things were set up, but basically you answered
all the questions in that and I don't know what's
on schedule for next Monday, but I do know the
previous two Mondays, they did cancel their ride.

DEP. CHIEF HALL: And they have worked out with the Detroit Police Department that if they have to cancel and it's outside of the two-hour window, they still do reimburse the officers because they have to come to work and get prepared and if it's something that contradicts with the police schedule, we have to cancel, then they don't have to pay for that particular ride, but we are working together, it is really a good working relationship and they are responding to all of our changes that we may need to make to their ride, so they're very responsive to that.

COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am, because the reason is -- well, there are a number of reasons they came up last year, but I think one of the main reasons was the access to emergency vehicles in and out of neighborhoods or whatever scene, there may be an emergency, but okay, that's adequately addressed.

CHIEF HALL: Absolutely. 2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Any other 3 questions? 4 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I just wanted to say that I think it's a great idea what they're 5 6 doing and I understand that they're going -- they 7 have been invited to the Mackinac Conference. 8 DEP. CHIEF HALL: I was not aware, but 9 10 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Yes, that just 11 came out in the paper and I'm not sure how many, 12 but they have been invited and there will be a 13 group that will go to Mackinac Conference. 14 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Are they going to ride from Detroit to Mackinac? 15 16 DEP. CHIEF HALL: One of the things 17 that is coming up is Mr. Dan Gilbert is 18 sponsoring a ride on a Sunday that will start at 19 the Punchbowl Social. We anticipate with him 20 sponsoring that ride that it's really going to be 21 huge and there are other business owners 2.2 throughout the downtown and midtown area who will 23 be sponsoring rides, so as I said before, we are 24 looking forward to this thing getting even larger



than what it is.

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1	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: So I have a
2	follow-up question. So one of the complaints or
3	several of the complaints that we got last summer
4	were that people had to wait an hour or an hour
5	and a half for the bikes to cross a main street,
6	they couldn't cross streets because bikes were
7	going.
8	Is there a plan to have the bikes stop
9	so that traffic can move so that we won't
10	continue to get those complaints this summer?
11	DEP. CHIEF HALL: Absolutely and that
12	was never the case. I think that might have been
13	exaggerated a little bit. There were some wait
14	times for some citizens to come out. Right now
15	that's why we have the Planning officers that
16	when we're on certain neighborhood streets and
17	people want to leave, the bike groups are
18	instantly dispersed and broken up for that
19	individual to be able to get out and move and
20	then we resume the ride, and that's the same
21	thing on any major thoroughfare that we're
22	traveling as well.
23	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Okay, thank
24	you.
25	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Any other



1	questions, commissioners?
2	COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Through the
3	Chair, I'd like to know the bike riders, are all
4	of them officers or anybody can join?
5	DEP. CHIEF HALL: Actually the Slow
6	Roll is not from the Detroit Police Department,
7	it's not an organization within our agency.
8	They're people who have various careers, lawyers,
9	judges, doctors, some police officers, people
10	from all over who ride, and it's just you go
11	online and you sign up and they give you the
12	rules and regulations for which they ride, no
13	alcohol, and basically you have to pay a fee to
14	join the Slow Roll group, but anyone is welcome.
15	COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Thank you.
16	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Any other
17	questions, commissioners?
18	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes, Madam Chair,
19	in regards to the traffic control officers, I
20	guess this would be for Capt. Petty, what are the
21	qualifications for that particular position and
22	how can someone apply?
23	CAPT. PETTY: You go through the City
24	and they do a background check on them. As long
25	as they!re physically able and they have a sheet

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1	on the website it will tell them as long as they
2	can do certain things, then pretty much they're
3	hired.
4	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.
5	CAPT. PETTY: And I can try to find
6	out, I'll get that information for you.
7	DIRECTOR OXENDINE: Hi, Gail Oxendine,
8	director of HR for the record. I don't know
9	exactly what the requirements are. I can send
10	you the job specs which will tell you
11	specifically what they are, but the requirements
12	are minimal. It's a 25 hours a week part-time
13	position. People would apply online at
14	detroit.mi.gov as we do for all civilian
15	positions.
16	The requirements are probably like a
17	high school diploma or GED and probably requires
18	some level of customer service experience. I'm
19	not sure how many years, and it's probably
20	basically it. There is an examination that's
21	required that people have to pass in order to be
22	considered for the position.
23	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.
24	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Ma'am Chair, I
25	had a question for the Director. Yes, ma'am, I



1	was going to ask Capt. Petty but you may have the
2	information. How many traffic control officers
3	do we have at this time and what is the goal
4	number?
5	DIRECTOR OXENDINE: I believe we have
6	24 or 25 currently employed and our budgeted FTE
7	is for 30.
8	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you very
9	much.
10	CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, I just
11	want to comment and I want to thank you for what
12	you do. This was an idea that's not unique, but
13	one certainly in any major city you have the
14	civilian traffic control officers and one of my
15	pet peeves coming in during my transition was
16	this, as many of you know, the traffic downtown
17	is horrendous and so it's been a significant
18	change, though construction does add on the
19	challenges, but throughout the winter they were
20	out there bundled up, did a phenomenal job, so
21	it's working out well.
22	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Chief.
23	Is there anything else you would like to add or
24	did you have something, Commissioner Bell?



COMMISSIONER BELL: I was just going to

25

1	say, Madam Chair, I want to acknowledge the
2	appreciation from Plymouth United Church of
3	Christ for the service that Chief Craig and Dep.
4	Chief Washington coordinated for the funeral of
5	Rev. Hood, Sr on Saturday and I just want to
6	thank you for that type of service that is
7	rendered.
8	I think everything went extremely well
9	and just want to say thank you on behalf of
10	Plymouth United Church of Christ and myself as a
11	member, so I also you said white hats are back
12	too, is that correct?
13	CHIEF CRAIG: The white hats are
14	traffic. I even have a white hat, and on
15	occasion I do wear the white hat.
16	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Chief.
17	I think that gives you that visibility, right and
18	I drive through there quite often in that time
19	frame you directing I mean, they do a great
20	job.
21	CHIEF CRAIG: Now, in D.C. the traffic
22	control officers are actually civilians as well
23	and I don't think we've had this request made,
24	but they're actually wearing shorts because it's
25	so humid in D.C.



1	Los Angeles they may wear the shorts
2	too, but I don't think we've had that request.
3	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. Chief
4	Craig, is there anything you'd like to add before
5	we move on?
6	CHIEF CRAIG: No, I think we're good.
7	The 1st Asst. Chief held it down, so I trust that
8	she told you all the good news. Did she tell you
9	about the buzz of excitement running around the
10	department?
11	First of all, let me thank Gail
12	Oxendine. I mentioned it before, but you have
13	we had our first promotional exam for sergeant
14	and lieutenant in eight years, so its really a
15	great day. The test results started going out to
16	the candidates and so many of them now know where
17	they placed on the list, so we anticipate
18	probably in a month or so some promotions.
19	We're going to be very sensitive.
20	While we have the vacancies, we certainly don't
21	want to deplete our staffing from the field and
22	the impact that might have, so we'll be very
23	methodical in that, but a lot of excitement
24	certainly for the commanders, and new commanders
25	and new captains, but now facing new lieutenants

1	and sergeants, so a lot of excitement right now.
2	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. Any
3	questions for the Chief, commissioners? Thank
4	you, Chief.
5	At this time are there any standing
6	committee reports? Any committee reports.
7	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam Chair, I
8	came across this name in previous months again,
9	the same name in citizen complaints. Officer
10	Trevon Martin I'm sorry, Tray Lyons, again
11	another complaint that I read the previous week.
12	It was in previous meetings I stated
13	that there may be or one would think there is
14	there should be some sort of red flag there
15	and as a matter of fact I don't see the person -
16	the Commander from Internal Affairs.
17	CHIEF CRAIG: Someone is here.
18	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Because I know
19	there was an investigation generated on this
20	officer as to what occurred in Auburn Hills out
21	in Oakland County at the Palace at a concert I
22	think two months ago or six weeks go and I asked
23	for some follow-up as to what was being done
24	about that, and then making note of that there
25	were like I say, I keep reading these citizen



1	complaints, some sustained, most aren't, and I
2	just had concerns about that.
3	CAPT. CHAMBERS: Okay, sir, as far as
4	that matter that occurred, the individuals were
5	convicted out there in Oakland County for that
6	different incident. The matter is being
7	administratively closed in relation to that
8	incident for the officer.
9	The other complaints that you speak of,
10	I don't have any recent complaints of that nature
11	with him, so I can't really speak any more to
12	that.
13	CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, I'll
14	have the Captain from Professional Standards
15	query and transmit through my office to you the
16	status of that case as well as any pending or
17	other closed matters. We have that information,
18	go just through our MAS system, so if you would
19	get that to me as soon as possible.
20	CAPT. CHAMBERS: Yes, sir.
21	COMMISSIONER CARTER: And that was
22	Captain Chambers for the record.
23	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you, sir.
24	COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Madam Chair, if



I could though, Chief, Commissioner Crawford did

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1	raise this particular name before, so what is the
2	process? You have somebody whose name comes up
3	four or five times.
4	Is there a red flag? Does someone
5	intervene? Is at least an interview done with
6	this particular individual to say officer or
7	sergeant or lieutenant, what's going on, why is
8	your name showing up with this much regularity?
9	CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, yes,
10	Commissioner Mallett, that is correct. The
11	system that we have in place as I reported out
12	upon the closing of our Consent Judgment I want
13	to say, and I'm estimating, I think we paid \$6.5
14	million if I'm correct for the development of the
15	MAS system which we have and other departments
16	frankly have tried to model their personnel
17	tracking system and certainly there's certain
18	complaints that will come up.
19	For example, let's say in that system
20	if the complaints are not resolved but say the
21	officer has three not resolved with a similar
22	issue, a flag goes up or even force incidents, so
23	we have the capability of doing that.
24	I am interested and this is the
25	first time I'm hearing that that particular

1	officer had some priors, I would like to know and
2	we'll make sure that if and the status of
3	those complaints, whether they was adjudicated as
4	sustained, not sustained or and advise you of
5	it, but we do do that.
6	COMMISSIONER MALLETT: But, Chief,
7	let's suppose that there are four his name
8	comes up four times and all four of them are

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found to be without basis. That is, the -- for whatever reason -- not sustained. Do we still have the officer come in and say look, man, your name has showed up four times. It may not have been sustained, but we think that there's a

possibility that you need to dial it down a

little bit out there in the field.

CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, yes, we have that ability and we do and we hold our command officers accountable and I'm going to let the 1st Asst. Chief address that.

1st ASST. CHIEF STAIR: Thank you, sir. For the record, 1st Asst. Chief Lashinda Stair. We do, we have peer meetings in an instance where an officer, let's say for an example, has several use of force incidents, vehicle pursuits, all things like that are considered and what happens

is there's an alert through the MAS system at
some point which is generated and generally the
risk management group will send notification to
the particular command and then you will have to
address it.

And so -- and then the command officers are held accountable to ensure that they address it. Sometimes it could be just a matter of monitoring, but calling an officer in and talking to them, explaining the issues that's there and in some cases in the case of a police pursuit or several police pursuits, everything could have been done right, even a use of force, but still the fact that they've had several police pursuits or several use of force is something that we need to discuss just to make sure that they understand what they should be doing out there to protect themselves and certainly to protect the citizens.

And so, yes, that whole piece is something that helped us get out of Consent Judgment actually and so, again, it's accountability on the part of the officers, but certainly the accountability piece is there for the supervisors to ensure that they're doing what they need to do to make sure that we keep



1	everybody on the straight and narrow.
2	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: And also for
3	the clarity of the record, the Chief wasn't here
4	the few times I did raise that issue and it was
5	like I said, there were a number of complaints
6	that were not sustained, but there were some that
7	were sustained.
8	COMMISSIONERS MALLETT: But to your
9	point, commissioner, the fact of the matter is
10	his name keeps showing up, and whether they're
11	sustained or not, the system should be that the
12	name keeps coming up, something happens because
13	where there's smoke, there's fire. It may not be
14	sustained, it may not be serious, but if you just
15	pull the person in and say listen, you know what,
16	it keeps happening, it may not be for any real
17	good reason, but let's talk about it.
18	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir.
19	CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, also
20	just a follow-up to that, just like when we look
21	at crime, we look for patterns, we look for
22	trends. Certainly if a given employee there's a

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certain pattern we might counsel. It may be

documented, it may not, just depends on the

individual employee, but we do look for patterns

1	because as you said, where there's smoke, there
2	could be fire and we will counsel the employee.
3	Again, our system is probably one of
4	the better systems in the country in terms of
5	employee tracking and so even though we're out
6	from under officially, that system will continue
7	to be maintained, sustained going forward.
8	It's very critical, and I'm curious
9	since you raised it several times why we haven't
10	responded back, so I will follow up with my staff
11	and make sure that the Board gets transmittal
12	from my office on it.
13	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you, sir.
14	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Is there any new
15	business? Old business?
16	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, Madam
17	Chair, under old business this came up last week
18	at our meeting. Pertaining to a personnel matter
19	in terms of looking at the applicants for the
20	board secretary position, could we have some
21	response from that, just so it was on record
22	last week, so we can go back on record this week
23	or go on record this week with some clarity as to
24	where we are and what we're doing.



COMMISSIONER CARTER: Sure, so

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1	Commissioner Dewaelsche can either update us or
2	Director Oxendine can chime in on where we are
3	with the board secretary application process.
4	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: So I
5	apologize, I was not here at the last meeting, I
6	was traveling, but we as a committee had met and
7	we discussed how we wanted to proceed with
8	posting the position, and we did agree as the
9	Personnel Committee to have TJA Consultants also
10	be involved in the posting of the position
11	because they would have the capacity to do a
12	national search at no charge, so our Personnel
13	Director Oxendine was going to work with a
14	consulting organization, so I would request that
15	we ask for an update from Director Oxendine.
16	COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Before
17	Director Oxendine comes. Commissioner
18	Dewaelsche, are you saying that we're going to
19	engage in a national search for a board secretary
20	for the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners?
21	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.
22	COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Why would we do
23	that?
24	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Why not?
25	COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Southeast



1	Michigan has nine million people in it, got
2	almost 40,000 lawyers. It seems to me that
3	within the confines of the state Lord knows in
4	Southeastern Michigan a person there are
5	qualified people to do this work.

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I would bet you that there's qualified people who live within the confines of the city of Detroit. It is -- in my judgment, it is a waste of time, free or not, it seems to me that this job is of modest consequence. The Board of Police Commissioners is extremely important. board secretary position is a support role.

It seems to me that we can find someone of adequate experience, adequate training, who meets the qualifications and I will bet you within five blocks of this building rather than 500 miles of this state.

So I'm sorry that I was not present. want to be on the record as saying that that is excessive as a waste of time and it doesn't make any difference if the services being provided by the consulting firm are free, let's suppose that they identify someone.

The Chief is very fond of bringing up the city of Los Angeles, so suppose they identify



1	somebody from LA. Are we going to pay to have
2	that person fly out here to be interviewed by us
3	for a job that I don't even know what it pays,
4	but I can tell you, Madam Chairperson, that I
5	know five broke-down lawyers right now who would
6	be glad to take that job who would be here on
7	time, who would never be late, who would take
8	their own notes and would do everything that
9	anybody on the Board asked them to do.
10	Please do not embarrass ourselves,
11	Commissioner Dewaelsche, by doing a national
12	I'll bet you I could go right over to Metro Fare,
13	your organization, and ask the administrative
14	assistant at the front desk to give me five names
15	and she could, so come on, let's not make a
16	mockery of the process.
17	COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I
18	don't think we want to look at broken down
19	attorneys for the position, with all due respect.
20	I think the process is working it's way through
21	and we pretty much been in this two weeks now.
22	The process is working it's way through.
23	COMMISSIONER MALLETT: I move I'm
24	making a motion. I move for a local search,
25	that's my motion.



1	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.
2	COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Support.
3	COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved
4	and supported that we do a local search. Is
5	there any discussion?
6	Those in favor?
7	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
8	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed?
9	The motion carries.
10	COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Thank you.
11	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair,
12	so we don't have any obligation in any way to
13	TJA? Were there any contracts signed?
14	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: No, no, there
15	were none. It was recommended that we would have
16	an additional resource to fill this position and
17	so I accepted it. We were already working with
18	Director Oxendine and in fact she had already
19	gone through the process and selected five
20	candidates to refer and if we're going to do a
21	local search, then we will proceed with that.
22	COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Were they all
23	local?
24	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Yes, sir.
25	COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Thank you.



1	DIRECTOR OXENDINE: Just so I can have
2	clarification of where we are now, I guess I need
3	some direction in terms of how we're going to
4	proceed.
5	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Based upon
6	this motion, we would suspend our activity with
7	TJA and just continue with the final step that
8	you had already presented to us which was that
9	you had five candidates that you were going to
10	refer and then we would go from there.
11	DIRECTOR OXENDINE: So we reopen the
12	position based on the last direction that we
13	received and so we will close it end of business
14	day.
15	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Yes, yes.
16	DIRECTOR OXENDINE: We will address

10	DIRECTOR OXENDINE: Yes, ma'am.
11	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.
12	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you,
13	Director. Any other questions?
14	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam Chair,
15	several times I want to advise the Board to read
16	the City Charter, the Michigan Open Meetings Act
17	or just review it and the Board of Police
18	Commissioners bylaws. Thank you.
19	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Any other old
20	business?
21	Announcements, the next meeting of the
22	Board of Police Commissioners will be Thursday,
23	April 28, 2016 at 6:30 [sic] PM here at the
24	Detroit Public Safety Headquarters. Our next
25	Board of Police Commissioners community meeting



1	will be Thursday, May 12 in the 8th Precinct at
2	the Harvest Christian Church located at 24440
3	West Seven Mile Road.
4	At this time we'll have
5	oral communications from the audience. Please
6	give your name and limit your comments to two
7	minutes, please.
8	MR. WELBORN: Good afternoon, Board,
9	Chief. Bill Welborn. I just want to let you all
10	know we have a new chair, new president for
11	Citywide and it's Alvin Stokes, president of the
12	10th Precinct. He's the new president of
13	Citywide now.
14	I'm no longer the president, I had to
15	give it up. What I would like to ask the Board
16	though and the Chief, if you all would attend
17	this meeting sometime. Since he is new and
18	besides that he's also trying to work with the
19	7th Precinct to get them straightened out.
20	He's starting out new, they don't have
21	anything at all, but he's got they got new
22	bylaws now and as soon as they get that
23	straightened out they will start electing
24	president and so forth and they will have an
25	operation that will work.



1	So he is a new man down there and I
2	think he's a good guy for the job. He's been
3	doing this for quite a while and I think Chief,
4	do you know Alvin Stokes?
5	CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, I
6	don't know if I know the name. I might have met
7	him.
8	MR. WELBORN: Okay, but anyway he's
9	been with the 10th for quite a while and when it
10	was the district he was with the 12th and 10th
11	for a while, so give him a break and attend the
12	meeting sometimes.
13	They meet the first Thursday of the
14	month at the mini station on, what's that, 12th
15	and Euclid, that's where they meet at 7 o'clock
16	6:30.
17	COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Is that the
18	Citywide meeting?
19	MR. WELBORN: No, that's the 10th
20	Precinct. Citywide meets the third Thursday of
21	the month at 6:30 at the 3rd Precinct.
22	COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Which one are
23	you asking us to go to make sure we attend?
24	MR. WELBORN: The Citywide, but right
25	now he's going to run both of those because he



1	can run both of those. In fact, Citywide is
2	tonight, but I don't expect you to be there
3	tonight, but every third Thursday of the month.
4	In fact, I gave him a lot of you guys'
5	e-mails, so you should be getting an e-mail from
6	him starting next month, I hope so. Thank you.
7	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you,
8	Mr. Welborn. Any other announcements or oral
9	communications?
10	MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon, my name
11	is Fredia Butler and I am the secretary for the
12	2nd Precinct police Community Relations Council
13	and I am a community activist.
14	I thought today that I would be coming
15	here to just listen and not speak, but I refuse
16	not to speak for what I believe is unjust. The
17	family of Kevin Matthews and others want to know
18	the name of the officer who killed him and the
19	status of the case.
20	The silence around the death of
21	Mr. Matthews who was mentally ill is viewed as a
22	cover-up and is protecting the officer who killed
23	him. The family will continue to demonstrate and
24	protest seeking justice for the family of



Mr. Kevin Matthews who was killed by a Dearborn

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1	police officer inside of Detroit.
2	I was at one of the demonstrations in
3	front of this building when some police officers
4	were sent out and they told us that we would be
5	ticketed for parking on the lot. Another
6	gentleman came out, not in uniform, from the
7	building and told us not to move our cars.
8	Why not speak up and say something
9	about Mr. Matthews' case. I believe if the roles
10	were reversed more would have been said and done.
11	When I first inquired it was said that
12	Mr. Matthews case had been sent to the prosecutor
13	and now the prosecutor has sent it back to Chief
14	Craig's office for more information.
15	Because of the silence and not talking
16	to the family a problem is being created for our
17	officers and all of us. I have written to
18	Governor Snyder, Mayor Duggan and Judge Rhodes
19	about what is happening in Detroit.
20	What is happening to us is
21	unsustainable and what I think, commissioners, is
22	democracy doesn't exist in Detroit and other
23	predominantly black cities in the state of
24	Michigan.
25	We are a people on a plantation with



1	masters and overseers and to keep down problems
2	it's going to get warmer and I don't want the
3	type of what could come out of a case that
4	what has happened here in the city of Detroit
5	with Mr. Matthews being killed, no one saying
6	anything because any other crimes that are being
7	committed, you can see, you're on the TV talking
8	about the problems and what have you, and it
9	should be a fair and let the people see that
10	it's done fairly.
11	CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair.
12	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Chief Craig?
13	CHIEF CRAIG: First of all, I have
14	talked about it initially. That case is in fact
15	at Prosecutor Worthy's office. Early during the
16	investigation it's gone back and forth. There's
17	nothing I can say about the case at this point.
18	I don't make a charging decision,
19	that's not my role. In terms of the family, I
20	have a meeting set up with the family next week
21	and basically I will tell them that that case has
22	been investigated by us. I'm going to go into
23	the details of the investigation. Again, I'm not
24	responsible for charging. That is the Wayne
25	County Prosecutor's role and she's had it now for

some weeks, and so she takes her time, we support
that. It's very critical, there was forensic
evidence involved in this matter, but I am not at
liberty to go into the details of that case.

And I don't make the charging decision, so I've been very transparent about cases as best I can, but it is one of those cases that it's now in the Prosecutor's Office.

In fact, as referenced to someone going outside and having a conversation, I believe Sgt. Woody is here that can speak to -- the whole idea was to advise the group that was out front that the case is no longer with the Detroit Police Department, but we do have a meeting set up next week, so at the appropriate time I'll have Sgt. Woody come up and address some of the other concerns about the contact on that day.

MS. BUTLER: Well, I appreciate that because at least to say something to them to keep tempers down, problems from arising from that because people don't want to trust police.

And I've been complaining about what had happened at the 2nd Precinct because I loved my captain who was there and the kind of work that has been done and I can see the difference



1	in our community and our officers worked very
2	hard and I appreciate our officers and I don't
3	want anything happening that we can avoid.
4	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Sgt. Woody, are
5	you coming up? I'm sorry.
6	MS. BUTLER: Thank you.
7	SGT. WOODY: Good afternoon, everybody.
8	Sgt. Michael Woody, Detroit Police Department,
9	Public Information Office.
10	Through the Chair, we did have several
11	conversations with the group out front. They
12	come every Monday. It's in an effort obviously
13	to relieve their concerns. We have open dialog
14	as often as we can. Understanding that this is
15	very sensitive in nature, we've asked the Chief
16	to meet with the family, he's agreed, so going
17	forward we will be the situation that occurred
18	with the parking in the parking lot, that was a
19	misunderstanding between some of the staff at the
20	building, not police officers. It was
21	immediately rectified.
22	This is public property, so we do allow
23	that and we do encourage all of our citizens to
24	protest whenever they feel the need to do so, it



is their constitutional right.

1	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, sir.
2	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner
3	Crawford?
4	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam Chair,
5	Ms. Butler, I just want to state that it's not
6	the onus is not on the Detroit Police Department
7	and the Detroit Police Chief to release the name
8	of the officer. As a matter of fact, that is an
9	old pattern and a bad practice of not doing that
10	and in current and recent years, in the last
11	couple of years with what has occurred around the
12	country, Baltimore, Ferguson, even Chicago, you
13	may note that police chiefs are stepping forward
14	and showing some courage, but this is not on the
15	Detroit Police Department or Detroit Police
16	chief. The onus is on the Dearborn Police Chief,
17	Chief Haddad, to release that name. It's his
18	officer.
19	I know Mr. Matthews was killed in the
20	city of Detroit, but it was by a Dearborn officer
21	and even we've had discussions at this very table
22	some previous meetings about that and there are
23	even those who said well, perhaps we should go to
24	Dearborn and meet with Chief Haddad.
25	I personally have no interest and I



1	know Chief Haddad, I've known him since he was a
2	commander at 11th Precinct, even recall when he
3	was a lieutenant I personally have no interest
4	in going to Dearborn to meet with the Dearborn
5	Police Chief.
6	I think the Dearborn Police Chief needs
7	to come to Detroit to perhaps meet with the
8	concerned citizens here and the family. His
9	officer came into Detroit and allegedly killed
10	or did kill Mr. Matthews. So the onus is on the
11	Dearborn Police Chief to release that name, not
12	Detroit, Detroit Police Department.
13	So I do understand what you're asking.
14	As a matter of fact, the Coalition Against Police
15	Brutality, Mr. Reed, filed a FOIA some months
16	ago. After one of our meetings he immediately
17	filed a FOIA for the Dearborn Police Chief to
18	release the name of the officer. That hasn't
19	been done.
20	So again, that's one who is engaging in
21	that old bad pattern and practice of not doing
22	so.
23	(Comment from the audience not
24	audible.)
25	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, ma'am.



COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, ma'am.
