12	SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yes, sir.
13	We have Ms. Pamela Davis-Drake, our Chief
14	Investigator. We have Mr. Robert Brown, who is our
15	Administrative Assistant. We also have Sergeant Alan
16	Quinn who is recording our proceeding. And Ms. Rhonda

CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Thank you.

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1	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Good to see you this
2	afternoon.
3	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Thank you.
4	(Commissioner Burton entered the proceedings
5	at about 3:04 p.m.)
6	CHAIRPERSON BELL: I don't really have a
7	formal report for this meeting here.
8	SECRETARY ANTHONY: Mr. Chair, may I?
9	Commissioner Burton has arrived.
10	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Burton?
11	SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yes.
12	CHAIRPERSON BELL: He is sitting to my right.
13	SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yes, sir.
14	CHAIRPERSON BELL: The one and only Willie
15	Burton.
16	COMMISSIONER BURTON: Present, Mr. Chair.
17	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.
18	Thank you, Mr. Secretary.
19	I just want to point out that the
20	commissioners should have in their possession by
21	e-mail, that would be the draft of the 2014 Annual
22	Report. Hopefully you have received that.
23	(Commissioner Carter entered the proceedings
24	at about 3:04 p.m.)
25	CHAIRPERSON BELL: And if you have any



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concerns,	any sugge	stions, or	notes,	respond	to the
Board Sec	retary, we	would app	preciate	it, beca	ause we
want to m	ove that i	tem right	along w	ith your	input.

And also we asked last week that you have the strategic planning draft also in your possession. And so hopefully you have responded to that. If you have any concerns, any issues, that we can move that item into the Board agenda next week, I think, as it is scheduled, on that particular note. So those two items I just ask that you do diligent in terms of reviewing those two items.

And the third item would be that we have two hearings coming up next week, so you have that notification package, you should have those items too. So please take your time to read those appeals, two candidates for the Academy. So you have that in your package, so hopefully — I just want to make sure that we have been duly served and that we have the documentation, that we can move forward next week on those two issues.

So that would be my reporting out.

And I just want to say Chief Craig, I would say once again, we served up all your accolades last week at the Board Meeting. And I had an opportunity to speak to your renewal contract for two more years. But

1	I want to say at this meeting, once again, we are
2	looking forward to those two years plus
3	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Thank you.
4	CHAIRPERSON BELL: since you denied the
5	rumors that you Chicago
6	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Chicago, Los Angeles.
7	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those have been dispelled.
8	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Right.
9	CHAIRPERSON BELL: And like the Mayor said,
10	he is not running
11	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Cincinnati.
12	CHAIRPERSON BELL: I didn't know about that
13	one.
14	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: There is a bunch of
15	them.
16	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. So the Board
17	expressed their support, you know, across the table in
18	terms of your reappointment to Chief of Police. We all
19	agree that you have been doing outstanding for the last
20	two years. And we are looking forward to more
21	outstanding work and relationship with this Board. So
22	just really pleased that you have the opportunity to go
23	forward. I think it is in the best interest of the
24	City of Detroit, and especially the Detroit Police
25	Department And I was pleased to see that your family



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1	was out there in terms of supporting, even though you
2	forgot to introduce them.
3	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: It was taking me off
4	my flow.
5	CHAIRPERSON BELL: I know. I know.
6	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: I had it planned for
7	the very end. But
8	CHAIRPERSON BELL: The Mayor stepped in.
9	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Yes, he did. But I
10	appreciate those kind words.
11	And certainly to the Board, I appreciate your
12	support. This has certainly been the most challenging
13	two years in my 38 years in policing. But it has been
14	very rewarding too. So I appreciate that.
15	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.
16	And I just want to say that I never attended
17	a ceremony of that nature. And I was just impressed by
18	the room in terms of the filled to capacity in terms of
19	cross-section of people that attended and spoke highly
20	of you, and in terms of that type of support.
21	And I apologize to the Board. We did not get
22	the information out to them in a timely manner, but I
23	think in the haste of the Mayor office and all of that,
24	but I apologize on behalf that process they didn't



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get the proper notification. But in spirit they were

1	there.
2	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: I believe that.
3	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay.
4	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: I asked a couple of
5	the Board, said, where were you? And they said, well,
6	we didn't get a formal invitation. I say, well, I
7	called
8	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Beg your pardon?
9	MS. SMITH: We didn't either.
10	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Well, you show up at
11	everything.
12	MS. SMITH: We felt left out.
13	CHAIRPERSON BELL: I just want to say I know
14	we had an officer was shot in the line of duty last
15	week.
16	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Yes.
17	CHAIRPERSON BELL: I assume that officer is
18	doing well.
19	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: And I want to talk
20	briefly.
21	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Why don't you do it
22	now.
23	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
24	I did want to talk because it is critical.
25	First let me say, and I know there is a presentation



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set, certainly, the Commander,	Captain,	certainly did a
phenomenal job in managing wha	ıt I would	describe as a
very tense situation.		

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I have been on a number of these barricade suspects, both here and other cities. I will tell you this one was one that from the beginning, it just didn't feel right. I mean, first, the suspect, you know, who had some recent history of mental illness that was not documented, we learned this, he went over to his mother-in-law's house, shot the house up. And what was interesting that really didn't get communicated out in the news is that he left that location, with his family, or went -- or returned to his residence where his family was at and took them hostage. Probably five or so family members.

But what was interesting, the initial responding officers, they got there, responded in, and met with the suspect who was armed with a shotgun. He pointed that shotgun at the officers. Clearly, they had an opportunity to use deadly force. And in having a conversation with them at the scene that morning, they articulated to me that they were very concerned if they had used deadly force, that it may have caused harm to the family. So they opted not to. Putting their own safety ahead of, you know, very important.

1	So they quickly did the right thing. Our SRT got out
2	there quickly. Lengthy negotiation with the suspect.
3	Once I arrived there, I was closely
4	monitoring the dialogue with Commander Barren, and it
5	was clear at different points that the suspect could
6	have gone either way. At times he would come and
7	display a weapon. He was armed with a pistol and a
8	shotgun.
9	And at some point during the negotiation, we
10	believed he was going to surrender. He released all
11	the hostages except for one, his wife.
12	We were certainly concerned about her safety.
13	In fact, we met with her son, not in common with the
14	suspect. He is a 15-year-old young man, who said, he
15	is going to kill our mom. He was convinced on that
16	based on the actions that we knew about, some things he
17	had said prior.
18	Well, of course, that didn't happen. He
19	preferred we go in, basically neutralize the threat. I
20	explained to him that we were going to do everything we
21	could to keep his mom safe and his step-father.
22	And so negotiations were going well, and it
23	became problematic. Once he let the hostages go, he
24	put on an army fatigue jacket and literally jumped out
25	off the front porch. And as he did that, he



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1	immediately began firing, striking one of our tactical
2	team members. The suspect was armed with a shotgun,
3	birdshot. Probably if he had been armed with buckshot
4	or a Magnum round in the shotgun, we might be talking
5	about the officer's funeral.
6	I am absolutely convinced that the round that
7	the officer took, it struck his helmet, there was a
8	clear indentation on the helmet, again, if it had been
9	a stronger round, it might have been fatal or a
10	significant injury.
11	So, of course, the SRT unit responded
12	quickly. And he was pronounced I think he was
13	pronounced dead at the hospital.
14	I know that in some subsequent news reports,
15	the estranged wife made comments that maybe we could
16	have done more with the PPO to save his life.
17	Clearly, this individual, again, I want to
18	emphasize a couple the discipline that was out
19	there, they spent probably five hours negotiating. The
20	goal was successful resolution. And it just didn't
21	happen.
22	What we learned later, in addition to
23	exhibiting some recent signs of mental illness, he had
24	some books in his personal vehicle about a tactical



approach to dealing with these kinds of situations. So

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1	he had a plan. He had recently talked about suicide.
2	So we think that suicide by cop was his plan.
3	We also learned later, he had turned all the
4	gas on in the home. And so when he decided to make the
5	move out, it was probably in his mind that our reaction
6	to his action may have caused the house to explode,
7	thereby taking her out, as well. That didn't happen.
8	So we were able to get her out successfully.
9	As you may have saw on some of the subsequent
10	news reports, the community was very happy in terms of
11	no harm coming to the wife.
12	And certainly I had the unfortunate task of
13	notifying suspect's sister about what happened. She
14	just happened she was driving in from was it
15	Ypsilanti or Inkster? She was driving in from Inkster.
16	And the idea there was that we were going to introduce
17	her voice in as part of the negotiations.
18	And so, again, tragic, but I commend the
19	discipline and the skill set of all those officers.
20	Three of the officers did use deadly force during this
21	encounter. We have since they have been seen. One
22	thing that we have lost, this is the first time you
23	may have heard me talk about our a peer counseling
24	or neer counselors we just launched this new effort



We had a couple of doctors out of California come in

1	and provide training to about 30 to 40 Department
2	members who have been in a crisis themselves. And we
3	wanted to introduce that as an opportunity to help heal
4	from these type of crisis situations.
5	Because I worked so closely with them in Los
6	Angeles, I thought this would be a great opportunity
7	for DPD. Everybody that was selected was ecstatic
8	about it. And this was the very first time it was used
9	with the S.W.A.T. officers. And frankly, they were
10	very happy about that part of this healing process.
11	So if anybody has any questions about that.
12	I don't know if the Captain or Commander, you want to
13	add anything to that?
14	UNIDENTIFIED CAPTAIN: I think you covered it
15	pretty well.
16	CHAIRPERSON BELL: I just want to pause to
17	acknowledge our Vice Chair Lisa Carter arrived about
18	ten minutes ago. Appreciate your attendance.
19	Chief, we can continue on with your report.
20	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Thank you. Okay.
21	And I will talk a little bit about crime.
22	And one last thing, this was the second
23	standoff. We recently had a standoff in February of
24	this year, one of those very cold days, it was a
25	12-hour standoff with another mentally ill person.



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And it was during this 12-hour standoff that
at one point, the suspect had been firing shots, but
actually fired shots at the what we call the
BearCat, the vehicle that has ballistic protection. I
bring that up for two reasons. One, in that situation,
I am absolutely convinced that the characteristics of
that vehicle may have saved personnel that was inside
during negotiation because the vehicle was shot. My
aide, who was also an SRT member, was part of the
negotiations. He was one of the members that was shot
at, that was in that incident.

And then we fast forward to just last weekend. Our SRT member who took a round in the face and -- well, part of the shotgun pellet in the face and his helmet.

Again, there's been a lot of dialogue about the militarization of police departments. There is a time and place for wearing helmets, for having armored vehicles. We are not talking about driving tanks down the street on patrol.

We are talking about for the sole purpose of protecting lives, not just the lives of the men and women who do this work, but also our citizens, because the BearCat, as it is called, can be deployed to facilitate a rescue operation of a citizen who might be

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down from gunfire, as well as a police officer. So
those things matter. And what we do a lot here in
Detroit, unlike a lot of other cities, that armored
vehicle will go up close and personal to the location.
And that's where negotiations are taking place. So
without that, we would be at an extreme disadvantage.

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Certainly, again, if the officer was not wearing that helmet, we might be talking about planning a funeral. That's just the reality of it. So I wanted to make sure I got that point on the record.

As it relates to crime, we are still trending downward. Some good news, for the first time, you know, I reported out last that we were up in homicides and we have been up in non-fatal shootings. But for the first time, we were actually even with nonfatal shootings, or is LaValley, David LaValley here? Are we down one shooting? I think we are down one shooting, non-fatal shooting incident. We are still up in homicide, but in overall violent crime, we are down 4 percent.

In the area of robbery, we are down 17 percent. Carjacking we are down 19 percent. All property crime, we are down 18 percent, which we have an overall Part 1 crime reduction, which includes both violent and property, 14 percent. And I just -- if you

1	could bear in mind that these stats are compared to
2	last year, where we also saw some dramatic reductions.
3	So we are still trending in the right way.

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And I am not suggesting that in any way that our work is over. But the good news is we are in the second quarter, and we are starting to see somewhat of a slowdown, but probably not enough. But we are still in the overall reduction. So that's my report out on crime.

The last thing I want to talk about, and I have gotten mixed reaction, certainly we had this past weekend a violent carjacking crew, I guess that's the best way to describe it, was on a 24-hour crime spree, starting with a carjacking incident, which led to a drive-by shooting, which then led to yet a second carjacking. Then a third carjacking where the gentleman was murdered at a gas station. And then right after that carjacking incident -- well, that was attempted carjacking, then they carjacked a fourth vehicle. It was three car jackings and one attempted carjacking. The victim in that incident was pistol whipped. So this group of three were on a 24-hour crime spree.

And so through the diligent and hard work of our investigators, our auto what we call CATS, they



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worked around the clock, literally worked around the
clock and brought a sense of closure. They ended up
arresting three suspects. Certainly, we had the help
from the State Police, the Task Force was involved in
that, involving CATS, representation from Wayne State,
Oakland County, and I might be missing one other. But
in any event, there was an arrest made.

So at the following day press conference, the Detroit News decided to take out of context what I said. Frankly, the initial headline read, Detroit Police Chief Says Don't Buy Gas in Detroit. On the record I will tell you that was an absolute untruth.

Now, what I did say when asked the question about buying gas at night, I said, no, but then I said, if I had to, I would. Well, in my mind, what my thoughts were, is for one, I don't have a job necessarily where I am working at night. And so if I am not working at night, I am not going to set my alarm clock for 2:00 in the morning to get up and buy gas.

But I then took the liberty to say that, you know, to caution our community, which is part of my job, I believe, that if we see that there is a trend, that people should be aware of their surroundings.

They should be aware, day or night. But particularly, when we look at, you know, the trend of carjackings,

1	and while I report to you that they are down,
2	certainly, there is some common, common aspects of car
3	jackings at gas stations. One, sometimes they are in
4	not-so-well-lit areas, that they are dirty locations,
5	they are unsafe, there is loitering. But one thing
6	that's clear, the majority of them that happen at gas
7	stations occur probably between the hours of 11:00 and
8	3:00 a.m. in the morning.
9	So if you are going to buy gas, you should be
10	aware. Not just in Detroit, anywhere in the country.
11	Now, if somebody finds that a problematic
12	statement, shame on you. I have a responsibility to
13	report the truth. I never said that we should not buy
14	gas overnight. But if we should, at 2:00, 3:00 in the
15	morning, how about we just use a little caution.
16	So, of course, I had a very spirited
17	conversation with Detroit News who opted to change the
18	title or the headline of the story, which just
19	basically said that I am warning people to just be
20	aware, whatever the headline said. But people continue
21	to seize on this issue, and the problem I have with it,
22	and I felt a need to bring it to your attention,

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because I am sure someone would have questions about

it, is that, you know, I have a responsibility. One,

to tell the truth, be transparent about it, offer wise

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advice based on what we are saying. But I would never
as a police chief of any major city say, do not buy gas
in the City of Detroit. This is irresponsible. And we
know that some of our gas station owners, which we work
with, are doing a phenomenal job.

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However, there are others that are part of the problem. Just last week, we had an operation, whatever we call it, Fill Up, and we focused on gas stations in the 9th Precinct. And at this one location, we had had eyes, or we had been watching the location because we knew that drugs were being sold in and out and around the gas station. We observed that a drug deal had consummated. And we went in, detained the suspect, made the arrest. And this owner, ironically, has been a problem location. We have handled somewhere between I think in that one location, if I am correct, 75 calls over a three-month period.

And so if we want to sit here and say that some of our gas stations haven't been a problem, that's not true. Many of you -- I have been here 23 months -- you could tell the stories better than I can.

So in closing on that issue, so one thing we know about carjackings are down year-to-date, so out of 161 car jackings that we have had in the city of Detroit this year, 28 of them occurred at gas stations,



1	while this time last year, 42 occurred. And so we are
2	up in arrests, we have made 68 carjacking arrests
3	total. So we are trending in the right direction.

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But what I had my staff do over the past 18 months, just to give you an example, pull reports in the most problematic locations. So at the top, we have one gas station where there's been a report of 103 incidents. That's a problem.

So when you talk about our lean staffing, and we are handling an inordinate amount of calls for service at gas stations because the owner may have refused to cooperate, it is draining our resources. It is taking officers out of the field.

Here is another example. So in another gas station, over this 18-month period, three sexual assaults, 14 robberies, seven aggravated assaults. That's just not acceptable. And then another gas station where we had the one homicide. Another gas station we saw where we had two homicides and two sexual assaults. That's a problem. And it affects the neighborhood.

So our commitment is we are going to continue to work through our Neighborhood Police Officers, our narcotics units, and our TRU unit to address these issues in and around gas stations, because it is a

1	problem. But certainly not a problem where the police
2	chief would ever say, do not buy gas in Detroit.
3	Totally false statement. Yeah, it would sell papers,
4	it would be good national news, but certainly not true.
5	So in my report, I would like if anyone
6	has any questions, I would be more than happy to answer
7	them.
8	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioners, questions
9	or concerns to the Chief?
10	I just want to say I acknowledge the issue
11	that we have with service stations, and we all know
12	that certain places you have to be really
13	conscientious. If you have got family members, we
14	always advise them, ATM in service station at
15	nighttime, ATMs in service stations, you really have to
16	be on your Ps and Qs in terms of monitoring the
17	situation. So we understand. And so hopefully, I
18	think the citizens understand those issues too because
19	we all conscientious about those issues.
20	So we appreciate it.
21	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Mr. Chairman, I just
22	wanted to also add on that, you know, because we are
23	about the business of public safety, and you brought up
24	the issue of ATMs, one of the things that certainly, a



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great best practice in many cities, not just Detroit,

1	but people find police stations a safe haven because
2	they are open 24 hours a day and staffed by police
3	officers.
4	And so one of the things that we did,
5	certainly under the leadership of James White,
6	Assistant Chief James White, we just recently deployed
7	ATMs in every police station? Or how many
8	A.C. WHITE: We are missing one precinct
9	right now.
10	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Which one is that?
11	A.C. WHITE: Number 5.
12	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Number 5. That's
13	because they are opening a new station.
14	So we are excited about that. This is
15	another service for the community, that if someone
16	needs to get money after hours, 2:00 in the morning,
17	instead of standing at the kiosk that's out in the
18	open, I don't recommend it. But should the banks now
19	be upset because I am saying, you probably should not
20	be drawing cash out in an unprotected open kiosk on the
21	corner, walking up? That's in any city. I wouldn't
22	take money out of an open ATM in Beverly Hills,
23	California, just to be candid. But so we see this
24	as a great opportunity. So there are kiosks or ATM
25	machines in the various police stations. As you know,

1	when I came here 23 months ago, police stations were
2	closed at 4:00.
3	CHAIRPERSON BELL: That's the truth.
4	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Which was ridiculous.
5	But they are open, and now people desiring to get cash
6	at 2:00, 3:00 in the morning, they can go to their
7	local police station.
8	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.
9	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair.
10	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.
11	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Chief, do you have an
12	update on the attempted abduction of the young ladies
13	in Northwest Detroit, the Chicago/Evergreen area, as
14	well as the 14-year-old girl that was raped?
15	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: You know, through the
16	Chair, that's still an active investigation.
17	Certainly, there is a sketch that has been distributed.
18	We have gotten some tips. It is right now kind of
19	slowed down. You know, the suspect at one point was
20	very active in a matter of I forget how many days
21	over a few days period, there were four incidents. But
22	because of the news coverage, for the most part, he is
23	gone. We are following up on some leads. There is
24	one, without going into detail in this open meeting,
25	that we feel good about, but I cannot say for sure,



1	but so we are still working those cases.
2	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Is that the same person
3	with the 14-year-old?
4	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Two separate
5	incidents.
6	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Any updates on the
7	14-year-old?
8	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: No new updates on
9	that.
10	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay.
11	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Oh, and by the way, I
12	want to backtrack, on this suspect, you know, the
13	shooting of the individual at the gas station, we have
14	been able to clear an additional homicide. I will tell
15	you that it was so unfortunate. You know, many times I
16	will say that sometimes two lives are affected or lost,
17	but the young man who was involved in this situation
18	has never doesn't have a criminal record, which is a
19	problem. Never had a criminal no, not involved in
20	any crime. And so it makes you wonder, why did this
21	24-hour crime spree start? And I will tell you, very
22	violent.
23	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair, the
24	brawl that happened at the gas station on Hoover and I
25	believe it was Seven Mile.



1	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Yes.
2	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Do you have any update?
3	It was very disturbing to see what happened in broad
4	daylight. And females of young females, fighting in
5	broad daylight like that. Is there any update? Do you
6	have any leads on who they are or have they been
7	identified yet?
8	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Through the Chair, we
9	are working that one. We just became aware of it.
10	What's ironic about that particular gas station, I
11	visited that location with the precinct captain not
12	even a week prior.
13	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Right.
14	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: And the reason why we
15	went to this location, believe it or not, this was a
16	gas station that I think over three months, that had
17	something like 94 calls for service. And it is in
18	close proximity to I think Denby.
19	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Osborn.
20	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Osborn. Basically
21	across the street. It has been a problem location.
22	And so we have asked the captain to move very quickly,
23	in putting some closure, to identify. But this is just
24	one of many issues impacting that location.
25	So we are going to make an example out of a



1	gas station or two, working with the other members of				
2	the city family. Because it has got to stop. And you				
3	are right, that was a very troubling video. But that's				
4	just an example of the kind of things that go on.				
5	And so here we are talking about broad				
6	daylight. If anybody is driving by and needs fuel, are				
7	they going to stop at a gas station?				
8	COMMISSIONER CARTER: No.				
9	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: We can't have that.				
10	Thank you.				
11	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.				
12	COMMISSIONER VANN: Mr. Chair?				
13	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes.				
14	COMMISSIONER VANN: To the Chief. That				
15	particular I am very aware of that particular gas				
16	station. I had a group called Made Men. And we worked				
17	in that area for a long time in the Osborn area. And,				
18	you know, that is a very hot trouble spot there. There				
19	is a lot going on at that gas station, which I am sure				
20	you are aware of. And there are other such hot spots,				
21	you know, throughout the city.				
22	And what I am most appreciative of is the				
23	Chief's personal attention to a number of these				
24	different areas. He has been there. You know. He has				
25	talked to the folks. He has talked to the gas station				



1	owners, some of which needed a talking to, to be				
2	perfectly honest. Others, of course, doing a good job.				
3	But the personal attention, the Chief on the street				
4	concept, I think is working in Detroit. And I wanted				
5	to just compliment you for that, because I have worked				
6	under a lot of different chiefs. And they don't always				
7	have the same concept.				
8	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Two or three.				
9	COMMISSIONER VANN: It is about my sixth				
10	Chief I have worked under.				
11	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Over what period?				
12	COMMISSIONER VANN: Five chiefs in seven				
13	years the first time. And now Chief Craig.				
14	But I just that personal attention,				
15	knowing that he is going to show up. He is going to				
16	get the information firsthand. It is not going to be				
17	filtered information. And, you know, accountability is				
18	going to be demanded, as well. And then there is a				
19	return visit at some point, where he can check on the				
20	progress of it. I just think it is a positive,				
21	positive strategy toward eliminating crime at the				
22	street level.				
23	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: And through the				
24	Chair, just in response. Thank you, Reverend Vann, for				
25	that comment.				



1	And just to kind of we are going to use				
2	this list, this past 18-month list as kind of a				
3	template of the most problematic gas stations.				
4	But what we are really going to take a closer				
5	look at, it is one thing for us to go by there and have				
6	a conversation with the owner, while this one where the				
7	fight took place is a problem, another one that we went				
8	to on Friday where the drug dealing occurred inside,				
9	that is probably ranking number one on our list. We				
10	want to move very swiftly to holding that owner				
11	accountable, even if it means shutting that gas station				
12	down. Because we can keep going back, have the same				
13	conversations. And as you pointed out, Reverend Vann,				
14	that gas station has been a problem for years. And the				
15	community knows it.				
16	And so we have got to put teeth in it.				
17	Certainly, I am asking for the Board support. I know				
18	many of you represent different districts. And I think				
19	this is something that we can collectively work				
20	together on. And even if we take a gas station in each				
21	of the districts, I am sure this list here, each				
22	district is represented. And we will just go after it.				
23	And I think it might be worth it will show a				
24	collaborative effort. And I know that the Mayor's				
25	folks are very interested in this, as well.				



1	So I think if we work this together, and				
2	really go after the licensings, because like, for				
3	example, the one gas station where the owner allowed				
4	the drugs to be sold, you know, there was a list of				
5	conditions that he agreed to. But he has only				
6	satisfied out of a list of 15 maybe two. And so				
7	certainly with cameras there, we think and thought that				
8	the cameras might cause him he said all the right				
9	things on camera, but what we do know, he is absolutely				
10	part of the problem. We know that. And so we have got				
11	to hold him accountable for it. Because it is not just				
12	arresting someone that comes inside and deals drugs.				
13	Someone is allowing that to happen.				
14	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Mr. Crawford?				
15	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir, through the				
16	Chair.				
17	Chief, that gas station at Seven Mile and				
18	Hoover, that is in not only in my district, but in				
19	my neighborhood. I don't buy gas there.				
20	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Be careful. Be				
21	careful.				
22	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Nor do I buy gas at				
23	Seven Mile and Van Dyke. Having a history of I				
24	don't know, some 15 years ago, I marched with a number				
25	of groups on gas stations in the city of Detroit,				



1	mobilized the citizens, where we actually closed them					
2	down for various issues that has occurred, such as some					
3	of the ones that you mentioned, and even there were					
4	some that were of lesser issues that occurred, such as					
5	just disrespect in the community in selling certain					
6	products to the community that should not have been					
7	tolerated, that we didn't tolerate it at the particular					
8	time. So look forward to getting a copy of your list,					
9	particularly the ones in my district.					
10	(Commissioner Taylor entered proceedings					
11	at about 3:39 p.m.)					
12	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Okay. We can					
13	certainly make this available. And again, we can work					
14	on someone if one of the districts has a gas					
15	station, let's make it a project, we will get our					
16	Neighborhood Police Officers, and we will go out.					
17	Because the two that I made reference to today,					
18	certainly are two stations that we want to, you know,					
19	set the bar on in terms of changing.					
20	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes.					
21	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: And the community, I					
22	will tell you, for example, we were out on Friday where					
23	we got the individual who was dealing drugs, community					
24	member after community member approached and said, this					

station has been a problem forever. And something has

25

1	got to happen. And so it is just it is overdue.					
2	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you.					
3	CHAIRPERSON BELL: The Chair will recognize					
4	Commissioner Jessica Taylor, her arrival. Thank you					
5	for your attendance this afternoon.					
6	All right. I think that was really a needed					
7	dialogue. And I appreciate the hands on too. And I					
8	know I am willing to help out Commissioner Crawford					
9	because I don't have a gas station like that in my					
10	district. But we are willing to target his district.					
11	We clean it up first. We might have some on the					
12	borderline.					
13	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I think there are a					
14	few across the city. Trust me.					
15	CHAIRPERSON BELL: I understand.					
16	COMMISSIONER BURTON: I would just like to					
17	ask the Chief how many gas stations signed up so far					
18	this year for the Greenlight Initiative program.					
19	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Through the Chair,					
20	that's a great question because we want to push that.					
21	We have got 15 to date.					
22	Now, here is a bit of good news, because I					
23	had not talked about it much in terms of we have had					
24	some issues around some of the party slash liquor					
25	stores, you know, there have been some problematic					



1	locations. I met with an organization that					
2	represents and some owners. And they want to become					
3	part of the lighthouse, the Greenlight, and so what we					
4	have decided to do, because we want owners of					
5	businesses that do the right things, that have clean,					
6	well-lit, and those instances where they need security,					
7	because again, that gives a service to our					
8	neighborhoods. So we are going to bring in some of					
9	those liquor store slash party stores to be great					
10	examples. So we have the 15 gas stations. I think 11					
11	McDonald's are coming online because they are 24-hour					
12	locations. We know that the party stores, markets are					
13	not 24 hours, but we want to bring them in. And so					
14	they are very pro that. I have Commander Todd Bettison					
15	who is doing a wonderful job at driving that effort.					
16	And so we how many McDonald's do we have so far? Is					
17	it 11.					
18	COMMANDER BETTISON: Yes, sir.					
19	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Eleven McDonalds, but					
20	we still need more gas stations. And so I think this					
21	effort, this renewed effort, might give us an					
22	opportunity to kind of get more signed up.					
23	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay.					
24	COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Chief.					
25	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: You are welcome.					



1	CHAIRPERSON BELL: I guess our next item					
2	would be TRU, Tactical Response Unit.					
3	CAPTAIN WILLIAMS: Good afternoon to the					
4	Board, Chair, Vice Chair, Chief. I am Captain Williams					
5	of the Metropolitan Division. I am here with Commande:					
6	Barren. Deputy Chief Hall, she is our unit is under					
7	her, in her absence.					
8	What we are going to do is just do a quick					
9	presentation on the Tactical Response Unit.					
10	The primary objective is to address violent					
11	crimes. This is aggravated crimes and, of course, a					
12	lot of this, the Chief had already talked about.					
13	One arrest of note from our unit is in early,					
14	mid, mid April, one of our units made an arrest of a					
15	serial rapist and ended that spree. So that's in					
16	addition to that, they do a lot of gun arrests or CCW,					
17	concealed weapons in vehicles, concealed weapons on					
18	persons arrests.					
19	The operational manpower of the unit: They					
20	have currently one lieutenant, two sergeants, and 19					
21	police officers.					
22	Inception: The Tactical Response Unit was					
23	deployed on November 25th, 2013. Generally, they					
24	receive their deployment through the crime intelligence					

25

unit. That can also be changed by 2400 or the captain

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Response Unit is a seven-day operation. We are uniformed patrol. They utilize fully marked scout cars. Their scout cars are a bit — they stand out, in that they have gold letters. They will be the only gold lettered writing you see in the city of Detroit on their scout cars. The unit works from 2000, or 8:00 p.m. to 4:00 a.m., Sundays through Saturday. And the hours are subject to change based on events we have in the city.

Current statistics: And this is

year-to-date, calendar year, from January, up to I

believe we submitted our slide deck on I want to say

May 21st. So as of May 21st, we have had 115 total

arrests, that's going to include misdemeanor arrests.

So if you are looking through this, try to add the

numbers up, they won't add up to 115 because we have

included the misdemeanor statistics in it. We have had

47 CCW person, which is concealed weapons on a person.

We have had 30 concealed weapons in a motor vehicle

arrests, 16 narcotics arrests. And of all these



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1	arrests,	we have	recovered	77 fi	rearms.	That's	going
2	to be bot	th pisto	ls and rif	les or	long gu	ns.

Arrests, continued: We have seven armed robbery arrests, two homicide arrests, one arrest for criminal sexual conduct, and three arrests for possession of stolen motor vehicles.

In addition to combating violent crimes in the city, the Tactical Response Unit has a couple of additional tasks that are very important. They are one of the city's primary force for mobile field force. So they are activated in those instances where we know we are going to have events where we are going to have rowdy crowds, possibly riotous crowds. They also are placed on standby for special details, as well.

They assist SRT with barricaded gunman, and primarily what they will do is — the precinct units will be the first responding unit. They will take up the outer perimeter on traffic, traffic positions.

Once the Metropolitan Division is activated, we move in all of our assets that include TRU. They will take over those positions for the precinct unit, so the precinct units can go back in service.

And one other thing they do on barricaded gunman situations, they will assist SRT with the acceptance of surrender. So if you have someone in a



	rage so
1	house, we will accept that surrender. They will call
2	them out. Back them down. They will secure that
3	person. Then they will pass it off to our officers.
4	And that can be both for the subject, and also for
5	hostages that may be inside the residence or location.
6	They are also trained in low level search
7	warrants. And what this means is they receive the raid
8	entry training from SRT, so they can actually active
9	raid crews.
10	Questions?
11	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Questions, Commissioners,
12	concerns?
13	COMMISSIONER MOORE: I just have a comment,
14	through the Chair.
15	I just want to commend you and Commander
16	Barren. I have seen you in 2nd precinct, 6th precinct,
17	10th Precinct. You are very active in what you do.
18	And I just want to say thank you.
19	(Applause).
20	CAPTAIN WILLIAMS: There are no questions?
21	COMMISSIONER CARTER: I have a question.
22	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.
23	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair.
24	So your daily assignment, you don't know day
25	to day where you are going? Is that how it happens?



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1	CAPTAIN WILLIAMS: What happens is we receive
2	a daily deployment from the crime intelligence unit.
3	And that deployment tells us where we are going to go.
4	And that deployment is based on the last 24 hours.
5	They actually have one officer at the crime
6	intelligence unit that goes through all of the reports
7	from the previous day.
8	So there is two things that can happen. It
9	can be either a short-term deployment process or a
10	long-term deployment process. Meaning it can be
11	because of the last 24 hours, or it could be for a
12	pattern that presented itself over a long period of
13	time. So in the absence of that deployment, either the
14	commander or I will deploy or the supervisors for TRU
15	deploy themselves.
16	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Through the Chair.
17	Just to follow up, for example, the captain
18	talked about the sexual assault suspect. Certainly
19	that was a violent crime that was creating a lot of
20	fear. And they were assigned to work those areas where
21	we believe most likely the suspect was working.

Whenever we see a trend that's emerging, like if there is a -- and while -- even though our robberies are down year-to-date, if we see, say, a trend of robberies along Gratiot between the hours of say 7:00



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1	and 11:00 p.m., then the TRU unit would go out and work
2	that area based on information they have on certain
3	suspects. And it can be very effective and has been a
4	very effective tool. When you look at our crime
5	reduction efforts, that's one of the reasons, because
6	they are strategically deployed into areas that we want
7	to reduce crime.
8	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any other questions or
9	concerns?
10	Captain?
11	CAPTAIN WILLIAMS: Yes. Somebody said that
12	was very short. And if she would like me to go longer,
13	I can probably add some stuff.
14	CHAIRPERSON BELL: We like them short and
15	sweet and to the point.
16	CAPTAIN WILLIAMS: Yes, sir.
17	CHAIRPERSON BELL: And your reputation
18	precedes you. So we know what you are engaged and that
19	you are involved and we really appreciate your unit.
20	CAPTAIN WILLIAMS: Thank you, sir.
21	COMMISSIONER SHELBY: One question.
22	CAPTAIN WILLIAMS: Yes, sir.
23	COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Through the Chair.
24	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes.
25	COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Most of your CCW



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1	arrests, CCW motor vehicles, are they done through
2	traffic enforcement?
3	CAPTAIN WILLIAMS: They are done through
4	they are done through I will say a combination of
5	traffic enforcement, meaning that it will be the
6	initial traffic violation that institute the stop, but
7	some of them also are done by tips. So our officers,
8	they are engaged in a lot of conversations with like
9	the bouncers who work at certain clubs, work at certain
10	bars, they will give them a call. They will say, hey,
11	we have they will give a vehicle description,
12	occupant description, and they will give us the
13	description of the weapon that will be in the vehicle.
14	So
15	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.
16	Appreciate it.
17	Before we move on to standing committee, I
18	would ask Commander Bettison to come forward to the
19	mic. And if you would, report out on what took place
20	at Henry Ford High School this morning.
21	COMMANDER BETTISON: Oh, absolutely.
22	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.
23	COMMANDER BETTISON: Absolutely. It was I
24	am still I still feel good about it. Great event.
25	Received a request to present to the students, juniors



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1	and seniors, of what should the children do when
2	stopped by the police. So myself, Detective Fountain,
3	who many of you have seen his presentations before, we
4	put together a presentation. Judge Deborah Thomas was
5	there, as well. Barb McQuade was there. They had
6	initially asked for the Chief. The Chief sent
7	Commander Bettison to go to that location. I went to
8	the location, was deployed by my Chief. And I did my
9	best to represent my Chief. So we blew students away.
10	It was well received.
11	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Chief hat today.
12	COMMANDER BETTISON: Yeah. Yeah. And the
13	gentleman from Wayne State University Police
14	Department, NOBLE, he was there, as well.
15	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Good. Good.
16	COMMANDER BETTISON: And we triple teamed
17	them and gave them, you know, what to do. What not to
18	do. And just that hard love. And also just letting
19	them know that we love them, we care about them. We
20	want a peaceful, safe summer interaction.
21	And Chief, we told them also about the Youth
22	Summit that we are going to have on June the 25th.
23	And also met with Bishop Vann right after
24	that. And we are talking about some great stuff, as
25	well. And thank you for that information that you gave



Page 43 1 me to the young -- to the gentleman that were 2 performing at your church. So I have his name, his contact information, Arthur Cartwright. So I am good 3 4 to go. 5 But it was great. CLARK: To the Board. 16 17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am. 18 MS. CLARK: All the commissioners, Chief 19 Craig, I am the President/Founder of Mothers of 20 Murdered Children. We have reached out to have a -oh, my name is Andrea Clark. I am sorry. Thank you, 2.1 22 Commissioner. 23 We reached out to have a meeting with you



because we think that we can do you some good. We can

24

help you.

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1	We have drawn up a resolution with mothers
2	organizations across the nation to declare homicide a
3	public health issue. And with that legislation, it
4	becomes a bill, we can get those Federal dollars in
5	here to handle some of the programs that we need to
6	kind of curb the violence, if not stop it all together
7	Mental health is one of the biggest issues,
8	as you can see, with the barricaded gunman. And those
9	issues are going to continue to happen until we get
L 0	Federal funding to bring back mental health issues.
11	Also, June the 5th, we are traveling to D.C.
12	to present that resolution to Congress.
13	We have presented it to City Council. It
L 4	just has not been adopted.
15	The Wayne County Commissioners have adopted
L 6	the resolution.
L 7	And I would really like for you to take a
L8	look at it as well as the Commissioners.
L9	We have been supported and endorsed by the
20	NAACP. And I want to thank them for that.
21	It is time for us to try to do something to
22	stop the violence. And one thing I really want to say
23	real quick is that whatever we can do as citizens to
24	assist you, and not your job.



I want to introduce to you, as well, a

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1	project that was done in California called Next of Kin
2	model. So that we can work with you to try to change
3	some of this, get homicides investigations kind of
4	completed and closed.
5	That's it. Thank you so much for your time.
6	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Go ahead, Brenda.
7	MS. HILL: Can I just say that I spoke with
8	the Chief at the Grace meeting, at the Grace Church
9	meeting.
10	And since then, I spoke with
11	Commander Deputy Chief Hall. And she has not gotter
12	back with us.
13	And then I spoke with Yvette Walker, the
14	scheduler, and she has not gotten back with us.
15	And I just talked to Commander Bettison, and
16	he says
17	But I am out here all the time. And if it
18	takes that much to get in touch with the Chief, what
19	about the people who can't speak up? This is the city
20	that we live in. And this should not be this way. I
21	really need your support.
22	I sent the resolution to Willie Bell. And he
23	will pass it all out with you. And we spoke to the
24	Bishop, as well. And we would like to speak to you
25	personally so that you understand that we are not



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1	only are talking the talk, we walk the walk, and I
2	have to walk that walk knowing that my son is dead on
3	the streets of Detroit, the city that I love. And
4	other people have to do, but we have to change this.
5	This should not be six years later, five police chiefs,
6	and you know, I had to pause when I heard you were
7	going to be here two more years because that gives me a
8	little bit of hope that somebody will listen. I have
9	had to tell this story to five police chiefs that did
10	not care. And if I have to do it, imagine the other
11	people.
12	We are trying to go to Washington to change
13	this, to make homicide a mental health issue, so that
14	we start touching the places that cause this.
15	We have got another five-year-old dead in
16	another city. That's a mental health issue. They
17	starved this baby to death. As well as the one in
18	Martin Luther King home, I don't know, but I do know
19	that we need your help. We can't do it by ourselves.
20	Thank you.
21	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, ma'am. And I
22	received your e-mail, and I will share it with the rest
23	of the Commission.
24	I don't know if the Chief want to respond to



25

your plea.

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1	MS. HILL: Thank you.
2	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Through the Chair,
3	yes, we did have a conversation. And during that
4	conversation, I talked to you about a new initiative
5	that we launched called the victims advocate
6	Volunteer Victims Advocate that work squarely with
7	victims of homicide.
8	One of the things that I am keenly aware, and
9	sorry for your loss, but one thing that really struck
10	me is very different here in Detroit when I arrived
11	here, was not just the number of unsolved cases, but
12	the fact that we have police officers, police officers
13	that have family members who are also victims and they
14	have unsolved cases too.
15	And so while we have also in response
16	since, you know, having a conversation with you, we
17	have launched and I don't like to use the word "cold
18	case unit," but we do have what I am calling an
19	"inactive homicide case unit." And inactive just means
20	we haven't gotten any new leads, but certainly, as
21	information comes in, that case then becomes active,
22	until it goes inactive. So "cold case" means the case
23	is just done, we have exhausted all opportunity. So we
24	have launched that.



I have a new commanding officer in the

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1	homicide unit, Captain Slappy, who we will be working
2	with your organization and other organizations, NRVBA
3	(phonetic), to try to at least keep our arms around the
4	families of the victims. Because we know that as we
5	continue to do that, we can still get more information,
6	so that inactive case can become active.
7	But as I have oftentimes said, that, you
8	know, the police, we are only one cog in the wheel. It
9	is truly the community that solve these crimes, that
10	prevent crimes. And it is the police that actually
11	facilitate it. Because we know, like you know, there's
12	somebody in the neighborhoods that knows something.
13	And the key is getting those folks in the neighborhoods
14	to speak up so that we can do our job.
15	So we are committed to it. Certainly Todd
16	Bettison can facilitate the meeting, but we can also
17	talk about this new initiative, which I brought up to
18	you when we last spoke, the Volunteer Victim Advocate,
19	which I think can coexist with your organization,
20	support it in so many ways.
21	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.
22	Yes, ma'am?
23	MS. VASS: My name is Vernell Vass.
24	I would like to thank you all for allowing me



to come today and have an opportunity to read this

1	information that I have.
2	In regards to the investigation of my son
3	Carl Bruner and Michael Lawson, my son has been wrongly
4	sentenced to life in prison for the murder of Marcel
5	Jackson. He was the cofounder of the Detroit 300. On
6	June the 20th, 2012, at Club Pandemonium, Marcel
7	Jackson lost his life.
8	The error that was involved in the
9	investigation starts at the lack of securing the crime
10	scene, collecting valuable evidence, and finished with
11	providing inaccurate testimony and falsification of a
12	labyrinth of witness statements.
13	My hope is that the City of Detroit and the
14	Detroit Police Department would hear my objections and
15	acknowledge the grave errors that have been contribute
16	to a young man and both men that's unjustly taken from
17	his family and sentenced to life in prison.
18	There are several wrongdoings that we feel
19	should be addressed to the City of Detroit and the
20	Police Department.
21	Upon arriving to the crime scene, the
22	forensic officer testified, who had been a police
23	officer for 30 years, he testified that he noticed
2.4	there was fresh brick ash on the ground, indicating



that a bullet had entered the alley wall. He stated,

1	however, that when he attempted to extract the bullet,
2	it was missing from the wall.
3	When he attempted to notify Officer Dale

2.1

When he attempted to notify Officer Dale

Hopkins that the bullet was missing and the scene,

indeed, had been tampered with, Officer Hopkins, at

that time, notified him that the gun that was present

with only police involved was missing.

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Officer Hopkins later testified that he received disciplinary action from the Police Department due to the gun missing from the crime scene. Officer Vila (phonetic) had testified also that he had noticed the gun, had walked over the gun four times, and he wanted it to be known and on record that the gun was there.

Later, the Department homicide detective

Nancy Foster testified that she returned evidence such
as clips of bullets and broken watch back to a

gentleman named Mr. Wayne White, a security guard who
was in the alley with Mr. Jackson at the time of the
shooting. Mr. White never was required to turn in the
items or was investigated in regards to his gun.

When asked, he said that the gun was left at the hospital. He said that his vest was left at the hospital. He said the shooter who shot into his vest was at least 25 to 30 feet, which is quoted in the

1	Detroit News.
2	So I asked for a police officer expert, gun
3	expert, to appear at court and to investigate the vest.
4	When he investigated the vest, he said that there was
5	no bullet in the vest because the bullet had been
6	missing from the vest.
7	He said that the person who shot you in this
8	vest, Mr. White, was not 25 to 30 feet, he had to be
9	standing 45 feet because there was gun residue on the
10	vest. That is what he testified to.
11	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Ma'am, I am going to have
12	to interrupt here. Your time is up. And we appreciate
13	your concern. I don't know if the Chief can respond to
14	this situation. But
15	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: I can.
16	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.
17	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Through the Chair,
18	what I would like you to do, Sylvia, can you get some
19	information? And also, Commander from professional
20	standards, I mean, what I am getting is you're alleging
21	police officer misconduct.
22	MS. VASS: Yes, by Officer Foster.
23	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Okay. Then I would
24	like you to set a meeting and find out if we have
25	allegations of misconduct that we have not addressed.



1	That sounds like you
2	MS. VASS: I have sent for the Freedom of
3	Information Act for Officer Hopkins. And I sent that
4	out and I have not had a response.
5	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: But I guess
6	MS. VASS: Well, they did respond back to me
7	to give them additional time, but it's been over three
8	months now.
9	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: But if you are
10	alleging police officer misconduct
11	MS. VASS: Yes.
12	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: we need to open an
13	investigation, if one has not. Although you did
14	reference in your comments that there was some
15	discipline associated with this case.
16	MS. VASS: Yes.
17	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: I am not certain it
18	is the same. So we will need to look at it. So if you
19	would get with Attorney Washington.
20	MS. VASS: Yes.
21	A.C. WHITE: And we can go from there.
22	MS. VASS: Thank you. I appreciate your time
23	today.
24	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair.
25	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.



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1	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Chief, who is in charge
2	of homicide?
3	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Captain Slappy.
4	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay. Where is Captain
5	Decker?
6	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Captain Decker now is
7	working under Deputy Chief LaValley, who is our crime
8	control czar, if you will.
9	We have done some reconfiguring, probably a
10	month or so ago, to address the spike in violence. It
11	is going to this model, while it is still being
12	etched out, is going to deal with some of the gang
13	activity, as well as violent crime.
14	Decker has demonstrated in the past that he
15	is very effective at addressing violent crime through
16	crime control strategies, so he is going to be working
17	with LaValley in that area.
18	And so Slappy was moved from the Academy.
19	She was formerly a homicide investigator. And she
20	in fact, her first day was this week.
21	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Who is in charge of the
22	Academy?
23	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: The Academy is under
24	the direction of a lieutenant at this point. Because
25	right now as it stands we have one class that's



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1	probably a couple of weeks from graduation. And there
2	is no real critical need to have a command officer
3	there. We have in service. But we are better suited
4	having the captain, certainly, in homicide and dealing
5	with the violent crime issue.
6	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.
7	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Okay.
8	CHAIRPERSON BELL: I might add that Chief
9	Investigator Pam Drake joined that dialogue with the
10	young lady, just in case it is a noncriminal matter, it
11	could be something that we would want to be involved
12	in, if not criminal. Thank you.
13	Thank you, Chief.
14	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: You are welcome, sir.
15	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Any other audience
16	participation?
17	MS. PANNELL: Good afternoon. Sharon
18	Pannell.
19	I just wanted to say about the Coleman Young
20	forum last week, it was great, but they did not mention
21	that he created the Board of Police Commissioners. I
22	had my hand up, but he didn't acknowledge, you know, he
23	didn't recognize me.
24	CHAIRPERSON BELL: I agree. That was



excellent. We had an opportunity to interact with

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1	Judge Cohn, who is a former police commissioner, and
2	went on to rule, and in reference to our matter here.
3	So, in fact, we had some interesting dialogue,
4	Commissioner Crawford and Commissioner Moore
5	afterwards. I know a little oversight, but it was a
6	tight program, I imagine so, but it was good dialogue.
7	MS. PANNELL: It was good dialogue.
8	CHAIRPERSON BELL: I really enjoyed the
9	dialogue.
10	MS. PANNELL: Just wanted to mention that.
11	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Hopefully. Definite.
12	Definite.
13	MS. SMITH: Captain, will you move that,
14	please?
15	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Always giving instruction.
16	MS. SMITH: Good afternoon. Bernice Smith,
17	political activist.
18	To the Chief, glad to see you. And to the
19	commissioners, we didn't get a chance to say personally
20	congratulations, but congratulations to you. Glad I am
21	going to look at you another two years. When I saw you
22	24 months ago, I was in doubt. And I told you that,
23	sitting right next to me on the right. And I looked at
24	you and I said, you think you going to stay here a long
25	time? You said, you will find out. So I am finding



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1	out. So glad to have you, Dear.
2	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Thank you.
3	MS. SMITH: In the meantime, I wanted to
4	correct the lady's statement stating that the young mar
5	was a member of the 300. He was brought into the 300.
6	I am one of the original on the women's side member of
7	the 300. So that's an incorrect statement when she
8	said he belonged to the 300.
9	In the meantime, it was a good affair last
10	Wednesday at the I wasn't there because I couldn't
11	find a parking space in time, and then it was
12	practically over with, but there was one concern that I
13	had. The fact that the person who was doing the
14	presentation, I understand is Chuck Stokes was the MC.
15	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.
16	MS. SMITH: I found out that they did not
17	mention the fact that Judge Damon Keith was one of the
18	most important person in Coleman Young's life, and in
19	his rule as being the Mayor. So I did call Chuck and
20	he told me who the person was. Because he said don't
21	blame him because it wasn't him. In the meantime, the
22	young man that I did call, he did not return my call.
23	So I am not going to worry about that. But the fact is
24	I felt as though that the judge was left out of it.
25	Now, Chief, I have seen you every day just



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1	about this week on TV. And you are doing a heck of a
2	job in coming to the crime scene. And I have heard
3	people talk about it to me. And I say I will report to
4	you that you are doing a good job as far as reporting
5	to the crime scene.
6	Also, I would like very much to know, you do
7	have an appointment, I don't know if you know your
8	appointment list, you are going to be at the
9	Renaissance next Sunday and you are going to be the
10	speaker for my granddaughter's Renaissance school.
11	With my pulling a little handle last February, I got
12	your
13	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Can I send Todd
14	Bettison?
15	MS. SMITH: That's fine. I have no problem
16	with that. But I promised my granddaughter and those
17	seniors that the Police Chief of the Detroit City is
18	going to be the main speaker. They wanted Gilbert, but

with that. But I promised my granddaughter and those seniors that the Police Chief of the Detroit City is going to be the main speaker. They wanted Gilbert, but I said, no way. You need to get the Chief. So we got you, next Sunday I believe, it is going to be at Cobo Hall. Just in case you forgot or you haven't seen your schedule. So he will be at Cobo Hall next Sunday. We all will be looking forward to seeing him. Because a lot of the kids, they have never met you. And I think it would be to their — to their advantage to see you

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1	and know what you are going to say, because we look up
2	to you, at least we seniors do.
3	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Thank you.
4	MS. SMITH: And I feel as though that the
5	students should be more aware of what your position is
6	in the City other than that label of Police Chief. Get
7	to know you are right within your heart and know that
8	you are sincere about staying here. And I am glad you
9	are not going to Chicago.
10	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Thank you. Don't
11	want to go there.
12	MS. SMITH: I thank you so much.
13	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Mother Bernice.
14	Any others? Audience participation?
15	So on that note, I just want to follow up
16	with what Mother Bernice said in terms of I think it
17	was outstanding that a Chief of Police would get an
18	opportunity to speak at a commencement ceremony. I
19	think that is unique. And I know he would do an
20	excellent job.
21	But I also want to let the record reflect, I
22	have no disrespect for Cass Tech. Some of my best
23	friends graduated from Cass Tech.
24	And Renaissance. Renaissance was not in
25	existence when I was in high school.



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1	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Did you graduate from
2	Pershing?
3	CHAIRPERSON BELL: No, sir. No Pershing High
4	School. In the hood. But we had rivalry, you know,
5	back in the day with, you know, different schools.
6	But and Cass was one of those schools. But
7	Renaissance, we had Renaissance was not on the map.
8	Osborn High School, but southeast and northeast and,
9	you know, other schools, it was a good spirit. Even
10	now, King and Cass have a rivalry.
11	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Yes.
12	CHAIRPERSON BELL: You are probably aware of
13	that.
14	CHIEF OF POLICE CRAIG: Yeah. Always have.
15	CHAIRPERSON BELL: I know in terms of track
16	and football, it's always highly competition when you
17	see those students come. And they're friendly, you
18	know, that type of thing.
19	But I am a great supporter of the public
20	school system. And I hope that I have been
21	following the issue with the Governor and with the
22	Mayor. I hope that they get this issue resolved. They
23	always it's always about the kids, somewhere along
24	the line. It get misplaced sometimes, but I think it
25	is crucial that they stabilize the school system. Do



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1	like public safety being stabilized, the school system
2	should be stabilized. So once we get that, I think we
3	can move forward.
4	So the Chair would entertain a motion for
5	adjournment.
6	COMMISSIONER MOORE: So moved.
7	COMMISSIONER BURTON: Support.
8	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Properly moved and
9	supported. Ready for question, aye?
10	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
11	CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed?
12	Motion carried.
13	And thank you for a great meeting. Great to
14	see you.
15	(Proceedings adjourned at 4:19 p.m.)
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
