5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Good afternoon. We'll try it  
6 again. Good afternoon good people.

7 ATTENDEES: Good afternoon.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: It's good to see you. And I  
9 really say it's good to see you. I'm a far eastsider, so I  
10 needed to throw out a lifeline to get to this place with my  
11 favorite staff person, Mr. Robert Brown; but he walked me  
12 in. I'm not accustomed to being lost. I'm a military guy  
13 and a DPD guy, you know. But my wife says, you should  
14 listen sometimes; I told you to turn left, turn right. We  
15 know how that goes.

16 It's good to see you this afternoon. I am  
17 Commissioner Willie Bell, District Four. I am chairman of  
18 the Board at this time. And this will be my last community  
19 meeting as chair of the Board of Police Commissioners, so I  
20 want to relish this moment. And it's good to see all your  
21 smiling faces this afternoon.

22 I should say good evening, right? Good evening?  
23 I said good evening? Okay, I'm accustomed to these 3:00  
24 meetings. We're going to get underway. I'm going to ask  
25 our very own Commissioner Bishop Edgar Vann for the

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1 invocation, please.

2 (INVOCATION GIVEN)

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Commissioner Vann.  
4 We're going to move right into introduction. And  
5 before I do introduction -- this is District Six, right?

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: -- I'm going to ask  
8 Commissioner Lisa Carter to bring any welcome remarks that  
9 she might want to share with you at this time.

10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good evening everybody.

11 ATTENDEES: Good evening.

12 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Hope everybody had a  
13 wonderful time coming from down or the eastside. Getting  
14 out here, it was terrible for me; so I can just imagine  
15 what you're thinking, but welcome to the Sixth District.  
16 Thank you all for coming out this evening. And thank --  
17 I'd like to thank Marathon for their hospitality today.

18 Some of you might know that my son who passed  
19 away in December, he was an employee here at Marathon; so  
20 Marathon means a lot to my family. Marathon was very good  
21 to me, to our family, during our time of loss. So thank  
22 you all for your hospitality, Marathon; and thank you all  
23 community for coming out this evening. Thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you Commissioner  
25 Carter. Our very own District Six here.

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1                   And I'm going to start with introduction. The  
2 commissioners are going to introduce themselves, starting  
3 to my far right.

4                   COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Commissioner Derrick  
5 Sanders, At-Large.

6                   COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Commissioner Elizabeth  
7 Brooks, At-Large. So I serve all the communities.

8                   COMMISSIONER BELL: And to my left.

9                   COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Eva Garza  
10 Dewaelsche, and I'm a proud Southwest Detroit. I was born  
11 and raised, lived here over 50 years, and I love it.

12                  COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Commissioner Reginald  
13 Crawford. Commissioner of District Three.

14                  COMMISSIONER VANN: Commissioner Edgar Vann,  
15 District Two, Northwest Detroit.

16                  COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Commissioner Richard  
17 Shelby, District One.

18                  COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, commissioners.  
19 And joining us now is Commissioner Conrad Mallett, Jr.  
20 Good to see you this afternoon --

21                  COMMISSIONER MALLET: Good evening.

22                  COMMISSIONER BELL: -- I mean this evening, sir.

23                  COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Good evening everyone. I  
24 want to introduce my associate counsel, Loren Denise  
25 Mallett.

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1                   COMMISSIONER BELL: Good. Good. And she's  
2 sitting in the proper place to observe, and witness, and  
3 see her dad at work. That's a blessing. Aman.

4                   And we have excused absence from Commissioner  
5 Willie Burton from District Five. He will not be with us  
6 this afternoon.

7                   As we move on, I'm going to ask the Board to  
8 approve the agenda for this evening's meeting.

9                   COMMISSIONER MALLETT: So moved.

10                  COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Support.

11                  COMMISSIONER BELL: It's been properly moved and  
12 supported.

13                  Discussion?

14                  Those in favor, aye.

15                  THE BOARD: Aye.

16                  COMMISSIONER BELL: Those opposed?

17                  The next item of business will be the approval of  
18 the June 1, 2017 meeting.

19                  COMMISSIONER VANN: So moved, Mr. Chair.

20                  COMMISSIONER BELL: It's been properly moved and  
21 seconded.

22                  Discussion?

23                  Those in favor, aye.

24                  THE BOARD: Aye.

25                  COMMISSIONER BELL: Those opposed? Motion

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1 carried.

2 We're going to ask our Board secretary to my  
3 right, Mr. Gregory Hicks, to introduce the Board staff  
4 please.

5 MR. HICKS: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

6 Before I introduce staff, let me indicate that  
7 taping tonight's meeting is Sergeant Quinn; Media Services  
8 providing the audio visual; and Donna Williams is our court  
9 reporter. And if we then turn our attention to the first  
10 row, we have Ms. Blossom from the media area; Ms. Johnson,  
11 who is our fiscal area; and, of course, next to me is  
12 Robert Brown. And then if we could go to Chief Drake, who  
13 will introduce his people from her staff.

14 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: Good evening, Board.  
15 Good evening, public. Good to be here tonight. With me  
16 today -- again, I'm Pamela Davis Drake, Chief Investigator.  
17 With us today -- and please stand as I call your name --  
18 Supervising Investigator Haley Crowell. It's been a long  
19 day; I'm telling you. And Senior Investigator Adela  
20 Rivera. Thank you.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

22 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Mr. Chair --

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes.

24 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: -- may I please add to  
25 that?

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1 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes.

2 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Adela Rivera is also a  
3 resident of Southwest Detroit and a former police  
4 commissioner. Thank you.

5 (APPLAUSE)

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. Thank you. And  
7 the next person we want to introduce is our Assistant Chief  
8 Williams. And he can properly introduce his full name and  
9 his title. He's sitting in for -- well he can't sit in for  
10 the chief, but he's here representing Chief Craig. There's  
11 only one Chief James E. Craig. So represent in your own  
12 right. You can speak and introduce any other staff after  
13 you introduce yourself first.

14 ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: Through the Chair;  
15 Assistant Chief Arnold Williams today with officers from  
16 Neighborhood Policing.

17 We're going to start with the staff. And what  
18 I'm going to do since there's so many, I'm just going to  
19 start with Deputy chief Charles Fitzgerald; and then we'll  
20 go across the room with everyone.

21 NEIGHBORHOOD POLICING: Deputy Chief Charles  
22 Fitzgerald. Captain Serda. Octavious Miles, Captain  
23 Eleventh Precinct. Captain Tucker, SDU; and little Captain  
24 Tucker. Captain Gary Saroka, Twelfth Precinct. Captain  
25 Donna Taurus, Civil Rights. Whitney Walton, Commander,



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1 Fourth Precinct. Russel Solano Captain, Fourth Precinct.  
2 Commander Markowitz, Professional Standards. Commander  
3 Nick Kyriacou, Tenth Precinct. Captain Derrick Galani  
4 (Phonetic), Downtown Services. Captain Conway Petty, Chief  
5 Neighborhood Liaison. Captain Pritchett, Commander, Eighth  
6 Precinct. Captain Tiffany Stewart, Ninth Precinct.  
7 Captain Holly Hope, Seventh Precinct.

8 CHIEF OF POLICE: And we have the neighborhood  
9 police officers in the back. Please introduce yourselves.

10 (WHEREUPON NEIGHBORHOOD POLICE OFFICERS  
11 INTRODUCED THEMSELVES)

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you Assistant Chief  
13 Williams, and thank all of the DPD family for their  
14 attendance; especially our eastside precinct commanders.  
15 And I know it's good to see you on the westside. You know  
16 who I'm speaking of. Okay.

17 Any elected officials or representatives of  
18 elected officials or precinct delegates attending this  
19 meeting?

20 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Jessie Gonzales from --  
21 unintelligible --

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir. Thank you for your  
23 attendance.

24 Any others?

25 (No Response)

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1                   COMMISSIONER BELL: We're going to move to -- I  
2                   have -- next item will be the chairman's report.

3                   I just want to mention that -- first of all, I'd  
4                   like to thank our host, Michigan Refinery Division,  
5                   Marathon Petroleum Oil Company and Richard Robell, security  
6                   site manager, for hosting us tonight. I understand that  
7                   Marathon Oil has been a cooperative part of the Fourth  
8                   Precinct. I'd like Mr. Robell to welcome us and give his  
9                   remarks on behalf of Marathon Oil Company. Will you come  
10                  forward.

11                  UNKNOWN SPEAKER: He just ran out to dinner.

12                  COMMISSIONER BELL: Ran out to dinner? Okay, any  
13                  other representative? If not we're going to enjoy -- you  
14                  want to speak for him?

15                  UNKNOWN SPEAKER: When we come up I'll say  
16                  something.

17                  COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay, you can identify.

18                  UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Yeah.

19                  COMMISSIONER BELL: It's going to be a short  
20                  dinner?

21                  UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Pardon me?

22                  COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay, I got it. I got it. I  
23                  understand. I understand. I'm a little slow this  
24                  afternoon.

25                  I would like to ask everyone tonight to still

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1 themselves for a moment of silence to show our support and  
2 concern for two police officers, Detroit police officers,  
3 who were recently shot. The first officer is Wallace  
4 Johnson of the Second Precinct. He remains in critical  
5 condition as you all know. And he is in a coma beginning  
6 the long road towards recovery. The second officer is  
7 Gregory Bentley of the Seventh Precinct who was shot off  
8 duty; and he is still in the hospital. So could we have a  
9 moment of silence, please. And just lift them up in your  
10 prayers at this particular time.

11 (MOMENT OF SILENCE OBSERVED)

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. Commissioners, in  
13 your package we released a press statement in connection  
14 with the incident involving Officer Gregory Bentley. A  
15 copy of the press statement is in your packet. I would  
16 like, however, to emphasize the senseless act of crime and  
17 violence in city, as we all know. If we think of it, this  
18 officer was off duty. And to the criminal this officer  
19 appeared to be a normal citizen. In this case the officer  
20 was well-trained and acted, using forces appropriate for  
21 the circumstance. As citizens, while we hold injured  
22 officers high in respect and support we recognize that we  
23 are praying for yet another victim of a senseless crime and  
24 violence. And there's too many instances that you turn on  
25 your TV, almost daily there's something of that nature. So

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1 we've just been praying for peace and tranquility,  
2 especially as we reach out to these young men who engage in  
3 this type of behavior, this type of conduct. And we know  
4 that the families of the perpetrators is grieving too  
5 regardless of the circumstance. So we submit our prayers  
6 to all concerned parties. But as we well know, we are  
7 really concerned about these officers attempting to recover  
8 and returning to full duty. The main thing is just  
9 continue to lift them up and their families as we have an  
10 ongoing issues of police shootings. As the chief stated,  
11 there's been about eight or nine in the last couple of  
12 months. So that is quite serious. Not the standard of  
13 what's happening across this country. So let's be  
14 prayerful, and let's be thankful that they recover.

15 As per request of Commissioner Dewaelsche and the  
16 recent enthusiasm of Commissioner Sanders, I have asked  
17 staff to contact Paul Montgomery, 9-1-1 Dispatch Center,  
18 Auto Pond Lot and Realtime Crime to arrange for visitation  
19 of commissioners so we can witness in action some of the  
20 great work of the department. In some occasions specific  
21 arrangements have been made. If you're interested in doing  
22 a visitation, please contact Mr. Robert Brown.

23 And I just bumped into Commissioner Derrick  
24 Sanders. He was on the ride-along with recently promoted  
25 Lieutenant Stacey Travis Greer out of the Fifth Precinct.

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1           And I want you to know; AC Williams, he was well treated;  
2           he was comfortable, and he enjoyed the experience.

3                       They also attended the Fifth Precinct Police  
4           Community Relations, and he was totally relaxed. So I'm  
5           glad that he's recovered from that other ride-along. So  
6           it's good to see that the commissioner is taking his  
7           challenge; not once, but also the westside and also the  
8           eastside. So Commander Ewing brought out all the new  
9           officers that have been assigned; the NPO -- the one NPO  
10          that was filling in, and it was a good opportunity and  
11          interaction.

12                      I don't know if Commissioner Sanders wants to  
13          elaborate.

14                      COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Well I definitely do. I  
15          definitely do. I had a good experience at the Fifth  
16          Precinct with also Officer May. We went to a couple of  
17          scenes, and I really seen how policemen work under  
18          pressure. And these guys was just excellent. They was  
19          what you called excellent police officers. They handled  
20          themselves very well; and the public they handled very  
21          well. And it was an eye-opener. It was really an  
22          eye-opener. I learned so much; and I'm going to keep doing  
23          these ride-alongs. Before it's all done I'm going to hit  
24          every precinct that we have on the Eleventh Precinct. So  
25          look out, I'm coming.

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1                   COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Commissioner  
2 Sanders, for sharing that experience. I don't need to do a  
3 ride-along. Well maybe I need an update ride-along. Maybe  
4 I can take advantage of that. We have that experience, but  
5 I'm glad others -- I might have to go out. I've been to  
6 the precinct. Not in terms of the most recent sitting in  
7 the cattle cars, so --

8                   COMMISSIONER SANDERS: It's a challenge.

9                   COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, it is. But the cars are  
10 much better than when I was riding around in them. And  
11 more technology too. But that's the challenge. We thank  
12 you for your commitment to that.

13                   Commissioners, please mark your calendar for the  
14 2017 Conference of the National Association of Civilian  
15 Oversight of Law Enforcement (NACO). The dates are  
16 September 10th to September 14, 2017. The conference will  
17 take place in Spokane, Washington. Please communicate with  
18 staff as to your interest and availability for this  
19 conference. In fact, Mr. Brown, Robert Brown, sent out  
20 information. Take a look at it. And you need to make  
21 arrangements with him, and let us know if you are planning  
22 to attend in a timely manner so we won't have any last  
23 minute interaction trying to schedule you. But the hotels  
24 and all that normally books up quite quickly if you want to  
25 be at the host hotel.

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1                   And today is the second Thursday in June, which  
2                   according to our bylaws is the date that we select a new  
3                   chair and vice chair. Staff notified The Commission on May  
4                   11th of this requirement and attached to our board packet a  
5                   copy of the bylaws on this point. Today attached is your  
6                   Board package of another copy of the bylaws which govern  
7                   the nomination process. And we are --

8                   Before we move right into that, I want to ask  
9                   Commissioner Shelby to speak to our chief investigator's  
10                  resignation. And we're going to ask Commissioner Shelby --  
11                  we received that about a week ago, and I consorted with our  
12                  chief investigator if we could have comments publicly at  
13                  this time.

14                  COMMISSIONER SHELBY: For the record; as the  
15                  Board members know, we received communications from our  
16                  chief investigator that she'll be leaving next month. I  
17                  believe toward the end of the month. I want to personally  
18                  thank her, and I know all the members want to personally  
19                  thank her. She got us through the consent decree. She got  
20                  us through the emergency manager. And I hate to see her  
21                  go, and I wish her the best. I'd like all the  
22                  commissioners to give her an applaud at this time.

23                  (APPLAUSE)

24                  COMMISSIONER BELL: Any other commissioners want  
25                  to share?

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1                   COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Well I'd like to say that  
2 I really do not want to accept her resignation, but we have  
3 no choice. She did such an excellent job. When I came on  
4 two years ago, she was slowly teaching me what it is to be  
5 a police commissioner and care about what you're doing and  
6 a police officer just as well as the job itself. And I'm  
7 really enjoyed talking to her and finding out things that  
8 we should know and need to know. I mean, she's a very  
9 caring person, and I'm going to hate to see her go  
10 personally, spiritually had I and every other way. So  
11 thank you very much for being there for us. And I'm not  
12 just talking about me; I'm talking about all of us, even  
13 though it sounds like I'm talking about me.

14                   COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: If I may, Commissioner.  
15 I also want to thank our chief for all that she's done,  
16 especially to make the department, the division operate so  
17 smoothly with very little disruption. As some of you may  
18 know, I was on the commission years ago, 1999; and I recall  
19 that back then -- actually Bishop Vann was on the  
20 commission with me as well -- that we had a lot of problems  
21 with backlogs, and just hundreds and hundreds or maybe even  
22 thousands I think.

23                   COMMISSIONER VANN: Yes.

24                   COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: And we just don't have  
25 that today. I think your leadership has just been



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1           astounding. It's going to be very difficult to fill your  
2           position. But I know that you have some goals in your life  
3           that you want to achieve, and that's wonderful. We wish  
4           you all the best, and God bless you. Thank you.

5                       COMMISSIONER VANN: Mr. Chair.

6                       COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes.

7                       COMMISSIONER VANN: I too want to join in the  
8           chorus of commissioners who are wishing our chief  
9           investigator a very happy life; and, of course, a great new  
10          chapter of life for you as well. I too can echo the  
11          sentiments of Commissioner Dewaelsche. I've been on this  
12          commission before. I have spent over ten years on this  
13          commission collectively; and I can remember when the office  
14          of the chief investigator was not run smoothly, was not  
15          organized, a lot of ineptitude and a lot of problems where  
16          it was overly politicized, and a whole lot of other things  
17          that I don't even want to get into tonight. But I am just  
18          grateful for your service. You have served impeccably.  
19          You served with a smile. And that smile, of course, lights  
20          up the room.

21                      I am particularly praying for you in this new  
22          chapter of your life. I know that you are pursuing a  
23          theological degree, and I'm very excited about that. And I  
24          look forward to our paths crossing down the road. And may  
25          you live as long as you want, and may you not have to want

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1 as long as you live.

2 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, through the Chair.

3 Chief Drake I also want to thank you very much  
4 for your service from the bottom of my heart, and also for  
5 all your help in all our conversations. And, you know, I  
6 just wish you well in your future endeavors; and I know you  
7 will be very successful.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: Commissioner Brooks.

9 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Yes. I just want to thank  
10 you for guiding me and helping me as a new commissioner.  
11 When you -- when I was asked to read the citizen complaints  
12 I thought, what are they? You know, why are they writing  
13 in complaints? But you took me to lunch and you laid  
14 everything out for me, and I understood everything. I  
15 don't want to see you leave. I don't want to start crying,  
16 but I'm very sentimental. I don't want to see you leave,  
17 but I really wish you the best of luck; and we're going to  
18 keep in touch. And again, thank you so much. I am sorry  
19 you all didn't have a building, but I'm happy that you came  
20 to our building; because if you had not come I don't know  
21 if I would have gotten to know you so well. Thank you very  
22 much.

23 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes.

25 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I'd just like to -- don't

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1           make me cry. I'm not going to cry. Thank you for your  
2           professionalism. Thank you for always being there to  
3           answer a question when I had a question, or when any of the  
4           commissioners had a question. Thank you for running a  
5           tight ship. Thank you for weathering the storm. Thank you  
6           for being you. We're going to miss you. And good luck.  
7           Thank you.

8                         COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Mr. Chair.

9                         COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir.

10                        COMMISSIONER MALLETT: So the chief investigator  
11           and I have an interesting relationship. She delivers to me  
12           -- is it complaints, Drake, that we look at where there has  
13           been -- the officers have been involved in a complaint more  
14           than one time. And in each of those instances,  
15           Mr. Chairman, you look at the thoroughness of the work that  
16           is produced.

17                        Drake, I can tell you that it is extraordinarily  
18           professional product. The work that you do on behalf of  
19           the citizens of the City of Detroit really goes unheralded,  
20           but by this Board of Police Commissioners does not go  
21           unnoticed. We are really -- you have really set a very  
22           high standard, as all of my colleagues have indicated, of  
23           professionalism. And we're going to be looking forward to  
24           the kind of work product from whoever comes next that you  
25           have developed over the course of these years.

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1                   You have done profound public service on behalf  
2 of the people of the City of Detroit, and we just thank you  
3 on behalf of the city for making sure --

4                   Part of the reason, Mr. Chairman, that we don't  
5 have some of the fuss and the mess that has is occurring in  
6 other circumstances is because Drake has been able to make  
7 sure that our citizens get heard. Drake has been able to  
8 make sure that our citizens are aware that there has been  
9 professional follow up. And whether or not there is  
10 satisfactory resolution has got nothing to do with whether  
11 or not a complaint was well investigated, recorded and  
12 delivered to this body at some point for evaluation.

13                  So, Pamela, I can just say thank you again, and  
14 echo everything that my colleagues have said.

15                                 (APPLAUSE)

16                   ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: Through the Chair.

17                   COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir.

18                   ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: On behalf of the staff of  
19 the Detroit Police Department, I want to say thank you as  
20 well. I know the chief if he was here he would have some  
21 things to say. But I can say for me for the times that I  
22 had interactions with your office everyone had a high level  
23 of professionalism. Anything that I asked they would  
24 provide. If it was something they could not provide they  
25 very professionally told me they could not provide it to

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1 me. And that level of care and concern that they showed me  
2 has to come from a leader. And it came from you, and I  
3 want to say thank you.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: And I just want to close it  
5 out. As you well know, in 2014 on my arrival I joined  
6 Citizen Complaints. In fact, I chaired that committee.  
7 And thereafter I was chair, vice chair, and chair. And I  
8 worked closely with the chief investigator because I had a  
9 great deal of concerns, because I was assigned as  
10 administration with a lieutenant from OCI for about five  
11 years. I wanted to see all of the backlogs; all those  
12 concerns you had. I had witnessed that before I retired in  
13 2003. So on returning I wanted to see the quality of work;  
14 I wanted to see -- and you raised the bar so high in terms  
15 of chief investigator, and that reflects on your staff.  
16 You know, even the former commissioner said -- she stepped  
17 down to join that staff. And I think that is was an  
18 enhancement, and have given you the authority to really  
19 mold and shape it. And I know I reached out to you. I  
20 said, we need to visit the academy and have some  
21 interaction; so you put together a power point that was so  
22 impressive, and your remarks was so in depth I learned  
23 something every time in terms of how OCI operates and some  
24 of the concerns, the interworkings of it that I did not  
25 have prior knowledge of. And we became a tag team with the

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1       you being the focal point. Because that's the reason why  
2       we wanted to make sure that the young officers understand  
3       the role of OCI and plus the Board of Police Commission.  
4       But the focal point of OCI in terms of dealing with these  
5       citizen complaints, that we are part of the system; we are  
6       not anti-police; We are here to service the community, and  
7       we're concerned about accountability and proper conduct, et  
8       cetera. So that's the bottom line. So as the class  
9       graduate -- two glass classes graduate next week. We have  
10      interacted with every class I think since that time frame.  
11      So it's been really -- I don't know what I'm going to do in  
12      terms of grooming somebody to fill that slot. Because you  
13      embraced it. You was enthused about it and have a passion  
14      for it. And that's what I like to see; when people have a  
15      joy in their work. It was not a labor, it was a labor of  
16      love. So I just want to thank you.

17                I stated on getting that phone call, I wish you  
18      the best. I'm sad to see you go, you know, but I  
19      understand there is another career path. You want to serve  
20      the Lord in a different capacity and move on. So we wish  
21      you blessing, blessing; and we're going to use you up until  
22      you leave to make sure we transfer some of that. So it's  
23      been really great, and that's why the Board expressed their  
24      concerns. So thank you. Thank you. And we'll do a more  
25      formal at a later date, next month. Okay.

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1                   Commissioners, we're going to move on to -- the  
2                   next item would be election of the chair and vice chair; so  
3                   the chairman of the board. The floor is now open for  
4                   chair. And the chair will accept nominations for the  
5                   chair.

6                   COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Mr. Chairman, I'd like  
7                   to nominate Lisa Carter for chair.

8                   COMMISSIONER BELL: Are there any other  
9                   nominations? Any other nominations? Any other  
10                  nominations?

11                  (No response)

12                  COMMISSIONER BELL: Chair would entertain a  
13                  motion to close nomination for chair.

14                  COMMISSIONER MALLETT: So moved.

15                  COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Support.

16                  COMMISSIONER BELL: It's been properly moved and  
17                  supported.

18                  Discussion?

19                  Those in favor, aye.

20                  THE BOARD: Aye.

21                  COMMISSIONER BELL: Those opposed? Motion  
22                  carried.

23                  The next item of business will be nomination for  
24                  vice chair. The floor is open now for vice chair.

25                  COMMISSIONER CARTER: Mr. Chair, I would like to

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1           nominate Commissioner Eva Dewaelsche.

2                       COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Support.

3                       COMMISSIONER BELL: Are there any other

4           nomination? Any other nomination? Any other nomination?

5                       (No response)

6                       COMMISSIONER BELL: The chair would entertain a

7           motion to close nominations.

8                       COMMISSIONER MALLETT: So moved.

9                       COMMISSIONER VANN: So moved.

10                      COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Support.

11                      COMMISSIONER BELL: Those in favor, aye.

12                      THE BOARD: Aye.

13                      COMMISSIONER BELL: Those opposed?

14                      Nomination is closed. And by the two seats being

15           unopposed the chair would entertain a motion affirmation

16           that these people are duly elected at this time.

17                      COMMISSIONER MALLETT: So moved.

18                      COMMISSIONER VANN: Support.

19                      COMMISSIONER BELL: It's been properly moved and

20           supported.

21                      Discussion?

22                      Those in favor, aye.

23                      THE BOARD: Aye.

24                      COMMISSIONER BELL: Those in opposition?

25                      The motion carried.



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1                   We commend and congratulate these two chair, vice  
2 chair. They will take office on July 1st. And with this  
3 timeliness of the process we will have a transfer of power.  
4 Of duty and responsibility. And I'm glad that this  
5 election went rather smoothly. Thank you commissioners.  
6 Thank you that we had order, and we heard you over the  
7 years.

8                   So we move on to the next item of business would  
9 be resolution for Attorney Tonya Phillips. And who's going  
10 to do this? Is that District Six?

11                   Oh, let me pause to recognize -- I think I  
12 recognize him -- former commissioner from District Seven.  
13 The one and only Commissioner Ricardo Moore. Good to see  
14 you, sir. Good to see you. And we're happy -- and I want  
15 to make a comment about something pending, but I'm not  
16 going to say it. I'll talk to you privately. Just a  
17 prominent person in the media about, you know, whatever.  
18 But it's good to see you. Thank you for attending, coming  
19 out tonight. So it's a blessing.

20                   I'd like to recognize Mr. Carter, Lisa Carter's  
21 husband, in the audience tonight. Thank you for attending.

22                   MR. CARTER: I'm tired of being called Lisa's  
23 husband. Once upon a time I was Tyrone.

24                   CITIZEN: And she tired of being called Tyrone's  
25 wife.

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1                   COMMISSIONER BELL: Well, as James Brown said, we  
2 will be nothing.

3                   Okay, it's good to see the commissioner, former  
4 commissioner, moving on to great things; and all of you,  
5 Mr. Carter, and all of that.

6                   We're going to move right into hearing from AC --  
7 Assistant Chief Williams at this particular time. I'm  
8 sorry. Pause. I got caught up in the drama.

9                   Ms. Phillips. At this time Ms. Phillips. Is she  
10 here? Oh, there she is. Okay, please come forward,  
11 please. And Commissioner Carter come around. Thank you.

12                   COMMISSIONER CARTER: All right, resolution  
13 honoring Attorney Tonya Phillips. Is this on? It's not  
14 on. Thank you.

15                   WHEREAS Attorney Tonya Phillips was born and  
16 raised in Detroit, Michigan. She attended Renaissance  
17 High School and received her bachelor's degree with  
18 honors and law degree from the University of Michigan  
19 Law School; and

20                   WHEREAS Attorney Phillips has a passion for  
21 social justice and in approving the quality of life  
22 for Detroiters. Her role as Executive Director for  
23 the Southwest Community Justice Center is to increase  
24 public trust in the justice system, assist in the  
25 reduction of crime, improve the quality of life and

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1 meet the needs of the community. She's able to  
2 combine her legal skills and love for the community  
3 work, by facilitating the first Community Court  
4 program in the City of Detroit; and

5 WHEREAS Prior to joining the Southwest Detroit  
6 Community Justice Center, Attorney Phillips worked as  
7 a staff attorney with the Michigan Legal Services.  
8 She also worked in private practice representing  
9 nonprofit organizations and small businesses, and with  
10 Maurice and Jane Sugar Law Center for Economic and  
11 Social Justice performing impact litigation; and

12 WHEREAS Attorney Phillips is very active in the  
13 community. She was appointed to serve on the City of  
14 Detroit Charter Revision Commission from 2010-2012.  
15 She serves as on the Board of Directors and volunteers  
16 with several organizations, including the National  
17 Lawyer Guild-Detroit, Michigan Legal Services, and the  
18 New Leaders Council; and

19 WHEREAS Attorney Phillips has been honored  
20 receiving the Distinguished Young Lawyer Award from  
21 the Wolverine Bar Association. She is also a past  
22 recipient of the Maryann Mahaffey Public Servant of  
23 the Year Award from the United Community Housing  
24 Coalition.

25 NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED

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1                   That the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners,  
2                   speaking on behalf of the citizens of the great City  
3                   of Detroit and the Detroit Police Department  
4                   acknowledge Attorney Tonya Phillips' outstanding  
5                   dedication. Her tireless advocacy for community and  
6                   commitment to improving the quality of life for all  
7                   the citizen in the Fourth Precinct and throughout the  
8                   City of Detroit merits our highest regards.

9                   We thank you for your leadership and congratulate  
10                  you Attorney Tonya Phillips. Signed by the Detroit Board  
11                  of Police Commissioners, June 8, 2017.

12                  (APPLAUSE)

13                  COMMISSIONER BELL: I'm going to ask Commissioner  
14                  Dewaelsche to stand with the photo. This is Southwest  
15                  Detroit, so let's make sure we --

16                  (PHOTO SHOOT)

17                  ATTORNEY PHILLIPS: Good evening everyone.

18                  ATTENDEES: Good evening.

19                  ATTORNEY PHILLIPS: I'm sorry, Attorney Phillips.

20                  ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: So through the Chair. I  
21                  believe Commander Walton also submitted a presentation that  
22                  we're going to do for Attorney Phillips.

23                  OFFICER: It's going to be covered during our  
24                  presentation.

25                  ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: Oh, it will be covered

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1           during the presentation? I'll stand down.

2                       COMMISSIONER CARTER: We're doing it during the  
3 presentation?

4                       ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: I think we need to do  
5 that. We need to do that now.

6                       OFFICER: I'm sorry, I didn't know that.

7                       COMMISSIONER CARTER: So it's over there, right?

8                       OFFICER: I apologize. I didn't know I was doing  
9 this. This is the Spirit of Detroit Award. It's presented  
10 here as an expression of the gratitude and esteem of the  
11 citizens of Detroit to Tonya Phillips in recognition of  
12 exceptional achievement, outstanding leadership and  
13 dedication to improving the quality of life. By the City  
14 Council of Detroit, Michigan.

15                       (APPLAUSE)

16                       ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: And if I can; I know this  
17 might be a little bit different, but we're going to hold  
18 this. On behalf of the Chief of Police, James E. Craig; I  
19 just want to say to everybody, Commander Walton and her  
20 staff at the Fourth Precinct also put together a request to  
21 do a resolution, and that's what she presented; the Spirit  
22 of Detroit from the City Council. But she also had a  
23 Certificate of Recognition that's going to be received on  
24 behalf of the Detroit Police Department signed by James  
25 Craig.

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1                   ATTORNEY PHILLIPS: Thank you.

2                   THE PHOTOGRAPHER: Get you in the picture too.

3                   (PHOTO SHOOT)

4                   (APPLAUSE)

5                   ATTORNEY PHILLIPS: Oh, wow. Well I just want to  
6 extend my very humble thanks. Thank you to the fine men  
7 and women of the Board of Police Commissioners. Thank you  
8 so much. I'm truly humbled. Thank you to Detroit Police  
9 Department. Thank you to Commander Walton and the fine men  
10 and women of DPD Fourth Precinct. Thank you so much. We  
11 couldn't do what we do without your partnership. Thank you  
12 for the Police Community Relations Board I see in the house  
13 and so many of the concerned citizens in Southwest Detroit  
14 and all over the City of Detroit. Mr. Carter, Ms. Theresa,  
15 Ms. Gonzalez and so many, so many others. Thank you so  
16 much. I want to thank my family. My husband, who's here,  
17 my mom, my son, the Leggos (Phonetic), and I want to thank  
18 the awesome team at Southwest Detroit Community Justice  
19 Center. The staff is here. No one can do anything by  
20 themselves, so thank you Patricia, and Naomi, and Juan.  
21 Thank you so much. Thank you Consuela. We all work  
22 together as a team. I'm honored. I'm privileged to be  
23 able to serve. It's an honor to serve, and I wouldn't want  
24 to do anything else. So thank you everyone here for giving  
25 me and some many of us an opportunity to serve. And,

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1 again, I'm humbled and appreciative. Thank you very much.

2 (APPLAUSE)

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Let's give another round of  
4 applause.

5 (APPLAUSE)

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: And I say that because this  
7 young lady, if you notice, she is a product of a public  
8 school system; graduated from Renaissance High School in  
9 Detroit. And as you well know public education is under a  
10 great deal of scrutiny, but you can see the caliber of  
11 people that we are producing. I know she graduated a...  
12 couple years ago, but it's such a blessing when we see  
13 people who strive. And with all the negativity, it's quite  
14 positive. I just want to give a round of applause again.

15 Thank you for giving back.

16 (APPLAUSE)

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: That's very crucial.

18 So we move on to assistant chief's report on  
19 behalf of Chief Craig.

20 MR. HICKS: Excuse me, Mr. Chair.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir?

22 MR. HICKS: We need a motion.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: We can entertain that.

24 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Motion to accept the  
25 resolution.

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1 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Second.

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: It's been properly moved and  
3 seconded.

4 Discussion?

5 Those in favor, aye.

6 THE BOARD: Aye.

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: Those opposed?

8 Motion passed. Thank you.

9 Yes, sir.

10 ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: Through the Chair, this is  
11 the citywide profile. This is as of June 4th. I'll give  
12 you some updates on some of the key bias numbers.

13 For homicides, we had a reduction from -- and  
14 this will be in comparison from 2016 and 2017. So for  
15 homicides, 4% down; sexual assaults 16% down; robbery down  
16 9%; carjacking 17%; aggravated assaults 8%; nonfatal  
17 shootings 6%, and total violence offense is 8%.

18 Now to give you the total numbers as of today;  
19 the homicide, the change or the difference has improved.  
20 We're now down as of today 8% on homicides. For robberies  
21 we're down 8%. For carjackings we were up 17%. Now we're  
22 up 14% -- or down 14%, I'm sorry, I should say. And that  
23 number is going to increase a little bit more. We had  
24 probably about I would say eight homicides -- I'm sorry --  
25 eight carjackings that will probably be backed out because



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1           it probably didn't actually reach the point where you would  
2           call it a carjacking or it was a false felony report. So  
3           the majority of them are false felony reports; so eight  
4           we're looking at backing out now, and that will cause a  
5           further reduction. And as for nonfatal shootings, that's  
6           as of today down by 4%. For property offenses -- again,  
7           these numbers are as of June 4th. Property offenses:  
8           Burglary went up 7% as compared to 2016. Larceny, we're  
9           down 14%. Stolen vehicles, we're down 6%; and total  
10          property offenses, we're down 6%. For the burglary  
11          numbers, even though it shows we're up for the last 28 days  
12          we have been trending down. So the numbers are doing well  
13          and the things that the precincts are doing to combat the  
14          burglaries are working as well. That's it for the CompStat  
15          report.

16                        COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

17                        Yes, ma'am?

18                        COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: I wonder if I could  
19          please ask a question with regard to -- the sexual assault  
20          numbers are significantly down if you compare them to last  
21          year. Is there something that we can attribute that to or  
22          -- but significantly down. From 2% last year to 16%, which  
23          is very commendable.

24                        ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: So the one thing I say is  
25          that the majority of sexual assaults you have occur with

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1 known individuals. But I'm not going to speak directly to  
2 it because I have Captain Tucker here, and we're going to  
3 let Captain Tucker from SBU -- if you come to the podium  
4 and speak to the question at this time.

5 CAPTAIN TUCKER: Good evening everybody.

6 ATTENDEES: Good evening.

7 CAPTAIN TUCKER: It's a real swift, brief answer.  
8 Awareness. We are allowing people -- it's normally called  
9 a silent crime. Now we're speaking in schools and making  
10 it okay to talk about your figure. They're reporting it  
11 more. It's very really simple. They're talking now and we  
12 can enforce it.

13 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

14 CAPTAIN TUCKER: Yes, ma'am.

15 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes. Yes.

17 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: You said on the car  
18 jackings, you said this is false reporting. I remember  
19 many years ago we had a real problem with false -- we had a  
20 large number of false reportings for carjackings. So is  
21 that something that recently just started?

22 ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: No. Through the Chair;  
23 we've had a -- we had been down on car jackings throughout  
24 the year; we just had a slight increase. And just to paint  
25 a picture. Last year this time we had 21 cases that were

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1 backed out because they were false felony reports. As of  
2 this year we had seven cases that have been backed out.  
3 And this is because we have not had the opportunity to go  
4 back and do a thorough case review of those questionable  
5 cases. So at this time carjacking is actually looking at  
6 those cases, and they're doing a thorough review; and  
7 that's why we'll have those eight cases probably backed  
8 out. But looking at how the numbers compared with last  
9 year, we could have some additional cases backed out as  
10 well.

11 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you.

12 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Mr. Chairman.

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir.

14 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: I wonder if I could ask  
15 Attorney Phillips a question.

16 Through your leadership of the Southwest Justice  
17 Center, when we did our citizen meeting over at LASAD when  
18 we were talking about the police department's management of  
19 its relationship with ISIS, how we were going to be  
20 managing our encounter with particularly Detroit citizens  
21 and people who live in the City of Detroit of Latin decent;  
22 I'm wondering have you seen an increase of persons in your  
23 office talking about their concerns; not being able to go  
24 to court, afraid to call the police?

25 'Cause I wonder, Mr. Chairman, if part of it is

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1 -- vice chairman Dewaelsche, if what we are seeing in terms  
2 of the drop, with all due respect to the captain, might be  
3 nonreporting of some of the members of our immigrant  
4 community. And I wonder if Attorney Phillips could talk to  
5 us about that just for a second.

6           ATTORNEY PHILLIPS: Sure. Sure, I'll be happy to  
7 speak about that. Of course I can't say whether it  
8 correlates to court or not, but I certainly can say that  
9 there is a lot of fear and apprehension in the community  
10 about the change in the immigration policies recently; that  
11 there is a great deal of hesitation in going to court. And  
12 our staff and other members of the community work very hard  
13 to assure people that when they come to court that there  
14 will be -- there will be a comforting presence. There's  
15 our office, there's an agency, and there's people there to  
16 help; and we don't want them to feel like they cannot  
17 engage in the judicial system and the judicial process.  
18 But there is a lot of fear. There is a lot of  
19 apprehension. And community members, community  
20 organizations, along with I know the men and women of the  
21 Fourth Precinct, we're doing the best we can to help in  
22 these times. But let me know if I can elaborate further.

23           COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Well I wonder are you  
24 keeping any kind of record of the number of reports that  
25 you get where people are saying, I would have reported this

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1 to the Detroit Police Department but I'm afraid and then  
2 deliver the information to you? I mean, I'm just wondering  
3 have you seen an uptake in that; in people coming to you  
4 for guidance in how they manage in this particular  
5 circumstance?

6 ATTORNEY PHILLIPS: Though we are seeing an  
7 increase that's not information that we track. We do track  
8 lots of things, but most of them are related to the  
9 judicial procedure and not necessarily from a crime  
10 victim's rights perspective. So I couldn't run a report on  
11 it but I can say we have been having many conversations in  
12 the community.

13 COMMISSIONER MALLET: Is there anything that --  
14 I thought, Mr. Chairman, that the board meeting  
15 that we had was particularly effective. I really do think  
16 that that was one of the times where even though we could  
17 not give the community the kind of definitive answers they  
18 were looking for it was clear, I think -- at least we sent  
19 the message, and the chief did too, that we were very  
20 concerned about how we were going to manage our  
21 relationship and the policies that we have that affect this  
22 particular section of the city.

23 So is there anything that you think that we could  
24 do as a Board of Police Commissioners to enhance the work  
25 that you're doing? Are there other opportunities that we

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1           might add to strengthen the community's receptivity to  
2           working more closely with the police department and with  
3           your office?

4                           ATTORNEY PHILLIPS: Absolutely. And thank you  
5           very much for the question and the invitation, because part  
6           of our mission is to increase trust between law enforcement  
7           and the judicial system. So things that this body can do  
8           is continue to reiterate that message. There are events  
9           that happen, not only in the City of Detroit but across the  
10          country that make people nervous, that make people  
11          apprehensive about interacting with police, about  
12          interacting with law enforcement; and the more that we can  
13          reiterate that we're allies, that we all have a common  
14          goals; that's to have a safe, beautiful community that  
15          helps. So as many times as that can be reiterated in  
16          public in terms of policy and documentation to be a  
17          welcoming body, I mean, that's something that the police  
18          commission can certainly take into consideration; making a  
19          resolution, or however you see fit, that this is a  
20          welcoming body, a welcoming city. And also part of what we  
21          do is falls on a restorative justice category. We work  
22          with -- I'm going to back up just a little bit and make  
23          sure that everybody knows what we do. We're a nonprofit  
24          501(c)(3) organization. We run a community court program.  
25          So we work with persons that have committed misdemeanors

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1 offenses. Things like driving infractions, loitering,  
2 being in the park after dark; low level nonviolent  
3 offenses. And we coordinate with the court to provide  
4 community service opportunities as restitution so a person  
5 can resolve the matter. And while they're working with us  
6 they also receive social services. Social services like  
7 continuing their education, taking English as a second  
8 language classes, job referrals, health care referrals to  
9 meet those basic life needs. And over time this model has  
10 been shown to help contribute to reduction in crime and  
11 beautification of the community. And as we work hand in  
12 hand with law enforcement, with Commander Laws, with  
13 Captain Serda, with so many other fine men and women people  
14 begin to trust the police. They don't think they're out to  
15 get them and shake them down for money at the traffic stop.  
16 So things -- and writing certainly a resolution, working  
17 with your sister agencies, governmental agencies, to  
18 reiterate that message again, not just in words but in  
19 terms of polices will be very helpful. And I'll certainly  
20 be glad to make myself available to follow up with that.

21 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Thank you.

22 ATTORNEY PHILLIPS: Thank you very much.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

24 ATTORNEY PHILLIPS: Thank you to this honorable  
25 body.

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1 ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: Through the Chair.

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes.

3 ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: Also if we look at the  
4 numbers, especially for sexual assault; looking at the  
5 2015, we had 218 cases year-to-date. Same time 2015 as  
6 year-to-date 2017. And 2017 our numbers are very similar  
7 to 2015. Where we had 218 in 2015, we have 213 in 2017.  
8 2016 was an anomaly year. At this time 2015 we had 254  
9 cases. So that's another reason for the difference. 2016  
10 was an anomaly year.

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you for pointing that  
12 out.

13 We are now going to hear a presentation from the  
14 commander of the Fourth Precinct. Now you get your  
15 opportunity.

16 COMMANDER WALTON: Hi. Welcome everybody. I'm  
17 Whitney Walton. I'm here with Captain Salona, who's  
18 actually going to do our presentation; but I have a few  
19 opening remarks. First off, I would like to introduce our  
20 two brand new NPOs, which is Garret Taylor and Amy  
21 Sarafenski (Phonetic). Stand up. They were actually  
22 appointed a few weeks ago, but they actually start June  
23 19th. We had to make some personnel changes. Also, Amy,  
24 stand back up. Amy is also the 2017 female officer of the  
25 year.



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1 (APPLAUSE)

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: She's our, what, 20 year  
3 veteran, right?

4 COMMANDER WALTON: Yeah. Are you 20?

5 OFFICER: Yes.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: I listen.

7 COMMANDER WALTON: She and I started together  
8 almost three years ago.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Wish you the best, And thank  
10 you. You look so good up on that stadium and with such  
11 a -- women in blue was so powerful that particular morning  
12 that we witnessed; Commissioner Brooks. And it really was  
13 an honor for the third effort -- I think the third program  
14 of that nature to lift up.

15 COMMANDER WALTON: What they didn't relate is why  
16 she was nominated. I wrote the nomination, and it had to  
17 do with a human trafficking case down on Electric; where if  
18 her and her partner had just walked away -- the run came  
19 out for a dead body. And they got there and a woman said,  
20 no, there's not. And they could have just walked away at  
21 that point, but Amy and her partner saw something was  
22 wrong, which ended up into a very large human trafficking  
23 case. So that's was why she was nominated and she deserves  
24 it.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: You know, you should make

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1           that recommendation, because we didn't know that. We had  
2           no idea. So they should share that --

3                    COMMANDER WALTON: It's not because she wrote a  
4           lot of tickets or anything; it's because it was deep. It  
5           was amazing work.

6                    COMMISSIONER BELL: I know it was 20 outstanding  
7           nominees, and I didn't know how they arrived. I assumed it  
8           was for outstanding work, but you've somewhat enlightened  
9           us. They should have make that part of the program.

10                   COMMANDER WALTON: Yeah.

11                   COMMISSIONER BELL: It only takes a couple of  
12           minutes to share that. That will lift up more the value of  
13           her work and why.

14                   COMMANDER WALTON: Yeah, she built a rapport with  
15           the woman --

16                   COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay.

17                   COMMANDER WALTON: -- that the Feds just wanted  
18           them to stay together. It was really great. One more  
19           thing.

20                   COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, ma'am.

21                   COMMANDER WALTON: By the front door there's some  
22           fliers for our Family Fun Day, June 23rd at the precinct,  
23           from 2:00 to 6:00. So if any of the commissioners would  
24           like to stop by. We have a lot of good food and fun. A  
25           lot of the police department things are going to be there;

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1 SRT. We have Aviation flying in. We have a basketball  
2 tournament through PAL. So we welcome everyone there.

3 And lastly, I want to thank Marathon, who gave us  
4 this great facility. And at the end of the event, if we  
5 walk out this door to the right there is a lovely hot  
6 catered meal by Marathon. It looks fabulous. So we need  
7 to speed this up so we can get to the food.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: I agree with you. It's on  
9 you, captain.

10 CAPTAIN SOLANO: I'm going to speed it up.

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: Take your time.

12 CAPTAIN SOLANO: AC, Commissioners. Fourth  
13 Precinct encompasses fifteen square miles and borders  
14 several suburban departments, as well as the Second, Third  
15 and Tenth Precinct. Fourth Precinct is home to a variety  
16 of business and a very diverse community. Our current  
17 population of approximately 71,000 citizens consist of 56  
18 Latino, 22% African American, and 20% white. Based upon  
19 our unique population, the Fourth Precinct has been  
20 intimately involved in the ongoing issues stemming from the  
21 federal policies regarding citizenship and deportation, as  
22 was just spoken about.

23 As a precinct confident that we do not engage in  
24 immigration enforcement we are continually working hard to  
25 ensure our citizens that we do not enforce immigration

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1 laws. As a matter of fact, the commander asked Homeland  
2 Security to come and address some of the community meetings  
3 to ensure citizens -- to ensure them, make sure they report  
4 their crimes. It's that simple. We routinely complete the  
5 U visa paperwork for victims of crime that are applying for  
6 temporary status and attend, as I mentioned, community  
7 meetings to spread the word that immigration status is not  
8 a factor when you are a victim of crime.

9           The Fourth Precinct is truly unique when compared  
10 to other precincts in many ways. But one distinct way is  
11 the pilot precinct working in partnership with the  
12 Southwest Community Justice Center headed by Executive  
13 Director Tonya Phillips. This organization in partnership  
14 with the City of Detroit 36 District Court offer an  
15 alternative to incarceration. The community court model is  
16 to make the court a problem solving entity, recognizing  
17 that fines and incarceration will not stop or prevent some  
18 crimes. Persons who are ticketed for misdemeanor offenses  
19 in the precinct are afforded the opportunity to participate  
20 in the alternatives to incarceration, which include  
21 community clean up, counseling, and other social services.

22           As of May 26, 2017 the Fourth Precinct showed an  
23 overall 21% drop in violent offenses as compared to 2016,  
24 and an 8% drop in property crimes compared to 2016. This  
25 reduction in crime was accomplished through the combination

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1 of hard work and dedication on the part of police officers  
2 and supervisors assigned to our Fourth Precinct. A great  
3 contributor to this decline was the excellent work by our  
4 precinct detectives. Fourth Precinct Detective Unit  
5 finished 2016 with a combined closure rate of 24%, which  
6 finished above the city average of 13%. In fact, the  
7 overall armed robbery, home invasion one, and nonfatal  
8 shootings, our Detective Unit led the city in closure rates  
9 in those categories. Additionally, in every category the  
10 Fourth Precinct Detective Unit exceeded the citywide  
11 average.

12 And, of course, none of this would be possible  
13 without partnerships with the community. So at this time I  
14 would like to recognize some of the community groups that  
15 have contributed to strengthening the bond between the  
16 community and the police. I'm going to have to hurry up  
17 because my voice is heading the other way. Fourth Precinct  
18 Community Relations President, Ms. Josephine Smith; the  
19 Original United Citizen of Southwest Detroit; President  
20 Tyrone Carter; Congress of Communities Executive Director  
21 Maria Salinas; Executive Director Chasey Condin (Phonetic);  
22 Ms. Amanda Holiday; Springdale-Woodmere Block Club;  
23 President Tom Fayz; Southwest Detroit Improvement  
24 Association President Maria Avila; Michigan Avenue Business  
25 Association President Joe Gappy; the West Vernor Civilian

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1 Patrol President Nicole Fisher; and the Mexican Patriotic  
2 Community of Metro Detroit President Alicia Juarez.

3 Members of the Fourth Precinct are committed to  
4 making this a safe area for citizens of Southwest Detroit.  
5 Their dedication translates directly into our goal of  
6 gaining the highest confidence of our citizens; that our  
7 officers and civilians take their issues and crimes  
8 seriously.

9 Any questions?

10 COMMISSIONER BELL: Commissioners?

11 (No Response)

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: If not, we thank you for --

13 COMMANDER WALTON: Oh, you want the meal, right?

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yeah. But thank you for an  
15 outstanding report on all the great things that's happening  
16 in the Fourth Precinct. Well done, and just continue to  
17 interact. That's what it's all about. Thank you,  
18 Commander. Thank you, Captain.

19 ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: And through the Chair.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes.

21 ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: For Commissioner Mallett,  
22 I just want to talk about the significance of the closure  
23 rate that they have at the Fourth Precinct. The Fourth  
24 Precinct; their average closure rate reaches the city by a  
25 phenomenal amount, phenomenal number. You can't reach that

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1 number unless you have citizens coming forward in  
2 cooperation with the police giving information, making  
3 statements to get those closure rates with the detectives.  
4 So this is a good sign that we do have that confidence from  
5 the community that is 56% Latino. So I just want to make  
6 sure that that's known as well.

7 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: No, I think that's an  
8 extraordinarily important observation.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes.

10 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: And the Board of Police  
11 Commissioners is really just very supportive of what the  
12 chief is intending to do; wanting very much to ensure the  
13 community that we want to continue to be a welcoming city,  
14 and with whatever we could do to make sure that that was a  
15 message that was well received. So absolutely, the Fourth  
16 Precinct is to be congratulated; and I thank you for that  
17 observation. That is certainly proof that the community  
18 remain very confident in their relationship with the  
19 Detroit Police Department. So thank you very much.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

21 And I just want to convey to the Fourth Precinct,  
22 Chief Craig; I talked with him earlier just prior to the  
23 meeting, and he really had a strong desire to be here, but  
24 there's been so many -- it's been a long day, a pressing  
25 week for him, as you well know. So we wished him the best.

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1 But he just wants to convey that he normally would have  
2 liked to attend the Fourth Precinct meeting but he could  
3 not just make it. And I can understand. It's been a long  
4 ordeal with the visitation interaction and his schedule. I  
5 just want to convey that to you. He said assistant chief  
6 would do a great job -- Williams -- but he sends his  
7 regrets. So I won't tell him about the meal.

8 And the next item of business will be any board  
9 standing or Ad hoc committee? I know we're going to hear  
10 from Commissioner Brooks.

11 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: We have a graduation coming  
12 up.

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, ma'am!

14 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I'm looking for the date.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: On the 16th.

16 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: The 16th at Second Ebenezer  
17 Church. We're still aggressively out here recruiting. So  
18 look for me, because I'll be back to your community. We  
19 are recruiting as hard as we can. We know that some of our  
20 policemen are getting shot, but you can get hurt on any job  
21 that you're on. So we wish them the best, and we pray for  
22 them; but we're still out here pushing. We have -- next  
23 week we have an event coming up at the COTS where we will  
24 have Sergeant Star. And Eva, what is your -- what is the  
25 other person that's coming?



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1                   COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Yes, we're going to  
2                   have some representation from SER Metro --

3                   COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Yes.

4                   COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: -- to do some  
5                   recruiting as well to assist in this in any way that we  
6                   can.

7                   COMMISSIONER BROOKS: It's called Career Day. So  
8                   any opportunity we get; church, Career Day, Sunday school,  
9                   anywhere we can go to recruit. Because being a police  
10                  officer is a career, and so we're really pushing that.

11                  But I have a question if it's okay if I ask.

12                  COMMISSIONER BELL: Oh, sure. You're the  
13                  commissioner.

14                  COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I'm looking on here and we  
15                  have a lot of violent offenses. Human trafficking is  
16                  moving up. Everywhere I go, everywhere I read; not only  
17                  here but in other places. I want to know is there a  
18                  department within the police department for human  
19                  trafficking?

20                  ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: Through the Chair. If I  
21                  could have Captain Tucker step to the mic again to address  
22                  that.

23                  CAPTAIN TUCKER: Good evening again. We don't  
24                  have a specific unit, other than my unit, Sex Crimes Unit;  
25                  but we are pursuing a partnership with the Feds as well as

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1 the Sex Crimes Unit to build a tasks force to address it.  
2 And I've also spoken to City Council regarding establishing  
3 a unit that specifically handles human trafficking. So  
4 it's an active pursuit of this unit, and we will have  
5 something for you shortly.

6 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Oh, that's wonderful.  
7 Thank you.

8 CAPTAIN TUCKER: Yes, ma'am.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

10 Any other commissioners?

11 Any other committee reports at this time?

12 If not, we will move on to the next item, which  
13 will be or board secretary, Mr. Hicks

14 MR. HICKS: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I do want to  
15 indicate and draw your attention to the four items that are  
16 on the agenda. These, again, represent communications into  
17 the office that are not on the agenda for the purpose of  
18 action during the meeting. And I call that to your  
19 attention that we did hear from Commander Barron, for  
20 example. We had a concern about this mock bomb exercise.  
21 That was something that was transmitted to the  
22 commissioners several days ago, and it was designed to  
23 alert you as commissioners that an exercise was taking  
24 place so that as you interact in the community, as people  
25 would raise questions with you, you would have information

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1           about it. But minus that observation, there are four items  
2           that were incoming that and are listed on your agenda. And  
3           that's all I have this evening.

4                        COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Mr. Hicks.

5                        Any old business?

6                        COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair.

7                        COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir.

8                        COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir. Last week --  
9           at last weeks board meeting I raised an issue about a  
10          retired deceased police officer, Ben Turpin, whose picture  
11          was in the Detroit Police museum. And that issue, I  
12          understand that the picture has been removed, which is an  
13          appropriate action. I believe it was removed sometime --  
14          well immediately after our meeting. Is there any other --  
15          if Mr. Hicks has any other update as to whether or not that  
16          picture will be displayed in any other area of the museum I  
17          still stand in protest.

18                      MR. HICKS: Through the Chair.

19                      COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir.

20                      MR. HICKS: No. We were informed that the  
21          picture was immediately removed. I am reminded by what the  
22          Board called for was that we enter into a dialogue with the  
23          police department to address the concerns that the picture  
24          tends to focus upon; and that is the history in the  
25          department of the fairly aggressive behavior on the part of

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1           that particular officer. And we have not began that  
2           particular dialogue as of yet. There are a number of  
3           people that come down on this question in varying ways,  
4           including the question of if you eliminate or eradicate  
5           those types of historical accountings whether or not you're  
6           eliminating the history. And there are other people who  
7           are concerned that, well you're not eliminating the history  
8           but that you put the proper context around the history,  
9           because people ought to know. And I think when I look at  
10          the work in which Commissioner Bell and Chief Investigator  
11          Drake has done in the academy in terms of informing new  
12          recruits or new members of the academy about the history,  
13          if you will, that what we ought to look at is to continue  
14          that dialogue in a way to put the context and not just  
15          simply eliminate some information. Because it's as  
16          important to talk about the context in which that occurred.  
17          And once that -- we agree upon in that dialogue on some  
18          language, we bring the language in front of the Board here  
19          and the Board will opine as to what it would want to do  
20          with the language and direct the department in whatever  
21          appropriate fashion.

22                        COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir. Well first and  
23                        foremost, I want to thank those in the department or  
24                        whomever decided to take that picture down, because it was  
25                        the appropriate thing to do. And I will forever be

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1 watchful and always in protest that that picture should  
2 find its way back into the Detroit Police Museum. Thank  
3 you.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

5 ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: Through the Chair.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes.

7 ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: Just to reiterate. I  
8 think that Mr. Hicks said it very well. One thing that we  
9 don't want to do is we don't want to glorify anybody who  
10 did wrong. But we also want to remember that history is  
11 just that, it's history. We want to know what it is so we  
12 don't repeat it; so you have to frame it in the correct  
13 context. The position where that picture was, was a  
14 position of what I would say honor. As soon as you walked  
15 in everybody saw it. It had no context of good or bad or  
16 indifferent. There was no learning, no education to be  
17 found with it. Not to say the picture will ever be back  
18 up, but if it is ever up again it will be in context. This  
19 is what you should not do. This is the history of the  
20 department. This is something that happened in the  
21 department. Let's make sure it doesn't happen again. And  
22 it should be something our officers should see and learn  
23 from. Just wanted to make sure that was said for the  
24 record.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. And we will have

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1 ongoing dialogue.

2 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Most definitely.

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes.

4 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: And I'm in agreement with  
5 the assistant chief. But also too, they are not putting up  
6 the confederate flag again; the confederate flags they've  
7 taken down across this country. They're not putting back  
8 up the statutes of individuals who oppressed and suppressed  
9 and discriminated against the community of color, the  
10 African American community across America. So I do  
11 understand the history and what context. But some of the  
12 images that are coming down across this country is  
13 appropriate. They should have never been up. And I  
14 appreciate the other comments and I will be forever  
15 vigilant about this particular issue. Thank you.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: And as we well know, there  
17 are well deserving African American officers and others who  
18 served this department with honor. And, therefore, we have  
19 opportunity, and perhaps even a profile or rotating profile  
20 of individuals who served this department honorably,  
21 including the first African American officer who was killed  
22 in the line of duty in Detroit. And we need to lift up  
23 individuals who really served with honor. And I look at  
24 some -- and I was familiar with some of these officers.  
25 Not maybe by interaction, but I knew through reputation,

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1       like Conrad Mallett's father who, you know, did not stay in  
2       the course, but he was one of those individuals that --  
3       Frank Blount. It's a list of people who served this  
4       department; not just in terms of rank but in terms of  
5       status of police officers; and they went through a whole  
6       lot. You know, we try to lift up some of them a year ago.  
7       But maybe we need to really understand when you put a  
8       prominent person like that and people have no idea that we  
9       need to really give them an idea. If they can take down  
10      the statute of Robert E. Lee -- General Robert E. Lee in  
11      New Orleans, who is a legend in terms of -- surely we can  
12      address the issue here in Detroit. And I think that's what  
13      we're dealing with. So we can put things in proper  
14      perspective, and that's what we really want to initiate.

15                I'm glad that our historian, Commissioner  
16      Crawford, brought it to our attention; and among other  
17      issues of that nature. But a young officer, even a young  
18      officer in this room, perhaps not even understood the  
19      historic perspective of Ben Turpin because they don't have  
20      that age and the longevity like we have. Even though I did  
21      not interact with them my father and others who did that  
22      profile. So we just want to put it in the proper  
23      perspective. He made me enlightened. He shared some  
24      remarks, but maybe we'll give you something in writing in  
25      the near future where you're going to get a clear picture.

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1           If not, you can talk to some of your people who are in  
2           their 80s and 90s. They can give you an idea. And that  
3           was not just Detroit; it was in Chicago, Beale Street.  
4           It's a historic role that when they hired these officers  
5           they had to act in a certain manner, and they were really  
6           brutal in this. And, again, what we're dealing with in  
7           2017. So let's put things into proper perspective as we  
8           move forward. And I thank you for that type of dialogue.  
9           Okay.

10                           Any new business?

11                           COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Through the chair.

12                           COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir.

13                           COMMISSIONER SHELBY: With the number of Detroit  
14           Police officers shot recently, I'm concerned about the bill  
15           that's being passed that's been going through the House in  
16           Lansing with you can carry a weapon without a CPL.

17                           COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes.

18                           COMMISSIONER SHELBY: I think this puts our  
19           officers at risk if we have everyone carrying a gun. They  
20           can carry a gun concealed without it.

21                           COMMISSIONER MALLETT: No question.

22                           COMMISSIONER SHELBY: So it concerns me. So is  
23           it possible that this board could draft a memo to maybe  
24           somewhat the key legislators letting them know that we  
25           don't want this bill passed?



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1 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Absolutely:

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: The Chair will entertain.

3 I'm glad that Commissioner Shelby brought that up.

4 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: So moved.

5 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Support.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: It's been properly moved and  
7 supported.

8 Any further discussion on it?

9 Those in favor, aye.

10 THE BOARD: Aye.

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: Those opposed?

12 Motion passed.

13 Thank you for supporting an issue that we should  
14 really be --

15 MR. HICKS: Excuse me. Mr. Chair.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir.

17 MR. HICKS: Just for clarification, we'll  
18 research the varying bills, draft a resolution and bring  
19 that resolution to the next meeting so that you can  
20 actually act on specific -- voice your position on specific  
21 legislation as it's moving through the legislator.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Mr. Hicks for  
23 always keeping us on point.

24 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I know one of the bills,  
25 House Bill 4419. I don't recall any other ones.

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1                   COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. Thank you. Thank  
2 you, Commissioner Shelby.

3                   Announcements. Our next meeting will be next  
4 week, June 15, at 3:00 p.m. at Public Headquarters at 1301  
5 Third, Third and Michigan.

6                   Our community meeting in July will be July 13 at  
7 6:30 p.m., at 10th Precinct Police Academy. That's 6050  
8 Linwood. That's two blocks south of East Grand Boulevard.  
9 And that will be your opportunity to visit the academy, the  
10 police academy of the Detroit Police Department. And I  
11 just want to mention that we have two classes graduating  
12 next Friday at Second Ebenezer Church, pastored by the one  
13 and only Bishop Edgar Vann, Northeast Detroit. So that's  
14 two classes graduating. And I think it's going to be quite  
15 a privilege to participate. If you are free at 10:30 a.m.  
16 I'm pretty sure the doors are always open, especially for  
17 this graduating ceremony. We are pleased that Bishop Vann  
18 is hosting us again. It's a great location. I love that  
19 location. And you know why, right?

20                   COMMISSIONER VANN: Yes, sir. It's on the  
21 eastside.

22                   ATTENDEES: It's on the eastside.

23                   COMMISSIONER BELL: It's on the eastside. And of  
24 course a historic church, historic community involvement.  
25 And all due respect, we get the same thing on the westside,

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1 but it's a little bit different on the eastside.

2 The next item of business will be the oral  
3 communication from the audience. Please give your name.  
4 And you have two minutes. We address public safety issues.  
5 There are other meetings where you can embrace the council,  
6 the mayor, and all the other activities. But the Board  
7 have responsibility in terms of public safety. So if not,  
8 we can steer you to the right person after the meeting if  
9 you don't get your time allotment. Because we have the DPD  
10 ranking officers and DPD neighborhood officers and we have  
11 a commissioner here. I'm pretty sure they would interact  
12 with you, any of your concerns. But we want to move on  
13 because we're on the clock right now.

14 Mr. Brown.

15 MR. BROWN: Yes, sir, Mr. Chair. We have Mr. Dan  
16 Wroblewski.

17 MR. WROBLEWSKI: Close enough.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir.

19 MR. WROBLEWSKI: Just don't call me late for  
20 dinner. As he said, I'm Dan Wroblewski. I retired from  
21 the police department in '93 after 20 years and then taught  
22 high school for 17 years. I want to commend the community  
23 police efforts. The MPO's and the improved Detroit App  
24 have done wonders in improving the quality of life in my  
25 neighborhood, as it probably has in others.

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1                   The issue I have is the use of Rouge Park for the  
2 Bomb Squad practice. Now I understand the need for the  
3 team to practice and by no means want them to stop. As a  
4 former member of the Underwater Recovery Team I understand  
5 the need for practice.

6                   As a resident of the city I am forced to put up  
7 with commercial grade fireworks starting with Memorial Day  
8 and continuing until well after Labor Day. Now add to that  
9 the unannounced bomb detonations by our Bomb Squad in Rouge  
10 Park. There's a half a mile in either direction from  
11 highly populated areas. Car alarms go off. It shakes my  
12 house. I can see Rouge Park right through my picture  
13 window. Next door explodes with my neighbors and friends;  
14 their dogs running away, jumping fences, breaking tethers,  
15 and other things like that. My own dog needs to be  
16 medicated for the afternoon because I have no idea when  
17 they're going to finish.

18                   Is there a possibility of relocating to a less  
19 populated area? Like I said, when they detonate those  
20 bombs they're a half mile from the neighborhoods on either  
21 side of the apartments. Or at least give the residents a  
22 schedule of their practices so area residents can make  
23 accommodations? I don't know if this is the proper forum,  
24 but I --

25                   COMMISSIONER BELL: It's a good question. This

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1 is the forum that we address those issues. I'll let AC  
2 Williams respond.

3 ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: Yeah, through the Chair.  
4 Both of those thing we can do. In addition to that, we can  
5 also make sure that we spread it around the city. I think  
6 Rouge Range, the archery portion of Rouge Range --

7 MR. WROBLEWSKI: Right.

8 ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: -- is one of the locations  
9 that they'd really like to use. But we can make sure we  
10 decrease the frequency of that happening, and we can also  
11 make sure that notification is made.

12 MR. WROBLEWSKI: And in fact, I've called the  
13 Sixth Precinct and I've called the Range, and nobody can  
14 give me an idea of when they're going to do this, how long  
15 it's going to last, how many bomb they're going to blow up.  
16 If they can give us a schedule of some kind, I mean, I can  
17 take my dog and walk her out in Hines Drive or something,  
18 get far enough away where -- and I can also notify the  
19 neighbors next door that this is going to happen and they  
20 can secure their animals.

21 ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: Okay. And we can  
22 definitely do that. Through the Chair again.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir.

24 ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: We'll make sure that we  
25 look to relocating. And until we actually are able to

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1 relocate we'll make sure we get a schedule out. And that  
2 schedule --

3 MR. WROBLEWSKI: I understand you got kicked off  
4 Belle Isle last.

5 ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: Yeah. Some other  
6 discussions there. But we'll make sure -- we'll try to do  
7 two things. We'll try to make sure the sixth Precinct has  
8 a schedule and then we'll also place a schedule next door.

9 MR. WROBLEWSKI: Perfect. Thank you. Thank you.

10 COMMISSIONER BELL: Could --

11 ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: We'll supply that with the  
12 Board of Police Commissioners as well.

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: Well there you go. I would  
14 help respond and definitely let this young man know about  
15 the -- that's something; they got kicked off Belle Isle,  
16 huh? I wish we could kick -- no, I won't say that. Yes,  
17 we just move on. So report back to that particular matter  
18 that we can make sure -- but I understand your concern. I  
19 wouldn't want that in my neighborhood. So don't move in  
20 Chandler Park.

21

22 MR. WROBLEWSKI: : That was going to be my next  
23 option.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Brown.

25 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, that's all the cards I

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1 have.

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, ma'am?

3 MS. LANDRUM: I didn't know there were cards to  
4 fill out. If I could just briefly --

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: I'm sorry. Would you take  
6 the mic, please.

7 MS. LANDRUM: Good evening. My name is Theresa  
8 Landrum, and I'm a resident of 48217. And I don't come to  
9 the commission meetings often because they coincide with  
10 other meetings that we attend. But I want to thank you  
11 guys for coming down and bringing it.

12 I just had a brief statement with the crime  
13 stats. Here in 48217 over the years we have enjoyed a low  
14 crime rate. But in the last year we have seen a serious  
15 increase on shooting deaths. As a matter of fact, in less  
16 than three months we've had four so far. Last year about  
17 five. And it's a great concern, because we know crime is  
18 city wide; but here in 48217 we have also experienced low  
19 police presence. It is always been brought to the  
20 attention of the police department and to the city.  
21 Through the help of Marathon, in the last few years, since  
22 the expansion, we have had an extra car and we also have  
23 had a stay. And that was in Officer Denmark, as well as  
24 Officer Labron. And now Officer Denmark, you know he has  
25 to go on to his greater good; but we need some more police

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1 presence down in Southwest Detroit. We know the city,  
2 downtown and midtown, is growing; and it seems the concern  
3 is always there. We are impoverished to a degree because  
4 we're retired 30, 40 years, so we don't have the means or  
5 the ability as more affluent areas that have the coverage  
6 of the police. So I'm bringing it to this Board's  
7 attention; we need more police in 48217.

8 The other concern is -- thank you, Commissioner  
9 Shelby for bringing it up. That was my concern. I saw it  
10 on TV about the house bill passing. And if it's no  
11 licensing, no class, no permit requirement that puts us all  
12 in danger. Because the young people, they think it's cool  
13 to carry a gun. And then we're older people in an aged  
14 community, we're fearful. So I'm kind of thinking it's  
15 going to be catastrophic if that bill passes. Because I  
16 don't think anybody that knows me wants me to go out and  
17 get a gun. You see what I'm saying. I used to carry a gun  
18 years ago when I was a prison guard for the State of  
19 Michigan, but I no longer do that. And I'm telling you,  
20 I'm afraid if I have to carry a gun again.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, ma'am. And I think the  
22 commander is going to speak to you.

23 COMMANDER WALTON: Come to the mic?

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: You can come to the mic.

25 COMMANDER WALTON: Commander Walton again. Yes,



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1 we do know because we did lose our NPO Denmark. He got  
2 promoted to sergeant. And there was a gap because we  
3 didn't have the manpower to put an NPO in. We do --  
4 Officer Taylor is going to be now down there, so I  
5 guarantee you he will be on it.

6 ATTENDEE: Where is he?

7 COMMANDER WALTON: Oh, stand up Taylor. And he's  
8 starting June 19th. And truly that was a manpower issue.  
9 And I apologize for any kind of -- we were down to two NOPS  
10 and we were very short, so I apologize for any distress  
11 that caused down there. We are aware of the issues that  
12 are down there. That is a challenge. And geographically  
13 it's a challenge down in your area. It's unfortunate that  
14 it's a geographic challenge. But we have been doing  
15 different targeted enforcement down there. We brought in  
16 TRU. We brought in Traffic Enforcement. We also have been  
17 working closely with River Rouge and the suburban, because  
18 what we see is a lot of cross boarder.

19 MS. LANDRUM: Exactly.

20 COMMANDER WALTON: You know, the people from over  
21 -- I was joking with Commissioner Sanders about Polk Street  
22 where he grew up, which is a thorn in our side in River  
23 Rouge, but -- so please go do something about that. No.  
24 But yeah, we are working on it. It's a challenge, but  
25 you'll see more and more presence down there.

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1 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Commander.

2 A COMMISSIONER: Through the Chair.

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes.

4 MS. LANDRUM: Just one other comment.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes.

6 MS. LANDRUM: When the stats are given citywide;  
7 I think when you go to district, each district, I think it  
8 would be helpful if you gave that district their crime  
9 stats. That would be helpful.

10 COMMISSIONER BELL: We do.

11 MS. LANDRUM: Okay.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: We have that type of  
13 interaction. They interact with the commander. They have  
14 CompStat. There's a while lot of information in reference  
15 to what department is engaging and reporting out et cetera,  
16 et cetera.

17 You trying to get my attention?

18 ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: Yes, through the Chair, if  
19 I may. Overall for the Fourth Precinct, the Fourth  
20 Precinct has some of the highest decreases in violent  
21 crimes in the city, as well as some of the highest  
22 decreases in property crime. They are doing extremely  
23 well. Now there is a history with the homicide rate. And  
24 it's because they're basically competing with the years  
25 prior numbers. They've had massive decreases over the past

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1        few years. So right now they're at a heightened point.  
2        But the strategies they're putting in place, they're  
3        showing that they're working right now. We haven't had any  
4        homicides in the Seventh Precinct in over a week, and  
5        that's -- believe it or not, that's excellent. And if they  
6        continue doing the -- it may sound bad, but sometimes  
7        there's a lot of violence occurring. And early on in the  
8        year at the Seventh Precinct there was a lot of violence.  
9        But that violence, they found a strategy for it and they  
10       have it under control right now which they're going to  
11       continue to have.

12                    We do have academy classes coming out with 55  
13        officers, which is one of the highest numbers that we've  
14        had this year, and the Fourth Precinct will be plussed up.  
15        So they're going to get some additional officers there.  
16        But just to make it known, every precinct in the city is  
17        short manpower. So we all have been struggling to make  
18        sure we have manpower with the attrition rate so high.  
19        Because we're still losing people to retirement and to  
20        other departments. So the strategy is still there, and  
21        we're doing more with less. And the Fourth Precinct is  
22        being very successful with the strategies they have in  
23        place for violent crimes.

24                    MS. LANDRUM: Thank you.

25                    COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Thank you.

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1 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: And by the way --

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir.

3 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: We do need more vehicles.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: We know that. We need more  
5 manpower. We need more equipment. And all the precincts  
6 are really seeking more manpower. We're graduating a  
7 class. But as we well know people are retiring; people are  
8 leaving, so we have about 150 plus openings now. We're  
9 aggressively recruiting. You know anyone who wants to  
10 join, as Commissioner Brooks stated, we are seeking police  
11 officers. We have civilians now. We have openings for  
12 civilians. We are doing everything possible that we can  
13 do. And we're doing a better job, but it's still not  
14 sufficient.

15 I told the people at the Fifth Precinct, we need  
16 your corporation. It's about your neighborhood. It's  
17 about your people. It's about your cousin, your uncle.  
18 It's about the young man was shot and killed on Gratiot and  
19 Chene. He come from a family. I don't know his  
20 background; but somewhere along the line when they drop out  
21 of high school or middle school they have a tendency to  
22 don't get on a career path. They don't leave Detroit.  
23 These are not people coming outside of Detroit. These are  
24 home grown folks that we are dealing with. That is the  
25 reality. So the more we can do in terms of parenting,

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1           being a family, and trying to encourage. I know the city  
2           -- the teachers are short everywhere. It's not enough  
3           teachers as we deal with the education issue. Until we  
4           resolve that we're going to have issues. You know the  
5           history. I'm speaking to the choir. I'm speaking to the  
6           concerned community. But let us continue to fight, fight,  
7           fight for all the positive things we can do and positive  
8           things we can say about what's happening in the City of  
9           Detroit.

10                           COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Mr. Chair.

11                           COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, ma'am.

12                           COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: If I may; I brought  
13           some fliers that will explain everything that you need to  
14           become a police officer. Please take some. Even if it's  
15           not for you, it's for -- as the commissioner said, for your  
16           grandchildren, your cousins, uncles, neighbors. Please  
17           take some information. And especially those of you who are  
18           representing organizations. I'd appreciate it. Thank you.

19                           COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair.

20                           COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, ma'am.

21                           COMMISSIONER CARTER: I just wanted to thank  
22           Ms. Landrum for her comments. Because all of you -- well  
23           many of you experienced the traffic coming out to 48217  
24           this afternoon. And it's like that all the time. Not all  
25           the time but all the time. And my concern is emergencies

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1 during that time and police presence. So it's a  
2 conversation that I'm willing to have with Commander Walton  
3 and the captain regarding response -- response time and  
4 police presence in 48217. Thank you.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. And in closing,  
6 let's dialogue on what's positive; how can we attack the  
7 problem. It's one thing to say this is what's wrong.  
8 Let's see how we can attack the problem. Any solution you  
9 might have or recommendation something we -- just like the  
10 young man spoke about bomb issues in their -- those issues  
11 we can probably resolve. And we are going to resolve it.

12 So if there's no other business.

13 ATTENDEE: May I --

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Well, excuse me. We have a  
15 process.

16 ATTENDEE: I've raised my hand, but you don't see  
17 me.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: We don't do hands anymore.  
19 We don't do hands anymore. Did we submit the cards?

20 MR. BROWN: She wasn't here.

21 ATTENDEE: I wasn't here.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay, we'll make an  
23 announcement at the beginning of the meeting to make sure.  
24 Because we don't want last minute people coming up and we  
25 get bombarded.

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1                   So there's two hands. Please come to the mic  
2 quickly please, because we want to move on and close up.

3                   ATTENDEE: I will be brief.

4                   COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

5                   MS. SMITH: Chief, Commissioners. Brenda Smith,  
6 Precinct 149, Midtown.

7                   Over the week there were several questions that  
8 was presented to a radio station that I do commentary on  
9 that's in regards to the curfew in downtown on the  
10 Riverfront. Is there a curfew for 16-year old students  
11 that are -- after 6:00? That's one of the questions, and  
12 we would like to know the answer to that before I leave.

13                   Also, since the suspect that allegedly killed the  
14 Wayne State police officer, Collin Rose, we would like to  
15 know what happened to the reward money? Was it -- it was  
16 strongly suggested that the money be divided between the  
17 two officers because they felt as though -- the listeners  
18 felt as though that they could use the money in their  
19 expenses and their medical expense.

20                   Also, there have been a -- because they are good  
21 police. That's what we all knew. But there were -- we  
22 have good police and we have bad police. We suspend them,  
23 and then we do recommendation for them or fire them. But  
24 lately there has been a war on shooting police officers,  
25 and this must stop. Their lives are at stake every time

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1           they wear their uniform in the public. It is a challenge  
2           for them to deal with the public. We should start giving  
3           them a raise in salary and show our appreciation for  
4           protecting the citizens of Detroit. I thank you for your  
5           attention.

6                        COMMISSIONER BELL: Assistant Chief Williams, the  
7           curfew issue.

8                        ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: Through the Chair. We  
9           have presented a temporary ordinance request to City  
10          Council that has not been approved. But we are requesting  
11          the same curfew be in effect that was in effect last year  
12          during the fireworks.

13                      MS. SMITH: City council?

14                      ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: At this time we're waiting  
15          for city council approval of the temporary ordinance.

16                      MS. SMITH: What about the salary?

17                      ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: As far as the reward --  
18          you said salary.

19                      MS. SMITH: The reward money and the salary for  
20          the police officers.

21                      ASST. CHIEF WILLIAMS: They are continuing to  
22          make the same salary. But as far as reward money, I don't  
23          know. I have to find out.

24                      MS. SMITH: Can we find out next week?

25                      COMMISSIONER BELL: Ma'am, excuse me. There's no



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1 reward for police officers functioning in their capacity  
2 I'm aware of. So there is no reward. That is the nature  
3 of their job.

4 Okay. Yes, ma'am.

5 MS. LOPEZ: Thank you for the opportunity. My  
6 name is Consuela Lopez. I live in and love Southwest  
7 Detroit.

8 First thing is you asked about stats for -- with  
9 emigrant residents coming to report crimes. I work  
10 directly with a lot of the residents here, and I can -- I  
11 would love to come and talk to you in person and give you  
12 actual like updates on the problems that we find. They are  
13 not coming -- they are not reporting because there is that  
14 fear. And I am working close in hand with the commander  
15 and the captain, as well as FBI and HSI in that in making  
16 some type of a neutral ground, which is the Community  
17 Safety Hub. And I'll get to that point later.

18 Human trafficking. I am working diligently with  
19 HSI, FBI, and DPD and council president Brenda Jones in  
20 regards to human trafficking. And our civilian patrol  
21 group has assisted DPD and FBI in resolving some of the  
22 cases that impacted the quality of life here in Southwest  
23 Detroit.

24 And the last two things are the happiest; is that  
25 is the Hispanic Police Officers Association is having our

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1 fifth annual scholarship fundraiser next Thursday at  
2 Giovanna's Lounge which is on Vernor. And I would not mind  
3 sharing that information. I hope you all can come.  
4 Because we've had 23 kids who are all DACA who are now  
5 going to Harvard, Princeton, MIT in full rides. So we want  
6 you guys to come out and help us celebrate that.

7 And the last one is, on June 29th will be our  
8 first anniversary of the Community Safety Hub. It's the  
9 first ever community safety led by residents working  
10 closely with law enforcement; local, state and federal.  
11 And we would love to invite you all to celebrate our first  
12 year, and I will not mind sharing that information with  
13 you. And thank you so much. And that's it.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

15 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Could you please give  
16 the date and time for the scholarship event again.

17 MS. LOPEZ: It's June 15th. What time is it?  
18 It's at 5:00. I just got nervous all of a sudden because I  
19 never stood up here and talk to anybody. It's at 5:00.  
20 And I think I sent out an email for that.

21 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Okay.

22 MS. LOPEZ: Gracias.

23 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: No. Thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: Commissioners, I want to  
25 entertain a motion for adjournment at this time.

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1                   I want to thank all of you for coming out this  
2 evening. We're going to have fellowship, and there's a  
3 meal. And Marathon, thank you for being a great host.  
4 We'll have that time to interact too.

5                   COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Move for adjournment.

6                   COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Support.

7                   COMMISSIONER BELL: Been properly moved and  
8 supported?

9                   Discussion?

10                  Those's in favor aye.

11                  THE BOARD: Aye.

12                  COMMISSIONER BELL: Those opposed?

13                  Motion carried. We stand adjourned. Thank you  
14 once again, and have a great evening.

15                  (At 8:16 p.m., proceeding concluded)

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
