CHAIRMAN BELL: Good evening. I want to extend a warm welcome to the Board of Police Commissioners Monthly Community Meeting here this evening. Good to see all your smiling faces in terms of attendance. We're hopeful that we can move the issues at hand in terms of the agenda for this evening.

I just want to call up -- I am Commissioner Willie Bell, your Chair for District 4, and I would like to call up the Senior Pastor Bishop Lambert W. Gates, Senior, Greater Apostolic Temple Church to rendered a welcome and opening prayer for our meeting. Good to see you, sir, appreciate you. PASTOR GATES: I'd like to say good evening. AUDIENCE: Good evening.

PASTER GATES: We welcome you to Greater
Apostolic Faith Temple, the Board of Commissioners, all of you who are here part of our community, we are very honored that you selected our church to come and carry forth your meeting on tonight.

May we bow our heads as we pray.
(Prayer.)
CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, sir, appreciate
it. And to my immediate right is our Vice Chair Lisa Carter and also this is her district, District 6. I'm going to ask her to render welcoming remarks also.

VICE CHAIR CARTER: Good evening.
AUDIENCE: Good evening.
VICE CHAIR CARTER: Thank you all for coming out this evening. My name is Lisa Carter, Vice Chair to the Commission. This is my district, District 6. I'm a proud member of it. I was born and raised in the City of Detroit and live here with my husband and my two sons who are here tonight and I'm looking forward to representing you in the future.

A little bit about myself, I spent 27 years with the Wayne County Sheriff's Office where I retired at rank of Lieutenant. At the time of my retirement I was the Lieutenant in charge of training unit, and after that $I$ was looking for an opportunity to further service the community and I volunteered for three months, well, $I$ was told three months, down at Wayne State University Center for Urban Studies and I ended up being hired on staff.

I work down there with the AmeriCorps Urban Safety project where we're out in seven different communities servicing residents trying to bring the community together through block clubs, building block
clubs, board-ups, cleanups. You name it, we do it. We have foot members out servicing those areas. So I'm glad to be here. Thank you for coming out and look forward to continuing as your Commissioner. Thank you. CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, Commissioner

Carter. I like to ask Commissioner, I want to say better half, $I$ want to say good half, her husband and her two sons to stand up and be acknowledged at this time. Let's give them a round of applause for the family.
(Applause.)
CHAIRMAN BELL: I want to say to Tyrone and Lisa, we had an opportunity to serve at a prayer breakfast for men and boys at Tabernacle Baptist Church a couple weeks ago, and he had opportunity to speak and he stated that some people say my son is on drugs, I drag them everywhere $I$ go. And I think that's really what family is all about and should be about in terms mom and dad interacting and exposing children, young people, young adults, to all activities that they should be engaging in. So $I$ think that's a blessing, the Carter family and we have good representation in terms of District 6 through her leadership.

At this time, I'd like to ask Commissioners starting to my left to introduce themselves, please.

Commissioner Ricardo Moore, representing District 7, Precincts 2, 6, and 10. I would like to acknowledge Precinct Captain Steve Walton from 6 and from the 10 th Precinct Nick Kyriacou. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Eva Garza Dewaelsche, born and raised in Southwest Detroit, still work here and $I$ was appointed by Mayor Duggan in February of this year.

COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Commissioner Conrad Mallett, lifelong Detroit resident, appointed by Mayor Duggan.

CHAIRMAN BELL: And to my extreme left, this young lady you've probably been exposed to, she's active in the community, the Deputy Chief Renee Hall. Let's give a round of applause for the Deputy Chief

Renee Hall.
(Applause.)
CHAIRMAN BELL: Mr. Anthony, our Board Secretary, would you introduce the staff of the Board of Police Commissioners, please.

SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Mr. Chair. For the record, George Anthony, Secretary to the Board. Before I do that, Mr. Chair, I would just like to put on the record, Commissioner Jessica Taylor and Bishop Edgar Vann are both excused for today's meeting.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, sir, for that.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: We have seated in front, Ms. Pamela Davis-Drake, our Chief Investigator, and seated next to her is our Attorney to the Board, Ms. Linda Bernard. Mr. Robert Brown, our Administrative Assistant is also seated in front, we have Sergeant Alan Quinn recording our proceedings in the back, and Ms. Elizabeth Koller, from Hanson Court Reporting Service taking the transcript.

That completes the introductions.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, sir. I just want to say we are really pleased to have this opportunity to be here in Faith Temple, the house of the Lord on the southwest part the of City and we're thankful for the hospitality. We have catering Blue Star Cafe,
breakfast, lunch and catering and they are sponsoring the meal. Is anyone from Blue Star Cafe here? Would you raise your hand? Thank you. We appreciate you. (Applause.)

COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Mr. Chair, we have a former Commissioner here, Erminia Ramirez. If you could please raise your hand or stand. Thank you.

MS. RAMIREZ: Thank you.
CHAIRMAN BELL: We have a pretty tight agenda and I'm going to as far as the duties and responsibilities, all of you should have this handout, the faces of the Commissioners. We all have this handout out in the back of the room and also there's a sign-in sheet in the back. We all have it?

SPEAKER: No.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Would you please circulate copies in the back and make sure you get a copy. Would someone bring a copy up, please? I just want to say that the Board was established in 1974. The first revised City Charter became effective July the 1st, 1974.

Our overall function of the Board is the liaison between the citizens of the City of Detroit and the Detroit Police Department. And all that you want to know about the Board of Police of Commission is on
the City's website. In fact, the website's been upgraded this year. There some fantastic information there about the history, minutes, and also our profile of all the Board of Police Commissioners.

So I hope that would be suffice in terms of addressing the duties and responsibility in terms of the handout is there and you can find more about it in terms of going to the website. So we're going to move right on. Okay. If you need a copy, please raise your hand and they'll circulate a copy.

I'm proud to introduce a young man who does not need any introduction, Chief of Police James Craig.

CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you.
CHAIRMAN BELL: He is now taking his seat. Appreciate it.

CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioners, you have before you the agenda for tonight's meeting. The Chair would entertain a motion to approve the agenda for Thursday, June 11th.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair, a point of order. You still have yet to move a motion to approve the agenda as presented.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Well, that's what we did with the agenda as presented.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: You said, "minutes."
CHAIRMAN BELL: I'm sorry. Corrected. The
Chair would entertain a motion to approve the agenda as presented.

COMMISSIONER MOORE: SO move.
COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Support.
CHAIRMAN BELL: It's been properly moved and second. Ready for the question, those in favor, aye?

COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed?
COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Are we going to be allowed to have conversation, sir?

CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir.
COMMISSIONER MALLETT: So Mr. Chairman, part of the duties and responsibilities that we have as you point out on the agenda that's been presented which is under New Business, Item Number 14, is a selection of leadership of the Board. This responsibility ought to be done and carried out in thoughtful manner.

And I certainly believe that we ought to provided even a small amount of notice to be sure that we are aware exactly of who was running, the substance associated with the agenda that they intend to carry
out as an elected official.
And as $I$ understand it, the first notice that Members of the Board had as relates to Item Number 14, I guess, was yesterday. And I wonder, Mr. Chairman, if the Commission really believes that rushing to a decision at this particular point in time is appropriate? It seems to me that this matter, while not groundbreaking in terms of importance; nevertheless, it does require a modest amount of deliberation.

And I wonder, why we are moving so very quickly? Commissioner Taylor is not here; Commissioner Vann is not here. I have not spoken with either one of them so I don't know if they would desire to participate in this process or not. But $I$ expect that their active participation as Commissioners they would.

So I just would ask my fellow Commissioners to step back for a moment and recognize the possibility of being more inclusive in the process than we currently are.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Mr. White -- I'm sorry, Mr. Crawford.

COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes. Through the Chair, this is just democracy. That's the way democracy is run. That's what this is all about.

Also, too, with all due respect, Commissioner Mallett, I heard that you were a candidate and I want you to know, sir, previously years ago I always went to the back of the ballot and voted for Mallett. So --

COMMISSIONER MALLETT: So I appreciate that. When I ran I needed every vote. I know yours is crucial.

COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: But I heard you were a candidate in this process, too. So this is simply democracy up front and close. So I think we need to proceed. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Mr. Chair, I have a comment --

CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioner White -- yeah, go ahead.

COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: I also am a bit surprised that we were not provided with sufficient notice. It was my understanding that the Officers would be elected and take position July 1st, so I assumed that the election would occur the last week in June.

So when we were notified yesterday, I felt that that was not sufficient notice given that this is a very important and significant event on our Commission and that is electing our new Officers for a

1 year. And so I do want go on record in saying that $I$ am concerned that we don't have a process. And from what I understand there were problems last year. I was not here.

And maybe, you know, we ought to have learned from last year that we needed to have a written process on how we were going to have elections and that everybody should know what that process is on the Board and so that we can all be included in that process. And $I$ just want to go on record in saying that. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN BELL: One more comment. Commissioner White.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I also would like to rise to express concerns over the election procedure. This august body has a rich tradition of forwarding to the community both transparency and accountability through oversight of this department.

Several Commissioners have expressed an opportunity. Commissioner Mallett stated he did not have an opportunity to speak with Commissioner Vann or Commissioner Taylor, both, which I did, when I learned of their absence. Both who very much would like to be a part of this process and have their ballots cast,
both also had expressed concern with the lack of notice given to the process.

I share those similar concerns. There's nothing before us in this election process that cannot be completed on any other given day. So given the rise of concerns, given the importance of democracy as my Colleague Crawford has referenced, I would yield to the opportunity to get this right versus having Commissioners walking away or the community view this as a political expediency process versus a totally potentially democratic process. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay. I'm going to ask our Board Attorney to speak to the issues in terms of our bylaws and notification and unfortunately $I$ agree that we need to have a process in place. And I know Commissioner Taylor could not be here tonight. She expressed her support to go forward. And her grandson is graduating.

But basically we never have a hundred percent participation at any meeting of all the Commissioners since $I$ been involved. I think that's been a rare occasion.

So, Ms. Bernard, would you -- and you're correct, we had those issues before and I don't know probably in the past before $I$ arrived but basically I think after this we need to go through the process of drafting concerns in terms of black and white, it won't be past practice or historically, that type of thing.

ATTORNEY BERNARD: Mr. Chair, Linda Bernard, for the record. The Charter simple indicates that the Board shall elect a Chairperson annually. And it goes on to say that the Board shall meet at the call of the Chairperson, and then it says, for the terms of the various Commissioners.

Now, your bylaws, hold on, and I think the bylaws and there's a provision in the Charter as well that says as of -- your new Officers have to be seated by July 1st. So that is $I$ think why this matter is on the agenda at this point.

There is no process in response to Commissioner Dewaelsche's statement for an election other than what is generally common in assemblies of this type and that is that nominations are made from the floor and they're voted up or down.

And it's my understanding that that's what the Commission has done in the past. There's never been, quote, a nominating committee. I believe I saw your correspondence to that effect and other things. Nominations are made from the floor, you vote them up or down, and straight parliamentary procedure pursuant
to Robert's Rules.
Beyond that, $I$ don't know there's nothing I
have to add, Mr. Chairman.
CHAIRMAN BELL: The Chair would entertain a
call for the question, those in favor of the motion? ATTORNEY BERNARD: The motion is to approve the agenda?

CHAIRMAN BELL: That's correct. Those in
favor, aye?
COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed?
COMMISSIONERS: Nay. No.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Is it clear? You need a roll

CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, sir. The next item of business would be Item Number 10, approval of the minutes from Thursday, June the 4 th. The Chair would entertain a motion to approve the minutes.

COMMISSIONER MOORE: SO move.
VICE CHAIR CARTER: Support.
CHAIRMAN BELL: It's been properly moved and supported. Ready for the question. Those in favor,
aye?
COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed? Motion
carried. Thank you.
In terms of the next item would be my report.
I just want to say that this is my last community meeting as the Chair, which we move forward with the election process the Chair can only serve one year.

And in reference to this election I think it -- I strongly believe that we need a transition period for the next Chair in terms of this process and that's something that we advocate.

And I want to say I wanted to have the Community Meeting at a forum because we do not get the attendance at our Public Safety Meeting at 3:00, we have very few people come out, and I think you need to witness, even the young people, witness democracy at work in terms of we might not all agree 100 percent, but basically any family might disagree, but the point is you disagree and you move forward when you reach that climax.

We witnessed that with the Council in reference to once elected Council President they moved forward. We definitely need some written black and white policy in place. But it's been in existence
since ' 74 in terms of there were five and now we have eleven Commissioners and that is a drastic change in terms of the politics of any election I've been involved whether it be block club, church activities, it always politics in terms of you can't keep everybody 100 percent happy even if the Charter is clear.

As you well know, we went through drastic Charter changes in terms of dealing with Charters and the Charter's been amended. But people have opportunity -- this Board has opportunity to vote. And any time you have majority you have opportunity to vote. A generic agenda goes out. I wish we could do better and $I$ hope to do better in terms of being a member of this Board.

So as we move forward, I just want to say that is my remark and remarks in terms of where we are and where we need to go because we know the issues are critical for this Board and for this community and we must be all together collectively and $I$ just really appreciate the Commission in terms of speaking their mind and their concerns in a forum like this. There's been a whole lot of dialog in the 24 hours, but the bottom line is you come together and you vote and you move on.

So I'm going to ask, next point of business
would be, Chief Craig. It's good to see you, sir.
ChIEF CRAIG: Thank you. Sorry I was a few minutes late. Forgive my voice. Detroit allergies have gotten the best of me. I'll hang in as long as I can.

But I would like to acknowledge and for those who live in Southwest area a little league park right around the block, I can't think of the name, but we were celebrating Juan Carlos, a local -- I call him a local hero, 18 years of service in this community coaching a little league baseball team. So I had the good opportunity to be part of the recognition of his effort.

But in addition to that, five of our Detroit Police Officers work in a league as coaches. They do that as volunteers. They work in this area, as well. So really it's just a credit to the kind of men and women we have serving this City.

I want to also acknowledge Mother Bernice. She looped me into, and I did say "looped," she looped me into being a keynote speaker at the recent --

MS. SMITH: And you was good, too.
ChIEF CRAIG: Well, I appreciate that. And I think after that I lost my voice. But, you know, Renaissance -- having been a graduate of Cass Tech
certainly we had a little friendly rivalry going. And I really enjoyed it. Mother Bernice, thank you for the opportunity to do that.

I want to also acknowledge President Bell.
We had an Officer sustained a gunshot wound last weekend. He responded to the hospital to make sure the Officer was fine. So I appreciate that, President Bell for your commitment to that.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, Chief.
CHIEF CRAIG: Then as $I$ get ready to talk about crime stats, we are overall crime we're down 14 percent year-to-date, again, compared to last year we're down 27 percent at this time. So we're still trending in the right direction.

Overall violent crime we're down four percent and property crime we're down 18 percent. We are up in one category, the area of homicide. We've taken a critical look. Again, we're fighting last year's statistics. This time last year we're sitting on a 14 percent reduction. And as you've heard me report out we ended last year with 299 homicides which was the lowest number in 45 years.

But I will tell you still, still too many homicides. But, again, we are trending in the right direction. Sexual assaults are down 29 percent; crime
of robbery down 20 percent, compared to last year we're down this time 39 percent; carjacking, down 15 percent. So I am extremely ecstatic, one, because of our work with our community.

But I want to take a moment just to acknowledge the Command Executive Team, particularly the Captains who have tremendous pressure. I think we need to go around the board and ask the Captains what they deal with everyday under tremendous pressure but step up each and every time, and I want to personally give them a public thank you for a job well done. (Applause.)

CHIEF CRAIG: I want to also acknowledge the Neighborhood Police Officers. I see one, two. How many Neighborhood Police Officer do we have? Three. Great. I want to thank them for what they do. They really truly and $I$ hear this almost daily, really a vibrant link into the community.

And so that's really what makes a difference when $I$ talk about relationships and building bridges. They truly are on the ground representing you, representing the Police Chief and the Police Department and City of Detroit. And so I want to thank you for that.

But when I talk about specifics over this
past week, certainly the leadership of some of the folks here, certainly I saw Chief Fitzgerald at -- I don't know, but he's over at the ball field paying recognition to J.C., but as you probably saw in the news a serial rapist in this very area was arrested. I will tell you great, great work by the men and women. (Applause.)

CHIEF CRAIG: Over the past couple weeks, two groups, violent carjacking suspects, one recent we just arrested. Certainly before that we had the tragic situation involving the murder at a local gas station. Those suspect were arrested. As you know we talked about some home invasion in the Twelfth Precinct. I want to talk briefly about the work Captain Balinski's done recently.

His area was experiencing a -- it was the north end, if I'm correct, he saw an increase of carjacking and really just this week made a key arrest on some violent suspects. And so I want to thank him for that.
(Applause.)

CHIEF CRAIG: Certainly, one of my partners Deputy Chief Hall, when $I$ can't be somewhere, she's there. If I've got to leave tonight she's going to be sitting right here. I want to take your tough
questions before $I$ give it to her, so.
I want to personally thank Chief Hall who was on a very lengthy conference call two nights ago a Baptist conference and the curfew. She's going to be on another probably very lengthy call so I want to publicly thank her for that. And finally, I want to thank what we affectionately refer to as the Chief's height man, Commander Todd Bettison.
(Applause).
CHIEF CRAIG: Todd and his staff are doing tremendous work and I want to thank him publicly. We are in the throws of this powerful youth peace summit set for the end of the month, excited about that, and that's going to be one of three held this summer; our first one being at the Butzel Center on the Eastside.

And so with that, $I$ open up for any questions the Board may have.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Chief, before we do that, would you introduce your staff and other Officers in the house? Did we do that? No.

CHIEF CRAIG: No, we didn't. And I just ask they stand and acknowledge them --

CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes.
CHIEF CRAIG: -- in case I missed someone. Starting with Chief Hall.

DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Also, Chief, we have Lieutenant Gross, who's going to do the presentation for the Precinct.

CHIEF CRAIG: Okay.
SPEAKER: For that Butzel thing, say the date.

COMMANDER BETTISON: It's going to be the 25th of June, 25th, so. I'm going to have a whole bunch of kicker cards out and it will have all the information. I've got a thousand of them being printed right now. We're pushing it out and you'll have them on the airwaves, everywhere, everybody will know.

CHIEF CRAIG: And on the note of that, you know, some of you may become aware, the Commission may become aware there was a YouTube video recently involving dancing Detroit officers.

COMMANDER BETTISON: Yes.
CHIEF CRAIG: It caused some anguish on the part of some. But when you look at what's going on across America today, really these young Officers who were probably the same age as those in attendance really touched the hearts. That YouTube video got over one million views.
(Applause.)
CHIEF CRAIG: Detroit Police Officers. Now,
we would not preferred for him to go upside down with a pistol in his holder, but we had a good conversation. The good news is he will be in attendance at our Peace Summit. He's going to be not in the uniform with the gun but he will be in probably a sweat suit adorning the Detroit Police Department. He's going to get up and do this thing --

SPEAKER: Yeah.
CHIEF CRAIG: -- at our Peace Summit. So we're excited about that. Anybody else want to introduce -- we got our SWAT Commander here.

Phenomenal job. Recently we had several very -- I don't know if $I$ reported out, we had several barricaded suspects. One certainly ended in a fatality. One of our Officers sustained a got shot wound.

I talked publicly about the need and necessity that our Officers are properly protected wearing helmets approaching the location in armor-type vehicles so that they can save, protect their own lives as well as the lives of others.

So Captain Williams is here. I don't know if Vern is here. Thank you for --

SPEAKER: He's on vacation.
CHIEF CRAIG: He's on vacation. But $I$ just want to give an acknowledge to Captain Williams and his
leadership. The Captain had also jumped into the frying pan of homicide. She's Commanding Officer. And there's so many to acknowledge.

Anybody else want to get up and give yourself -- over in the Seventh Precinct worked in the community.

Captain Kay or Special $K$ as they refer to him in the loth Precinct. Okay. And with that, any questions?

CHAIRMAN BELL: I'd like to acknowledge Captain Bliss on the Fifth Precinct, my Precinct, in terms of Fifth Precinct. He was there at the meeting and he seen the Village the next couple nights, so here he is again in terms of doing great things on the Eastside of Detroit.

And I can't say enough about June 25th, that's going to be on the Eastside of Detroit, Kercheval and Van Dyke at Butzel Community Center. For all you Westsiders you need to find your way over to this outing because it's going to be off the hook in terms of young people. You want to know what we're doing with young people, then you need to come over on Eastside of Detroit on -- what's the date?

SPEAKER: June 25 th.
CHAIRMAN BELL: June the 25th. What time?

COMMANDER BETTISON: Starting at 1:00 p.m.
CHAIRMAN BELL: 1:00 p.m., so that's not C.P.
time, 1:00 p.m. Okay.
Any questions or concerns for the Chief of
Police?
COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair, do we have an update on the curfew issues that's going on?

CHIEF CRAIG: Yes. As you may have heard curfew for fireworks is exactly as it was last year. I know there's been lots of conversation. I've had a chance to meet with some of the Council folks over it.

But let me just say and I coined a phrase and this will sum it up for you, our focus as Detroit Police Officers, we're all Detroit Police Officers, the safety of the City, safety of the community. And as you recall last year we had a very safe and probably one of what I'm told the most uneventful fireworks.

It's designed to support families. So our focus is on safety. Not supervision. It is not the job of the Detroit Police Officers to supervise unsupervised minors.

SPEAKER: That's right.
CHIEF CRAIG: We need to focus on one thing and that's keeping the City safe, keeping the community safe. There was a decision made that we would extend
curfew to the River Days, that was done because of information or really just an obvious total disregard of young people that come into the Downtown area.

And so a decision was made based on intelligence and certainly based on my judgement and experience that we should impose a limited curfew and I use the word "limited" curfew. And what that translates into is that what we're saying is we want, we encourage family youth from all over the City, from all over the region to come out. All we're saying is bring them, but let's make sure they're supervised. Emphasis on supervision. Not DPD's job. And we want to make sure that no one gets hurt.

We've done some research into it about what happened last year. We had some young people that got hurt. We had some young people that got arrested. We don't want that to happen. This is about safety.

I know the critics are going to say this is discriminatory. I am telling you this is not discriminatory. Because if unsupervised youth comes from Livonia, they will be detained just like a youth that's unsupervised in Detroit.

Now, what we are suggesting and to the critics, the ones who are most vocal, how about this? Why don't you find a way to get ten to 15 young people
that can't make their way because maybe they don't have a parent or guardian available, because what the ordinance is saying "a responsible adult."

SPEAKER: That's right.
CHIEF CRAIG: So if you're a responsible adult, feel free to bring 15, 20, 25 youth down to the Family Fun Festivities. That's going to help us and it's going to free us so that we're not in a supervising mode but that we do what we do and that is keep the public safe.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Any other questions or concerns? Yes, sir.

COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair, I do realize, too, that Council has the say so on the curfews. Matter of fact, they haven't voted yet and I guess will vote in the coming week or so on that issue. It's just unfortunate that...well, when I think about Angels Night and how going back to the Great Honorable Mayor Coleman A. Young mobilized, I don't know, was it 40,000 people or something like that, or 50,000 citizens.

And of course I say it's unfortunate because the emphasis and $I$ do understand that the issue of safety not only for the City, the Police Officers, also the citizens and the youth in Downtown Detroit. But
it's amazing that mobilization of people for property and we can't mobilize people for people. It's just unbelievable.

And as you well know Angels Night everybody wore the orange $t$-shirts, the orange $t$-shirts which represents today in the gun violence that color orange, that color represents to be in the gun violence. And I just -- I'll reach out to some of the Council Members and see if that -- and irregardless or regardless as to which way they vote on the curfew or not, but the mobilization of the people and that would be great to connect to our youth in Downtown Detroit, not only our youth, but all youth that are coming to that event.

I mean, if there was a mobilization, particularly of men, but not only men, but woman, citizens of this City, adults, to just go down to the fireworks whether they have a son or daughter or grandson, you know, they can just be there with the youth to enjoy it. So it is supposed to be a family event for everyone.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Any other questions or concerns? Well, we can move on. Chief, are you finished with your report, I assume?

CHIEF CRAIG: I am.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir. Standing Committee

Report --
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Mr. Chair -- I think the Lieutenant has a presentation.

CHAIRMAN BELL: You're correct. That's why you're standing there, right? That's why you're coming forward, right? Okay. Thank you. Sorry, about that. LT. GROSS: Good afternoon.

COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.
LT. GROSS: For those of you who don't know, I'm Lieutenant Gross. Captain Chambers of the Fourth Precinct couldn't make it. He is out of town this week so $I$ will be filling in for him.

First of all, I'd like to thank Bishop Gates and the Greater Apostolic Faith Temple for letting us use their facility tonight. And I would like to recognize Dave Roland, he's in the back. He's the head of Marathon Petroleum Corporation. They are ones that are supplying the dinner tonight afterwards. So just give them --
(Applause.)
LT. GROSS: All right. The Fourth Precinct is located as you all know right across the street at 4700 West Fort.

SPEAKER: Beautiful, beautiful.
LT. GROSS: Yes. It's a very nice facility.

The Precinct encompasses 15 square miles. It's bordered on the south by the Detroit River, the north by Michigan Avenue, the Eastside by 14 th Street, and the Westside by Outer Drive. The Fourth Precinct also borders neighborhood communities such as Melvindale, Lincoln Park, Dearborn, and River Rouge.

A few of the notable locations, businesses, and organizations we have in our Precinct would be Patton Park, Clark Park, Detroit Salt Company, Southwest Solutions, Detroit Southwest Business Association, and as I spoke of earlier, Marathon Oil.

According to the recent and the latest U.S. Census, our Precinct houses or excuse me, our population of the Fourth Precinct is just over 70,000 people; approximately 55 percent of those are Hispanic, 20 percent are black, another 20 percent are white.

As the Chief spoke earlier, the City as a whole is down -- crime is down in the City as a whole. And as we established this morning in one of our meetings and I'm going to brag a little bit here, the Fourth Precinct is leading the City in all Precincts being 26 percent reduction of crime.
(Applause.)
LT. GROSS: It's not Captain Walton's Precinct.

SPEAKER: I think overall -- (laughter.)
LT. GROSS: As our Officers are doing an outstanding job, we also understand that we have to encompass and bring in outside agencies and utilize the other entities. So once a month we have a Detroit One Meeting. We have a Southwest CompStat Meeting where we discuss crime trends, strategy and problematic offenders.

And some of the outside agencies that we involve in this would be the Detroit Public Schools, Michigan State Police, Wayne Country Sheriff's Department, Michigan Department of Corrections, the FBI, U.S. Customs Border Patrol, U.S. Attorney's Office, and the ATF.

Also other organizations that attend these meetings, which I'm probably going to leave some out and I apologize, would be the Wayne State University Center For Urban Studies, The Congress of Communities, Urban Neighborhood Initiatives, Black Family Development, Detroit Hispanic Development Corporation, and Southwest Detroit Business Association.

And we also have a great -- very active community groups. And so some of those I see here in attendance tonight. That would be the Springdale Block Club, Southwest Detroit Improvement Association, the

United Citizens of Southwest Detroit, and the bridging communities and friends of Patton Park.

And at this time I see two of our NPOs which are our Neighborhood Policing Officers which would be Officer LaBron, he's in the back. Officer LaBron handles the northern portion of the Fourth Precinct, Officer Dunmark over there, he handles the south portion of the Fourth Precinct, and Officer Ruez, who isn't here today, he handles the central part of the Fourth Precinct.

Our Community Relations Officers, they've been doing a great deal of work and $I$ want to point out a couple great events they have taken part in the past few months. Back in April we had a Restore Order where the Police boarded up vacant houses. I believe that day we boarded up 21 houses. I saw Deputy Chief over there. I saw a lot of the Captains out there, Commanders. It was a well-attended event. We had has hundred of citizens out there. And, again, Marathon provided food for the volunteers and refreshments and that was a great effort.

Also Captain Serta back in May helped put on a Pitch Hit and Run event which is a National Little League event for the youngster. I know the Chief was talking about that earlier tonight. Captain Serta
along with the Hispanic Police Officers Association put that on along with our Neighbor Police Officers.

The NPOs had Police Week last week where they got together with our SWAT Team, our K9 Team, and our Bomb Squad and gave presentations at school. So I'd just like to say that they've been doing a very good job with the community and the different organizations and events they had.

So overall you can see the Fourth Precinct we have a understanding and importance to have a strong relationship with the outside law enforcement agencies, with our community groups and our local business and our residents. And through these partnerships we're all working together should be able to make a change here in the Fourth Precinct. Thank you.
(Applause.)
CHAIRMAN BELL: Any questions or concerns? COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I'm wondering, sir, if you all are involved with or at least are keeping track of what's going to be happening with Riverside Park, the new initiative that the Mayor has talked about with the bridge company they're going to be renovating. And that's in your Precinct, right?

LT. GROSS: Yes.

COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: They're going to be renovating the park and $I$ understand that there's going to be a lot of recreational kinds of, you know, fields, and things, baseball fields, soccer fields, etcetera, that are going to be built, pools, water park, something to that effect. But it's in the works right now. They're starting to have meetings. And I would highly recommend that the Police, you know, somehow be represented or at least try to find out what's happening there because that will certainly have an impact on, you know, giving youth some activities to keep them, you know, occupied.

LT. GROSS: Absolutely we will have some part in that.

COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you so much. CHAIRMAN BELL: Any other questions or concerns?

VICE CHAIR CARTER: Though the Chair, isn't there an event coming up June 17th, Family Fun Day, 18th? Okay.

LT. GROSS: Yes, Family Fun Day. Maybe one of the Neighborhood Police Officers would explain that.

SPEAKER: Thank you. On June 19th.
CHAIRMAN BELL: The mic, please.
MS. SMITH: Thank you. I'm Josephine Smith,

President of Fourth Precinct Community Relations Council. And on June 19th, we will have our Second Annual Family Fun Day. And I am advised that we had a wonderful experience last year, and that this year we can expect -- well, I was told double the improvement and we open it to the public to all of our residents, businesses, and especially our children in this community.

We want to bring together the community and allow that interaction because we want to implement, we want to make community relations an actual fact in the Fourth Precinct and we want to be leading the way.
(Applause.)
CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you.
MS. SMITH: The date is June 19th, the hours are two to four -- two to 6:00 p.m., and it's on the grounds at the Fourth Precinct.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Any others? Commissioner White.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Commissioners, I just wanted to applaud the Fourth Precinct and the community and the Chief's Office for the Youth Day and youth activities. One of the suggestions behind alternatives for curfews was if we give our young people some constructive things to do and I thank you all for
continuing to press the envelope and give our young people a chance to do some things constructively during the summer.

So I think those are the kinds of solutions I think that would be holistic in scope and bring our community closer together. So again, I just wanted to publicly acknowledge all those who are striving to do so. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you.
(Applause.)
CHAIRMAN BELL: Any other comments? Thank you, Lieutenant. The next item of business would be the Standing Committee Reports. We should have a document before you 2015/2016 Action Plan that was worked up two or three months ago and the lead person was Chief Investigator Pam Davis-Drake and there was no amendments to that document. I think it's been in circulation for the last two or three weeks.

So the Chair would like to entertain a motion to approve this Action Plan for 2015 and 2016. So, Commissioner White, you are the Chair of the Policy Committee, that falls under your banner.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Move for adoption, Mr. Chair.

COMMISSIONER SHELBY: So move.

COMMISSIONER MOORE: Second.
CHAIRMAN BELL: It's been properly moved and second. Ready for the question?

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair --
CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: -- comments. I just
wanted to publicly acknowledge Chief Pamela
Davis-Drake. I know this was an arduous task getting through the strategic plan, but I thank you for your guidance and leadership in leading this Body through this process. I believe we have a solid working document that will set the tone for years to come in terms of the direction of this Body. So thank you for your leadership.
(Applause.)
CHAIRMAN BELL: And $I$ want to thank all the Commissioners who participated in that process. I know it was giving up your time and energy and input and now we have a working document in terms of a action plan that we can move forward.

The next item would be under Standing
Committee Report --
COMMISSIONER WHITE: A motion --
CHAIRMAN BELL: A motion. I'm sorry. I'm moving too quickly. Those in favor of the motion, aye?

COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed? Motion
carries. Thank you. We've been working on our annual report and that document is almost ready to be circulated, Mr. Anthony?

SECRETARY ANTHONY: It's ready.
CHAIRMAN BELL: It's ready. At what point in
time will we be circulating that document?
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Mr. Chair, it's already been circulated. It was sent out two weeks ago.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay. So we can take action on it at our next meeting?

SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yes, sir.
CHAIRMAN BELL: That would be next week, so the Commission will be prepared to act on that document because that's something we've been working on in terms of the annual report for 2014. I thank Mr. Anthony. We're looking forward to that type of resolution and hopefully we would have a packet just like this for you at that time.

COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Mr. Chairman.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir.
COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Could we as a matter of going forward then when we're going to have items that we're actually specifically going to take action
on, could they be on the agenda so that those of us who might have missed the meeting when the agenda circulated we can see that the report we're going to be considering is on the agenda for a resolution so we can familiarize ourself with it?

CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir. We'll make sure it's on the agenda and we'll make sure you get a due notice as soon as possible by Monday in reference to that item being on the agenda for Thursday. We would take due diligence and do a better job to make sure these items are on the agenda in terms of what's going out. And I'll make sure we communicate with Mr. Brown, who does an excellent job of getting the minutes out, not the minutes, but the agenda for you.

So the next item. Any other Standing Committee Reports? Under New Business, we have a resolution for Marathon Petroleum Corporation, LP. And I'm going to ask our Vice Chair Lisa Carter come forward, and also Commissioner Dewaelsche, this is her home turf, to come forward and they can share the honor in terms of the resolution. It's quite lengthy and perhaps they can share in terms of reading it.

And Marathon, would you come forward, please, at this time? Thank you.

SPEAKER: Are you hiring now?

VICE CHAIR CARTER: Resolution honoring the Marathon Petroleum Corporation, LP, Detroit Refinery. Whereas The Marathon Petroleum Corporation, LP, Detroit Refinery, was opened 56 years ago (1959) in the Southwest City of Detroit, and is the only refinery in the State of Michigan; and,

Whereas The Marathon Petroleum Corporation (MPC) is in the business of creating value for customers, community partners and shareholders through the delivery of quality products and services.

The MPC strongly believes that how it conducts its business is just as integral to the company's bottom line as promoting it's products and services. As a result, the MPC strives to always act responsibility with its employees, it's business partners, and in every community where it operates.

The MPC firmly holds true to the corporate principles of health and safety, environmental stewardship, integrity, inclusive culture, and corporate citizenship; and,

Whereas the MPC's Corporate Citizenship is clearly evident with the City of Detroit especially with the Fourth Precinct. The MPC is always a willing sponsor of local events and seeks every opportunity to assist the community, local businesses and law
enforcement. The MPC is making a difference in Detroit and the surrounding community, for example:

Detroit MPC employees have donated 480 coats and raised funds to purchase an additional 120 new winter coats, donated a total of 600 coats to those in need throughout the Salvation Army; and,

COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Due to closure of various bridges within the Fourth Precinct for repairs, the MPC has provided funding to allow for additional patrols in the area to ensure that Police response times do not suffer and essential law enforcement services can be performed; and,

In 2014, the MPC supported the Fourth Precinct Family Fun Day and National Night Out, which was attended by hundreds of citizens and Officers. The MPC has pledged to assist with both events in 2015 as well as with the Second Annual Fourth Precinct Family Fun Day being held on Friday, June 19th, 2015; and,

In April 2015, the MPC contributed to several worthwhile initiatives within the Fourth Precinct which included MPC employees volunteering their time and talents to paint rooms inside the Precinct and plants and bushes around the exterior of the building; and,

The MPC established a state-of-the-art surveillance camera at a problematic location during
the Cinco de Mayo weekend and allowed Fourth Precinct Officers to monitor it. The use of this camera along with other police strategies ensure the successful and safe weekend for all; and,

Whereas the MPC is fully engaged within the community and with the law enforcement community.

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Detroit Police Commissioners speaking for the citizens of Detroit and the Detroit Police Department and acknowledges the outstanding and dedicated commitment to community service and outreach mission of the Marathon Petroleum Corporation, LP, Detroit Refinery. Their generous contributions to the City of Detroit and the Forth Precinct merit or highest regards.
(Applause.)

SPEAKER: State your name for record.
MR. ROLAND: My name is Dave Roland. I'm the Division Manager at Marathon Petroleum at the refinery here in Detroit. Members of the Board, members of the community, I just would like to express on behalf of Marathon Petroleum Corporation to Rich Robell, our appreciation for these awards.

We've been in the City of Detroit for 56 years and been proud members of the City of Detroit and we really, we really enjoy supporting and being a proud community partner supporting the effort of the Police force. The true honor here is not for Marathon. It's really for the heroes here who keep us safe every day.

I would like to thank the Members of the Force because of the job you do, we're able to do the job that we can do every day safely. Thank you.
(Applause.)
CHAIRMAN BELL: The Chair would entertain a motion to receive the Resolution for Marathon and also the recognition and appreciation to Richard Robell at this time.

COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: So move.
COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Second.

CHAIRMAN BELL: It's been properly moved and second. Ready for the question. Those in favor, aye? COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed? Motion
carried.
COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chair, before we continue, I would like to add another Resolution to the agenda. This is in honor of Kim Miller-Griffen. Ms. Griffen is the deceased aunt of our fellow Commissioner Willie Burton. Commissioners have her bio on her before this time and I'd like to make a motion for a Resolution.

COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: So moved.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Do I hear a second?
COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Second.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay. It's been properly moved and second. Ready for the question. Those in favor, aye?

COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed? Motion
carries. Thank you. Just before we move to the next items of business in terms of the nomination of the Chairperson, did you get a copy of the newsletter? Did you see the smiling Chief Craig? Isn't that a great shot? He's elated. Sounds like he was playing --
signs for the Pistons or the Lions.
But he signed a contract for Chief of Police for two more years. What a blessing, what a great -(Applause.)

CHAIRMAN BELL: -- and I don't know what I said to make him happy but $I$ think $I$ know what $I$ said.

CHIEF CRAIG: I remember.
CHAIRMAN BELL: But on that day, that
morning, that room was packed and what you see tonight it was double, triple, in terms of wall-to-wall and people in hallways and people came from all walks of life.

And I told the Mayor that was a game changer in terms of signing the Chief ahead of time because his contract was initially expired June the 30th. So he got a two-year contract extension. It's a unique contract. I'm not going to go into details but it's a unique contract. But that's the commitment that he's made to the people in the City of Detroit and to Detroit Police Department and to the rank and file and to the Officers.

I was skeptical about the NPOs program initially. But people said the mini stations, we don't need no mini stations, we don't need mini stations. We have NPOs Officers. And I know the Mayor often use

1 them, the businessman use them, the police community relations use them and they've been a blessing throughout the City.

I have traveled to different Precincts in terms of that involvement and they are on the case. So I think it's one of the great tools and great commitment that the Chief has brought to this City of Detroit and to DPD. And what we have witnessed is I think it is a happy day and we're looking forward to that type of interaction, that type of commitment because accessibility is there.

The Captains are just fantastic in terms of people getting their cell numbers, they know how to contact them. And I know on the Eastside they use them 24/7. So I just want to say, I just want to commend you, Chief Craig. Southwest, too.

SPEAKER: Absolutely.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Because they are a lifesaver. So if $I$ were working patrol $I$ know I'd be thankful because they do a lot of troubleshooting, they do a lot of trouble shooting, whether it be dogs or whatever, they do a lot of troubleshooting. So I just want to acknowledge that type of program and among others and his staff has been great in terms of that type interaction.

So I'm hoping that, I hope that we have achieved a whole lot in my year as being the Chair in terms of that type of interaction with the Chief's Office. So that's been a blessing in terms of serving. When I first got elected my first meeting with Northwest Activity Center and I told Chief Craig I was proud of him, he's doing an outstanding job and we're looking forward to that type of involvement. The Precincts are open.

All those things I listed in terms of my campaign were fulfilled by this Department. So I'm proud to be part of this family. And we graduate a class tomorrow at 10:00, at Ebenezer Baptist Church at 10:00, if you want to witness the occasion.

And we have the former Commander of the Training Academy. Let's acknowledge, help me out --

SPEAKER: Jarvis, Donna Jarvis.
(Applause.)
CHAIRMAN BELL: She was really -- allowed us and worked with us in the Academy and we had interaction with this Class 2015 C, I think is coming up. And she opened the doors for us initially last year. I said we want to go into the Academy and the exchange has been great and that continues now.

So you led the way in terms of that type
commitment and a former Commissioner who served two years on this department, we had the last interaction with him at the Academy along with Chief Craig in terms of powerful interaction with that class. So that's the type of dialog that we have established. I just want to acknowledge.

Okay, so we move on. The next item of business would be the nomination of the Chair. The floor is open for --

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Point of information, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: As it relates to the process going forward, is it this Body's intent to hold nominations and elections today?

CHAIRMAN BELL: That is the intent.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: Okay. Point of order, Mr. Chair. On our agenda is listed nominations of Chairperson and nominations of Vice Chairperson, which does not announce the election of Chairperson, nor Vice Chairperson. And I would ask that we have a legal opinion because we are subject to the Open Meetings Act and the ramifications of having the order of the day that is adequately acknowledged to the public.

CHAIRMAN BELL: I just want to say that $I$ did
not print the agenda. The agenda was primarily shared with the Body in terms of nominations and election and I did not have input in terms of the agenda being printed up in terms of just saying the nomination.

But we clearly understood that this would be -- it's only one process and that would be election -- it should have indicated election on the Chairperson versus nomination because that's primarily the concern.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair, I do believe this Body has moved that the agenda be approved that's presented, so regardless if we were aware of the original print of the agenda this Body has already voted to approved the agenda as presented.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Madam Chair -- I mean, attorney.

ATTORNEY BERNARD: Commissioner White, obviously you can move -- you have adopted your agenda but you can also move to amend that agenda to include the issue of nomination of and election, if you so wish to. There's no Open Meetings Act issue because you're in an open meeting and you can always amend either a resolution or an agenda. You can amend a resolution that nominates a chairperson, to nominate and elect, you can do that, as you know. NAACP.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: If I could, Mr. Chair? CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Counsel, which
resolution would we be amending? There's no resolution properly before us.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Agenda.
ATTORNEY BERNARD: You can amend your agenda to include any items that you like, as you frequently do. In addition to that, if there's going to be a nomination you can make a motion to nominate and/or elect, you can do that. You have that flexibility. You have that autonomy.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: And, Counsel, if you could, could you cite what version or paragraph in Robert Rules your are addressing when you say we can amend the agenda, approving the agenda -- post approving the agenda?

ATTORNEY BERNARD: I don't have Robert Rules with me. I wasn't -- I didn't bring it with me this evening. I apologize for that. But it's an inherent authority and ability for any body, B-O-D-Y, meaning whether it's an elected or appointed body or corporate board, they can always amend within management's rights and your authority as an entity, you can amend your agenda to include items that aren't specifically stated

1 on the agenda.

For example, you haven't even raised New Business, under New Business, this is an item that you have under New Business, you could add to New Business at this point to do anything that you wanted to do because you have a quorum present.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir, Mr. Mallett.
COMMISSIONER MALLETT: I want to make it clear to the Body and to my fellow Commissioners, I've already conceded the outcome of the election because this is not what this is about. But $I$ do wonder, Ms. Bernard, this is not about us, of course -- no, no, what I mean, the Commissioners -- the agenda really as printed is not a device for the Commissioners.

The agenda as printed and presented, Mr. Chairman, is an information piece for the public. And so I just wonder if whether or not citing Robert's Rules, I'm more concerned about the Open Meetings Acts, and $I$ wonder whether or not we have sufficiently provided to the public the notice that they're entitled to of the action that we we're going to take.

And, again, $I$ want to say to my fellow Commissioners, this is not about outcome. This is about the process and we have a legal advisor. We need to know whether or not, Mr. Chairman, we'd be in
violation of the Open Meetings Act by taking action today that the public was not clear that we were contemplating by the publication I think 24 hours in advance of the actions that we anticipated moving foreword.

Now, you know, I grant you that the -- as I said earlier, it's not particularly an earth-shaking decision, Mr. Chairman, as to who's going to be the Chairperson. But this is a Body subject to the Open Meetings Act. We would be subject to a lawsuit. We would be subject to a fair amount of public ridicule.

And so, again, setting aside the election results and $I$ just wanted to say to our fellow Commissioner, Robert Buddy Battle used to say all the time "When you got the vote, vote, and if you don't, fight." But that's not what this about this. It's about the Open Meetings Act.

And I just wonder, Ms. Bernard --
ATTORNEY BERNARD: Commissioner Mallett, on Page 6 of the Open Meetings Act: Agenda's and the OMA, I quote, "While the OMA, Open Meetings Act requires a public body to give public notice when it meets it has no requirement that the public notice include an agenda or a specific statement as to the purpose of the meeting. No agenda format is required for the OMA."

So the fact that it's not on the agenda does not affect you under the OMA whatsoever.

COMMISSIONER MALLETT: But --
CHAIRMAN BELL: Mr. Mallett, Mr. Mallett, I think the attorney has responded to the inquiry.

COMMISSIONER MALLETT: No, Mr. Chairman, she has not, Mr. Chairman, she has not because she read a certain section of the Open Meetings Act talking specifically about the agenda. Now, there are other sections of the Open Meetings Act.

Again, $I$ don't have it in front of me, Mr. Chairman, that specifically does say something -- hold on, Mr. Chairman, does say something to the effect that action items, that decisions to be made by the Body have to be previously noticed to the public. That's the part Mrs. Bernard that $I$ think would be relevant to this.

This is an item that has consequence, that has obviously some degree of public consequence. And so what does that say? What does the section say about that?

ATTORNEY BERNARD: The next section that would be -- decisions must be made in public meetings. All decisions must be made at a meeting open to the public. The OMA defines "decision" to mean a
determination, action vote or disposition upon a motion, proposal, recommendation, resolution, order, ordinance, bill or measure on which a vote by members of a public body is required and by which a public body effectuates or formulates public policy.

The OMA requires that all decisions of a public body shall be made at a meeting open to the public and that with limited exceptions all deliberations of a public body constituting a quorum of it's members shall take place at a meeting open to the public.

You're fine. You can proceed.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioner Crawford, I think the attorney to the Board has spoken clearly to the issue in terms of what's in writing that she's sharing with us and Commissioner Mallett is verbalizing whatever. But Commissioner Crawford.

COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir. Very
short. I think we need to proceed on with the nominations and the election. And I'll take you back, keep the vote, no takeover.

COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chair, I would like to make a motion to amend the agenda to include the election as well as nominations.

CHAIRMAN BELL: It was properly moved and
second. Ready for the question. Those in favor, aye? COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed, no? COMMISSIONER WHITE: NO.

CHAIRMAN BELL: I think the ayes carry it.
The floor is open for --
COMMISSIONER WHITE: Point of order,
Mr. Chair.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: Under Robert's Rules of
Order, if the bylaws do not state how to conduct nominations any member can make a motion proposing the nominating process. As such, I would like to recommend that we do conduct nominations today that would be voiced matter of nominations and that we vote by ballot giving all members an opportunity to vote with ballots being due June 17 th and the election results being read June 18th.

CHAIRMAN BELL: That would be out of order. This Board has no history of voting by ballot. It's an open meeting for people to witness this process, therefore, it's an open floor for nomination and election of officers not by a ballot.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair, the bylaws do not speak to how we can vote, that matter according to

Robert's Rules is adequately before us as a body to vote how we wish to decide to vote going forward.

Past practice as you stated earlier in the meeting, does not necessarily mandate or dictate presence circumstance.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Well, you voiced your opinion, but that's just one opinion. So can we open the floor for nominations? Okay.

COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chair, I'd like to nominate Commissioner --

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair, I'd like to appeal the decision of the Chair.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay. The Chair has ruled that --

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Not debatable, Mr. Chair, according to Robert's Rules of Order that should be up for vote.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Are we ready for the vote?
Support the position of the Chair, those favor, aye?
COMMISSIONER: Aye.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: Is there any discussion, Mr. Chair?

CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, discussion.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair, as President or Chair of a body, the Chair's responsibility does not
solely lie to move the agenda as dictated by the Chair, but to move the agenda as a pleasure of the Body.

Clearly there is some hesitation and unreadiness as relates to this matter. There's been a clear concern as relates to some legal ramifications according to this matter, in addition to other Commissioners who are feeling as though their vote is marginalized in this process.

So I would just urge us as a Body to be mindful of that as we are here before the public this evening on public record.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Those in favor of the motion, aye, in reference of supporting the Chair in terms of overruling Commissioner White in reference to position on the length --

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Nay.
COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: I'm not clear on the motion, Mr. Chair.

COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm not clear, either.
CHAIRMAN BELL: The Chair ruled that
Mr. White was out of order and therefore he's asking for a body to rule on that order of support the Chair or not support the Chair in reference to his motion.

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Point of order, Mr. Chair, the motion adequately put forth at this time

1 is the appeal of the decision of the Chair, not the motion to rule me out of order.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Appealing of the Chair's ruling. Are we clear?

COMMISSIONER BURTON: Can you explain that further?

CHAIRMAN BELL: Let's pause. Mr. White raised issue, and I ruled that he was out of order, and he wanted to appeal the ruling of the Chair. So we have to vote it up or down. Okay.

Those in favor, aye?
COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Aye.
COMMISSIONER: Aye.
COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Well, no. If you vote yes, you're voting to support the Chair, is that right, Mr. Chairman?

VICE CHAIR CARTER: That's right.
CHAIRMAN BELL: That's correct.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair, if I could speak to my motion. Colleagues, before us, Colleagues before us is a motion to appeal the decision of the Chair which would render the ruling of out of order inappropriate, so.

CHAIRMAN BELL: It's as simple as that. Those in favor?

COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed.
COMMISSIONERS: Nay.
COMMISSIONER: Can we do by a roll call?
CHAIRMAN BELL: Roll call.
COMMISSIONER: Through the Chair.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir. Mr. Anthony, could
we get clarity on the issues?
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yes, sir. Commissioner
Carter.
VICE CHAIR CARTER: Nay.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Willie E.
Burton.
COMMISSIONER BURTON: Nay.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Regional
Crawford.
COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Nay.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Eva Garza
Dewaelsche.
COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Aye.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Conrad
Mallett.
COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Aye.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Ricardo R.
Moore.

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COMMISSIONER MOORE: Nay.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Richard
Shelby.
COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Nay.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Donnell
White.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: Aye.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Willie
Burton -- Willie Bell, excuse me.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Nay.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Mr. Chair, the motion is defeated.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay. The Chair would entertain a motion for the nominations.

COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chair, I would like to make a motion to nominate Lisa Carter, Chairperson.

COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Support.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Are there any other nominations for Chair?

COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Move nominations be closed.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Are there any other nominations for Chair?

COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Nominations closed.

SECRETARY ANTHONY: Mr. Chair, if I may?
CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: There was an earlier motion to amend the agenda to include both nomination and election, that has not been --

CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay, okay. The motion's on the floor to amend the agenda to include the nominations, election of officers, Vice -- Chair and the Vice Chair. Ready for the motion? Those in favor, aye?

COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: Nay.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Motion carried. Thank you. So the Chair's been elected. There's been no other contestant for that position.

Nomination for Vice Chair at this time.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair, I nominate Commissioner Conrad Mallett.

VICE CHAIR CARTER: I nominate Vice Chair --
COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Is that a motion?
Do we have to support?
CHAIRMAN BELL: No, these are nominations, so. Could you repeat it again, please?

COMMISSIONER WHITE: I nominate Commissioner

Conrad Mallett.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay. Lisa Carter.
VICE CHAIR CARTER: I nominate Commissioner Willie Bell.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Any other nominations? Any other nominations?

COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Mr. Chair, I'm sorry, Mr. Chair, I don't know if you can conduct the elections if you're --

CHAIRMAN BELL: Oh, Mr. Anthony, would you conduct the election?

SECRETARY ANTHONY: Are there any other nominations? Going once. Going twice. The nominations are closed.

We have a contested election for Vice Chair. Commission Mallett has been nominated by Commissioner White; Commissioner Bell has been nominated by Commissioner Carter. We should have a roll call vote. CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir.

SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Lisa Carter has nominated Commissioner Bell. Your vote will be for Chairman Bell?

VICE CHAIR CARTER: Yes, that is correct. SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Willie E. Burton.

COMMISSIONER BURTON: I nominate -SECRETARY ANTHONY: This is a vote, sir. CHAIRMAN BELL: You're doing one at a time,
sir, right?
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Yes, yes. CHAIRMAN BELL: We're doing Commissioner Bell
now.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Bell, or
Commissioner Mallett.
COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes. I support
Commissioner Bell.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Crawford. COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Commissioner Bell. SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Dewaelsche. COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner

Mallett.
COMMISSIONER MALLETT: I vote for myself. SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you. Commissioner

Moore.
COMMISSIONER MOORE: Commissioner Bell. SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Shelby. COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Commissioner Bell. SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner White. COMMISSIONER WHITE: Commissioner Mallett. SECRETARY ANTHONY: And Commissioner Bell
would be for himself?
CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioner Bell.
SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Bell has received the most votes for Vice Chair.

CHAIRMAN BELL: This concludes the nominations and elected Chair and the Vice Chair. I want to commend Lisa Carter as the newly elected Chair-elect as of July the 1st.

VICE CHAIR CARTER: Thank you.
(Applause.)
CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir.
COMMISSIONER WHITE: Just a point of privilege, Mr. Chair. I just want to publicly acknowledge Commissioner Carter and look forward to working with this Body even though I will no longer be a member of this Body. I look forward to working with this Body continuously under your leadership.

I certainly hope that Madam Chair soon-to-be, you do not take my comments as trying to thwart your efforts in terms of becoming Chair. I wholeheartedly believe in the democratic process. Putting that aside, I certainly think that you're more than capable to lead this Body forward and $I$ wish you well in your endeavors.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Any other remarks?

COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Mr. Chairman, the record should reflect that it was Commissioner Conrad Mallett moved that nominations be closed around the nomination of Lisa Carter for Chair.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir, appreciate that. Any Old Business?

Announcement: The next meeting of the Board will take place on Thursday, June 18th, at 3:00 at Detroit Public Safety Headquarters. The next community meeting would be on July the 9th at the City Temple Seven-Day Adventist in the Fourth Precinct at 8816 Grand River at 6:30 p.m.

And at this point in time $I$ would like to open it up for oral communication from the audience. You have two minutes to speak and identify yourself and be respectful and we thank you for your coming forward to participate this time.

MS. RAMIREZ: My name is Erminia Ramirez, $\mathrm{E}-\mathrm{R}-\mathrm{M}-\mathrm{I}-\mathrm{N}-\mathrm{I}-\mathrm{A}$, Ramirez, $\mathrm{R}-\mathrm{A}-\mathrm{M}-\mathrm{I}-\mathrm{R}-\mathrm{E}-\mathrm{Z}$.

I'm director of Community Relations and Outreach for Chass Health Center and I'm definitely going to make sure that $I$ send out a card and telephone, and email to Commander -- Captain Chamber and Lieutenant Gross who definitely left us out of all the agencies that he mentioned in Southwest Detroit.

We are the neighbors. We are Chass Health Center and we work closely with the Precinct when it comes to domestic violence, which is our unit, and we work closely with them. And I definitely -- maybe it's my fault, I will definitely reach out to them.

I do want to say thank you very much.
Welcome to Southwest Detroit. After hearing the statistics that there are 55 percent Hispanics in the Southwest area, and I hope that we do some heavy recruiting.

Commissioner Carter, especially here in District 6, we definitely want more Hispanic Officers or even Officers with two languages throughout the City of Detroit would definitely be welcome, and hopefully will give some incentive as well as having a second language.

I know Commissioner Dewaelsche is working with the Hispanic Police Officers Association, and I invite you, Commissioner Carter, to also be part of this endeavor and have two or three events when it comes to recruiting here in Southwest, Detroit, 48217 48210, 9, all of it that Fourth Precinct deals with and I will definitely would put out Chass as one of the recruiting sites whenever we do have the event.

And I really do strongly feel that we do need
to increase our Officers. I know we're graduating a lot of Detroit's Finest and we'd just like to have some of them look like us.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay. Thank you.
(Applause.)
MR. CARTER: Good evening, my name is Tyrone Carter. I'm the President of the original United Citizens of Southwest Detroit 48217.

Two things, Chief Craig, thank you for coming here tonight. We would love to have you come to our community meeting in Southwest Detroit 48217. We meet every third Thursday at 6:00, St. Andrew Benedict Church. Captain Chambers comes all the time.

And I got to say a shout out to your NPOs. They do a fantastic job. In the neighborhood we had two gas stations that haven't sold gas in ten years. They were doing other things. One of them is closed down. We're working on the other one.

So we appreciate that. So let me know how we can get in touch with you to come to our community meeting. I know that you're going to Cork Town's meeting this week.

CHIEF CRAIG: Yes.
MR. CARTER: That's one thing. The other thing is, Marathon. Where is Marathon? I want to say
thank you to Marathon. A lot of people in the neighborhood are just upset with Marathon. But Marathon's getting ready to invest in a new recreation center for that community. I think they need to be commended for that because we've been waiting for 50 years to get a recreation center.

They talked about closing it down plenty of times. Marathon put up the money for the plants and they put up the money for the building of the institution. So I want to say publicly thank you. (Applause.)

MR. CARTER: Last, but not least. They did put up the money. As many of you are well aware, 48217 is separated from the rest of the City by the river. And the two bridges are down. I75 is crumbling. And in meetings years ago Marathon put up money to put extra Officers in that community. And $I$ just want to say to Rich Robell, thank you very much.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you.
(Applause.)
MS. BRYANT: Good evening everyone. My name is Terri Bryant. Unfortunately, I'm going to put a little sour note in our meeting. But the reason why I came is because I know Chief of Police would be here. I was born and raised in the City of Detroit.

1 I fled, I left due to work or whatever, school. I came back and moved back to the City.

They're saying the City of Detroit is coming back. It never went anywhere. What is happening is that the City of Detroit is revitalizing itself and the people are coming back to the City.

But I had an incident at my home back in November of 2014. There was a shooting outside by an uninvited guest in my home. Six Officers came to my home. There was no report taken that evening. I had out of the ten people who were at my home kids from University of Michigan and from Michigan State, or whatever, they all had to come back.

I live in the Seventh Precinct. They had to come back and make a report to Camilla White and they came back one at a time slowly but surely they came back because they were threatened, they were fearful, they were afraid.

I thank God no one got injured, no one got killed. But if that's what it takes for me to get any cooperation from my Police, then I'm in the wrong City. The fact that these two individuals were at my home with a gun that does not have a permit that pulled it out and shot up in the air is a felony and a crime.

And the fact that it's taken six months for
the City of Detroit to have not even gotten back to me, but not a letter, the first letter was February
the 2nd, 2015 that they would respond, they were investigating the Officers because I complained about the Officers not even taking statements of the individuals who were at my home that evening when I had to get these individuals to come back.

I am upset. I am discouraged. I'm
disappointed that my tax dollars are going to incompetency --

CHAIRMAN BELL: Your two minutes are up.
MS. BRYANT: Okay. I'm fine.
CHAIRMAN BELL: You want to see our Chief
Investigator Pamela Davis-Drake right there.
MS. BRYANT: Okay. That's what I need to do because I need to move forward on this.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, ma'am. And keep in mind you don't have to wait until a meeting to address your concern. You can contact the Office of the Chief Investigator Office $24 / 7$ and they will respond to your concern.

MS. BRYANT: Well, no one had directed me in that --

CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay. Well, now she'll talk to you. Thank you, ma'am.

MS. BRODEN: Happy Thursday, to everyone.
My name is Theo Broden. Is Commander Todd
Bettison still here?
COMMANDER BETTISON: Yes, Ms. Theo.
MS. BRODEN: I hear you. You said the information going to be everywhere. Does that mean you're going to be at $\mathrm{W}-\mathrm{H}-\mathrm{P}-\mathrm{R}$ on Monday at nine a.m., $22 n d--i s$ on the $25 t h$.

COMMANDER BETTISON: I can be there.
MS. BRODEN: Thank you, thank you. All
right. All the witnesses heard that. Okay. Number two, the first young lady who spoke has my sentiments exactly. When $I$ was at a community meeting here $I$ asked how many African-American Officers graduated in the class and I was told, I believe her name is Hall or Commander --

CHAIRMAN BELL: Deputy Chief Hall.
MS. BRODEN: She didn't know. She says, well, I'm not concerned as whether they're Chinese or Mexican or white or black, we just want good Officers. But the young lady who spoke first tonight has the same concern that I do. I want Officers who look like me. She wants Officers to look like her.

It's interesting, in Dearborn, $I$ don't know how many of you know Ronald Haddad who was from the

Detroit Police Department. I did have an opportunity to meet him. He is an Arab-American who is currently the Chief of the Police of Dearborn. They, by the way, have Arab-Americans on the Police Department of Dearborn. Hum. They only got 188 Officers in the whole city, but about 10 percent of them are Arab-Americans. Isn't that interesting?

CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, ma'am.
MS. BRODEN: And, Livonia, oh, boy. You don't even want to talk about what they don't have in Livonia.

The only thing is as it relates to the curfew, is that going to include punitive things like felonies, misdemeanors, or are they going to be civil infractions? Nobody's talked about that that I've heard. Because my understanding that three misdemeanors will make a felony.

We all already know that with the destruction of our schools more of our children are on the road to prisons. Seems like private prison contractor say, we'll keep them filled. Have you all heard that?

CHAIRMAN BELL: Ms. Broden --
MS. BRODEN: What about -- I need an answer, please.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes. Thank you. Chief will
respond to that question, okay, about the criminalization or misdemeanors or something to that affect. Is that the question?

MS. BRODEN: What is this?
SPEAKER: That's the recorder for the court reporter.

MS. BRODEN: My goodness. Okay. What was the answer?

CHAIRMAN BELL: We're going to give you the answer now.

MS. BRODEN: Okay. Yeah. I couldn't hear anything with that. I need to know whether it's a misdemeanor, felony or civil infraction with a fine? Or this is just more destruction of our young people.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Chief Craig.
CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, you want me to address the diversity of the Police Department? I'm not clear on this last question.

CHAIRMAN BELL: If you clarify the last question. I think that was more of a concern you had. Is that correct?

MS BRODEN: The curfew. I know about the diversity. You don't have to say anything about -- I'm talking about the curfew. Are our young people going to be receiving civil infractions, misdemeanors,
felonies or what? I'm not talking about guns and all that. I'm just talking about picking them up for being unescorted.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Curfew violations.
CHIEF CRAIG: Curfew violations is an infraction at best, not a felony, not a misdemeanor.

MS. BRODEN: Okay. So it will be a fine?
CHIEF CRAIG: Directly to parents, if my
memory serves me correct.
MS. BRODEN: Okay. Now, last point. If you pick up some children that are not in Detroit, when you go on TV would you please be kind enough to show their faces?

CHIEF CRAIG: I won't show their face, but I will commit to you that we will be equitable in enforcement.

MS. BRODEN: Yes.
CHIEF CRAIG: Equitable.
MS. BRODEN: Dan Gilbert was so thrilled to have cameras downtown and he was going to get the ones who put graffiti on the buildings. Come to find out they were from Grosse Pointe.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, thank you, thank you.
Yes, ma'am.

SISTER HUGHES: Good evening. I'm Sister Margaret Hughes and I work with the YWCA. And I've been privileged to work for the past 14 years at the Fourth Precinct, the old Fourth Precinct and the new.

And when I started working as an advocate for victims of domestic violence there were five other advocates in the City at all other different Precincts. And we have the victims come to the Precinct. We do all the paperwork for PPOs and we go down and file them. We attend court hearings, and then the people just have to come back and pick them up, and we also get them services, shelter, whatever they need.

So I'm saying is, I'm the only one left in the City at Fourth Precinct and my dream is to have advocates again at different Precincts throughout the City. Because domestic violence is still out there. There's people being killed because of it and there's all kinds of that going on and so we need more advocates throughout the City. So it's a plea to get more advocates.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you.
SISTER HUGHES: Thank you.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, appreciate it.
MS. COPELAND: Good evening, Police Chief Craig.

CHIEF CRAIG: Good evening.
MS. COPELAND: Commissioners and residents of Southwest Detroit. My name is Pamela Copeland and I am the administrator of Michigan Legal Help, Self Help Center in Wayne County. I would first like to thank Commissioner Moore for inviting me to be here this evening to tell you a little bit about what we do at the Center.

The Michigan Legal Help Program is a grant funded program through the Michigan State Bar Foundation and, excuse me, the Legal Services of South Central Michigan, and we provide free services to the residents of Michigan to assist them in trying to solve their simple civil legal problems.

Our website is the michiganlegalhelp.org, that's our actual website. It is designed with toolkits to assist people in trying to prepare documents that they would need to file over at Circuit Court.

One of the main areas of law that we cover is family and that would encompass divorce, custody, parenting time, child support, annulments, separate maintenance, paternity, protection from abuse, housing, we deal with landlord/tenant issues, consumers, we have a lot of information for consumers who are faced with
debt collection, those who might be at risk of having their wages garnished, what to do to try to stop it before that even starts and what to do if you find yourself in that situation.

We also help those who have felonies that need to have their criminal convictions expunged. And then we have information on public benefits especially for those who have applied for benefits and they've been denied. It has information to let them know what the steps are that they can take to try to get that resolved.

We're also a referral service, as well. So we refer people. If it's something that the center does not cover, then we have a lot of different resources for individuals, in particularly legal aid agency. I work with William Booth Legal Aid Clinic and Legal Aid -- okay, I'm getting the stop sign.

But anyway, $I$ just wanted to let you know we're there to provide free services and I also have the information with me in the back in case you're interested in answering any questions that you have.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, thank you. We really appreciate it.

MS. COPELAND: Actually we do not. I can give you my email address. We want individuals to come
into the center to deal with me personally.
SPEAKER: Where is that located?
MS. COPELAND: We are in the Penobscot
Building, that's 645 Griswold, Detroit 48226 on the 13th floor. I'm actually in Conference Room 6. And our hours are nine to four, Monday through Thursday. CHAIRMAN BELL: And you have a flier in the back to that effect?

MS. COPELAND: Yes.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Make sure they get that
flier. Thank you.
One more comment or two more.
MR. CARTER: I apologize for coming twice but
I had thirty seconds left. And I know we're in the House of Blue, DPD. But the Wayne County Sheriff's Department is hiring, as well. And what's interesting is when we talk about candidates that look like us, I'm not getting any candidates that look like us.

I'm going to Waterford, Auburn Hills, Holly, and other places. You know it's not a job -- and my son's here and he's in college. He said it's not a job that a young black man wants.

So we got to change those dynamics and talk about the good things. Policing is under the microscope right now. But it's generational. And, you

1 know, we need to have good conversations. And we're recruiting on June 27 th at Cass High School, they're going to have a free test. So if anybody wants to talk to me about being with the Wayne County Sheriff's Department come see me in the back.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay. I assume DPD wants equal time. But we are actively recruiting, too. So we have the same issues that you are facing, too. We appreciate that.

Yes, ma'am.
MS. SMITH: Good evening. Bernice Smith, Political Activist. I felt like I was at Chicago election tonight. My goodness. I didn't know the Board was going to --

CHAIRMAN BELL: They voted twice, you only get one vote here.

COMMISSIONER: Vote early --
MS. SMITH: All right. My attention is for the Chief.

CHIEF CRAIG: Hello.
MS. SMITH: You don't know how I appreciate the fact that he took time out even though he went out of town for a convention, he did come back in time, and I am very proud that he was there and proud also because my granddaughter was the one that introduced

1 him. I don't know whether you knew that or not. I had a whole row of my relatives there, I don't know if you noticed.

But anyway, they were proud of the fact you were there and you did speak to the students in a way where I think they can understand that what crime is all about. I wish you had went more in detail and scare them a little and tell them do not reject anything that the Police say to them.

Now, as far as I'm concerned the Police have done a wonderful job. I've been a Commissioner. I was number one. Of course most of you don't know it because Brown haven't found the paperwork yet, but I'm not going to worry about that. But anyway, when we had the Police before us and we questioned them about various things that happened we got answers and we were very satisfied.

I don't have any problem with the Police Department as of today. They know me as Mother Bernice and I respect them and I appreciate them. And I want the people to know last Friday we had over 200 students at my granddaughter's open house on Oakman Boulevard. We did block up the street a little bit but after I took control I will say I did have two Police cars come by and once I showed them my ID that I belong to

Chief's Advisory Committee, they said, yes, ma'am, and they went on. Two-hundred students I'm telling you. And it was wonderful. No problem whatsoever.

So we do have good students in this City. And I'm very proud of them and what they did these Renaissance students that came. So I know there are good students in this City.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, ma'am.
MS. SMITH: So as far as I'm concerned everybody need to take hand and take control over the students and let them know that they got to grow up and be gentlemen and not being fighting and having guns and everything. I'm so sick and tired of hearing about the crime that we have here.

And you're during a wonderful job, Chief. I appreciate it. You know I told you when I first met you, if you're not going to do a good job we don't need to have you here. But you're doing a good job and I'm very proud of you and to be your friend because I am your friend to the end.

And I thank all the Police Officers. That young man and that young lady, I can't beat them, they're fine, all three of you. I give you all my love and appreciate that you're out here.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, thank you, Mother

Bernice.
MS. SMITH: You let Theo talk.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you.
MS. SMITH: I appreciate the fact you're out here trying to do a good job. And we're going to protect you all the way as far as I'm concerned. I live in Midtown so I don't have to worry too much. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, thank you.
COMMISSIONER MOORE: I think we have some
Reserve Officers at the rear.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Reserve Officers, we acknowledge you. I don't see any.

I just want to close on this note. If this is your first meeting please stand up, if this if your first meeting of the Board of Police Commission, please stand up. Thank you for coming, thank you, appreciate it. Yeah.

We changed our meeting date from July the 2nd to June the 30 th at Public Safety Building and that meeting will be at 3:00, and after our meeting we are working up a reception for the outgoing past Chairs, Commissioner Donnell White and Commissioner Jessica Taylor for their five years of service.

So we are going to be extending invitations
to you and make you aware of that date and time in reference to their lengthy five year service. And I know in the one year and a half that we have worked with them they've just been really fantastic in terms of working with a changing Board that came on board in January 2014.

It's been a blessing in terms of their participation and allegiance to, not just to the Board, but to DPD and this community. Because as you well know this is a non-salary job and that's a commitment they made and we want to make sure. And Jessica is at Country Day. Her grandson's graduating.

We want to thank you for coming out. On close, I want to thank Chief Craig for his attendance tonight. I thank you for your attendance and all the Board. That's why I wanted to have the meeting of the election process in the public where you get an idea of how democracy works at it's best.

And as we move forward, I'm looking forward to working with the Chair Lisa Carter, as Vice Chair, as a Board member and others who would do the same and that would be the blessing of unity as we move forward.

I'm looking for that type of same support she has given me for a year $I$ would give to her in terms of the next year. So as we move to our refreshments,
please do not leave. They prepared refreshments for you.

And the Chair would entertain a motion for adjournment. And I want to thank our Board Attorney Linda Bernard for being active and also Mr. Anthony in terms of -- and all the Commissioners that are in attendance today; and all you Officers, you have witnessed our process also and you can appreciate that and understand that because you've been at all the meetings, at most all the meetings, so.

On that note, I just want to thank you, that God bless, that God keep you as we move forward for the best interest of the City of Detroit.

The Chair would entertain a motion.
COMMISSIONER MOORE: So move.
CHAIRMAN BELL: It's been properly moved.
VICE CHAIR CARTER: Support.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Support. Those in favor, aye.

COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed? Motion carries. Thank you.
