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CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Good afternoon. We're going to call the meeting to order. My name is Lisa Carter. I'm the chair for the Board of Police Commissioners. Welcome to the meeting.

And at this time, I'm going to have Mr. Anthony do the roll call, please.

MR. ANTHONY: Thank you, madam chair. For the record, George Anthony, secretary to the board.

Vice Chair Willy Bell.

COMMISSIONER BELL: Here.

MR. ANTHONY: Commissioner Elizabeth Brooks.

COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Here.

MR. ANTHONY: Commissioner Willie Burton has asked to be excused.

Commissioner Reginald Crawford.

COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Present.

MR. ANTHONY: Commissioner Eva Garza Dewaelsche has asked to be excused.

Commissioner Conrad Mallett, junior.

COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Present.

MR. ANTHONY: Commissioner Ricardo R. Moore.

COMMISSIONER MOORE: Present.

MR. ANTHONY: Commissioner Richard Shelby.

COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Present.

1 MR. ANTHONY: Bishop Edgar Vann has asked to  
2 be excused, as has Commissioner Donnell R. White.

3 Madam Chair, you have a quorum.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Mr. Anthony.  
5 And at this time, I'd like to introduce A.C. White,  
6 who's sitting in for the chief who was here momentarily  
7 a minute ago.

8 A.C. WHITE: Good afternoon, everybody.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: So apparently the chief  
10 had to leave.

11 A.C. WHITE: Yes. I'm sorry. The Chief had  
12 to leave. We had an officer, Officer Mark Robins,  
13 traffic enforcement officer, involved in an accident on  
14 his motorcycle. He's at Detroit Receiving Hospital,  
15 and the chief is on his way to visit with him now.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, A.C. White.  
17 Please keep us updated on the status of Mr. -- Officer  
18 Robins.

19 A.C. WHITE: I will. Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: And certainly our  
21 thoughts and prayers go out to him and his family at  
22 this time.

23 A.C. WHITE: Thank you.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Mr. Anthony, if you  
25 would please introduce the rest of the staff.

1 MR. ANTHONY: Thank you, ma'am. We have from  
2 the office of the chief investigator our chief  
3 investigator Ms. Pamela Davis Drake, and our senior  
4 investigator Officer Jones is here as well. We have  
5 Ms. Linda Bernard, our attorney to the board.  
6 Mr. Robert Brown in the back recording our proceedings.  
7 Sergeant Allen Quinn is also helping out in the back.  
8 And Ms. Trisha Houpt from Hanson Court Reporting  
9 Service is taking the transcript. That completes the  
10 introduction.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Mr. Anthony.  
12 At this time, A.C. White, is there any staff here that  
13 you'd like to introduce?

14 A.C. WHITE: Let's see. I'm not wearing my  
15 glasses. No. I think it's just me today.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: All right.

17 A.C. WHITE: We've got -- no. That's it.  
18 Oh, I'm sorry. Rodney Bellamy from labor.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. At this  
20 time, Commissioners, I'll entertain a motion for the  
21 approval of the agenda for Thursday, September 17th.

22 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: So moved.

23 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and  
25 supported that the agenda for Thursday, September 17th,

1 be accepted. Is there any discussion? Those in favor?

2 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed? The  
4 motion carries.

5 At this time, I'll entertain a motion for the  
6 approval of the minutes from Thursday, September 10th,  
7 2015.

8 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: So moved.

9 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and  
11 supported that the minutes from Thursday, September  
12 10th, be accepted. Is there any discussion? Those in  
13 favor?

14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed? The  
16 motion carries.

17 At this time, I do not have a report.  
18 A.C. White, is there a presentation from the department  
19 today?

20 A.C. WHITE: No, there's no official  
21 presentation today. We continue to fight crime. We're  
22 still looking at ways to improve our efficiency in  
23 those areas.

24 We are in the process of undertaking a number  
25 of different endeavors, including restructuring the way

1 we go about deploying. We're engaged in looking at how  
2 we can best deploy. We put together a deployment  
3 strategy that involves basically assigning officers to  
4 areas of hot spots.

5 So the simplest way I can say it is the 6th  
6 precinct, 10th precinct, and 12th precinct, their  
7 deployment will be based on their needs as opposed to  
8 just a cookie cutter approach of five or ten officers,  
9 you know, on the street at one time. It will be based  
10 on what's trending. So you might see, you know, 20  
11 officers one month deployed in one area and 30 officers  
12 the next month, depending on how things are trending.  
13 But that's -- I'm hesitant because we're still in the  
14 discussion stages of that.

15 But there are a number of things taking  
16 place. We're looking at some innovations with  
17 technology to help us fight crime. Scott Hayes from my  
18 staff is working on a number of different things  
19 involving cameras and card readers and plate readers  
20 and things like that. So we will be presenting a  
21 number of things in the next couple months to this  
22 board for review.

23 In addition to that, we continue to move  
24 forward with our body camera pursuits, that process.  
25 We're waiting on some updates from the grant

1 opportunity. We have not received that yet, but we  
2 heard from the DOJ, I believe, within the past week to  
3 ten days that they're going to be announcing who's  
4 going to receive that grant. With that grant, we're  
5 hoping to purchase those body cameras. So that's  
6 moving forward.

7           And then lastly, we're looking at our  
8 infrastructure still. We're looking at identifying the  
9 7th Precinct. As you know, we're in the process of  
10 negotiating an 8th Precinct, which is near Meijer. And  
11 we are building a 5th Precinct. And I just left there  
12 on my way here -- I'm sorry. Before I got here, I was  
13 there. And the progress there is going along. Not as  
14 fast as I would hope, but we're getting there. It's  
15 going to be a beautiful precinct. We'll make sure this  
16 board receives the information timely enough so that  
17 you can be part of the unveiling of the 5th Precinct.  
18 That would be my report.

19           CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioners, any  
20 questions for A.C. White?

21           COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam cheer, I want to --  
22 Chief was at field day this past Saturday. It was  
23 outstanding field day activities. And myself,  
24 Commissioner Brooks, Commissioner Ricardo Moore, and  
25 Commissioner Shelby. I don't know if there were any



1 other commissioners in attendance but -- and  
2 Mr. Anthony and others. It was well attended. They  
3 had a whole lot of activity for people and tug of war,  
4 softball, the whole nine yards, and, you know, food and  
5 just activity, backpack for the kids. It was just a  
6 wholesome day and the weather cooperated. It was not  
7 too hot, not too cold. And I -- I discovered that the  
8 assistant chief played a little basketball. He was out  
9 doing 3 on 3. And I was taking notes because we all  
10 have our day. He got a pretty good game, and I was  
11 impressed that he was playing with the guys and all  
12 that. So it was a fun day for DPD and the DP family  
13 and the neighborhoods, and I was really impressed in  
14 terms of that type of activity. I want to thank you  
15 and the chief and all the command office. I know it  
16 was a long day in terms of preparation from 10:00 to  
17 6:00. It was really very wholesome in terms of seeing  
18 that type of activity. So once again, just reaching  
19 out to the community, and that's what it's all about.  
20 So thank you for that.

21 A.C. WHITE: Thank you for those comments.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: And also on Friday, we  
23 had the honor of the 911 memorial day.

24 And once again, Commissioner Shelby,  
25 Commissioner Brooks, and Eva Dewaelsche and myself and

1 George Anthony. That was really a moving ceremony in  
2 terms of police, fire, EMS, and all the entities coming  
3 together. First Assistant Chief did an excellent job.  
4 So once again, you know, the whole nine yards. Pamela  
5 Drake was there. And we must lift up those officers.  
6 As I think the fire commissioner stated, take time to  
7 interact with your family. And that's ongoing because  
8 you never know when that lost call -- you know, last  
9 call is going to be made. So really embrace that. And  
10 so that was another occasion that we had opportunity as  
11 commissioners and DPD personnel and others to  
12 participate in a great positive forum. So there's not  
13 enough media coverage on something of that nature, and  
14 I was impressed the people came out for that. You was  
15 there in full color on Friday and Saturday. So thank  
16 you for that participation. And you all lead that  
17 charge. So that's a blessing. That's my brief  
18 reporting out on those two activities.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, sir. Are  
20 there any other questions for A.C. White?

21 I have one question about the recent  
22 deployment of the command officers. Is that a part of  
23 the strategy with the hot spots, or is that just  
24 something that --

25 A.C. WHITE: The short answer is yes, that's

1 part of it. But I don't want to leave you with the  
2 impression that it's the biggest part. It isn't. It's  
3 just there's some issues where we needed to get --  
4 well, there's a couple different components. We have  
5 one deputy chief that will be going away for training  
6 for three months, and she's got some pretty big shoes  
7 to fill. So it just made better sense to move some  
8 people around to help accomplish that.

9 And then, as you know, on the east side, in  
10 particular No. 9, that needs a particular focus. That  
11 needs a very significant focus. And the person that we  
12 found that would be best suited to handle that was in  
13 another seat. So we needed to move him over there.  
14 And so that's what caused the ripple effect of moving a  
15 few other people around. But I will assure you that we  
16 will not lose any traction anywhere else.

17 You know, these -- you know, we have an  
18 attitude that's a little bit different than the way it  
19 used to be in terms of, you know, I'm the east side  
20 captain, so I can't look at the west side. No. You're  
21 a Detroit Police captain. Now your responsibility is  
22 the east side.

23 So I will be tapping Deputy Chief LeValley.  
24 He will continue to work with realtime crime. You  
25 know, as well as (inaudible) who's in neighborhood

1 policing now who is very important on the east side  
2 with us. So we'll all be working together  
3 continuously.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. And I also heard  
5 something about Commander Mahon, there was some  
6 division -- not division. But he was strictly east  
7 side at one point. Is he doing something different  
8 now?

9 A.C. WHITE: So he was either west side --  
10 what was the initial -- I think he was west side.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: He was east side.

12 A.C. WHITE: He was east side most recent.  
13 Then he went west. And then he came in and made a  
14 compelling argument why he should remain east and  
15 that's --

16 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Do we have an  
17 organizational chart to accompany this?

18 A.C. WHITE: We're changing it, and I'll make  
19 sure you get a copy of it.

20 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Timeframe?

21 A.C. WHITE: You'll have it today.

22 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thanks.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Brooks.

24 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Yes. I'd like to ask  
25 you a question. The 8th Precinct, is this a new

1 precinct altogether, or are you redoing a precinct?

2 A.C. WHITE: Well, it's a -- yes, we're going  
3 to redo a building.

4 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Redo?

5 A.C. WHITE: Yeah. You remember where the  
6 8th Precinct was at Six Mile and Grand River?

7 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Okay.

8 A.C. WHITE: We sold that building, and  
9 people that are no longer here made the decision that  
10 we should close that building. I don't think that was  
11 a very good idea. It's the most densely populated area  
12 of the city, so it would be smart to open up an 8th  
13 Precinct and not have the citizens go all the way to  
14 Plymouth and Warwick for police services. So great  
15 idea to put it there. Unfortunately, we don't own the  
16 building. In fact, where it was before has been  
17 flattened. So right across the street at the foot of  
18 the apron of Meijer sits a wellness center next to an  
19 old library. I don't know if you remember that  
20 wellness center. You had Redford High School and then  
21 you had the old library and then you had the wellness  
22 center right there on the corner. And what we're  
23 trying to do, it's not a done deal yet, is purchase the  
24 wellness center and convert it to a precinct.

25 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: My next question is, do

1 we have enough policeman?

2 A.C. WHITE: Well, that's a good question.  
3 But we're constantly hiring. Now we're chasing  
4 attrition rates. So, you know, it's tough. And I  
5 would ask anybody in here that knows any good  
6 candidates, please send them our way. We need as many  
7 police officers as we can get. And we are  
8 civilianizing the department. You probably have heard  
9 a lot about that. So, you know, there's a mandate from  
10 the mayor and the chief that these positions of  
11 nonenforcement, like clerks, typists, be filled with  
12 those people, clerks and typists, and that full-duty  
13 police officers be returned to the field. And that is  
14 in the process now. That's happening at  
15 communications. That's happening on my side. It's  
16 happening at property. You're seeing record low number  
17 in every command in the department. I remember when I  
18 worked in the chief's office some 15 years ago, there  
19 was like 10 police officers in the chief's office.  
20 There is 2. And in my office there is 2 restricted  
21 duty police officers and 1 full-duty police officer.  
22 So philosophically things have changed.

23 But to answer your question, we need more  
24 police officers. But will we have enough to fill the  
25 precinct? Yes, we will. Because No. 6 -- where No. 8

1 is housed now, 6 is bursting at the seams. They don't  
2 have enough room.

3 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Thank you.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam chair, if I might  
5 chime in on that. Assistant Chief mentioned how  
6 crucial that is, because, as you know, from the chief's  
7 office on down is top heavy with staffing.  
8 Traditionally the precinct was top heavy with staffing  
9 because of the union contracts and etcetera, etcetera.  
10 So now we went under emergency management. That's one  
11 of the positive things that we could do in terms of  
12 civilization of the department. So able-bodied police  
13 officers would be functioning as police officers. And  
14 I don't think we ever going to have unfortunately  
15 enough police officers. But we don't want a police  
16 officer on every corner neither. But everywhere you  
17 go, people are asking in the precinct, they want more  
18 police officers. But it's a budget restraint, you  
19 know. And plus, recruitment and people leaving. So  
20 all those issues that the community is really, really  
21 concerned about, like yourself and me, you know, when  
22 you go to any of these meetings, we don't have enough  
23 police officers, even though the response time is cut,  
24 it's still a hear and cry for more officers. So I want  
25 to commend Assistant Chief and the chief in reference

1 to addressing those issues. I can see the difference  
2 in terms of that type of --

3 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: There's one other thing  
4 I was reading where the mayor has put together so many  
5 children from different schools for fire and police. I  
6 know that's a long time coming. You know, they've got  
7 to be of age and all this sort of thing. But I think  
8 it's a worthwhile program.

9 A.C. WHITE: Absolutely. And if I can add to  
10 that. I met with Wayne County Community College about  
11 three weeks ago with First Assistant Chief Stair. And  
12 we talked to them about potentially setting up a  
13 program where people that are in the criminal justice  
14 program can be funneled right to the Detroit Police  
15 Department. And, you know, I'd like to be able to, you  
16 know, get ahold of these kids right out of high school  
17 so we can keep them on track because what we're running  
18 into, quite frankly, is a lot of little problems that  
19 keep them from making the transition to law  
20 enforcement. And even if we weaken our standards, we  
21 have to do that cautiously because you don't want to  
22 lower the bar too low because you're going to pay now  
23 and pay later. There's still the issue of MCOs, where  
24 if we say this is a person we're willing to work with,  
25 MCO is going to say -- which is where we get our



1 certification -- we're not going to certify that person  
2 because of some circumstance in their life.

3 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Thank you.

4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the chair, the  
5 police academy program, is it still vibrant? I know  
6 the summer program is. But what about the school  
7 program? That was another feeder system. That was the  
8 program I was in. (Inaudible)

9 A.C. WHITE: You know, the junior police  
10 program and (inaudible) are still strong programs. But  
11 there's been just a shift with the kids in terms of law  
12 enforcement. So our messaging and packaging has to be  
13 upgraded. You know, when you're competing against  
14 other interests and you make 28, \$25,000 a year as a  
15 police officer, not the strongest medical, not the  
16 strongest retirement, you know, it's a hard sell. So,  
17 you know, these kids are coming out of, you know, high  
18 school, college. Why would I want to do that. You  
19 know, it's a very dangerous city, tough job. So we  
20 have to repackage ourself. And First Assistant Chief  
21 Stair is working on a lot of different programs to  
22 incentivize hiring, to incentivize being a police  
23 officer, college reimbursement. When I came on, you  
24 came on, do you remember the reimbursement checks we  
25 would get?

1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I used to.

2 A.C. WHITE: I used them constantly. It took  
3 forever to get them, but I used them. They went away.  
4 And a few other things like that, you know, bonus pay  
5 and that type of thing. You know, we're looking at --  
6 we're going to be so creative and innovative. You come  
7 to work and you don't use any sick time, you're going  
8 to get something. I even want to incentivize not  
9 getting complaints. I want to incentivize everything  
10 we can incentivize to make being a police officer, you  
11 know, positive.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Whatever assistance I  
13 might be able to add, let me know.

14 A.C. WHITE: All right. Thank you. And,  
15 again, anybody with any nephews, nieces, grandkids,  
16 kids, send them our way.

17 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Madam chair. Chief,  
18 the idea that you're going to incentivize people for  
19 not missing work, that stems from my dear friend the  
20 mayor. We did away with that at the Detroit Medical  
21 Center. And the reason that we did was because of the  
22 number of sick days per quarter that our particular  
23 policy allows. You can have three. I mean, three  
24 unexcused. And so the thing that I would say is is  
25 that when you set the standard at 3 per quarter, that's

1 12 per year. That ain't good attendance. And so  
2 you've got to be very careful. When we did it at the  
3 DMC, we had a FMLA rate, almost 40 percent. Attendance  
4 was completely out of control. So our response at the  
5 time was quite reasonable. The problem is, in  
6 particular in the unionized atmosphere that you're in,  
7 once you start a program like that, even if it's not in  
8 the contract in terms of custom and use, then they say  
9 well, you can't get rid of it without a lot of  
10 consternation. So I would be -- it's appropriate to  
11 incentivize but, you know, you've got to watch very  
12 carefully, you know, the conversation you had with  
13 Commissioner Brooks about setting the standards. And  
14 one day a quarter, which is four times a year, maybe.  
15 Eight times a year? I don't know. You know, I mean,  
16 and so the department really needs to look at that.

17 The other thing that happened with that is  
18 that, good Lord, our employees are very, very smart.  
19 You put a couple of -- you put that attendance  
20 incentive with some FMLA days, you're going to be out a  
21 week and be getting incentivized when you're not there.  
22 So it's a -- the mayor is very proud of that program.  
23 But, you know, buyer beware.

24 A.C. WHITE: Thank you, Commissioner. I  
25 don't want to suggest that anything is solidified yet.

1 I guess --

2 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: I just want you to  
3 look at it. We still do have an attendance bonus  
4 program. But it's only -- it's three days a year. I  
5 mean, if you are -- if you're going to call in, if  
6 you're not scheduled, then you have three call-ins a  
7 year. And we upped the bonus, but we also upped the --  
8 we also raised the bar.

9 A.C. WHITE: Okay. Thank you. I just want  
10 to make sure I leave the board with the right  
11 perspective. Everything is in play. Nothing has been  
12 decided. So we've got everything sitting on the table  
13 to talk about to make being a police officer worthwhile  
14 for officers. But we have not decided anything. But  
15 I'll make sure I bring your concerns to the table.

16 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: One other thing. When  
17 you start doing your recruiting, I hope it's not about  
18 law enforcement. I hope it's about passion for the  
19 community, protecting the citizens, and making their  
20 community safer. I think sometimes if you do it that  
21 way, it's not all about the force part of it.

22 A.C. WHITE: Okay.

23 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the chair, to  
24 further elaborate on that issue, the Wayne County  
25 Sheriff's office, Wayne County Sheriff's Department has

1 put something in place too that I think has a negative  
2 effect on its employees. For example, we get ordered  
3 to work at the end of the shift. You're ordered.  
4 Prior to them putting something in place is what is  
5 commonly known to the deputies as you get two mulligans  
6 every 30 days. We call them mulligans. So you can  
7 refuse the order twice in a 30-day period. But what  
8 that does is -- say, for example, what happened to me  
9 about a week ago was there were 13 people in front of  
10 me. All 13 were ordered. All 13 refused. So it  
11 dropped down to me. They only needed 5 people to work  
12 that night. So, of course, there was no state of  
13 emergency or anything like that. The jail wasn't on  
14 lock down, even though I get ordered, it feels like I'm  
15 on lock down because I can't go home. So that is  
16 something -- and when -- it's been in effect for a  
17 year, year and a half. And some of us looked at it  
18 when it first came into being or they initiated this as  
19 that it would have the kind of negative effect on  
20 employees who never refused an order who just take the  
21 order and work overtime, you know, an additional 16  
22 hours, an additional 8 hours at the end of their shift.  
23 So that put in place has kind of had a negative effect.  
24 And I do believe that sometime in the near future  
25 they'll probably do away with that. But prior to that,

1 they would just order people. If you refused the  
2 order, you get written up. Now you get two, as they  
3 want to call them, mulligans. So on the third one,  
4 within the 30-day period, you actually get -- you  
5 actually get disciplined for it. So I just want to put  
6 that out there. Thank you, sir.

7 A.C. WHITE: Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Any other  
9 questions or comments? Thank you. Are there any  
10 standing committee -- subcommittee reports?

11 Under new business we have a resolution for  
12 Mr. Bill Welborne.

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam chair, I'd like to  
14 pass this onto Commissioner Mallett, if he would be so  
15 kind to say the resolution for Mr. Welborne.

16 Mr. Welborne works at City Wide. So would  
17 you come forward, sir.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Mr. Welborne, can you  
19 step forward, please.

20 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: We going to put as a  
21 part of this how long we've known each other? We keep  
22 that under wrap.

23 So, ladies and gentlemen, this is a  
24 resolution honoring Mr. Bill Welborne. I've known him  
25 for 1,000 years.

1           Whereas, Mr. Welborne served our country for  
2   35 years in the United States Air Force where he  
3   participated in the Vietnam and the Desert Storm. He  
4   rose to the top of his field as line chief in charge of  
5   \$30 billion worth of aircraft. As a ramp coordinator  
6   during Desert Storm deployment, Mr. Welborne supervised  
7   all loading of combat ready troops and supplies and  
8   never busted a flight time schedule. When he was  
9   deployed at the Headquarters Tactical Air Warfare  
10  Center at Elgin Air Force base in Florida, Mr. Welborne  
11  was awarded the Air Force commendation medal for going  
12  above and beyond the call of duty in ensuring that all  
13  fighters were deployed to Vietnam in a timely manner  
14  and returned to home base on time, as scheduled.

15           And whereas, Mr. Welborne is a member and  
16  leader in many civic community organizations, MOSES,  
17  NOBLE, the 12th Precinct Community Relations Board  
18  where he serves as the vice chair, Tuskegee Airmen, and  
19  is a member of Chief James Craig Police Advisory Board.

20           As whereas, Mr. Welborne is pro law  
21  enforcement and believes that respect is the key to  
22  good community relationships.

23           And whereas, Mr. Welborne continues his  
24  advocacy on behalf of disabled veterans educating them  
25  on how to obtain government benefits.

1           Now, therefore, be it resolved, the Detroit  
2 Board of Police Commissioners speaking on behalf of the  
3 citizens of the City of Detroit, Detroit Police  
4 Department, and all the rest of Southeastern Michigan,  
5 acknowledge the dedication of Mr. Bill Welborne. His  
6 patriotism and commitment to this community merits our  
7 highest regard and admiration. We thank you and we  
8 congratulate you.

9           (Applause.)

10           COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Where's our camera?  
11 Where's the official -- where's the lady with the --  
12 stop complaining. All right. I just want you to know,  
13 Bill, everybody else got the lady with the big old  
14 camera.

15           MR. WELBORNE: Well, it's good enough for me.

16           COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Vice chair and  
17 chairman wanted to make sure you get your Board of  
18 Police Commissioner pin. This plus \$3.50 will get you  
19 two a cups of coffee. You keep that.

20           MR. WELBORNE: Thank you very much.

21           COMMISSIONER MALLETT: You're welcome.  
22 Congratulations.

23           MR. WELBORNE: Thank you. Thank you to the  
24 board.

25           COMMISSIONER BELL: You want the microphone



1 to say something?

2 MR. WELBORNE: Oh, I get to speak?

3 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: It won't be your first  
4 one.

5 MR. WELBORNE: I'm not used to getting  
6 awards. I always thought that when I raised my right  
7 hand, I was supposed to -- I believed in duty and honor  
8 and country, and that was my thought. When I joined  
9 the service, I wanted to give it my all and I wanted to  
10 do the best I could do. And that's what I tried to do  
11 in the service. When I retired from the service, the  
12 civilian life, I tried to bring that forward to my  
13 civilian life. And, you know, it's been great. I  
14 can't complain. I had a great life. I can travel  
15 anywhere in the world free with my military career, and  
16 I love it. I just -- I just want to thank everybody  
17 for this. This is great. And I will treasure it  
18 always. Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Mr. Welborne.  
20 And thank you for your continued support of the  
21 residents of the City of Detroit. It's truly an honor  
22 to know you. And congratulations.

23 At this time, Commissioners, I'll entertain a  
24 motion.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: So moved to receive the

1 resolution for Mr. Welborne into our records.

2 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Support.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and  
4 supported that we accept the resolution for Mr. Bill  
5 Welborne into the records. Is there any discussion?  
6 Those in favor?

7 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed? The  
9 motion carries.

10 Under old business --

11 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Oh, through the  
12 chair. Under new business. And the reason I say new  
13 business is because this is probably something new,  
14 innovative, high tech, maybe low tech. I see the  
15 e-mail and text messages about Commissioner Burton  
16 being on conference call today at our meeting. And I  
17 just want to know that in terms of -- well, I don't  
18 know if -- if he's on the phone and it's conference,  
19 there's -- I don't believe there's voice recognition on  
20 there. We don't know if that's him or it's been  
21 authenticated that he is on the phone. And I do  
22 respect the fact that he's not here, and I do respect  
23 Commissioner Burton. However, in terms of our attorney  
24 weighing in on if there's a vote on a resolution or  
25 anything like that and Mr. Burton isn't here, he's just

1 on conference -- I mean, well, what I'm saying is it's  
2 civilian oversight. Accountability through civilian  
3 oversight. Not out of site. So I do respect the fact  
4 that he's not here.

5 What I'm saying is if we move into this  
6 technology of conference calls or something like that,  
7 via -- it's not video conference call. So I just -- I  
8 just want to know where do we stand in terms of --  
9 particularly if there's a vote on something.

10 MS. BERNARD: Linda Bernard, board attorney.

11 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: And a vote proxy by  
12 cellphone.

13 MS. BERNARD: No. The bylaws are very clear  
14 you have to be present to vote. We had a brief  
15 discussion about the possibility of a person being able  
16 to hear while they are -- hear the meeting from here.  
17 But we don't have that facility in this room. You need  
18 a -- one of those big conference call phones that picks  
19 up everyone's voice in a room. This is a huge room.  
20 We don't have that ability. So essentially, even for  
21 listening purposes, there really isn't any way that a  
22 person can listen unless they're present.

23 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, man. So for the  
24 record, this is low tech. This is not high tech. They  
25 talk about innovative high tech stuff from the

1 department. I'm sure DMC has all this innovative high  
2 tech --

3 MS. BERNARD: Yes, DMC has it.

4 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: -- and conference  
5 calls and video conferencing.

6 MS. BERNARD: Yes. We don't have any of  
7 that.

8 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Also, in the past we  
9 talked about pod casting the meetings. It's been a  
10 year, year and a half ago. And that hasn't come  
11 into --

12 MS. BERNARD: Well, the gentleman that was  
13 here that introduced himself to you that was from the  
14 insurance agency that previously was head of the cable  
15 commission, that is an open issue. That's a great  
16 issue. There's really no reason why your meetings  
17 couldn't be televised, just like City Council meetings  
18 are televised. So that's something if the board wants  
19 us to follow up on, we can follow up on, if that's your  
20 -- if that's your druthers. You're an elected body,  
21 and clearly the public has an interest in what you do  
22 and what occurs here.

23 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am. Thank  
24 you.

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the chair,

1 Commissioner Burton just sent me a text message. He  
2 wants the audience to know that he is listening in on  
3 our board secretary's, Secretary Anthony's, telephone.  
4 And the record should reflect that he has conferenced  
5 in.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I don't  
7 think we can entertain any of that in reference to the  
8 process. We just have to continue business as usual.  
9 It's great that he's listening in, but we can't take  
10 any action or monitor on the record or anything like  
11 that. I just think that we just continue because a  
12 public body, that person has to be present. So we not  
13 going to even entertain anything of that nature at this  
14 time.

15 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the chair, if  
16 that's the case, we all can just conference, just have  
17 Mr. Anthony in the room, our attorney, and Chief Drake  
18 and the stenographer. And we can just all conference  
19 call in here, you know, from any side of the country we  
20 choose. Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Any other  
22 comments? Thank you. We'll move on to old business.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam chair, under old  
24 business, as you know, we talked about moving -- our  
25 meetings scheduled for October the 8th which is -- the

1 majority of the commissioners and the staff will not be  
2 in the city for that meeting. That's a community  
3 meeting. So we made a recommendation, I think at some  
4 point we need to formalize it, in terms of not being  
5 present and not have a skeleton for a community  
6 meeting.

7           And one of the things we talked about, and  
8 I'm in the final stages of working on it and hopefully  
9 by next week we have a firm date, to move that meeting  
10 date to Osborne High School. I've been in conversation  
11 with the principal as of today. They have three high  
12 school principals, as you well know. And we're trying  
13 to work out the logistics in reference to -- you heard  
14 Assistant Chief White's issues about that particular  
15 area in terms of zip code 05, 48205.

16           And I spoke briefly to Captain Cox, and he is  
17 no longer at No. 9 but he oversees fire. And that  
18 would be in conjunction with 6th fire, the 9th  
19 Precinct, and other entities, you know, all that in  
20 terms of moving into that 1:30, 2:00 timeframe to  
21 interact with young people. The more positive issues  
22 or impact with young people, it also has impact on  
23 recruiting too and Junior Explorers, Police Explorers.  
24 We had a successful forum at East English Prep High  
25 School. And so I would make that type of

1 recommendation that we transfer that meeting to the  
2 15th since we going to be out of town and the one staff  
3 left is going to be at training day. I would hope that  
4 this body would entertain at this time because we have  
5 to give public notice to that effect. And once we  
6 finalize the plan, then we can move ahead. I think  
7 that would be a grand opportunity to go to that  
8 particular area because Osborne is under a great deal  
9 of scrutiny. And that whole area is under a great deal  
10 of scrutiny in terms of fighting the issues there. And  
11 that's why Commander Mahon wanted to stay in that area,  
12 because it's a challenging effort. So I would hope  
13 this body would entertain at this meeting here to  
14 reschedule that meeting from the 8th to the 15th. If  
15 not, in that timeframe.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Is there a motion?

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: If it's proper, I would  
18 move to that effect.

19 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Support.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Is there any discussion?

21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes, Madam Chair. The  
22 times --

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: This is where we stand.  
24 I talked with the principal. There are three high  
25 school principals, three schools there. And I was

1 having their final meeting on this issue at 1:00, and  
2 she's going to give me a call back tomorrow. They want  
3 to do it and make sure that they're all on the same  
4 page and that we would meet like we did before. We  
5 looking at maybe 150, 200 kids. We don't want to speak  
6 to the entire student body. We want the student  
7 counsel, some parent organization. So we working out  
8 the logistics in terms of we can't do it at 3:00  
9 because school is out. Looking at 1:00 or 1:30. But  
10 they have to work out the logistics. If that's not  
11 convenient on that Thursday, we will know later  
12 tomorrow or Monday in terms of the timeframe. And, you  
13 know, because of the school calendar, you get out at --  
14 you know, we went in there on June and we had a great  
15 turnout. There was a basketball game scheduled. So  
16 they're trying to work all those logistics out. I know  
17 a lot of commissioners work, but we can work it out to  
18 get the majority of people there. We had great  
19 attendance last time around. Does that answer you're  
20 question in terms of trying to work out formality in  
21 terms of timeframe?

22 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Because we're not dealing  
24 with one principal like we dealt with at East English.  
25 We're dealing with three principals.



1           COMMISSIONER MOORE: So the motion is on the  
2 floor that has to be voted on. I would guess how come  
3 we just don't table this until next week until we have  
4 the final times.

5           COMMISSIONER BELL: Well, I want to give them  
6 the go ahead now. You know, I don't want to say we  
7 have to get back with you. I want you to approve the  
8 date. Then we can work out the time. If the date --  
9 we want to be flexible because they working with us. I  
10 talked to Stacey Bradkins who's head of security, you  
11 know, Chief Bradkins there. So we trying to -- you  
12 know, I'm just trying to lock in the date in that  
13 timeframe because we can move to Wednesday, Thursday.  
14 I said we flexible but we need to change the date  
15 because we're not going to be here anyway. So if that  
16 would be something you can vote in favor of, I would  
17 appreciate it for us to get the logistics worked out.

18           COMMISSIONER MOORE: Are you suggesting we  
19 meet twice in one week?

20           COMMISSIONER BELL: No. Just one day.

21           COMMISSIONER MOORE: So we're just going to  
22 cancel it, the meeting on the 8th?

23           COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes.

24           COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the chair,  
25 when you say cancel the meeting of the 8th, in terms of

1 the board meeting on the 8th or --

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: If I may, the board  
3 meeting is scheduled for the 8th. The majority of the  
4 commissioners would not be here on 8th. They'll be  
5 coming back from the conference. That's the majority  
6 of the counsel -- I mean, of the commissioners and the  
7 staff will be out of town coming back. So that's why  
8 we trying to just cancel that day out and move it to  
9 the 15th in that sense.

10 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I have one question.  
11 Why not go back to the area that you were going to, the  
12 one that you cancelled? You don't want to go back  
13 there? You'd rather go to a new area?

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: We want to go to Osborne  
15 High School because of the issue that that particular  
16 area is dealing with versus King High School. We stay  
17 in the 7th Precinct. It's not the same concerns. And  
18 Osborne is the high crime area, high issues. And  
19 there's a whole lot of target organizations working  
20 within that area. So I think as we move forward --  
21 that's why we went to East English Prep. And it's in  
22 the same area too. But in the future we can perhaps  
23 schedule another one, you know, maybe some timeframe in  
24 the 7th Precinct. But Osborne is more pressing. We  
25 might want to look at Cody High school, you know,

1 multicultural high school. But something that we can  
2 work on. So hopefully --

3 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: All right then.

4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: One final comment.  
5 We're not in violation of the city charter by  
6 cancelling?

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: We would entertain like  
8 this is the training day, you know.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Attorney Bernard should  
10 speak on that.

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes. Thank you.

12 MS. BERNARD: Before I do that, I wanted to  
13 give you this.

14 I'm sorry. What's the question?

15 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Are we in violation of  
16 the city charter by cancelling a meeting?

17 MS. BERNARD: Well, you're not really  
18 cancelling the meeting. You're just scheduling it as a  
19 training. You're indicating that you are going to be  
20 together, but you're in training that day. You're not  
21 having a board meeting that day. I don't think it will  
22 be an issue. It's a very minor detail. You have  
23 around 50 meetings a year barring the break that you  
24 have at Christmastime. So I think you're okay.

25 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the chair,

1 because last year we went over this about cancelling  
2 meetings.

3 MS. BERNARD: Did we?

4 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am. You  
5 weren't here. And the research was done in terms of  
6 whether or not we in violation of the charter. And of  
7 course -- and I do understand what the Vice Chair Bell  
8 is talking about in terms of everyone will not be here.  
9 And we definitely couldn't do a conference call from  
10 our location. But I just want to say that that's a  
11 real issue with me as to whether or not we are in  
12 violation of the charter. I would support this  
13 resolution if the next time we going to meet in the  
14 community with the youth at a school that we do it on  
15 the west side. And I do understand the need for  
16 Osborne. That is my district. I live within a few  
17 blocks of that high school in that area. But I just  
18 want to say that, you know, we done East English  
19 Village and now we're doing Osborne. And the next time  
20 that we do this in terms of the youth that we do a west  
21 side school. So be inclusive of the city. But that's  
22 -- that's my main stickler is to make sure that we're  
23 not in violation of the city charter by actually  
24 cancelling that meeting.

25 MS. BERNARD: Well, you're scheduling a

1 training event for the day of the meeting. The  
2 alternative, of course, would be that Commissioner  
3 Mallett is in town, he could come over here, there  
4 would be no one in the room. He could, you know.

5 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Conference call all  
6 of us?

7 MS. BERNARD: No. Convene and say I don't  
8 have a quorum, and walk out.

9 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: I do that all the time  
10 anyway. So it wouldn't really be a big deal.

11 MS. BERNARD: If that's your druthers, he  
12 could certainly come. There would not be a quorum  
13 present.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam chair, the point is  
15 this is a community meeting. This is not a regular  
16 meeting. This is community meeting on that particular  
17 date and time. So as you can see, the attendance here  
18 at our 3:00 meeting is really -- it leaves a whole lot  
19 to be desired. And we try to go all out for our  
20 community meeting. But even with that, that's probably  
21 not sufficient in terms of generating the people out.  
22 So I think we can move forward, you know, in terms of  
23 looking at it from -- realistically, we meet more so  
24 than any other body in the city in terms of meeting.  
25 So we are diligent in terms of -- but who would really

1 miss us on that particular day? But we just doing --

2 MS. BERNARD: There is no quorum.

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: I think that's something  
4 that we need to engage with all these issues that we  
5 are facing. I think we need to take advantage of  
6 what's happening nationally.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions?  
8 The motion is that we have a --

9 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: That we have a  
10 training day for October the 8th, that we move our  
11 public meeting based in the community to October the  
12 15th at Osborne High School with a time to be  
13 determined, but nevertheless, at or around 1:00.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those in favor?

16 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed? The ayes  
18 have it. The motion carries. At this time, there's a  
19 resolution for Dental Choice Mobile. So I'll move --  
20 I'll entertain a motion.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Are we going to -- go  
22 ahead.

23 MS. BERNARD: Would you like to present that  
24 resolution when that person is present? We could  
25 perhaps table it until then. He was present at our

1 meeting before, but I'm not sure he was -- was he  
2 notified to be here today.

3 MR. ANTHONY: No. The motion dealt with  
4 consideration. They're going to approve today and then  
5 present later.

6 MS. BERNARD: Okay.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Motion to accept the  
8 resolution for Dental Choice Mobile.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: I so move, madam chair.

10 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and  
12 supported that we accept the resolution for Dental  
13 Choice Mobile. Is there any discussion?

14 I just have one comment. I wasn't here last  
15 week. And I understand that this person -- this Dental  
16 Choice Mobile was recommended and there was some  
17 confusion about the Dental Choice Mobile not having an  
18 office in City of Detroit. Anyway, it was denied. So  
19 we're here now with the motion. A motion was made at  
20 the last meeting to do the -- consider the resolution.  
21 So we're doing the resolution now.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: We're approving the  
23 resolution.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: We're approving the  
25 resolution now. Okay. So those in favor?

1 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed? The  
3 motion carries.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam chair, I'd like to  
5 speak to that particular issue. I think that it would  
6 be appropriate to receive any resolution prior to our  
7 community meeting, that the whole board receive the  
8 resolution a week prior to. Then we can look at it.  
9 And if we have any reservation or concern about  
10 disapproving it or any concern, they can contact the  
11 chair. And then, therefor, that resolution would go  
12 forward or not go forward. Then we won't get into the  
13 situation where the board was put in a position we was  
14 not aware of what transpired. Therefore, I think that  
15 would be something -- and there should be two issues.  
16 Naturally public safety is one. Public safety issues  
17 come from DPD or from this board. And the other issue  
18 would be the quality of life issues that impact the  
19 quality of life. This is a case of quality of life for  
20 young people and others who make a commitment to the  
21 City of Detroit in some form or another. I think those  
22 two areas, that perhaps we can work up in reference to,  
23 you know, something that the board secretary, you know,  
24 could work up and give us something to see in terms of  
25 how we can formulate that type of language. Then we



1 can approve it or disapprove it. Would that be  
2 something that we can entertain just by common consent.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I think that -- well, I  
4 think that there should be a broader -- I mean, a  
5 bigger parameter set in that we wouldn't have even  
6 gotten that far for us to approve it because the  
7 decision had already been made based on past history.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, ma'am.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: From what I understand.  
10 So I think that any resolution that's brought to us  
11 should come to us, period, and not based on past  
12 practice, if that makes sense.

13 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: That makes sense.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. So I'm open to  
15 that. Commissioners, any comments?

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: That would be -- you  
17 know, in accordance with your recommendation, that we  
18 go forward in that manner, work up something that the  
19 word secretary could draft or something that we can  
20 take a look at, entertain all of that in terms of the  
21 timeframe and the decision making process, to make sure  
22 that we don't fall into this type of situation where  
23 we're sitting there and we're not aware.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Right. Okay. I  
25 think that's something Mr. Anthony can work on.

1 MR. ANTHONY: Absolutely.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. At this  
3 time, announcements. The next meeting will be  
4 Thursday, September 24th, 2015, at 3:00 p.m. at The  
5 Detroit Public Safety Headquarters.

6 At this time, we'll have oral communications  
7 from the audience. Please give your name and limit  
8 your comments to two minutes, please.

9 MS. PANSELL: Good afternoon, Board. Sharon  
10 Pannell. Detroit Police Citizens Academy is having  
11 another class October 5th. If anybody knows anybody  
12 that wants to join, go to that class. Officer Smith's  
13 number is 596 -- I can't see it -- 2530, I think. Or  
14 you can call me or e-mail me. I've got some  
15 applications.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

17 MS. PANSELL: Thank you.

18 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I'm sorry. May I ask,  
19 that's October the 5th? Where?

20 MS. PANSELL: It's here at 1301 on Mondays.  
21 It's only one day a week. It's on Mondays from 5:30 to  
22 7:00, and it's for six weeks.

23 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam chair, is that --  
25 is that communication going out to the community? I

1 know you have limited space to accommodate so many  
2 people. Is that being circulated throughout the  
3 community? Will people be aware?

4 MS. PANNELL: Well, all my members are  
5 telling people. So I don't know. We got -- we all  
6 have applications to pass out. We have about -- I  
7 don't know how many people he's going to have. He  
8 always have an overflow of people. But just in case  
9 you know somebody's that's really interested, because  
10 some of them, you know, you've got to do a background  
11 check too.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes.

13 MS. PANNELL: So have to make sure that --  
14 yes. Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Any other  
16 comments?

17 MR. WELBORNE: Bill Welborne. A couple weeks  
18 ago I announced about A seminar I had for the veterans  
19 on the 10th of October from -- what's that? I gave  
20 some fliers to Ms. Carter up here. From 10:00 to 2:00  
21 p.m. at the disabled veterans hall on Puritan and  
22 Cheyenne. I forgot the address. It's between Meijer's  
23 and Schaefer. That's where it's at. They're going to  
24 have people there to explain all the veterans benefits  
25 because a lot of people not getting what they're

1 supposed to get. I think I mentioned the case about  
2 the 95 year old man that got hurt in World War II and  
3 he never -- never knew about his veterans benefits. He  
4 just found out about them six months ago. So he missed  
5 all those years of benefits he was supposed to get.  
6 But they're going to have people there on the spot to  
7 sign you up to help you fill out the paperwork. All  
8 they need -- and every veteran know what this is -- a  
9 DD Form 214. That's what they need. That's the  
10 discharge papers. If you have any medical records to  
11 help speed things along, bring that. And that would be  
12 at the DAV. And if they have any problem, I'll be  
13 there in the morning too to help them out. So come  
14 over there. And they got \$170 million just sitting  
15 there. And people don't know about it. And the VA  
16 doesn't tell you about it. So that's all our money. I  
17 get my money. I'm getting mine. I make darn sure and  
18 I make sure everybody get theirs too.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Mr. Welborne.

20 MR. WELBORNE: It's the 10th of October from  
21 10:00 to 2:00.

22 MR. JOHNSON: Good afternoon, Honorable  
23 Board. And thank you for allowing us to speak. I'm  
24 Don Johnson. I'm with 12th precinct community  
25 relations and also interim president of City Wide.

1 First of all, those applications that Ms. Pannell is  
2 talking about, we talked about that at our City Wide  
3 meeting. So the presidents of City Wide can take that  
4 information back to their group and let them know as  
5 well. So that's how we get that information out. We  
6 also do it by e-mail and other systems as well.

7 What I would like to speak to with this  
8 honorable body is, number one, I know you been working  
9 on getting your power back. I haven't heard any  
10 updates on what had happened or if there's anything  
11 happening and how is it happening so that we can relate  
12 those stories to our people at community relations.  
13 And my last question is -- good to see you, Assistant  
14 Chief White.

15 A.C. WHITE: Good to be seen.

16 MR. JOHNSON: Once again, I want to keep  
17 reiterating to this honorable board and to the police  
18 department, we are here to help. Don't call me the day  
19 before the event to get my people together. I can get  
20 some together. But if I had just a little bit more  
21 time, I can get you more.

22 A.C. WHITE: Okay.

23 MR. JOHNSON: And that's all we want to do is  
24 be a part of what's going on so that we can make this  
25 city better. Thank you.

1           COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam chair -- go ahead.  
2 I just -- can I respond to his -- give you update.  
3 This next Tuesday at 10:00 the entire counsel is going  
4 to vote on a resolution in terms of support for  
5 reinstatement of the Board of Police Commissioners.  
6 And the public is invited. The commissioners invited.  
7 Our attorney to the board, Linda Bernard, spoke to  
8 counsel woman chief of staff. That's going to take  
9 place at 10:00. This is -- we met with counsel woman  
10 Sheffield. And she said we speak to a resolution prior  
11 to the summer. We need to do a resolution. So she  
12 spent this summer. So that hearing is going to take  
13 place by the Counsel at 10:00. And also, Mayor Duggan  
14 is publically supporting the reinstatement of the Board  
15 of Police Commissioners. So we all on the same page.  
16 And we going to have a forum to update the public on --  
17 I'm going to make sure you get fliers on Tuesday,  
18 September 22. Pleasant Grove Missionary Baptist Church  
19 on the east side of Detroit on Six Mile. There's going  
20 to be a forum at 6:30. We inviting the public. We're  
21 inviting our -- unfortunately, counsel perform meetings  
22 on that same night, but they changed their date and  
23 time. I'll make sure you can get some fliers and you  
24 can circulate. So things are moving forward. I'm  
25 very, very pleased at the counsel, the mayor, and other

1 elected officials we have. A resolution already been  
2 approved by the Detroit caucus of the state  
3 representative by former Commissioner Byrd, State Rep  
4 Byrd, and the Chair Banks in terms of leading that type  
5 of charge. So that resolution officially on Tuesday  
6 the 22nd. So that gives you an update. So we don't  
7 want to call you Monday and say please come out. So we  
8 hope that you take some fliers, e-mail, whatever that  
9 is, and we'll see you on Tuesday. If not at 10:00, but  
10 hopefully at 6:30.

11 MR. JOHNSON: Thank you.

12 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes. Through the  
13 chair. Prior to Dr. King -- I believe it was the  
14 mid-1950s. Reverend Vernon John said if you see a good  
15 fight, get in it.

16 MR. JOHNSON: Get in it. Right. Oh, yeah.

17 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Right.

18 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the chair. I'm  
19 sorry to segue the conversation. But, Assistant Chief,  
20 Angels Night, when does that planning start?

21 A.C. WHITE: Well, it's already started. You  
22 should be receiving your fliers in the mailbox soon.  
23 And the neighborhood community or neighborhood stations  
24 are set up to volunteer already.

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: All right. Thank you.

1 MR. JOHNSON: We got our cards already.

2 A.C. WHITE: You did get them?

3 MR. JOHNSON: Yes.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other  
5 communications?

6 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the chair, I  
7 just want to publically thank Chief Drake and also  
8 Commander Sims for their work on I guess the  
9 collaboration on bringing or giving us what's going to  
10 come forward is monthly reports in terms of what has  
11 occurred in terms of a complaint being filed and  
12 followed all the way through in terms of it was a  
13 sustained complaint, whether or not there's discipline,  
14 and what was the result of that discipline. So I just  
15 want to publically thank you for that work. I look  
16 forward to hearing those reports. Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Any other  
18 oral communications? Any other oral communications?

19 MS. SMITH: I was getting up. Good  
20 afternoon, chief. Good seeing you again, even though  
21 you're on TV all the time. But you doing a good job  
22 anyway.

23 Bernice Smith, political activist. I just  
24 left a meeting because I had a call earlier this  
25 morning in regards to the police following through on a



1 burglary. My church member asked me would I bring it  
2 before the board or get some help for them. I went  
3 over to the store which is located on Jefferson. The  
4 name of -- well, it's in the Jefferson Village shopping  
5 area. So I spoke with the manager there, the young  
6 lady, and she gave me all the particulars that I  
7 thought I would bring to the board. The burglary --  
8 the first burglary was on February the 18th of this  
9 year at 3:30 a.m. The next burglary was March 20 of  
10 this year, also, same time, around that time. Now,  
11 what they think is -- well, you did have two of the  
12 detectives come and speak with them, but they haven't  
13 heard anything else since then. In the meantime, I do  
14 have the report number. I have pictures to be given to  
15 our attorneys. So maybe we can get something done in  
16 regards to this situation because we want businesses to  
17 stay in our area, not leave out. And they have a good  
18 business. I was there and I saw it. Good products  
19 over there. But in the meantime, we would like very  
20 much for the police department to give them attention  
21 in regards to trying to solve the problem. They have  
22 pictures of the person who came in the door. I have  
23 pictures of the truck that was being -- in the area  
24 watching the store when they close up and so forth. So  
25 I think with this information, I think that we can get

1 started in regards to helping them out.

2 A.C. WHITE: Agreed.

3 THE WITNESS: Because like I said, we want  
4 the business to stay here and not leave.

5 I have been in Chicago. I am so proud of  
6 Detroit, I don't know what to do. I know we have our  
7 crime and everything. I was there for a taping with  
8 the Harvey show. But what I saw over there was so  
9 outrageous, it was a shame. People -- they do not  
10 drive properly. They ride up on your car. You think  
11 they're going to hit the back of your car. And I was  
12 quite scared. And I was born over there. But I am so  
13 proud to be a Detroiter, I don't know what to do  
14 because, there is no control. The police do not have  
15 control on the city in certain areas. Before I got  
16 there, there was 48 shootings in one weekend and 13  
17 killings. Now, they don't broadcast their crime  
18 activity. But they will broadcast Detroit all the  
19 time. So I just want to let the police department know  
20 I know you're doing a good job. I feel that you're  
21 doing a good job. You're not just wearing that uniform  
22 for nothing. And I just want to know that I -- let you  
23 know that I am proud to be a Detroiter and a member and  
24 be affiliated with Detroit Police Department because I  
25 bragged about you. I will give this information to

1 her.

2 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Ms. Smith, I'm sure  
3 you told Steve Harvey that too.

4 MS. SMITH: You don't know what all I told  
5 him. And then I had an appointment with the chief, the  
6 judge. I overslept so I didn't get a chance to see  
7 him, so I apologized to him. But I am disappointed.  
8 Prejudice is running rampant over there. They have us  
9 sitting in this section, some of us here, and them all  
10 in the front section. I was not able to do my answer,  
11 whatever Steve you want, because guess what, the seats  
12 that I thought I was going to sit in was reserved. The  
13 next seat that was on the front row was reserved. I  
14 was put like in the back of the bus on the first row,  
15 the third seat from where the camera people come in. I  
16 was so upset. But I did let it be known, not to him  
17 because he went out, but I did speak to him when it was  
18 intermission. They was all raising their hand and  
19 everything. I said excuse me. I'm the woman that came  
20 300 some miles, 83 years old, and drove here to see you  
21 and talk to you in regards to your swearing. He looked  
22 over there at me, way over there, and then he said oh,  
23 Mother Bernice, you the one that has the bakery. And I  
24 said yes, yes, yes. And then I said I have more to  
25 tell you, but I don't want to let the public know.

1 Well, you told enough already about me. But in the  
2 meantime, I did get a chance to -- but he didn't come  
3 and recognize me or hug me knowing that he knows me.  
4 But that -- their production people took over. They  
5 put the people where they want to put them and put them  
6 there. So I was very upset about that. And I did  
7 write a nice letter referring to that. I will not go  
8 back again unless I am recognized because they let them  
9 come in first and then they called names and they  
10 didn't call my name the second time so I just got on up  
11 and went on in the studio. I wasn't going to be  
12 sitting way up in the booster. But anyway, I wasn't in  
13 a good seat anyway, I was way down there. But in the  
14 meantime --

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, ma'am.

16 MS. SMITH: -- Chicago is in bad shape.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

18 MS. SMITH: They building downtown true  
19 enough, all the sky scrapers and everything for the  
20 people who want to have homes. But as far as in the  
21 other area where we are, it's horrible. And I just  
22 glad that I'm proud of my police department.

23 A.C. WHITE: Thank you.

24 MS. SMITH: Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, ma'am. Any

1 other oral communication? Any other oral  
2 communication? Any other oral communication?  
3 Commissioners, is there a motion to adjourn?

4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So moved.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Support.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and  
7 supported. The meeting is adjourned. Thank you all  
8 for coming. Thank you.
