Desired National Impact

Nationally, the recovery package is designed to:

- Create or save 3.5 million jobs over the next two years.
- Direct nearly 40 percent of recovery package dollars for relief to working and middle class families.
- Double renewable energy generating capacity over three years.
- Invest \$150 billion in our nation's infrastructure.
- Protect health care coverage for roughly 20 million Americans.
- Enact the most significant expansion in tax cuts for low- and moderate-income households ever, lifting more than 2 million people out of poverty.



ARRA Overview

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) is a nationwide effort to create jobs, jumpstart growth, and transform our economy for the 21st century. Across the country, the Recovery Act will help businesses create jobs and families afford their bills while laying a foundation for future economic growth in key areas like health care, clean energy, education and a 21st century infrastructure.



Guiding Principles

- Spend quickly to save and create jobs.
- Ensure transparency and accountability.
- Thoughtfully invest one-time funds.
- Advance effective reforms.



ARRA Goals

- To promote economic recovery.
- To assist those most impacted by the recession.
- To provide investments needed to increase economic efficiency by spurring technological advances in science and health.
- To invest in transportation, environmental protection, and other infrastructure that will provide long-term economic benefits.

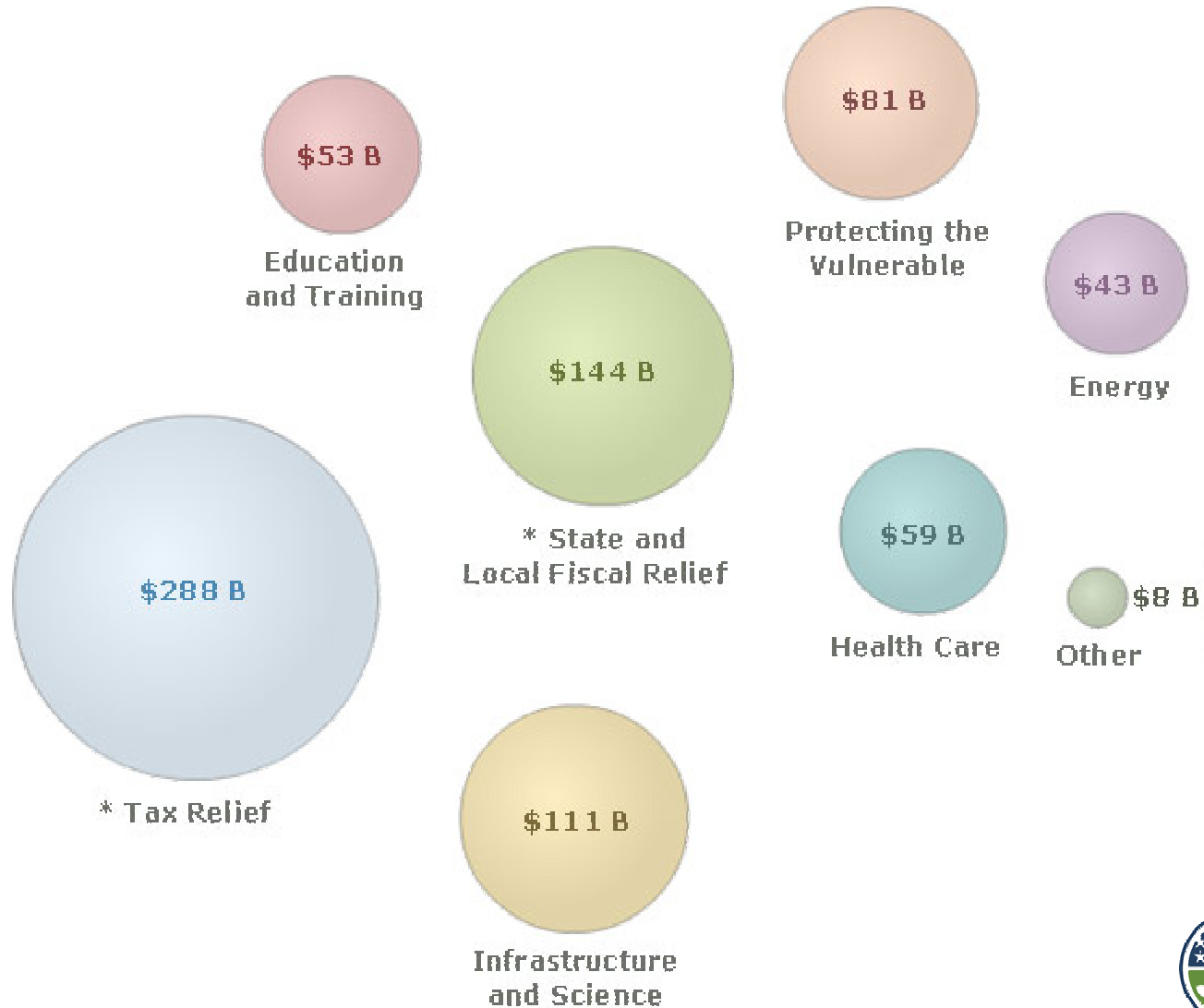


ARRA Myths

- All Recovery Act dollars have been received by the local agency – the City of Detroit.
- ARRA dollars are to stabilize State and local government budgets, in order to minimize and avoid reductions in essential services and counterproductive state and local tax increases.
- The vast majority of the money would go into infrastructure, whether it was roads, bridges or public buildings. In actuality, infrastructure funding is only a small percentage of the overall Act.

The Michigan Impact

Working Families:

- Making Work Pay: The President's tax-cut – which covers more Americans than any in history – is putting more than \$1.9 billion back in the pockets of more than 3.7 million hard-working Michigan families.
- \$58,681,179 to support child care for working families.

Education:

- \$2,576,612,114 potentially available to Michigan to lay the foundation for a generation of education reform and help save thousands of teaching jobs at risk due to state and local budget cuts.



The Michigan Impact

Transportation:

- **\$847,204,834** in highway funds to help build and repair roads and bridges.
- **\$134,956,466** to repair and build public transportation infrastructure.
- **\$12.7 million** to address airport safety and security, infrastructure, runway safety, increased capacity, and mitigation of environmental impacts.

Law Enforcement:

- More than **\$67 million** for state and local law enforcement assistance available through the Edward Byrne Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program.

The Michigan Impact

Energy:

- **\$76,601,500** in block grants to foster energy efficiency in building, transportation, and a wide range of other improvements.
- **\$243,398,975** to support the weatherization of homes, including adding more insulation, sealing leaks and modernizing heating and air conditioning equipment.
- **\$82,035,000** to the State Energy Program, available for rebates to consumers for energy saving improvements; development of renewable energy projects; promotion of Energy Star products; efficiency upgrades for state and local government buildings; and other innovative state efforts to help save families money on their energy bills.

The Michigan Impact

Health Care:

- **\$2,600,000** to fund **2** new Community Health Centers, which will serve an estimated **13,890** patients and create a projected **105** jobs.
- **\$8,586,711** to expand services at **29** existing Community Health Centers, which will expand service to an additional 53,749 patients and create or save a projected **152** jobs.
- **\$3,153,580** to provide meals to low-income seniors.
- **\$464,364,309** made available in Federal Medical Assistance Percentage (FMAP) to protect health care for the families hit hard by the economic crisis.
- **\$6,612,318** in vaccines and grants to ensure more underserved Americans receive the vaccines they need.

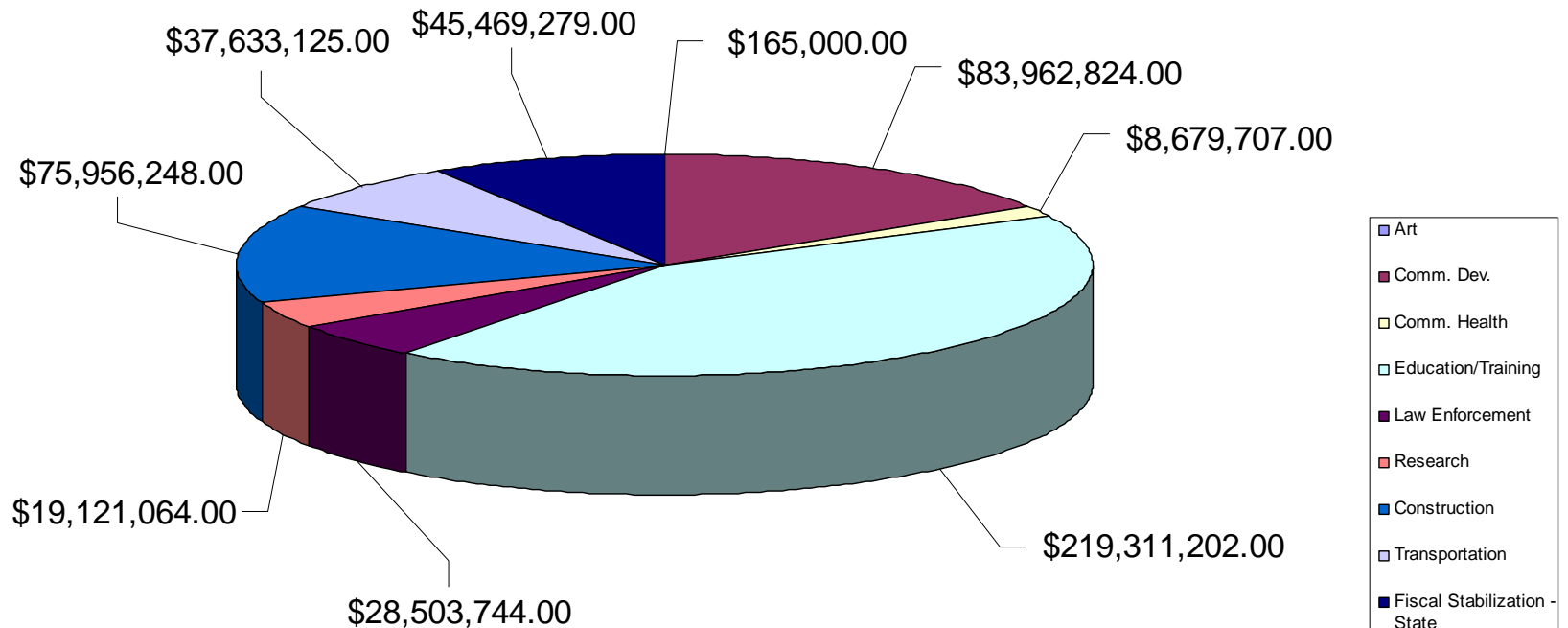

The report defines the urgent need for bold and decisive action by:

- Putting 240,000 Americans to work improving their communities in direct public service jobs with Detroit as a pilot city.
 - Fast track jobs could include cleaning up abandoned properties.
 - Staffing emergency food programs.
 - Working in Head Start, child care, and other early education programs.
 - Renovating and maintaining parks, playgrounds, and other public spaces.

- Creating roughly 930,000 jobs by strengthening the safety net.
- Creating at least 1.4 million jobs by giving a tax credit to employers that hire new employees or increase hours in the work schedule or existing employees.
- Encouraging the prevention of tax hikes.
