4 CHAIRMAN BELL: Good afternoon. Welcome to
5 the weekly afternoon meeting at 3:00 of the Board of
6 Police Commission. Hi. I'm your Chair, Willie Bell,
7 from District 4. At this time we're going to have
8 invocation by our own Reverend Pamela Davis-Drake, the
9 Chief Investigator.

10 (Invocation given)

11 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. Roll call.
12 Elizabeth Brooks, Ms. Brooks

13 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Present.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Willie Burton?
15 Lisa Carter? Reginald Crawford?

16 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Present.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Eva Dewaelsche excused.
18 Conrad Mallett? Ricard Moore, excused. Derrick
19 Sanders?

20 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Here.

21 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: You're not excused
22 you are here. We'll note you're here. Richard Shelby
23 is excused and Bishop Edgar Vann is excused. Mr.
24 Secretary, I assume that we do not have a quorum.

25 SECRETARY HICKS: That's correct.

1 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you, sir. I'm
2 going to ask -- before we do that, I'm going to ask
3 Deputy Chief David LeValley, thank you for your
4 attendance on behalf of the Chief. If you want to
5 introduce any others at this time, this would be the
6 appropriate introduction time. If not, we can a little
7 bit later.

8 D.C. LeVALLEY: Thank you. Chief Craig is at
9 a retreat for all the mayor's appointees that he's
10 having today so he's in training. Sitting in for the
11 Chief today also present from the Department Lieutenant
12 Johnson from Chief Staff and Sergeant Stinson from
13 downtown services. I don't think I missed anybody
14 else. Thank you.

15 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, sir. Good to see
16 you. At this time, I'm going to ask our Secretary to
17 the Board, Mr. Gregory Hicks, I'm introducing him and
18 he's going to go forth with any other introduction of
19 the staff.

20 SECRETARY HICKS: Thank you. I should add
21 that Commissioner Carter just joined us.

22 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good afternoon.

23 SECRETARY HICKS: We have with us this
24 evening Chief Investigator Pam Drake, who's here, of
25 course. Linda Bernard our attorney to the Board.

1 Robert Brown, who's Administrative Assistant, and Mr.
2 Nelson, the supervising investigator. We also have
3 Mindy Womack, who is the court reporter today and we
4 also have Gail Oxendine, who is excused for the day.

5 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, sir. And
6 recorders today, sir if you would introduce them.

7 SECRETARY HICKS: Yes. Mindy Womack is the
8 court reporter.

9 CHAIRMAN BELL: Oh, got. Did I hear it the
10 first time? Media Service did we miss them?

11 SECRETARY HICKS: Yes, we did. Okay. We
12 have two able people on the part of media services who
13 are here, one manning the camera and one in the back of
14 the control room.

15 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, sir. And we still
16 are.

17 SECRETARY HICKS: Awaiting a quorum.

18 CHAIRMAN BELL: Do not have a quorum at this
19 time. Okay. We're going to move.

20 SECRETARY HICKS: Commissioner you can
21 proceed with your agenda.

22 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir.

23 SECRETARY HICKS: When we get to things that
24 require a vote, a decision making item, then we would
25 be concerned with our quorum.

1 CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay. We'll continue on.
2 And since we do not have a quorum for the agenda I just
3 move on in terms of the formality of it all.

4 My report, I'm going to reserve some
5 comments. I have to gather my thoughts and it's been
6 so hot outside I haven't had a chance to gather myself
7 make an adjustment from inside the building here.
8 Subcommittee.

9 SECRETARY HICKS: I'm sorry.

10 CHAIRMAN HICKS: Subcommittee.

11 SECRETARY HICKS: Mr. Chair, you have in the
12 packet pursuant to discussions with you and the
13 appointments that you had made to the subcommittee.
14 What's in the package is a complete listing of all of
15 the subcommittees. I would note that the added one in
16 this particular rendition is the one that you created
17 as a result of the great work on the part of
18 Commissioner Brooks meeting and that was police
19 recruiting. Other than that, the subcommittees are all
20 the same. We have standing and ad-hoc committees, and
21 to the right of the paper you'll have in bold the
22 chairpersons of the committee and membership.

23 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, sir. I appreciate
24 that in terms of rolling it out and I appreciate
25 Commissioner Brooks for volunteering to chair that

1 committee last week and we're looking forward to more
2 interaction in terms of something that is dear to our
3 heart in terms of recruiting efforts with the
4 population in the City of Detroit and Metropolitan
5 Detroit and nationally. Do you want to share anything
6 with us at this time Commissioner Brooks?

7 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I don't need to talk
8 about all of the crime and all the shooting that's
9 going on, but it is going to be hard to recruit young
10 men and women. So we're going to need every able body
11 we can. All community centers even going to go into
12 southwest. We have some other places to go, but I'm
13 calling on all the citizens to help us to do this. But
14 because of what's going on now with police shootings,
15 it's getting a little hard, so we need as many people
16 as we possibly can. I still have to get with the My
17 Brother's Keeper, that's coming up, and I have
18 something else that's coming up, but now that he is
19 working with me, I feel that the two of us together can
20 do a great job. But I'm calling on all of you out
21 again that if you know of any organization, any church,
22 any community center that we can go into with our
23 police lieutenant to recruit young people, I would
24 appreciate it. Thank you.

25 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. That includes

1 Slow Rollers too, if you want to roll with the police
2 department, we are aggressively recruiting. And
3 there's no age discrimination and we do have a bike
4 patrol, as you well know. So we do have motorized
5 patrol so you don't have to be slow with us, you can
6 move forward with a rapid pace. We'll entertain a
7 little bit later on. We just want to acknowledge that
8 you're present. And I assume the next item on the
9 agenda will be Deputy Chief LeValley report.

10 D.C. LeVALLEY: Yes, sir. Thank you. I will
11 start with the crime reports as of this morning, 158
12 homicides. That's even with last year. Nonfatal
13 shootings we're at 508. Last year we were at 562.
14 We're down 54, or 10%. Robberies at 1,378. Last year
15 this date we were at 1,640. We're down 262 or 16% and
16 carjackings, which are included in that robbery number,
17 we're at 161. Last year we were at 252. We're down 91
18 or 36% this year. Our average priority one response
19 time last week was 16.7 and we handled last week 1,701
20 priority one calls, 5,567 total calls for service.
21 That's it for that.

22 I know we had last night, probably saw in the
23 news, we had some protesters that were chaining
24 themselves to the front door of the 3rd precinct. We
25 had our chief duty officer respond to the location,

1 talked to the organizer of the group. You know,
2 indicated to that person that we certainly support
3 everybody's right to protest and which has been our
4 message all along, we support everybody's First
5 Amendment right, free speech, but blockading the
6 entrance to the police station and chaining themselves
7 wasn't the appropriate location or venue to do that.
8 So after about an hour we had the chains cut off and
9 they were arrested and charged with disorderly conduct.
10 So it ended without any physical encounters. There was
11 no force used. We recorded the entire incident or the
12 entire cutting of the chains and arresting of the
13 individuals.

14 One of the issues too is that they chained
15 themselves to the building without the keys to the
16 locks available, which I don't know if that was their
17 tactic for us not to remove the locks but we had tools
18 to cut them. It's not that big of an issue for us.

19 CHAIRMAN BELL: You didn't expect them to
20 give you the keys, did you?

21 D.C. LeVALLEY: Well, no, but what A.C.
22 Dolunt pointed out to them, if the building catches on
23 fire, you might have a problem, because you're stuck to
24 the building, we're not. But either way, it ended
25 peacefully. And again, we support everybody's right to

1 protest, everybody has a right to express themselves
2 and their First Amendment rights. And I think we go
3 out of our way to accommodate groups to do that, but
4 that wasn't the right way to do it so they ended up in
5 jail for the night. And they may have wanted to go to
6 jail.

7 CHAIRMAN BELL: There's no right way to
8 demonstrate, but you exercised law and order, peace and
9 tranquility, from what I can see. What I gather you
10 responded appropriately and they made their point and
11 you made your point and people got arrested and civil
12 disobedience is America.

13 D.C. LeVALLEY: I agree.

14 So and then also Tuesday, you know, we had a
15 funeral here -- or not here in Detroit, but in Redford
16 Township for one of the Dallas Police Officers who grew
17 up in this area. So a lot of Detroit police officers
18 and officers in the region, I think there were over a
19 thousand police in attendance for that funeral, and the
20 Dallas Chief was here as. But that went well, and I
21 know the Chief presented a gift to the department, a
22 statue that they're taking back. That should be it for
23 now.

24 CHAIRMAN BELL: Any comments? Questions or
25 concerns in reference to the Deputy Chief's report?

1 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir. Through
2 the Chair. Yes, sir, Chief. First and foremost, I
3 want to commend the protesters or activists for their
4 nonviolent act of civil disobedience.

5 Also too I want to commend the Department and
6 particularly Commander Barren who I believe was on the
7 scene for the way the Department handled the actual
8 protest out there. So I think there were six arrests
9 or something like that.

10 D.C. LeVALLEY: Correct.

11 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: And there wasn't any
12 forced used, etcetera. So I just want to make sure
13 that Commander Barren gets that note that I really
14 appreciate the way it was handled and that there wasn't
15 any real incident between the Detroit Police and the
16 protesters or activists.

17 Also too, the issue of chaining themselves up
18 and having locks and not having a key and I guess
19 ultimately they were locked up. So thank you, sir.

20 D.C. LeVALLEY: I will definitely relay the
21 message to Commander Barren. He oversees most events
22 that we have, most protests that we have and always
23 does an excellent job. He's very patient, very forward
24 thinking about where we're placing certain equipment,
25 about what message is sent to have certain equipment

1 that we hope we don't have to use, but rather than
2 putting that stuff on the front lines, Commander
3 Barron's very conscientious about how he manages those
4 events, but I'll let him know. Thank you.

5 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I just might add, too
6 that recently a couple weeks ago there was a large
7 protest, about ten thousand activists, the protestors
8 and I believe there were only ten arrests in that
9 particular incident and, of course, the mayor had had
10 to step into the middle of that because at one point it
11 was about to become kind of disruptive so he stepped in
12 and quelled that. He was the mayor of the City of
13 Atlanta. So I guess one might say Detroit is, you
14 know, I mean wasn't ten thousand but the fact is we
15 didn't have any issues so I appreciate that. Thank
16 you, sir.

17 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Through the Chair.

18 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir.

19 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: I'd like to ask a
20 question. Why is the response time is going longer and
21 longer? I noticed that it's 16 minutes now. Before we
22 had it down to 11 minutes. And the reason I ask that
23 question is because this morning about 6:30 when I got
24 up I heard some noise when I looked out the window and
25 right across the street from me I see somebody taking

1 this man's roof off that was not at home. I made a
2 phone call. By the time the officers get there, roof
3 was gone. It took them longer than 16 minutes to take
4 the roof off.

5 D.C. LeVALLEY: Correct. So that roof.
6 Couple issues. That roof coming off is not a priority
7 one. Priority ones are assaultive crimes in progress
8 and including domestic robberies. All the part one
9 crimes fall into that category. So we have multiple
10 priority lists, priority one, two and three and
11 priority four, actually. The reason that the time has
12 again going up I don't know about 11 minutes, but our
13 quickest week for the last couple years has been about
14 14.3 minutes and those are during low volume weeks of
15 the year. So basically right now all of the increase
16 that we've seen in our priority one response time has
17 been in a cue time. So cue is the time when the call's
18 already been made, the dispatcher is trying to identify
19 an available unit to respond to that call.

20 So the volume that we have right now priority
21 one runs and other runs versus the number of people
22 that we have available on the street at any given time
23 to answer those runs causes that time to increase. So
24 we always see a cycle for the last several years of as
25 we go into the warmer weather we can see the crime

1 trend go up and then down as we get back into fall
2 time. So that's what has caused that to go from 14.3
3 minutes to 16.7.

4 The priority two and other runs that response
5 time for those is higher, so we're just talking about
6 the priority one runs in this time. And that is an
7 average of all of the 1,700 runs last week. So if we
8 look at them individually by run type that are in
9 priority ones, I'm sure you would see that, I don't
10 know what the right word is, maybe critical priority
11 one runs or shooting, carjacking that the response time
12 for those is much lower than some of the other priority
13 one runs. The priority time, so the response time is
14 higher but it causes the average to be 16.7.

15 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: How do I put this? Is
16 there to get time better by trying to bring more
17 officers on?

18 D.C. LeVALLEY: Absolutely. So we look at
19 the times. Right now we have a -- last week the intake
20 time is 1.6 minutes. So that's the average time that
21 it takes from the time a 911 operator answers the call
22 to the time that they've created the ticket, figured
23 out what the problem is, where the problem is at and
24 send it to dispatch. So that average takes 1.6
25 minutes.

1 Our travel time last week is 10.3. That --
2 there's a couple things that go into that. So that's
3 from the time the officer gets dispatched to the run to
4 the time they arrive on scene, their drive time. So if
5 we have more units on the street, there's a greater
6 likelihood that the unit that we're going to send is
7 closer to the run than having to dispatch somebody
8 that's farther away. So travel time could be increased
9 by that.

10 It could also be increased by supervisory
11 oversight. We made a big push in the last two years,
12 about two years ago for priority one response time to
13 drive that down. When we did that, one of the things
14 that we did was that stopped the clock where we sent
15 that message out to all the officers and the
16 supervisors. We equipped all the supervisors with the
17 ability to look at GPS on the cars to do audits to make
18 sure that when they're receiving priority one that
19 they're driving straight to the run and not make any
20 unnecessary stops. So that time we cut a couple
21 minutes off of that. Like I said, it's at 10.3 now.
22 Adding more units to the street, encouraging officers
23 to continue to go straight to the run without any
24 unnecessary stops or delays when it's a priority one
25 run, we could drive a little bit of time of that off

1 that, probably a minute or so.

2 And the biggest areas cue time which last
3 week was 3.8 minutes. So for every priority one run
4 that comes in when the dispatcher sees it, they have to
5 start pulling units to find out what they're on, who's
6 clearing up, who they can take and send to that
7 priority one run. Sometimes we pull a priority three
8 run away when a priority one pops up and send them to
9 the priority one. So that is the biggest area we're
10 adding officers when we get to full staffing that we
11 would see the biggest decrease in that cue time,
12 because once it shows up on the dispatcher's screen, if
13 we have more units out there, there's more people to
14 redirect to a priority one, greater likelihood they're
15 closer to the run if there's a lot of units spread out
16 throughout the city.

17 There's definitely opportunity for
18 improvement and a lot of it is connected to staffing
19 level.

20 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Ms. Brooks, we got to
21 get more people out here.

22 CHAIRMAN BELL: That's been age old for quite
23 some time personnel-wise. Thank you. Any other
24 questions? Concerns? I see Commissioner Willie
25 Burton, District 5, is joining us. Let the record

1 reflect that Commissioner Burton is not joining us. He
2 has to be excused due to personal circumstances. We're
3 going to move forward.

4 The next item of business before we get to
5 Mr. Hicks, Secretary of the Board, I'm going to ask
6 Chief Investigator Pam Davis-Drake to come to the mic
7 since we're on the subject matter talking about
8 recruiting. I want her to share our interaction with
9 the Academy class just last week on Tuesday, or this
10 work Tuesday morning at 9:00 and she is a significant
11 part of that effort to present ourself to the class.
12 So she has some really, you know, past experience such
13 and such. And so if you would share your interaction,
14 our interaction with the class, which we did also with
15 lieutenant, sergeant-lieutenants a week ago. Thank
16 you.

17 C.I. DRAKE: I think I already reported out
18 on the sergeant-lieutenant meeting.

19 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, you did.

20 C.I. DRAKE: We did have the opportunity you
21 and I, Commissioner Bell, to speak to the class
22 actually of 36, which is the largest class I think
23 we've ever spoken to, a newer class, only been there
24 two months, but they were very eager to get started and
25 very forthcoming with information. They were very

1 participative and very diverse. It was a wonderfully
2 diverse class both I think it was like six females, a
3 lot of different ethnicities there so it was very very
4 good to see that. Several were City of Detroit
5 residents so it was very good to see that.

6 Again, they were receptive. The information
7 that was presented they seemed to be very receptive.
8 They were very knowledgeable and they participated very
9 well. So very good class. I'll was Sergeant Duncan's
10 class, another wonderful class from the academy that we
11 had an opportunity to speak with. I do hope that they
12 all make it because it was a wonderful class. I'm sure
13 that maybe a few will fall out, but I'm rooting for the
14 entire team. It was a great class of 36 so and the
15 largest again that we've ever spoken to.

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: Any questions or concerns of
17 Chief Investigator Drake? I want to say that she not
18 only interacts, you know, but at the end there was a
19 little Q and A, a quiz and make sure they understand
20 the message, and I thought that was really, see if they
21 really was in tune to the issues and did an excellent
22 job. So that's what you're looking for in terms of
23 that type of class. And we were impressed with that
24 type of engagement. I just want to make sure that
25 we're, you know, engaging at the academy level they get

1 exposed to the Board of Police Commissioner and OCI
2 directly, you know. They won't get the hearsay, they
3 get it direct.

4 But we're still waiting on, Deputy Chief
5 LeValley, would you follow up? We requested a couple
6 weeks ago, maybe three weeks ago, the curriculum for
7 the Academy class. We still would like for the Board
8 to take an entire look at the curriculum in terms of
9 exactly what has been taught in the Academy because I
10 know Crawford was there years ago. It can't be the
11 same curriculum. So there's so much going on we should
12 have some working knowledge as to what's been shared in
13 the academy class, you know, so I just think that we
14 need to do a follow-up on that because he attended two
15 class -- I'm mean not just DPD but Atlanta PD and you
16 didn't have to go through a class in the Sheriff's
17 Department, right?

18 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir, we did.
19 But pardon me, Mr. Chair. You said I was there years
20 ago. I think you preceded me by a decade or two.

21 CHAIRMAN BELL: By a couple years. Me and
22 the Chair only a couple years.

23 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: More than a couple
24 years.

25 CHAIRMAN BELL: They have so much on their

1 plate it was a great interaction to see what's
2 presented on graduation day but you get an idea in
3 early on in terms make up of the class. We wish them
4 the best. Thank you.

5 C.I. DRAKE: Just to add to what you're
6 saying about knowing what the curriculum is, it
7 actually would help us because it would be if we
8 already know what they're exposed to when we give our
9 presentation we can piggyback off of all of the things
10 that you said so we would love to have that.

11 CHAIRMAN BELL: Good point.

12 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Through the Chair?

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes.

14 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: I'd like to thank you,
15 Pamela Drake, Chief Investigator, for doing such an
16 excellent job. She's always there for us, always there
17 to answer questions, call us, e-mail us. She's doing
18 an excellent job and I like to commend you for that.

19 C.I. DRAKE: Thank you, sir. I appreciate
20 it.

21 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: We do appreciate you.

22 C.I. DRAKE: Thank you.

23 CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioner Crawford?

24 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir. Through
25 the Chair. This is a different subject. I just want

1 to thank you and Captain Chambers, Internal Affairs and
2 Commander Simms. You received my packet on Officer
3 Barry. Thank you very much for the information that
4 was requested.

5 C.I. DRAKE: You're quite welcome.

6 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Just like I said, case
7 in point.

8 C.I. DRAKE: It's called doing my job, sir.

9 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair.

10 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes.

11 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I have one question for
12 Chief Investigator Drake. Do we have an update what's
13 going on with the DBA? I wasn't here last week so I
14 don't know if it was talked about at all.

15 C.I. DRAKE: The contract, as you know,
16 former Madam Chair, was signed last, oh, about a month
17 ago and it has been moved through the process. Right
18 now it is going through the different units or
19 departments within the City. It's got to go through
20 purchasing is the last one, but it has to go through a
21 number, I think four all together. Budget, finance.
22 It has to go through the law department, corporation
23 counsel and then the final is purchasing. I know it is
24 on that track. I just made a call earlier today. I
25 have not received a return call just yet from DBA to

1 find out where we are in the process. They were trying
2 to get it in by today's meeting or tomorrow's meeting,
3 the Board Meeting -- the City Council meeting, I'm
4 sorry. That is tomorrow. I doubt they're going to be
5 able to do that but there is a subsequent meeting.
6 It's going to be held on the 25th so they're trying to
7 push it. If it gets to purchasing on time and
8 purchasing is able to get it on the agenda for the
9 council meeting on the 25th, then it should be approved
10 if all goes well. So that's the latest update.

11 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

12 C.I. DRAKE: You're welcome.

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. Mr. Hicks.

14 SECRETARY HICKS: Commissioner, beyond which
15 I said at the top of the meeting, I have no additional
16 items to share with the Board.

17 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, sir. Appreciate
18 that.

19 Under the new business. Commissioner
20 Crawford. Yes, ma'am.

21 MS. BERNARD: Thank you, Commissioners, for
22 allowing me to announce some new business that I just
23 heard about, and it is something that I think all of
24 you will be delighted to hear. It is a Pamela
25 Davis-Drake's birthday today and I knew you would like

1 to know that. That's the new business.

2 CHAIRMAN BELL: We would sing happy birthday.
3 That's a copyright issue. I think they resolved that.
4 We can all say happy birthday. Many many blessings to
5 you and your family.

6 C.I. DRAKE: Thank you.

7 MR. HICKS: I'll give you the Barry White.
8 Happy birthday.

9 CHAIRMAN BELL: On the new business you have,
10 I assume, a copy of a promotion, DPD promotion and
11 appointment ceremony that's going to take place on July
12 the 29th. That would be on a Friday at Second Ebenezer
13 Church. Bishop Vann is the church where he's the
14 senior pastor and the notification should say 10:00.
15 You have this. All right. Okay.

16 Deputy Chief LeValley. Promotion and
17 appointment ceremony. I see promotion but
18 appointments.

19 D.C. LeVALLEY: Yes. The command officers
20 that were appointed, well, it's been a couple months
21 now. They never had a formal ceremony for the family.

22 CHAIRMAN BELL: Do they need one?

23 D.C. LeVALLEY: It's nice.

24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Absolutely do.

25 D.C. LeVALLEY: They absolutely do.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. So be it. Okay.

2 Any other new business that we might have as
3 we move forward? Old business. We had talked about it
4 for the last I guess two or three meetings, Slow
5 Rollers, and we have their chair or president of the
6 Slow Rollers here this afternoon.

7 MR. HALL: Yes, sir.

8 CHAIRMAN BELL: We would like to give you the
9 opportunity since it's been a huge issue. Where's your
10 bike?

11 MR. HALL: Outside locked up.

12 CHAIRMAN BELL: I hope it's changed.

13 MR. HALL: It's changed. It is chained.

14 CHAIRMAN BELL: If you would identify
15 yourself and we can take two or three minutes and then
16 from there we go to some questions or concerns that we
17 might have. Thank you.

18 MR. HALL: Yes, sir. My name is Jason Hall.
19 I'm the cofounder of Slow Roll Detroit. I'm also the
20 president of Detroit Bike City, Inc. Thank you
21 everybody for giving me the opportunity to speak
22 because it's important for me to take a couple seconds
23 to actually explain because I think it's a lot of
24 people think it's just a ride where people come
25 together and we just ride bikes, but it actually is a

1 lot bigger than that, okay? It's a weekly bike ride
2 where people come from all over the city, all over the
3 state, all over the world to come here and ride in
4 Detroit, the City of Detroit in its true beauty and
5 essence. They come together every week. We've never
6 had a violent issue. We've never had a problem. We've
7 evolved through time because it's grown through time as
8 we've all seen. And through that evolution, we are
9 partnered up with the Detroit Police Department. We do
10 have police bikes. We have motorcycles and cars so we
11 do work very hard to alleviate the stress.

12 I'd also like to mention in this time we keep
13 talking about protest. We bring together a lot of
14 people and no one has a problem ever. In this climate,
15 in this world, people, when they come together, they
16 might want to act out. That never happens here. You
17 have people who come here and they say I've had my life
18 changed. Now, I'm getting nervous because when I talk
19 about it, I get emotional because it's my child.

20 So yes, I'd love to address any issues, but
21 I'd also like to talk about, like I said, the good
22 things we do. We just collected 600 backpacks and
23 their campaign have going on partnered up with
24 Gleaners, partnered up with Focus Hope and we bring a
25 lot of great energy to the City, not only great energy

1 but we can also focus those people to spending dollars
2 in the city at our restaurants and actually moving to
3 the City.

4 CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioners?

5 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir, through the
6 Chair. And yes, sir. And thank you for coming for us.
7 The ride is on Mondays.

8 MR. HALL: Correct.

9 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: The time you stated.

10 MR. HALL: Monday nights at 7:30.

11 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: 7:30 to what time?

12 MR. HALL: Roughly 9:00. We usually meet at
13 a place, we move it around the city because we, once
14 again, want to slow it off and work with Rosedale Park,
15 Chandler Park. We're working with a lot of different
16 places so we try to move it around, but we meet around
17 5:30. We keep every everybody contained in that area.
18 We take off on the road at 7:30 and we try to end
19 roughly 9, 9:30.

20 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I also noticed it has
21 really expanded over the last couple years from
22 hundreds to thousands.

23 MR. HALL: At times it can, it can hit
24 numbers of that. We work very hard to get good numbers
25 but, you know, it's a bike ride that's free for

1 everybody so people tend to show up and that's what we
2 want them to do. But yeah, that's part of, like I
3 said, our evolution, we're never complacent in that
4 once numbers started to grow, that's when we started to
5 grow as we speak. Like I said, our partnership with
6 the Detroit Police Department, we added more police as
7 we need and as we can. I'm sure Sergeant Stinson can
8 help you out and answer any questions you have on that.

9 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: And also a part of
10 this evolution now, police officers are employed as
11 part of the secondary employment.

12 MR. HALL: Correct.

13 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: How many officers do
14 you have that are employed by secondary employment by
15 Slow Roll?

16 MR. HALL: I can address that, sir.

17 SERGEANT STINSON: If you don't mind, I can
18 address that. Good afternoon, Board. Sergeant Jenae
19 Stinson, Detroit Police downtown services. We've had a
20 great collaboration with Slow Roll and what I've seen
21 start out as a community involvement, ambassadorship,
22 we go out and also engage the community with Slow Roll.
23 It is a secondary employment, but they do reimburse for
24 services.

25 The number of officers depends on the length

1 of the route. It changes from week to week. Once Mr.
2 Hall submits the route to us, we actually go out and
3 ride the route, see what issues we may have on the
4 route, if it's going to impact any freeway ramps and
5 that type of thing. We either change the route or make
6 some provisions as a turn here or turn there based on
7 some issues that we may encounter.

8 But as you stated, it's been a great diverse
9 group that come together. I've actually worked with
10 Mr. Hall when they were featured on HBO specials and
11 Apple commercials, so their brand has evolved. It has
12 morphed into something that we know we have to address.
13 But as we state to the officers in the beginning of the
14 rides, we engage the community as well so they know
15 that the services aren't pulled from their
16 neighborhood. So that's one of the things that we do
17 with them. And as you stated with recruiting, maybe we
18 can get recruiting to come out to our next Slow Roll
19 locations and pass out some interest cards.

20 So again, it's a great, diverse group and we
21 work with them every week to ensure that the impact is
22 minimum on the community that they're actually riding
23 in. Any other questions?

24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I have a question. I
25 know in past there were questions from the

1 Commissioners regarding emergency response like EMS,
2 things like that through the neighborhoods. Has that
3 issue been addressed?

4 SERGEANT STINSON: Yes, ma'am. It's Slow
5 Roll. So if we encounter, say, a bus, we can stop the
6 riders, allow the bus to continue on, or if there's
7 emergency vehicles who need to get through, we stop the
8 riders and allow emergency access or any other vehicles
9 that may need to cross the route.

10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Are residents able to
11 get across a street, anything like that? Cars?

12 SERGEANT STINSON: Yes, ma'am.

13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: It doesn't impede
14 traffic?

15 SERGEANT STINSON: No, ma'am.

16 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Mr. Chairman. I think
17 it's a wonderful thing for the Slow Rollers. It gives
18 an opportunity for other people to see Detroit as it
19 really is. I don't think it's the Slow Rollers. There
20 are zillions of bicycle clubs going on there. My
21 church just started one a month ago, so there are all
22 kinds of bicycle clubs going on and I think those are
23 the ones that are causing the problems with the traffic
24 because they don't have all the information that you're
25 giving out. So I don't know what could be done about

1 that because personally you should be able to start
2 your own bicycle club. But I don't think it's the Slow
3 Rollers, after being out and being on the River Walk,
4 there might be 15, 20 bikes on the River Walk that you
5 can't walk.

6 SERGEANT STINSON: I agree. And public
7 safety is paramount for us. You know, we do want to
8 ensure that because it has morphed into 100 bikes in
9 the beginning to maybe 600, 7000, depending on the
10 weather, depending on the route. We want to ensure
11 that everyone is safe, you know, the bike, because
12 they're going to show up. We even tried to put a cap
13 on the number of participants, but then they'll call
14 their friends and they just join up anyway. So there's
15 no way we can actually control it. We can only react
16 to whatever we have come and prepare for the numbers.

17 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes.

18 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the chair. I
19 think Slow Roll is great. I think it's great for the
20 city. It's larger than any bike club. In complaints
21 from the citizens was oftentimes -- well, sometimes
22 we've had citizens come before us and their complaint
23 was one, the emergency issue of getting in and out.
24 And also too, just being stopped in an intersection and
25 trying to get home because to them, Slow Roll -- and

1 not that they were so much opposed to Slow Roll, but
2 Slow Roll, they probably support it or some of them do
3 support it, but the issues is for them sitting there
4 for 20 minutes or so and 20 minutes to them can perhaps
5 seem like an hour we know perhaps how sometimes it is.
6 To them it was No Roll. Slow Roll is No Roll because
7 they have to sit there.

8 I do understand it. I mean years ago I used
9 to work different events, particularly the Marathon and
10 stuff like that and even the fireworks. I always tell
11 the story about fireworks with people, officers used
12 to send people around the corner, they live here on the
13 condo and they kept sending them around the corner and
14 try to move traffic and, you know, the particular
15 traffic pattern after some event. So that was my main
16 concern was just that people able to get in and out
17 their homes or their community and particularly the
18 emergency vehicles if there's some sort of emergency.

19 SERGEANT STINSON: Yes, sir. We will address
20 that.

21 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: We haven't had that
22 many complaints. Oftentimes they come in may want to
23 address us about it, but it hasn't been a lot of
24 complaints considering the magnitude of Slow Roll. I
25 mean it's been going from being city to regional, more

1 or less, to state to national and probably global
2 because I following stuff on the Internet.

3 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, sergeant. Thank
4 you, Mr. Hall. And we really appreciate the update and
5 department involvement. I see Captain Conway Petty
6 involved in his leadership downtown. I think
7 everything is coming together for the best interest of
8 the citizens of the City of Detroit, Metropolitan and
9 people feel safe, and that's a good think because there
10 was a time folks did not went to come in unless it's
11 staged event. This is a thing where people just
12 collectively ride. It's like any hiccup, the Free
13 Press Marathon, people complain about some of those
14 issues, but that come with the territory, you know,
15 when you're staging events like that and like other
16 cities. So I'm just so happy that you took time to
17 come out and share this type of dialog and alleviate
18 some of the concerns. Ride tricycles, you know, they
19 need to get with the Slow Rollers. And thank you
20 again. I appreciate it.

21 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I just have one last
22 question. Slow Roll is what I call it seasonal, from
23 April to what?

24 MR. HALL: October.

25 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: October? Okay.

1 Thank you very much.

2 CHAIRMAN BELL: Continue to ride safely.

3 CHAIRMAN BELL: Any other old business?

4 COMMISSIONER CART: I have.

5 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, ma'am.

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: A couple weeks ago I
7 inquired about Homeland Security coming to present and
8 Mr. Kincaid did call me and Attorney Bernard contacted
9 him and, yeah. He called me and he is just waiting for
10 a date to be on the agenda to present their
11 presentation to the Board. So whenever, Mr. Chair,
12 you'd like to put him on agenda to the presentation.

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: I assume we can do it in a
14 community meeting. Would that be more appropriate?

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: That's fine.

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: We don't have to wait that
17 long. It's on August 11 I think the next community
18 meeting. You want to do it at that time or prior to?

19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No. Community meeting
20 is fine.

21 SECRETARY HICKS: Mr. Chair, we will chat to
22 make sure all the individuals are available on that
23 community meet.

24 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, ma'am.

25 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, sir.

1 CHAIRMAN BELL: Announcements. The next
2 meeting is going to be held on July the 28th here at
3 3:00 in Public Safety Headquarters. That's next week.
4 The month is pulling right along. The next community
5 meeting is going to be August 11th at 6:30 p.m., 5th
6 precinct. That's in the area of Jefferson and Chalmers
7 for your landmark, and that's Joy Missionary Baptist
8 Church, 703 Newport. That's in the area of Jefferson
9 and Chalmers on the east side. It's a small church,
10 but they have an engaging activities in the community.
11 They feed the hungry once or twice a week, and it's
12 also to tie in our Jefferson-Chalmers lower east side
13 area because Mr. Brown indicated we haven't been in
14 that particular area in quite some time so I was there
15 for some grass cutting in that area on Newport and
16 talked to the pastor and asked him was he willing to
17 host and we got a confirmation on that. So hopefully
18 we can promote that with that whole Jefferson-Chalmers
19 because a long time they've felt left out when they
20 closed the 5th precinct that was St. James and they had
21 to go all the way up to Mack and Gratiot -- not Mack
22 and Gratiot. I'm dating myself, Mr. Crawford. Gratiot
23 and Gunston. And now they have their own precinct
24 there at Connors and Mack, and we were there for
25 opening ceremonies so they are enthused about that

1 whole area being developed so that's the location of
2 the next one. Share that with you west-siders. We
3 want you to come out next month. Mr. Nelson, can you
4 find Jefferson and Chalmers?

5 COMMISSIONER NELSON: Yes, sir.

6 CHAIRMAN BELL: If you can find it, we should
7 be okay. We'll make sure Mr. Mallett gets the map to
8 the location.

9 Oral communication from the audience and I
10 ask that you come to the mic. Please give your name
11 and be respectful because we respect you in terms of
12 opportunity to speak. Any others would like to come on
13 the first row. If you can't stand, would you come to
14 the first row. We can get an idea of how many folks
15 we're going to have in terms of speaking. This is your
16 opportunity. Unlike the council, you don't need a
17 quorum. They do have a open format for the community
18 meetings, the council, which I think they got one
19 scheduled for the month before they adjourn for the
20 summer. We don't have that pleasure adjourning for the
21 summer. We engage all year long right during the
22 summer. Okay. Yes, ma'am. Madam secretary.

23 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon. My name is
24 Fredia M. Butler and I am a community activist and
25 through the Chair I would like to thank Commissioner

1 Carter for the fliers that she had printed out for me
2 as she promised that she was going to do. I had been
3 told that where I could go them done for a certain
4 price, but when you're doing so much in the community,
5 it can be quite expensive with one person coming up
6 with the funds because we are having a voters, we're
7 registering people to vote in our community. It is a
8 big big job, very very hard job, but we have volunteers
9 who are working. We are working together. We are
10 calling ourselves community activities and I purchased
11 buttons and stickers and the people really want to get
12 the stickers, but I'm going to save the buttons until
13 closer to the election in November so that we can get
14 as many people out to vote. So as we tell people,
15 you've got to be engaged and stop complaining and get
16 engaged in doing what we need to do and our vote is
17 what will get things done. Thank you.

18 CHAIRMAN BELL: Than you. Yes, ma'am.

19 MS. HARDING: Good afternoon. I'm Barbara
20 Harding, Northwest Detroit out of Grandriver-Greenfield
21 area.

22 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, ma'am.

23 MS. HARDING: And we got some from the
24 community, we have some appreciation certificates for
25 the three assistant chief of police. I understand they

1 were, you know, they kind of tied up, but I talked to
2 Officer White and he told well bring them and we'll see
3 that, you know, they get them. So they're right here
4 and I brought them and this is from the community,
5 okay?

6 I've been around for many years. I
7 volunteered with many police station up there on
8 Grandriver and Greenfield, okay? I also volunteered
9 there at the 6th precinct for on and off, you see. And
10 I work out of community, been out there for a long
11 time. And she, the Mrs., I can't, I can't see your
12 name over there on the end there. You were speaking
13 about you needed the community.

14 CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioner Brooks?

15 MS. HARDING: The community to help, you
16 know, get involved. That's what I understood you to
17 say, right?

18 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: That's correct.

19 MS. HARDING: Well, I need to get your card
20 and talk to you. And I'm going to leave these here.
21 That's for the people. The community.

22 CHAIRMAN BELL: Well, ma'am, you make sure
23 why do any formal process recognizing and appreciating
24 for assistant chief or deputy chief, who we want to
25 recognize. Could we coordinate that in terms of with

1 the good lieutenant and deputy chief whereas we don't
2 want you to come down and not here. Maybe we can make
3 some type of arrangement. You can present it. We can
4 take some photos, shake their hand.

5 MS. HARDING: Okay.

6 CHAIRMAN BELL: Could we do that?

7 MS. HARDING: Sure, you can.

8 CHAIRMAN BELL: You take and hold on to them.
9 You don't have to travel back with them, but don't give
10 them to them. Just hold on to them and then we'll try
11 to do some scheduling, and we apologize. I guess there
12 was couple calls by Coach Mohammed, even tried calling,
13 by I really don't answer that call often. I explained
14 to them you have to call me on my cell phone.

15 MS. HARDING: You understand, we collaborate
16 with other community councils.

17 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, ma'am.

18 MS. HARDING: Five or six of them over on the
19 Northwest Detroit. We got strength in numbers, we all
20 know that. All right then. Thank you so much.

21 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. Work with that
22 coordinating that. Lieutenant got you. Thank you,
23 ma'am. Really appreciate it.

24 MS. HARDING: Sure.

25 CHAIRMAN BELL: Other oral communication from

1 the audience?

2 I'd like to just, Ms. Pannell.

3 MS. PANSELL: Yes.

4 CHAIRMAN BELL: I stated on the record last
5 week at Thursday's community meeting that you did an
6 outstanding, I should say the Detroit Assistant Police
7 Academy Association on your annual picnic out to Belle
8 Isle. You had great food, great fellowship. They even
9 had a jazz band.

10 MS. PANSELL: That was nice. Matter of fact,
11 that was Barb Harding's son.

12 CHAIRMAN BELL: Oh, okay. If you want to
13 elaborate. I know you flew out of town the next day.

14 MS. PANSELL: The lady that just left, Barb
15 Harding, that's her son.

16 My name is Sharon Pannell, and that was Barb
17 Harding's son that did the jazz concert and we had
18 plenty of food and plenty of everything. I worked
19 hard.

20 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, no doubt. And we really
21 appreciate you in terms of all the communication you
22 sent out. We just want to thank you and that was
23 really nice, you know, to invite this police personnel
24 citywide, you know, etcetera that was there, and I had
25 an opportunity to drop in just at the mealtime.

1 MS. PANNELL: Well, we like for the police to
2 know who we are because we volunteer a lot with police.
3 And matter of fact, on the 28th, we're going to help
4 out with that youth program, the Summer Jam from 3 to 8
5 next Thursday.

6 CHAIRMAN BELL: And you hold your meetings on
7 what date and time?

8 MS. PANNELL: Every second Wednesday of the
9 month starting in September. We don't have a meeting
10 in July and August because we have a picnic. In August
11 we have break, and then we start back up September.
12 And also going to start a new officers Detroit Police
13 citizens class in September if anybody's interested. I
14 have applications. Thank you.

15 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. I assume there's
16 no other audience participation at this time. I'd like
17 to just acknowledge that we received a memo dated for
18 this meeting here concerning Chief Craig is proud to
19 announce a partnership with Detroit Police Department
20 and Wayne State University assisting him in completing
21 a Master of Science in Criminal Justice Degree at Wayne
22 State University. The endeavor is bound to be
23 beneficial to the Detroit Police Department, Wayne
24 State and the residents of the City of Detroit and we
25 have I guess I'll share this with the board In terms of

1 how this process works and we might have some questions
2 if we really look at it, but I think on the surface
3 it's great in terms of that type endeavor, but I want
4 to make sure that the Board gets the memo and we can
5 have some comments later on in reference to this
6 program.

7 Any other business coming before this
8 committee of the whole? If not.

9 SECRETARY HICKS: Mr. Chair?

10 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes.

11 SECRETARY HICKS: As a matter of formality,
12 all of the items that were scheduled for review and
13 approval will be moved over in the next agenda.

14 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir. No action taken.
15 We stand what -- oh. I want to thank all of you for
16 coming out on this very very nice day the weather
17 outside, I understand why you're here because we have
18 air conditioning. But be safe. And I'd like to close
19 on a note of privilege that we all are concerned. We
20 lost three more officers in Louisiana and we just
21 buried five officers, one of them like I state just the
22 other day in Michigan. Could we just have a moment of
23 silence for all involved parties, law enforcement and
24 all victims of all the issue that we've been dealing
25 with. I would hope that we meditate on our hearts that

1 we find some common ground that this cycle would end
2 and we all come together as concerned citizens and
3 basically it's been difficult for all law enforcement
4 family, but also difficult for those engaging in terms
5 of peacekeeping and victims, etcetera we can debate
6 right and wrong, but we'd just like to have a moment of
7 silence.

8 (Moment of Silence)

9 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you and have a great
10 day and great weekend.

11 (The proceeding was adjourned at 3:55 p.m.)
