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1 Detroit, Michigan 2 Thursday, March 22, 2018 3 2:57 p.m. 4 5 COMMISSIONER BELL: As you well know, I am Police Commissioner Willie Bell. I represent 6 District 4. I want to thank you for attending 7 8 the meeting today. Commissioner Lisa Carter, 9 Eva Dawaelsche and Shirley Burch are unable to join us today. I will be acting as your Chair 10 for today's meeting. For people viewing this 11 meeting on your government cable channel, thank 12 13 you for viewing. I'm going to get through this 14 script here. The Board of Police Commissioners 15 16 meet every week except for Thanksgiving and 17 Christmas holiday period. We meet at Police 18 Headquarters in our regular session three weeks in a month on Thursday at 3 p.m. We also 19 20 meet in a community area the second Thursday of the month at 6:30 p.m. 21 The Board of Police Commissioners 22 provides civilian oversight for the work of the 23 24 Detroit Police Department. As a Board we receive 25 and investigate non-criminal citizen complaints,



1 monitor operation of the department and working with the Mayor and the Chief of Police to make or 2 3 modify police policy. The objective is the same 4 as the City of Detroit; to provide for the best 5 use of your tax dollars to improve on the quality of life within our city -- I would say within the 6 metropolitan Detroit. 7 8 As a Board we bring a unique perspective 9 to policing, the eye and viewpoint of civilians. The principle of civilian oversight is as old as 10

and as important as all of the founding principles in our democracy. Separation of 12

11

13 powers within government allows for 14 accountability, transparency, right to appeal and citizen control. These principles are supported 15 16 nationally as well as locally.

17 We're going to ask that our invited Pastor Matthew Nicholas on Jefferson Avenue 18 19 Missionary Church to provide invocation. Please 20 approach the mic. Thank you, sir.

21 (Whereupon Pastor Nicholas 22 proceeded with the invocation.) Thank you, Pastor Nicholas. 23 THE COURT: 24 I'm going to ask the Commissioners to introduce 25 themselves starting to my right, please.

11	COMMISSIONER BELL: Motion carries. I'm
12	going to ask our Board secretary, Mr. Hicks, to
13	introduce the Board staff.
14	MR. HICKS: Thank you, Mr. Chair. To my
15	immediate right of course is Robert Brown. And I
16	do want to indicate that taping today's meeting
17	is the work is done by Sergeant Quinn, Media
18	Services doing the audio visual work and Shay
19	Coleman is the court reporter for the day.
20	We direct your attention to the first
21	row. I would also want to indicate that Ms.
22	Johnson from the fiscal area is seated here.
23	Next to her is Mr. Wyrick who is attorney to the
24	Board. Ms. Blossom who is the Media Outreach
25	Coordinator, Ms. White who is the policy manager

1 for the Board. And then what we typically do --2 just before we do that I see on the other side of 3 the room is of course the acting HR Director 4 Bridgette Lamar. Then we would go to the Chief 5 Investigator, Dr. McAllister to introduce herself as well as the balance of the people here from 6 our staff. 7 8 MS. MCALLISTER: Good afternoon, 9 Commissioners, Chief Craig, DPD leadership and I'm Polly McAllister, Chief 10 citizens.

11 Investigator. In attendance with me today is Supervisor Investigator Nelson, Supervisor 12 13 Investigator Cromwell, Senior Investigator Moses, Senior Investigator Sloan, Investigator Hunter, 14 Investigator Murphy, Investigator Hiller, 15 Investigator Healey, Investigator Nichols, 16 17 Investigator Stewart, Investigator Calloway and 18 Investigator James. Thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Is that it,

20 Mr. Hicks?

21 MR. HICKS: Yes.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: I'm going to ask our 23 HR Director, Ms. Lamar to come forward and take a 24 front row seat. Thank you. Now you're properly 25 seated. The man who needs no introduction, Chief



1 Craig to my left. 2 CHIEF CRAIG: Yes, Mr. Chair. Good afternoon, Board. Attending with me today 3 4 starting first with Assistant Chief Williams and if we could go around. 5 (Whereupon several sworn officers 6 introduced themselves.) 7 8 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Chief 9 Craig and thank you DPD and thank the Board staff and any other visitors and friends attending this 10 11 afternoon's meeting. Do we have any elected official or representatives of elected officials 12 13 or former appointees or anyone of that, would you 14 please stand. MR. RAZZO: Former District 6 Manager 15 16 Rico Razzo (ph). 17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Good to see you this 18 afternoon. I'll just continue on. Lamar, I think we need to know and see you because there's 19 20 always a lot of issues dealing with HR and we 21 want the public to know -- we want everybody to 22 know where you're sitting in that seat in that capacity because you're a very important part of 23 24 the team and I thank you for allowing me to make 25 that minor adjustment.

1 At the top of our meeting we always 2 indicate on behalf of the Board our concern and support for fallen and injured officers and their 3 4 families. I would ask the Chief during his remarks to provide us with any additional 5 information related to injured and fallen 6 officers. As you well know, we keep them in our 7 prayers all the time. I think it's very 8 9 important as I mentioned this afternoon at another forum I think we need to lift up our 10 officers each and every day out there 24/7 and we 11 12 prayed for them in that setting not too far from here in Cass Corridor. 13

14 I would also ask the Chief advisor to 15 report on several recent events and report on 16 investigation involving Commander Leach; two, a 17 report on the circumstances resulting in a car 18 wash into Cody High School; a report of what appears to be an increase in number of threats on 19 20 closing -- internet closing schools, and the Chief just held a press conference so we 21 22 attended, myself and Commissioner Brown and others, just a couple minutes ago; report on any 23 24 other disciplinary action taken by the Chief's 25 office.

1 Today we have a presentation from the 2 Department on the Chief of Police Improvement Plan in 2012 Detroit City Charter Section 7806-7 3 4 raised under the duties of Chief of Police, present annually the Police Department Operation 5 Improvement Plan. The plan should be filed with 6 the City Clerk, distributed to the Mayor and the 7 8 City Council and the public record. 9 On the old business last week we took an

action to grant a disqualification appeal to 10 Nathaniel Sanders (ph) pending inquiry of MCOLES 11 policy and practice. Actions were predicated on 12 receiving an answer from MCOLES to determine the 13 14 likelihood that a recruit with an expunged juvenile record on the successful completion of 15 16 the training at the Police Academy certified as 17 this officer. Several inquiries have been made 18 and we have our attorney to the Board on this subject under old business. 19

Toward the end of the meeting we have oral communications from the audience, so if you would like to speak to the Board please make sure you print your name on a speaker card. Cards are located in the back on the table obtained by Mr. Robert Brown to my right. He needs your card

3 I also want to lift up two retired 4 officers that are deceased. One is Sergeant 5 Kenneth Ray who was outstanding in so many areas especially in training; and another one, Officer 6 Harold Tiller who was from the 7th Precinct and 7 8 he used to do the National Anthem; great voice, 9 great person. I spoke to the pastor at Tabernacle not too long ago about his health and 10 he passed this week. But Eric Tiller was one of 11 12 those legendary people I had the opportunity to work with as a rookie officer. So he made his 13 14 transition. There will be other notification of The next item of business would be 15 arrangements. 16 Chief Craiq.

17 CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you, Mr. Chair. As 18 always, I will start with crime. As of today 19 we're sitting on a 14 percent reduction in 20 homicide, which translates into eight fewer 21 homicides as compared to this time last year. As 22 it relates to non-fatal shootings, 23 percent reduction translating into 38 fewer non-fatal 23 24 shootings; and robberies, 23 percent reduction, 25 130 fewer robberies and carjackings down 6



1 percent.

2 When you look at the overall violent crime picture we're down 5 percent. Property 3 4 crime overall we're down 17 percent. We're at overall part one crime reduction of 14 percent. 5 So as we approach the end of the first quarter 6 I'm optimistic. I think there are a couple 7 8 strategies that continue to serve us well. We 9 had our recent cease fire call in last night two nights ago. We continue with that effort. We're 10 11 going to continue to move that strategy city wide 12 because clearly we are seeing a reduction in overall violence. As it relates to -- that's all 13 14 I have on crime.

So I want to talk a little bit about 15 16 today's news conference. As you are now aware, 17 since the Parkland shooting incident we have 18 received in excess of 40 threats against Detroit Public Schools and that also includes charter 19 20 schools. In the last 24 hours we have received 23 threats against Detroit Public Schools which 21 22 also includes charter schools. It's gotten out of hand and we thought even based on this recent 23 24 surge that the DPD as well as our other law 25 enforcement partners, we need to unify, and this

1 needs to stop and send a message to these kids. 2 Our response has been extremely thorough. We have four arrests made in these 3 4 matters. These young people who are making these threats are teenagers. The forth one is an adult 5 17 years old. I think many of them believe they 6 can conceal their identity. They cannot. 7 We have the skill, the technology to override that 8 9 and so we've been very successful in doing that now that we have a commitment from our other 10 11 partners to work with us I am hoping today's news 12 conference sent the right message. 13 One thing that was trouble that I 14 learned today, some of the parents, and I'll say this very loosely, there have been instances 15 16 where children are bringing weapons into the 17 school for protection because of these threats. 18 When the parent is notified in some instances the 19 parents are not really troubled, surprised at 20 least, that's what was reported to me which tends 21 to suggest that it's encouraged. Now, again, 22 that's just based on the reaction. I address that also to tell the parents to stop and the 23 24 students that are bringing weapons not to. 25 And so I hope that these threats stop.

1 It's a significant strain on this department. We 2 respond to all threats in the City of Detroit, and when we identify who's responsible we go to 3 4 their residence. We make arrests if necessary. But as it relates to a school situation, if that 5 school is open, we have to be there to provide 6 safety and security. So you can imagine when 7 we're doing this that's one less car you have on 8 9 the street to handle emergency calls for service. So this has got to stop. Parents have got to 10 monitor what their children are doing in social 11 12 media.

13 And so again, I am hopeful that the next 14 24 hours there will be no threats. So we're making examples but just too many. Right now I'm 15 16 going to defer to Assistant Chief White. As you 17 may know, we sent a team to California and Vegas 18 to participate in what's called Baker to Vegas; a 19 great comradery, moral booster. We try to 20 promote a lot with fitness and I'm very proud of the effort of our team that went and so AC White 21 22 was in attendance. He did not run but he can 23 run. He was a back-up runner.

ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: That's correct. I was prepared to run but thank goodness I didn't



1 have to. Good afternoon, Board. James White for 2 the record. As Chief indicated, we sent a team to Las Vegas to participate in the Baker to Vegas 3 4 As you know, we've been really engaged in run. 5 DPD Fit the past few years. We're very proud to 6 be representing the Department. It was over 270 police agencies from around the country and we 7 8 just really performed well; really a proud moment 9 for me personally as a member of the police department. 10

We learned a lot and we came in 29th in 11 12 our division out of 150, which is a phenomenal 13 showing for your first time. What we're most 14 proud of is we had no violations or demerits so to speak for doing anything wrong with the run, 15 16 which is very rare for a new team. So they were 17 making jokes, you guys from Detroit must have 18 some tremendous discipline practices there 19 because we've never seen a team not get an 20 infraction first year out.

It was a lot of fun, good comradery, good moral booster. Officers were very excited and we're going to do a formal presentation in a couple weeks after we pull everything together. We want the Board to know that we're happy to



1 place 29th but we plan to win this thing next 2 year but we will be going up against some very 3 tough competition with LA. They won three 4 divisions with LAPD. Also very proud that our 5 winner-CHIEF CRAIG: I'm not sure Commissioner 6 Willie Bell knows what LAPD stands for. 7 8 ASSISTANT CHIEF: I think he might. We 9 out performed -- our women really out performed a lot of the female teams that were there and they 10 11 stabilized our group. And for those that don't 12 know, this is a run across the desert that's all night. It starts at 9 a.m. and it concludes 9 13 14 a.m. the next day. It's over 120 miles and each 15 group runs and there's a support team which is 16 part of the team that I was on, which we were up 17 all night monitoring each runner. Like I said, 18 we're looking forward to next year. We're going 19 to prepare to win the thing next year. Thank 20 you. CHIEF CRAIG: As relates to the accident 21 22 you referenced Cody High I would ask Assistant Chief Williams. 23 24 ASSISTANT CHIEF WILLIAMS: Through the

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Chair. On or about -- I'm sorry. On Tuesday at

about 5 a.m., 10 after 5 a.m. we had a scout car 1 receive a call that there was a felonious assault 2 that took place; somebody had been stabbed. 3 As 4 the scout was en route they had received the description of the vehicle. It was a blue Neon 5 that was associated with the assault. As the 6 scout came up to the location he saw the blue 7 They pulled behind it and the vehicle 8 Neon. 9 initially was still. Then it took off. The scout activated their lights and started to 10 They called out. They had a pursuit. 11 follow.

12 The pursuit went on for several blocks. At one point the victim was in the vehicle and 13 14 you had the suspect just climb on top of her and he started driving and at that point that's when 15 16 the vehicle started to go excessive speeds. 17 As the vehicle went excessive speeds there was a 18 supervisor monitoring and it was very -- the scouts that were involved in this were very 19 20 disciplined. The supervisor said terminate. The scouts immediately pulled to the side and 21 22 stopped.

And the vehicle was probably about a block and a half ahead of them and we got to the turn for Cody the vehicle was going so fast it



couldn't turn. It just jumped the curb, went right through three doors and the suspect, he climbed out, a short foot chase. He was placed in custody and the scouts were able to render aide to the female. It was a very good discipline by our police officers and a very good arrest.

COMMISSIONER MALLET: Well done.

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9 CHIEF CRAIG: And I also want to address some of our injured officers. Certainly we 10 11 continue to ask for thoughts and prayers as relate to Officer Wallace Johnson who is still in 12 13 a long-term care facility. Some of our other 14 officers, Anthony Brown, who was hit by a vehicle, he's recuperating at home. 15 James 16 Kisselberg who sustained a gunshot wound, still 17 at home. Officer Robert Kovac involved in a 18 motor vehicle accident is at home. Eric Smith, 19 officer sustaining a gunshot wound; he is at 20 home. Anthony Winquest (ph), gunshot wound 21 recuperating at home. And recent injury Sergeant 22 Eric Busey (ph) had a broken ankle. He is also recuperating at home. And, lastly, I just want 23 24 to first thank Commissioner Conrad Mallet and I'm 25 not going to say Cedar Sinai.



1	COMMISSIONER MALLET: Sinai-Grace.
2	ASSISTANT CHIEF WILLIAMS: Sinai-Grace
3	for the treatment and how they've treated
4	Lieutenant Shawn Wesley the last several weeks.
5	Certainly he's in grave condition and but really
6	thankful. I know that the family was very
7	thankful. And so we ask that you pray for his
8	family in the coming days. And that's again
9	Lieutenant Shawn Wesley.
10	The graduation tomorrow 2018-C. That's
11	going to be at Greater Grace at 10:30. And then
12	lastly, we have the grand opening of the Police
13	Athletic League at the corner ballpark where the
14	old Tiger Stadium stood. That will happen this
15	Saturday again at 9:30. There will be a parade
16	at Michigan and Trumbell and so we invite all of
17	you to come out for that celebration.
18	So, with that, Mr. Chair, open up for
19	any questions you or the Board may have.
20	COMMISSIONER BELL: Before the Board
21	could you address the Commander's League
22	situation, please.
23	CHIEF CRAIG: So that investigation is
24	continuing as I report bifurcating investigation
25	one criminal and one internal. Both the criminal

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1 being conducted by our homicide special section 2 which is a combined unit of MSP, FBI part-time and DPD detectives which is customary. 3 4 When I got the call about this incident and when I learned the injury to the person I directed 5 that this matter be handled or investigated by 6 our homicide special section. It was initially 7 being investigated by the 3rd Precinct. They did 8 9 not know it was involving a member of the department until they viewed a video which 10 depicted the Commander. So it was at that time 11 12 they notified their chain of command and then I directed that not only that the homicide team 13 14 would investigate but also Internal Affairs because of allegations of misconduct. 15 So the internal side of the 16 17 investigation is addressing what I consider the 18 lowest part of the misconduct is the fact that the Commander was working in unauthorized outside 19 20 employment but then the second areas that clearly when the videos viewed you can see force was 21 22 I'm not at a place right now to tell you used. whether force was proper or improper; just that 23 24 force was used. That determination will be made

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as we continue with the criminal investigation.

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1 I will say that all members of the department as 2 you know are required to report force. There was no report of force. In fact, there was some 3 4 concern that came out in early media reports that 5 Detroit Police Department did not respond to this In fact we did respond. What didn't 6 incident. happen is that there was no indication that force 7 8 was used as relates to this individual. So 9 that's the most serious. There's some other issues that I'm not at liberty to talk about 10 publically right now as relates to the internal 11 12 probe but we are moving forward at a pretty good 13 There was another department member that pace. 14 was part of this, I guess you could call it, security detail who was also working unauthorized 15 16 so he's being investigated. 17 The other security members were private 18 citizens that were working. So we believe that 19

we should have this investigation wrapped up within the next couple of weeks. We have interviewed a number of witnesses. In fact, during one news report one of the news reporters was getting real time texts that he was there, was in the bar, he saw what happened but was not really interested in talking with us because he

had made some efforts to contact us early on and he didn't get the kind of response that he should have gotten. So I urged him to come forward. He did do that.

5 We did interview him and so that worked 6 out very well. We're working very closely with 7 the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office on this 8 matter. They were brought in from the beginning. 9 I did have a conversation personally with Kim 10 Worthy and so again, we're optimistic in the next 11 couple of weeks.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Chief. 13 Commissioners, questions or concerns for the 14 Chief?

15 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I have a question. 16 My question goes back to guns in schools. 17 There's a metal detector that if we go into the 18 schools we have to open up our pocket books and 19 everything. How do the young kids get their guns 20 in school? Do they go through the metal 21 detector?

22 CHIEF CRAIG: The weapons I wasn't 23 specific. The report that I got were different 24 types of weapons like a taser. One child brought 25 a taser. Another one brought brass knuckles,

1 knives. And, yes, metal detectors would pick 2 those items up. I'm not sure if it was the metal detector but once it was revealed to have weapons 3 4 they notified parents and detained the child. 5 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Do you feel that all schools should make the young people go 6 through metal detectors to make sure that they 7 8 don't bring any kind of ammunition of any sort 9 into schools? I think that most of the 10 CHIEF CRAIG: 11 schools in Detroit have a metal detector. Now, 12 what I'm told is that the high schools have armed 13 security. Middle schools and elementary schools 14 may have unarmed security; not necessarily DPS, but it might be, you know security companies that 15 16 work in the schools. But, to my knowledge, all 17 schools have that in place. I think its been noted that Detroit is one of the first cities to 18 place those detectors in the schools. 19 20 COMMISSIONER BELL: Commissioners. 21 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes, Chief. First 22 of all, thank you for today and for the news briefing today. Just fabulous work with the 23 24 cooperation with all of the departments and the 25 men and women of the Detroit Police Department.



And the Deputy Chief Bettison (ph) and I were talking earlier today saying yeah we're going to have a short summer if they keep calling these things in and you hit it right on the head. I just can't say enough at how I think your message came across very seriously that we're not playing with them.

8 First, I'd like to thank your staff. 9 Assistant Chief Williams had a request to address some traffic issues on the Gratiot speedway and 10 he immediately got on it and was yielding the 11 result of that, the things that were out there. 12 13 There are some speeders out there and he told me 14 a couple of them were clocked at 70 miles an hour so that's bad. But I'd like to thank him and his 15 16 staff and the men and women of the Detroit Police 17 Department Special Traffic Unit that's probably 18 participating.

19 Secondly, I did receive an e-mail from a 20 constituent. I'm not going to say her name. I'm 21 going to give this to you afterwards. She had a 22 concern that 20101 West Eight Mile there's a medical marijuana clinic there. It's on the west 23 24 corner of Vaughn. And then on December 12th the 25 Board has only approved the variance of spacing



1 for 20041 West Eight Mile which is on the east 2 corner of Vaughn and Eight Mile. Her concern was 3 that during the hearing and all the paperwork 4 that she had was does this violate the act that the City -- the ordinance that the City put in 5 with the distance they can be in the same area. 6 So I would appreciate it if your staff or someone 7 could look into it and if they are operating 8 9 illegally we need to get them shut down. CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, yes, we 10 11 can make that happen. In fact, Todd, if we could figure out and lieutenant if we could figure out 12 at the NPO first go over and take a look. 13 Then 14 maybe Grant, if you can check the zoning part of 15 it. Thank you. 16 COMMISSIONER BELL: Any other comments for the Chief? 17 Mr. Chair, I just 18 COMMISSIONER MALLET: want to point out that when we had the report of 19 20 the speeding going through Cody High School the significant participation of the supervisor, you 21 22 and I had this discussion and the Board had this discussion before, the importance of having 23 24 supervisory personnel involved. And I compliment 25 the officers in the scout car for following the

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1 direction that was immediately given. 2 But in this circumstance, it's true in 3 the hospital, it's true I'm positive on the 4 streets in the City of Detroit, well-trained interested available supervision is going to be 5 crucial for the execution of everybody's 6 responsibility so I just want to compliment the 7 management for a job well done. 8 9 CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you. This is another area I just wanted to kind of echo when 10 11 it comes to accountability. You know, in particular when we have an egregious act 12 13 involving a ranking member of the department, the 14 message has to be consistent and clear that managers will be held accountable but they're 15 16 held to a higher level of accountability. 17 We think about the consent judgement 18 that this Department was under for twelve years, 19 as many will remember, the way we effectively got 20 out from under that because managers were held accountable. It's one thing to hold police 21 22 officers accountable, but if bosses are not doing what they should do that's when you will see 23 24 If they're not addressed or if they're problems. 25 not held accountable then it sends a message to

1 the rank in file that's why we are going to be 2 treated differently so I appreciate the comments. 3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Any other comments for the Chief? 4 5 (None responded.) COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Chief. 6 We appreciate you for your leadership and 7 involvement in the City of Detroit. I do have 8 9 one issue with you; Assistant Chief White, we're going to go for it. Even though LA is a 10 11 (inaudible) city, right, but we're an urban city we are going to go for it. So I just really 12 13 commend you. I want to lift up Captain Gardner 14 from the 5th Precinct who participated in that I don't know all the players but I saw 15 forum. some of it on Facebook and I think fitness is 16 crucial so we have raised it to another level and 17 18 I want to thank the Chief and the Academy. 19 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: If I may, Board, 20 through the Chair, I will be presenting the Board 21 with the names of everyone who participated. 22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay. Outstanding. ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: And I would be 23 24 remiss if I did not also inform the Board that 25 there was no taxpayer dollars associated with

this endeavor. This is the foundation via
 Chemical Bank that supported our officers going
 out.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. And I
5 appreciate them taking the initiative. That's
6 not an easy run by all means.

Through the Chair, I ran 7 CHIEF CRAIG: 8 that race, not this past year, and I will tell you as the Assistant Chief knows, some of the 9 legs are uphill so you're going through different 10 elevations. And one member of the team who is 11 actually an outstanding runner kind of mis-judged 12 13 the hill, and as Chief White described, he 14 couldn't figure it out. He'd seen the guy run but he was totally whipped. When you're at that 15 16 elevation and going straight uphill and that's 17 kind of that terrain on the west coast, it's up 18 and down. So usually the higher the elevation 19 it's a shorter distance so some of the legs were 20 as long as ten miles. Some are six, five and so 21 it's an interesting race but I'm with you. I'm 22 hoping Detroit goes next year and takes the cup. COMMISSIONER BELL: You heard it here. 23 24 We appreciate your leadership. I'm going to ask



Mr. Hicks to send out a get well card on behalf

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1 of the Chair of the Board to all those officers I think we need to let them know -- I 2 listed. 3 know we mention them every week, but I think we 4 need to send out a get well and lift them up. I 5 want to make one other announcement that if you want to speak, Mr. Brown, the cards, you have one 6 more opportunity to do that to fill out the card. 7 8 I want to introduce Lieutenant Shaw from the 9 Michigan State Police. You always do an outstanding job even this afternoon speaking to 10 11 the issues. So we appreciate you. Any others 12 that I might have missed? Do I see City Wide Leadership Team -- not City Wide. Detroit Police 13 14 Citizen Academy Alumni Association. COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. 15 Very

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Hank you. Very
16 important support for DPD and thank you for your
17 leadership. I think we covered everyone. We're
18 going to move right on to hearing the Chief of
19 Police Improvement Plan.

ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Good afternoon again. I will be introducing Lieutenant Brandon Lewis from my staff. As the Board is aware by charter mandates pro annual improvements plan, today is not that presentation. It's an update on the improvement plan. With that, Lieutenant



1 Brandon.

2 LIEUTENANT BRANDON: Good afternoon, I just wanted to give you all a brief 3 Board. 4 update. We're going to present the improvement plan. We have it scheduled to be presented to 5 you right around the time when we do the annual 6 report. So in this report the report has command 7 8 officers information. Command officers were 9 tasked with assessing their current operations as well as noting the needs for the improvements 10 such as facility improvements, additional 11 12 vehicles, manpower allocations, challenges, 13 equipment upgrades, et cetera.

14 The department -- I'm sorry. The documents will be sectioned off by precinct and 15 16 There will be images of the command command. 17 officers and captains, organizational charts, 18 personnel. (Inaudible) is here today with crime 19 comparison charts. And we're also very excited 20 about some of our on-going successes, some of the 21 new strategies and key improvements and goals 22 that we've accomplished over the last year. So those things will also be captured in the plan. 23 24 So, again, this will be submitted for executive 25 review at the beginning of May and we anticipate



1 again it to be delivered to you to the Board 2 around the same time as the annual report. So on behalf of officer support operations we'd like to 3 4 thank you again for your continued support for 5 this report. 6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Lieutenant. 7 8 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: When you said 9 updated vehicles, I thought we had updated vehicles already. Do we have more updated 10 vehicles coming? 11 12 LIEUTENANT BRANDON: Yes. 13 ASSISTANT WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the 14 Chair, as you know, we have a four-year vehicle strategy. We have implemented year one and we 15 16 are going to commence with the implementation of 17 year two. Year two will be captured in the 18 annual improvement report to list vehicle 19 improvements as part of our implementing overall 20 performance of the precinct. 21 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: When you say 22 improvements, are you talking about different cars or the cars we just received? 23 24 CHIEF WHITE: We have a four-year 25 vehicle strategy so we have year one and this



1	report will capture the year two vehicles so
2	we're getting more new vehicles, so yes, to
3	answer your question. And we'll be getting more
4	new vehicles next year as well.
5	COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Okay. Thank you.
б	COMMISSIONER MALLET: They want you to
7	be comfortable in your ride along.
8	COMMISSIONER BELL: Any other questions
9	or comments?
10	(None responded.)
11	COMMISSIONER BELL: We're looking
12	forward to the upcoming report and thank you for
13	clarifying the new vehicles because surely we
14	need vehicles. At some point in time we might
15	Chief Craig sort of indicted to us when we first
16	came. We all had different cars and different
17	colors and LA have one uniform car system. But
18	we it's Motown. This is Motor City. We roll
19	regardless of what we ride in.
20	CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, I might
21	remind you of one of my early experiences here;
22	the 9th Precinct on a call man with the gun
23	officers in foot pursuit. I respond. I arrive.
24	Suspect is taken into custody, placed in the back
25	seat of the car. Officer enters the car, turns

the key, nothing happens. At the same time that 1 2 officer in full uniform slid underneath the car and hit the contacts on the starter and it 3 4 started right up. So that was what I witnessed. 5 COMMISSIONER BELL: I agree with you. It's been a challenge over the years. I think 6 we're on the right path because cars are sort of 7 crucial on patrol to have the -- not just his 8 ride along but all the technology and the 9 comfort. 10 11 COMMISSIONER MALLET: I agree with you. Thank you, sir. I appreciate that. 12 I have one other 13 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: 14 question. Once we start phase two, you know, is this in the budget from the first phase? 15 Is that 16 in that budget or is this a different budget? ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: 17 So these are O 18 of L dollars that have been morphed that was broken down into our various budget dollars --19 20 strike that. This is budgeted for fire safety 21 and we extracted our budget so when we projected 22 out our budget we projected out year one was last year's budget. Budgeting year two out of this 23 24 year's budget and we're making going forward. So 25 we have a four-year strategy for deployment based

1 on call for service number of officers at each 2 precinct and number of cars needed. The only increase that we've had is the implementation of 3 4 the NPO Program and we've got a strategy that 5 won't impact the budget. We're going to use some older vehicles. We're going to move over to the 6 new vehicles. 7 8 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Some older 9 vehicles-10 ASSISTANT CHIEF: For NPO. 11 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Yeah, but the NPO vehicles are already old. 12 13 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Well, they are 14 going to newer than the other vehicles but older. COMMISSIONER SANDERS: The vehicles I've 15 16 been seeing they should be selling them in a 17 scrap yard. 18 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: The new vehicles 19 systems that are coming out are quite dynamic. 20 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Will they be able to take them home? 21 22 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: If they live in the City. 23 24 COMMISSIONER BELL: The next item of 25 business would be standing and ad hoc committee



1 for one of the very important committees. I'm 2 going to ask Commissioner Brooks to report out on that. Before I do that I want to introduce 3 4 Commissioner Willie Burton from District 5. He 5 joined us about ten minutes ago. Thank you for your attendance, sir. Commissioner Brooks, 6 Recruiting. 7

8 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I had a meeting 9 set up and I had to cancel the meeting due to personal problem; however, we're back on track 10 11 and I will be putting another meeting together 12 but I have a list of names of places where we can 13 recruit. Recruiting is very crucial now. I know 14 you all know that because police are getting hurt 15 and guns are everywhere so we are very, very 16 blessed and fortunate to have young people who 17 are still passionate about being policemen.

18 So anyone out there that knows any 19 place, and I've said this time and time again, 20 recreation centers, churches, a corner, any place where we can set up a recruiting table get in 21 22 touch with me and we will be there because I never felt so much about recruiting as I do now 23 24 because we're going down in graduation and we 25 should be going up. We only had 40 that the

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1 Mayor suggested we have a month and we've got to 2 get back to that. And again, we will recruit anyone as long as they have all the 3 4 qualifications that we need. So, please, if you know of any place 5 there's a gentleman out there that gave me a 6 place and I thank you, sir. I don't remember 7 8 your name but I'm looking directly at you. I 9 haven't gotten to it yet but we will be getting to it. 10 11 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, 12 Commissioner Brooks. Any standing or any other 13 committee want to report out at this time? 14 (None responded.) COMMISSIONER BELL: If not I will move 15 16 on to our Board Secretary, Mr. Hicks. 17 MR. HICKS: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Ι 18 want to call your attention to the seven items that are listed on the Agenda. 19 Largely these 20 items are -- well, are incoming communications as well as responses. The item that I did want to 21 22 spend some time, very abbreviated but some time with you, is a communication that we received 23 24 from the Chief directed to the Chair, which 25 discussed the lack of notice from the Police

Commission in the case of suspensions without pay
 hearings.

3 I do want to report that although we 4 just received this from the Chief, our leadership made a decision on this item really a couple 5 months ago. If you recall, we met we had a 6 meeting, I think it was January 31st as part of 7 our Chairperson's Briefing and you initiated a 8 9 new protocol relative to the notations that come to us for our suspensions without pay. I just 10 want to so the record is clear to review those 11 just quickly. 12

First is that when we receive the 13 14 notations from the Chief we are now placing those one week after placing them on the agenda one 15 16 week after our receipt. So you would normally 17 never receive the item for board action within 18 seven days roughly and taking it all the way out upon receiving the notification. With those --19 20 what those seven days allows for us to do is a couple things. One is we're under requirement 21 22 and we have done this in the past, and that is for our attorney to the Board to conduct a 23 24 review/investigation and its only investigation 25 to the extent that there are questions that need



1 to be clarified from the information in which we 2 received. We want to give ample enough time for 3 that to take place.

4 And, as you know, the attorney for the Board responds to the Board with a review and a 5 recommendation as to whether or not one should --6 whether or not staff in this case is recommending 7 concurrence with the Chief's recommendations. 8 So 9 we formally put a recommendation in front of you for you to act upon. You're of course under no 10 11 obligation to act upon this to move in the direction in which we suggest you would use your 12 own independent wisdom in order to do that. 13

14 Secondly, it does allow for us to notify 15 the police unions in this case, in most cases, 16 It also involves lieutenants and sergeants DPOA. 17 but any other union that might be impacted. In 18 the past our practice had been to notify them and 19 we would notify them essentially by phone. There 20 was an instance that occurred, which I think was 21 the subject of this where the notification went 22 out and we were unable to directly talk with one of the attorneys who was involved in the case and 23 24 therefore I left a message.

25

The attorney's view is stated of course



received the message and subsequent to that a 1 2 grievance was filed. In reviewing that grievance, the Law Department, we met with the 3 4 Law Department and the Law Department indicated to us there was a 1985 case which we summarized 5 as Lauderdale case where we are under a duty to 6 notify the police union in connection with these 7 types of things. We institute a process for 8 9 doing that. As we move forward we not only will 10 notify them by e-mail but we will also send them a written notification but the e-mail 11 notification is the one which we'll start the 12 13 tracking and we are going to give them five days 14 advance notification in connection with a determination by the Board to place an item for 15 action on this Agenda. 16 We also as had been the case in the 17

18 past, we ask them whether or not they want a closed session. We've in the past they have 19 20 indicated sometimes yes closed and other times 21 no. We'd also ask them whether or not the 22 officer or member of the police union would be available or would like to be available for the 23 hearing and then we'd -- they would of course 24 25 tell us their preference in that area. When we

1 receive that we use that information in order to essentially organize an open or a closed meeting. 2 You always have in the event that the 3 4 officer is not requesting a closed meeting and if 5 in your judgement you decide not to go into a closed meeting. You always reserve the right to 6 handle the item in an open session and in some 7 cases you've done that and in other cases you 8 9 have not. And then the last part of this is that our notations, especially into the future, we 10 will document them so that the unions will not be 11 in a position to come back and suggest that they 12 13 did not receive notification. Again, that policy 14 as I've outlined it was corrected back in January or enhanced back in January up until last night, 15 16 I think about 4:30 last evening. We had not 17 received any additional referrals from the Chief's office relative to administrative or 18 19 suspensions without pay. We do now have one that 20 came in, as I said, last night. We will initiate this policy in 21 22 connection with them so you would not see this item on your Agenda for seven days and the 23 24 notations to the police unions and so forth would

25 take place.

1	COMMISSIONER BELL: Any questions or
2	concerns for Mr. Hicks?
3	(None responded.)
4	COMMISSIONER BELL: And we all received
5	the communication. It's the formal process we're
6	going to go through so we all received
7	communication in your mail. If not you need to
8	contact Mr. Hicks. Under old business we're
9	going to hear from our attorney of the Board,
10	Mr. Wyrick.
11	MR. WYRICK: Thank you, Chair Bell.
12	Through the Board, last week as you all may
13	recall, we had a situation by a young man by the
14	name of Nathaniel Sanders who applied to become a
15	Detroit Police Officer and had also been
16	struggling with this situation for several years.
17	He was initially denied or disqualified back in
18	2009. He has made strides in his life since
19	then. He has been gainfully employed at Kroger
20	since 2007 and 2011 he became a member of the
21	United States Army Reserve.
22	The question that we were left with last
23	week was the issue of whether or not he would be
24	eligible to be MCOLES certified based upon his
25	prior contact I would call the justice system.

1 What was holding him back was that's the way the 2 department looked upon him is that they looked upon him as being convicted as a felony based 3 4 upon the CCW charge that actually happened in Dearborn, Michigan when he was 15 years old. 5 However, considering he was adjudicated in Wayne 6 County Family Court Juvenile Court it's not 7 really considered a criminal conviction and 8 9 actually there should be a memorandum that I actually wrote as well in your packet of 10 11 materials. He was actually adjudicated as 12 opposed to convicted. That's a distinction between juvenile justice and adult justice. 13

14 The juvenile justice system is considered to be more rehabilitative. 15 The adult 16 justice system is more punitive. So based upon 17 that he was asked in 2013 as an adult able to get 18 that adjudicated case set aside whereby it's not really supposed to be held against him. 19 I have 20 communicated with two individuals at MCOLES over the past couple days while being the chief 21 22 investigator one actually being their counsel about this situation and they're of the same 23 24 opinion that I am that an adjudicated case in 25 Wayne County Juvenile Court cannot be held

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1	against him for MCOLES eligibility.
2	The only caveat that the commission
3	counsel gave me is that MCOLES when they
4	investigate him for licensing they can still go
5	and review his Court file and if they see
6	something in the Court file that they don't like
7	they can still hold that against him. But
8	there's a very high likelihood I would say access
9	of 90 percent that they would not hold that
10	against him.
11	COMMISSIONER BELL: Make it crystal
12	clear.
13	MR. WYATT: He'll be eligible. That's
14	not my decision to make.
15	COMMISSIONER BELL: I just want to make
16	sure. Could you state that again.
17	MR. WYATT: He will be eligible to be
18	MCOLES certified.
19	COMMISSIONER BELL: So he could go
20	through the process if we indicate it by our
21	motion and resolution. Thank you, sir.
22	MR. HICKS: Mr. Chair, if I could add to
23	that; we have also planned to send a
24	communications to MCOLES that kind of summarizes
25	these events and ask them to place this on their

board agenda for review so that they seek a
policy resolution in this area as opposed to
taking it every time an individual may be in this
situation because it appears that an adjustment
of policy on their side might clear up this
problem in the future.

COMMISSIONER BELL: Ms. Lamar, would you
care to respond in terms of this particular
issue?

10 MS. LAMAR: Good afternoon. Bridgette 11 Lamar, Interim Personnel Director. At this time 12 we would like to have our recruitment division as 13 well as the attorney for the department to look 14 at this matter before we respond to the Board.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. I know 16 you want to weigh in so we want to make sure 17 we're all on the same page as we go forward. Ι 18 want to thank the Board for taking the initiative 19 to give this young man an opportunity. I think 20 we are trying to give folks second opportunities to meet criteria. It's clear if you have a 21 22 felony you cannot be a Detroit Police Officer. 23 That's been long standing. We're not trying to 24 alter that. Certain circumstances might be 25 considered under certain circumstances and he met

1 that criteria. Others might not meet it if for 2 asking for that type of clarity. Commissioner Sanders, you had a question? 3 4 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Yes. Mr. White-5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Mr. Wyrick. 6 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: 7 I just want to 8 know when we get those cars coming to the 9 department can I possibly get a list like we did before. Since I'm a chair I like to be able to 10 know exactly what we have coming in and when I'm 11 12 out here at some of these stations knowing that the cars is there and not somewhere else. 13 So if 14 it's possible can I get that list? ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: We're in the 15 16 process right now. The stops where the vehicles 17 are going to be deployed, we're in the 10th 18 Precinct today. We're making deployment decisions based on vehicle need and vehicle 19 20 assessment so it will be approximately 30 days in 21 its deployment before I can give you the 22 finalized list. But today we're at Number 10, SRT, and there's another unit. I can't remember. 23 24 I can provide you with a list as we go and a 25 final list at the conclusion.

1	COMMISSIONER SANDERS: I appreciate
2	that.
3	COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I have a question.
4	Do officers command staff, whatever, live outside
5	the City, are they allowed to take vehicles home?
6	ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: It would to
7	answer your question regarding command staff,
8	yes. Other officers if they are in recall
9	status, such as homicide, and they are on recall
10	a vehicle is provided to them so they can make
11	that assignment should they be recalled.
12	COMMISSIONER DAVIS: So are there very
13	many command staff officers who take vehicles
14	outside the City?
15	ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: When you say
16	very many there are some, yes.
17	MR. HICKS: Can we also while we have
18	the Chief there ask update in connection with the
19	new cars to be assigned to BOPC and OIC.
20	COMMISSIONER BELL: Assistant Chief
21	White.
22	ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Yes, sir.
23	Through the Chair, the purchase request went
24	through. It went before the review committee.
25	It is my understanding through the agency CFOs

office is that the funds have been allocated and
 if they have not been ordered they are scheduled
 to be ordered before the end of March.
 So about a week ago I was told they went
 through the process and were scheduled to be

ordered but I don't want to commit to the fact that that has occurred already. I will have to check to follow up but it should be scheduled.

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9 MR. HICKS: Through the Chair, my 10 understanding was that order had taken place 11 several months ago. Is there a reason why our 12 order is out of the sequence? I'm just asking 13 because I don't know.

14 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: So we went through the vehicle committee on a lot of our 15 16 There was some movement to that. purchases. Т 17 don't want to misrepresent to the Board. I will 18 have to check. One of the line items was the 19 BOPC vehicles. There was not an issue with that 20 so I don't know if they were in fact ordered yet 21 but I will let you know by the end of today -- in 22 fact, as soon as we're done here today I will double check. 23

24 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Mr. Chairman,25 just for clarity, these are for the investigatory



1 staff? 2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir. Mostly OCI but that's -- normally there's a break down 3 4 but mostly OCI, yes, sir. Just to indicate, none of 5 MR. HICKS: the cars that we're talking about would be 6 available to members of the Board of Police 7 8 Commissioners. We do not provide that kind of 9 support to the Board. 10 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: You have to drive 11 your own. 12 COMMISSIONER MALLET: I know that. 13 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: I just want to 14 make sure you do. COMMISSIONER BELL: Let's move on. Any 15 16 other any new business? 17 (None responded.) 18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Announcements. Our next meeting will be Thursday, March 29, last 19 20 meeting of the month, here at Public Safety Headquarters at 3 p.m. Next community meeting 21 22 will be on Thursday, April 12, 2018 6:30 p.m. in the 11th Precinct Peace Baptist Church at 13450 23 Goddard Avenue. Next, the union president, he 17 made a statement on the radio in the news that 18 there were over or just about 18 retirees a I think that's terrible because of the 19 month. 20 fact that we need all the policemen that we can 21 have. The Mayor and the City 22 Counsel has the authority to increase the policeman's salary, but my question is how long 23 24 will they neglect or ignore the fact that their 25 lives matter. Every day that they put on their

1 uniform I support the police to the highest; 2 always did since 73. Whenever I see them out on the street I always address them and tell them 3 4 you be careful out there and be safe and their 5 response to me is thank you madam. We appreciate So I'm just saying we have so much that we 6 it. have to do in the City. We have buildings being 7 built. I live in Midtown so I know what's going 8 9 on just about. We have owners that are coming in buying property all over the place. 10 In the 11 meantime, the police is at risk every day when they put their uniforms on, and we as citizens, 12 13 we must respect them and we have to emphasize 14 that daily to the citizens here in the City of Detroit. They got a life of their own and they 15 16 need to be respected. I would like also to tell you I met 17 18 Chief Holt going on the elevator and he would 19 like very much to have this meeting of the Police 20 Commissioners come to Wayne State sometimes. He thinks I have an input on it. So Chief I'm just 21 22 extending that information to you. He wants, if

1	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Ms.
2	Smith. This is the Board of Police
3	Commissioners.
4	MS. SMITH: I'm sorry. I don't mean to
5	ignore the Police Commissioners. I just look at
6	him all the time because he looks at me all the
7	time.
8	COMMISSIONER BELL: This is the Board of
9	Police Commissioners and I want to say-
10	CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, she
11	likes to look at me. I just want to address she
12	asked a few questions. I think our attrition is
13	a little lower than 18 a month. It fluctuates.

19	year we had a total of 130. Again, we are down

23	knows that the Mayor is concerned about salaries,
24	increase in salaries, the Chief is concerned, the
25	counsel is concerned, we're all concerned but

1 we're under a budget and this city has come a 2 long way the last four or five years but we're all concerned and I have opportunity to speak to 3 4 each academy class in the academy just like this graduating class, and the bottom line is they 5 recognize the salaries and the benefits; that's 6 not why they're here. They're here to serve the 7 City of Detroit and they want to be police 8 9 officers. I'm proud to say that is what we have 10 witnessed tremendous turn out to join our ranks.

The second item; officers reaching 11 12 retirement age, at some point in time they're 13 going to retire just like myself and others. So 14 that's a blessing. They can go on but basically we're doing everything possible to keep these 15 officers in the rank as long as possible. 16 We 17 have that issue on going all the time. But the 18 -- to the timeline is there's not enough money. 19 I don't think there's ever going to be 20 compensation in terms of police officers putting their lives on the line. Some of us wouldn't do 21 22 it. Some of us take on the responsibility that we engage. It's like firefighters and other 23 24 first responders. They know it's not the money. 25 They can't pay you enough. So I just want to



commend the officers who are joining our ranks
 tomorrow morning. Mr. Blunt, you have the floor.
 Thank you.

4 MR. BLUNT: Good afternoon, Board. It 5 was over a year ago, February to be exact, that I've pleaded with the Board and the police 6 officers to institute two major items I thought 7 8 would really help situations; and that was body worn cameras and electronic weapons better known 9 10 as tasers.

11 I come to you today with a heavy heart because of what happened Sunday in Sacramento, 12 13 California with Stephon Clark. His brutal murder 14 was captured on body worn cameras. It was 21 shots fired at him that were not tasers. 15 So in 16 light of this, I'd like to request the police 17 department to give us a monthly update on the 18 progress of body worn cameras and the employment 19 -- or deployment of tasers. Thank you.

20 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, as of 21 today, and James White correct me if I'm wrong, 22 we have four deployment of body worn cameras 23 throughout the department including our special 24 response team.

ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: That is correct,



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1	Chief as well as our secondary employment.
2	CHIEF CRAIG: So as an add on we include
3	our secondary employment; so when they work
4	secondary employment they are wearing body worn
5	cameras. And as far as tasers, as you may know,
б	we are under a pilot at the 4th Precinct and the
7	City Council did approve the budget so we will
8	commence with the deployment. I don't have a
9	timeline unless you have a better timeline of
10	what that might look like.
11	ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: We will start
12	our first precinct I apologize. We just got
13	locked and our deployment will be in the next 45
14	days for one of our precincts.
15	CHIEF CRAIG: Do you know which precinct
16	is first?
17	ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: 4.
18	CHIEF CRAIG: 4 is test and they're
19	going to-
20	ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: They're going to
21	go fully.
22	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Assistant
23	Chief White. I don't think we're going to be
24	able to give you a monthly report on it. We are
25	working on it. We have body cameras and car

1 cameras working. We're utilizing those tools and 2 you just heard AC White report on the pilot 3 program. We cannot give you a monthly report but 4 we are working on it. We have our own agenda in 5 terms of how we report out. Thank you, sir. 6 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, I want to add one thing as a reminder. One of the 7 things we have that no other major city that I'm 8 aware of but our in-car camera and our body worn 9 camera communicate with each other. We just 10 don't have the frontal view, but when that 11 officer leaves the car if certain triggers are 12 13 activated; let's say he or she is in a foot 14 pursuit away from the front of the car or 15 contact, it will transition over to the body worn 16 camera. 17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. Is that 18 on the website, the body policy, on the website? 19 MR. HICKS: The policy, yes. The policy

20 should be accessible on the website.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: You can review that 22 and see what's involved. It's on our website on 23 both items but not the tasers. We're still 24 working on that.

MR. HICKS: Mr. Chair, can I also raise



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1 one other question. I was asked by Commissioner 2 Brown to put together some information for him and; one of those was in the area of these body 3 4 worn cameras and electronic control weapons. One of the issues that I was not able to resolve and 5 I was going to research it but I ask it here and 6 that is on the tasers themselves, especially for 7 8 the pilot program, if I recall there was a camera 9 also loaded onto the tasers in the pilot process, if I recall. And the question, if I'm first of 10 11 all correct on that, the question would be on the expanded purchase that would be deployed across 12 13 the city. Would they likewise have cameras 14 loaded on those tasers?

CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, the 15 16 idea of cameras being on certain tasers is for non-uniformed staff like detectives who are 17 18 carrying tasers because they're not wearing body worn cameras. Would have -- that taser would 19 20 have the added feature of the camera. It would be no need for a uniformed officer to have a 21 22 camera on the taser because they're already wearing body worn cameras. So the idea is that 23 24 it would catch the deployment of the taser and 25 it's a more expensive purchase but we have body



1	worn cameras so it's not needed on that device.
2	MR. HICKS: Thank you, Chief.
3	ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: And I just have
4	an answer. Your vehicles were in fact ordered
5	and they should be on the ground within 30 days.
6	And, with regards to the funding source, over the
7	next four years these will be capitol dollars so
8	it will not be budgetary dollars; it will be paid
9	for out of capitol.
10	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.
11	COMMISSIONER MALLET: Mr. Chair, if I
12	might, one of the things that the interim chief
13	inspector, who I hope we thanked him for the very
14	good work that he did, I think we can ask
15	Dr. McAlger one of the observations made was that
16	the body worn cameras were excellent in terms of
17	recording incidents as they occurred but he had
18	not come to a judgement as to whether or not it
19	was actually modifying the behavior that the
20	cameras were recording if you know what I mean.
21	So I would say to Dr. McAllister that
22	would be something to look at because as we read
23	and I know many of us do read the citizen
24	complaints, many many times Mr. Chairman, the
25	actual complaint is being verified by the body

1 worn camera. So I don't know if we're going to 2 be able, Chief, to prove the negative that the 3 body worn camera is preventing people from doing 4 things inappropriately because they're behaving appropriately but it is an interesting thing that 5 we are many, many, many of the citizen complaints 6 I know that your office reviews there is actual 7 recorded etched to support the citizen complaint 8 9 that's being lodged. So I guess the point, Mr. Chairman, is it's not a cure all. I believe 10 it's helpful but it is not a cure all. 11 These things are still -- we're still getting citizen 12 13 complaints.

14 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, there has been some research and there has been 15 16 instances where there's been a reduction of 17 citizen complaints. Also, not only modifying the officers' behavior but also citizens' behavior 18 because in the past without that recording 19 20 sometimes citizens can make false claims and if it's recorded and also if a false report is made. 21 22 Like one comes to mind where a female who was arrested made a false report that she was 23 24 sexually assaulted in the back seat of a police 25 car and she was unaware that there's a camera

inside the car that looks at the back seat. She
 was charged.

3 COMMISSIONER MALLET: I'm not saying 4 that they're not additive but I think that's the exact point; that they're additive but they're 5 not going to cure it all. I think Dr. McAllister 6 I think I made reference, Mr. Hicks, to an 7 article in the month, a month or two ago based on 8 9 Sacramento's experience with body worn. It's just something that I think we would want to 10 monitor and see how it's going and whether or not 11 it's having the positive effect that we hope for. 12

MR. HICKS: Mr. Chair, if I may add on 13 14 Akbar's point one of the items he indicated in and continually would point this out is that 15 16 oftentimes and whether or not one sustains the 17 complaint that we're closing the gap in terms of 18 sustaining complaints so what we're finding 19 because of the presence of the body worn cameras 20 or other supportive evidence we're able to conclusively determine more than you would by if 21 22 you did not have these items on whether or not the citizen's complaint should be whether or not 23 24 you sustain the citizen complaint or indicate 25 that the officer simply did not do or was

1	involved in the behavior that the complaint
2	suggested.
3	COMMISSIONER MALLETT: I agree. That's
4	a good concern; however, next week I will be
5	presenting some of that data. And just to give
б	you an overview of it, DPD is looking rather good
7	and that's with the use of the cameras and I'll
8	demonstrate that in my presentation next
9	Thursday.
10	COMMISSIONER BELL: I think you're going
11	to see demeanor throughout. You're going to see
12	that, but like you say, you raise a good point.
13	It's common sense that we're going to see a
14	difference.
15	MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next speaker
16	is Ms. Yolanda McCant followed by Rico Rizzo.
17	MS. MCCANT: Good afternoon to the
18	Board. My name is Yolanda McCant. I'm here
19	today for more or less like a citizen complaint
20	or I shouldn't say a citizen complaint because
21	I am involved directly with my police station and
22	I am the president of a board that is within the
23	police department, I find out that we are lacking
24	some communications not through the actual police
25	department because we have that and through the

1 citizens who participate but from this Board. We do not have any interaction with this Board. 2 Some of my members don't understand what this 3 4 board is. Some of them don't even know anything about this board. So if we could have the second 5 Wednesday of each month a person or all of you to 6 come to one of our meetings and just introduce 7 8 yourself. You don't even have to all come at one 9 time but if we could have some type of representation from this Board we would 10 11 appreciate it so much. 12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you for 13 bringing that to our attention. We would really

14 take that up to respond. On the second Wednesday 15 what time?

16 MS. MCCANT: At 6 o'clock right here in 17 this same room in this building so therefore you 18 don't have to leave home. Another thing that I have, and I don't know whether -- I think maybe 19 20 the Chief or one of his designees can answer for 21 me is these marijuana grow houses in our 22 neighborhood. When I say literally in our neighborhoods, in our back door. I stay on the 23 24 east side East Davison and Sherwood, Van Dyke and 25 McNichols and they've taken those auto body shops

1 and turned them into the grow houses; not the 2 dispensaries, but the grow houses. So us as 3 residents, and I know the legal ramifications, 4 some are licensed, some are not, but how do we as citizens find out whether or not these facilities 5 are legal or nonlegal? 6 Through the Chair, as I 7 CHIEF CRAIG: always said, I encourage you to work the 8 9 precinct, I think it's 11th Precinct, and if there's an illegal grow house then they can take 10 appropriate action. And certainly Todd Bettison 11 12 who is seated behind you can assist. If you 13 report it and if you work with the precinct and 14 they don't respond that's a different issue, but that's the way I recommend it be done. 15 16 MS. MCCANT: But they have. 17 CHIEF CRAIG: And the 11th Precinct has 18 shut a number of them down. In fact, I know probably 11th Precinct has probably the higher 19 20 number of grow houses that have been shut down at least over the last six months. I don't know, 21 22 A.C. Williams, if you -- there's been a number of 23 them. But I encourage you to continue to work 24 with your precinct. 25 MS. MCCANT: And I do. We do make -- I



1 make them aware of what's going on but it's like 2 I don't know. I talk here but I'm going to City Council because somebody is authorizing these 3 4 buildings to go up or it to be switched over or 5 to even give them licenses to go in there to do it. So I think that's the biggest problem; the 6 fact that it is one business and now it's another 7 business but then you got licenses so how they 8 9 can switch over from an auto body shop to a marijuana grow house? You have to have licenses. 10 11 You have to have permits. You have to have all 12 of the above. It's something that's not being 13 done that should be done or either somebody palms 14 getting greased. It's just coming up to much.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: If you can speak to 16 Deputy Chief Bettison in reference to that and 17 also have interaction with Theresa Blossom, our 18 community person, make sure she gets all your contact information that we can close that 19 20 communication gap. But like you said, 11th Precinct is doing an excellent job in that 21 22 particular area, but if we have a concern I'm pretty sure we can address the issue. 23 It's a big 24 issue but we're trying to get to the next 25 speaker, please.



1MR. BROWN: Rico Rizzo followed by2Ashley Carter.

MR. RIZZO: Good afternoon, Chief and 3 4 the Board. Just a few announcements, couple comments. We can't help everybody out at once 5 but tomorrow night at 6 p.m. at Joseph Walker 6 Williams Recreation Center myself, Lamont 7 McCausey whose brothers are always together are 8 9 putting on a dinner to support his cause in the 12th and Clairmount community but also we're 10 going to write a check to the family of Officer 11 12 Glenn Doss. So if anyone wants to come out and donate to the cause we will be there 8431 Rosa 13 14 Parks at 6 p.m. We will have a couple dance groups performing, give a plaque to Councilwoman 15 16 Mary Sheffield's team and have Glenn Doss say a few words. So that will be tomorrow. 17

18 The second comment I had, and I've had a 19 conversation with Deputy Chief Bettison, is 20 getting to all these community groups who have 21 annual events. As you guys are aware, a lot of 22 them feel like they're grandfathered in as far as not having to pay for secondary employment or 23 24 police officers and then the day and age of 25 overtime being paid out in the city, I think

1 maybe having -- and maybe there isn't a policy or 2 one sheet that goes out to all the community 3 groups, so that they know exactly what's in store 4 when they put the event on and not when the event is about to come up and then they're like oh 5 we've got a \$35,000 bill what we do we didn't 6 raise any money for it. So I learned a long time 7 ago in economics class there's no such thing as a 8 9 free lunch and I think the communities also has to play a part in that. 10 11 My third comment would be as to the police department looked into purchasing bullet 12

13 proof baseball caps for officers? There's a 14 company called Bullet Safe and they're a little bit on the pricey side because I don't think many 15 16 people do it. They're about \$129 a hat, but they 17 have them so I don't know if that's something the 18 department may look to do in the future. I can 19 probably get a couple dozen donated if you guys 20 want to check them out. That's all.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir. 22 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, we have 23 looked at some protective covering for the 24 officers' head. I know Chief White is looking at 25 that. We're also looking at ballistic panels for



certain marked police vehicles to protect
 officers that are inside the vehicle or if we
 have to initiate a rescue effort.

4 In terms of the other issue you raised 5 regarding some of the smaller events that they're getting invoiced if they're placed on hold there 6 has been some decision made probably two, three, 7 four administrations ago, as relates to some 8 9 events, and so I will be meeting with the Mayor and we'll figure out certainly when you talk 10 11 about Cinco de mayo parade I think that's what 12 you were referencing those things, you know 13 certainly there's a community event and they 14 can't afford to pay but when you're talking about larger events like events that happen LCA or auto 15 16 shows, those things are open for some further 17 discussion.

18 MR. BROWN: Ashley Carter. Mr. Chair,19 that will be your last speaker.

20 MS. CARTER: Good afternoon, everyone. 21 My name is Ashley Carter and I have kind of a 22 comment and the second is a question. The first 23 comment is I have been doing some research on 24 policing in Detroit and I was pleased to see that 25 there's a data portal that the City has created

1 that lists criminal occurrences that happen 2 throughout the City, but it's not really user 3 friendly. I work somewhere where we have a data 4 person who was able to help me, but I really 5 couldn't figure out on my own what happens to cases or what happens to these incidents once 6 they transpire and the way that the incidents are 7 listed doesn't necessarily translate into 8 9 charges. So I'm wondering if there's any sort of conversation happening or questions being asked 10 about enhancing the quality of the data or the 11 12 way that it's presented on the portal.

And then the second question I have is I'm sure everyone is well aware of the creation of the new justice center that's being created; the new jail. I'm just wondering if the Police Commission has issued an opinion or has taken a stance on the creation of this new facility.

19COMMISSIONER BELL: We'll let the Chief20respond to your first question.

21 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, yes, as 22 relates to the data portal, I appreciate your 23 comments, good feedback. I will talk to the IT 24 folks. This is the first concern I've heard on 25 it. I will tell you, in terms of reporting out



1 crime in each of our areas, we do something 2 called community com stat so that community members can know where crimes are occurring. 3 4 What we don't have, and you bring up a good point, how is the case dis-positioned. 5 I've been very vocal at times about certain cases not being 6 charged, certain cases where judges have given 7 very low bonds and the final adjudication is such 8 9 that there's no -- how can you say it's done in such a way we go out and make the arrest but, you 10 know, if a criminal deserves to receive a certain 11 12 punishment is not punished then what happens? They re-offend. 13

14 I'm not saying you should just lock 15 people up because you can't arrest your way out 16 of a problem. I would rather not have to arrest 17 anyone and we continue to prevent crime, but 18 that's not the world we work in. People must 19 know that if you're a felon and you're carrying a 20 gun the next time you're caught with a gun you 21 shouldn't get a pop on the wrist. Then when you 22 find out that same person goes out and engages in a violent crime like homicide or non-fatal 23 24 shooting, I don't know how close we are with 25 putting the adjudication or even if we can do



1 that. That's an issue I just don't know the 2 answer, but we will take a look at this because 3 what you want is disposition.

4 MS. CARTER: Well, if I can respond. So 5 in my research I was looking for -- I wanted to know arrest numbers; like the types of arrests 6 that were happening, the numbers and then what 7 8 happened to those arrests. And what I found is 9 that there were way more incidents than actual cases, but when I reached out to the Prosecutor's 10 11 Office they allegedly don't keep data on dispositions, so I have like different pieces but 12 13 I'm looking to bring them all together and that's 14 where there seems to be a gap.

CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, I 15 16 certainly can't speak for the Prosecutors on 17 this. We do know dispositions of cases because 18 we make the arrests. We submit charges. Ultimately it's the Prosecutor's decision whether 19 20 to charge or not charge; and then once that's done it's the court's decision to determine 21 22 whether or not there's guilt or innocence. We're 23 just one part of the criminal justice system. 24 DEPUTY CHIEF BETTISON: Hello. Deputy

Chief Bettison for the record. I just want to



25

1 add that with the City of Detroit creating that 2 data portal for the community one of the things we needed to ensure that it was user friendly and 3 4 I understand it's not meeting your needs and I 5 would love to introduce you to our IT person as well, but we actually brought in the community, 6 the power users from block clubs, radio patrols 7 and sat them down with the IT web designers and 8 9 they gave their input and it was a long tedious process and a lot of critical feedback; but as a 10 result, the folks from the community, the early 11 users that have adopted it has met their needs 12 thus far and we've received good reviews for what 13 14 they're trying to do as far as block clubs, radio patrols, just giving them the preliminary data of 15 16 crime occurring in their neighborhood.

At this point in time the system like the Prosecutor's Office to even talk about dispositions, but at that point it's talking about incidents that have occurred. So it can warn folks about what's going on so that they can make appropriate and also their patrols to be eyes and ears.

24COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Deputy25Chief Bettison. And, Ms. Carter, the second



1 question about the Wayne County Justice Center. 2 That is a Wayne County issue. That is not a 3 Detroit issue. The Wayne County Executive Warren 4 Evans supports whatever is happening in there. In the future would be a Wayne County project. 5 I understand that, but I 6 MS. CARTER: also know that a few weeks ago the City Council 7 had to vote on switching plots of land with the 8

9 County and I just assumed because you are 10 involved in criminal justice that there might be 11 a position but okay.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: The last hurdle in 13 my understanding was the Board of Education, the 14 school board, and they voted to sell a parcel of land and cleared it up, so that is a Wayne County 15 16 project. So that's not something that DPD or 17 Board of Police Commissioners or City of Detroit 18 issue. But I think it's going to be something that's needed as we know from a criminal justice 19 20 aspect in terms of the system, the jail, the juvenile and all that. So thank you for 21 22 addressing those concerns. Ms. Lamar.

23 MS. LAMAR: Thank you for allowing me to 24 come back. For the record, Bridgette Lamar. I 25 do have Lieutenant James Cole, officer in charge



1 of our recruiting and McCowin who would like to 2 put on record the recruiting division did do some research to contact MCOLES so we would like to 3 4 put on the record our findings. 5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. LIEUTENANT COLES: Lieutenant James 6 I'm the officer in change of police 7 Coles. 8 recruiting. 9 MS. COWLING: My name is Sharon Cowling. I'm administrative assistant in recruiting. 10 LIEUTENANT COLES: So from the last 11 12 meeting that we had it was brought up about the standard that MCOLES has for felony offenders and 13 14 then try to make it into the Detroit Police Department, and I think we brought the 15 16 information out that MCOLES uses the Michigan 17 Statute, which basically states that they cannot 18 or they will not hire persons who were convicted of a felony for this Department or for any 19 20 Michigan Department. They will not certify those people. We reached out again. We talked to --21 22 excuse me. I'm going to butcher this name Mr. Sisbulick (ph). He's on the Michigan MCOLES 23 24 council and he advised us they meet six times a 25 year and he stated that as far as it goes,

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1 employees, employment standards he said it's 2 extraordinarily unlikely anyone with a felony conviction is going to get on and it's not likely 3 4 that they're going to change that. The issues that they had with what they told us with trying 5 to change it is because it makes it a little bit 6 too hard to determine who actually is going to 7 get that. 8

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Why don't we look at 10 it this way. This matter is still under review 11 so unless you have something in writing-

12 If I could just respond to MR. WYRICK: 13 that. With all due respect, through the Chair, I 14 spoke to the same gentleman that he just referred to the day after he did. He's actually the 15 Commission Counsel. I think where there's 16 17 confusion here is that this young man was not 18 convicted of a felony. He was adjudicated as a juvenile; that's the distinction. That's why 19 20 MCOLES will not hold it against him because he was adjudicated as a 15-year-old kid. 21

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Well, hopefully we 23 get some documentation in reference to the 24 juvenile situation so that's what we're trying to 25 clear up. We're not going to clear it up this



1afternoon so I appreciate your input. We2understand the felony for adults; that's crystal3clear. There's no appeal on that. But we're4trying to clear up this matter of dealing with a5juvenile, who was a juvenile at that time, so we6hopefully get that matter resolved.

7 LIEUTENANT COLES: Just a little extra
8 information. We did speak to him about juveniles
9 so I'm not sure of the conversation he had, but
10 that was how we presented-

11 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, if it 12 was adjudicated in a different way MCOLES may, as 13 what was reported out in your presentation, they 14 may -- we're not talking about someone convicted. 15 Not all juvenile offenses have felony 16 dispositions. In that case it is very different 17 so I think that's what we need to take a look at.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. That's 19 what we're trying to do. We can't resolve it by 20 -- we're trying to get some documentation in 21 terms of this particular matter so thank you. 22 It's something that we might be able to clear up 23 in the near future.

24MR. BROWN: That was your last speaker.25COMMISSIONER BELL: I want to thank you



1	for your attendance. I look for meeting next
2	week if you have the information on the community
3	meeting so share that. If there's no other
4	business the Chair will entertain a motion.
5	COMMISSIONER MALLET: Move to adjourn.
б	COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Support.
7	COMMISSIONER BELL: Motion carries.
8	Thank you.
